Gardening Tips-by the Horticulture, Conservation
Aboretum Committee

-Dig, dry and clean summer flowering bulbs (gladioli, dahlias, tuberous begonias and cannas) as soon as frost kills the tops. Store in plastic bags of dry fine peat, sawdust, or sand. Poke holes in the bags for ventilation and remember to label.

-There is still time to plant spring bulbs.

-Don't mulch fruit trees, strawberries, grapes, berry bushes until ground freezes.

-Don't feed roses that are still in bloom.

-Water fruit trees deeply to make them winter hardy.

-Divide and plant peonies, daylilies and Siberian irises (give extras

to a friend)
-Harvest sunflower heads by cutting them off with a foot-long stem
before they're completely dry, Hang them in an airy place to cure.

-Cover summer crops to protect against frost.

-Irrigate late season crops.

-Feed chard, lettuce, spinach, kale, brussel sprouts, cabbage, brocooli, and cauliflower with manure to hasten maturity.

-Harvest brussell sprouts after the first heavy frost.
-Bring in house plants before you put on your heat.



- 5. Native plants of New Jersey may be used or exhibited if grown by the exhibitor or obtained in a legal manner. If used, a statement of how acquired should be made on a 3"x5" card to accompany exhibit.
- 6. Classes may be subdivided, reclassified or combined at the discretion of the committee.
- 7. All entries for Design and/or Horticulture Divisions must be pre-registered with Kay Cross (233-0905) before Sept. 18 due to space limitation. Only Design Division exhibitors need find a replacement if they cannot exhibit.
- 8. AWARDS: The Standard System of Awards will be used and the decisions of the judges are final. The following may be awarded:

First:	Blue	90 points or above
Second:	Red	85 points or above
Third:	Yellow	80 points or above
Honorable Mention:	White	75 points or above

In each class or subclass, one blue, one red, one yellow and one or more white ribbons may be awarded if merited.





Due to space limitations at Trailside, we encouraged members to be selective and enter only their best specimens in horticulture. Design entry spots went on a first come basis.


