and employ labor, it is only necessary to look at a few of of the necessities we use in this country which depend on

For instance, on the farm, there are the bug destroying insecticides, fertilizers, medicines to fight livestock diseases, creosote for fence posts, telephone poles and buildings, and coal for locomotives to move the farmers'

In the home, coal plays a major part aside from heating. We depend on it for plastics, jewelry, aspirin, medicines (including sulfa drugs), food flavorings and colorings, textile dyes, baking powder, chemicals to wash woolens without shrinkage, perfume, suntan lotions and hundreds
