ALLEGED VIOLATION OF THE SUNDAY LAWS.—August Giebelhaus, of No. 4 Main street, was arraigned before Police Justice Tison on Thursday morning on a charge of having, on the 7th inst., violated the statute making it a misdemeanor to offer or expose for sale on Sunday any spirituous, vinous, fermented or other intoxicating liquors. The complaint was made by David J. Bunn, formerly police justice. On the Sunday in question, May 10, he saw several persons entering the premises of Giebelhaus, who has a license from the common council to sell wine, beer and liquors. Giebelhaus keeps a saloon as well as a liquor store, and he has his saloon as the sitting room of his dwelling. He claimed that he did not on the day in question on any other express or intended to sell liquors; and his statement, in the absence of proof to the contrary, was accepted by the justice as a true one. He was fined \$50, and his license was suspended for one month.
