A CONSCIENTIOUS OFFICIAL

Last week the resignation of Eugene Miller, chairman of the Tax Lien Committee, was presented to Common Council and was accepted. This ended a period of service which Mr. Miller began during the depression when the committee was formed to handle liens on property acquired by the city through tax sales.

The loss of Mr. Miller as chairman of this important committee is a great one. An executive of a large New York financial institution, Mr. Miller gave freely of his services. He was paid nothing. He gave Railway many long hours of conscientious service which can't be bought at a high salary.

Through the efforts of Mr. Miller, the city was able to clear many liens on property it didn't want. The city has no use for property and it was Mr. Miller's duty to get that property back into a position where it would produce revenue. Through the efforts of the chairman and his colleagues, the Tax Lien Committee spent many hours arranging payment plans for former owners who have thus been able to get back their properties.

At the same time the city received tax revenue from these properties, an action which has reduced the tax bill of other residents who were not so unfortunate as to lose their properties during the depression.

It is to be hoped that when he is replaced, that his successor will be, like Mr. Miller, a conscientious citizen and not a politician. Politicians are not to be trusted with important matters like these which present great opportunity for political fence building.

Shortly before Mr. Miller's resignation, Council President Patten and Councilman DiCorno made themselves apologetic by criticism of the Tax Lien Committee. They claimed they were unable to get data which they sought from the committee.

We don't know what the aims of these two men are in this respect but we hope that they have been set on the right track by Councilman Jennings and Tax Receiver Fox who quickly refuted the criticism of this committee.

Mr. Miller's resignation was received by Council and accepted without comment. He wasn't even thanked by the governing body which probably would have gushed splendidly had Mr. Miller been a political stooge.

We want the people of Railway to know of the conscientious effort made by Mr. Miller and we know that the civic-minded citizens of the city who have no political axes to grind appreciate his work.

We hope that the Common Council will do something about the properties handled by the Tax Lien Committee so that the work of this committee will not go for naught and so that the city will get the revenue it deserves from these properties.

Every taxpayer has an interest in this matter.

COUNTY OFFICIALS WHO MERT SUPPORT AT POLLS TUESDAY

Although Railway voters are primarily interested in the local contests on the ballot at next Tuesday's election, they should not lose sight of the fact that there are other important offices to be filled, particularly in the county government.

Railway is greatly interested in the Freeholder race where a native son, Freeholder Alfred C. Brooks, is running for re-election. Railway is the only county municipality besides Elizabeth which has two representatives on the Board of Freeholders. The benefit of this representation is well-known here, and many improvements have been provided, thanks to representation which Freeholder Brooks and Gehring have given us.

Johnny Brooks has distinguished himself on the county board and it is only proper that his fellow townsmen, regardless of their political beliefs, should vote for his re-election. Tuesday morning with Brooks were two well-known officials whose re-elections are merited. They are Freeholders, Brooks and Smith. Brooks, a veteran of many years' service, merits backing along with Smith, the financial expert and Brooks, the favorite native son.

Another deserving servant who has spent 20 years in his office and is an expert whose services cannot be replaced is Register Edward Bauer. His systems have won praise for him and recognition for Union County as evidenced by the fact that they have been copied in other counties. He is ably assisted by Deputy Register W. L. B. Heinzelman of the city. Both these men should be retained and Mr. Heinzelman's many friends should recognize his service by voting for Mr. Bauer.

When one mentions Register Bauer, he naturally thinks of Surrogate Charles Otto, an experienced official who isn't in the limelight very much because he devotes all his time to his responsible position which he has filled ably for many years. This efficient incumbent deserves re-election and voters who put public welfare ahead of partisan politics will support him.

In New Jersey, the sheriff cannot succeed himself. For that reason, voters can't get mired support to Sheriff Lee Rigby. But they can assure the country of receiving the same type of efficiency which Rigby is giving us by voting for Alex Campbell. Campbell, first assistant to Sheriff Rigby, will continue the Rigby policies if elected. He deserves promotion to this position and with him in the field, it would be foolish to elect an inexperienced man to fill an important office.

These county officials have given good, efficient service with their conscientious performance of their duties. Why change when we are getting excellent performances from them?

Getting down to cases, it's difficult to make any predictions this year and feel safe about them. A good many taxpayers have told me they are pretty well fed up with the high tax rate which promises to go up further next year. These folks will vote against the administration and in so doing the Republicans will gain votes. Whether there will be enough folks who feel this way to swing the vote to the Republicans, remains to be seen. My personal opinion is that most of the folks will continue to string-along with the party in power.

The Republicans have made a good campaign this year and have brought out some good points which haven't been satisfactorily answered by the Democrats. This has created the impression that there are no answers to these questions. The majority of the Democrats are running for election which is another point which isn't encouraging to the Republicans. It's much easier to elect an "in" than an "out," especially when the "ins" haven't done a whole lot to arouse the public. Getting down to the serious business of predicting from where I sit it looks like the following but I hope nobody will bet upon my choices because maybe my seat isn't the proper one to give me a clear view of the future:

BARGER-JACOBSEN. The present Mayor has proven himself a good vote getter and even though some folks are a bit puzzled about his decision to run when he has repeatedly stated he didn't want to be a candidate again, there should be enough votes to elect him by a comfortable margin. Jacobsen, a newcomer in politics who is a successful man in one of the city's important industries, has made a good campaign and will make a good record as anyone is expected to against the biggest vote puller in the city's history. The result here will be Barger by a comfortable margin, sez I.

HEDEMAN-PAULSEN. The First Ward is still

strongly Democratic and even though Paulsen is an outstanding candidate, Hedeman is too much of a veteran campaigner to lose out this year. Hedeman should be re-elected in the First by a sizeable margin.

BORECH-FLATHMANN. A lot of folks say Tony

Borech is on the way out but when the results are in, he will still be the Councilman from the Second Ward. Unless the members of the Voter's League are just shouting to hear their own voices, I can't see how Borech can lose. The Second Ward has been Democratic for so long, I can't see how the Republicans can expect much here. Last year this ward gave DiCorno a big majority and even carried the water commissioner and Councilman-at-large to victory. It looks like Borech in a breeze.

DONOVAN-ARMOUR. The Third Ward went back

in the Republican column by a big margin last year and should stay there again this year. This is the ward where the Republicans can cut down the Democratic margin for the water-board member and the Councilman-at-large if they get out the vote but it will take real work. Although Jack Livingston upset the hope of the other hand, would give Council another victory man if he wins. He is, popular in his ward and while this contest can go either way, I look for a close Hoyt victory solely because he is the incumbent.

LEONARD-RUDKIN. The fact that John Leonard is

a veteran campaigner and that the Fourth Ward has been Democratic for years is sufficient grounds to predict an easy victory for Leonard here.

HOYT-WIEMER. This contest promises to be

the closest in the city just as it was this year ago. Hoyt, the incumbent, is popular in his ward and has done nothing to make anyone sore at him. Wiemer, on the other hand, would give Council another victory man if he wins. He is, popular in his ward and while this contest can go either way, I look for a close Hoyt victory solely because he is the incumbent.

PATTEN-WOLCOTT. This contest also shapes up

as a close one. The organization should give Patten a big vote in the First, Second and Fourth wards. Wolcott will get a big vote in the Third and the Fifth will be close. Wolcott's chances hinge upon the Second Ward results where Patten swept to victory last year. While many folks are riding with Wolcott, it looks like Patten's the winner to me.

EGGERS-MORECRAFT. Nobody seems to be worry-

ing about this contest for the Board of Water Commissioners. Some folks feel that the Democratic monopoly of this board should be broken by the election of a Republican so as to vote for Eggers. Because the Democrats will probably get out the largest vote throughout the city, my guess is that Morecraft will win.

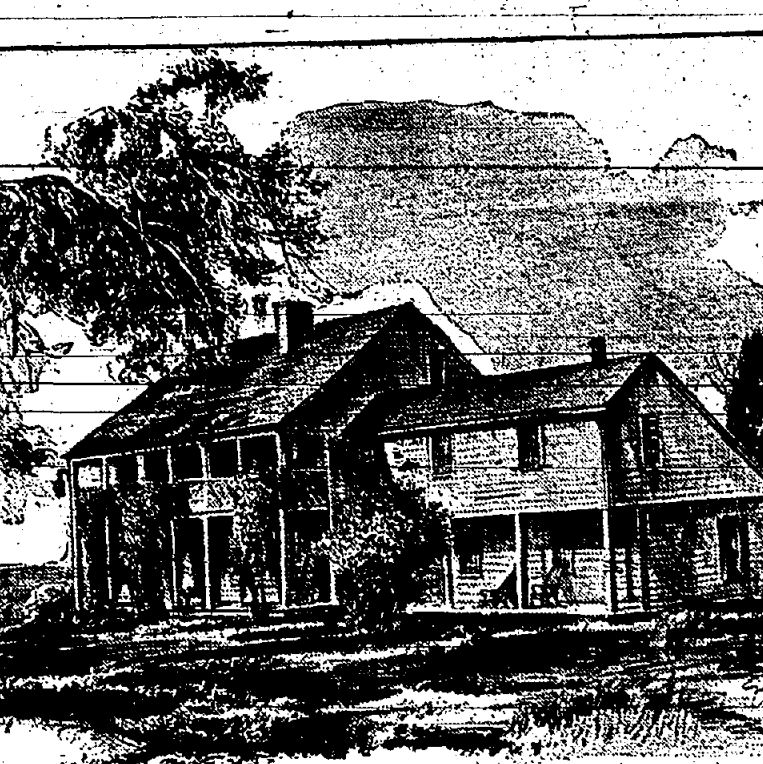


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HISTORICAL NEW JERSEY—No. 4

TUESDAY'S ELECTION AGAIN SHOWS RAHWAY'S INDEPENDENCE

Although both sides are justified in claiming a victory in Tuesday's local election, it is our opinion that the victory again belongs to the voters of Rahway, that large body of citizens which knows what it wants and gets it at the polls, regardless of what either political party may feel.

It would be difficult to try and determine just what caused the electorate to split tickets in such a manner that about half the local candidates of each city party were elected. Venturing a guess, we would say that the results indicate that the independent public did not favor a lopsided control of city government.

The best government does not result from one side having a huge majority. A 6 to 5 Council will be more representative of the public at large which, in local elections at least, is neither strongly Democratic nor strongly Republican.

The independence of voters on local issues augurs well for our democratic form of government. It is a warning to anyone who attempts to set up a dictatorship and run things entirely to their own liking.

The major congratulations are due the independent voters and commendation is also due to the Republican organization for the fine work it did to make Rahway government more representative of the people. The huge majorities given the county Republican candidates is indicative of the satisfaction Rahway citizens have with the manner in which those officials are running our affairs at the Court House.

WILDWOOD BOOSTS ITS REVENUE, WHY CAN'T RAHWAY?

The following article is taken from the Wildwood Leader and is reprinted today for the information of Rahway officials who have a large number of tax liens on their hands from which the city is getting no revenue. If other municipalities can dispose of their tax lien property, why can't Rahway do something about this leak in the taxpayer's pocket?

Spirited bidding marked the Wildwood tax sale at City Hall this morning of tax title liens on properties delinquent on taxes for 1937 and previous years.

The type of bidding and the firms and individuals representing them were the same as in the previous year. The Collector, Walter S. Koon, cried the sale indicated a definite interest in Wildwood properties for investment purposes.

More than \$30,000 was realized by the city from the sale of the liens, Saul A. Wittes, an Elizabeth attorney, being responsible for \$22,783.14 in purchasing for three clients.

The clients were the Tax Investment Corporation with purchases totaling \$6,224.93; the Atlantic Municipal Corporation whose purchases amounted to \$7,641.21; and the Ehren Realty Corporation with \$5,217 in purchases.

The corporations make it a business to buy in tax title liens in municipalities where investigation has assured them good investments will result. The three corporations may buy an additional \$10,000 worth of liens here within the next week.

Notice of the tax sale printed several weeks ago, Collector Koon said, resulted in more than forty percent of the properties originally listed being withdrawn from the sale by the payment of the delinquent taxes. The collections from the sale and these payments amounted to close to \$150,000.

One lot sold today for a delinquency of \$69.50 brought a price of \$500. The purchaser paying the premium to round out a group he already owns. The lot was on Ocean avenue between Hildreth and Cresce avenues and was bought by George Stierle.

"We were forced to hold the sale by State officials," said Mayor George W. Krogman, "and are sorry for those of our citizens whose properties went under the hammer, but the result is a sounder financial condition for the City of Wildwood and a platform on which to build lower taxes for many years to come."

ARMISTICE DAY OBSERVANCE IN RAHWAY

Today two programs will be held in Rahway to celebrate the 20th anniversary of the signing of the armistice. The first will be at 11 A. M. at the veteran's monument at Pierpont street and St. George avenue while the other will be held tonight at the Elks' Club.

These programs are arranged by the Veteran's Central Committee, a group which is composed of representatives from every veteran's organization in the city. Rahway has more than 400 men who saw service in the war and it is well that outstanding groups like our veteran's organizations do something to celebrate the anniversary of the conclusion of this devastating and bloody conflict.

Public attendance at these programs should be regarded as a patriotic duty. Every person in Rahway should attend one of them as they have been arranged to suit the convenience of the majority.

On Armistice Day it is well for us to pause to pay our respects to those who died in the service and to pay honor to those of our citizens who returned to their homes two decades ago after giving their services to their country.

It is only proper that now, with war clouds gathering again, we celebrate the armistice of the last war by resolving to do all in our power to abolish the hatred which threatens to lead to another war.

We have not made America safe for Americans yet, but we still have plenty of time to devote to tortures in foreign lands. Babaney, friends, just pure unadulterated baloney.

Today we are just as glib as we were 20 years ago. In fact, I might say that we are a lot more so. If we have learned anything from the last war, I'd like to know just what it is. Of course, we do know that war cost a lot of money and the money that you lend to allies during war times may not be returned, but what is money between friends? National honor is much greater than gold—or even the flower of youth.

Today is the 20th anniversary of the signing of the Armistice and America has not aged a day.

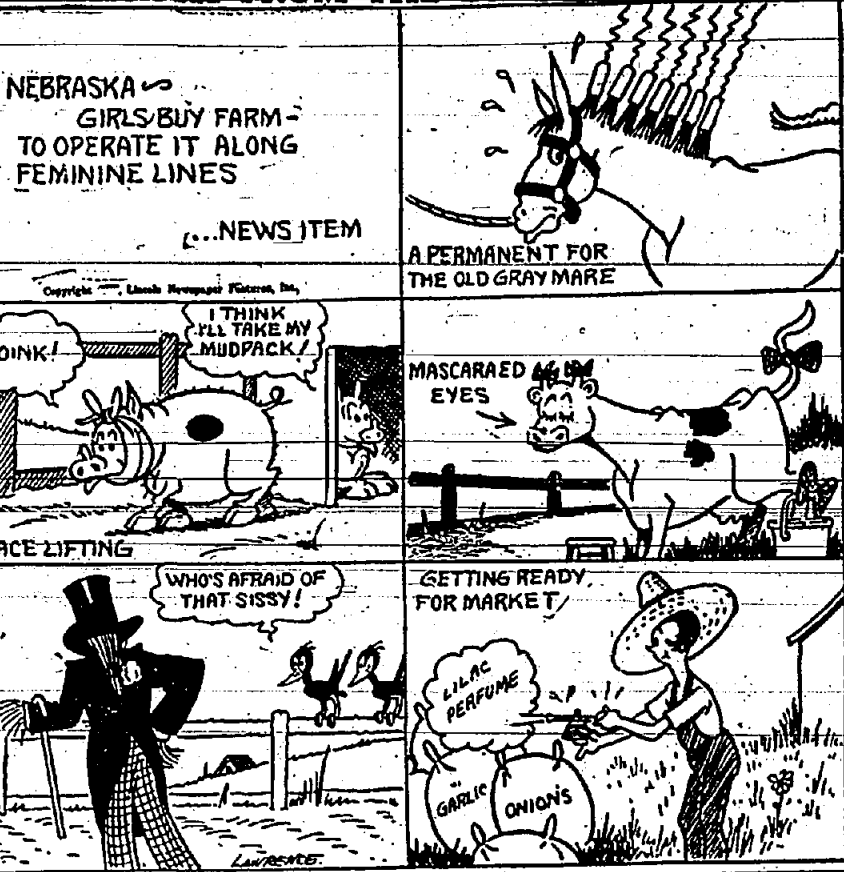
Rahway 5 Years Ago
