The schedule received full credit on all evaluations!!

Staging was well executed, neat, with excellent light in all areas. The only minor point deducted was forslight crowding of the horticulture and special exhibits.

Design classes were challenging and varied in their interpretations. Some designs were truly outstanding, and only in the stabile class did there appear to be some problems. I believe this is due to exhibitors not understanding the requirements of a stabile design. They are certainly to be commended for attempting this design!

The Special Exhibits Division was most appropriate with very complete and comprehensive designs. This division also received full credit on every evaluation sheet.

## RULES

#### GENERAL

- 1. Classes are open to all amateurs unless specified.
- An exhibitor is allowed only one entry in each class or each subdivision.
- 3. Horticulture entries must be made between 4:30 and 8:30 PM on the evening before the show.
- Design entries must be placed between 8:00 and 9:00 AM on the day of the show and must be removed between 8:30 and 9:00 PM that evening.
- 5. The club will exercise every precaution but cannot be held responsible for loss or damage of property.
- Native plants of New Jersey may be used or exhibited if grown by the exhibitor or obtained in a legal manner. If used, a statement of how acquired should be made on a 3" x 5" card to accompany exhibit.
- 7. The Standard System of Judging will be used and the decisions of the Judges are final.

#### **DESIGN DIVISION**

- 8. All designs must contain plant material.
- All exhibits must be checked by the consultant before the exhibitor leaves.
- 10. If the registered exhibitor is unable to exhibit, she must provide a substitute.
- 11. Accessories may be used in all classes.

- 12. Backgrounds may be changed where permitted and must be changed in Classes 2, and 13.
- 13. All entries must be accompanied by a list of the plant material used, list to be on a 3" x 5" card.
- 14. Contrived flowers or plant forms of recognizable plant materials, fresh and/or dried, are permitted. No embellishment or treatment of fresh plant material is permitted, except conditioning. Only dried material, not fresh, may be embellished or treated. Glycerinized plant material is permitted.
- No artificial flowers, fruits, foliage, nuts or vegetables are permitted.

#### HORTICULTURE DIVISION

- 16. Horticulture classes are open to all amateur gardeners.
- 17. All horticulture exhibits must have been grown by exhibitor.
- Container grown plants must be in exhibitors' possession for a minimum of three months and exhibited in container in which grown without additional adornment.
- 19. Plants grown for bloom must be shown in bloom.
- 20. All chrysanthemeums must be grown outdoors.
- Sprays of stems of chrysanthemums need not meet the definition of a terminal spray but must have a minimum of 3 blooms, preferably 5.
- 22. Containers for cut specimens will be supplied by the committee.
- Horticulture specimens shall be correctly labeled as to variety or cultivar if possible. Only named exhibits are eligible for TOP AWARDS.
- 24. All exhibits shall be checked by the Classification Committee before being placed by the Placement committee. Each entry card must be completely filled out.
- 25. Classes may be subdivided, reclassified, combined, or limited at the discretion of the committee.

## JUNIOR GARDEN CLUB RULES

- 26. Container grown plants must have been in the possession of the exhibitior for two months.
- 27. No artificial plant material is permitted.
- Scenes using sand, gravel, and/or moss are unacceptable as designs.
- 29. Each exhibit must be the work of the individual exhibitor.
- All entries must have exhibitor's name and age on entry card.
- Plants in class 48 must have been growing for at least three weeks.
- 32. All design arrangements must be made at the exhibit hall between 3:30 and 7:30 on Tuesday evening in the presence of the Junior Consultants.
- 33. All children are invited to exhibit. Those not members of the Rake and Hoe Junior Garden Club are asked to make advance entries.

#### NATIONAL COUNCIL AWARDS

The Standard System of Awards will be used. One Blue (1st) and one Red (2nd) and one Yellow (3rd), and one or more White (Honorable Mention) ribbons may be awarded if merited.

1st	Blue Ribbon	90 Pts. or above
2nd	Red Ribbon	85 Pts. or above
3rd	Yellow Ribbon	80 Pts. or above
H.M.	White Ribbon	Meritorious entries- 75 Pts. or above

TRICOLOR AWARD (2) may be awarded to a blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or over in classes 4,7,8 and 6,9,12. All plant material must be fresh. One or more accessories may be used. Weathered wood is not permitted in any form. Color: Rosette combining blue, red and yellow ribbons.

CREATIVITY AWARD may be awarded to a blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or over in classes 2,5,11. Exhibit is to be designer's choice of fresh, dried, and/or treated plant material with or without other components. Color: Rosette of purple ribbons. AWARD OF DISTINCTION may be awarded to a blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or over in classes 3,10,13. All plant material must be dried. All other components must be subordinate. Treated dried plant material and/or glycerinized plant material and one or more accessories are allowed. Color: Rosette of brown ribbons.

JUNIOR ACHIEVEMENT AWARD (3) may be awarded to outstanding horticulture, design, and/or educational exhibits in the Junior section. Winning exhibits must score 90 or above. Color: Rosette of red, white and blue ribbons.

AWARD OF MERIT (2) may be given in sections I and II of the Horticulture Division to a named blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or over. Color: Rosette of orange ribbons.

ABOREAL AWARD may be given in Section III of the Horticulture Division to a named blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or over. Color: Rosette of two shades of green ribbons.

AWARD OF HORTICULTURAL EXCELLENCE may be given to a named blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or above judged as the finest in the entire Horticulture Division. Color: Rosette of green, orange and blue ribbons.

AWARD OF APPRECIATION may be awarded to invitational exhibits and/or other special non-competitive exhibits. Color: Rosette of orchid ribbons with gold lettering.

SWEEPSTAKES AWARD may be given to the exhibitor winning the most blue ribbons in the Horticulture Division. An Award of Merit, Arboreal Award and Award of Horticultural Excellence will each count as one extra blue ribbon. In the event of a tie, red ribbons will be counted. Color: Rosette of green and white ribbons.
