State Health Director Plans for Local Board

Dr. J. Lynn Mahaffey, State Health Director, has outlined general measures which local boards of health in New Jersey may adopt as a plan in preventing the spread of infantile paralysis.

"Poliovirus, judging from case reports received, is more prevalent in New Jersey than normal for this period of the year," Mahaffey said. "Other states are having a similar experience."

"In New Jersey from January 1 to June 15, 1945, there have been 65 cases of infantile paralysis," Mahaffey said. "This is a considerable number for this time of year."

"All the means by which this disease is transmitted have probably not yet been established. It has been definitely established that the disease is caused by a specific virus and that this agent may be present in secretions from the throat and nose and from the intestines, both from persons recently or mildly affected with the disease and also in some persons who show no symptoms of illness."

"General measures which boards of health may adopt as a plan in preventing the spread of the disease include:

"Informing the public of the known prevention of the disease by eliminating fly breeding places. Seeking to have produced from flies, food to be eaten without further cooking."

"Inducing upon proper and thorough cleaning of eating and drinking utensils in soda fountains, restaurants and other public places."

"Inducing persons not to swim in waters which may be polluted by sewage from septic or other similar receptacles."

"Urinating persons not to drink water from streams or from springs or wells which may be open to pollution."

"Inducing parents to separate from others any child who appears ill, until the cause of the illness is determined."

"Directing prompt reporting of cases of infantile paralysis to the State Health Department."

"Director Mahaffey notified local boards of health that the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis is prepared to extend financial assistance to victims, including payment of hospital, medical, nursing and physical therapy services."
