

Maybe you can get a tan

If the islands' rainy weather has dampened your vacation spirits, perhaps you'll find comfort in the fact that all of Florida has been blanketed with drizzles this week. The weather bureau predicts an 80 percent chance of sun today, says Chamber of Commerce Director Walter Klie, who also reports that last minute vacationers still can find accommodations here through January. February and March, however, will find the islands packed and its 2,000 or so rooms filled.

Bird illness still mystery

Laboratory tests have failed to uncover the cause of widespread deaths of cormorants around the islands in recent weeks. Care and Rehabilitation of Wildlife (CROW) on Captiva has been receiving dozens of the ailing birds. Although some die, many are released after feeding and rest, according to Holly Davies of CROW. Tests performed by the Florida Fish and Game Commission proved negative, but a commission biologist theorizes that a combination of factors -- cold weather, the recent outbreak of red tide, and even pesticides -- may add up to the trouble.

Porno publisher on island

Al Goldstein, publisher of what must be the nation's most explicit periodical, "Screw" magazine, took time off from his work to vacation on Sanibel over the holidays. Goldstein spent his time on the islands fishing and beachwalking and keeping a low profile, according to those who saw him. Goldstein's notorious newsprint tabloid magazine features pages of classified advertisements for New York City prostitutes as well as sexually explicit photographs and articles. It has been the target of countless lawsuits. Goldstein told one island fishing guide that his lawyers account for half his budget.

Josephine DeFord of Sanibel Siesta encountered a Scrooge on Christmas Eve. She was attending a midnight service at St. Michael and All Angels Church on Christmas Eve when someone broke into her locked car and removed two purses containing \$998 in cash and contents. 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Patience necessary on crowded roads

Driving has once again become a major undertaking on. Sanibel and Captiva, requiring planning, strategy, special skill and above all, patience.

The pre-season tranquility that existed on island roads vanished last week as holiday visitors and winter residents filed into every available motel, condominium and home for the holidays. The result was a solid line of cars, trucks and motor homes on Periwinkle Way in the afternoons.

The traffic became noticeably heavy at the end of last week, and by Christmas, islanders were finding they once again could bicycle home faster than they could drive.

Sanibel police began stationing police aides at two key intersections, Periwinkle/Causeway Road and Periwinkle/Donax, during the afternoons to keep traffic flowing smoothly.

"Last year the traffic started earlier," said Sanibel Plice Sergeant William Trefny, "but it probably will get heavier this year. People will be coming down before the gas prices go up."

Trefny said police aides will be directing traffic from noon to about 6:00 p.m. as long as traffic remains heavy. Police have rearranged their hours to work later in the evening because of the heavy traffic, he added.

Trefny predicted that traffic will decrease when school vacations end, but will increase again soon.

Drivers can avoid the heaviest traffic by shopping early in the day, advised Trefny, and can help cut down on the number of cars on the road by travelling with a friend.

He also urged drivers to use "patience and courtesy" and cautioned moped operators to keep to the right of the road but off the bike path, and to avoid weaving in and out of traffic.



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What if growth law had been passed four years ago?

Sanibel might look different today if the rate of growth ordinance had been in effect since the island became a city four years ago. Conceivably, the island's new growth could have been cut in half, thereby easing the burden on Sanibel's roads, water, sewage disposal, and other city services and resources.

There might be fewer condominiums lining the beaches, and perhaps fewer homes, but probably even higher land and construction costs in accordance with the law of supply and demand.

Sensing that their unique island community was being threatened by its own growth rate, the majority of island voters went to the polls November 21 and in what some would call "a better late than never" move, they voted in a rate of growth law limiting Sanibel's growth to 180 dwelling units per year.

Suppose Sanibel voters had made this move four years earlier.

According to city records, from November, 1974 to November, 1978, Sanibel issued building permits for 1,506 dwelling units. Under the rate of growth law, Sanibel might have seen less than half of those units constructed. Even considering the 15 percent overage which the law allows for each year, only 828 units could have been built in the past four years.

The system which the city council has proposed for allocating 180 permits per year divides the year into three 4-month periods, or "triannums," in which permits for up to 60 units may be issued. The allocation system goes into effect only when permits for more than 60 units are received.

Since the city incorporated in 1974, there have been only three triannums in which permits for 60 or fewer units were issued. Permits for 51 units were issued from March through June, 1975; 27 units from July through October, 1975; and 60 units from July through October, 1976.

The most units ever permitted in one triannum was 375 from July through October, 1977. That figure could be inflated somewhat by 92 units for Sundial agreed to in a court settlement.

The average number of units permitted in a triannum was 125.5.

Multi-family units have far outweighed single-family units during the city's fouryear permitting history. Single-family houses have amounted to 483 of the total, while multi-family have made up 1,023 of the total number of units permitted.

The average number of single-family units permitted during a triannum has been 40. The average for multi-family units has been 85.--

The city's rate of growth law is written to favor single-family homes over multifamily. Sanibel voters have indicated they are particularly concerned about the growth of multi-family projects over single-family

City council currently is working out the allocation system for the rate of growth law. City officials have had several meetings on the subject over the past few weeks. Council has a January 19 deadline to put the law into effect. A second reading of the ordinance outlining the allocation system is scheduled for next Friday, January 5.



Jerman was arrested just an hour before he was scheduled to check out of the motel where he week.



Jerman was taken to Lee after posting \$1,368 bond.





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
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

The city has notified Sanibel Beach Club I developer Keith Trowbridge of some violations of city laws resulting from a sailboat rental business operated on the beach at the interval ownership complex. 

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Oster submits revised plans for Blind Pass development

John Oster, Jr., of the Deltrol Corporation, has submitted a revised set of plans to the city for the development of his 24-acre tract in the Blind Pass area.

The plans, prepared by environmental consultant Dex Bender, show 22 residential lots, half located north and half located south of Sanibel-Captiva Road. The plans also show a frontage road running parallel to Sanibel-Captiva Road for driveway

Oster originally had asked to develop his property into 44 lots, but the land use plan would allow him a density of only three units. Oster argued that his land was improperly classified in the environmentally sensitive Special Blind Pass ecological zone by the land use plan, and actually could sustain more development.

The city since has prepared revised ecological zones showing Oster's land to be partially in mid-island ridge, and partially in wetlands-lowlands and wetland-uplands zones. Those revised zones have not been approved by city council yet.

A fact finding team was appointed last summer to review the Oster case. When it last met in July, that team had agreed that one unit per acre may be an acceptable solution for Oster. The team also recommended at that time that all development on the land be single-family homes, all melaleuca and Australian pine be removed, no seawalls be allowed, only one ingress and finding team for their consideration. egress be allowed on Sanibel-Captiva Road, and a vegetation buffer be required along the road.

Oster's revised plans are a result of those recommendations. He submitted them earlier this month to members of the fact

Councilman Zee Butler, chairman of the fact finding team, said she has some questions about the new plans, especially concerning the location of the frontage road. She plans to schedule a meeting of the fact finding team shortly after the beginning of the year.

Council to review advisory committees

The Sanibel City Council will review its committee system and make all necessary committee appointments at its meeting on Tuesday, January 2. Council conducts an annual review of all city advisory committees at its first meeting of the year.

This year there are eight standing committees and three ad hoc committees, involving about 80 Sanibel residents, to be reviewed.


Council will discuss and make appointments to the appeal review board, the board of adjustments and appeals, historical preservation, public health, site selection,

vegetation, and water resources conservation standing committees, emergency preparedness and evacuation relief team (EPERT), and the live shelling, marine advisory, and low cost housing ad hoc committees.

Perhaps the largest and most active city committee, the vegetation committee will undergo the most membership changes. Six members have asked to be dropped from that group. The committee has nominated seven others to take their places. They include Ann Constanza, Penny Rogers, Thomas Uhler, Carl Wagner, Caroline

Beebe, Eugene Kelly and William Hagerup

During its committee review last year, council voted to abolish four committees and redefine the functions of several others. Council delayed action on redefining the duties of the vegetation and water resources conservation committees until a decision was made on the appointment of a new natural resources committee which would combine the functions of any existing committees dealing with the natural environment. That committee was never appointed, however.

YACC openings at Camp Ocala

The Young Adult Conservation Corps (YACC) has immediate openings for young people to work and live in Florida's Ocala National Forest.

National Forests in Florida Supervisor Don Percival said applicants from Alabama, Georgia, South Carolina and Florida are being sought for approximately 50 remaining positions in Camp Ocala, the U.S. Forest Service's first residential YACC program in the southeast.

Established by the Youth Employment Act of 1977, YACC is designated to give young people an opportunity to learn new job skills and put them to work in conservation projects. Similar to the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) of the 1930's, YACC is designed to help relieve the nation's unemployment problem and accomplish needed conservation projects on public lands.

To be eligible for YACC, a person must be a United States citizen or legal resident, unemployed, out of school, and between 16 and 23 years old. Interested persons who meet the eligibility requirements must apply and be referred to the YACC by their local State Employment Office.

Enrollees earn federal minimum wage and may participate in the program for a maximum of 12 months. Enrollees are required to live at camp and a minimum room and board charge will be deducted from their semi-monthly pay checks.

Enrollee work projects may include tree nursery operations, recreation rehabilitation and maintenance, road maintenance, trail construction and maintenance, general sanitation and litter cleanup, erosion control, construction activities, tree planting, land line survey and maintenance, and archeological surveys.

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
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
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
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Building blocks for children

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



Had a lady call me this evening from the big city called Fort Myers. (Better known by Sanibelites as "Fort Misery.") She had some friends visiting, and they were eager to "rack up" (and I'm hoping study too) a Western Tanager, Long-billed Curlew, and the Snowy Plover.

I felt the tanager they might find in the

Keys, or over at Loxahatchee National Wildlife Refuge near Florida's east coast. I could only point them toward the Sunshine Skyway over Tampa Bay as the most likely spot to see the Long-billed Curlew locally. I felt I could direct them right to the Snowy Plover and fortunately the spot I feel certain this species can be found on is our Sanibel Causeway.

During midday many shorebirds will fly

to a certain place and rest and the east causeway island has such a spot on it. It's along the south shore approximately 2-400 hundred feet after you drive onto the island, as you are leaving Sanibel.


As soon as you get well onto the second island out there, pull off to the right, stop and study the shoreline to your right, looking towards the Sanibel lighthouse. The area you will be looking at is an ancestral roosting area, and has been since I can remember; at least since these causeway islands were dredged up in the early 1960s.

If it is midday, especially if the tide is high, (which forces the shorebirds to give up trying to feed) there will often be hundreds of these "wind birds" snuggled up in little pockets created by human footprints or car tire tracks.

Here their cryptic coloration blends in with the sand, and they remain quite camouflaged until the viewer presses too close. Finally they will rise up and reluctantly scurry over the sand only to take up napping again, if not pressured more

In with all these shore birds are usually 2-6 Snowy Plover; a bird found on virtually every continent throughout the world. In the western United States they are found along the Californian coast and Texas, and also inland to northern Utah and Kansas.

On our gulf coast the snowy is a permanent resident though they are likely to be found here more in the warmer months while nesting. During the cooler months more are down in the Yucatan, Venezuela, Brazil, and Paraguay. Basically they are more tropical than the other





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
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Barded Plovers, and in this area are never too common.

The snowy is the whitest of all shorebirds, except for the sanderling which you have all seen running with the waves along the beaches. The sanderling is not a plover, and though both are shorebirds, and fall in the order of charadrifformes, the plovers walk and stop, walk and stop while all the other shorebirds generally are continually moving. This would be the first stage of separating these types of shorebirds, and, of course, your field guide will direct you from there.

In this same roosting area where the snowy occurs, the other banded plovers usually can be observed also. On a normal day at this time of year, here is what may be observed roosting (the use of a spotting scope is highly recommended):

Four Snowy Plover, two Similpalmated Plover, 15-20 Piping Plover, 150 Wilson's Plover's, and 20-30 Black-bellied Plover, and on rare occasions even a Killdeer -- All of our native plovers.

Then you will likely record approximately 50 Ruddy Turnstone, 20 Willit, 20 Shortbilled Dowitcher, 40 Redknot, 200 Dunlin, 150 Sanderling, 15 least Sandpipers, and perhaps 80 Western Sandpipers. This, of course, is not to mention the different gulls and terns out there along with pelicans, frigates, cormorants, etc., etc., etc. Believe me, it can be quite a show!

Ray Judah and I flushed a Chuck-willswidow out of the buttonwood tree swampy area behind the public restrooms at Lighthouse Point during the annual Audubon Society's Christmas count (to be reported in next week's issue of Island Reporter.) It looked like a foot-long brown moth with, two-foot wing span as it fluttered erratically low through the trees. Perhaps if one waited in this area during dusk, or at the

crack of dawn they might witness it feeding. This summer resident is normally wintering in South American jungles now, but I guess due to this very warm winter (so far) it has decided to stay. Normally the Whippoorwill replaces it during the winter months. (By the way, at Corkscrew Swamp, they have a Whippoorwill "staked out" -- it is roosting in the same place every day!)

Another interesting bird which for some reason is not common at all this winter on Sanibel is the Loggerhead Shrike. On the mainland this species is fairly common, especially around open cattle country. But it occurs on our island only during months with the letter 'r' in them. The only place this "masked bandit" can be seen, that I am aware of, is behind Sundial Condominium, as you drive through the new golf course. It looks like a mocking bird, but has a shorter tail, a black mask, and a hooked beak used to tear its prey apart while being impaled on

a thorn or sharp pointed object.


Want to see a Common Snipe? If so, do your "snipe hunting" in the Bailey Tract by walking slowly up to the newly dredged moat around the old rookery island, and peek down on the bank. Very likely, with a good set of binoculars, you will see this squat little fellow with its super-long bill, probing for worms along the water's edge.

Another fun bird to find is the yellowthroated Warbler. Unlike the Common Yellow-throat, the Yellow-throated Warbler is not found in grassy fields and brushy area, but is normally found up in the dead fronds of a palm tree. If you hear a loud "chip, chip" coming from a palm on your motel lawn I'll guarantee you that is what you will be hearing.

Students try hand at shrimping

Editor's note: Field trips are an enjoyable part of the curriculum at many schools, but how many students get to take a field trip on a shrimp boat? Students from the Sanibel Resources Center on Sanibel recently hitched an instructive ride with Ralph Woodring aboard his bait boat. The following account of that journey was written by Sam Hill and Kevin Epranian, both students at the school.

Sanibel Resources Center, a small non-profit private school on Sanibel, was interested in going out and observing sea life. Ralph Woodring, lifetime resident of Sanibel, was willing to devote two of his shrimping nights to Sanibel Resources by taking us out and teaching us things of interest. Paul Zajicek, one of Ralph's employees, graduated from college with a degree in oceanography and was glad to take time out to go with us.

From 7:00 to 10:30 p.m. we felt a cool breeze while we heard the

warm chug of the inboard engine. All of the students took part in the general running of the boat, which consisted of picking shrimp, driving the boat, and general helping out.

Slowly we circled the entrance of Tarpon Bay just off Woodring Point. We shrimped the grass flats using drag nets to get the shrimp. The nets were lowered into the shallow water where sealife was feeding. Ten to 20 minutes later, the nets came up with loads of animals such as eels, flounder, pinfish, puffers, and of course plenty of shrimp.

Ralph and Paul taught us many things such as using the moon to tell if the tide was rising or lowering, how to tell a male shrimp from its female counterpart, and how flounder get their food. Ralph also showed Jenny Slosson how to throw a cast net.

Overall, it was an exciting and educational trip. It was especially enjoyable to have this class at night.

Students were in charge of all living conditions. They were responsible for pitching tents as well as planning, buying and preparing meals. They learned a lesson after raccoons ate all the bread that was left out the first evening.

On the final day the van stopped ongoing research projects. Shark at Shark Valley for a scheduled canoe trip through the saw grass. Ranger Mary Wise asked everyone to pretend they were Indians from long ago, as they paddled their way to Indian Camp Hammock. The excitement came when they found a three to four foot diamondback rattle snake and two pigmy rattlers. Rather than explore the hammock further, the group decided to quickly depart.

On the return trip, the van was filled with quiet and tired bodies. All were exhausted after a weekend filled with exciting and educa-

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
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New year brings big plans for building

Two new residential projects that will add 38 duplex and condominium units, and three commercial ventures totalling 22 new office or shop spaces either are under construction or awaiting permits on Sanibel.

Building officials say the residential projects represent the last big construction to be processed prior to the start of the city's rate of growth law in mid-January. Commercial construction is not covered by the new law.

Outer Island Development Corporation and Dan Royal Jr., as trustee, are the developers of Sandpiper Cove, a 27-unit condominium project next to Signal Inn on Middle Gulf Drive extension. The project, received by the city prior to the multi-family building moratorium, was granted a building permit on December 11.

Several of the units have been pre-sold, according to an Outer Island spokesman. Pre-construction prices for the two-bedroom units currently is listed at more than \$100,000 each. Valuation of the project, on 12.51 acres, is set at \$675,000 on the building permit for four 6-unit buildings and one 3-unit structure.

Construction will be phased, with completion of the complex expected in the fall by Kenleen, Inc. contractors.

Cyprina Beach, a \$1 million duplex project on East Gulf Drive, awaits a city building permit. The 11-unit complex will include five 2-unit, elevated townhouses and one single family residence on 2.2 acres. The two bedroom units will be situated between Sanibel Seaview and Sandalfoot condominiums.

Developers of the project are David Smith, Richard McCormack and Claude Renaud, all of Fort Myers. Apgar and Markham, Inc. are the builders. A few of the units have been pre-sold; current prices are \$180,000 per unit.

McCormack, also the architect, said this week he expects construction to begin in late January, with completion in the summer.

Plans for two new office complexes on Palm Ridge Road also await permits in city hall. Sanibel resident Herb Purdy Sr. plans a professional building on about a half-acre parcel diagonally across from Three Star Grocery. The two-story building will house five office or shop spaces on the first floor and two to four office suites with a central reception area on the second floor.

Purdy says the 7,500 square foot building will look very similar to Periwinkle Place shopping center, because he admires its "islandish character." A construction contractor has not yet been named, but Purdy hopes to start building soon after the new year, with completion by the end of April.

Next door to the Purdy tract, Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Kessler plan a pharmacy and office building on a half-acre parcel. Kessler said the total cost of the project, including land acquisition, is less than \$200,000. He applied for a development permit on November 1, but has not yet received one.

The 5,000 square foot, one-story structure will include a pharmacy, which Kessler will occupy, and four 500 square foot shops. A building contractor has not been named, but Kessler hopes to have construction completed by late summer.

Across from Palm Ridge on Periwinkle, the Gulfside Plaza office complex expects to be ready for occupancy by February 1, according to developer Lou Martelli. The plaza, on about two acres, contains the 5,000 square foot, hexagon-shaped Burger Emporium, a fast-food restaurant, and a two-story complex to house eight shops and offices. Joe St. Cyr designed the plaza; Herzog Construction is the builder.



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Surges delay holiday calls

If a merry Christmas call to relatives up north or across the state is an annual tradition at your house, you may have been disappointed this year.

A record 275,000 incoming and outgoing long distance calls were logged on Christmas Day by United Telephone Service's (UTS) new computerized switching center, but there still weren't enough circuits to handle the demand. Many islanders complained that direct dials to other cities and states produced no more than an occasional "blip" tone, especially on Christmas night.

The plight was shared by callers nationwide as the "Sorry, all circuits are busy" recording likely was the most often repeated message all eve-

Surges, or peak calling hours, were the problems, according to Paul Hamilton, UTS community relations man. One hit at about 9:30 a.m. Monday, just after Christmas packages had been opened. Many callers did get through, Hamilton said, as UTS' 91 toll call operators routed calls until midnight. The switching center could have handled the 275,000 toll calls, Hamilton said, if calls had been spread out throughout the day. The only recourse for callers is to call early on holidays. "We encourage people to call a few

days before and after Christmas,' he said.

But even that doesn't always work. On Tuesday night, December 26, a blown fuse in the switching center halted heavy belated merry Christmas calls for almost half an hour.





You may wish to differ, but the bureaucracy really is not plotting against the small businessman. A few basic rules and regulations must be followed when opening a new business. They are fairly easy to remember, and if followed by even the most unsophisticated entrepreneur, the chances of encountering difficulties with a government agent are

Basically four levels of government are to be reckoned with: Federal, state, county and city. The involvement with each level is as follows:

• Federal -- File a Form SS-4 with the Internal Revenue Service for a taxpayer identification number. This number will be used on income and employment tax returns.

• State -- (a.) File a Form DR-1 with the Department of Revenue. You will be given a sales tax number to be used on monthly returns you file. You also will use this number when purchasing merchandise for resale. (b.) File a Form UCS-1 with the Florida Department of Commerce. You will be assigned an

account number and a rate for unemployment taxes payable to the State.

 County -- Go to the county courthouse and obtain an occupational license to do business in the county. You also need to register a fictitious name, whether your business is a new one or ownership is changing.

City -- You will need to purchase a city

license at the city hall.

After you take care of these details, you will have complied with the general requirements confronting every new business. It should be remembered that certain industries and businesses are governed more stringently, however, most people in those types of businesses are aware of additional restrictions, i.e., contractors, restaurants, liquor stores, hotels and motels.







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Minimum wage rises January 1

Almost one million workers in the Southeast will be eligible for a pay raise on January 1, 1979, when the federal minimum wage risés to \$2.90 per hour, according to Richard Robinette, assistant regional administrator for the Wage and Hour Division, U.S. Department of Labor in Atlanta.

On November 1, 1977, President Carter signed amendments to the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) establishing uniform minimum wage rates for all covered workers-\$2.65 an hour effective this past January 1, increasing annually to \$2.90, \$3.10 and \$3.35 an hour by January 1, 1981.

The Wage and Hour Division, a part of the Labor Department's Employment Standards Administration, is responsible for administering and enforcing the FLSA (which sets minimum wage, overtime pay, child labor and equal pay standards). The Atlanta region includes Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Tennessee.

Under the 1977 FLSA amendments, the percentage of tip credit which can be applied toward the minimum wage for tipped employees will be reduced to 45 percent effective January 1, 1979 and 40 percent effective January 1, 1980.

Another change resulting from these amendments is the repeal of the partial overtime exemption for employees of hotels, motels, and restaurants. Beginning January 1, 1979, these employees will be due overtime premium pay after 40 hours in the work week.

 Maids and custodial employees of hotels and motels have been on the 40-hour week since May 1, 1977.

In the eight-state region during fiscal 1978, the Labor Department found that more than 160,243 workers protected by federal wage and hour laws were illegally underpaid by \$25,068,313. Violations of the minimum wage and overtime provisions of the FLSA accounted for the bulk of underpayments.

Wage and Hour Division offices are located throughout the region and are listed in most telephone directories under U.S. Government, Department of Labor, Employment Standards Administration.







EDITORIAL

Have a safe year in your environment

We've always thought of the environment as at least benign, if not downright delightful. In all good faith we've done our best to defend the environment against its detractors, never once reflecting on the possibility that the environment could be a malevolent killer.

Then on the eve of the New Year -- when we try to think more of reform and rebirth than of death and destruction -- a document appeared on our desk that shattered some of our illusions about a friendly environ-

This "vital statistics report" from the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services deals with death due to environmental factors since the day they started keeping such records back in 1917. Over the 61 years since, natural and environmental factors accounted for 5,186 deaths -- a not inconsequential number.

We found solace in some of the statistics. Would you believe, for example, that from 1959 to 1977 five times more people were killed by being kicked or crushed by mules and horses (20) than died from shark bites (a mere four). In fact, friendly old cows killed more people (six) than sharks, while tiny bees and wasps took a bigger toll (19) than did the justly feared rattlesnake (18).

We were a little shocked to learn that in the past 18 years one person has been killed in Florida by a water buffalo, the same number that met an end as a result of a crocodile bite or by being squeezed too tight by a python.

In this modern age you wouldn't think many people would be the victims of hunger, thirst, exposure or neglect, but in fact 6.6 people have died annually from those causes since 1917. Even harder to believe is that in sunny Florida, 63 people died from exposure to the cold in that 61 year period.

If you still have an idea that the environment is some friendly, cuddly thing worth protecting, bear in mind that lightning -- which is a very visible part of our Florida environment -- caused 719 deaths since 1917.

But the worst offender of all, as you might suspect, is a villain called a "cataclysm" in our vital statistics report. This includes everything from rain and flood, to hurricane, tornado and tidal wave. These "cataclysms" accounted for 2,975 deaths (nearly half of the total) attributed to the environment in that period of 61 years, but happily they have been on the decline in recent

We are not sure what kind of messages for the New Year one can filter out of these fascinating statistics. One thing is certain: we are going to avoid standing behind a mule or in the path of a bee. And when someone starts raving about how wonderful the environment is, we are going to caution them to watch out for kicking cows.

If one can escape all these environmental hazards; if the economists are all wet about a recession coming up; if the state of Florida doesn't sink, as one seer predicts -then we all have some prospects for a happy and prosperous New Year.

In any case, that's our fondest wish for all of you from all of us.



It all started very innocently when jet planes made access to Hawaii from the mainland easier (it reminds us of the time the causeway to Sanibel was built). With revenue from the military and agriculture declining, there was renewed emphasis on tourism.

First came the well-to-do visitors. Many of them stayed behind to buy their home. The next phase was the development of large hotels and condominiums on and around Waikiki Beach. Packaged tours followed to make sure these units stayed profitably occupied. Then the real estate developers and brokers moved in.

The free guide "This Week on Oaho" now entices tourists with a real estate section, which states that a typical ocean front property on Kailua Bay was built in 1968 for \$65,000, resold within six months for \$83,500, resold by the second owner in 17 months for \$135,000, resold again in 1973 for \$215,000 and which would presently have a value of \$400,000.

The most beautiful beaches and verdant valleys are the choice locations for high rise concrete structures, built purely for speculative purposes, "to make a fast buck," "to beat inflation" or "to cash in on the tourist trade." Actually, there is a housing shortage for local residents who cannot afford the average \$139,000 price for a one-family housing unit.

And so, the history of Miami, Acapulco, Nice and Torrenmolinos is repeating itself now in Hawaii. Tourism is a fickle and fragile business and pretty soon, the tourists will move again to more virgin territory leaving Hawaii's beauty destroyed forever.

Leather fern grows larger than any American fern

Millions of years ago, before the evoluthe interior cordgrass marshes in areas that tionary development of seed plants, sporebearing ferns dominated the landscape créating forests reaching nearly one hundred feet in height. Today, ferns that have survived through time are comparatively much smaller and live in the shadow of the dominant flowering plants.

Probably the largest of these fern-plants is Acrostichum danaeifolium commonly called leather fern and known from the freshwater marshes and brackish swamps of South Florida. Certainly, as far as mass is concerned this plant has the largest leaves of any of the American ferns. In favored habitat leaves of leather fern are known to

exceed ten feet in length. Leaves are closely tufted and erect ascending from a short, stout root base. Leaf stalks are grooved lengthwise and rather thick in order to support the weight of numerous leaflets.

Leaflets are dark green above with a very prominent midrib. Their shape is that of an elongated lance head. Blades of the leaflet are stiff and quite brittle with under-turned

The underside of all the leaflets of the spore-bearing leaves is covered with sporangia giving this surface the color and texture of reddish brown suede leather.

The generic name Acrostichum is from the Greek and refers to the arrangement of the spores on the leaflets. The specific name danaeifolium is a combination of Greek and Latin root words and again refers to the appearance of the leaves.

On Sanibel this fern occurs at the edge of

-are not too wet nor too dry. It also is seen commonly associated with buttonwood in areas having a similarly suitable hydro-

Soil moisture is an important factor influencing the growth of leather fern as is salinity. The fern grows best in freshwater situations though it is tolerant of the brackish waters of Sanibel interior wet-

This species of leather fern was once widely confused with the related Acsostichum aureum. A. aureum is a salt water species associated with mangrove swamps and low hammocks of the everglades.

For landscaping wet areas on the islands leather fern is recommended as one of the best native species. Its dark green leaves with contrasting soft brown undersurfaces are very attractive and the plant grows large enough to be used as a hedge or foundation planting. It will tolerate shaded spots but seems to grow best in areas fully exposed to the sun.

It is propagated by separating young plants from established clumps and transplants well. It occasionally is used as a potted patio plant and does very well if kept in an undrained pot with wet rich soil.

Though not cultivated as a food crop anywhere in its range the tender fronds of leather fern are eaten by people in many parts of the world. The uncoiling new leaves can be eaten raw or cooked in several different ways like asparagus. They have a good flavor though are somewhat mucilaginous. I have used them effectively as a

substitute for okra in gumbo soup recipes.

While the value of leather fern as a food source is certainly limited its potential for more widespread landscape application has yet to be fully explored. It is a plant worthy of more attention.

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
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Bob Dylan: watching himself

Twelve years ago when Bob Dylan released his fifth album, "Blonde on Blonde," the album cover annoyed some fans because it pictured an out-of-focus Dylan.

Dylan watchers (of which there are numberless millions) long ago stopped expecting Bob Dylan to stand still long enough to remain in focus. During his protean 16-year-career Dylan has made change his hallmark, shifting masks and personae so fast and so often that even his best friends and most loyal critics have been left stunned and perplexed.

Dylan is recognized now as possessing that unique brand of genius that, instead of attempting to understand the world, assigns the world the task of understanding Bob Dylan. For his own part, Dylan is not only aware of the Dylan enigma but actively cultivates a deliberate aura of mystification. With interviewers he is evasive and contradictory, preferring to answer questions with questions. Describing his mystique in one early song Dylan wrote.

> I don't know how it happened But the riverboat captain He knew my fate; But everyone else, Even yourself

Is just gonna have to wait. In his various incarnations Dylan emerged first as a folk balladeer and heir-apparent to the late Woody Guthrie. But by the time his second album was released, Dylan's style and focus had shifted to protest music. He became prophet, poet laureate and official spokesman for a politicized generation of Americans who didn't want to die complacently in pre-fabricated backyard bomb shelters.

In 1963, when the activist movement was just starting to gain momentum and Dylan was firmly enthroned as the king of folk/ protest music, the king abdicated. At the Newport Folk Festival Dylan shocked his audience by appearing on stage with an electric guitar to perform "Maggie's Farm," a raucous rock song with an abstract lyric that verges on the incomprehensible.

Newport crowds did not take the blasphemy lightly. Heckled and booed by his own converts, Dylan reportedly left the stage in tears.

But he did not revert to folk music. Dylan's subsequent albums synthesized the highbrow qualities of folk music and the harddriving rhythms of low-brow Pop music. Like Muhammed Ali, who brought intelligence to the mindless world of professional boxing, Dylan was chiefly responsible for importing intelligence to the previously mindless world of American Bandstand. Poetry -- real poetry -- was being broadcast on that abomination of all true intellectuals, the transistor radio.

"People fear all kinds of things," Dylan once remarked caustically, "And the worst fear some people

have is to get caught reading a copy of 'Screen' magazine."

During his rock period Dylan surfaced as a thinking man's Elvis Presley, a sort of Chubby Checker and T.S. Elliot rolled into one. His idiom and images seemed to spring alternately from Rimbaud and the National Enquirer, Coleridge and the Reader's Digest. Dylan was, above all, a switch hitter, capable of sounding like Dante one minute and Dizzy Dean the next.

Dylan himself was aware of the paradox. As prestigious universities lined up to confer honorary degrees on the one-semester college dropout, Dylan warned: "I might look like Robert Frost but I feel just like Jesse James."

The late 1960's witnessed another total eclipse of the Dylan image. After suffering a serious motorcycle accident Dylan abandoned his abrasive rock style and acerbic lyrics for country-western music. To the dismay of many followers the poet who had, a year earlier, been writing metaphysical songs of desolation and decay was now crooning, "That big yellow

gonna shine like a bum in between. spoon . . . "

For neophyte hippies attending their first anti-war rallies and rolling their first joints, Dylan's defection to Nashville was bewildering. In an age that demanded songs of experience, Dylan was suddenly singing songs of innocence. Due to the unpopularity of his "soft" sound and his own reluctance to perform publicly, Dylan dropped from view while a host of imitators scrambled to claim his mantle.

Dylan, now 36 and recently divorced, has still not completed his personal or musical genesis. Touring again since 1974, he has appeared with the Band and a number of ad-hoc backup groups performing a brand of music often termed "gypsy rock."


Completing the last leg of his latest national tour, Dylan performed the Lakeland Civic Center. His repertoire was an anthology of Dylan past and present, a retrospective patchwork of songs drawn from his first album, his latest album, and practically every other Dylan al-

Despite his creative restlessness and his famous injunction, "Don't look back," Dylan seemed comfortable performing such prehistoric classics as "Blowin' in the Wind," "Rainy Day Women," "Mr. Tamborine Man," and "Master of War."

A silver cross around his neck and his eyes underscored with dark eyeshadow, Dylan looked frail and somber under the spotlight. With his mouth agape and his darkened eyes turned skyward, he resembled a Byzantine depiction of the crucified Jesus.

Dylan has never purported to be a hero or model for anyone. He has done everything in his power, in fact, to discourage a Dylan cult or following. Nevertheless, he stands like a solitary colossus on the hero-less horizon of the 1980's, if only because he is honest enough to admit he has no answers in an age when answers are an infinitely marketable commodity.

Wealthier but less sure of himself than he was 16 years ago, Dylan himself may just be the most curious of all Dylan watch-



China relations criticized

When President Jimmy Carter decided to recognize mainland China two weeks ago, Sanibel resident Bob Dormer wasn't entirely pleased.

Dormer, a retired Naval officer stationed in China during World War II, believes the United States should not abandon its long time friend and loyal ally, Taiwan.

"Certainly we have to recognize Communist China," concedes Dormer. "We can't not recognize it; it's there. But we shouldn't establish full diplomatic relations at the expense of leaving Nationalist China out in the cold."

Dormer, who fought against the Japanese with Nationalist Chinese troops, is the current national president of SACO, the Sino-American Cooperative Organization. Earlier this year SACO veterans and delegates of the Taiwanese government convened on Captiva for an annual reunion.

Unless plans are altered, the group will convene next December in Taiwan to celebrate Chinese independence from dynastic rule, says Dormer.


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




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THE BIOGRAPHER

Best-selling biographer Leonard Mosley plans to finish a biography of the duPont family during his six-month stay on Sanibel. Published by Atheneum, the book should appear in late 1979 or early 1980.



Pity the poor biographer.

If his book is less than honest, he is labeled a publicist. If his book is too honest, he becomes a detractor. To the famous, vain and powerful he is an unwelcome annoyance, endured in the same way that pilot fish are endured by great whales.

Leonard Mosley is one of the few modern writers to tred the biographical minefield with his literary reputation still intact and untarnished. His biographies of Hermann Goering, Charles Lindbergh, Hirohito and the Dulles family have met with enormous popular and critical success. Mosley has managed, at the same time, to steer clear of what Boswell termed, "Light effusions a writer and journalist Mosley

of carelessness and pique or ponderous labours of solemn inaccuracy and dark uncharitable conjecture."

interviewed Hitler and Goering. covered the Lindbergh kidnapping trial, crossed the Sudan behind enemy lines to restore Haile

66 An autobiography? I've never given much thought to an autobiography. There are too many people who I am more interested in writing about. 77

If his biographies are accurate and compelling, it is for the very simple reason that Mosley has been an eye-witness to the shaping of modern history, a man with an uncanny talent for being in the right places at the right times.

During his four decade career as

Selassie to the Ethiopian throne, spirited industiral diamonds out of Holland during the Nazi blitzkreig and paratrooped into Normandy on D-Day.

Mosley has, in a word, met everyone worth meeting. And though the biographer himself tends to discount the suggestion,

his own life would furnish ample material for an autobiography.

"An autobiography?" balks Mosley, recently arrived on Sanibel where he plans to spend winter and spring. "I've never given much thought to an autobiography. There are too many people who I am more interested in writing about."

At present, Mosley is interested in writing about the duPonts. After a year of research the author has come to Sanibel to write a biographical history of the duPont family, an industrial dynasty that began in 1802 when a family of French watchmakers emigrated to the United States to

escape the French Revolution.

Why is an essentially political biographer writing about the duPonts? Mosley says the du-Ponts, as populizers of nylon, plastics and synthetics, rank among the chief inventors of modern America. According to Mosley, only Henry Ford has had a greater impact on shaping the nation's manners, morals and mores.

"You had to be in England during the war to grasp the significance of nylon stockings," says Mosley. "American GI's absolutely beguiled European women with nylon stockings. I doubt there was a woman under 50 in the whole of Europe who wasn't compromised for a pair of nylons,"

In researching the duPont empire, Mosley says he was impressed by the family's instinct for self-preservation. For generations the duPonts tolerated no political stand or partisan alliance that placed the family business in ieopardy.

"After fleeing France the duPonts never again made the mistake of being on the wrong side," says Mosley. "The family adapted quickly to America and always remained cautious and conservative."

The family broke ranks only once. says Mosley, at the outbreak of the American Civil War. "The

duPonts had explosives factories in the South and deep Southern sentiments," notes Mosley. "After long deliberation they took a deep breath and backed the North. The decision was a personal tragedy for the family; Alfred duPont's mother was a heart and soul Southerner. She never forgave her son."

In this century the duPonts parlayed their business into a conglomerate empire. Mosley. By the 1950's, after buying a major interest in General Motors, it appeared the duPonts were well on their way to buying U.S. Steel as well.

The family met its Goettendaemmerung during the 1960's. After losing a marathon anti-trust suit the company paid enormous fines and began divesting itself of holdings in other corporations. Today no duPont remains on the duPont Board. The personal fortune of family patriarch Alfred duPont, recently deceased, has been converted to a memorial trust fund for handicapped children and the elderly. The trust is said to be worth \$2 billion, says Mosley.

For a Britisher who resides in South France, Mosley has a curious preoccupation with powerful American families. Published earlier this year, his most recent biography charted the influence of the Dulles triumvirate -- Eleanor, Allen and John Foster. During the

postwar years the Dulles cartel all but monopolized American foreign policy, establishing a nepotistic domain that stood for two decades. With a candor that displeased some family members and embarrassed the CIA, Mosley's biography described the strengths, weaknesses and private lives of the Dulles family network.

"I am fascinated by the intermeshings of families," Mosley admits. "Within the Dulles and duPont families you find an interesting clash of temperament and

creative abilities."

Mosley has a Greek tragedian's eye for spotting heroic flaws and the corrupting influence of power. The biographer views Lindbergh as the quintessential American hero and, in his biography of the famed aviator, characterizes Lindbergh as a sort of Gatsby who was laid low by his own trust, idealism and naivete.

"When I was writing the Lindbergh biography I flew over his old mail routes near Little Falls, Minnesota," says Mosley. "I remember thinking there could be no more enlivening story of a good man than the story of Lindbergh's life. He was the best sort of American, a man who never lied and mistakenly assumed no one else lied either. I always felt his life was a warning."

Even in the depraved character of Nazi Field Marshal Hermann Goering, Mosley sees strengths

and virtues that were somehow twisted and obscured. Mosley, a correspondent in Berlin before the outbreak of the war, knew the Luftwaffe commander and examined his life in a biography, "The Reich Marshal."

"Goering was a highly intelligent man and a first class avaiator," says Mosley. "There was a great nobility about him . . . he was born a general. He was also a cultured man who admired painting and people."

Mosley, who also covered the Nazi war crime trials at Nuremberg, was impressed by the dignity Goering displayed in com-

mitting suicide.

"Inside that fat, slobby, drugaddicted body there was still great strength of character," remembers Mosley. "Goering managed to get himself unhooked from drugs and make good on the promise

that he would cheat the gallows." Mosley has far less compassion or sympathy for Hitler. "Hitler always remained a small man, a lieutenant," says Mosley. "He had no charisma or dynamism unless he was addressing a large crowd. But he was adept at public relations; he made a point of learning my name and the names of all the other foreign correspondents, as well as the names of their wives and children. When you met him he would inquire,



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Frisbee flinger suffers Frisbee finger

Tennis players are plagued with tennis elbow, boxers wear cauliflower ears, and Bill Eisenhart suffers from Frisbee finger.

Frisbee finger, a malady known only to serious Frisbee throwers, is a build-up of skin on the underside of the middle finger where it joins the palm. That's the area of the hand that takes the greatest abuse when the Frisbee is thrown.

Esienhart, a music teacher from Newark, Ohio, and a serious Frisbee thrower, was on Sanibel this week and took advantage of the warm weather to limber up his throwing arm on the beach.

Eisenhart received four Frisbees for Christmas to add to his collection, now numbering "a couple of dozen." He carries at least a half dozen with him in his fashionable "Frisbag," a shoulder bag specifically designed to tote Frisbees.

If Eisenhart's preoccupation with Frisbees seems to border on the excess, consider the California man whose collection numbers more than 2,000 of the flying plastic discs, or the Ohio fanatic who is fond of pulling out his Wham-O Pluto Platter, a collector's item worth about \$65.

Eisenhart is just one of thousands of Frisbee devotees who practice regularly and match skills in tournaments. Eisenhart has competed in one tournament in Newark and did well in the preliminary rounds, but he was so exhausted from the competition he didn't bother showing up for the finals.

A descendent of the Frisbee Pie Tin Factory (some claim the first Frisbee was the Frisbee pie tin, others say it was the factory's cookie tin lid, according to Eisenhart), the Frisbee has spawned an entire subculture with books, magazines and a bureaucracy. Frisbee throwers are classified as novice, expert, master and world class master, a rank held by only 72, said Eisenhart.

During the summer Eisenhart practices daily with neighborhood kids. It took him two months to perfect his nail delay, a trick that calls for the thrower to balance a spinning Frisbee on the end of his or her fingernail for as long as possible. Eisenhart's personal record is 35 seconds. The world's record is 90 seconds.

Accomplished Frisbee flingers learn that nail delays can be done only if the Frisbee is modified by grinding off the small bump and some raised letters on the underside of the disc, and spraying it with silicone.

The nail delay was invented two years ago. Frisbee Disc World magazine has just reported that a man has perfected the toenail delay, said Eisenhart. Now Eisenhart is attempting to perfect the nose delay.

Although the South Florida climate is ideal for year round Frisbee throwing, Eisenhart says he has seen very few Frisbees in the air during his visit. "Doesn't anybody down here throw Frisbees? We haven't seen any since we've been here. In Ohio, there would be people throwing Frisbees in every town we drove through."












Grouper grandeur


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
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FISHING REPORT

SEATROUT Some for everybody this week, whether boaters or waders. Live shrimp under popping corks, or artificials were bringing them in. The flats off the Causeway islands and in the Sound provided the most action in both the spotted and silver varieties. Pier fishermen were bringing in some of the small silver. Minimum legal length for spotted seatrout is 12 inches.



SHEEPSHEAD Putting new gift tackle to the test at the fishing pier, fishermen were carrying home some stringers of nice sheepshead. Pieces of shrimp or fiddler crabs on small hooks helped. Sheepshead also came from the Punta Rassa area and around docks in the Bay and Sound.



SNOOK Scattered action this week -- a few still came in from the pier and a few turned up under the Causeway bridges and in the passes. The continuing warm weather seems to have the snook confused as to where they are expected to go to get caught. Depending on your style of fishing and location, live shrimp or pinfish and jigs brought best action.



COBIA The warm temperature also seems to be holding the cobia in our area longer than in recent years. A few are still being picked up from the

Causeway area. They will take shrimp or pinfish.

Minimum legal length for snook is 18 inches. Limit in

possession -- one day's bag limit (4).



FLOUNDER Those fishing on the bottom along the shorelines or in shallower areas in the Sound were catching some nice flounder 15 to 18 inches. They were picking up shrimp, or small artificials bounced along the bottom. Minimum legal length for flounder is 11 inches.



JACK CREVALLE For a real tussle on your new Christmas rods, hook up with a jack. They are in and out of the inlets with the tides and go up in some of the canals. Surface plugging brings best results, or trolling if you are in a boat. Many of these being caught are small and should be RELEASED. Larger ones, if bled immediately, can be used to make many tasty fish recipes.



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

Phil Chapman has spent the last five years trying to develop a snook raising and stocking program for fresh water.

Eighteen months ago, Chapman, a Fisheries Biologist with the Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission, stocked eighteen fingerling snook in a small, one acre pond near Yee Haw Junction, Florida.

Last week Fish Management Specialists Wes Fish and Ken Jones, who worked with Chapman, recovered nine of those snook.

"We were of course hopeful that some fish would be found," said Chapman, "but until now we had no success recovering snook in any lakes or ponds where they have been stocked since the program began in 1974."

All fish recovered were over sixteen inches and weighed between one and two pounds. The largest of the nine weighed two pounds and measured nineteen inches long.

"The growth of these fish was very impressive," Chapman said. It has been

projected that for snook to attain these lengths in a salt water environment it may take as long as three years. It took these fish only eighteen months."

Chapman attributes their rapid growth to the amounts of forage fish available. One fish had seven small bluegill in its stomach.

Attempts by biologists to artificially propagate and raise the salt water fighter began at Englewood in 1974. The purpose was two fold; to provide a fresh water sport fishery for snook, as well as a possible biological control of forage fish such as pan fish, tilipia, shad and others that tend to over-populate.

The following year the program shifted to Rookery Bay in the Ten Thousand Islands where facilities were provided by the Collier County Conservancy.

In 1977 Mrs. John Dearholt, an avid conservationist and sportswoman, donated

to the Commission a new laboratory which has facilitated improved scientific research.

That year, 160 fish raised at the new facility were stocked in Lake Bonny in Lakeland. None have since been seen and Chapman speculates that they must have succumbed to the extremely cold temperatures of last winter.

According to Chapman, four ponds were stocked with fingerling snook this year: Pioneer Park in Hardee County, Turnpike Pond in West Palm Beach, Oak Grove in Miami and Palm Lake in Stuart.

"We stocked Palm Lake in mid-September and last week we found some snook there that were seven inches long," Chapman said.

With continued research and effort perhaps one day fresh water fishermen will have the opportunity to do battle with Florida's number one salt water sport fish.

"And how is little Johnny?"

Haile Selassie, the deposed Ethiopian emperor who died as a prisoner recently after being beaten and starved to death, was a close personal friend of Mosley's and the subject of another Mosley biography. Mosley still carries a silver dollar talisman given to him by Selassie during the commando mission that restored the emperor to his throne at Addis Ababa.

"We were paying our way through Ethiopia with silver dollars," explains Mosley. "At regular intervals a plane would fly close to the ground and drop off more silver dollars. During one drop a sack of coins exploded on impact; one coin struck me and another struck Selassie, cutting him on the cheek. We decided to exchange silver dollars."

"It was a hell of a trip," adds Mosley. "We started out with 3,000 camels. Only one camel lived to see Addis Ababa."

Mosley says his most difficult biographical subject was Japanese Emperor Hirohito. The biographer claims the emperor was not really inscrutable but just plain dull.

"I suspect there was less to Hirohito than met the eye," says Mosley. "He was an icthyologist whose primary concern was deep sea fishing.

"To this day no one fully realizes what a dramatic event it was when the emperor roused himself to say the war must stop. In Japan, the emperor's word had always been considered the word of God because the emperor never spoke. Even after Hiroshima and the terrible fire bombing of Tokyo, I am not sure the Japanese would have surrendered if Hirohito had not spoken."

Mosley's biography of Hirohito became the first biography of a Japanese emperor ever published in Japan. It immediately sold over one million copies and continues to sell today, says Mosley.

Financially, Mosley ranks among the best-selling authors of non-fiction. His last three books were main choices of the Book-of-the-Month Club. One was a main choice of the Literary Guild.

Mosley has also written five novels and admits a preference for writing fiction. "I prefer writing novels but they don't sell as well as my non-fiction," sighs Mosley.

"Unless you really hit the jackpot you can't make much money writing novels."

As is usually the case with biographies, Mosley's severest critics have been his subjects. "Ann Lindbergh never objected publicly to my biography of her husband," says Mosley, "But I learned from her daughter that she thought my book was unfair.

"Actually," says Mosley, "I thought my biography was more than fair. I suppressed a great deal of personal correspondence that could have been very embarassing to the family."

By contrast, Japanese Emperor Hirohito seemed pleased with Mosley's biography. When the emperor made his historic visit to France, Mosley was asked to report the event for Japanese television. "And I don't speak any Japanese," says Mosle; "Everything I said had to be translated."

Mosley's biography of the Dulles family was strongly protested by Eleanor Dulles, the last surviving member of the Dulles troika. "The book mentioned that Allen was born with a clubfoot and wasn't baptized until he had a secret operation," says Mosley. "Eleanor wrote asking me where I

heard that rumor and if I heard it from a member of the family. I replied that yes, I heard it from a member of the family -- I heard it from her."

The club foot episode is characteristic of Mosley's biographical vision. He does not want to make heroes or destroy them but merely humanize them. After 40 years of studying great men, Mosley feels a profound sympathy for human failure and weakness.

"It is dangerous to condemn anyone out of hand," says Mosley. "When men come to power they tend to view themselves as supermen. They think they can ride roughshod over the rules."

Mosley suspects, however, that the age of the hero and demagogue are over. "Heroes -- men of power -- are bad medicine today," says the biographer. "If someone is a leader we automatically assume he has feet of clay. If he doesn't have feet of clay they are quickly manufactured for him.

"Civilization doesn't want statesmen anymore," says Mosley. "People have been tricked too often by dictators and smart talkers. People want to be governed today by responsible committeemen."





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





It is an informal discursive study of the good old, bad old days and it amply illustrates why Newsweek calls Mr. Furnas "by a country mile the most readable of our social historians." The years of which he writes were indeed "Great Times" and in this wide ranging and fascinating volume he captures both their flavor and their essence.

Edison, The man who made the future by Ronald W. Clark. Many stories have been told of Mr. Edison and the stories have been viewed in strangely different lights. To some he was a famous American above criticism. To others he was the man who consorted with the "robber barons." He was also seen as a developer of other men's ideas as much as an inventor. 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
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Rum punch for 70 people

The New Year is upon us, and may it bring peace, joy and good health to all of you.

If you are having a large party, this punch might be just the answer. A warning, however; like most punches, it has a wallop. If you overindulge, the clam juice cocktail recipe of my father's was known for its restorative powers.

Rum Punch for 70 People

5 quarts light rum 6 quarts orange juice

3 quarts lemonade 1½ pints pineapple juice

1½ pints grapefruit juice 3 pints simple syrup

1 quart ice cubes

A day ahead of time or earlier, make the simple syrup by boiling together one cup of sugar and two cups water for about two minutes,

until sugar is well dissolved. Pour into a jar and refrigerate. When ready to serve, combine all ingredients and pour over large block of ice in a large punch bowl.

Chip's Clam Juice Cocktail

1 quart clam juice (available bottled)

1 cup ketchup

1 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce

3 dashes Tabasco

1 tsp. black pepper

2 Tbsp. celery salt

1 Tbsp. powdered sugar

1 lemon

Dissolve the sugar in the juice of the lemon. Combine the ketchup, Worcestershire, Tabasco, pepper and celery salt with the lemon juice and pour into a large pitcher with the quart of clam juice. Stir until well blended. Add crushed ice and stir until well chilled. Serve the morning after the night before.

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


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City vegetation committee talk

"Sanibel's Vegetation Committee: A Friend to Our Native Vegetation" will be presented by committee members Dr. William Webb and Mike Klein at the Conservation Center's Tuesdays at the Center program on January 2.

Dr. Webb is a former professor of wildlife ecology at the State University of New York, and recently appointed to the "Committee of Scientists," advising Secretary of Agriculture Robert Bergland on regulations to implement the National Forest Management Act.

Klein is a physicist and former associate director of the Army Night Vision Laboratory in Fort Belvoir, Virginia.



Hammer, who was born in February as far as we can tell, is the son of William and Judy Shipman of Boston, Massachusetts. Happy New Year, Hammer.







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
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Desperate for a fourth, bridge addicts nab Mr. Claus

Just hurry on in — get the game under way!


