### Island Festival: The results

**Y**ou might say Sanibel's Festival of the Island is to Murch's annual Oktoberfest, what a rockfall sausage is to a bratwurst.

In other words, the Sanibel event was small and tasty — you like that kind of meat — and might just leave you craving for more — instead of being a little greasy and capable of producing a bit of indigestion.

By most accounts, including those of formerly doubting city officials, the month-long event was fairly well received. It attracted a few island businesses in one of the worst

months of the year and it was almost a non-spectator public enough the reason it was originally conceived and it was poorly managed.

But whichever side of the fence islanders sat on, everyone the Island Reporter contacted said Festival of the Islands should be staged next year.

Agrees Walter Kile, head of the Sanibel-Captiva Chamber of Commerce, the business group that masterminded the festival. "From where I sit, there will be another next year."

"We took the first step — lending identity to the islands as a place of fun and action in October," said

Kile.

Although Kile could not pinpoint the financial results of the festival, saying the facts and figures are now being run through a computer, he did say the amount of money that changed hands, from entry fees and sponsorship money to advertising and managerial costs was about \$45,000 "and it looks like it's going to wash," Kile said.

The chamber will hold a special meeting tomorrow Friday to discuss the festival's success with all its movers and shakers.

### Gibby's promise to stay 'low-key' wins OK for band

**F**ormer coach Bob Gibson did not say he would turn into a pumpkin if entertainers at his new restaurant and lounge was not over by midnigh — but he did promise the city council the operation would be "low-key" and would close at 12 p.m.

On that basis, Gibson was granted a city entertainment license to enable him occasionally to have a five-member Dixieland combo at Gibby's (formerly Scotty's Pub) on Periwinkle Way.

The ex-football coach, who is opening the restyled sports-themed restaurant/lounge this month, says the entertainment will be aimed at the 35 and up age group. "We are going to start early and finish early — I am not interested in the really late night crowd," he told the city council Tuesday.

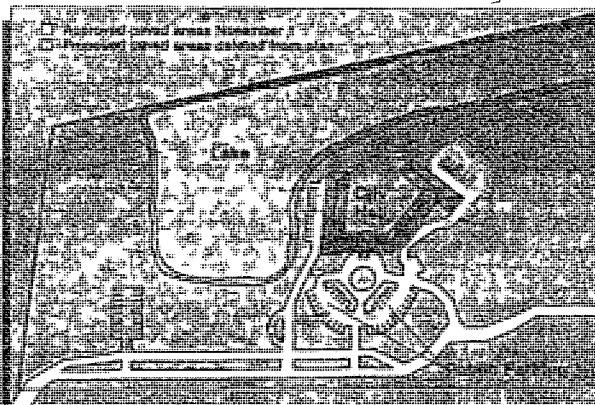
Councilman Fred Vallin said he was not concerned about the number of players, but with the level of amplification parties still in view of the history of noise complaints about Scotty's, "I have no hesitancy as long as you guarantee the noise will be barely audible off your property."

"If we get any complaints we can review the commented Councilman Bill Hagerup of the \$250 license.

Said Mayor Mike Kile, "These are not permits we are issuing. If a person doesn't comply, we don't have the opportunity to yank their permit and put them out of business. We can (only) fine them and harass them," he said.

City attorney David Le Croix said he was working with code inspector Dick Baker on a regulatory or ordinance that would allow the withdrawal of a permit in cases of violation.

Said Kile to Gibson, "It is going to be your responsibility to see the noise is held down. Everybody is well intentioned, but owners are not necessarily on the premises when the violation occurs. There is no reason why the residents around there should have to put up with it. There is a simple little knob you have to twist (to turn the amplifier down)," he added. □



### City council cuts in half paving at the new city hall

**H**undreds of tons of blacktop will be hauled onto the new city hall site soon to cover more than 7,000 square yards of shell roadways and one parking lot.

But the amount of paving the council approved last month has been almost halved, following public outcry — and some council walk-outs — when the departure from "Island style shell" being retained where possible.

The main parking lots in front of the government building, and a large parking area to the east side have been deleted from the blacktop plan, leaving only

the access roads and rear staff parking lot to be asphalt-cid.

The trimmed-down plan will keep the cost closer to the \$20,000 budgeted for the job, says Public Works Director Gary Price. To pave the entire parking and road access areas would have involved 1,150 tons at a cost of \$45,482 and would have covered 13.6 percent of the site and Price.

The bids came in higher than expected. Only two were received though bids were advertised for and 25 contractors were notified by mail. The low bidder

### Red tide alert

The waters off Sanibel and Lee County aren't the most gracious at the moment — not only has a shellfish harvesting ban been declared in Lee County, but dead fish have been rolling up on Captiva beaches, victims of a red tide as the situation moves south.

"The shellfish ban was called this weekend and is related to the red tide phenomenon — the microscopic red tide plant produces a poison that paralyzes fish as they can swim as breathe."

Mollusks, such as clams and oysters, can be contaminated by the red tide and can produce sickness in humans who eat them. Coquina can also be contaminated but crabs and shrimp are not included. The shellfish ban is expected to last at least two weeks.



Dead fish from red tide that wash up on shore are not only a visual nuisance but some people experience breathing problems and sore red eyes.

The shellfish ban has been in effect in Charlotte County north of Lee for the past three weeks. And the east coast of Florida has recently experienced such severe red tide that the beaches, laden with dead fish, had to be bulldozed. □

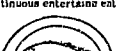

### Kipp Frohlich

**S**ome 41 manatees died during the 1962 red tide outbreak in this area and a new research facility at a J.N. Ding Darling Wildlife Refuge will seek the reasons behind these manatee deaths and others. At the time of the outbreak manatee carcasses had to be sent to Miami often resulting in almost a day's delay before the animal could be examined.

Much more can be learned from fresh tissue, says Kipp Frohlich who will manage the necropsy center being set up through the cooperation of a manatee research laboratory in Gainesville and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Frohlich will also observe the specimens in its natural habitat between Manatee

County and Everglades City.

The St. Petersburg National Wildlife Research Center biology from Furman University in Greenville, S.C. at his master's in wildlife ecology from the University of Florida.

Southwest Florida has one of the largest manatee populations in the state, Frohlich says, and certainly one of the largest winter gathering areas around the Florida Power plant on the Caloosahatchee River. Up until this time it has been fairly neglected for research purposes, but the state has recently directed into this for manatee deaths of local and becoming entangled in monofilament line. which Frohlich expects to be finished by winter. It is located on the former Gavil property in the refuge which had been developed and is now a pristine area.

Frohlich also analyzes the program as a salvage, where carcasses are picked up and examined to determine the cause of death. "We collect data and present a report," he says.

He classifies the cause of death into two categories: man-made and natural mortality. Some of the causes related to man are boat accidents, being crushed in a flood control device or lock and becoming entangled in monofilament line. Red tide and unusually cold weather are two natural causes.

Besides collecting biological data, Frohlich says he has requests for manatee skeletons and

the body parts from museums all over the country.

He is collecting a photo file of individual manatees which can be identified from scar patterns made by boat propellers. This way their migratory patterns can be traced. Another method of discovering their migratory patterns is through aerial surveys, the large animals are visible in the water.

Frohlich says identifying the year-round habitat of the animals is important because it could lead to improving it. The animals' distribution in their wintering spots, but their summer whereabouts are not as well known.

He says the survival of manatees is a well-sounded ecological issue and is optimistic.



# City reminds county planner of evacuation needs

Sanibel City Council on Tuesday applauded Lee County for the land use plan it is developing ... but raised a few flags about the need to protect island evacuation routes.

Lee County Planning Director Dan Shaw was on Sanibel to hear the council's reactions to the land use map ... and perhaps a little advisory advice from a city that has a working land use plan.

"We have followed the trials and tribulations of the county planners. We are all for it (the plan)," Mayor Mike Klein told Shaw.

Pointing to areas targeted for high density, including Mincee Corner and Iona McGregor, city councilmen stressed the need to keep a weather eye on an evacuation route for the barrier islands, which could soon be overloaded by new development.

Shaw had said that areas with infrastructure already

in place would be further developed in accordance with a policy to "build" rather than to develop undeveloped areas.

He agreed the pressures in Iona McGregor were intense, but assured the council hurricane evacuation was being taken into consideration. "If the council has a position it wants to take, that is why we are here. We would not allow any intense development there until we had a handle on new road improvements to keep evacuation under control.

"If this concept is adopted, we will commit to protect the evacuation times. But we can't better them," he said.

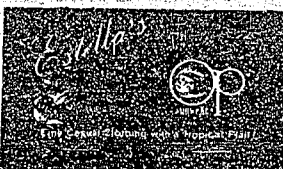
With Commissioner Porter Goss on the county commission, evacuation routes would be well protected, Shaw added. We have an excellent county commission at this point in terms of planning and growth management and we have to make the most of it in the next nine months because we don't know what will happen next November."

Shaw added that in areas like Iona McGregor, there was a range of densities available based on services, adjacent land use and evacuation patterns. "Maximum densities may not be given out down there. There may have to be some mitigation by developers in terms of road improvements, intersection improvements and on-site (emergency) shelters.

"We will build language into the plan to prevent development that shows a negative impact. But we can only reduce it so far until we get to the point where the causeway is the problem," he said referring to Sanibel and Captiva's evacuation route.

Said Commissioner Fred Vailin, "I hear you, and I wish you the best of luck. Your intentions are above, but I am not all that optimistic."

Shaw said Sanibel planners Bruce Rogers and Bob Dunes were being kept advised of the county's land use plan and he (Shaw) would come back to the island to discuss the plan further. He wanted the endorsements of Sanibel, Fort Myers and Cape Coral for the plan. □

### Dixie Beach drainage must wait for Price

City efforts to solve drainage problems on Dixie Beach Boulevard resulted in a 3-foot deep moat in front of his home with fish swimming in it, said Dan Monahan.

Resident John Seabrooke, who raised the drainage problem with the city council Tuesday, said the swale in front of homes near Royal Poinciana did drain prior to the installation of two culverts to The Dunes. "Since then there is tidal water in the swale) almost every day of the year."

"In September, the city came in with a back hoe and drainage equipment and replaced culverts. They tried. But when they were finished...I think it was even worse. Those who live in the area sincerely request the council to do something to alleviate the problem," he said.

After Public Works Director Gary Price said he did not know when he could come up with a proposal for the area, Seabrooke retorted, "I know of no business that can start a project, fail it, then say I don't know when I can get back to you."

He and other residents objected when Price suggested Jan. 17 as a date when Price could come back to

the council with a recommendation. Fritz Halls suggested "digging" up the swale near Royal Poinciana as an interim solution, and Clark Newcorn said four or five planks on the east side of the culvert might hold the water back until something could be done.

Price agreed there was a problem. Culverts under the road were put in by Marjorie to increase flush lag in the area of Dixie Beach Boulevard, but it had made the swale a tidal ditch which was unsightly and odorous. "I wouldn't want it in front of my house," he added.

"The best solution would be to pipe it but we don't have the funds to do that." Another solution might be to have an outfall pipe to change the flow so the ditch would not have to be so deep. The outfall pipe could go under the road to the Fish and Wildlife land or could drain into the canal, but he was not sure Fish and Wildlife would agree to the former, while the latter idea would require the consent of adjacent property owners and a specific amendment.

The council agreed to discuss the issue Jan. 17 but said Price should be on the look-out for an interim solution.

### Goss to field questions on causeway purchase


Lee County Commissioner Porter Goss of Sanibel will pose the question: "Is the purchase of Sanibel causeway feasible for both sides?"

He will be speaking at Sanibel Community Association's monthly dinner for members Wednesday, Nov. 9. Questions Commissioner Goss will ponder will include: Can this community take on a \$25 million responsibility? What about needed repairs in the next 30 years? Is it true a toll of \$7.53 would be required? Must Sanibel buy the causeway to alleviate congestion by heavy traffic off-island that threatens the quality of island life? Does the county need to raise cash for roads and other improvements? Would the lower interest rates result in a good purchase?

Sanibel residents are invited to attend the discussion, which starts at 7:00 p.m. Admission is free.



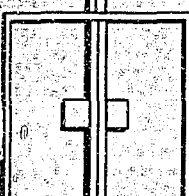

### Oil spill protection

Agreement among councilmen for a resolution to protect Sanibel's shorelines against oil spills was unanimous — now Mayor Mike Klein only needs to put the thought in words.

Klein had brought up the matter of potential oil spills, citing a bill proposed by a U.S. senator, that would establish a 20- to 30-mile buffer zone off coastal areas for the draining of oil booms, in a bid to protect beaches, the fishing industry, and marine wildlife from potential oil spills. But, Klein says, Florida Senator Paula Hawkins has noted that the bill would not protect certain Florida areas, including Sanibel, from a 31-year old law that is still on the books. Said Klein, "Since we are three miles out, we would really be seriously affected if there was an oil spill."

Councilmen agreed in Klein's suggestion that he draft a resolution calling for an absolute 20-30 mile buffer zone for the leases — with no exceptions.

### Tax rebate refused

Lee County Commission not only refused to give the City of Sanibel a penny for its thoughts — it also flatly

turned down the city's request for the \$37,000 Sanibel says the county overcharged in tax bills issued last year to islanders.

Even though city fathers were defeated by the news in September that Lee County was not as far off the mark as was thought in their taxing practices, the council resolved two weeks ago to retrieve that somewhat sizeable sum.

But according to councilman Fred Valtin, who had spearheaded the city's effort to get the accounting straight, the county commission, by unanimous vote, turned down the refund bid last week. Valtin did not say if the commission gave any reason.

The irony of the unanimous vote tone that incited Commissioner Porter Goss, who had supported the dual taxation took while on Sanibel city council, was not lost on the council.

The cities of Sanibel, Cape Coral, and Fort Myers had paid \$10,000 in Kelton and Associates of Deland, Florida, for an investigation into the county's tax and service records. Although Cape Coral and Fort Myers have publicly denounced the firm's findings, Sanibel council has chosen not to fight the results in what could become extended legal proceedings.

### Road setbacks reduced

With very a dissenting word, the city has sanctioned a planning department bid to reduce setbacks on Rabbit and Beach Roads from 75 feet to 62.5 feet.

In what planners called a "housekeeping chore," they asked that the setback on Rabbit Road be relaxed since numerous requests for deviations on the 75-foot standard had been carelessly asked for by homeowners.

On Beach Road, planners said the reduction in setback length would give homeowners greater flexibility in designing homes on the narrow lots — which they said would not pose a hardship to the city since Beach Road provides minimal opportunity for future road drainage or utility improvements. But at the same time, planners suggested the city should pursue acquisition of an additional 25 feet of right-of-way wherever possible on Beach Road.

The setback reductions were approved unanimously by both the planning commission and, this week, by the city council.

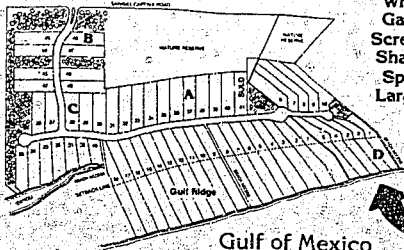

### No relief for pepper clearing

Colocate resident Jerry Jackintell failed Tuesday in his bid to get relief from the six-month building moratorium in Sanibel Highlands.

Endorsing the planning commission's 6-0 recommendation of denial of Jackintell's request, the city council on Tuesday voted 8-0 to reject the appeal, saying the road was impassable.

The area of Jackintell's two lots falls within the larger area for which decisions on drainage have not yet been made, said Councilman Fred Valin. City planners say the right of way fronting the property on Capital City Way is overgrown with Brazilian pepper and is an upstate wetlands easement with elevations generally at four feet above mean sea level.

Robert Kornick, representing Jackintell, said his neighbor would like to clear his lots of pepper so he could design a house appropriate for the site. Jackintell was willing to extend the road to his property and install proper drainage on his side of the road. He did not plan to build a house at this time.

Planning Director Bruce Rogers says the reason for the moratorium is to look at existing conditions and that building a road would alter those conditions. The owner can clear pepper by hand without a permit, but bringing

in equipment would be considered development in violation of the moratorium.

Kornick himself successfully appealed the moratorium for an extension to his home in Atlantic Plaza Drive in Sanibel Highlands. His case was considered different from Jackintell's.

Kornick will, however, now have to seek a septick tank deviation because of the bedroom he is adding. □

### No harbor for duplexes

The only question city councilmen had this week on a request to keep duplexes out of Sanibel Harbours subdivision was one of procedure.

Ged Carrington, representing Sanibel Harbours homeowners' association, said the subdivision was more than 70 percent completed, and the measure to stop duplex development before it got started "was only covering our trail - following the procedure undertaken by other neighborhoods."

Councilmen apparently had no question on the wisdom of the zoning bid, but only discussed whether it should remain a specific amendment to the plan, as it is now titled, or be included as part of a 1977 general amendment that called for similar zoning restrictions in several island subdivisions. □

In the end, City Attorney David La Croix said the specific amendment could be cross-referenced to the previous general amendment. The council will vote on the issue Dec. 6.

### Point of no return

A request for the return of \$800 in building permit fees left the Santa Barbara Development Corporation empty handed. The city council decided Tuesday to hold onto the fees \$200 each until the company reapplies.

Planning Director Bruce Rogers said the applicant was told the permits could not be issued for the Sea Otter subdivision phase II until road, drainage and water improvements had been made. The improvements were not made, therefore the permits cannot be issued, Rogers said. The applicant insisted on filing to beat the RGOO deadline. "Everybody was fully informed," he added.

A city ordinance states that such fees are non-refundable.

All is not lost for the company, however, for the fees can remain on file and be used when the improvements are completed. □

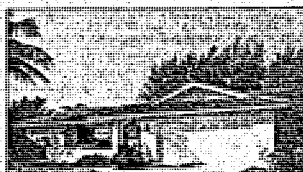



### What constitutes 50 per cent?

In anticipation of a new clubhouse at the Dunes Country Club Mariner Properties decided to begin early in their struggle with the city over whether the building still have to conform to flood regulations.

The basis for determining whether an addition to the existing ground level building must be floodproofed or elevated is whether it constitutes an improvement of more than 50 per cent to the existing structure. But whether that 50 per cent should be calculated on size or value or a combination of the two is the big question.

City Planning Director Bruce Rogers admits there are some areas on the federal flood regulations that need clarifying but says it will take time to come up with a good policy. We can't operate in a consistent

manner under the regulations as they are now. State and federal experts have advised that anything that adds value to a structure should be considered part of the valuation in determining a "substantial improvement," he said.

"One thing we want to be sure of is not to put our federally subsidized flood program in jeopardy," said Rogers. He urged the council to postpone judgment on a Mariner's request, which they did, at the same time directing Rogers to seek a certification "expeditiously." Councilman Fred Veltin asked Rogers to come back with figures showing how the expansion of Bailey's Shopping Center last year and the proposed bank of the Islands addition had been calculated with the result that neither had to conform to the flood regulations because neither was considered a "substantial improvement."

Rogers said in Bailey's case the owner's appraiser had fixed the value. This included "everything that goes to make the building work" but did not include internal

#### financing

For the bank, there had been a letter from the architect stipulating that the addition was less than 50 percent in value, which was feasible since the vault and other expensive fixtures were contained in the existing building. "We didn't go to nearly the extent we did with Bailey's where it was a close call," Rogers explained.

He said state insurance officials had offered to visit Sanibel to review past practices and do a "critique" but Mayor Mike Klein felt they had been "wily waxy" and he was "hesitant to ask them to put restrictions on us that they might not put on other people."

But after agreeing the council could opt out or for suggestions made by the state officials, the members agreed they could always use more information.

Jack Summers for Mariner said planning staff had told him that the value of improvements would include cabinets, carpets and draperies in the clubhouse addition.

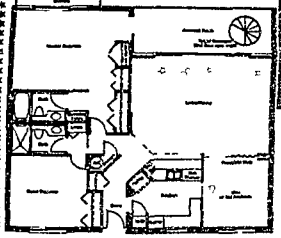


# Sundial

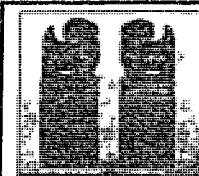

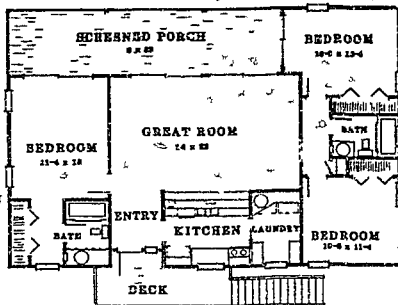

## Two churches settle differences with city

One islander doesn't believe his church need be "buffered from the rest of society" — but city fathers, saying, rules are rules, directed a portion of the grounds to be screened.

Aid across town, another church is grappling with the facts of land — but only if you can find where to place a brand new house of worship.

There were in city council chambers, two island churches stood a little worriedly at intervention in their affairs — St. Joseph's Catholic Church asked for leniency on the land's vegetation requirements and the city approved the Congregational United Church of Christ a request to remove their Periwinkle Way land to institutional use to pave the way for a new island church.

After plotting several conditions on the size of development and clear area city councilmen readily endorsed the Congregational United Church's plans along Periwinkle — and their quick unanimous approval prompted a little cheering and clapping from Reverend Thak Siers wife Frances and the sup-

porters

With over four acres at the church's disposal, located opposite Periwinkle Place shopping center, the city restricted total development to 12,000 square feet, with a clearing of the parcel not to exceed 100,000 square feet. Because the residentially zoned land could have supported nine dwelling units, fourmen allowed one house approved as a paragon to be built in addition to the church. No other residential development was sanctioned.

Stein embodied the city's set on on the rezoning and its limits, one "entirely acceptable."

Joseph Higgins representing St. Joseph's Church was also portly representative with the city in the church's effort to have tough zoning and vegetation laws relaxed. But Higgins at one point expressed dismay "as a civilian" as to why you have to build a church from the rest of society?

It was told that all islanders — from churches to resorts — should try to follow protective land laws. But in the end councilmen showed more sympathy with the church than not requiring all the property's borders be buffered.

St. Joseph's this summer was denied a permanent certificate of occupancy because the church had not removed the Brazilian pepper from its six acres. When

the city issued a development permit for the 8,000 square-foot additions to the Sun-Isle-Captive Road chapel two years ago, officials said it was understood that part of the work included removing the pecky peppers — a stipulation placed on any islander who builds new or substantially improves their property.

Councilmen decided this because the church expressed willingness to remove all the pepper on the property. "The way I understand it we will keep on chipping away on the pepper until it is all gone for one thing I cause you to remove" said Higgins — they gave St. Joseph's up to two years to eradicate the peppers, a time period all members agreed was realistic.

Councilwoman Louise Johnson voted against the extension period, however saying that the council had not met in a strong stand, first using all papers must be reviewed at the time of development.

Councilmen also permitted the church to forego buffering requirements on the eastern and northern boundaries because the land largely borders U.S. 1 Telephone property but now red the church to screen the land on their western side which neighbors Rabbit Hill homes. The city allowed the church two years in which to establish the buffer or reeding — but the two year limit on removing the Brazilian pepper.



### Let's give the Fisheries Commission a chance

When I was first elected to the state legislature in 1974 one of the most controversial issues before the Lee County Legislative delegation was a dispute between commercial fishermen regarding net fishing restrictions.

Ironically a gent-man appeared before the delegation on another matter who had been a member of the State Legislature in 1938. He passed to tell us of his memories of early legislative service and told the delegation that in 1938 like now fishing was one of the most burning and controversial issues in every session of the legislature.

Over the past decade or more, Florida lawmakers have gradually shaped and changed Florida's laws governing marine resources to break that vicious cycle of emotion and unify our approach to resource management.

With the passage of the 1968 State Constitution and "home rule" powers for counties and cities, the legislature stepped out for the first time areas of law to remain solely in the hands of the state jurisdiction. Among those areas of jurisdiction included the clear authority to regulate marine resources in the best interests of all the people of the state.

But even with the elimination of thousands of "local" jurisdictions with fragmented and often contradictory approaches to resource management, the state still had not come to grips with the emotion charged issues of fishery management.

Lawmakers pressured by vocal constituencies still had and exercised authority to pass "local acts" — bills that only affect one county or part of a county — regulating fishing. The result has been a confusing jumble of "local acts" which must be enforced by the State Marine Patrol along with many general state laws on marine resource management.

As more people continue to move into the coastal areas of the state with their seawalled canals supplanting once native fisheries habitat of mangrove and wetland the pressure and the conflicts continued to mount.

In Southwest Florida alone the impact of poor and fragmented resource management has been evident in the closure of many once important oyster harvest areas the loss of a once thriving

scallop industry in Pine Island Sound, drastic new restrictions and limitations on snook and other game fish, and serious feuds between stone crabbers and shrimpers over prime fishing grounds.

In all areas of resource management, including enforcement and research, the Department of Natural Resources found itself overwhelmed, undermanned, and underbudgeted.

As a solution to the problem, some proposed to transfer the authority for marine resource management from the DNR to the State Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission, a autonomous Constitutional agency and rename it the State Game and Fish Commission. Defeated on that effort, its proponents are again trying to mount a petition drive to place the issue on the 1984 statewide ballot as a Constitutional amendment.

There are responsible arguments and facts to dispute this point of view but perhaps the most important, is simply that the State Marine Fisheries Commission the approach I have supported and sponsored, is a "fait accompli". It is here now and a meaningful effort toward resource protection based on sound scientific fact, instead of protection and political pressure, can be initiated by working with the commission.

Hopefully for the first time, we can "take the politics out" of resource

management decisions through the Marine Fisheries Commission.

The commission is empowered to make decisions on fisheries, species protection bag limits, seasonal restrictions and other gear restrictions and regulations on the taking of fish, crabs, lobsters, shrimp, mollusks and other marine life. These decisions will then be ratified by the Governor and Cabinet as formal rules and regulation — with the power and force of state law.

In addition to the creation of the commission, the legislation I sponsored includes licensure for commercial fishermen, wholesalers and retailers. Anyone who sells their catch of fish, mollusks, shrimp, crabs or other marine resources will be required to possess such a license. Wholesalers may only purchase from licensed wholesalers.

Revenues from these licenses will help curb one of the primary complaints that many fishermen have had against the DNR, not enough is being spent on research and fisheries management. Because of a lack of resources DNR efforts have been primarily directed toward commercially important species of fish, crabs, lobsters, shrimp and mollusks. The additional resources will enable DNR researchers to look at species of game fish and other marine resources that their limited dollars could

Mike Gaylord, specially-hired promotional consultant for the festival, says he will refrain from comment on the event's success until after the meeting—but he did offer one little tidbit, saying vehicular traffic across the toll bridge increased by 22,000 cars this October compared with October 1952.

"Since the normal increase per year is four to six percent, and this shows an 18-percent increase, the county toll officials felt that was an extremely significant increase," said Gaylord.

The *Island Reporter* has confirmed that last month, 145,503 cars crossed the bridge, compared with 122,777 cars in October 1952. A further barometer of this significance is the reduced number of cars that crossed the bridge in September of this year—123,577—compared with a higher number in September, 1952, of 128,831 cars.

Even though that many more people visited the island last month, the *Island Reporter*, in a random survey, has been somewhat hard pressed to find where the people in those cars have been spending their money.

The most significant increase in island business seems to have fallen on the restaurants, which generally showed moderate increases. Kip Foster, owner of The Tumbler Restaurant, said he noticed a fair number of new faces in his restaurant, many of which participated in the festival's tennis and sailing events.

Other eateries, while reporting a good month, could not really say what it was due to. The forty percent increase at The Quarterdeck was probably due in part to the festival, and in part to the opening of Jerry's Center, reports a significant rise. The Oyster Shell also reports "a wonderful winter business." A spokesman said it might be due to their popular shrimp dinner special.

The island delicatessen, on the other hand, reported a decline in October business. Several said it was the worst month they have ever had.

Although some resorts and motels benefited from overnights by festival participants, most said their businesses was not significantly helped. Casa Ybel reported an occupancy rate lower than last year, even though it hosted part of the tennis event. A manager said that might be because the resort's pool was closed down for two weeks.

And says Chuck Andrews, rooms division manager for Sandals, "The festival really didn't do that much for us." Andrews suggested it be shortened into a two-week period, incorporating all the events, rather than stretching it all out across the month. That way, people would be more likely to stay at the resorts for a week or two at a time.

One shop reported a great increase in October business, but again couldn't really attribute the rise, saying it might be due to the time share people. While other store-front businesses reported the same slackness typical at this time of year, Gripped one merchant. "This wasn't the retailing experience it was cracked up to be."

In a poll of the heads of festival events, most said recognition was the big plus this time around—and next year should produce the desired contents—and financial picture, while others speaking privately, pointed to serious management flaws, which they said must be straightened out for their participants next year.

The two Chamber-initiated events, which seemed most successful were the 10K race, which drew 400 runners from age seven to 70, and the tennis tournament last weekend. According to Greg Parker, the tennis was "exceptional—a major undertaking and a big success."

"The particular thing about it was the high caliber of play and the extremely appreciative crowd. It couldn't have been much better," Parker added, but the celebration was topped off by 16 cases of champagne—and he predicted there will be a waiting list for players next year.

The sailing regatta was also fun for the participants, and head Myron Ireland predicts a bigger success next year if there is a little more promotion. "It's a natural for the island," he says.

"The first event of the festival, the fishing rodeo, was almost a wash-out," reports the co-chairman, but says Forrest Münden, "The potential is there." He suggests the rodeo be reduced from a week-long affair to three days, to capture the local working people and other Florida participants.

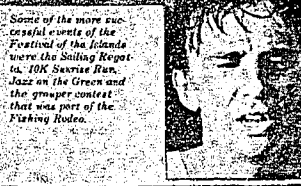
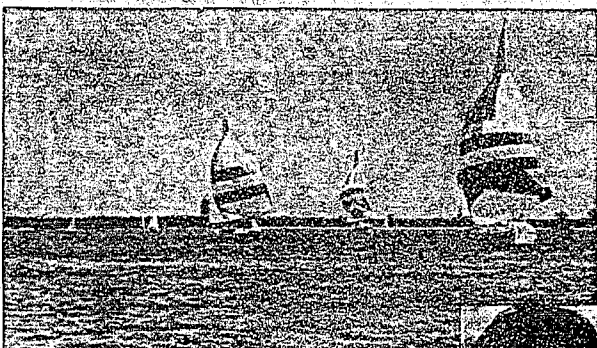
Ralph Woodring, the other rodeo co-chairman, says the grouper event produced some excellent fishermen, as the tarpon event should have, if the false word had not spread that tarpon fishing "was poor at this time of year." There were loads of tarpon," Woodring objected. Both men suggested a longer-term advertising campaign would beef up interest.

The Kwanza Chili Cook-off on Oct. 2, and BIG Art's Jazz on the Green, Oct. 8, were both unqualified successes.

But the golf tournament, scheduled for Oct. 14, 15, and 16, was a rain-out, and only a limited number of golfers could have enjoyed teeing off. The Duques back-nine holes in a new, Tourney-organized format, but the event was supposed to be held on the three days at three different golf courses—The Duques, Bearview, and South Seas.

Says Pat Flynn, the Duques pro, "There wasn't what it was intended to be." Flynn adds that if it was up to him, he would have canceled the golf, rather than play the nine holes four times.

One of the great successes in the month, although it was not part of the Festival of the Islands, was the

Octoberfest held last week at Tavern Waters Inn. Reports Tom Lepi, the Inn's general manager, "It was very good—beyond all our expectations," drawing at times up to 1,000 people over a big tent.

Lepi said plans for the Oktoberfest featuring the popular oom-pah-pah band, the Stratton Mountain Boys, started about eight months ago before the Chamber's festival was killed. "And we are definitely going to have this again next year," says Lepi.

A major endorsement of the festival came from members of Sanibel City Council this week, who said that because most events were so nicely under attended, they thought it all came off very smoothly. The council had voted major concerns earlier this year about the

Chamber's high-powered ideas on festival promotion, with a large advertising bill to match—which they scaled down in later considering council fears.

Said Councilman Francis Bailey, "There has been absolutely no problems. Everyone gaped earlier over the grandiose plans and the millions of dollars, but they brought it back in and I think it was very tastefully done, with the kind of activities we want here."

Commented Councilman Fred Valtin, "It wasn't the big bull-bulge we feared—the events went off smoothly and were well attended, by islanders too."

And said Mayor Mike Klein, in what would only be words of praise, "As far as the city is concerned, the Festival of The Islands posed no problems."

Macphalt, Inc. got the contract with their \$402.5 a ton—32 cents a ton cheaper than Harper Bros. Inc. The latest paving plan calls for only slightly more blacktop than the "island style" concept the council approved last August.

After heavy summer rains, some city officials sought in October to have more area paved, following complaints about waterlogged shell parking areas and sand being tramped into the new building.

But the subsequent 3-2 decision to cover about 14,000 square feet with blacktop came under fire from members of the community and this week's decision is the council's reaction to this and to urging from Mayor Mike Klein and Councilwoman Louise Johnson for a return to the more native concept on the picturesque 22-acre site.

Councilwoman Johnson said although she could go along with the plan to pave the roads, she would have preferred to delay it to see how the shell would hold up.

"We have at least made the effort to recognize that the policy on Sanibel is not to pave every parking area," she added.

But Councilman Fred Valtin, a proponent of the wider paving plan, said he was worried that some of the few public parking spaces might become unusable much of the year because of rain. In that event, any council member should feel free to reopen the question, he said.

Councilman Bill Hagerup was more concerned with the handicapped parking area being more accessible to the building. Price said he could provide a number of spaces on the hard surface under the police department for this purpose, and this would be within easy reach of the elevator.

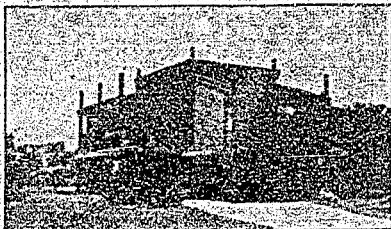

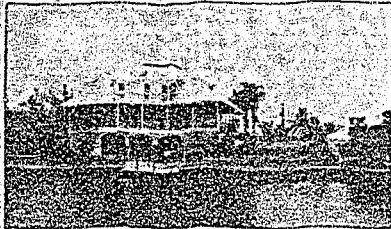

"T rain ladies, do not strain." "Bring your body, the mind will follow." "Take what you like and leave the rest." That's what the petite blonde advises her class while building to a crescendo of stretching and sweating, shouting "Whew!" at the peak similar to television aerobic dance teachers. But there is one difference immediately apparent — Jennifer Dehus is very pregnant.

This new Sanibel resident and exercise teacher is expecting her first child Nov. 20, but expects to finish this session of classes held each Saturday at the Captiva Civic Center at 10:30 a.m. "Sometimes I think people think I'm crippled. It's the best thing for the baby and my doctor told me just to listen to my body, the same thing I tell my classes." She has taught several pregnant women in the five years she's been teaching. Her background is in classical ballet which she learned from her mother who created the Children's Dance Guild at the University of Southwestern Louisiana. A native of Lafayette, La., the practical Jennifer majored in business at Southwestern, but took lots of dance and exercise electives.

She studied basic calisthenics in an exercise studio in Norfolk, Va. and taught exercise and aerobic dance for the Lafayette Parks and Recreation Department. She also exercised to Cajun music on an early morning television program.

Jennifer moved to this area with her husband, Royer who is building a home for them in the Wolfert area. He started the house Christmas Eve, 1982 and the Dehus just recently moved in. Jennifer says exercise helps her a lot with her everyday chores, especially since she is the clean-up woman and trash crew on the house site.

While living off the island, she taught exercise in several mobile home parks to the music of the big bands. She also teaches six hours of exercise on Fort Myers Beach.

She describes her brand of exercise as simple yoga combined with calisthenics and ballet movements. One of her favorite routines is having class members stand up against the wall and flatten their lower backs. "Posture is so important," she says. "When you stand up straight it pulls those bulges up and flattens them out."

The class starts with warm-ups and raises the heartbeat with some aerobic steps, breaks into a jog

and ends in a relaxing position where Jennifer has the class members think of a pleasant thought or plays soothing, inspirational music. Jennifer says, "I can eat and enjoy food and at the same time do something good for my body. Also, exercise lowers your set point level where you want less food." She has seen some dramatic weight losses in her classes, but more importantly she has seen women begin to feel better about themselves.

Jennifer will take a few months off after she has her baby, but Annette Pettit will take over her classes. Registration for the new session will be Nov. 12 at Tween Waters Inn. ☐

### Muffet Hayes

Muffet Hayes, the matriarch of exercise on the islands, has gone beyond exercising the outside of the body to getting her students in touch with their bones, muscles and internal organs.

Starting her fourth year of teaching on Sanibel, Muffet is taking a holistic-health approach in her Body/Mind-Awareness class in addition to teaching aerobics "for fun." She is enjoying smaller classes now more than the days when she had 30 to 40 students because she was the only person leading any form of exercise class on the island. "In the larger classes, you lose track of the individual," she says.

Similar in style to yoga, the holistic class emphasizes lots of slow stretching movements, breathing and relaxation. She wants her students to find an integration with their own body, to discover how all the systems work together and influence each other and an individual's health. She feels a person can then "take this understanding and discover his wholeness with the planet and other people."

Grounding is one technique she teaches to get the student in touch with the earth so that it supports the body structure, thus lessening tension on bones and muscles. She teaches the student to find his "physical center" which is located a few inches below the navel. To do this the bones must be aligned properly with good posture and in balance with the muscles. "Students learn what muscle control what movements so they can send information from the brain to that muscle. She teaches them exercises to stimulate specific organs and to develop their inner senses of seeing and hearing."

"Being aware of the mind's ability to see is an introduction to meditation and relaxation and is a key to expanding our environment," she says. "We're working with our potential because that and our bodies are the only things we can be sure we will always have."

Muffet studied holistic health and art last summer at the Naropa Institute in Boulder, Colo. She has also attended Omega, a new spa center in upstate New York. She is a graduate at the University of Wisconsin where she studied dance, and she taught modern dance and yoga at the Arkansas Art Center before moving to Sanibel.

"I'm still a student as well as a teacher," she says. "All I can do is plant the seeds and the students have to make them grow."

Muffet says now that the effect of stress on the heartbeat has been scientifically measured, perhaps someday man will be more willing to believe that we can control our body's functions. "This is something the Indian gurus have known for thousands of years," she says. "Organs can absorb stress and block our body's energy, so it's very important to work on releasing it. Many modern lifestyles involve working with the body, such as bio-energetics, to release energy."

### Dianne La Croix

Ballet is exercise for the body and mind, says Dianne La Croix who has more than 60 students of all ages enrolled in her classical ballet and jazz classes which began last month.

"This is the first time I've worked with children and it's really where my heart is," says Dianne. She did choreography for the Island Youth Theatre play *Oliver* last summer and was asked by parents then if she would teach.

Dianne says once a child gets down the discipline of ballet it can help them in other activities from modeling to swimming to gymnastics. It is a rigid and set discipline in contrast to jazz which is really a celebration of life, she says. "In jazz, something clicks inside the child and makes him move. I try to get them to move to the music inside and do it for themselves first."

Her set class of 2½ to 5-year-olds have done three of the five foot positions and the French terms for them. They curtsy for the roll call and one new student had three others positioning her feet for her. Another young one came to class with a pacifier in her mouth and popped it out when she swung her arm out at the barre.

"I love 'em," Dianne says, but she doesn't allow any "put downs" of other students in class. "It ruins the concentration; I tell them to leave that stuff outside. I respect them and expect it from them."

She has a library of books on childbearing, she says, and feels that maintaining a child's dignity is the most important part. She has experience with her own two daughters, Kirsten and Katrina, and also studied it in college psychology courses.

This belief may be a result of her own childhood when she was an "only docking" and was told that "I see classes but the classes I had to feel better," she says. At a military base, she was interested so called in German schools. She also trained as a child with a French male teacher and an Italian ballet mistress. "The adult class is Dianne's largest group and she didn't think there would be much interest in it when she started. She has now expanded to twice a week and teaches both jazz and ballet in the co-ed course. One of her students, Craig Shuman likes it because it's not as hot and sweaty as some exercise such as boxing from."

Gunella Palmer, a Swedish visitor to the islands, finds Dianne very professional. "She loves to dance and likes what she's doing. It gives her a sense because she says things like 'I'm so proud of you,'" Gunella says she's taking the class while on vacation because she's not interested in being on the beach all day and it's a good way to meet local residents.

Dianne herself did not return to class until after 30 when she was 70 pounds overweight. "I decided enough is enough, that I either accept myself the way I am or do something about it," she says. She started attending Polish's in Galveston where she was living. In three months she pulled off the extra pounds through ballet and altering her meat and potatoes diet to raw vegetables and no red meat.

She says she grew in height two inches during this time and that she's really too tall to be a professional dancer. "Plus I have extra long arms and am always having to compensate for them," she says.

That fact didn't seem to bother the Southwest Florida Dance Theatre when it selected her and another dancer from a group of 15 to join its company. She had taken her daughter to try out for the troupe whose members are mostly between 17 and 19 years old. "I wasn't prepared to dance and my feet were blistering before I was finished," she says. She has a minor role in the Christmas story which the company presents in area school and churches. It will be presented at Sanibel Community Church Dec. 18. She is also on the Barrier Island Group for the Arts schedule in January for Dianne La Croix: An Intimate Revue in Song and Dance.

Her classes will continue all year long at the Sanibel Community Association building and anyone may join them at any time. ☐

### Madge Amoroso

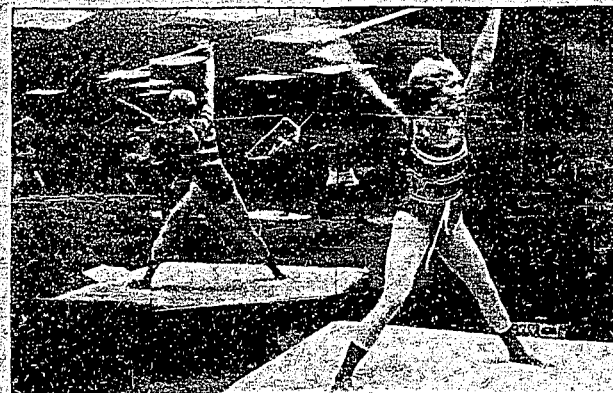
Madge Amoroso has been teaching exercise classes since she and some friends gathered in the hall of their college dorm to work off the "good institutional food." In addition to teaching physical education for 15 years, she always had an exercise class going on the side at a community college or community center.

She has been teaching on Sanibel since last January when she and her two children, Matt and Nick, moved to the island. She recently moved into a new studio behind Burger's Emporium with carpeted floors and walls and large mirrors where students can watch their form. She has named her studio Sanibel Fitness Center and she hopes to add exercise equipment soon.

The exercise classes are choreographed to music and concentrate on spot-toning with emphasis on the hip, thigh and abdominal areas. Classes start with warm-ups and build to a peak using wands or "macho sticks." Hand dumbbells are used to strengthen the upper body. More calisthenics and jump rope movements increased the heartbeat to build the cardio-vascular system. Choreographed dance movements and a cool down period end the session.

She has been encouraging men to join her classes

Linn Major has a new collection of photographs now on display at Sanibel Gallery where she has offered her wildlife and nature photographs for the last four years.

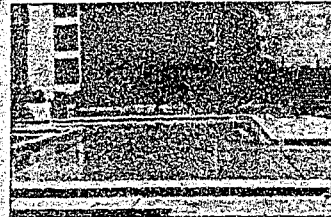

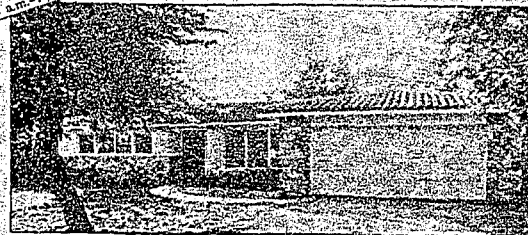

## fishing report

### Improving the forecasting of weather

"Everybody complains about the weather but nobody does anything about it" is a saying that has been around for a long time. Although it is very difficult for anyone to do anything about the weather, it is possible to do something to improve weather forecasting.

During the fall and winter a pilot program in Florida for improving weather reports will be conducted in Fort Myers by the Sea Grant Marine Advisory Program in cooperation with several other groups. The system being tested is called MARP and has been tested successfully in a few other states.

The problems with present marine forecasts is that forecasters must depend on satellite and situated guesses to predict if the sea conditions to expect under given wind conditions. While satellites have greatly improved all weather forecasting they are unable to "see" small enough weather systems to predict the kind of inshore localized storms that can prove hazardous for boaters and fishermen.

The MARP will use data relayed by people who spend a great deal of time on the inshore waters to improve the marine weather forecasts. Commercial fishermen charter and party boat operators will be sending real time sea and sea state observations over their VHF or SSB radios several times a day.

These observations will be received at a shore station, manned by volunteers from the Fort Myers Amateur Radio Club and relayed by telephone to the National Weather Service which will then get this current weather information and sea conditions back out on the air as soon as possible on their regular weather broadcasts.

□ □ □

Some of the large pits in Central Florida created during phosphate mining operations, are scheduled to be opened to the public for fishing in the near future. Fishery management agencies plan to control the fishing in order to conduct experiments in fish management strategies to prove to biologists will an opportunity to evaluate the effects of management through regulations.

Each area will be evaluated individually based on fish population data collected prior to opening along

with catch records to be provided by each angler after opening and constant releases of fish for fish restrictions. Some will have slot limits where specific size groups of bass must be live-released, while other sizes may be kept by the fishermen. One pit will be limited to fly rods and artificial flies only. On another fishermen must be accompanied by a child under 15 years old.

□ □ □

At the Fishery Habitat Symposium in September 1983 sponsored by Florida League of Anglers, it was pointed out that phosphate mining operations release radioactive agents, such as radium 226, and sufficient data was available at that time to determine whether fish living in phosphate pits were safe for food.

In December 1980 the University of Florida tested fish taken from the retention pond of a mining operation's the Suwannee River area as well as fish taken from a creek which receive a discharge from the operation. The analysis revealed the presence of routine levels of radium-226 which is a naturally-occurring radioactive isotope, and researchers determined that all fish sampled could be safely consumed.

In August, 1983 at the request of the Sarasota County Board of Commissioners, the University of South Florida published results of a study conducted to evaluate the ability of aquatic organisms in central Florida to take up radium. A major purpose of the study was to test the hypothesis that phosphate mining causes an adverse impact on plants and animals by elevating radium 226 exposure.

It is an established fact that radium seeks bone and in the fish sampled approximately 70 percent of the radium was in the bones of the fish. Researchers further determined that radium is incorporated in plants and animals by direct absorption from water not by food entering the digestive system.

"Based on our present level of understanding," the report summarized, "it seems that if only larger fish are eaten by man, if the majority of radium 226 is contained in the bones of fish and if fish constitute a small part of human diet, there should be minimal hazard to man."

This sounds like a very "lifty" bill of health for fish live in phosphate pits. Biologists with the Game & Fresh Water Fish Commission however, stated that radioactivity was not great enough to be of concern.

GRUPPERS — Although the season of one-castel grupper storage may be past, wind will be the deciding factor for offshore fishermen for the next several months. While some permit, there will be some good grupper fishing about 30 miles offshore in the 50 to 60-foot water depth. Full grupper out from their hiding places under rocks requires sturdy tackle and enough weight on the line to hold the bait down near the bottom. Gruppers are not fussy eaters and will take almost any live or dead bait you care to take out to them.

SPANISH MACKEREL — Schools are thinning out off shore at the water temperature cools. A few scattered fish are still being their way south through our area. Any shyness or lure should get their attention. Minimum legal length for Span sh mackerel is 12 inches.

SEATROUT — Although seatrout are in our area year round members of the current year class are about fully grown now and anglers should be able to find "keepers" of the spotted variety. The only one of the three local species which carries a minimum length requirement. Live shrimps or plastic imitations appeal to all three.

Minimum legal length for spotted seatrout is 12 inches.

BLACK DRUM — These hug the bottom in deeper water in Pine Island Sound. Maitchua Pass and Buchoe Beach areas. Although they like shrimp, live or dead, they can also be tempted with cut bait. Use enough weight on the line to take the bait near the bottom as some of the larger drum are rather lazy.

since last August and now has several good classes. She uses more unisex exercises in the coed classes to stand of ballet movements she frequently uses in women's classes. "I wanted them to know they were welcome. So many of them don't identify with exercise classes. They are more used to health or working out with weights. One of my male students told me, 'This is all the work-out I'll ever need.'"

Reed Toney has been taking exercises from Madge for the last eight to nine weeks because he wanted to tone-up and improve his lifestyle. "I wanted to put more life into my years," he said. "The only program he had been following up until this time was a 'lack of self-discipline program,'" he says.

He thinks it's an excellent overall fitness program without the risk of straining or tearing a ligament as in other exercise programs such as Taekwondo. He says Madge's program is flexible enough that you can add more stress by working harder. "I've never exercised as many muscles in so short a time," he says.

Although Madge has exercised most of her adult life, she also had a weight problem after the birth of her second child. "I had 36 pounds to lose and I did it between January and April with lots of exercise, carrots and celery." She tells her students it will take a

month to get back into shape for every year they have been inactive.

So many people have told her what a difference it has made in their life, getting punched from her classes. "That's why I'm here. It's fun and most importantly rewarding," she says. ■

## Pat Shank

Pat Shank just turned 50 and cleared another hurdle — the Festival of the Islands 10K race. "I made it in one hour and ten minutes," the aquatics instructor says proudly. "I didn't see any other Sanibel women in that age category out there."

She started training for her first ever race six weeks ago. "I had gotten up to five miles, but I just had to finish to prove I could do it," she says. She was required to run a mile and a half in 12 minutes when she was a Jackie Sorensen aerobic instructor and she took her exercises in the city pool have kept her limber.

She faced another challenge when she was 40 after the birth of her fifth child, 13 years after the fourth.

"I weighed 187 pounds, had teenagers, children in elementary school, a new baby and no energy," she says.

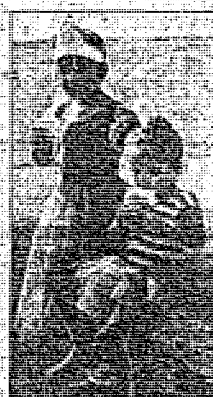


## An Island Halloween
