AN OFF YEAR.

In politics an off year is one in which

important issues are to be decided.

The year of a political election usually calls

for the most earnest and able efforts

on the part of the candidates and the

people. It is a year in which the

people are called upon to exercise

their right of suffrage, and to

decide upon the course of the

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people are called upon to exercise

out" for the honors and emoluments of

office.

Amongst the people who compose the

masses of each party, however, this is

not the case. They are moved and

animated by convictions that will

force themselves into the arena of

political action and will be believed, from

the issues which will be fought out at the

polls in the near future. Two of these

already making themselves felt in

politics and others of a kindred nature are

slowly obtaining prominence in the public

mind. The questions are not such as

relate to the tariff or the currency. These

long exclusively to the department of

political economy and will be determined by

industrial and commercial conditions

and will not affect individual

prosperity, the people at large feel no

particular concern in regard to them.

The two questions to which we refer are

declared to form the issues of the

future are that of Civil Service Reform,

and that which concerns the regulation of

the traffic in intoxicating drinks. In

regard to the first it may be said that

already the better classes of both parties

are fixed in a determination to do

the Civil Service from politics and thus to

purify the Government by removing the

present incentives to party animosity and

by cleaning out politics from the sources

of their present follies—the great

office and the struggle for spoils. For a

little time it may be possible for political

adversaries to hold the decision of the

question in abeyance, but many signs

indicate that ere long it is destined to

become a leading issue before the people.

The regulation of the traffic in

intoxicating drinks was one of the

issues in the recent Ohio election, and led in

part, though only in part, to the defeat of

the Republican ticket. Had it been decided

on that question, there was a million

of Republicans who would have

done that they would rather be defeated in

an honest endeavor to restrain the ravages

of intemperance than to have swept the

State, as did the Democrats, under the

banner of "free rum." It was the

depressing conviction that the administration

in Washington is not in sympathy with the

party it misrepresents by its policy and

methods that kept Republican votes enough

at home to have carried the State in spite

of the money of the liquor league. That

battle is fought again, and on a broader

field. No Ohio alone, but every Northern

and Western State, will yet find an issue

in this policy.
