Belated Wildlife Refuge dedication set for February

The Wildlife Refuge on Sanibel, established in December 1945, will be officially dedicated on February 4, 1978.

The dedication will take place about 10 years after the name of the sanctuary was

changed in December 1967 from the Sanibel National Wildlife Refuge to the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge in honor of the celebrated cartoonist and conservation-

In what promises to be a stellar ceremony, the featured speaker will be the

U.S. Department of the Interior's Assistant Secretary Robert Herbst.

The belated dedication of the nationally popular Refuge, which now attracts about one million visitors a year, is being co-sponsored by an impressive array of regional and national organizations -- all

pulled together for this function by the J.N. Darling Foundation of Des Moines, Iowa.

"We are pleased and grateful for the broad and generous support that we have received in organizing this dedication program," said Sherry Fisher, chairman of the Board of Trustees of the J.N. Darling Foundation, in a telephone interview last

Fisher is serving as chairman of the February ceremony.

Playing a key role with Fisher in helping organize the dedication is Richard "Dick" Koss, whose wife Mary is the daughter of "Ding" Darling. The Koss' are well-known winter visitors to Sanibel, and Dick Koss is vice-chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Darling Foundation.

Secretary Herbst will be introduced by Lynn A. Greenwalt, director of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

The program will feature other speakers that have been closely associated with the Refuge system. Larry Givens, of the National Refuge Association of America, will speak on the role of federal, state and local agencies in establishing the "Ding" Darling Refuge, while Emmy Lou Lewis, who was chairman of the "Ding" Darling Memorial Committee and long-time member of the board of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, will talk on the part that many private individuals played in creating the Refuge.

It is anticipated, Fisher said, that a platform will be erected near the observation tower for honored guests and visitors. A large stone, carrying a plaque with dedication wording that has been submitted for official approval, will be unveiled by Secretary Herbst in the afternoon cere-

City Council calls for quiet

Sanibel's threatened "sound of silence" was insured Tuesday when City Council passed an ordinance prohibiting "excessive, unnecessary, unnatural or unusually loud noises" on the island.


With support from the small audience, and hesitancy only from Councilman Francis Bailey who complained of a "proliferation of ordinances on relatively petty things," Council unanimously approved the antinoise law.

The ordinance results from what Mayor Porter Goss called a "steady trickle of complaints" from residents, especially on the noise generated by construction, motorcycles and trucks with no mufflers.

Under terms of the new ordinance, a person may be fined up to \$500 or jailed up to 60 days for making any noise which "annoys, disturbs, injures, or endangers the comfort, repose, health, peace, safety or welfare of others."

January 31 set as growth rate deadline

The Planning Commission once again on Monday tackled the problem of controlling the rate of growth on Sanibel, agreeing that a policy should be established by January 31 and that, in the meantime, the city should stick with its policy of issuing no building permits without prior proof of an approved water hook-up from Island Water Association.

Commission chairman Ann Winterbotham reported on the recommendations to City Council on Tuesday, and it is anticipated that the subject will be discussed further by Council at its next meeting on November 1.

Planning director Carleton Ryffel reported to the Commission on Monday that his estimates show that a total island build-out of 7,800 dwelling units will be reached by 1981 if development continues at its present rate.

Ryffel also said projections of water usage show that Sanibel will be "dangerously close" to exceeding its water capacity by March, 1979.

Island Water Association director Larry Snell told the Commission, however, that IWA will probably have a difficult time providing water in March, 1978.

After hearing Ryffel's report and the IWA projections, the Commission decided to urge City Council to continue issuing building permits only to persons with water permits. Council passed an ordinance to that effect in September. IWA currently is not issuing new water permits.

The Commission vigorously objected to a proposed amendment which would allow exceptions to that ordinance.

Council will have a public hearing November 1 on the amendment, which would allow a person with an existing

well to apply for a variance to the ordinance to get a building permit without an IWA water hook-up. That person would have to connect to IWA when water becomes available.

IWA president Jim Robson pointed out that IWA would have problems forcing people to hook up to the Association when water became available. He added that well water poses a health hazard. "We could wake up one morning to typhus fever," he said.

Commissioner George Tenney said, "To allow someone to live off well water is a mistake." He said the present ordinance does not go far enough. "This may be heresy, but I would recommend that Council impose a complete building moratorium until some of our imponderables -- water, traffic, circulation, and hurricane evacuation -- are solved."

City offices may expand

Sanibel police and MacKenzie Hall may have brand new, though temporary, quarters in a few months. The city has been negotiating with Jim Robson, owner of Three-Star grocery store, to rent space in an addition Robson plans for the building which now houses Three-Star.

Robson said he will construct his new building to accommodate the police department on the second floor and MacKenzie Hall on the ground floor if the city will sign a two-year lease.

According to City Manager Bill Nungester the space is badly needed. The police department is seriously crowded in present quarters in the fire department, he said. The department has no privacy and no storage space.

Two problems would be solved if MacKenzie Hall were moved from City Hall to the new building. The meeting room would be more accessible to the handicapped by being on the ground floor, and the present chambers could be converted into two or three badly needed offices and a conference room for city employees, Nungester said.

With the recent addition of an associate planner and an assistant to the city manager, and the future addition of an engineer, City Hall very badly needs more office space, Nungester said.

Robson said he plans to apply for a building permit from the city today and hopes to have the building finished 90 to 120 days after construction begins.

Abuse of vegetation law prompts new regulations

Sparked by excessive and unapproved clearing at construction sites. City Council decided Tuesday to tighten regulations on vegetation removal.

Council agreed that a section should be added to the building code ordinance which

would give the city the authority to issue a stop work order when a development does not comply with city approved vegetation removal.

"A stop work order begins to hurt," Mayor Porter Goss said.

City Attorney Neal Bowen explained that

the recourse now open to the city in such a case is court action which is "relatively ineffective."

The most recent incident of unapproved vegetation removal resulted in a negotiated agreement between the developers and the city for revegetation.

The driver of the smashed

truck escaped serious in-

jury.

The incident involved Joey's fast food restaurant being built on Periwinkle Way east of Seven Seas. The developers cleared 28,600 square feet, or nearly twice as much as they had agreed to, according to City Manager Bill Nungester.

Public Services Director John Goode said developer Robert Hollopeter was out of town when the clearing took place and had said it was done inadvertently.

Hollopeter and the city reached an agreement last week requiring the developer to place \$3,000 in an escrow account until the area was revegetated. The replanting will be done with the approval of the vegetation committee.

'How are we going to get people on this island to understand a tree cannot be replaced," Vice Mayor Zee Butler asked after learning about the Joey's incident. "We've got to come down pretty hard on the destruction of vegetation."

Nungester said the city will begin making more vegetation inspections at construction sites and will require fencing around vegetation to be preserved, along with giving the city authority to issue stop work order when vegetation ordinances and regulations are ignored.

The Planning Commission recommended to Council that some changes regarding island vegetation be made in the land-use plan. The Commission suggested amending the plan to provide for protective fencing around vegetation to be preserved, to require a vegetation inspection of all sites, and to require revegetation where vegetation was removed illegally.

The Commission also asked the city to adopt the following policies:

• to systematically top all casuarinas along city streets;

• to replace casuarinas wherever possible with slash pine;

• to encourage property owners to remove exotic vegetation which competes with native plants;

• to establish a list of competing exotics

 to use only native vegetation or non-competing exotics in city landscaping.

Heavy loads shorten life of city roads, engineers say

Some of Sanibel's roads are not going to last much longer if heavy construction traffic continues to travel on them frequently and at present load limits, according to an engineering report by the city's consulting engineers, Howard, Needles, Tammen and Bergendoff (HNTB).

Jack Carman, HNTB engineer, told City Council Tuesday that Donax, Casa Ybel, Gulf Drive, Tarpon Bay and Palm Ridge are deteriorating fast -- especially in the west-bound lanes -- and in some cases may last only a few more months.

For example, Carman said, if construction trucks loaded to 75 percent of the Florida weight law make 30 trips down Donax every day, that road will be impassable in one year.

Because Donax is the only access to Middle Gulf Drive where several new condominium projects are underway, that estimate is probably quite conservative, Mayor Porter Goss said. "It's probably closer to six months."

Causeway Road, Periwinkle Way, Rabbit Road and Sanibel-Captiva Road are in fairly good shape, according to Carman. Those roads could likely last 15 more years, he said. Sanibel-Captiva Road may deteriorate somewhat faster than that, however, because it is so narrow, Carman explained. "The load is then applied on the very edge of the road which tends to shear the surface. Widening would extend the life of Sanibel-Captiva Road."

Carman pointed out that construction vehicles are the critical vehicles in analyzing the design life of roads. "Automobile traffic does not have such an effect on roads," he said.

A weight survey of trucks on Sanibel, conducted last April, revealed that most trucks are loaded to 75 percent of the Florida load limits, which is slightly less than the city's existing weight limits. Sanibel now allows a two-axle truck to carry 40,000 pounds, whereas 75 percent of the Florida law is 33,000 pounds.

Sanibel is in the process of revising its

weight laws. An earlier proposal by City Manager Bill Nungester to make the present limits much more restrictive was criticized by area builders as being much too severe. The builders have asked if they could supply input in determining the new limits. Council will hear another engineering report November 1 and will then schedule a public workshop to give builders and residents a chance to discuss the subject before a first reading of a permanent weight ordinance is held.

In other action Tuesday, Council:

• passed an ordinance establishing an application fee of \$150 for specific amendments and \$200 for general amendments to the land use plan;

• approved an amendment to the plan allowing the Sanibel Community Church to build an addition;

Encephalitis threat lessens each week

The threat of mosquito-borne encephalitis on Sanibel seems to be diminishing week by week as the population of culex nigripalpus, the mosquito known to carry the disease, grows smaller.

Only two nigripalpus were found in three traps on Sanibel last week, according to Lee County Mosquito Control Director Wayne Miller. That compares to 1,000 found in one trap two weeks ago. Miller said the population is too low to warrant spraying the island.

More encouraging news on the situation has come from the state Epidemiology Research Center in Tampa where the mosquitoes are tested for the virus. Of six pools of nigripalpus collected from Sanibel, none had turned out positive as of Wednesday.

Miller explained that mice, injected with a serum from the mosquitoes, usually die by the sixth day if the mosquitoes are infected. None of the mice injected with serum from Sanibel mosquitoes had died by Wednesday, the fourteenth day.

"We will not get a definite clean bill of health for a few more days, however," Miller said. "We will continue to monitor the situtation."

Six positive collections have been found in other areas of Lee County. Mosquitoes from Shady Oaks Park in East Fort Myers, Winkler Road south of Fort Myers, Pine Island, and North Fort Myers have been found to carry the encephalitis virus.

One human case was confirmed in a

69-year old East Fort Myers man in September.

Three other cases around the state have been confirmed in Palm Beach and Osceola counties, according to the state Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services. Five people are suspected to have the disease in Highlands, Orange, Hillsborough, Polk, and Sarasota counties.

Miller also said the recent cool weather has been beneficial in controlling the mosquitoes. "Cold weather keeps the mosquitoes in hiding," he said.

Failure prompts new test well

Attempts to repair the collapsed casing on a new Island Water Association test well have failed, and the new well must be drilled.

The setback will cost the IWA more than \$40,000 and three months' time, according to General Manager Larry Snell. It was hoped the 610-foot deep test well near the Sanibel Elementary School would determine if additional good quality water could be drawn from the lower Hawthorn aquifer, or if a deeper well into the larger Suwanee aquifer will be needed to boost the supply of treatable water.

A deeper well would mean the IWA would have to install additional treatment equipment to handle the poorer quality water from the Suwanee.

The IWA Board of Directors were promised a report on the test well on October 15, but the casing failure and the subsequent repair attempt have delayed the report until December 1, said Snell.

The aborted well was capped yesterday,

and drilling of a nearby new well is supposed to begin today or tomorrow. The IWA has agreed to pay the drilling contractor, McGregor Pump, \$13,000 or half the cost of the first well, plus the cost of drilling the second well, estimated to be

The total cost of the test well program was set at \$70,000, but the delays have pushed that up to \$110,000, said Snell.

more than \$30,000.

By drilling around the clock the test well should be dug in about 10 days, said Snell. Hydrologists will then conduct pumping tests to determine the amount and quality of water still available in the lower Hawthorn. "If the tests turn out bad, we'll have to go down to the Suwanee," said Snell.

The IWA moratorium on new water connections will probably stay in effect until more treatable subsurface water is found. Meanwhile, Snell said the association has compiled a waiting list of people who want to build a total of 700 more units on Sanibel.


enjoyable routine in which students take seriously their assigned tasks while learning a vocation that will enable them to lead more productive lives.





the ordinance are:

• Radios, stereos, televisions and musical instruments which disturb the peace, quiet and comfort of neighboring inhabitants;

• Engines without mufflers to prevent excessive noise;

 Any motor vehicle so out of repair or so overloaded so as to result in loud and unnecessary grating, grinding, rattling or other unnecessary noise;

• Demolition, alteration, development, erection, or repair of any building or structure, road or highway, which involves excessive noise except between 7:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Monday through Saturday.

• Operation of any bulldozer, pile driver, steam shovel, pneumatic hammer, derrick, steam or electric hoist or other appliance except between 7:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Monday through Saturday.

As a representative of the building industry, Sanibel Homes president Bill Frey said he would prefer a 12-hour work day from 6:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. but he was agreeable to 10 hours.

The approved ordinance is somewhat less restrictive than the original proposal which limited construction to 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. on weekdays only.

The new ordinance also left out specific restrictions on yelling, shouting, hooting, whistling, or singing on public streets; animals which create frequent or loud continuous noise; and horns with unreasonably harsh sounds.

The ordinance gives a fair amount of latitude to the City Manager in making exceptions to the law.

"The idea of this ordinance," Mayor Porter Goss said, "is not to write a ridiculous ordinance or a Cape Coral-type restrictive ordinance. It gives a tool to the police department so they can do their job."

Sanibel Police Chief John Butler, who was not consulted during the writing of the ordinance, said he supported it. "We've had complaints about construction activity on Sunday for example, but we haven't had a law to fall back on.'

Butler pointed out that, as with most misdemeanors, police have to witness the violation to make an arrest.

Councilman Bailey objected to the apparent difficulty in enforcing the ordinance. "Who is going to say whether the noise level is annoying? How do you determine that level?" he asked. "We are asking for a whole lot of work to be thrown

on the police for nothing."

Councilman Charles LeBuff voiced concern over the homeowner who wants to "cut a board, drive a nail, or cut his grass on Sunday."

"We are hitting at the flagrant violator of the peace and tranquility of Sanibel," Councilman Duane White answered. "Not the person who goes out and occasionally cuts his grass."

City Attorney Neal Bowen said cutting the grass would not be construed as an unusual noise, and pointed out that similar noise ordinances are in effect in 30 to 50 percent of all cities in the United States. "I am not at all uncomfortable with it." he

Mayor Goss concluded that the ordinance is actually a guideline "to encourage reasonable people to do reasonable things.'



New plaza is Tracey's pride and joy

A year's worth of planning, land acquisition and several appearances before the Sanibel Planning Commission are expected to come to fruition for island native Gordon Tracey next month with the opening of Sanibel Plaza.

Construction on the eight-unit shopping center, located off Periwinkle Way behind Weeds in Things and adjacent to the Heart of the Islands shopping plaza, began this week. Completion is expected in mid to late November. Tracey and his mother, Mrs. Velna Ridge, are the owner-developers.

This is their most recent attempt at development on the island. The first, a planned 95-unit travel trailer park on 23 acres at the end of Dunlop Road, was the object of a lawsuit against the city which Tracey and Mrs. Ridge lost last May. "We claimed vested rights," the brassy but polite Tracey said in an interview this week. "The idea for the park -- and it was strictly for recreational vehicles -- began in 1970. In 74 we tried to get zoning and permits from the county five months before the city incorporated."

Mrs. Ridge owned and operated a trailer park for 20 years on the east end of the island. It was sold in 1970 and the site was developed for Loggerhead Cay condominjum

The Dunlop park suit was filed in the spring of 1975 after the new city had denied permits on the basis of potential problems with hurricane evacuation and increased generation of traffic on island roads.

Tracey lost in the first round in the circuit court, then lost in the court of appeals last May. The city heralds the case as the first great test of the comprehensive land use plan, which passed, officials believe, with flying colors.

To observers, Tracey appeared to take the opposite tactic with his Sanibel Plaza project. Several months ago, when he first appeared before the Planning Commission seeking a development permit, Tracey told commissioners his intent was to abide by all

the requirements of the land use plan. Commissioners, openly critical of small shopping centers on small strips of land in an already congested area, examined every inch of his plan. Several times Tracey left commission meetings with his head bowed after being told that more changes had to be made for such items as buffer zones, parking places, driveway widths and drainage plans before a permit would be issued.

That happy day for Tracey arrived in August; building permits were granted

EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

Demolition crews are working at Casabel Resort on Sanibel this week removing several structures and the swimming pool from the island's oldest resort.

Three sheds, a laundry and a maintenance building on the northeast corner of the property are being demolished, according to Art Steidel, project manager for the resort's owners, Mariner Properties. "The structures were quite old and not very sound," Steidel said.

Also being removed are the pool, pool house and No-See-Um bar on the Gulf behind the restaurant. The area will be restored and revegetated, Steidel said.

The former Doane's Twin Palms Cottages on Captiva has changed ownership and is now known as Jensen's Twin Palm Resort Marina. Owner Richard Jensen purchased the 15 cottage resort last month for a reported \$425,000 from E. Arrel Doane and Doane Enterprises, Inc. New managers as of October are Rosalie and Thomas Huss, who moved to Captiva from Lakewood, N.Y.

Retail sales in Florida amounted to more than \$31 billion last year, the highest amount ever reported for the state and 13 percent higher than the previous year. Fort Myers contribution was \$611 million, up from \$527 million in 1975.

Regarding a recent article on this page concerning a one million dollar restaurant and clubhouse complex being built at Sundial Beach Hotel and Tennis Club, the complex is being completed with the aid of a mortgage loan of \$1 million for construction, as reported, but the actual total cost of the complex is \$2.4 million.

Congress modifies wage bill

Both houses of Congress were expected to vote this week on a conference committee report that could increase the minimum wage in increments starting next year and reduce the tip credit system 10 percent by 1979.

The committee's report, the result of a compromise between House and Senate minimum wage bills, would raise the wage level by 35 cents to \$2.65 an hour next January, \$2.90 in 1979, \$3.10 in 1980 and \$3.35 in 1981.

The tip credit system would be retained at 50 percent during 1978, and would drop to 40 percent in 1979 through 1981. The National Restaurant Association strongly protested reducing the current percentage, which allows an employer to count employees' tips toward as much as 50 percent of the minimum wage. The Senate's first draft of the bill would have phased out tip credit entirely by 1983. Restaurant owners around the country speculated that such a move would force them to raise prices, reduce working hours and lay off employees.

The compromise bill also would change the definition of a tipped employee as one who earns more than \$30 per month in tips. The current level is \$20 per month.

Also, businesses would be exempt from having to pay minimum wage to their employees if gross sales are less than \$275,000 in 1978-79, less than \$325,000 in 1980 and less than \$362,500 in 1981. The current cut-off level is \$250,000.

A youth employee differential, which would have allowed new workers age 19 and under to be paid 85 percent of the new minimum wage during a six-month apprentice period, was not included in the report.

According to Florida Senator Richard Stone's Washington office, both houses are expected to vote on the report this week. If approved, the bill would then be submitted to President Carter for final action.

Sanicor condo units sold

Captran, Inc., a new general limited partnership on Sanibel, has purchased the 30-unit Sanicor Lighthouse Apartments from its Swiss owners, San Investment Corporation, S.A. (Sanicor), for a price in excess of \$3 million, according to Captran general partner Keith Trowbridge.



Sanicor Lighthouse units are destined to be marketed under the interval ownership concept.

The apartments, to be known as Lighthouse Resort and Club, will be marketed for interval ownership beginning in early November. Prices for the three bedroom units will range from \$1,900 to \$6,500 depending on location and season. The units will be marketed by Interval Realty, Inc., a new real estate firm being formed, Trowbridge said, to handle interval ownership transactions.

Sanicor purchased the Lighthouse Point units in August, 1976 and converted them from condominium to rental apartment status. Captran will honor reservations made with Sanicor through this year, Trowbridge said.

Other Captran principals include vice presidents Kenn Kiem and John Hill; Chuck Leonard will be director of management information systems for the firm.

This means that for every eight ounce glass served, 24 additional ounces are used, and since not all guests care to consume table water, in some cases we were virtually throwing much of this water 'down the drain.'

Most moderate to large restaurants figure the effort will conserve about 750 gallons of water a week. It's economical, and on an island with a critical water shortage, it's good public relations.

Harbor House follows the same practice, but they don't use signs. 'People are aware enough," said owner Bob Horstmeyer. "We cut out serving water in June and now only about five percent of our customers ask for it. And, it tends to increase wine and beer sales.'

John Kontinos recently initiated the water-saving practice at the Coconut Grove. "He expects to use less than half the amount of water required at the restaurant before the policy was adopted.


Water on request is also standard practice at Letizias, Scotty's Pub, and the Mucky Duck. Castaways tried it for about a month, but it didn't work, according to a spokesman. "We're right on the beach and I guess that has something to do with it, but four out of five requested water, so we stopped the policy. Frankly, we don't seem to waste it.

Breakwater offers cheaper alternative

FLOATING ZIGZAG BREAKWATER

A floating, parallel zigzag-shaped breakwater has recently been installed at a Scottish marina by Floating Breakwaters Ltd. The 1.6 foot deep breakwater was assembled from replacable units that were constructed in dry dock, towed to the site, and "permanently" moored by chains. Whereas conventional breakwaters and seawalls stop wave action by forming a wall against the wave's horizontal motion, the floating zigzag breakwater forms a horizontal barrier to the vertical, up and down movement of water in a wave. Engineers estimate that the cost of the new breakwater is four to five times less than if a conventional, permanent one had been constructed.

FOSSIL FUEL USE WILL RAISE THE EARTH'S **TEMPERATURE**

As fossil fuels are burned, Carbon Dioxide (CO₂) is released. This adds to the CO2 already existing in the air and increases the "greenhouse effect" of the atmosphere, allowing solar energy to reach the Earth but preventing its release as infrared radiation. The result is a warming of the earth's surface. Since the beginning of the industrial revolution, atmospheric CO₂ has risen 13 percent. Reports from the National Academy of Sciences and Dr. Broecker of the Lamont Doherty Geological Observatory say that if we continue to burn fossil fuels the average global temperature could rise by as much as 11 degrees F. by the middle of the next century. Although the exact effect and magnitude of such a warming are uncertain, Dr. Broecker notes his belief that the temperature difference between the last glacial age and the last period of warm-up was only 4 degrees F.

PRIMEVAL ASTEROID SHOWERS CREATED THE CONTINENTS

A NASA scientist, Herbert Fey, hypothesizes that the same showers of asteroids that pitted the moon's surface also led to the formation of continents here on Earth. Over four billion years ago the surface of the Earth cooled and formed a crust of material less dense than the deeper molten rock. Then, asteroids 30 miles in diameter plumetted onto 50 percent of the Earth's surface, fracturing and "denting" the surface. This allowed the denser subsurface molten rock to seep upwards and fill the basins, eventually cooling. Thus two types of crust developed: the heavier rock which had come to the surface and cooled, and the original less dense crust which formed the continents.

LEARNING DISABLED CHILDREN AND THEIR HAIR

A study at McGill University in Montreal has found a significant correlation between the concentration of heavy and trace elements in the students' hair and their classification as learning disabled (LD) children. Using cadmium, cobalt, manganese, chromium, and lithium the researchers were able to classify the subjects as normal or LD with 98 percent accuracy.



Lots are larger

To Island Reporter: As the president of the Virginia South Corporation, the developer of Sea Oats subdivision, I am concerned by several quotations in the article on page 8 in the issue of October 14.

Specifically the references to lot sizes in Sea Oats have been made without complete information. One party is quoted as stating the lots average about 10,000 to 12,000 square feet. Another is quoted as saying, "I am scared to death of these little tiny lots."

As a matter of fact the smallest lot in Sea Oats is 12,408 square feet. Only one other lot, at 12,487 square feet, is under 12,500 square feet. At the other end of the spectrum, lot sizes go up to 19,849 square feet, with over 20 percent of the lots being in excess of 15,000 square feet.

The average size of the 50 lots in Section One of Sea Oats is 13, 855 square feet.

Beach building ban proposed

To Island Reporter: The primary ecological objective of the Comprehensive Land Use Plan was to protect the vital wetlands environments of Sanibel. This was done by limiting the number of dwelling units that could be built on an acre of land in the wetland types. The great majority of us support that ecological objective, and it is clear that the protection is reasonably effective.

However, some of us pointed out when the draft plan was being discussed at public hearings, that another ecological type was ecologically significant, esthetically valuable, and environmentally vulnerable -- the Gulf Beach Ridge. I, for one, felt that this type deserved as much protection as the

Our professional planning consultants from WMRT did not agree! They drafted a

plan which proposed to allow eight dwelling units per acre. That is really crowding as it allows a dwelling unit with only a land acre of 75 feet by 75 feet! The City Council had the good sense to reduce the density to 5 units per acre in the final Plan. Even that density committed the Beach Ridge to multi-unit development from one end of the island to the other.

It may be too late to do anything. Our beach front may be lost because most remaining open areas are scheduled for development. However, I believe the City Council should impose an immediate moratorium on any building on the Beach Ridge; then it should amend the Plan to reduce the allowable density to no more than one dwelling unit per 5 acres -- or perhaps one per 10 acres! /s/ William L. You will be quiet on Sanibel - or else

Commerce, in its national advertising, bills Sanibel as famous for "the sound of silence," where a man can walk on the beach "and hear himself think."

Having agreed, however, that unnecessary noise is bad, the question still remains: How far should the City

of Sanibel go in trying to legislate quiet?

This week the City Council passed a revised version of an ordinance to regulate noise on the island. Although it represents an improvement over an earlier draft, it is still, in our judgment, a bad law.

It is bad, primarily, because it contains provisions that are unnecessary, other provisions that are unenforceable, and at least one that is ridiculous.

 The ordinance requires mufflers on motor vehicles -which seems redundant and unnecessary because it's already required by state law;

• The ordinance makes it illegal to play a phonograph or a television after 11:00 p.m. if it is "plainly audible" at a distance of 50 feet.

This is ridiculous. At virtually any practical volume setting, music from a decent stereo is likely to be audible at that distance -- unless one closes all the windows and turns on the air-conditioning.

This provision could result in a lot of unnecessary crank calls to the police department, asking the police to take action to enforce a law that most likely wouldn't stand up in court because the standards aren't sufficiently well-defined. What is "plainly audible" to one person might be scarcely audible to another.

Is the next move to provide our police department with expensive and time-consuming noise meters?

 The ordinance limits most construction work which involves noise to the hours of 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on weekdays and Saturdays.

If interpreted with some reason, this provision makes sense and follows a pattern adopted in many communities. Why could not the Council have confined its ordinance to this provision and thus have avoided "the administrative nightmare" that the other provisions could produce?

We sympathize with the desire of the community for quiet, for what the Chamber of Commerce calls "the

We all favor a little peace and quiet. Our Chamber of sound of silence," but in responding to every problem is it necessary to over-legislate?

The fact that the city now has a law regulating noise may make some people sleep better, but we doubt that it'll have much effect on the real noise makers.

Water ban too rigid

some exceptions to receive reasonable consideration, on the merits of their cases, as presented to a proper authority.

Construction continues to go on all around us, of both single family and condominium homes. Most, on completion, will be added to the roster of those already built, erected for absentee ownership, planned for use as a vacation island home, and in later years, as a retirement domicile. They give no thought to residing here now, or giving up their present home states, for official Florida residency.

These dwellings are usually rented out for the three or four month winter season to vacationers, then remain vacant for the better part of the year. Sanibel becomes a town of uninhabited homes. The permanent population is a very thinly scattered few, when compared to the total number of housing units built and available for occupancy.

Due to the moratorium, those persons wishing to live year round on Sanibel can no longer build their own private dream retreat. Nor can they purchase an existing current model new home. They are built only on specific order, under contract. All this, because a water shortage could happen, supposedly, during the winter tourist season.

It seems grossly unfair to permit tourism to interfere with residency!

There should be a workable solution for coexistence of the two for the benefit of all.

It would seem that the City of Sanibel should have room for and be willing to accept new permanent residents into their midst at all times. Wouldn't it be exemplary to be considerate and give some human understanding and special priorities to those already retired who have taken up official residency in Florida, wishing only to become respected members of the Sanibel community.

There is some evidence, I'm told, that this move of Homo erectus from the tropics to the north may have presented such a challenge that it resulted in an increased size in his brain.



Tucker Abbott: 'No need for live shelling ban'



little threat to the molluscan community as a whole."

Abbott, chairman of the Department of Malacology at the University of Delaware and well known locally, was on Sanibel last June to speak to a group of Girl Scouts on "Shells around the world."

Abbott is quoted by "Hawaiian Shell News" as saying: "When an (offshore) shell is carried to within a hundred feet or so of the shore, it is already destined to wash up and die on the beach, so there's no harm in picking it up. It does no good to throw it back because it will just wash in again with the tide.

"The shell population here (on Sanibel) come and go, depending on mother nature and the climate. If you have a major disturbance -- bridge building, for instance -- it will alter the shell's environment for about ten years. The molluscs that were there originally, of course, will probably disappear, but they will be replaced by another type of shell more suited to the new environment.

"I'm of the opinion that the city (of Sanibel) should allow moderate collecting by tourists and residents and, if possible, control commercial shell collecting.

"People may be moan the lack of shells on the beach, but when you get one of those famous 'northwesterns,' the island is knee-deep in shells.

"Sanibel still has the third or fourth best shelling conditions in the world. When Sanibel has a good day, it can't be matched anywhere.

"I wouldn't recommend rushing out and getting all the angel wings you can," Abbott is quoted as saying in his speech to the Girl Scouts. "Not because of lack of supply but because of uprooting or destroying the natural bay bottom where they live. Marine shells lay millions of eggs every year, so there is a great supply."

Speaking of the islands, Abbott said, "None of the shells here are endangered, certainly not from over-collecting, although in the long range the whole west coast of Florida possibly is endangered from over-development. But that won't come about for another fifty years.

"The City of Sanibel doesn't need an ordinance banning live shelling. All that would do is keep some of the tourists away. But that might not be such a bad idea."







There's one thing we'll need, of course, and that's a little gold snap


course, and that's a little cold snap







feeding with roseate spoonbills in the "Ding" Darling Wildlife Refuge during the winter season. Ornithologists generally agree that these birds, along with others seen in the Everglades, are escapees from captivity. And indeed, visitors to Jungle Larry's Safari in Naples or Parrot Jungle and Hialeah racetrack in Miami can view imported flamingos, some of which have escaped over the years. Most do not breed in captivity, yet the Hialeah birds have prospered and have been recorded as the only breeding colony in the United States.

The flamingos pictured here reside in the wildlife park in Periwinkle Trailer Park on Sanibel, where they have lived since park owner Al Muench imported them from Miami 10 years ago. The flock of five diminished to three over the years, Muench reports, after one fell victim to an alligator and another to the

rock-throwing antics of a child.

Park visitors delight in watching the birds, whose wings are clipped twice annually to prevent escape, feeding in the pond. The dancing or swaying motion results from efforts to loosen foodstuffs from the mud under their webbed feet. Then the long, curved bill submerges, moving from side to side to sieve the water and mud. Worms and micro-organisms are trapped in the slits on the top bill and similar tooth-like projections on the tongue. To insure a good diet, park flamingos also are fed a mixture of dry dog food, rice and water, with a daily dose of carotene, a shrimp substitute, to keep their pink color.

For many years flamingos were killed for food, sport and their beautiful plumage. The bird's large tongue reportedly was a delicacy in Roman days and frequently served at emperors' banquets. Since that time, few have regarded the bird as worthwhile for food, but in the first half of this century they were pursued for their feathers. Protective legislation in the Bahamas for the flamingos, the national bird; has increased breeding colonies

on those islands.

Of the six species found in the world today, the most prosperous colonies are those in East African lakes, where thousands of Lesser and Greater Flamingos nest.

State develops fresh water snook plan

More than a gross of young snook, a popular salt water game fish, made history recently when they were released in the fresh waters of Lake Bonny.


The operation, conducted by fisheries biologists from the Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission, was the first major release of its kind. The snook, averaging six inches, were the products of a pioneer project conducted at the John Dearholt Lab near Rookery Bay.

Commission biologists, utilizing a site provided through the Collier County Conservancy, artificially spawned and reared the young using brood stock collected near Naples.

Prior to being released in the Polk County lake, the young snook spent several weeks in rearing ponds at Boca Raton acclimating to fresh water.

"We were extremely impressed with the size of the fish," said Phil Chapman, project leader. Chapman said biologists from the Commission would be monitoring the snook's condition and growth rates in their new home.

Anglers catching one of the young salt



water fighters should release it unharmed to the lake.

"We'd like to hear from any fishermen who catch a snook in Lake Bonny," Chapman said. "They can contact us at the Lakeland office, 2202 Lakeland Hills Blvd., or by calling (813) 686-8157."

The snook project is currently in its fourth year. Commission biologists hope to eventually produce sufficient quantities of snook to stock in suitable waters of the state.

Snook have been seen and caught in brackish, man-made ponds on Sanibel. One man recently reported catching a 15 inch long snook in a pond north of Island Inn Road, while another watched two snook grow in his backyard pond for a year before they suddenly disappeared.

"A friend of mine caught three that were undersize, put them in a cooler with an aerator, brought them to this pond and dumped them in," said the man, who asked not to be identified.

Two of the three snook were spotted a year later, and had grown six to eight inches. It has been two or three months since the snook were last seen in the pond.

The sudden disappearance of bass and bluegills that shared the pond with the snook has led to speculation that the fish were killed by disease or a change in the chemistry of the water.


"There is no problem adapting snook to fresh water," explained Commission spokesman Forrest Ware. "It's just that snook won't spawn in fresh water." Fresh water lakes will have to be stocked with a new population of snook each year, said Ware.

Snook are susceptible to fluctuations in water temperature, and Ware said that keeping the fish warm in the cooler lakes of northern Florida constitutes the biggest problem in the stocking program.

The Commission is undertaking the stocking program because the snook is such a popular game fish, said Ware, and also because the snook could help to re-establish an ecological balance in certain fresh water


The program also should produce revenue for the Commission, since fresh water fishing requires the angler to purchase a fishing license.

The "Sanibel Flotilla" is gearing up for fall fishing with the first off-shore trip of the season planned for this weekend.



FISHING REPORT

By Norma and Fritz Stoppelhein



Some good sized ones up to ten pounds, mostly from the causeway this week; but a few still coming in from the pier and from around the mangroves up the sound. Most were caught with live shrimp, a few on pinfish. Minimum legal length for redfish is 12 inches.



Very scattered reports now as the fish being caught are mostly in the three to four pound range. A ten-pounder was brought in at the pier. Live shrimp is your best bet for bait. Minimum legal length for snook is 18 inches. Limit in possession - four.



Coming back to the grass flats in the sound and off the causeway, these fellows were hungry for live shrimp. Most fishermen were using the shrimp under popping corks. Minimum legal length for spotted seatrout is 12



A few reported from the pier and some from holes in the sound. Some of those brought in went seven pounds and were being hooked on shrimp. These fish are often confused with the sheepshead as they have similar markings. However, the drum has a grayer body and the stripes are less distinct.




Spanish Mackerel Quite a few being caught at the pier and some around dock pilings up the bay. Most were nibbling on shrimp or sandworms. Use small hooks to catch these

A school was working around the waterway from off Fort Myers Beach to the drawbridge last week. Two anglers, unprepared for the occasion, spent about four hours casting jigs to them. They succeeded in boating six, some weighing up to four pounds; but many more got away. The Spanish have been moving off the coast, so keep an eye out for diving birds and troll around the area with silver spoons on wire leaders. Minimum legal length for Spanish mackerel is 12

Diversified biographies grace the bookshelves

When the Captiva Memorial Library opened on the morning of October 4, we found a spate of new and diversified biographies on our doorstep.

Leo Deuel, known for his popular archeological writings, now gives us Memoirs of Heinrich Schliemann: A documentary portrait drawn from His Autobiographical Writings, Letters and Excavation Reports. This fascinating enigma of a man seemed always to be a "gold digger," from the Gold Rush days in California, to the discovery of Troy and its golden artifacts, to Agamemnon's golden mask at Mycenae. The mask is of the wrong date to have been his, of course. But this book, with it's contemporary drawings and illustrations, is

a most scholarly and interesting one.

Scarlet O'Hara's Younger Sister: My Life in and out of Hollywood by Evelyn Keyes, tells of an emigre from Georgia, that made it in the fabulous days of Hollywood. Her first important role was as Suellen O'Hara in that epic film Gone With the Wind. Miss Keyes was married to directors Charles Vidor and John Huston, and had a globe-trotting three-year love affair with Mike Todd before Elizabeth Taylor came along. Besides, she was a friend of all the Hollywood greats. An autobiography of nostalgia.

Ring, Lardner, of course, is by Jonathan Yardley, who does a superb job of depicting this great American "original." Alcoholism and illness caused his early death, but this great journalist always invoked a hearty laugh. His great forte was, of course, baseball, but he was also a friend of Hemingway and F. Scott Fitzgerald, that other victim of the fast pace of life and of alcohol.

Beth Archer Brombert has produced an intriguing portrait of an almost forgotten "avant guarde" lady of the 19th century. Cristina: Portraits of a Princess, tells how this "femme fatale," Italian and married to a profligate prince, fled to France in 1831 and became the center of the Romanticist Movement. She was a contemporary of that other advanced female, George Sand, a friend of Balzac, Lafayette, Liszt and Henry James, who wrote her into one of his novels.

She also knew Disraeli and Gautier. A fascinating account.


Daphne du Maurier in Myself When Young: The Shaping of a Writer, reminisces back to her life at age three, in the home of her gifted actor father, Gerald du Maurier. From diaries that she kept from age twelve to her marriage to "Tommy," Major Browning of the Grenadier Guards, we find her full of imagination, and bitten by the art of writing, at a very early age indeed. The book is delightful, especially her love affair with and coming of age in Cornwall, from which she wrote her first successful book The Loving Spirit in 1931. Pictures, yes. indeed. It is to be hoped that Miss du Maurier writes another autobiography covering her full years of maturity.





Omelet lets eggs stand on their own

By Don Whitehead

There is perhaps no food more elegant that is treated to greater indignity than the egg.

In the United States most often associated with breakfast, the egg

true that they are usually tough and tasteless products. A famous French expert on cuisine with the unlikely name of Ali-Bab wrote a book about 100 years ago in which he observed that "there is no lack of people who have never eaten a really good omelet."

Ali-Bab goes on to give the technique, not as simple as many believe, for making a plain omelet, adding that "he who can make that one can make them all, with the possible exception of the omelette soufflee...'

He points to the obvious fact that one must begin with the freshest eggs and top-quality butter, and the less obvious fact



omelet with too many eggs. He uses four eggs in his rècipe and uses a six or seven inch frying pan.

The key to making a good omelet, I've found, is speed in cooking. Eggs toughen and dry out if over-cooked. Also one should not beat the eggs too briskly. Ali-Bab calls for beating the eggs about one minute, but less time could produce a better omelet.

In any case, here is this very old and very fine recipe for starters. Next week, I'll let you in on one of the most exotic and delicious omelet recipes I've ever had the pleasure of eating.

Ali-Bab's Omelet

4 Tbs. butter 3 Tbs. milk or water 1 scant tsp. salt

1 tsp. each chopped parsley. chervil, chives, tarragon (I would eliminate the chervil and tarragon unless you have fresh.) Freshly ground black pepper 4 fresh eggs

Break the eggs in a bowl; add the milk or water, salt, and pepper, and beat for about one minute (or less). Melt the butter in the frying pan over a hot fire. When it is at the required temperature, which should take about two minutes, and which can be recognized when the froth on the surface of the melted butter has almost disappeared and the butter has acquired a nut-brown color, pour in the eggs.

After about one-half minute the under side of the omelet will have set; then rapidly lift the sides of the omelet all around with a fork by tilting the frying pan and allow the surface liquid to run down where you have lifted it.

Repeat this procedure a second time and then let it cook by itself. The entire procedure should take about two minutes.

The omelet is ready when one notes steam rising from the edges of the pan. At this precise moment, fold the omelet as you slip it onto a hot platter. Serve.

Conifers to consider for home landscaping

By Robert G. Curtis, Lee County Extension Director

Pines are ideal trees. They generate cooling breezes during the hottest days, yet their filtered shade permits flowers to bloom in beds around their trunks. And some folks claim that their soothing sighs are tranquilizing to ulcers.

If you need one of these qualities, then consider the slash, loblolly or oldfield pine.

sanibel gardening

The longleaf pine is fine except it grows more slowly.

The season for planting bare-rooted seedlings is in winter, but nurserymen sell potted pine that can be planted at any time.

The uses of pines are many. But, in general, locate them as specimen plantings in the front yard or as background and framework plantings around the home.

There are scores of other conifers that you may consider in landscaping the home. They are favorite plants because once well established, they thrive on minimum care. This quality makes them ideal plants for both busy young folks and retired garden-

The three araucarias -- commonly called the Bunya Bunya, Monkey Puzzle and Norfolk Island pine -- are well worth considering where there is adequate space for top development.

Cedrus deodara is a landscaper's dream plant. It forms a beautiful green foliaged pyramidal tree that can be used as a single specimen or in groups. The plants can also be used as screens and windbreaks. The plant has one failing -- it likes to grow in fertile soil.

On the other hand, the callitris robusta will thrive on poor sand dunes and upland sands of South Florida. This plant also makes a graceful plant.

There are several species of Juniperus, including red cedar, that can be used in landscaping your home. Some of the most important are these: Chinese juniper, a compact pyramidal form; Pfitzer juniper, a rather low, flat-growing type; Japanese

juniper, one of the best prostrate forms; and the common juniper, a favorite of the older homestead-type gardeners.


Junipers are valuable conifers because of the variety of types as well as the shades of green that are available. These shades of color permit the development of effects impossible with other plants.

The arborvitae may be the most familiar of the conifers because they have long been favorite plants. There are two groups --American and Oriental.

The American arborvitae group contains many desirable kinds of coniferous plant material. A tour of your local nursery will show you how these plants will look in your yard.

Some of the more important Oriental arborvitaes include: Aurea, golden yellow in spring; Beverleyensis, pyramidal, leaves golden yellow; compacta, dwarf and compact; conspicua, compact, golden yellow, suffused with green; stricta, a dense and compact pyramidal type of growth with dark green foliage; Bonita, a dwarf, compact form of slow growth with beautiful green foliage; Blue green, a strong grower with a foliage that retains its bluish-green color throughout the year.

PROPERTY APPRAISED AT \$1.2 MILLION

Council urged to eye acquisition of Causeway parcel

After hearing an appraiser's report listing the price of about 30 acres along Causeway Road at \$1.2 million, the City Council ad hoc committee on site selection recommended that Council consider acquiring the total acreage for municipal use.

Committee chairman Duane White told members that \$1.2 million was "in the ballpark." Sanibel special counsel Fred Bosselman said, "It is reasonable and fair to assume that amount might be attractive to the owners of the land."

The committee has been investigating the possibility of buying the land since July

when Bosselman recommended the acquisition. The land is the subject of litigation against the city. The 13 owners have alleged that a change in the permitted use of the land from commercial to residential when the land use plan was adopted, amounted to a taking without just compensation. The owners claim the land would have a value of

\$4 million today if zoned for commercial use.

Bosselman recommended the purchase because it would help the city in its defense in the lawsuit and because "the property is in a critical location at the throat of the

causeway."

The land is divided into three parcels -5.4 acres on the east side of Causeway Road
next to San Carlos Bay; 12.5 acres on the
west side from the Bay to the Priscilla
Murphy Realty property; and 10.3 acres
from the Chamber of Commerce to
Periwinkle Way.

The appraiser's \$1.2 million figure for the property was calculated on the basis of the land being zoned for office use as it would have to be if the city were to condemn it and use it for municipal offices, Bosselman explained.

Under the existing land use plan, which would allow 51 multi-family dwelling units on the land, the value would be \$633,000.

Under new ecological zones which the planning department is currently redefining, the value would go up to \$753,000, allowing 74 multi-family units.

Committee member Ann Winterbotham said all three parcels of the property are valuable. "It would be a big mistake to buy one section and lose the rest to condominiums. Any expenditure for that land would not be wasted."

George Campbell agreed that the property was a "key piece of land for the island. We need it all. The part we don't use still prevents undesirable use by others."

Fred Valtin also said the land was worth acquiring "even if we do nothing with it," but added that Sanibel citizens may object to buying the Causeway land and then buying additional land for a city hall.

One of the most frequently made suggestions for use of the land has been a site for a new city hall. Other suggestions have included a site for the police department, a park, visitors center, and a parking lot for a mass transit system.

Larger ambulance on call

A modular EMS ambulance which can carry five patients is now stationed on Sanibel.



The Lee County Emergency Medical Service (EMS) has stationed a larger, better equipped ambulance on Sanibel. The "modular" ambulance, so named

because of its box-like configuration, replaces a conventional van-type ambulance that will serve as a back up and transfer unit throughout the county. The EMS station at the Sanibel fire hall is the last of the seven manned EMS stations in the county to receive a modular type ambulance.

The larger ambulance is capable of

carrying three patients on stretchers and two sitting on a bench. It also features more stand-up working room, improved telemetry radio equipment, a well-stocked cardiac medication cabinet, and a heart-lung resusscitation machine.

"It's like going from a wheelbarrow to an automobile," said EMS para-medic Kenny Hutto. "It's ideal for the island."

The islands used to be the last stop for EMS personnel because of the relatively outdated equipment and the lack of action. The new modular unit seems to have changed all that. "People like to sit out here now," said Hutto.
