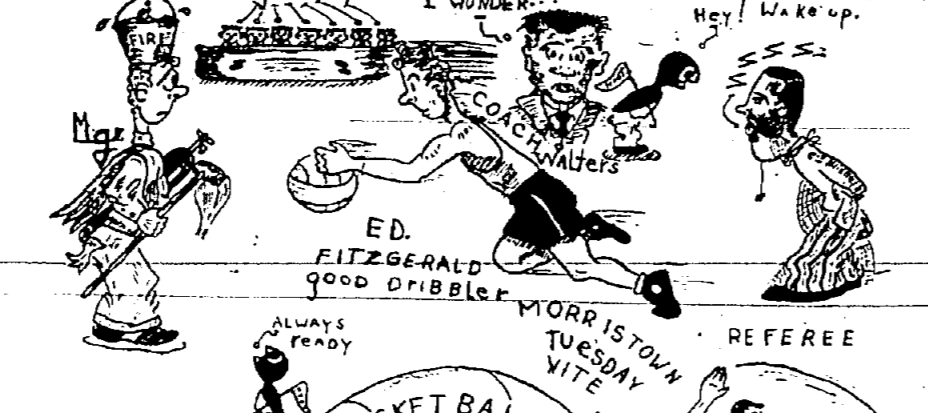

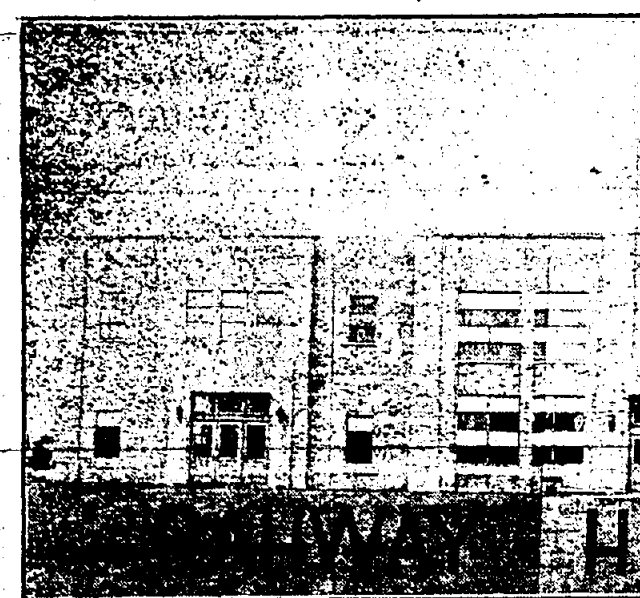

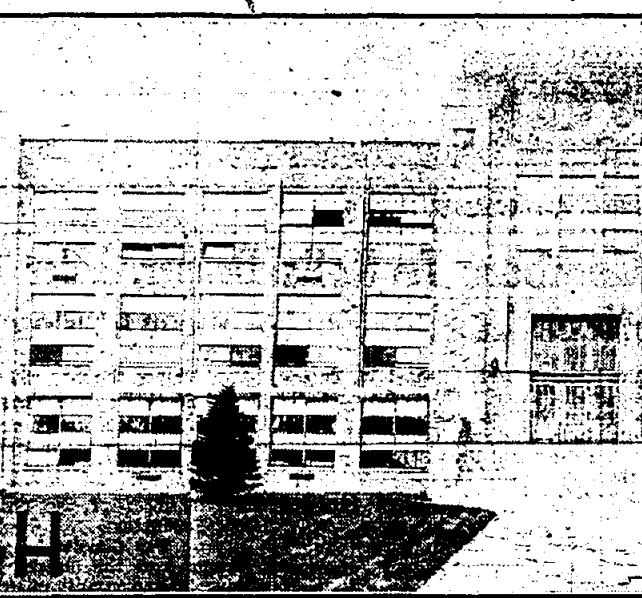

THERE IS A DIFFERENCE

Some people are content to understand why it should make any difference whether government or private enterprise operates industry, so long as pay comes regularly. Well, in the first place, if government were at the helm politics would be mixed up with jobs. The right to work would inevitably depend upon "going along" with the political group in power—which would lead straight to the politics of the worst sort. In the second place, if government were at the helm there would probably be few industries other than those which are profitable to the government which would have developed comparable to the United States, and only in this country has the individual always been free to go as far as his capabilities permit.

If you think freedom and progress in the United States are a second-hand product of the major industry, you are wrong. You will see the most strenuous effort to build for the future. You will see new ideas galore. You will see the most ingenious devices to encourage the public to try out these new ideas.

The construction of larger chimneys in new homes—chimneys big enough for the installation of coal-burning heating plants. The slogan is, "don't build coal out! Sure, it's advertising." Back of it is the desire to teach consumers the value of the coal-burning stove, which has been used by all industry. From it has come our American standard of living. Had it not been for such continual pushing, present day luxuries and conveniences would still be buried in the ground. The public would never have known anything about the coal-burning stove, which is waited for unimpaired offshoots to pioneer the untried.

Don't dismiss the controversy between public and private ownership as academic eyewash. The apparent policy of OPA is to encourage the idea that anyone who raises a voice in protest against OPA methods is a second-hand product of the major industry. The plan fails, it is OPA itself, if anybody is promoting inflation. The evidence rests with thousands of retailers.

During the war, rigid price ceilings were strongly supported by retail distributors. One of the purposes of these ceilings was to curb civilian production, thus turning more effort toward war production. With the sudden ending of the war, the problem changed entirely. Rigid price ceilings that curb civilian production should have been abandoned because such civilian production has become the one sure way to prevent inflation. Ever since the end of war, retailers have strongly urged a flexible stabilization program wherein prices would be freed of control or adjusted, with the primary purpose of encouraging production and letting high production in turn control inflation. Only in this way do the retailers feel that inflation can be controlled and eventually permit a return to a truly competitive free market.

Today, months after the end of the war, OPA is riding in the best Don Quixote style, pushing against inflation with the obsolete weapon of rigid price ceilings. Vainly, and here is the damning evidence of OPA's hallucinations: Attractive price ceilings applied to retail goods that are longer cast—goods that have literally been driven off the market. A single low cost retailer cites the following of work socks were ordered, 150,000 received; 1,100,000 men's shirts to sell for less than 50 cents were needed, none obtainable—the same was true of men's shorts; 200,000 children's union suits were needed, 36,000 obtained, in \$1.98 military, 62,500 women's hats were needed, 8,400 secured; in the \$2.49 bracket for the same article, 14,000 were needed, five received. Space limits the citing of more figures. Every one of these shortages could have been corrected by a slightly higher price which was forbidden by OPA.

OPA admits that shortages are inflationary. If then proceeds to make more shortages. The tragic penalties of dictatorial economic control are beginning to appear.

UNIONS MUST FACE RESPONSIBILITY Congress is considering partial repeal of the Smith-Connally Bill which was originally designed to curb strikes but which in actual practice has had the opposite effect. Amendments to the bill are proposed that would penalize unions for failure to live up to collective contracts or for engaging in political activity. In addition, an amendment has been recommended to exempt supervisory and managerial employees from the collective bargaining provisions of the Wagner Act.

Unions, especially supporters of these measures will be condemned by some as anti-union. However, legislative action to control unions must be established or unions will destroy themselves and bring unemployment and suffering to millions. The coal industry is an example of the dangers of modern machinery. Modern machinery has largely replaced the old-time pick and shovel work of mining. Of all the coal from America's underground mines, nine-tenths is cut by machines, about half is loaded by machines. Because of the resultant high production, coal miners are among the highest paid workers in the country. Wages
