He was graduated from St. Benedict's in 1913 and in September of that year enrolled as a pre-medical student at the University of Maryland. The year before he was to receive his medical degree, the United States was plunged into war. He immedistely entered the service and was commissioned a Lt. (j.g.) in the United States Navy. While still in the service he completed his medical work and was sent to the U.S. Naval Hospital in Washington, D. C.
