The Board will meet on the coming year, as already there are 10 Democrats to 6 Republicans in the township, and the balance of the county, with Rahway yet to elect two.

SEVEN ISLAND TOWN BONDS.—Eighteen years ago the town of Smithfield, in Middlesex county, was bonded for \$25,000 and \$10,000 respectively, to pay for the improvement of a road at which time a boundary between the town of Smithfield and the town of Clinton was a boundary between the town of Smithfield and the town of Clinton.
