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
History and Description

Located in a woodland setting behind the historic Reeve House, the **Claire Brownell Memorial Wildflower Garden** was officially established in May of 1996. It is on the property of the Westfield Historical Society.

At the time of her death five years earlier, Claire's husband George established a Memorial Fund with the Westfield Historical Society to create the garden in her name. Grants from the Caroline Stephens Hold Fund help support the garden's maintenance. The Rake & Hoe Garden Club cares for the garden, replacing plants as necessary.

The approach to the garden is down a grassy slope on the right side of the hill. Turning onto the garden path, visitors will view the marshy meadow below. The entrance to the path is marked by an historical memorial stone and a stand of majestic Solomon's Seal.





The seating area is nestled into the slope before a giant maple tree, a perfect setting to enjoy a variety of birds attracted by an ample food supply from plants and shrubs.

The hillside is planted with:

- Observation Blue Star Flower (Amsonia hubrechtia)
- Searded Tongue (Penstemon barbatus)
- ♦ False Indigo (Baptisia australis)
- Outline Mountain Mint (Pycanthemum muticum)
- ♦ Golden Alexander (Zizia aurea)
- Virginia Sweetspire (Itea virginica)
- ♦ Inkberry (Ilex glabra)
- Ophobble (Leucothoe axillaris)
- Obstant Section Buckeye (Aesculus parviflora)
- Christmas Fern (Polystichum acrostichoides)
- Cinnamon Fern (Osmunda cinnamomea)
- Sensitive Fern (Onoclea sensibilis)
- ♦ Wood Fern (Dryopteris filix-mas)
- Mayapple (Podophyllum pelatum)
- Lesser Celandine (Ranunculus ficaria)
- ♦ Golden Ragwort (Packera aurea)

Garden Restoration

In the years since the garden's dedication in 1996, the original steps, planting beds, and wall had disappeared under a blanket of invasive English ivy.

In 2012, Matthew Gates of Boy Scout Troop 77 in Westfield, proposed an Eagle Scout project to clean up and re-landscape the garden. With the help of other scouts and high school friends, fifty bags of ivy were removed from the property.

Matthew, son of Rake & Hoe Garden Club member Karen Jolley Gates, then worked with the garden club and the Westfield Historical Society to replace the old benches that had been vandalized. Two metal benches were designed and custom-made in a style appropriate to the Victorian Reeve House. Concrete was poured to form bases for the new benches, which were bolted into the concrete for security.

A 60-foot long retaining wall of stone was built to line the other side of the path, and the path was leveled and laid with gravel. The garden was now ready for planting by the Rake and Hoe Garden Club.



Matthew's Eagle Scout project won the First Place National Distinguished High School Service Project Award from National Garden Clubs, Inc.
