There's No Fuel Shortage Here



Next winter, when the demand for coal and oil will be heavier and transportation will be overworked, a wood pile like this will come in mighty handy. Wood-burning stoves and fireplaces are fuel savers. Now is a good time to stock up for winter.

Ration Calendar For Thirty Days

Fuel Oil—New Period 1 coupon valid for 10 gallons until January 4. Period 2 coupons of old series remain good through September 30.

Gasoline—Number 6 stamps in a gasoline book are good for 3 gallons of gas. All B and C stamps are good for only one and a half gallons.

Sugar—Stamp 14 is good for 5 pounds of sugar through October 2.

Stamps Nos. 15 and 16 in War Ration Book No. 1 are each good for 5 pounds of sugar through October 2.

Home Canning—Stamps for home canning, through October 31. Housewives may apply to local board for additional stamps if they are automatically current in their tax payment—actually in rare instances only will this be the case," writes Harter L. Lutz, Princeton of Public Finance at Princeton University, in The Tax Review, a publication of the Tax Foundation.

The impression that the withholding tax is all that the Treasury has to do with the nation's rationing is not only erroneous but also is not the only erroneous notion that exists regarding the law enacted in June and which was supposed to be so simple. As everyone knows, the "pay-as-you-earn" law did not repeal, modify or replace the essentials of the 1942 income tax law; neither did it do away with the nuisance of filing a tax return next March; nor did it relieve the taxpayer of the obligation to pay the Victory tax, although its collection by withholding was discontinued after July 1.

What people are going to take just as much as paying more taxes than they expected to have to pay on their 1942 income is the million-dollar headline which nearly everyone thought had been obliterated. The average taxpayer's estimate—and there are about 44,000,000 of them—will have a worse time of it than ever in filling out the return next year due to the innumerable complexities, inconsistencies and absurdities, with which he must juggle in his attempt to comply with the law. Professor Lutz predicts a revolt against the foolish and needless reporting, computing and other paper work involved and against the deception involved in implying that the tax at its source had put

a large number of persons on a current basis.

The headline has already started for about 15,000,000 persons who had to file an estimate of income for 1942 by September 15. Another such declaration relating to income for 1942 will be due on March 15. It means that the taxpayer is only on an "estimated" current tax basis. He can pay as he earns only to the extent that

he is good at guessing what his income will be and equally good at figuring the tax on his "estimated" income.

Congress could simplify the whole business, according to Professor Lutz, by doing three things: (1) absorb the Victory tax into the withholding rate; (2) designate the withholding rate as the normal rate; and (3) eliminate the requirement to file a

year-end return by the average wage earner or salaried person.

"There is every reason to believe that the few simple suggested changes would sustain and consolidate the good will toward the income tax which was generated by the inauguration of the pay-as-you-earn principle," writes Professor Lutz. "On the other hand, the obvious complications of the existing tax structure must inevitably produce ill will. In a time when all citizens must be added repeatedly to a steadily increasing tax, every precaution is worth taking to prevent a normal resistance to needless confusion and red tape from developing into a resistance to the taxes themselves."

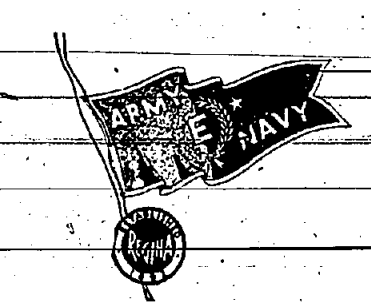

An Open Letter To The Retail Business Concerns Of Rahway

Gentlemen:

The object of this letter is to bring to your attention the hardship being suffered by the thousands of workers living in Rahway due to the hours the stores are open for business. We believe that when you get a clear understanding of the condition and what it means to the men and women who are working long hours in our factories and those in industry out of town, you will immediately take steps to correct the situation by arranging your store hours to coincide with their time away from their jobs. Many suggestions have been offered by those interested, on what would be the best plan. But the most logical solution seems to be for the stores to set their opening hour later in the morning and remain open two to three hours later each evening. This would give all an opportunity to shop intelligently without the necessity of trying to crowd all their buying into an hour or two one evening each week which has proved to be impossible as well as most unsatisfactory.

Many people living in Rahway are working seven days a week and a large number of them are working twelve or more hours a day. Some are on different shifts and those who are employed out of town must spend considerable time traveling by train, bus or car to reach their homes after their day's work is finished. Among the women workers are many housewives who have their homes and families to look after in addition to the buying of supplies for the family and food for the table. They, particularly, would welcome any change in store hours to permit

evening shopping. The buying of foods especially, takes much longer during these days of rationing and shortages, often requiring more than one evening to buy the supplies for the family table. Many of the workers are at their jobs on the nights the stores are now open. In this case it is necessary for them to give up a part of their much needed rest or possibly not sleep at all on the days they must do their shopping.

We realize that retail merchants are operating under great difficulties with the shortage of help, the scarcity of merchandise and the many other problems they are called upon to solve. But, on the other hand, every other business as well as the workers themselves have equally difficult problems to face. The workers know that the merchants and their clerks and assistants spend long hours at their business places. But the men and women working in industry also are spending long hours at their places of employment. Since industrial plants must be kept in constant production, those employed have no choice in setting the hours they shall begin and finish their shifts. It is for this reason that the workers living in Rahway and vicinity, in cooperation with their employers, are petitioning the retail merchants through the medium of this printed message, to keep their stores open six evenings each week in order to give all an equal opportunity to shop during their time off duty. By such cooperation, you will be contributing greatly to the war effort through helping those on the production lines of essential war materials and munitions.

In an effort to acquaint the merchants of Rahway with the problems explained in this open letter and, if possible, bring about a revision of store hours for the mutual benefit of all concerned, the following manufacturing plants are sponsoring its publication.
