Sanibel sticks to its guns

In the face of heavy public opposition, Sanibel City Council has decided to stick to its guns on the melaleuca eradication program.

In a 4-1 vote, and before a packed hall of property owners, the council reaffirmed its policy to banish the pesky pink tree (*Melaleuca quinquenervia*) from the island by 1988.

Out of more than a dozen members of the public who spoke, only one, island naturalist Mark "Bird" Westall, came out in favor of the city's eradication program. Most of those who voiced an opinion wanted to be left to their own devices and left the city a action was an infringement on their right to privacy.

Though the program is already on the books, and money earmarked in the budget, a 272-name petition seeking repeal of the law prompted the council to take a second look at it and at the same time give the public a chance to air their views.

Many people prize the exotic trees, alias paper mulberries, as symbols for the island, and the fear they offer and fear they would take years to replace.

But the council last summer signed the death warrant.

for more than 1,200 such trees identified on Sanibel — 1,000 on people's yards, the rest on undeveloped land — and set up a program to banish them over a five-year period. The pink tree is a major threat to other native species.

Under the city's program, trees will be labeled as "noxious" by the city — free of charge until

1988.

After that date, the city can go in and remove those not voluntarily offered for removal and charge the owner for the cost. In case of removal, they may place a ban on the property for the next five years.

Attorney Tom Cipriani, representing Jimmie Cipriani, who started the petition, said there was no proof that

melaleuca was capable of draining natural wetlands, according to a report at the Florida Division of Forestry's metropolitan symposium in 1980.

"Mr. Cipriani really questions whether it is possible to eradicate melaleuca. Will we see his trees cut down which have been there for 20 years?" he asked.

Said Jenny Newswanger, "which to remove melaleuca from her property before she could be forced to develop

men permit to put a house on it, said, "No one should force you to remove vegetation from your land which you have paid for."

Ed Koured said every tree which grows on Sanibel spreads its seeds. "There is not a tree I know that doesn't propagate itself on other people's land."

"I think the council has the right of the city," he said. "I think the council has the right of the city has obliged itself to trying to get rid of them. The city has got to be nothing but a monolith of expense because somebody wants to stick their nose into the citizen's way of doing things," he said.

Dr. V. Bach of Clates-sur-Mer said people should not be afraid of the "hairs" of the melaleuca, but one of its "virtues" is that it has no known faults.

The new ROGO:
Even the losers

Too had the Sure deodorant company wasn't in Mackenzie Hall doing a little filming Monday.

With their catch slogan, "Raise your hand — if you're Sure!" a cameraman could have had his pick of views from the almost 2,000 times a planning commission's hand was raised.

What the commissioners was a planning session in�ating the city's newest Rate of Growth Ordinance.

Like navigating an unfamiliar course in the dark, six commissioners groped their way through the new rules, questioning the procedure at every step until comfortable little bubblyholes were found in the new dawning light.

But what was most enlightening to the commissioners is that none of the 22 people who had wanted single family houses, but were denied a ROGO allocation, nor any of the 16 multifamily developers, who also didn't receive ROGO units, actually objected to the new procedure.

The sequelence on the single-family home side is due largely to ROGO's new disclaimer — all those who didn't get ROGO units this time will receive priority next time around (in March). With that new ROGO year just starting then, all will receive city permission to build.

The process to consider single-family homes was on Monday, as commissioners had 60 units to work with this period, of which 20 were units reserved for below market housing every year. Since there were no BMB applications, commissioners decided to include those 20 into the available pot for single family and multifamily units. But of the 60, 31 had to be given to multifamily developers, because the new law reads a minimum of 45 units yearly must be devoted to the developers, and 15 units given to far, far, that meant 29 units could be awarded to single family homes.

In another fast decision commissioners voted to give back six units that had not been picked up from July's allocation. That is, six people who received a

The vegetation
crackdownCouncil gets tough
over law violations

Crackdown on developers who destroy vegetation may be on the way following a debate by the city council Tuesday.

Councilwoman Louise Johnson says there is nothing to stop them from cutting trees and taking later. "In at least one part of the city, they really disregard our vegetation standards and our laws," she said.

She wondered whether a fine or "something that makes it less palatable" to clear vegetation was the answer.

Mayor Mike Klein agreed, saying "it was an established point on Sanibel that you do it first, then will be a big fuss, then you get it over with."

"From my observation, we have definitely seen when the contractors come in [city hall] saying 'We want to do this' and say they have cut out there they are paying. None of them have ever really suffered. The problem is, the damage is already done. I would like some mechanism where the guy with the chainsaw knows what he can do before he starts the thing up."

Johnson opened the discussion during acceptance of a right of way from James Foley which is a condition of a development permit allowing him to subdivide a parcel on Piney Point Road. Foley's Sanibel Landscaping Company has eight single-family lots.

Site said 40-50 trees had been cut down and laid on shrubbery. "This continues to happen because some developers feel it is cheaper to go in, clear and replace the trees."

But trees were not always transplanted properly, and many would die, she said. Those that lived would take several years to recover.

Barry Glynn, enforcement officer, said he put a stop work order on the subdivision following a complaint about vegetation violation on Oct. 31. "I observed several trees that had been destroyed lying on the side." The order was lifted after the contractors agreed to come up with a vegetation plan for the vegetation Committee.

City Manager Bernie Murphy did not agree that stop

Vacating public land called "bad policy"

A developer who wanted the city to vacate 130 feet of right of way so he could make a better site plan, was turned down Tuesday because the city council felt there was no benefit to the community.

Council won't return easement either

A bid by islander Paul Howe to have an unused six-foot utility easement returned to several property owners in Coquina Drive could result in thousands of similar requests, Mayor Mike Klein said Tuesday. Howe wants the city council to pass a resolution of distance for the easement, the result of which would affect other houses, and according to Public Works Director Gary Price all the utilities have okayed the idea.

But Councilman Francis Bailey was against it. "We might be giving up something we might need in the future."

Klein said the council ought to consider the consequences, in view of the number of people who could follow suit.

Said Howe, "I think I have the right to have clear

title to my land. It is an encumbrance."

"And you bought it knowing it was there," commented Councilman Fred Valin. "I don't think there is an absolute duty of the city to approve. I can't say how we can turn down others if we set a precedent."

Price agreed. "If we have a lot of requests of this type, it could be an awful burden to process. It takes time for us and the utilities. The utilities don't need it, but at the same time I don't think a cloud on the title is sufficient for the city to do this, but I don't know that I have any firm recommendation."

The ordinance was declared to have had its first hearing, with a second and final hearing, scheduled for Dec. 6.

The council decided, by a 52-vote with Councilman Bill Haygroup and Francis Bailey dissenting, not to vacate the land, even though it would have alleviated the city from its maintenance and liability.

Planner Jean Ialey says Spiers Smith has the square footage for six residences, whether the land is vacated or not. Not having the land would take away from the flexibility of the common right of way.

The planning commission had no objection to the idea and so far as it was concerned, it would allow more flexibility of design. It doesn't appear to be any use to the city as it sits there right now," she added.

Spiers Smith said the idea was to create a new cul-de-sac and move access away from Periwinkle. "It involves vacating a portion of the road that doesn't exist today."

Elmer Silbert, representing property owners in Sanibel Estates, said there may be the acreage for six lots. There might be a reasonable number to build because of "the lie of the land."

And islander Fritz Stoppelbein said, "I just don't feel that we should give up any public land unless the public gets a benefit from it."

Councilman Fred Valin agreed. "Vacation of public rights of way is a bad policy."



Sand Pointe request promised a denial

If it was a for an act of courtesy, the city council this week would have flatly denied on first reading Sand Pointe Condominium Association's request to ultimately rent their condos for a week at a time.

Instead, bowing to the association's attorney William Haverfield's request to be allowed to withdraw the item after client consultation, councilmen promised they will deny it if it comes up for a second and final hearing December 20.

The city councilmen did not expend much energy in coming sympathetic tally for the association, saying their problem was self-made and approval of the request would severely violate the city's land use plan.

Sand Pointe Condominium Association several years ago voted by a majority of the 45 unit-owners to amend its documents to allow weekly rental — strictly forbidden by the city's rules "Units of high impact" or those rented for periods of less than a month must be given city council approval and have 1,500 square feet of open space in the grounds for each unit. Sand Pointe now provides 2,690 square feet per unit. A city notice of viola-

tion for the rentals was sent to each condo owner on May 10 1982.

Haverfield told councilmen that not only did Sand Pointe's developers mislead its buyers, but that the buyers had no knowledge in their minds that that the rentals would be permitted for less than a month.

The lawyer conceded the development "had a long and sordid history" but added "the city could have done a better job of putting people on notice. I think that is how a lot of people fell into the trap."

Now "in order to make a good faith effort to resolve the problem" Haverfield said the association wishes to buy a three-acre parcel of land across the street and down a little way to help provide the open space needed for the weekly rentals.

The problem the city has noted is that the land is zoned residential not resort, and that even with the addition of the three acres, each unit would still only have 5,842 square feet against the 7,500 requirement.

Haverfield said that since the development has changed hands, there is no one to file suit against for the breach in salesmanship and the owners "are unhappy — they got less than what they thought they had."

Councilmen expressed willingness to leave Johnson's summer "to take residential land change it to resort, to accommodate rules changed by a condominium association in mid stream."

A decision whether to hire a lawyer to fight the city on increased garbage collection rates will headline a special meeting to be held by CASI, the Condominium Association of Sanibel, Inc.

CASI vigorously opposed the changing of garbage rates from commercial to higher residential rates late last year, but the city did not accept its arguments. The next CASI general meeting, this season, has a discussion against an attorney to institute proceedings against the city of Sanibel and Sanibel Disposal Inc. because of discriminatory refuse collection rates."

The news release distributed by CASI to its members also asks "an opinion from your association as to whether it may participate financially as an estimated cost of \$10,000 to \$15,000 in legal fees." The release is signed by CASI president Robert Martin, vice president Warren Hyde.

The CASI meeting will be held Tuesday November 29 at 2:30 pm at the Sanibel Surfside Club House 610 Donax Avenue □







refuge report

Manatees return to area waters


November in Southwest Florida means the return of cooler weather, winter residents and manatees. As air and water temperatures decrease, local populations of West Indian manatees or sea cows (Trichechus manatus) begin to move up the Caloosahatchee River and into the Orange River. They congregate in the waters of the Caloosahatchee up to the Fort Myers power plant operated by the Florida Power and Light Company. Up to 271 manatees have been counted in and around the discharge canal making the site the largest winter gathering of manatees in Florida.

Unlike many marine mammals, manatees are adapted to tropical and subtropical climates and have very little tolerance to low temperatures. If exposed to water temperatures less than 18°-19°-34°-60°F for prolonged periods manatees may cease to eat, become inac-

tive, and develop increased susceptibility to disease. Extreme cold weather can lead to increased manatee mortality.

Winter aggregations of manatees provide an excellent opportunity to observe this unique species that may be difficult to observe at other times of the year. Unfortunately, the large concentrations in relatively small areas may mean increased risk of manatees being injured or killed by collisions with motor boats. To provide the animals with some protection, the state has established slow speed and idle speed zones at most wintering sites from November 16th to March 31st. These speed zones are effective within 100 yards of the 175 bridge at Beautiful Island, up the Caloosahatchee 1 1/2 miles past the Orange River. From that point up the Caloosahatchee River to the power plant is a slow speed zone. In addition, the Orange River is an idle speed zone. Signs are posted to remind boaters and the regulations are enforced.

If you are interested in observing manatees, you probably will have better luck from the shore than in a boat. Boat motors tend to frighten the shy animals, disrupt their behavior, and often cause them to scatter.

categories — quality of site design, compatibility, and community enhancement — which has to be considered. For each development, the representatives were seated around the commission, and then each of the eight questions has scored in a separate vote, during which time the developer could choose to comment.

Fourteen developments in all were seeking 32 units, when only 31 could be allocated. Because two, Tortuga and Sanibel Cottages, Mariner Properties projects had each received four units already this year, they were out of the running for more units, according to the new procedure.

The two of the available 31 units were quickly awarded to St. Croix Condos and Dodrill's project because each received a non-beneficial use unit in other words, for every condominium project starting on cleared land, the first is considered a non-beneficial use unit, and all other remaining are deemed to have been used, a lower priority.)

During the subjective questioning period, the project rated number one was Captain's Tarpion Key project, and project number two was Ray Fenlon's Ferry Landing.

When both subjective and the planning department's objective scores were added together, the top two projects of the 11 considered were Captain's Tarpion Resort Beach Club and Captain's Shell Island Beach Club.

Of the 29 units awarded, four went to each of those projects — and in order of scoring, four to Ferry Lan-

ding, four to Frieda Murphy, two to CROW, three to St. Croix, one to Balki to complete their duplex, three for High Tide Condominiums, four for Standard Associates, four for the Dahlmans project, and four for the Dodrill development.

Captain's head Keith Trowbridge, who "brought an all-day dog" to go to bat for his project, argued humorously at times with the commission for more points. When he felt his island compatibility score should be increased, Trowbridge pointed out that in his project, "there has been no paving as you can see around city hall."

When a public bird-watching tower he had proposed for Tarpion Beach Key won him no points, because the structure would have caused building permit, Trowbridge predicted newspaper headlines in the Sanibel Planning Commission's Voices Public Bird-watching Tower on Private Land."

One serious complaint Trowbridge made, backed up by other multifamily developers, was the unfairness of pitting older 1980 and 1981 projects, which were designed against the old ROGO, against the new rules when they had to be re-submitted. Trowbridge deemed the state-approved condominium documents.

Commissioner Simon conceded the objection "was a good point — one that the council might want to act on." But at the moment, Simon added, "We have enough of a struggle trying to interpret these rules."

Any applicant for a ROGO must be until next Monday to appeal.)

Seven topics comprise COTI's annual agenda

Critical issues facing Sanibel and Captiva residents will be discussed at the COTI (Committee of the Islands) annual meeting Dec. 8 at 10 a.m. in the parish hall of St. Michael and All Angels Church.

According to COTI Chairman Fred Metcalfe, there are seven important topics to be brought before the meeting, and it is imperative that citizens become knowledgeable about these activities. Intensity of use is one of the topics. COTI's proposed ordinance — now before the city council — to regulate the number of persons per unit, will be explained.

COTI has also been intensely concerned and made proposals regarding more adequate means of waste disposal on the islands. A third topic for discussion is ROGO's recent crisis and subsequent revisions, particularly since the original Rule of Growth Ordinance was adopted by COTI.

Another issue which a great deal of interest has been expressed is the proposal now before the city council for the funding of below market rate housing. The causeway acquisition, the Emergency Management Plan, and the 1984 city council election, in which three seats will be vacant, will complete the discussions.

Metcalfe points out that the outcome of these issues will affect island residents.

Alice Kyllo

When anyone calls Alice Kyllo a turkey — she feels complimented.

Alice knows the label is applied by some when she most stubbornly defends the island against development.

In fact, Alice has long been the Commander in Chief in her own self-declared "Turkey Wars" — those she mounts against users and abusers of Sanibel.

Besides a sign of rank and symbol of a defender of the leafy faith, Alice Kyllo also thinks the turkey is a nice bit of nature who gets it's own holiday every year.

Alice's love of animals was nurtured on the Wisconsin farm she was raised on, by her Norwegian parents and with 12 brothers and sisters — so this long-time islander wants to keep Sanibel as farm-like, fresh, and continuing with life savers.

Indeed, to attain that atmosphere, Alice Kyllo suggests cooking for the Thanksgiving Holiday be efficient and coordinated, so that the day can be crowned by a walk in the refuge or on the shore.

Turkeys United! says Alice Kyllo — and have a great holiday. □

Turkey Day Menu (for 8 or 9 around the table)

- 25 lb. roast turkey (preferably Butterball with dressing)
- Mashed potatoes
- Home-made turkey gravy
- Fruit salad of your choice
- Candied sweet potatoes
- Peas and carrots
- Nuts and mint
- Pumpkin Pie with whipped cream
- Rolls
- Cranberry Sauce
- Homemade kumquat preserves

The day before Thanksgiving, Alice suggests you make the pies (using your favorite recipe, although she prefers the canned pumpkin pie mix with attached instructions), also defrost the turkey, and fill it with a dressing of bread cubes, celery, apples, onions and melted butter. Put the stuffed turkey in the refrigerator overnight. Also, the day before, cook the cranberries as well as prepare candied sweet potatoes, and roll out the rolls.

Early on Thanksgiving, about 6 a.m., pour melted butter over the turkey, and salt, and pop it into the oven. Leave a cover on the turkey until the last half-hour of cooking; so that the top browns. Peel the potatoes and prepare them, as well as the fruit salad, using your favorite natural ingredients. Set the table. If you are using frozen dinner rolls, start thawing them now.

Hours later, when the turkey is tender (from 11 a.m. to noon), remove the roaster lid and put in the sweet potatoes and rolls to warm. At the same time cook the white potatoes for mashing and the peas and carrots. Mash the potatoes, then put out the fruit salad.

Remove the turkey from the oven at the prescribed time, and slice it. Use the brown juice in the bottom of the roaster to make a gravy, by thickening it in a pan with a little flour, water, and seasoning. You can also use the turkey giblets, cut up small, if you want a giblet gravy.

If you are a maker of preserves from island fruits, then serve a side dish of tangy kumquat preserves with the turkey. It makes the meal an island treat.

Seat your guests and serve. □



Repairs overdue for Periwinkle bicycle paths

To Island Reporter: The city of Sanibel is building new bicycle paths a project everyone will applaud. It is now possible to bike way up Sanibel Captiva Road, Casa Ybel and North Periwinkle Drive and very comfortable streets to ride. These paths are well constructed smooth with beautiful overpasses over canals and ditches and gentle turns through the foliage.

All this is very audible and enjoyable but how about the old bicycle paths? Whoever rides his bike on the path along Periwinkle Drive may be in for some unexpected surprises.

The path has many cuts that make you lose balance, uneven places and is on a rainy day obstructed by many pools. The latter gives you the choice to either go on the asphalt of the road with a chance to be occupied up by a car or truck, or to venture into the water pool and get hopelessly stuck mud if from your own tires then from automobile rushing by at 1/4 inch clearance.

Or you can try to bike over the undeveloped land on the other side of the path. Here are lots of obstacles hinder the way: broken bottles threaten to cut your tires and overhangs, horny branches, and many other things that obstruct the path itself in certain places and if two bicyclists are passing at such a spot, one of the riders may have to stop or end up with a painfully scratched arm or face.

"You have declared them noxious, but you don't offer to replace them," she added.

Though he had none of his property John Friedlund felt he were "being forced to accept the city's spend no money in this area." If nothing else is going to start up we would be a rare if it now," he said.

Other citizens spoke in the same vein, but on the other side of the fence was Mark Westall who perched the creation of a "monoculture" if melaleuca were allowed to get a stronger foothold on the island. This would destroy the wide variety of food and habitat for the diverse wildlife on Sanibel. Everyone is interested in his own property, nobody has talked about the island as a wildlife," he said.

"If we don't get it now we are going to have melaleuca and Brazilian pepper everywhere and for those people who come here because they love the birds and the wildlife, we are just not going to have it."

So far as citizens rights were concerned, his view was that a person did not have the right to have a tree that would interfere with the property as a whole.

Bill Webb, chairman of the Vegetation Committee which is behind the eradication, spoke to those who feel they have the right to grow anything they wish on their land: there was the public health safety and welfare to consider. No one has challenged the city's mandatory removal of Brazilian pepper he pointed out.

work orders were lifted too easily. "I don't take issuing one lightly or lifting it lightly," he said. In every case rest, tuition or some agreement was accomplished he added.

"It's a sad thing for me when we believe it is going

to bring a 9 foot high, 18-month old tree and raising a jar of more than eight million seeds produced from one branch of a melaleuca. Webb a forestry expert, says he has no reason to believe Sanibel will escape the fate of melaleuca covered areas on the mainland where native plants do not survive and fauna fauna is impoverished. Now is the time to act before the melaleuca population gets out of hand."

But Cipriani, who planted melaleuca as a buffer 16 years ago says there are no more now than there were when he put them in. "Ninety nine percent of them on this island have been planted, they have not jumped from one man's land to another."

Jerry Muenzen, of Periwinkle Trail Park, which houses a large number of melaleuca in its island, is in a tree eradication program as a condition of a development permit he received. "We have removed more than 300 of the 800 trees," he said. "If anyone wishes we will show them how to do it, how much it costs and what it looks like afterwards. We would be glad to help the city."

But one aspect which had not been discussed was what would happen to the stumps left in the ground. Being left with a stump to remove is their own expense, something that worried many people. Muenzen said. Nothing could be planted while the stump was still there.

Well if it takes a 25-foot dedication or roadway to tell me we have this wholesale problem with our vegetation we are not communicating properly. This disturbance is not good," he said.

City Attorney David La Croix said he would look at the codes to see whether there was a way to ensure native vegetation would be protected.

The blackout of news from Grenada

A copy of the following letter to Press Agent Reagan was submitted to Island Reporter for publication.

As a concerned citizen I am deeply troubled about our involvement in Grenada. The purpose of this letter is to present one aspect of the affair — namely the handling of the press. No press representative was permitted on the Island for the first two or three days after the invasion. It is my understanding that even at this late stage only a small group of correspondents are allowed to visit Grenada and then only under the close and controlled supervision of military authorities. Such a restriction of the press is in my opinion outrageous and intolerable. The only reason advanced by your spokesman is that the government is concerned with the personal safety of the members of the press. Given the record of the press in previous conflicts the explanation is sincere and honest, then the government is naive — dangerously naive.

I hope you will agree with me that the cornerstone of an open society is a free press. He who seeks to control the press controls freedom for all of us. Whatever explanations are advanced to support our activity in Grenada they will not be accepted so long as the press is denied the opportunity to probe for the truth. I urge that you immediately remove those restrictions that prevent the press from performing its vital function in Grenada.

City Manager Bernie Murphy said some thought could be given to the idea of removing stumps and replacing the melaleuca by the city but not under this year's budget. A total of \$54,000 was budgeted this year for noxious plant control.

Public Works Director Gary Price said priority would be given to the wild lands and fringe area before the city's own land.

Councilman Fred Vatin, who wanted to postpone a decision until the "financial and practical implications" of the plan were known, said stump removal could "raise the cost to the city from \$54,000 to several hundred thousand a year." "We are beginning to talk about much more than we can casually commit ourselves to expending." He wanted to draw a distinction between "managed" and undeveloped areas and have a chance to rethink.

But the other council members followed Councilwoman Louise Johnson's lead in moving to reaffirm the policy. Seconding her Bill Hagerup said: "We decided we would give it a try for a year, tackle the critical areas and then reassess it. Melaleuca has a heavy potential for damage to the entire island. It is worth a try to come up with a solution. \$34,000 will be well spent and if nothing else, get a feel for what can be done in ridding the island of melaleuca."





Ten years ago this week, the *Island Reporter* was launched with a pledge of honesty and fairness and a commitment to the interests of the island community.

The new weekly newspaper was to be produced by islanders for islanders about islanders and island issues, and would provide a mouthpiece for the community's opinions on many issues, paramount among them being that of home rule.

The line-up of publishers reflected the island-style aims of the newspaper: Porter Goss, Duane White, Don Whitehead, Fred Vailin and Ed Underhill, with Whitehead as editor.

"The *Island Reporter*," said Whitehead, "has no commitments to any special interests, other than serving the interest of the community through improved communication. Our columns are open to all."

The offices of the paper were — and still are — in Periwinkle Place shopping Center, though various locations within the center have been occupied.

Volume I, No. 1 of the *Island Reporter* announced on its front page a town meeting to discuss home rule, an explosion of condo building permits from \$7 million in 1972 to \$29 million in the first half of 1973. Page one also had a lighter side, with Song of the Sea assistant manager Pat Slater as a stand-in for Warner Brothers' *The Dark Tower* being filmed on the island; Wildlife refuge manager Robert Barber leaving for Atlanta.

The paper also carried the first of a series on those who govern, beginning with "What does the county do for the island?"

A Sanibel home for \$29,900?

The first advertisement for Sanibel Homes appeared in early editions of the *Island Reporter*. It offered a home and lot in Sanibel Highlands for \$29,900.

Sanibel Homes owner Bill Grey, who is to build 15 homes in the subdivision and has built around 300 on the island since that time, "We really wanted to build moderate-cost," says his wife, Doris Grey, who also works with the family business, "but with flood and density regulations this becomes an impossible." Their average home now, without a lot, costs \$80,000.

The company survived two mortariums on the island while growth plans were being decided upon. "At one point we had to move the business off the island for 18 months," says Doris, "but we came back because this is where we lived and wanted to build homes."

today and from that small pot they launched a weekly newspaper that has captured more than 40 awards in a decade and which later sold for the equivalent sum of a fleet of Rolls Royces.

The *Island Reporter* had, however, been named first. When Valton and his wife had been on staff at a Pulitzer-prize-winning newspaper and well-seasoned reporters and photo-journalists from UPI, the *Miami Herald*, and other respected dailies — plus it had lured a few rub reporter into the journalistic world beyond.

It all began with an idea, hatched among three former CIA executives and two of their friends.

The three from the CIA — Don Whitehead, Fred Valton, and Jim Corning — had taken early retirement from the agency while they were still relatively young and energetic, to pursue interests in other fields.

Since all enjoyed the tropical climate and the lure of the sea, the three in the early 1970s began a boat-renting venture Island Boat Rentals — but what they got was a good drenching based on the unrelenting costs of endless boat and engine repairs. After almost two years of planning, the rental business washed out to sea.

The idea of starting a weekly outlet on Sanibel then emerged among the group and they incorporated into the group islanders Duane Whitehead and Ed Underhill, a man with editorial experience having once owned the *Corning (New York) Leader*. Each came up with a sum that was combined into a \$55,000 cash pot for first year operations.

But the decision to go ahead with the pub cast on was not without some what ad-hoc market survey was carried out by management-expert Fred Valton who was used to "figuring everything up to the nearest mull on the CIA."

In the spring of 1973 Valton visited island businessees; he thought might advertise with the *Island Reporter* — and found all were eager if not hungry for a good vehicle to present their advertising. At the same time that Fred was making the business rounds, as the appointed *Island Reporter* editor, he met Don Whitehead who accepted the position of editor. Whitehead, long a local journalist, then traveled to Washington to tour IBM and Compugraphics for a little first-hand knowledge on the art of getting a newspaper out.

The next decision the group made was to farm out for a year the paper's typesetting to the *Cape Coral Breeze*, which at that time did not own *The Islander* newspaper.

Then, with production offices packed in Fred Valton's garage, and editorial in Don Whitehead's house, the first issue of the *Island Reporter* appeared on Nov. 16, 1973. With a run of about 5,000 papers, the issue was 32 pages, with front-page headlines that read, "Cape Coral Heats Debate," "Town Meet on Home Rule," and "Grand Gulf Hurricane."

Although the paper had 60,000 m/s of advertising to editorial, the first issue featured one mock classified ad that read, "Looking for some Asses" (Milt) Mott catching about the little classified was that it was strategically placed in the middle of a large blank page. The page soon filled up. As Don Whitehead says, "The paper progressed rather progressively."

In fact, according to Valton, the *Island Reporter* was in the black within the first several months and \$20,000 of the original investment sat in the bank untouched. By the end of the year the newspaper showed a net profit of \$1,000.

Mark Twombly was the first fulltime reporter hired. He later became editor. One of his first stories centered on the Bowman's Beach mudlily controversy. To get the bare facts, Twombly joined Jim Underhill in the buff.

"At the time the newspaper emerged, so did the feel among the islanders for incorporation," Valton says. The Sanibel islanders, he says, thought, "Let's get a hold of our destiny." According to Whitehead, there was a great deal of community involvement with the newspaper — and it's a happy coincidence that community interest and involvement in incorporation occurred at the same time as the newspaper.

"In a sense the *Island Reporter* served as catalyst to

Amisland of new ventures

It was an accident or hand of fate that led to the birth of the *Island Reporter* ten years ago. It began on the back of a boat, buying live lobsters, and many times out of pocket. It's a story that needs to be told.

In its first issue on Nov. 16, 1973, the newspaper listed many many new business that were getting underway. Some, like the *Island Reporter* flourished. Others, sadly did not.

Within four months *Island Reporter* publishers were boasting circulation in excess of 3,000 a week. They had to add a kid on the block, as the paper had just turned a year old. Along with the business boom, an "explosion" of new firms on Sanibel including five in Punta Ybel Plaza, near the Lighthouse. They included Mary Aleck's Saloon de Bellas, Anne Boland's Needles Eye a bar and tackle shop by Bruce Chaplin; Snack Shack II by Jeanne Hopwood.

Who lost the original is a tornado, but the first year of the *Island Reporter* was a success. The Lighthouse also survived by rocky coast. A package store, B & L Liquors, managed by John "Willie" Williams and Robert Pratt's real estate office, next to Hunter's Market, with Don Russell, former owner of the Daley Queen, working out of the realty office.

Periwinkle was a hive of activity with many shops opening, including Jonathan Bourne's Cheshire Cat, and Kona's Kettle, and the Beach House, owned by Bob and Ernie Gauthier. Valhalla with Scandinavian imports, managed by Bernard and Irene Tool. A Drey's tobacco and news; and the Wren Family's Sis of Sanibel. Nearby Watertown's Sea to Sky gift shop had a summer opening.

Conservation: The early days

Two island environmental groups were in the fledgling stage when the *Island Reporter* first appeared on the scene.

Ann Winterbottom was chairman of the six-year-old Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation which had just hired Dick Workman as its executive director. It then had 240 acres under its protective wing and was operating out of a small office on Periwinkle Way.

At the same time 150 members had begun to clear trails at a present property on Sanibel Captiva God. One of the group's biggest projects that year was removing some 175 junk cars from the island. Working with Lee County SCCF succeeded in having the cars crushed and recycling the metal.

Mada Harrison wrote the first book on "Native Trees and Shrubs for Sanibel-Captiva Landscaping" that year for SCCF and was influential in landscaping the Sanibel island with native plants.

SCCF's present 2,400 members have now preserved some 750 acres of island wetlands.

Shirley Waters and Jessie Dugger had been bandaging injured animals on the island for five to six years before CROW (Care and Rehabilitation of Wildlife) was incorporated in November 1972. The two women had a desire to provide a safe and secure haven for injured birds and animals to recuperate until they could be released back into the wild.

CROW now has a permanent home on Sanibel Captiva Road and a full-time director and two assistants.

mainland backed by the *Sentinel Star* Corporation, the company that had just purchased the *Island Reporter* also had it for sale after the sale. In the summer of 1978 the *Island Reporter* was sold to the Chicago Tribune Company for an undisclosed sum, which was a settlement characterized by all involved as powerful.

Why sell the *Island Reporter* after five years of success? Answers Whitehead, "It was sold because some of us were getting older and didn't want to indefinitely continue the heavy responsibility — and because we got a good offer."

What's Fred Valton's role in the selling is one of the joys of strategic naïvete. The five-man group of investors had been receiving unsolicited offers to buy the paper from local people and large newspaper groups, one of which was the New York Times Company. When the offers fell under a serious consideration by the group, they found they had no means to gauge the selling price or experience in negotiating such an offer. They approached Jim Wood, former chairman of the Chicago Tribune Company who writers on the island, for help in setting a price.

After advising the group Wood immediately rang up the Tribune Company and suggested it might be interested in buying the successful weekly. The company at the time had a drive to buy worthwhile weeklies in Florida. In short order Wood phoned the group back and got an offer. After his company had the chance to price in the paper, Wood says, "Finally the *Island Reporter* was sold to the Tribune Company owners of the *Orlando Sentinel Star* whose subsidiary Sunbelt Publishing Company controls the paper."

The change in ownership reflected the *Island Reporter's* mature status in a city that had been born and was stable, says Whitehead. Commenting that the paper's circulation at the paper he helped found five years ago and the few years before, he thinks the social and political climate of the island has changed so dramatically since 1973 that no newspaper could pursue the same editorial policies that we did — it has changed in the sense that, first of all, that we were operating in a climate in which the city was new development intense and controversy very prevalent.

"The situation today is completely different," says Whitehead. "The city is firmly established, development is more or less under control and hundreds of new people have moved onto the island."

Nevertheless, adds the former editor the *Island Reporter* continues to provide a very important vehicle for community communication.

While growth on the island was slowing down those years the *Island Reporter* kept growing until around all the high in the sense of more than 100 pages a day were produced. At the time the editorial staff of the paper ran to seven fulltimers.

But there were some failures — the paper's effort to launch a cable news channel for islanders fizzled out, and the effort Whitehead and Valton took in late 1978 to start another weekly on the south Fort Myers

Discover the thrill of releasing fish

As those who have fished Florida waters for many years are aware the populations of many saltwater species are becoming depleted for various reasons. One way recreational anglers can help ensure that there will be fish to catch in the future is to carefully release all fish not needed for personal use.

Start now that more released fish, if handled properly, will survive and those that have become the accepted standard for professional bass anglers in tournaments throughout the country. Bass boats are equipped with live-wells so the catch can be kept alive until checked in and then released.

Recently GatorHalt's competition with Pace's Place Tackle Shop Fort Myers staged a saltwater tournament featuring trout and redfish. Ninety anglers participated in the tournament which \$3 of entry money for each entrant to Florida League of Anglers in recognition of that organization's efforts to try to ensure a continuing supply of tournament raw material in Florida's waters.

It turned out that more than half of the anglers were bass fishing devotees who had never fished for salt water species before. When one boat pulled up to the dock the captain asked the judge to check in his catch quickly so the rest could be released.

The captain of course asked the spectators to clear an area. The angler carefully took his trout and reds from the live-well in his boat. The judge checked the catch and the angler leaned over the side of the boat, moved the fish back and forth in the water for a few minutes then turned them loose.

There were gaps of disbelief from many lookers who apparently had never heard of releasing tournament-quality fish. When the judge was complete, the last winning trout was in the released catch swimming around to provide sport for another angler another time.

A few months ago in this column, we detailed some methods for releasing fish and some precautions to ensure their survival. We received an interesting letter from a reader in Winter Park the following week.

I have been vacationing on either Sanibel or Captiva Islands for the past fifteen summers and as a result,

take an interest in the fishing conditions as reported in your column each week. I was particularly taken by your series of comments on releasing fish which you were not going to consume on the dinner table.

"During my vacation this week, I had a bright idea. I planned to catch a trout which I would catch my first legal trout of about 18 inches in length.

"I carefully released the hook, held him for a moment under water and released him as soon as he struggled. Well I got a big kick out of that instant and as a result did not keep a single fish during the entire week."

"My biggest thrill, however, was when I caught a snook which weighed something over two pounds. My first thought was 'no live-well I suppose I would have to release this hook slowly moving him back and forth in the water and when he struggled furiously I released him I jumped up and down I ke a k again."

"Thanks for the idea - Keep up the good work - I only hope more people take your advice. It is a real thrill to catch a fish and release it."

For those who are inexperienced in releasing fish a few brief reminders:

- Don't squeeze the fish when removing the hook. Vital organs may be damaged.
- Don't damage the gills. This could mean almost certain death.
- Don't tear a hook out of the fish's mouth or flesh. Remove it with pliers if it is not deeply hooked. Otherwise cut the line close to the hook as possible.
- Don't use stainless steel hooks for the above reason. Other hooks will disintegrate in a short time in the fish's body.
- Use barbless hooks. Anglers report very little difficulty with numbers of fish caught and it is seldom necessary to touch the fish to release it.
- Don't slam a fish on a hard surface. Shock can kill.

Try catch and release if you haven't already done so.

You too will find it as much of a thrill as catching the fish.

fishing report

REDFISH

Anglers at the fishing pier had a flurry of redfish activity last week as a school passed through. Most were the "rat" reds about two to four pounds although a few anglers reported some running six or more pounds. During the fall and winter season most of the reds will be hugging the mangroves and along shell bars at high tides, they find their favorite food - small crustaceans. Anglers baiting with shrimp or casting jigs to shell bars should get action. Minimum legal length for redfish is 12 inches.



SEATROUT

These are found throughout the area and the spotted variety are good size at this time of the year. They usually feed over the grass flats at high tides or in deeper water during low tides or when the waters are wind whipped. Live shrimp or artificial baits both bring results. Minimum legal length for spotted seatrout is 12 inches.



CREVALL JACK

For fun and fast action cast into a school of jacks as they splash through the area waters. Some of these are hefty and really give the angler a tug-of-war when hooked. They will chase almost any moving object - live or artificial. They are not desirable for "food" so best released.



LADYFISH

On a par with the jacks for action although not as hefty, the ladyfish are plentiful inshore. Like their relative the bonefish ladyfish put up a good fight but are not good for eating. Return them to the water where they are one of the items on the snook's diet.



Discover the thrill of releasing fish

As those who have fished Florida waters for many years are aware, the populations of many saltwater species are becoming depleted for various reasons. One way to help maintain and increase is to ensure that there will be fish to catch in the future is to carefully release all fish not needed for personal use.

Stud es show that most released fish, if handled properly will survive and catch and release has become the accepted standard for professional bass anglers in tournaments throughout the country. Bass boats are equipped with live wells so the catch can be kept alive until checked for release.

Recently, Gatorfish in cooperation with Pace's Place Tackle Shop, Fort Myers, staged a saltwater tournament featuring trout and redfish. Ninety anglers participated in the tournament in which \$5 of each entry fee was contributed to Florida League of Anglers in recognition of that organization's efforts to try to ensure a continuing supply of tournament raw material in Florida's waters.

It turned out that more than half of the anglers were bass fisherman who had never fished for salt water species before. When one boat pulled up to the dock, the captain asked the judge to check in his catch quickly so the fish could be released alive.

The master of ceremonies asked the spectators to clear an area. The angler carefully took his trout and reds from the live well in his boat. The judge checked the catch and the angler leaned over the side of the boat, moved the fish around and forth in the water for a few minutes and then turned them loose.

There were gasps of disbelief from many onlookers who apparently had never heard of releasing tournament quality fish. When the entries were complete the prize winning trout was in the released catch swimming around to provide sport for another angler another time.

A few months ago in this column, we detailed some methods for releasing fish and some precautions in such an unusual situation. We received an interesting letter from a reader in Winter Park the following week:

"I have been vacationing on either Sanibel or Captiva Islands for the past fifteen summers and as a result,

take an interest in the fishing conditions as reported in your column each week. I was particularly taken by your series of comments on releasing fish which you were not going to consume on the dinner table.

"During my vacation this week I tried your ideas I guess the hardest part was when I caught my first legal trout of about 18 inches in length.

"I carefully released the fish and held it for a moment until I could get a hook and line as far as I could. Well, I got a big hook out of that instant and as a result did not keep a single fish during the entire week.

"My biggest thrill, however, was when I caught a snook which we gored something over ten pounds! My wife witnessed all this — so no fish tales! I quickly released the hook slowly moved him back and forth in the water and when he struggled furiously I released him I jumped up and down like a kid again.

"Thanks for the idea — keep up the good work — I only hope more people take your advice. It is a real thrill!"

For those who are inexperienced in releasing fish a few brief reminders:

- Don't play the fish until it is exhausted which may happen if very light line is used. Bushwhacked fish when released may become easy prey for larger predators such as sharks.
- Keep the fish in the water if at all possible while you release the hook.
- Don't squeeze the fish when removing the hook. Vital organs may be damaged.
- Avoid any damage to the gills. This could mean almost certain death.

• Don't tear a hook out of the fish's mouth or flesh. Remove it with pliers if it is not deeply hooked. Otherwise, tie the line close to the hook as possible.

• Don't use stainless steel hooks for the above reason. Other hooks will disintegrate in a short time in the fish's body.

• Use barbless hooks. Anglers report very little difference in numbers of fish caught, and it is seldom necessary to touch the fish to release it.

• Don't slam a fish on a hard surface. Shock can kill. Try catch and release if you haven't already done so. You too will find it as much of a thrill as catching the fish."

fishing report

REDFISH — Anglers at the fishing pier had a flurry of redfish activity last week as a school passed through. Most were the "fat" reds about two to four pounds although a few anglers reported some running six or more pounds. During the fall and winter season most of the reds will be hugging the mangroves and along shell bars at high tides when they find their favorite food — small crustaceans. Anglers baiting with shrimp or casting lures to these feeding areas should get action. Minimum legal length for redfish is 12 inches.



SEATROUT — These are found throughout the area and the spotted variety are good size at this time of the year.

They usually feed over the grass flats at high tides or in deeper water during low tides or when the waters are wind whipped. Live shrimp or artificial baits both bring results. Minimum legal length for spotted seatrout is 12 inches.




CREVALLA JACK — For fun and fast action, cast into a school of jacks as they splash through the areas. Some of these are hefty and really give the angler a tug-of-war when hooked. They will chase almost any moving object — live or artificial.

They are not desirable for food so best released.



LADYFISH — On a par with the jacks for action although not as hefty, the ladyfish are plentiful inshore. Like their relative, the bonefish, ladyfish put up a good fight but are not good for eating. Return them to the water where they are one of the items on the snook's diet.

The milkshake way to fitness

A 32-oz. milkshake is all that's between breakfast and bed on the first day of Captiva Caper, a semiannual event at Two Waters Inn where local and out-of-state women gather to lose a few pounds, be toned up and enlightened.

The secret lies in the ingredients that nutritionist Helen Godman has put into the high-protein drink. They are skim milk, two eggs, the juice of two oranges, one banana, a tablespoon each of wheat germ, brewer's yeast and honey, blended in a blender. The women usually have a shake in the morning, then a glass at breakfast, lunch and dinner, and the other one split between mid-morning and afternoons snack, she says.

If they are still hungry, she allows them a teaspoon of sunflower seeds and an apple before bed. A person can lose three to five pounds in three days on this diet, she says, but she doesn't recommend doing it any longer than that. Also on the first day of the spa, the women are measured, tested and oriented to their week's activities.

And, after a week of a 900-calorie a day diet, water fitness, calisthenics and yoga plus beach walks, shell craft, and fashion shows Helen offers a two-day liquid cleansing fast as a bonus.

It starts out with four ounces of grapefruit juice in the morning, and a half glass of orange juice and beef broth-squeezed over cold juice at 10 a.m. Chicken or beef bouillon is served at 1 p.m., a fruit drink at 2 p.m., and a vegetable drink at 3 p.m. such as avocados with bouillon, cucumber and parsley. Dinner is another bouillon meal and a fruit drink tops off the day at 8 p.m. Sunflower seeds and an apple again may supplement this diet.

Helen does the liquid fast herself twice a year at the fitness caper and at the spa. Helen and Boots French hold in Captiva, the homecoming. Boots is a Captiva winter resident who created the fitness caper.

"I believe in what we're doing here," Helen says. She calls her brand of nutrition a well-balanced diet of fresh fruits and vegetables. She has her own organic garden at her home in Cape Coral and a dozen papaya trees. Mangoes and papayas are good digestive aids, she says, and they blend well with many other fruits.

She first became interested in nutrition when her husband and Robert contacted bronchial pneumonia while working on a wind tunnel for the Advisory Committee for Aerodynamics during World War II. Her taking a course in dieting "broke him in" he was having difficulty recovering.

She developed a rash as a nervous reaction to the situation and went to see dermatologist Dr. J.D. Walters in Cleveland who was also a nutritionist. He started treating her husband with a diet of fresh fruits and vegetables and they both recovered.

Now that diet is a part of their lives. They run their own business and return home to Captiva for breakfast diets. They have eliminated red meat from their diet mainly because of the cost and they make their own bread. [1]
