One of the surest propagators of disease is impure water. Cleansing cesspools and removing nuisances will avail little if the water used for drinking be impure.

Wells and springs must be most carefully protected from defilement. It is not safe to place any well within one hundred feet of any cesspool, privy, cow or pig-pen, or other deposit of foul matter.

Even a cistern may be defiled by the soil or spilling about it, and wells often are. The cistern may have crevices or may have something fall into it or may have its water become impure by long standing.

There are a few tests which, without the assistance of the chemist, may much aid in indicating whether further examination is necessary or whether it is wise to cease using the water until fully examined.
