POSTWAR PLANNING

One of the tasks that soon must engage the attention of the Common Council of Rahway is postwar planning for returning soldiers and the unemployed from industrial plants unable to maintain production at war peak.

After going through the postwar planning experience of the WPA and the PWA, that followed "World War I," it will be clear vision, a good head and a decisive check on anything that smacks of political, municipal or party interest of patronage that will not accomplish the greatest amount of good for the unemployed as well as for the city of Rahway.

Out west the Nebraska Federation of Taxpayers' leagues has set down four principles that must govern all postwar plans to be considered, which Rahway solons and citizens will do well to study: First, each project should be self-supporting; second, that all money expended by a project should be returned from the project; third, that it should be of value to the State and to the welfare of the people; and that all construction work must be done efficiently and economically.

If there is a local public life of the downtown business district of Rahway appears to be, those who will benefit by it should be the ones to contribute the most toward it.

Other cities are already giving this postwar question serious consideration. From the standpoint of attracting more trade and creating home life projects, in fact, the immediate community, and they have been able to learn several hundred men and women could thus be taken care of. The question, what can be done to get more business to remain in Rahway, and how can the output of our factories be increased, should be given careful study, and a planning board should be named to start immediately to work on this situation.

Rahway should not find it necessary to load itself down with an enormous postwar debt to take care of the unemployed that may be left on its doorstep after this war. The needy must be provided for, but let there be no boggling. Let it be practical, worthwhile, beneficial public work or let there be straight out cash relief provided.

TOO EARLY TO EVALUATE

Since the adjournment of the Moscow conference and the passing of the Comintern-Moscow Senate bill, many thinking people are asking, "What are the two main goals of the American people and the hopes of better world conditions going to be realized, or may it not be that we are just taking things for granted the Moscow pact, signed by Russia, Great Britain, China and the United States actually promise nothing, except that the world will be 'fought' according to present alliances, until surrender and disorder it is obtained." But, is that enough? Surely not. It but raises the question, for what are we fighting in this war?

The bait that is left dangling for individual citizens, in which firm belief is placed by so many, is, first, that the Moscow quarantine "recognizes the necessity of establishing international organization," but the past does not state that it is committed to do that such an organization is established, and there is good reason to believe, the evidence accumulating from day to day, that Prime Minister Churchill will delay as long as possible any such organization, and that when realized it will be only for handling very minor matters.

It further states that the four nations will "consult with one another" to aid in maintaining peace and security. Nothing definite, such as a declaration that all questions find differences that threaten international complications must and shall be settled by arbitration, the only way by which international security may be guaranteed. In fact, it nullifies the purpose of any "general international organization" that may be arranged, by saying very plainly that the four nations will "not interfere with the affairs of other nations without that consultation," for the best they can possibly think of doing jointly is to "cooperate to bring about a general agreement regulating armament in the postwar period," and cooperation means willingness to yield to whatever compromise is proposed.

France is purposely being left out of consideration, though future peace in Europe, without the aid of France, would be futile.

Instead of the United States taking advantage of the third article of the Atlantic charter, in August, 1941, to immediately declare that, as a free nation, we stood for the freedom of all peoples, nations and countries, including India, China, Palestine, Poland, Bessarabia, Czechoslovakia, Latvia, Lithuania and Lebanon, and we were without exception, and now we give sanction to a contract that "renounces the Moscow pact" and "authorizes the American initiative to prevent aggression and preserve peace," without even a suggestion as to how this shall be done, making it practically certain that Great Britain and Russia will determine for us just what kind of an international organization is set up to aid in maintaining their hold upon the small countries of Europe and the Far East.

Though most of the Smyrna rugs formerly were manufactured by Greeks, yet today you see a Smyrna rug, if it is made in Smyrna, comes from a Turkish loom. The largest rug I ever saw was in the office of a former Turkish governor of Anatolia at Smyrna, and covered a floor that must have been about 50 feet square. Most of the looms that are imported by this country come from Turkey, and I saw several great warehouses 100x500 feet high, filled to utmost capacity with looms. The finest Turkish tobacco is grown near Samsun.

A party of us visited the ancient and Biblical city of Ephesus, some 60 miles south of Smyrna, the site of the famous temple of Diana. Here, where Paul was accused of persuading the people that "there are no gods made with hands," I saw the ruins of that old temple, which, in the time of Paul, was perhaps the most beautiful in existence, and called one of the seven wonders of the world.

However, there was nothing but the floor and some of the sidewalks remaining, all the columns having been moved to other and distant temples and buildings. The ruins of the jail in which Paul's two companions, Gaius and Aristarchus, were incarcerated, were still standing in fair state of preservation, overlooking the Aegean sea.

Here the site of an old stadium is seen, built by Lysimachus in 295 B. C., and a theatre, seating 30,000 people, near the wharf of the ancient city that today lies in ruins, the beach having receded at least a mile from the landing place where Paul went ashore, after crossing from Corinth. Here was a public gymnasium and a paved street, with graceful columns on either side that led down to the wharf. On the main street that today are headless, and back of this was the Roman temple of Claudius.

It was on this trip that our party of four had an exciting experience, being fired upon by Greek soldiers. As we were returning to the hotel, from the old section of Ephesus, we were accompanied by an Italian officer and a soldier, as a guard, for this was Turkish territory and the railroad was guarded by Greek soldiers. We were going around Mount Erion, just back of the city, in order to see the ruins of what was called "the little singing hall," and the cave of the seven sleepers, when a shot was fired behind us, which we thought was a stray bullet from some hunter. But when the one and only lady in the party died under a heavy thicket of bushes. There, several other shots were fired, but being in a depression on a slight elevated way, we were not greatly frightened.

We thought we were to be engaged in a battle, when about 25 more shots were fired over our heads; then stopped. The Italian officer and about 20 soldiers from along the railroad approaching, he arose, with the rest of us, and waited until the posse arrived. We were taken to the officers' headquarters where the captain apologized, saying that they had seen us when they were on their way to the ruins of the city, and at times find their way through the ruins of the city as they journey to Smyrna. After it was all over we found quite a thrill in our adventure, even though it might have turned out differently. It was a little later, when darkness would have made it impossible for the soldiers to have determined our identity until it was too late. Back at the hotel in Ephesus, as we discussed our unusual experience around the dinner table, we had first taste of wild bear meat and found it sweeter even than our best American pork.


