#### THE FREEHOLDERS' BILL.

The unfair representation awarded the cities of Elizabeth, Plainfield, and Rahway in the Board of Freeholders is a glaring injustice. Mr. Corbin has, by way of remedy, introduced a bill providing for a more equitable allotment of members by the increase of the board to twenty-five, apportioned as follows: Elizabeth, eight; Plainfield, four; Rahway, four; and the nine townships one each. Under the present apportionment the nine townships control the board nine to eight. At present the representation from these cities comprise but 47 per cent of the board. The injustice of this representation may be seen when it is remembered that these cities comprise 77 per cent of the population of the county, contain 78 per cent of the voters, have 78 per cent of the assessed property, and pay 78 per cent of the taxes. These cities do not make unreasonable demands; for under the proposed allotment they will have but 64 per cent of the board or about 19 per cent less than their population, number of votes, assessed property, and tax payments entitle them to. The proposed basis of representation is established in most of the counties of the state. We are inclined to firmly believe with Mr. Corbin that the expression of the Board of Freeholders does not reflect the views of the people of Union County. It is a old story of taxation without representation, which along with the other old fashioned abuses, must some time go, and the sooner the better.

Editor *Advocate*: As a citizen I think it is time that the ditch agitation in Rahway should be in some way brought to a termination. We have had enough drawn backs, without enumerating them, to check improvements and to prevent capital and people from investing and locating here. Now that there is some change of property into other hands and manifestly some money here yet, and more would come could we but get clear of this ditch and other nuisances? I think I would suggest a plan which I think the least objectionable the most feasible, likely to be successful if resolutely and earnestly pushed, and in which I see no political vic. Would you the Council to pass an ordinance for the leasing of bond to cover the cost in various sums drawing a small rate of interest, to be paid in five or ten years, and provide for the interest and a sinking fund to redeem the same. These let the citizens generally take said bonds from the city or lot. Those most interested would take the largest amount but all are interested in the health of the city, and many who are not in the vicinity of the nuisance would feel no doubt likely doing something for the general good. They ought if a special tax is assessed the bonds would be worth par, and they would soon feel that they had not parted with their money without a pecuniary consideration. Now that, as a true good citizen said, "Agitate this!"

It now remains only to cover the road with a wearing surface. This should be of stone in all cases.
