A NEW OPERA HOUSE.
 In the burning of the Opera House last Wednesday morning this city met with a great loss, and one that will not soon be easily replaced. It has since its erection in 1874 been a source of pride to the citizens that Rahway should possess a building of a size and elegance that no similar structure in any town of equal population in the state could rival. To the liberality and public spirit of the late Mr. Gordon was the city indebted. His foresight for the dramatic art led him to erect for his town a building, where the best companies could present properly the best plays. Now that this is gone the city is absolutely without a place for the performance of plays or the holding of large public meetings. The citizens already see that something must be done immediately to supply this necessity. A number of our prominent men realizing the need of such a building have expressed their willingness to help along the enterprise. It cannot be expected, however, that it will be possible to erect such a fine structure as the one just destroyed. It is thought, however, that for \$35,000 an opera house can be built that will not only answer every requirement, but will reasonably well supply the place of the burned one. There has been a very general suggestion that the Gordon estate be asked to contribute the ground and the bricks from the old building and use the \$10,000 of insurance money in the purchase of stock. If it will consent to do this prominent citizens have said that the rest of the money needed for rebuilding would be subscribed in the form of a purchase of stock. This is far from an unreasonable proposal. The Opera House was an enterprise dear to Mr. Gordon and was a monument to him in the city of his long residence. Its re-erection would be a worthy tribute paid to his memory by his heirs. It would be well, therefore, for those of our citizens who are interested in the matter and are willing to contribute to the enterprise to meet and decide upon some sort of proposition to be submitted to the estate. It is a matter in which the city is interested and something should be done about it at once, for delays are often dangerous.
