The Supreme Court in its recent decision upon the application of the County Collector for a peremptory mandamus to our City Treasurer to pay over the large arrears of county tax due from the city, affirmed the validity of the act of the Legislature authorizing bonds issued in anticipation of the payment of the taxes received for the value paid and accrued interest, for a long time actually received the bonds in accordance with their terms. What it entailed from this position and its tendency to the tax receiver to refuse further to pay them has never been apparent. Why now, with this explicit adjudication upon the very question, it deems itself in its resolution following the tax receiver to accept such bonds, is still more inexplicable. Will it require a mandamus now to set them in motion?

The delay of the Common Council in withdrawing its petition of the tax receiver's acceptance of tax bonds instead of money for taxes more than one year may arise from its stock of the Supreme Court's announcement that the writ of mandamus should issue to the Mayor and themselves for the amount shown to have been received by the city treasurer in the city's pay warrant on lists of cash on the assumption that the city treasurer in receiving them was acting under the direction of the Common Council.

The judgment was also that the mandamus issue to the city treasurer for the amount of cash shown by him to be in his hands on account of the taxes due for the year in controversy. Regarding this, and the further fact that the present and future liability of the treasurer in the matter of receipts of taxes and of disbursements of his receipts is not accurately defined, it is perhaps small wonder that to the guardians of the city's liberties the occasion brought more of paralysis than motion.

OUR NEXT UNITED STATES SENATOR.
We believe Mr. McPherson will be his own successor. In the first place he has all the advantages of being Senator now. This position gives to a man who knows enough to sagaciously utilize it for his own benefit, a lead-in half the battle. McPherson has an instinctive knowledge of the human nature that controls the average makes of United States Senators. Whatever any man could get out of this position to add him in his estimation, he will get. Besides his political career has taught him how to estimate the human weaknesses of these Senatorial masters. He has the capacity to recognize it, and disposition to sympathize with it, and the means to gratify it.

His present appearance, his only competitor will be Senator Randolph. This elderly statesman has not been mentioned that of Miss Ross. But politically speaking Miss Ross is dead. His political power derived its entire energy from office holding success. When that failed the power died. The only wonder is that it did not fail sooner. We venture the judgment that when the occasion meets his power will not ever be mentioned.

We believe neither McPherson nor Randolph was sanguine of a Democratic success this fall in the Legislature. If we are correct in this, it is not likely that either of them gave much personal attention to the campaign, or financial help to the candidates. To that extent their claims are about equal. As to their ability, we doubt if there is much difference between them. But McPherson never affects superiority. Political place has never led him to forget that he is still simply one of the people, while Randolph is rather given to put on airs. If the Republicans had to make that selection between the two, they would without doubt select McPherson; and after all one can often get quite as good an idea of a politician's strength by the favor able opinion of his political opponents as by that of his own party.

So far as the country is concerned, the excess of the one or the other of these gentlemen is a matter of indifference. We never heard of either of them devoting any political efforts that extended beyond the facilitating of his own political advancement, except in the single instance of Randolph's attempt to furnish Hancock an opportunity to enlighten the people in regard to the revision of the tariff. His political failure in that effort will probably be forgotten, from original attempt to exhibit himself as a statesman upon any subject of national consequence.

Whatever may be the result, it is evident that the comparative value to the country of the different candidates will not enter into the contest. The measure of success will depend upon popular popularity, substantial aid given to elect a majority in joint meeting, and a plebeian bank account.

DEATH OF THURLOW WEEF.

This distinguished man died at 9 o'clock Wednesday morning, after a mild and lingering illness of six weeks. During the last eighteen years he has resided in New York city, and his tall and powerful though squat figure, with the genial head and benevolent features, was a familiar object at eligible and patriotic gatherings.

Thurlow Weed was born at Chiro Greene county, N. Y., on November 15, 1797. His parents were poor, and as soon as he could reflect, became a cabin boy on a Hudson river boat. He died of this soon, and for a time was an apprentice in the office of the City Journal. He was then sent to work in the law offices of Herkimer county, N. Y., with his father, and later secured employment on the Herkimer American newspaper. He was fifteen years old when he was admitted to the bar, and he immediately enlisted as a soldier. He emerged from Army service in 1817 a Quartermaster's sergeant, and in 1821 became a member of the New York legislature.

The life of Mr. Weed, from 1810 to 1852, is one of the most singular and interesting in our history. He was almost the only man in the Legislature who received a salary, and he was never afterward so honored. The first paper of which he had control was the Norwich, N. Y., Journal, and while an editor he became the de facto agent of Dr. H. C. Chapman, whose fortunes he followed for many years. In 1824 he was deeply interested in politics, and from that time until 1852 he was a Whig, a Warwick, a maker and master of horses, and a man of fortune.

In April, 1819, he married a young woman, Mrs. Weed, a daughter of Captain Ostrander of Herkimer county. They had four children—a son and three daughters.

The son, James, learned to set type, and became a member of the New York legislature. He died unmarried in 1851. The second daughter married Odessa M. Allen of Dutchess county; the youngest daughter married Charles Barnes, a physician, who for some time was president of Insurance. Mrs. Weed died in 1856, and the five or six children of his daughters in the same degree mingled with her descendants. Mr. Weed's oldest daughter has never married.

In some recent reminiscences, Mr. Weed said: "I saw the first steamboat in New York harbor, and I took a passage on it."

In 1828 he married his second wife, Fanny Palmer. It was a most delightful sight.
