## MILLIONS HAVE SUFFERED NEEDLESSLY

Millions of American citizens, deprived of automobile tires for three years now, have not only been completely immobilized, but their anger has grown to white heat as they have learned there has been absolutely no good reason why the nation should have been rationed on tires since the war began. The fault lies in the door of just one person, the "indispensable" fourth term.

Three years ago, William McCollum, of Salinas, Cal., sided for years by the Government, in developing the use of the latex from the guayule shrub, wrote the "indispensable" fourth term that he could supply enough seed of this desert bush, that had been cultivated to produce four times the amount of latex as the native shrub, to plant 4,000,000 acres; that would grow on desert land over the entire country, with only a single rain to sprout the seed. The Government, with only a single rain to sprout the seed, refused the first season 350 pounds of latex per acre, or 700,000 tons on the 4,000,000 acres, enough to supply this country, THREE YEARS AGO, with all the rubber substitute it needed. McCollum, in his efforts to rescue the nation, was not even encouraged not a time has been made for the Government from this shrub, though it has been produced from it equal to the best rubber tires made.

Nearly three years ago, Premier Josef Stalin, of Russia, wrote this "indispensable" man that he could furnish him all the tires he would want, for the Russian campaign, that yielded three times the latex of our common front yard dandelion, from which Russia was then making thousands of tires for war use. We are informed, from good authority that this letter has, to this day, never been even acknowledged.

Three years ago the "indispensable" man secured from the Standard Oil Co., the synthetic formula for making tires, which that company had obtained through a car arrangement with a German company. Today the Government has four formulas for making synthetic rubber from grain and crude oil derivatives. Why have we not had millions of surplus tires? Evidently it has been "planned" that the American people should be sold short and suffer rationing these three years.

Three years ago, a year ago last spring, refused to remove the penalty for raising more than a maximum number of acres of corn and wheat, when the crop could easily have been doubled three years ago, supplying all the grain needed for all the fires that could have been used. As at the end of this year also, the farmers have not been encouraged in the least to grow the maximum acreage possible to supply derivatives for needed tires, while the nation suffers.

Car owners in the United States have the "indispensable" fourth term, and no one else, to thank for the rationing of tires the past three years. The "indispensable" man, who has been deprived of the means of transportation by this man, who has been suggested by the Department of the Interior as a candidate for the presidency next November.

## MAKING PEACE WITH STALIN

Furthermore, the "indispensable" man should know, that whatever is agreed upon at the Dumbarton Conference, will not last two minutes when the general conference of all nations is called, for the other countries, disgusted at the procrastination and appeasement methods of the fourth term, will tear those peace recommendations to shreds.

What should have been done, was for the United States to have called into conference representatives of all the anti-Axis nations of the world, without inviting Russia to be present, and after peace terms had been agreed upon, providing for "a world organization, in which all nations would share as equal sovereigns, to maintain peace" with "a world force to prevent military aggression," as Governor Dewey demanded in his address, then to present those same terms to Stalin, to take or leave, just as he might choose, for that appears to be the whole story of the peace settlement as it already stands.

Another point that must also be considered is, as to whether they have competition, or so little that they act as a "monopoly" in the rubber business. It was felt that somehow pressure had been brought to bear by this gargantuan corporation to have the case dismissed. And there is the danger, undiscoverable by the people.

The question would seem to stand itself up, therefore, into a recognition of the fact that in so great a country as this, while there may be need for great industrial organizations, and these perhaps cannot be timed here as they are in New Zealand, yet, if there is not actual competition, by which they may be regulated, either the employees should be the owners or the Federal Government.

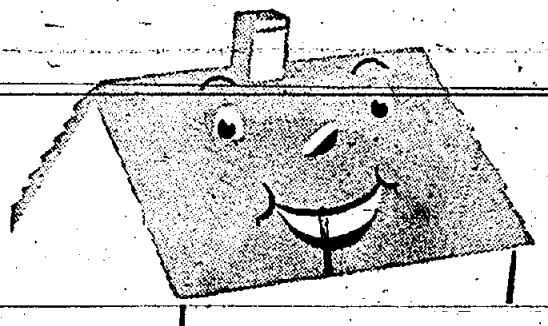

## Drastic Changes In Postal Fees

### Nearly Precarious Rates Will Go Into Effect November 1

New and in many cases reduced, fees for money orders, insured and collect-on-delivery mail and special delivery service, which will become effective November 1, are expected to place all postal services on a self-sustaining basis, in an announcement issued here through Postmaster Martin F. Gittinger the first of the week. The changes were authorized by new legislation.

The new postal rates, with its 5-cent rate for simplified form of money orders for amounts up to \$10, will result in savings that make it possible to reduce the rates for the traditional form of money order to the level that existed prior to March 26, when the Revenue Act of 1943 became effective.
