### FOR THE BEST INTERESTS OF ALL THE PEOPLE

The new Congress convenes in Washington next month. It will be the seventy-sixth since that body was created by the United States Constitution 151 years ago. Its duties will not be unlike any Congress of the past—legislating in the best interest of all the people. And that is the case in point.

In the past few years many new laws have been written into the rule book of economic life. Doubt has been raised that some of them are in the best interest of all the people. In the main, the objectives of many of these laws have been worthy, but they were conceived and written so hurriedly that they have blocked their own supposed objective—that of bringing recovery. Or perhaps the objectives have been too Utopian, and we should know by now that we can not legislate our way to Utopia any more than we can spend our way out of debt.

It would be wishful thinking to suppose that Utopian schemes are at an end. There is always someone willing to listen to it. Already some of the Washington theorists are reported drafting more cure-all measures for presentation to Congress in January.

What attitude the new Congress will take toward these chasing-the-pot-of-gold-at-the-end-of-the-rainbow schemes is yet to be seen. It is to be hoped the Congress will see the folly of the fantasy and get down to the task of making some of the present laws more effective.

That would be in the best interest of all the people.

### TAX REVISION PLANS OFF TO A BAD START

The tentative plan of the State Tax Revision Commission's \$80,000,000 program, recently announced informally, got off to a bad start. This was bound to happen, following as it did on the heels of the recent abrupt and unprecedented tax raid on New Jersey industries. Staged without warning, a few municipal governments in the State have increased personal property assessments for 1937 and 1938 against New Jersey corporations, which total hundreds of millions of dollars.

Among other things, the Tax Commission's tentative program includes a proposal for a three percent gross receipts tax on the State's retailers. This feature of the program would raise an estimated \$35,000,000. The theory is that retailers who admittedly could not absorb it would pass it on to the consumer. This is apt to develop into the most controversial feature of the program. It sounds like a disguised sales tax. No doubt, we shall hear more about this later.

But this much is certain. While undoubtedly there would be public sentiment for a revision of New Jersey's archaic tax system, there will be vigorous opposition to any program which proposes to raise the present total levies on New Jersey citizens and New Jersey business.

The total cost of state and local government in this State is \$330,000,000. Our combined state and local per capita tax burden is second only to that of New York, which leads the nation. As Robert T. Bowman, President of the State Chamber of Commerce points out, we are already taxed to the "limit of tolerance."

Nobody wants new taxes. The present burden of \$330,000,000 is big enough to provide for all necessary public service, including relief, if properly allocated and properly spent. It will be difficult to sell the people of New Jersey a bill of goods that it is necessary for them to accept substantial new burdens.

The coming 1939 session of the State Legislature will probably provide the background for a struggle between the advocates of new taxation and those who believe it is time the taxpayer got a break. Every citizen of the State has a stake in the outcome of this fight. He'll pay the bill if the economy forces loss.

It makes little difference whether the Munich treaty lasts a month or a year. I do know that for every day that is operative many men will continue to live and breathe and walk and laugh who otherwise might be rotting on the field of battle. Anything that prolongs life can not be all wrong. But England knows that the Treaty of Munich is just a stop-gap. In fact, it was never intended to be anything else. England also knows that without the help of the United States it stands a mighty good chance of going down to defeat. The statesmen of England are of a resourceful breed. In their capable hands the United States might very easily become just so much patty.

So to our shores comes the masterful Anthony Eden. True he comes as the invited guest of a powerful organization of manufacturers, but his mission will

reach much further than the field of commerce: His speech could not, by any stretch of the imagination, be considered a great contribution to the world of business. He asserted that Great Britain was not looking for any one to pull chestnuts out of the fire, or words to that effect, but he failed to mention why the British war debt to the United States remains still unpaid. We pulled some mighty fine chestnuts from the coals in 1917 and there are just as many monkeys alive today.

It seems that during recent months a new school of thought has arisen. Its disciples apparently are of the opinion that the best road to peace is war. They would fight fire with gasoline instead of fighting it with water. Instead of trying to localize war they are in favor of spreading it with the ally idea that when certain undesirable forces are eliminated from the face of the earth everything will be peaceful and serene. The main trouble with their method is that human beings never seem to be able to reach an agreement as to which forces are desirable.

The world has just escaped a major war by the skin of its teeth and now it is starting to regret. As I said before, England knows that another world war is almost inevitable. It is making a strong bid for support. Don't think that the King and Queen are coming over here just to have a spot of tea with our President. The British are not that impractical. British royalty expects to do a nice bit of business in good will before the return retires to Buckingham Palace. And we, jolly old saps that we are, will wage and cheer our visitors onward and when the next war starts we'll rush off to take our stand beside our cousins across the sea.

It happened in 1917 and it can happen again. It is about time that we learned to beware of Arabs bearing gifts and the same goes for the English or the French or the Germans or the Italians or any nationality. America is grown up and it has plenty to do to watch after its own knitting.

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## TALK of the Town

Every now and then, somebody visits homes of the city soliciting permission from home owners to paint house numbers on the curbs. These proposals are frowned upon by city officials, and rightly so, because it is felt that if such a numbering system is to be used,

the numbers should be uniform and under city supervision. This view is a sane one.

But since so many Railway residents appear in favor of having numbers on their curbs as well as on the houses, why isn't something done to do this work on an official basis? On a number of streets in the Third Ward, the house numbers have been painted on the curbs, even though the city fathers frowned on this idea.

Railway has an outstanding numbering system, thanks to Lee Price and Al Peakes, and having numbers on the curbs would make the system even better. Try and find a house number at night and because it is felt that if such a numbering system is to be used,

up on Bryant street some night and notice the numbers on the curbs. You can see them while seated in your car as the headlights make them very clear. This numbering business might well be undertaken as a relief project, some of the better towns in the state have numbers on curbs. Such a project here would certainly be more sensible than the one now under way in which unemployed youths are going around the city and making "T" or "L" signs displayed. They will be listing the cracks in the sidewalks next.

One provision of the Wage and Hours Law which is encouraging youngsters not to work is the one which makes it impossible for youngsters under 14 years of age to carry papers. Those between 14 and 16 must have working papers. The idea seems to be to make the youngsters loaf around until they are 16 and then they can go on a relief job and learn a trade.

The Record had to discharge a number of its best carrier boys because of this silly law. Some of the boys were helping out as much as they could by carrying newspapers for their parents. Others were buying necessities with their savings. One youngster was giving half his earnings to his mother and putting the other half in a school bank each week. A law which stops such helpful practices can do no good, and certainly can do much harm. It gives the juvenile courts more work as they continue to heap expenses on the taxpayers and gives the youngsters more time to plan and carry out their petty crimes such as those which happen in Rahway regularly.

The law is so handicapped to us because we can get other boys but it is so certain under the law that youngsters who had to be let go might be O. K. to prevent youngsters from selling papers in the big cities but it is certainly of no value to force them to stop in a small city like Rahway.

Santa didn't leave us many gifts to distribute to Rahwayans this year but here is the list we have compiled for the youngsters. Reappointments for Tax Receiver Fox, Judge Needell and Auditor Kenna, a winning basketball team for Coach Walter, a new high school for Rahway children, 11 big husky football players for Coach Hoagland, to Father Henneke who leaves Rahway as fine and loyal a parish as he had at St. Mark's, to Common Council, all the faculty and students of the complete harmony during 1938 even though the vote will be 6-5 to Al Peakes, his favorite list.

Despite this, the Senate this week voted to spend an amount which will probably exceed a half-million dollars on the voters can go to the polls June 20 and decide whether or not gambling on horse racing shall be legal in this state.

Union County has reason to be ashamed of the vote of Senator Loeizaux whose vote decided the issue setting the special election.

The Senate did nothing about solving the relief problem, preferring to spend its time making possible an election which may bring a more grave relief problem upon the taxpayers of the state.

In addition to Loeizaux, other Union County legislators who aided the horse race gambling program are Assemblymen Muir and Kerner. We can't be proud of them and neither will the taxpayers when they have to pay for the cost of a foolish special election and suffer increased expenses which will certainly result if the vicious horse race gambling measure is adopted by the public.

Assemblymen Pascoe and Shepard of Union County voted against the measure. They have the public interests at heart. In 17 states this year, more than \$270,000,000 will be bet on horse races. These states will get only about \$10,000,000 in taxes from this gambling.

The public will furnish the money which will go into the pari-mutuel machines. Where will they get it? They will take it from business. Some of that business will be Rahway business which will suffer with the rest because we haven't enough upright men with backbone in Trenton to devote their time to the solution of real problems instead of serving the gambling and vice rings which always reap the biggest profits from any kind of organized gambling.

We urge every voter in Rahway to mark June 20 on his 1939 calendar and be sure and go to the polls to vote against legalized gambling which, if authorized, will be one of the worst losses which ever festered in the state.

## Rahway 55 Years Ago

From The Advocate and Times, December 24, 1878.

An announcement of a Pigeon Shooting between two crack sportsmen drew a large and miscellaneous crowd of men, boys, double and single barreled shot guns on the grounds of the East of the corner over the Drawbridge at Milton avenue. The champions were James Dougherty and George Dunham.

Inquiry heard of a "shortage" in books of the TVA. In private business there would be a deluge—while accounts to the politicians it's merely a disappearance.

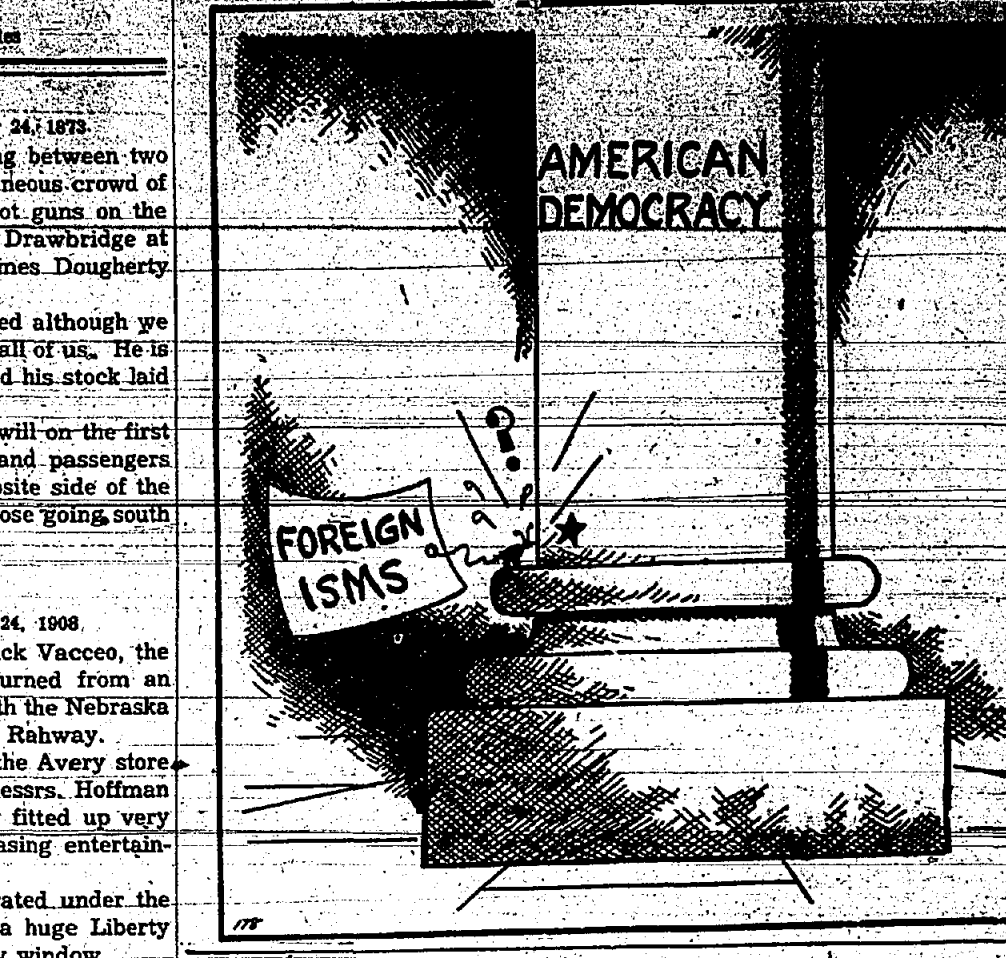
Democratic Chairman Parker decides not to butt into local political situation. Well, at least, Mr. Parker can't count on support.
