KEEP THE 1945-PAGE UNOPPOSED  
Many citizens of Rahway were surprised at the action of the Common Council at the last meeting of 1944 when it passed over the Mayor's veto the two ordinances granting pay increases to the members of the Police and Fire Departments: to be retroactive from December 1, 1944.

The general public looks upon a City Council as a group of deliberate and wise senators, taking no action, except with utmost deliberation and debate. It is hoped that the action referred to was given all due consideration.

Mayor Armstrong pointed out the past of the Board of Education for an increase in salaries for all school teachers in Rahway, at least commensurate with that given the Police and Fire departments and by those employed in other departments of the municipal government including those in the white-collar class who are getting only a slight bonus without a salary increase. Mayor Armstrong declared that the granting of the Police-Fireman's pay increase was a precedent that would have a tendency to bring the city as "not good budget practice."

It is quite possible that Council will have done well to weigh the words of the Mayor when he said "It would mean only wise and fair for the governing body to make an increase in salaries for the whole staff, for an enactment that is pushed through hurriedly may bring its repercussions at some later date. Council could have delayed its action until a later time and after due consideration it could have deemed best."

Another important matter which had been called to the Council's attention by Mayor Armstrong was the legislation allowing the payment of war-time bonuses which is specifically designed to permit temporary raises war, "for salaries once raised have a tendency to remain unchanged, with the result that it would tend to create abnormal conditions in many instances, may not be justified."

Some criticism has been made of Council's action in allowing the bill of Eugene S. Hainzer for special attorney's fees for making out deeds of city property, which have been sold. Mayor Armstrong had specifically called attention, in his refusal to sign the voucher, that city ordinances provide that such work is the regular duty of the City Attorney, which was also the position taken by the Council last summer.

However, with all the charges and counter charges during the recent election, our present administration has done a mighty good job during the past year. This year, although the Mayor and the Council majority are of opposite political parties, we trust they will forget their party differences and work in harmony for the best interests of the city so that when a review of their accomplishments is made, we can say with pride, "well done."
