The count of the money and securities in the treasury under the auspices of a Democratic secretary has just been made. It disclosed a discrepancy of exactly two cents. And yet it was like like these we have exposed that made up the Democratic party's ammunition last fall.

Even the alleged discrepancy of two cents, reported in the count of the cash room, was shown on account to be incorrect. The missing pennies were subsequently found on the floor where they had dropped in the progress of the count.

THE SITUATION IN ENGLAND. It would seem from present indications that Mr. Gladstone is beset by the greatest difficulties and his Government is in danger of falling. The Cabinet is divided on the question of the renewal of the Coercion Act. Its Soudan policy has been a failure, and the Russian affair has been managed so badly that the ruling classes of England are calling loudly for a change. On the other hand the common people (the Liberals chief support) are indignant at the prospect of an increased tax on beer and are already holding meetings to protest against it; and Lord Randolph Churchill is filling the air with vituperation and denunciation of the government. Still the Conservatives have not yet been able to gain a Parliamentary victory, probably for the reason that they seem to have no really competent leader. And if the Liberals can manage to defer till the general election to be held in the fall under the Redistribution Act, it almost certain that Mr. Gladstone's splendid oratorical abilities and personal influence will succeed in extricating his party from its present critical position, and gaining for it a substantial victory.

THE DISTRICT COURT CLOSED.—The present term of the United States District Court came to an abrupt end Tuesday at 5 o'clock. The trial of the indictments recently found by the grand jury Judge Nixon, in discharging the panel of jurors for the term, said that this was rendered necessary by the exhaustion of the Congressional appropriation made last fall to defray current expenses of the Court.

AS OPERA HOUSE.—It is suggested that the old opera house building on Main Street could, at a cost of about \$5,000, be made into a hall for theatrical meetings, etc., which would answer very well until arrangements could be made for the erection of an opera house. The beams, frame work, and roof of the building are strong and the interior making would make up most of the cost of alteration. Mr. Laing the real estate agent, who has the property for sale, informs us that he has had the last few days' inquiries made about the building with the design of using it as a skating rink, a hall for fairs, a paper mill, a foundry and other purposes. He thinks that money could easily be raised for its alteration into a hall for temporary use.

THIRD REGIMENT NOTES.—Col. Roper of the Third Regiment has issued his orders for the inspection and muster, which will take place at Long Branch on Sunday afternoon. A MEMORIAL HALL.—At a recent meeting of Barry Post, a committee was appointed to make investigations and report on the advisability of erecting a memorial hall, together with a further sum to be raised for the erection of a memorial building for the use of the post. It is proposed that this shall contain a memorial hall which shall be tablets to the memory of all those soldiers and sailors who lost their lives during the rebellion. NEW SYSTEM OF TRAIN STOPPING.—On June 1 the Pennsylvania Railroad Company will introduce a new system of signaling in their passenger trains, to take the place of the bell rope now in use. When the air pipes were too small and large they were put in. These old pipes will now be used to signal from the conductor to the engineer when the former wishes to stop the train. The pipes will communicate with a small whistle in the engineer's cab and the signal will be given by the conductor pulling a rope, which will hang on one side of the car. The main advantage in this arrangement will be that it will be more difficult for the passenger to step the train. Trains are quite often stopped by some excited or intoxicated passenger, and accidents are likely to occur when a train is being stopped.

Three tablespoonfuls of taproca, soaked two hours in water enough to cover it. Boil one quart of milk, stir in the taproca and let it boil till soft. Add the yolks of three eggs well beaten with a cup of sugar. Stir it in and let it boil. As soon as taken from the stove, add the whites of the eggs beaten to a stiff froth; stir it in, add a little salt, and favor to taste.
