SCHULTZ'S JUDGEMENT

BENEFITS CLARK TOWNSHIP
Mayor Charles Schultz of Clark Township was severely criticized recently for allowing the Oak Ridge Holding Company so much time in which to meet its delinquent taxes. There were many Clark residents who were critical of Schultz and charged he was playing politics in allowing this large taxpayer to escape payment of its delinquencies.

Although many thought that Clark should immediately foreclose on the taxpayer, Schultz insisted all along that Clark didn't want land but did want the taxes if it was possible to get them. Through negotiations which resulted from Schultz's action, the company is now meeting its obligations and Clark is benefitting.

Since Schultz bore the brunt of the criticism when it was advocated that foreclosure proceedings be instituted, he must be given most of the credit now that Clark is reaping the benefits of this action.

Had Clark foreclosed, it would have had a golf course on its hands with no revenue coming in. Rahway has been unable to do anything with its tax lien foreclosures and it is only reasonable to assume that Clark would have had the same difficulty.

Now that the revenue is coming in, Clark has a good income source and at the same time has allowed private owners to hold a property, part of which is being developed into a residential section which will further boost Clark ratings.

Schultz maintained all along that Clark wanted taxes and not land. The wisdom of his judgment is bearing fruit for the benefit of Clark Township.

HEED THE RED CROSS ROLL CALL

The annual Red Cross roll call drive is now being conducted in Rahway by workers of Rahway Chapter, American Red Cross.

"That this has been a very active year is obvious when one compares this year's operations with the average of 92 disasters requiring Red Cross aid annually for the past 15 years," Chairman Norman H. Davis said in commenting on the Red Cross Disaster Relief Service Report.

The Red Cross policy of relief has been established over a period of years through actual experience of its workers in the field. Relief is given on the basis of need of sufferers—not of losses. Loans are never made but relief is given from the Red Cross in the name of its members and contributors for the work.

While relief was being given to victims of natural catastrophes, the Red Cross was not unmindful of the necessity for preparedness plans to meet emergencies that may arise in any American community. Red Cross chapters in hundreds of counties have organized disaster preparedness committees charged with the responsibility to map relief plans in advance of need, and to organize resources of communities to prevent duplication of effort and waste of materials when calls for help are received.

"The administration of such relief for disaster victims is made possible by annual membership of millions of Americans in all walks of life," Mr. Davis pointed out. "The extent of Red Cross aid to such sufferers is entirely dependent upon selfish sharing on the part of all of us."

'MUSTS' FOR TRAFFIC SAFETY

Julien H. Harvey, managing director of the National Conservation Bureau, lists six vital "musts" for the solution of America's number one accident problem—the street and highway death and injury toll.

First, all drivers must be licensed, and only after stringent tests.

Second, real, not perfunctory physical examinations of drivers at periodic intervals is important.

Third, all high school students should be educated in safe driving through specially devised courses.

Fourth, there must be more stringent enforcement of laws affecting both drivers and pedestrians by the police and traffic courts.

Fifth, ticket fixing must be 100 percent eliminated.

Lastly, all safety organizations should give their prime effort toward discovering the speed-mania—principal cause of the bulk of serious accidents.

The conscience of all democratic nations has revolted at the horror of what is taking place in Germany. The sordid demonstration of the vicious vagaries of unbridled passion cause many to give thought to the evil consequences of bigotry. It is with an ever-growing shame that we must admit that the history of our own nation has been smudged by intolerance. Savage hatreds under the guise of KuKluxism smoulder still. It is our duty to prevent the spread of flames from abroad.

America, made up as it is of all races, creeds and nationalities, might very easily become the scene of local outbreaks. But it is to the credit of American Jews that they have exercised restraint despite the taunts and threats of professional Jew-baiters. They know that violence here will not help the dark night of friends and relatives four thousand miles away. The mad act of a crazed Jewish youth in Paris recently added greatly to the hardships of the people whose cause he would espouse.

It was the firing of a single shot 24 years ago that thrust most of the world into a war reached down to the very foundation of our civilization. The hand that fired that shot also was controlled by an unbalanced mind. Already propagandists are spreading the word that the killing of a minor German official bears the taint of international intrigue. That is a subtle way of spreading hatred of Jews throughout the world.

We must not be too easily swayed by the things we read and hear. I think that every American citizen of German birth abhors the conditions that exist in Germany at the present time. All of us should strive to be tolerant and personal opinions should be tempered accordingly. First and last we are Americans. Our sympathies may be with the German Jews, but our main duty is to keep a firm grasp on our emotions and pray God that racial and religious bigotry never will find a foothold within our borders.

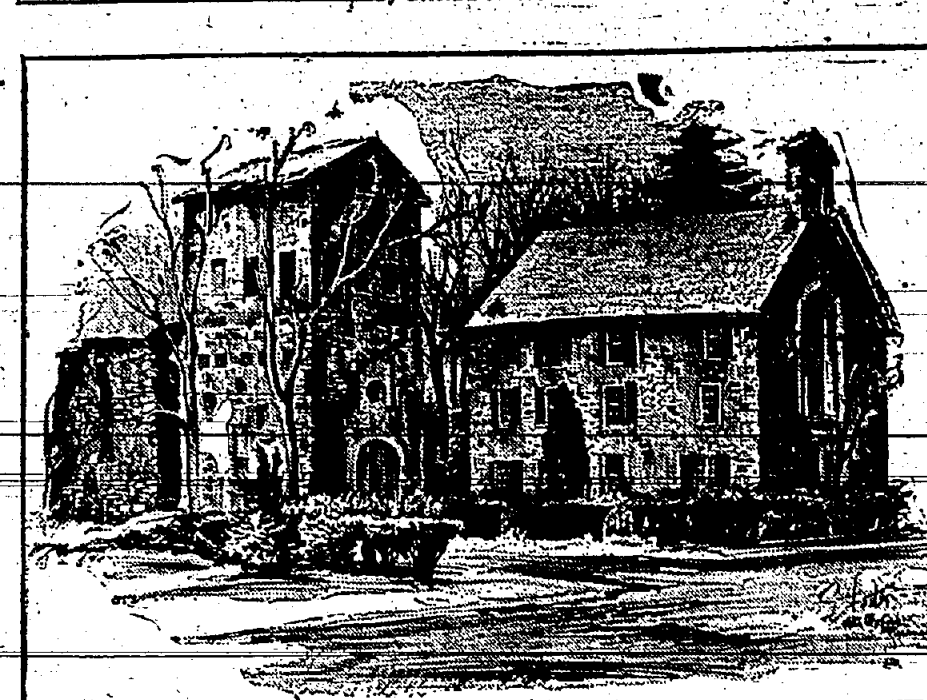

Old Oxford Furnace
Oxford Furnace was one of the most important factors in the Revolutionary period. Built in 1742 by Jonathan Robeson, Oxford's cannon balls fired at Indians, French, British, and Hessians. Its weekly output of 16 tons of pig iron provided for horses and oxen, and spikes for wooden ships, houses and carts. It is not surprising that the British made so many attempts to capture this valuable furnace. Working full blast until long after the Civil War, Oxford was blown out in 1842, then rebuilt. It ran until 1915. The historic value of Oxford Furnace is being perpetuated by the New Jersey Historic Site Commission. It is located on Route 30 in Warren County.

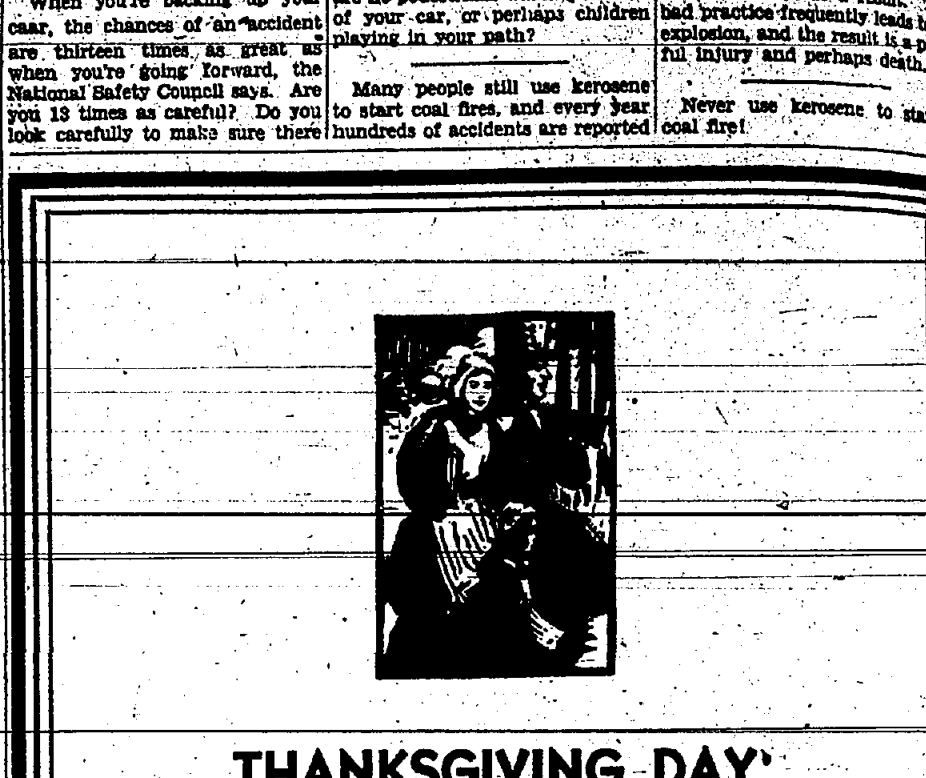

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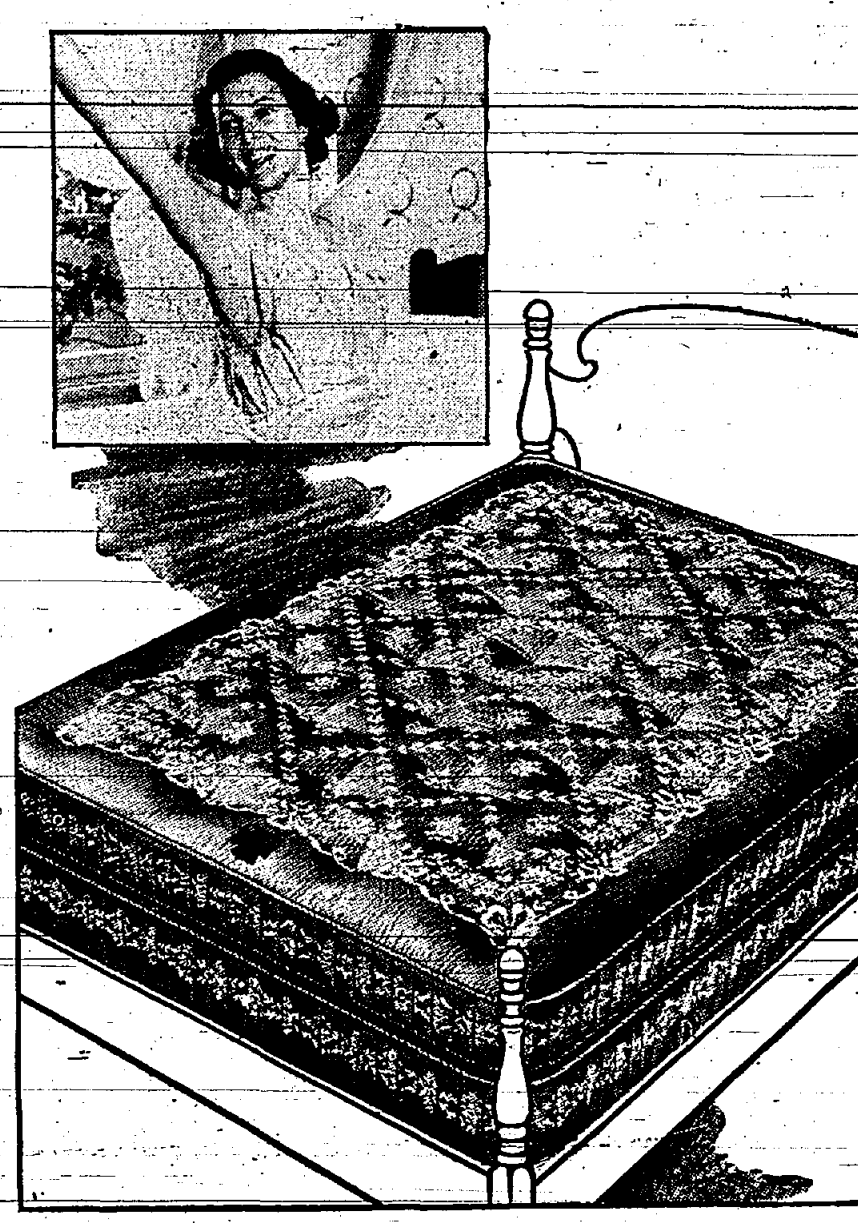

THANKSGIVING, THEN AND NOW

Just as the Pilgrim fathers had much to be thankful for on the first Thanksgiving Day, so have we much to be thankful for this week as this annual holiday is observed.

We are still privileged to enjoy the same advantages as were enjoyed on the first Thanksgiving Day. Religious, racial and class intolerance which the Pilgrims came to this country to escape still exist in almost every other country in the world today.

America is still one of the few nations where these cancers do not grow upon the national life. As the population of the world has increased, so have the intolerances which the Pilgrims came to this land to escape.

Thankfully, we aren't an oppressed people today because the government formed by these hardy founding fathers will not allow the injustices to thrive here which have multiplied in other lands since the Pilgrims first came to these shores.

Regardless of our other advantages or disadvantages, we can give the most thanks on this coming Thanksgiving Day because we are not subject to the whims of intolerance.

With liberties curtailed in almost every other nation of the world today, we are still, thankfully, enjoying the benefits which have existed here since the first Thanksgiving Day.

IMPROVEMENT DURING PEACE AND QUIET

It is not a coincidence that the substantial improvement occurring in business since last spring took place during a relatively quiet period, so far as domestic affairs were concerned.

Congress was not in session. Comparatively few crack-pot legislative schemes were being aired. Rumors of new and still more extreme experiments were rare. Generally speaking, the attitude of the government was one of co-operation with business.

There is a hint in this for our lawmakers, now that a new legislative season is just in the offing. American business and industry are ready and eager to go places. They are prepared to spend tremendous sums for expansion and betterment, to re-employ hundreds of thousands of workers, and to provide a profitable and productive place of investment for savings. But this can only be done under sane, stable and reasonable government. Uncertainty is one of the worst enemies of economic progress. It breeds lack of confidence—and lack of confidence means retrogression.

The coming Congress will do well if it attends to essential matters, makes short-shrift of what new "wild-eyed" proposals are presented in its affairs, as soon as possible, and calls it a day. We have had enough of chaos—some nine long years of depression amplify testifies. Today we need more of that atmosphere of peace and quiet that will enable us to go forward in a normal manner.

THE CRUCIAL ACCIDENT PERIOD

The automobile death and accident rate has shown a steady decline for a number of months. But now the crucial test period is at hand.

We are entering the most dangerous driving months. Fall brings rains, to be followed by the ice and snow of winter, all of which immeasurably increase driving hazards. Equally important, these seasons bring shorter days—and the accident rate at night, is much higher than in daylight.

The wise driver will prepare for this dangerous period. And preparation should take two forms. Put your car in first-class condition, so far as brakes, lights, tires and steering are concerned. And put yourself in the proper mental condition for safe driving—Never forget that the human element is the responsible factor in the great majority of accidents. Before you can drive safely, he must think safely. He must know the hazards he faces, and be prepared for them. This "safety consciousness" is the first and most vital essential of accident prevention.

Remember that chance-taking isn't clever. Any fool can push the throttle to the floorboards, pass on hills and curves, disregard adverse weather conditions, and perform similar acts of idiotic recklessness. Caution is the product of intelligence.

Drive safely all the time! And be especially careful in the fall and winter seasons. Then the accident rate will continue to go down.

On this Thanksgiving Day, as in those long past and the many others yet to come, we have little difficulty in finding many things for which we can be grateful. The President's proclamation calls attention to the fact that "We have lived in peace and understanding with our neighbors and have seen the world escape from the impending disaster of a general war. Our lands have yielded a goodly harvest, and the toiler in shop and mill receives a most just return for his labor. We have cherished and preserved our democracy."

The Chief Executive has noted that "our fathers set aside a day of thanksgiving as they heaved a nation of the primordial forest. The observance was consecrated when George Washington issued a Thanksgiving proclamation in the first year of his presidency. Abraham Lincoln set apart a day of thanksgiving, and praise to our beneficent Father who dwells in the Heavens. Thus from our earliest recorded history, Americans have thanked God for their blessings."

In addition to the general reasons for giving thanks as outlined in the official proclamation, there are many personal reasons. Each of us has something for which we should give thanks. Just remember that regardless of what has happened in the past or what will happen in the future our motto is "In God We Trust." We can be more than thankful that, unlike other nations, we still have the right to place our trust in God.

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Adult Recreation Centers To Open In City Monday

Roosevelt and Grover Cleveland Schools Open To Public

Recreation centers in two city schools are scheduled to open Monday night when features will be offered free to all persons in the city over 16 years of age.

Sponsored by the Rahway Recreation Commission with the co-operation of the Board of Education and the WPA Recreation Project, the program will be held in Roosevelt and Grover Cleveland schools.

Three sessions weekly are planned from 7:30 to 10:30 P. M. and will be held in Roosevelt and Grover Cleveland schools.
