Q. Can you give me a quick and simple way vegetables? You can grate the vegetables instead of slicing or

cubing them. This works well with the more solid vegetables such as cabbage, turnips, potatoes, beets, etc. You just peel, grate, add a minimum of water and steam quickly.

Q. Is there any special way of cooking vegetables sr they won't lose their color? Green vegetables stay bright if they are cooked

quickly in as short a time as possible. Don't cover the pan, and cook them until tender. Q. Is there any way to give cooked red cabbage a better

color? To give red vegetables like cabbage a brighter and more appetizing appearance, cook them in a covered pan in a small quantity of either vinegar or lemon Juice.
