



UNION PICKETS ARE FORCING THE CLOSING OF LOCAL A&P STORES

*IN HUDSON, BERGEN, ESSEX, UNION, MIDDLESEX, SOMERSET, MONMOUTH, OCEAN AND WARREN COUN-TIES, NEW JERSEY, AND STATEN ISLAND

At midnight on Monday, September 10th, pickets representing Retail Clerks' International Protective Association, Local 1262, appeared-without warning at our Newark warehouse, which serves 250 A&P stores in nine New Jersey Counties" and Staten Island.

Since that time, teamsters of Local 863, Teamsters Union, who are employed, not by A&P, but by the contract carriers who deliver food to our stores, have refused to cross the picket lines. The effect of this has been to stop deliveries to the stores in this area for almost two weeks.

It is with sincere regret, therefore, that we must inform our hundreds of thousands of loyal customers in New Jersey and Staten Island that, beginning Saturday night, we will be forced to close the stores which serve them, unless picket lines are

We want our customers to have the facts so that they may know that discontinuance of service is no fault of ours or our employees. No A&P employees are on strike. No questions of hours, wages or working conditions are involved. Accordingly, we have notified our regular full-time employees that pending the settlement of this matter, they will be paid in full for their period of enforced idleness.

The Clerks' Union has never approached us with any claim to represent our employees nor to discuss the entire question of Union representation. It has ignored all efforts to arrange such a discussion, and has refused to follow the orderly procedures prescribed by the Government under the provisions of the National Labor Relations Act. Nor have the teamsters made any demands on the Company or the contract carriers.

Apparently the sole purpose of this picketing by the Clerks' Union is to force the Company to negotiate a contract with this Union. We cannot legally negotiate such a contract unless our employees desire it. We have no right to force our employees to join any Union. The wishes of our employees can be determined by an election conducted by the National Labor Relations Board.

On September 12th we sent a registered letter to the Clerks' Union expressing our willingness to arrange a speedy election by the National Labor Relations Board. That letter was delivered the following morning and has never been acknowledged by the Union in any way.

On September 12th, too, the State Mediation Board offered its services and we accepted them in good faith, but the efforts of the Board to get the Clerks' Union to sit down with them and us have been unsuccessful.

Without any notice whatever to this Company, without any prior discussion, and without any claim on the part of your organization that you represent any of our employees, your organization has placed pickets around our Newark and Paterson Warehouses, with signs claiming *A&P is unfair to Labor*.

This Company has never been anti-Labor, and has hundreds of Union contracts with your organization and other Unions throughout the country. If your organization does actually represent a majority of our suployees we are willing, as we always have been with other Labor organizations in similar circumstances, to recognize your organization as a representative of our employees. and to negotiate a contract with you in good faith.

The National Labor Relations Board is the agency sat up by the U.S. Government to ascertain whether or not a Labor organization represents a majority of employees in order to he entitled to negotiate a contract with an employer.

Despite the high-handed tactics you have adopted in this situation, the Company is willing to cooperate with you to arrange to have a speedy election conducted by the National Labor Relations Board to determine whether your organization does in fact represent the majority of our store employees, and we are ready to agree to have the Board conduct a consent election at the earliest possible moment. Under these circumst reason why your organization should not follow the orderly procedures prescribed by the Government, and immediately withdraw

On September 14th our contract carriers met with the Teamsters' Union Officials. At that time the contract carriers pointed out that the action of the Teamsters was in violation of their Union contract. The carriers have been compelled to discontinue their service to A&P and consequently are suffering heavy financial losses even though the Teamsters have no quarrel with them.

Our best efforts to solve this problem have obviously failed and we cannot continue to serve our customers without merchandise. We must close the stores on Saturday night unless deliveries are resumed.

This is the first time in the more than 70 years we have been serving consumers of this area that we have ever had to consider such a drastic step. We do so with the utmost reluctance, only after every legal and reasonable approach has been exhausted.

We regret the inconvenience caused our customers through no fault of our own or our employees. We hope that the Unions involved will ahendon their current tactics and follow the orderly procedures prescribed by the Government. We think our employees should be allowed to decide for themselves whether or not they want to join a Union. We trust that the men and women of A&P will be allowed to carry on their important work of filling the food needs of our customers in nine New Jersey Countless and Staten Island.


