CATALOGUE OF THE UNIVERSITY OF PENNSYLVANIA FOR 1882-83. This is the catalogue of the Trustees, Officers and Students of the University of Pennsylvania. It is a pamphlet of 111 pages, giving very full information in regard to the history and organization of the University, its buildings, its faculty, its courses of study, &c. The object of the Convention is to arouse the sympathy of the country to the cause of preparing the country for a Congressional election. They intend to nominate a candidate for Congress in every Congressional district of the State at the next election.
