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COMMON COUNCIL.

A regular meeting of Common Council was held last night. All the members were present, though one or two were somewhat late. Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

COMMUNICATIONS.

Bonds of J. Wesley Black as superintendent of Alma House, and John J. Oldek as assessor at large, were referred to the finance committee.

From Mrs. Carrie P. Tuttle asking for division of taxes on estate of Wm. H. Platt, was referred to the committee on assessment.

The superintendent of the Alma House reported for month of February: Income \$14. Receipts \$20.50. Expended \$20.50. Balance on hand Feb. 1, \$2.70. Feb. 28, \$2.70. During month of February \$7,229.80. Disbursements \$10,229.80. Balance on hand March 1, 1894, \$3,350.00. Received and placed on file.

Treasurer Langstaff reported as follows: Balance on hand Feb. 1, \$2,700.00. Received during month of February \$7,229.80. Disbursements \$10,229.80. Balance on hand March 1, 1894, \$3,350.00. Received and placed on file.

Receiver of Taxes Brown, reported receipts during month of February: \$4,483.51. Report received and placed on file.

From Secretary of Washington Engine Co. No. 1 certifying that John Fox has served the required time entitling him to exemption. Referred to committee on Fire Department.

From Street Commissioner Hughes stating that pursuant to a resolution passed at last meeting of Council, he had prepared a detailed statement of unpaid accounts owned by him as Street Commissioner. The amount remaining unpaid is \$38.70. On motion of Mr. Gay the report was received and placed on file.

From Peter Thiel, asking that his application for license lay over for two weeks. Request granted.

From Committee on the Soldiers' Monument, asking Council to appoint another member of said committee. Vice Mr. Charles H. Oliver, who declines to serve.

On motion of Mr. Ward the committee was received, and depending the would be detrimental to the interests of the city, except the Water Bill and Senate Bill No. 10 relative to the same.

From Committee recommending that John S. McAnn, Wm. Shockey, and John Crosby be dropped from the roll of Poor House Co. and Wm. Godfrey, Emil Stubby, Edward Crowell, Charles Schweitzer, and Hendley Heath be confirmed as members of same. Council agreed to receive and recommendations adopted.

Mr. Ward reported in the matter of F. L. Stiles communication relative to interest on teachers' warrants, which was referred to the Committee on Education, at last meeting of Council. Mr. Ward said that he had passed a resolution to pay interest on warrants, in order to aid teachers and other employees to be able to get their warrants cashed, and the Board should meet Council in the matter and allow them to pay. This made the school fund. The Board said they could not possibly pay the interest, because they have no fund to pay it from. They made their estimate of what they would need to run the schools for the year, and at the end of the school year would not have left. They finally in their suggestion passed a resolution that they would ask for an additional sum at the time appropriations are made for next year, in order to cover the interest account that may accrue.

Mr. Melick said "no resolution is necessary in this matter, all that is needed is for the Board to take the stamp and stamp their warrants payable with interest, and then the City Treasurer will pay the interest and charge it to the school fund."

Mr. Ward replied that what he wanted was that the Board of Education did not want done. They have no money that can be used for this interest, and as all warrants on the school fund are drawn by the Board of Education, who are a distinctly chartered body, we have no control of their money whatever, after we make appropriations.

Mr. Melick moved that the report be received and placed on file. This made some mirth, as members wanted to find out how a school report could be "filed."

Mr. Melick's motion was received and the Finance Committee reported the Bonds of J. Wesley Black and John J. Oldek as assessor at large, and recommended the approval and confirmation of the report and recommendations adopted.

Mr. Crolius of committee on Poor and Alma, said that another horse would very soon be needed at the Alma farm, and he would like to have Council give the committee power to purchase one.

President Mustfield said no action was necessary as the committee already had the power to purchase a horse if they thought it was needed.

Mr. Donike said he would object to having more than one horse on the farm. He said "I have got 40 acres of land and only farm it with one horse. Whenever I need another horse I can get him for a dollar a day. What do you want two horses there for? You get the grass cut by machine. (The gentleman told what he knew about "one horse" farming.)"

Mr. Leonard said that the city did not like the grass cut at the poor farm, but that the superintendent cut it with a machine that the city owns.

Mr. Martin said that it would be too much "one horse" business to get along without a good team at the farm, and two horses are really needed. No action was taken.

The special com. to confer with P. R. R. relative to safety of houses in the city. We have acquired into the probability of fencing the railroad track and also of having the station when the fast express train pass, with great fearful speed. We have had a conference with officers of the P. R. R. Co. who have expressed to us that the blowing of the whistle has recently been abolished, and that at the earnest request of the people who live adjoining the railroad, that they be consented to fence in the track, 44 feet from the outer rail from Main street to Handwood avenue, whether the proposed authority is given them to do so. Your committee invited the property owners on the line of the railroad to meet with them and present objections, if any. We found a very unanimous opinion expressed against the proposed plan, on the ground of

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Education was held Monday evening, Feb. 27, 1889.

Present, all members except Commissioner Freeman. Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Reports of attendance in various schools during past month, read and placed on file.

Mr. W. Pease, read, stating that he had issued an order on the county collector for the balance of the state appropriation for the month of February was read.

Teachers pay roll for February was read, and the amount was \$715.88.

Miss Lydia H. White, was absent from school 8 days, cause, sickness. Miss Martin taught as her substitute 8 days.

Miss Lillie Hayward was absent from school 8 days, cause, sickness. Miss Mary Sharp taught as her substitute 8 days.

Mr. McKenzie moved that the salaries of the teachers, including substitutes, be paid according to the rules of the Board. Carried.

The subject of the Clerk's report, and the subject of the Treasurer's report, were ordered paid.

The bill of Lewis S. Hyer, for advertising, printing rules in pamphlet form, and tuning organ, \$30.00 was ordered paid.

Mr. C. D. Ward, chairman of the common council, presented a communication from F. L. Stiles relative to interest on warrants held by him, and been referred to the committee named, and he would like the Board to take some action in the matter.

Mr. Ward said that the appropriation for schools has been apportioned to different funds as the Board requested by Council, and he would like to see the Board take some action in the matter.
