

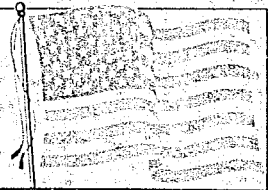

Postcard campaign supporting police chief surprises editor

A campaign of postcards supporting Sanibel Police Chief John Butler and printed for return mail to *The Islander* newspaper caught editor Cindy Chalmers by surprise. She said she has received about 50 cards which she did not solicit.

"I don't know what to do with these. I hate to give this whole thing any mere attention. I would rather let the courts handle it," she said, referring to Butler's resignation to take effect July 26, the decision of that resignation and subsequent lawsuit against the City of Sanibel.

Butler is charging that he was forced to resign because of his complaints about alleged violations of law by other city employees.

Burt Binder, a Sanibel developer who owns Biju Comedy Club, Fort Myers, said he had a thousand of the cards printed and that he would "be happy if a hundred cards came in." Binder, who has lived here a year and a half, said he wants "an

expression from people on the island." He continued: "What's good for our island is a good police department and that's what we've got. . . I think Butler has done a fine job, he's got a good department. Why dismantle it?"

Chief Butler said he heard about the printed cards from Dave Wooster at the Grog Shop, where some were placed. "I don't have any opinion about them," he stated. "As far as I'm concerned, this will all be decided in a court of law."

Wooster said he did not have the cards out on the counter "because of my business." But he said that "if anyone wants one, I'll be happy to give them one."

The cards have also been spotted at the Putting Pelican Golf Shop. Manager Robby Wilson said "I have no idea where they came from. I came in one morning and found them. They have been removed." □

Jailbait!

Taking too many live shells may land you in prison under new law

After years of bureaucratic hangups and hassles, Sanibel may finally have a legal prohibition against the taking of more than two live shells per species in one day.

Florida Marine Fisheries Commission, which was given exclusive jurisdiction over shelling in 1980, met last week to hear testimony in downtown Fort Myers. A spokesman for the commission said that a ruling has previously not been possible "staffwise, due to other priorities."

The commission unanimously approved a compromise draft of the rule to be sent to Governor Bob Martinez and the Florida Cabinet for final approval.

City Attorney David LaCroix asked the commis-

sion personally "to help get him off the hook." Sanibel's efforts to control live shelling have been an issue since LaCroix came to work for the city 4½ years ago and, now that he is leaving in August, he said he "would like to leave in good graces."

On a more serious note, he told the commission that the issue was important to Sanibel both economically and philosophically, shellfish being "the one aspect of our wildlife that remains unprotected." Only ill-informed tourists, inconsiderate shell guides, and a few winter residents who have shell shops in other states, he said, would be affected by the rule.

The commission agreed that any living mollusk or echinoderm (a spiny marine animal such as a starfish) and also sand dollars would be protected. Food shellfish such as oyster, hard clams, bay scallops and quoginas are excluded from the rule.

Lee County's management and budget director Chris Chronis was scheduled to appear at a public meeting Tuesday night at Sanibel Community Center, but the community was totally unaware of the briefing.

Acting Mayor of Sanibel Mike Klein said he received a telephone call shortly after 7 p.m. from someone wanting to know if electrical outlets at the community building could accommodate television cameras. After a few more phone calls, it was apparent that nobody at city hall had been advised. Local newspapers had not received notice, although Chronis said a legal announcement had run in the Fort Myers *News-Press*.

The meeting, which Chronis said was "to explain the county's proposed budget and property taxes for the 1987-88 fiscal year", has been rescheduled for Thursday, July 9 at 7:30 p.m. in the Sanibel Community Association building on Periwinkle Way. □

Mariner wants entire resort in Captiva beach plan

Board approves preliminary restoration plan

A preliminary resolution outlining details of the Captiva Beach Restoration Plan was approved Tuesday night by a dazed CEPD board still reeling from a bombshell delivered earlier in the evening by the president of Mariner.

The resolution, a sign that Captiva Erosion Prevention District's much ballyhooed beach restoration plan is nearing completion, was approved with several amendments, including a possible revision to extend the new beach to include all of South Seas Plantation.

The plan, as it was approved by the board last month, called for varying beach widths of between 60 and 80 feet along the entire length of the island up to a point about 900 feet south of Redfish Pass. The portion of beach excluded from the plan borders several gulf front homes and the South Seas golf course.

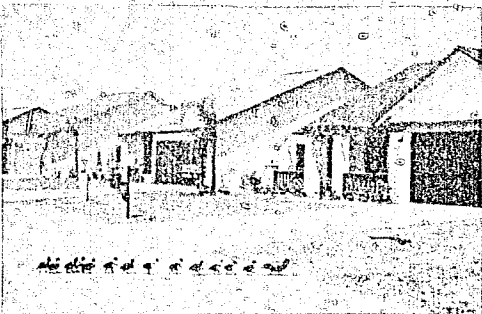
Allen Tenbroek, president of the Mariner Group which owns South Seas Plantation, asked the board to include the left-out beach, saying it would be easier to sell the South Seas community on the project if the beach were extended the entire length of the island. In 1981 South Seas embarked on an ambitious \$2.3 million beach renourishment project of their own, but their beach, like the rest of Captiva, continues to erode. Tenbroek said it was time South Seas and Captiva "unified" their fight against erosion.

Tenbroek said it would be in the best interest of the board to extend the beach if they wanted the support of South Seas property owners when the plan is taken to voters in November. If the board agreed to his request, Tenbroek said he would try to use his "influence" to get South Seas property

Animal lover's legacy

A family of ducks brought such delight to the remaining days of a former Sanibel woman, her husband wanted to share it with *Island Reporter* columnist and naturalist George Campbell.

Jovan De Rocco said, "It was a joy that brightened Marcia's declining days to feed the numerous brood twice daily as they came and waited with their mother at our back porch door." The De Roccas moved from their home on Windlass Way.

Sanibel to Cinnamon Cove, Fort Myers, last October.

"We had them breed first, until we were warned of a 'protein deficiency' in

their diet and we switched to sunflower seed and the regular bird feed," De Rocco wrote.

"Now of age, at the end of an astonishingly rapid growth — an inch a day it seemed — they are ready for flight, though they'll never abandon us, apparently receiving in one meal what they couldn't find in nature in a month."

After the mother disappeared, the ducklings continued to appear at the De Rocco's door, expecting three meals a day.

De Rocco said, "Anyway, it is my heart-warming task to relay the pictures and the information about my dear Marcia's last 'Mussey' delight and her last desire to convey it all to you, which I am

doing with pleasure and with appreciation for your valuable contributions to our knowledge through the years."

Mrs. De Rocco died June 21.

Campbell replies, "Dear Mr. De Rocco, it is letters like yours that make it all worthwhile."

"I am so pleased that her observations and love of animals, in this case ducklings, helped Marcia during her final days. There is a lesson here: mankind must learn to appreciate and conserve those creatures with which we share Planet Earth. If we don't soon make these accommodations, we may not have a habitable planet to inhabit."

Perhaps a step in this direction will be Marcia's valued legacy.

Aerobics in a chair?

Linda Uhler

If you are Aunt Mildred with meat marinade, Sister Susan with sugar cookies, Cousin Queenie with kumquat preserves, you may be next. Linda Uhler of Sanibel could find you where you live — in your kitchen.

Says Linda, co-owner with husband Tom, of The Wine Merchant at Royal Palm Square, "We like to go out and look for small producers of foods to sell. Right now we're carrying a salsa made by a dentist and his wife in Arizona and a mustard . . . by a woman in Vermont . . . among other things."

"But they don't need a new salad dressing. They already carry 14 distinctive and exotic ones from small purveyors."

"What they do after we agree to take the product is get marketing expertise and other advice and start a business," explains Linda.

"That's easy to be discovered. Is it? Well, not exactly. Although Linda and Tom travel a lot, particularly to California, to check what's new in food and wine, they are not too apt to find the second Pepperidge Farm lady, and all those others out there watching pots boil into great fortunes."

"Now there's the trend out there for the little farmer who is



raising poultry that's extra good or the best berries to bring that in to a little shop (or a restaurant), says Linda.

It is these "little" people that the Uhlers visit and find out about their special cheeses, new sauces, condiments and the herb mixtures. "I'm more interested in the food, and Tom, the wine," says Linda.

Once again Linda has started classes in cookery at their Royal Palm place which is equipped

with a full and elaborate kitchen. "We're reviving classes we used to have and probably will have them again in the fall," she says.

This week, Linda was to teach a class in the use of the food processor as well as a champagne class. "All you could do with champagne . . . and, of course, we always taste," was her comment.

She came to her present vocation by way of elementary education, specifically in Shippensburg State University in Pennsylvania.

She was teaching near Gettysburg when she met Tom, a securities dealer and wine aficionado. Tom moved to Orlando, Linda followed and the two married.

The move to Sanibel followed — some ten years ago — and Linda taught at Sanibel Elementary School for a year and then at Fort Myers Beach.

"We met Ed and Twink Underhill, owners of 'The Unpressured Cooker' and I was asked if I'd manage their store at Cypress Lake in Fort Myers," says Linda.

"It was a challenge to try something in the adult world," she adds.

After starting a series of cooking classes at Cypress Square, she brought in such notables as

Giuliano Bugajli, an Italian chef, who divides his time between Italy and New York; Abby Mandell who writes a column for 'Bon Appetit' magazine; and Perla Myers, cookbook author. Uhler also taught cooking classes for kids.

Linda and Tom opened The Wine Merchant four years ago and have remained there since. A connection with a nation-wide wine group somehow did not get out of the wine cellar, and the couple started their own group. "What we do is sponsor three events a year that involve food and wine," she says.

Their most recent wine happenings were a dossier buffet with appropriate wines at the end of a Pirate Playhouse performance 18 months ago, a road rally in Fort Myers and a recent dinner at Villa Pescatore in Naples attended by 62 people.

Business is quite naturally mixed with pleasure, too, when Linda edits "Gulfshore Delights", the cookbook published by the Junior League of Fort Myers. She has been chairman of that endeavor for two years.

"We're in our second printing," says Linda, "and all of the recipes were tested three times." Suggested wines by the Uhlers, of course.

New tarpon limit will have little effect locally — guides

Florida Marine Fisheries Commission's decision to limit the number of tarpon killed to one per day per person may have little effect on local fishing primarily because few people ever catch more than one tarpon in a day.

Most local fishing guides contacted by the *Island Reporter* said they agreed with the commission's decision to reduce the number of tarpon killed from two per person per day to one, but questioned the need for a total ban without some kind of study to support it.

"I don't mind the restrictions on tarpon while a study is underway but don't make it permanent until the result are in," said Larry Paul, chairman of the board of directors of the Sanibel Island Fishing Club.

Paul called the commission's action "the biggest thing since sliced bread."

Sanibel guide Capt. Ted Cole said he supported the one tarpon per person limit and probably would not object to the total ban even though it is not necessary. "I think if someone wants to have one (fish) mounted it won't affect the stock," he said.

Cole estimates that only about one of every seven tarpon that he catches is killed for a mount.

Taxidermists, whose job it is to prepare the fish for mounting, would be harder hit than fishermen, Cole said.

Charter captain Neville Ross, while agreeing with the one tarpon limit, said a total ban on killing wasn't warranted. "I don't think tarpon are in any kind of danger," said Robeson. "There are many fish out there now as there's always been. I think it's ludicrous to deny people this fish."

Robeson said about 25 to 30 percent of the tarpon

he catches are killed for mounts.

For many people, catching a tarpon "is the thrill of a lifetime," said Guide Pat Lovetro. "They should have the right to bring that fish in. There's a lot of pride at stake."

Lovetro, who kills "less than one percent" of the tarpon his charters catch, said the commission should have studied the situation before imposing new rules. "They (the commission) made up their minds before ever coming to Fort Myers," he said.

Guide Dave Case also opposes the idea of a total ban. "I'm not in favor of it at all. I think it's ridiculous. They haven't done any research at all," he said.

About a quarter of the tarpon he catches are killed for mounts, he said.

The commission also voted to lift the ban on redfish between Oct. 31 and Dec. 31. The new rules would limit sportfishermen to one redfish per day and commercial fishermen to five fish per boat per day. Most guides agreed with that ruling.

"I think it's very fair," said Case.

"I can live with one and five," said Cole, who added that he would also like to see some kind of limits imposed on trout.

Cole blamed net fishermen for the declining numbers of many fish, especially snook and redfish. "Nets are indiscriminate," he said.

Robeson was the only guide who objected to the new redfish rules, saying that current measures were adequate.

Guide Chuck Skinner said as far as he was concerned "They can keep redfish closed forever, at least until they get back on their feet."

Guides said they didn't think either ruling would have much effect on Sanibel's multi million dollar sportfishing industry.

Although no exact figures are available on much money the sport actually pumps back into the local economy, it is believed to be a considerable amount.

"Eighty percent of the tourists in the summer come here to fish," says Bail Ilox owner Ralph Woodring.

"Sanibel tourism would collapse without sport fishermen," said Cole. "There are only so many shellers and tennis players and golfers."

RACCOON RACKETEERS

Researcher aims to learn more about this noisy critter

There are two types of people on Sanibel, raccoon research specialist David Spicer said. Those who love the cute furry animal, and those who hate the rodent.

Even prominent island naturalists, staunch conservationists as well, abhor the noise and fuss created when raccoons go into their nighttime feeding frenzy in garbage cans and other yummy places.

"They're just mischievous," Spicer said. "They get into all kinds of stuff and they make a little racket." Perhaps Howitzer canons make a "little racket" in comparison.

Spicer is visiting Sanibel from Iowa State University as part of Iowa based Ding Darling Foundation's cooperative research program with Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation. His research goal is to gather facts, he said, and begin this month he will be collecting data on everything from raccoon ages to population figures.

Spicer will be disemboweling road-killed raccoons to find out what they eat, attaching radio sensors to trapped animals to find out their movement patterns and poking yellow ear tags into their ear lobes. Removing a tooth from a raccoon for analysis is how he determines its age.

"I am simply interrupting the animals when I catch them," he said. "When you mention 'trap,' the first thing that comes to mind is that the raccoon is suffering."

Nay, Spicer maintains. If all that work sounds cruel, remember that his research could eventually help wildlife managers decide how to help people and raccoons get along better.

And Sanibel is getting a bargain in boot.

Research costs for the two-year study tally \$17,000 per year, with \$1,000 coming from SCCF, and \$16,000 from DDF. DDF is a national group based in Des Moines, Iowa. Those research costs are relatively low, SCCF executive director Erick

Lindblad agreed.

Spicer will use the research toward his graduate degree in wildlife management, stressing biology. After talking with island naturalists, he learned few facts are known about the habits of the omnivorous mammal among Sanibel citizens, except that they make a lot of racket.

One surprise he has discovered is that raccoons seem to get along with domestic and feral cats roaming the island. A condominium owner recently called the *Island Reporter* when a raccoon and a cat were found sleeping peacefully beside each other in a trap used to gently capture mischievous raccoons.

Captiva community center addition to be scaled down

Captiva Civic Association's plans to expand the community center will be scaled down because of objections from island residents and concerns that the project would not meet county building requirements.

The CCA's building committee met two weeks ago to discuss the project and decided then that it need to be scaled down, CCA vice-president George Tuttle said.

The CCA first announced the expansion plans in January.

Revised expansion plans will still include an addition to the library, renovations to the main meeting hall and the addition of a deck and sliding glass doors on the north side of the building, said Tuttle, the architect on the project.

"Tuttle said he did not know yet how many square feet would be added, other than it would be less than first planned. "There's not enough land area to meet county building requirements," he said.

Tuttle said the final project design would probably not be completed until late this fall. "It probably won't be formalized and presented to the board (of governors) until sometime later in the year.

The community center was built in the early 1960s and has been added to several times over the years. □

Five BMR units will be upgraded

Community Housing and Resources, Inc. has received a written commitment from First Federal Savings and Loan giving approval of a \$140,000 loan to finance renovation of the five Below Market Rate Housing units on Beach Road, according to executive director Dorothy Newman. The project consists of two duplexes and a single family home.

The contract with Joval Builders to upgrade the units, which were donated by the Mariner Group, will bring them up to city and CHR standards, including roof and air conditioner replacement, plumbing and electrical renovation, painting, and new carpeting, siding, and screens.

Newman said a special fund has been set aside for landscaping. □

Islands' help group to prepare for AIDS cases

As insulated as Sanibel and Captiva are from the rest of the world, they cannot escape the deadly threat of AIDS, Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome.

Although no "full blown" cases of the virus have been reported on either island, Lee County health officials say several residents have been exposed and could eventually come down with symptoms. Some may even die.

"Sanibel and Captiva are not immune from AIDS," says Lee County AIDS surveillance officer Dr. Adrian Pollock.

Countywide since June 1983, 80 "full blown" cases of AIDS have been documented by the Lee County Health Department. At least another 27 people have developed symptoms, commonly referred to as ARC, or AIDS Related Complex. Sixty-one people have died.

Pollock said an estimated 6,000 to 8,000 other people have been exposed. Studies show that, of those, 34 percent will develop ARC. For those exposed to the virus "it is not a very bright outlook from the standpoint of staying well," said Pollock.

Although there are several experimental drugs being tested, there is as yet no known cure for AIDS. The fatal virus attacks the body's defense system, destroying its ability to fight off disease, thus leaving the victim susceptible to a variety of illnesses.

Newspaper headlines remind us almost daily of how fast AIDS is spreading. For those ignorant of the virus and how it is transmitted, the stories are frightening. One sometimes gets the impression a person can become infected simply by breathing in the AIDS "germ." In truth, if you are not in either of the two high risk groups — homosexual men and intravenous drug users — and you don't have multiple sex partners, there is little to worry about. "Unless you're having sex or sharing needles with someone who has AIDS, you're not going to get it," said Pollock.

Because the majority of people who live on Sanibel and Captiva are older and do not fall into either of the two high risk groups, your chances of being exposed to the virus are minimal, said Pollock. Of course, if you have more than one sexual partner, then those risks increase substantially. "You have to engage in certain types of risk

behavior to come in contact with the virus," said Pollock, who maintains that fully 50 percent of the AIDS cases in Lee County can be attributed directly to drug users.

Still, the threat of AIDS is very real here. And because of that, FISH, Friends in Service Here, is exploring the possibility of a training program to prepare its volunteers in the event they are asked to serve a person afflicted with AIDS. Because the volunteer group assists sick and homebound people, FISH president Ahe Lerner says, "It is far from unlikely that one day we will have an AIDS patient."

Although such a "situation has not come up yet," Lerner said it was important for volunteers to be prepared. "People have varying degrees of sophistication about the disease," said Lerner. "We are interested in doing what we can to prepare ourselves in the event we have someone with AIDS."

While no FISH volunteer is required to perform a job that they find "personally repugnant or doesn't want to do," Lerner said, it was important that volunteers not overreact if they are asked to help an AIDS patient. "You're not going to get AIDS just from being around a person who has it," said Lerner, who along with his wife, Kathleen, recently attended an in-service training program on AIDS at Hope Hospice in Fort Myers. The education program taught Hope Hospice volunteers about the risks, precautions to take, and what kind of situations a volunteer could encounter in dealing with an AIDS patient.

Hope Hospice, which works with people in the final stages of terminal illnesses, has dealt with about ten AIDS patients in the last two years. Hope Hospice executive director Gene Rybarczyk said, "All our staff is willing to work with AIDS patients," said Rybarczyk. "It hasn't been any problem."

Rybarczyk said the primary concern when assisting AIDS patients was "caution," like being careful when handling needles and avoiding contact with an infected person's blood.

Sanibel winter resident Dr. LeClair Bissel, an expert on communicable diseases, recently contacted Lerner about addressing FISH volunteers in the fall. Plans for that meeting are underway now. "There's no reason to think that (AIDS) won't come to Sanibel," said Lerner. "The virus is no respecter of anything." □

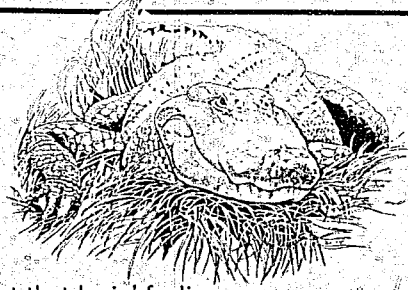

They've got that lovin' feeling
**'Gators surprisingly tender
 in courtship — zoologist**

Female alligators may be shy during the start of gator courting season, but when they do warm up to the rites of spring, they turn the tables on the males and usually take the lead, said a University of Florida zoologist.

During the early part of alligator courting season, male gators cruise Florida's waters, bellowing and trying to attract females — and are often spurned, said Kent Vliet, who is studying alligator mating behavior.

"The females spend a lot of the early part of gator courting season sitting back, yanking up their eggs and getting hormonally prepared for courtship," Vliet said.

"The males are prepared for courtship much longer than the females, about 45 days on the average," Vliet said, "while females are active for courtship for an average of 25 days."

"When the females are ready, they go out and initiate courtship and stimulate the males into mating between 60 to 70 percent of the time," Vliet has been studying alligator courtship since

1981, and has been featured in a *National Geographic* TV special on alligators.

To get a gator's eye view of how these reptiles court, Vliet literally immersed himself up to his shoulders in his work by wading in a shallow artificial lake filled with alligators in a St. Augustine tourist attraction.

The Florida alligator courting season normally lasts from the second week of April through the first week of June, but this year it started earlier than usual — in late March — because of a mild winter and early spring.

People generally think of alligators as being brutish, but when it comes to courting they are surprisingly tender, Vliet said.

"We think of these animals as being primitive and very dangerous. But their courtship is very complex," Vliet said. "They actually have very subtle, very tender behavior during their courtship."

Vliet has discovered 18 different tactile behaviors alligators engage in during courtship, and most of these consist of one gator nuzzling

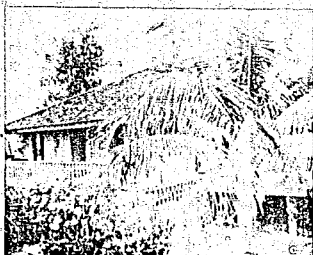

Bless their beautiful hide — alligator harvest set for fall

The Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission's Division of Wildlife is firming up a rules proposal for the limited harvest of alligator hatchlings to take place this fall.

"This is the first phase of a planned alligator management program which eventually will include harvest of adult alligators and alligator eggs as well as hatchlings," said Frank Montalbano, director of the Division of Wildlife. "We plan to use the alligator's economic value to promote conservation of the species and its habitat."

The 1987 Florida Legislature enacted a law to establish a license and fee structure for participants in the alligator harvest program. Specifically, the law authorizes the Commission to collect \$250 license fees from alligator

farmers who want to collect wild alligator hatchlings to be raised in captivity.

In addition, beginning in 1988, the commission will offer licenses to trap adult alligators. Trapping licenses also will cost \$250 per year for Florida residents. Out-of-state trappers who plan to capture alligators in Florida will be required to purchase \$1,000 licenses.

Participants in the harvest will have to meet qualifications and abide by quotas and rules to be established by the Commission.

"Although the only alligator harvest planned under the recent legislation during 1987 is the proposed fall hatchling harvest," Montalbano said, "we do plan to continue the taking of nuisance alligators and the experimental alligator harvest from selected lakes. Those programs are separate from the alligator management program."

Licensing details are being developed by the commission and applications will be available later in the summer. □

another about the head and neck. Another important part of "gator courtship involves submerging. One alligator sometimes will submerge and position its head just under another's head, inviting the other to press down gently.

But if things are going too fast for one of the prospective mates, submerging can also serve as a pause button. "One of them will submerge and the other waits. If the submerged one is still interested, it rises and they continue courting," Vliet said.

In yet another subtle aspect of alligator court-

ship, one "gator can let the other know their match isn't meant to be simply by submerging and swimming off.

Besides being complex, alligator courtship can be confusing to humans, and nonproductive to the reptiles, since males often court and mount each other, at least in captivity.

"Alligators are frequently indiscriminate in whom they court and mount, probably because they can't tell since the bulk of their bodies are under water," Vliet said.

Which is why following by male alligators may be a crucial part of courting and reproduction for this species.

"This is the only time I've seen when alligators were able to tell which sex they were dealing with," Vliet said. □

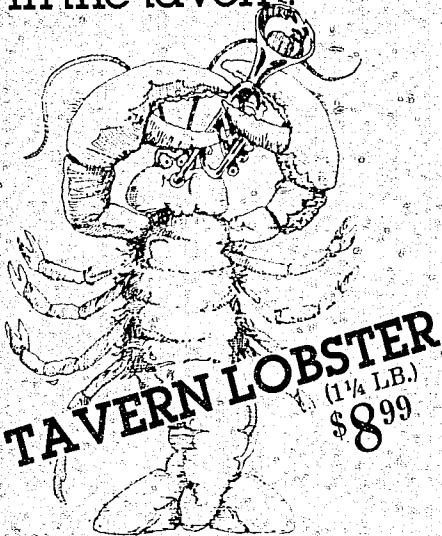

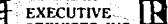

Violations would amount to a second-degree misdemeanor, punishable by a year in jail and/or a \$500 fine.

LaCroix said Sanibel Police Department would assume responsibility for enforcing the rule which would extend 300 feet out from the mean high water line of the island.

James Quinn, a marine biologist with the Florida Department of Natural Resources, drew the wrath of the Sanibel delegation and a few of the commissioners when he spoke against the proposed rule. Quinn contended that the proposed rule had "no biological basis behind it" and also that enforcement would be a problem due to the expertise needed for identification. He said some beds might be temporarily depleted, but they would renew themselves. He recommended the city undertake an education program.

Alice Anders, vice-president of the Sanibel-Captiva Shell Club, told the commission of the community's efforts toward education, including brochures, a display board at the Chamber of Commerce welcome

station, and the club's scholarship program. She said that, due to overharvesting offshore, she has never seen a live olive shell on Sanibel.


As for problems in distinguishing between one variety of whelk and another, Anders said, "If Dr. Quinn doesn't know that one opens to the right and one to the left, he had better go back to school."

Captain Dan Kippis, a member of the commission, said "I am disappointed in the Department's attitude, but I have had problems with it before."

Commissioner Dr. David Anthony said, "It may not be a biological problem, but a question of distribution, and it has to do with the conservation ethic in general."

Eugene Boyd, who identified himself as a shell collector from Pine Island, said he has more than 10,000 specimens, most of which were live-collected. He said he had not been shelling on Sanibel for 10-15 years because "it would be a wasted effort, the shells are gone." He stated further "If there are any live shells there, they should be left there." □

Sometimes it's easy to say 'no'

The following appeared under *Roe Young's by-line in the Dayton Daily News and Herald, Dayton, Ohio, on May 16. It was sent to us by a reader and we reprint it with Roe Young's permission. It was titled, "Sometimes it's easy to say no."*

Ruth came waving a folder as Millie and I were hunting for tomatoes in Jerry's supermarket on Sanibel. "Here's a new time share resort opening," she said. "I picked up a coupon at the front desk. If we go to look at it, we will get a check for \$35 to spend in Jerry's."

That February afternoon a brisk blonde in white top, gray belt low on her hips, white trousers and high-heeled gray boots seated us at a patio table overlooking the Gulf. She laid a stack of papers on the table, pulled a gold pen from her pocket and then panned our faces with a brown-eyed glance. "I am Mari Hurricane," she said. "That's M-A-R-I. It's really M-A-R-Y, but it got into the computer wrong. Now, tell me about yourselves."

We told her we were from Ohio. "I already know something about you," she said. "You like vacations. You are going to like Sanibel. All

those cotton-picking people shivering up in Ohio and here you are, swimming and shelling on the beach.

"Vacation is what Hurricane House is all about. That is what we are selling to people like you who like to come here and get out of the cold and yet don't want the problem of owning a vacation house. We do everything for you here at Hurricane House. All you need is your suitcases. No worries. Everything else is furnished. Nothing but sun and fun."

She flipped out one chart after another, laying them on the table facing us and reading them upside down. Every time she made a new point, she drew an asterisk on the chart with her gold pen.

"This is a five-star time-share resort," she said, drawing five asterisks. "My owners buy one, two or more weeks a year. Now when you buy a week here, you own it forever."

"Who named this a five-star resort?" asked Millie.

"I will get to that later," Mari said. "But feel free to ask questions."

"How much does it cost?" asked Ruth.

"I am glad you asked," said Mari. "We will get to that later."

While she continued talking and drawing asterisks, three other salesmen brought in three other groups, seated them at tables, took gold pens out of their pockets and began talking.

"The Mariner Company," said Mari, "which owns this and many other resorts, is a great organization and owns seven Drexel furniture stores to provide the furnishings, a plumbing company, real estate management, investment services and a travel agency."

"How much?" Ruth asked again. "I'll get to that," said Mari. "Excuse me a moment." She left.

"They always go away a while to let you talk it over," said Ruth.

When Mari came back, she said she would now show us one of the units. Everything harmonized. Bedspreads, sheets, draperies, towels, artificial flower arrangements and pictures all were done in turquoise and pink. The carpets were white. Everything was complete from the two TVs to a microwave.

Mari led us back to the table, laid out more charts and her gold pen.

"Lower units sell for \$25,000 a week during the season," she said.

"Upper units are \$1,000 more. Now isn't that a fabulous bargain? Where else could you buy a home completely furnished for only \$25,000?"

"There is a maintenance fee of \$315 weekly for property taxes and \$25 million insurance. We do expect a maintenance fee increase of 15 percent a year because of inflation."

Mari laid down her pen and looked each of us in the eye.

"Now how many weeks may I sign you up for?"


"You wouldn't expect us to make a decision like that without thinking it over," said Millie.

"You'd be surprised how many do," Mari answered. "We do want our owners to think it over. That is why we have a 20 day refusal law. After you sign the contract, you have 10 days to change your mind and get all your money back. We cannot promise, however, that the villa of your choice will be available after today because of the popularity of our resort. It will pay you to act promptly."

She looked from one to the other. "Tell me why you are not ready to take advantage of this marvelous opportunity," she said.

Ruth said she had lots of traveling to do yet. Millie said she is still



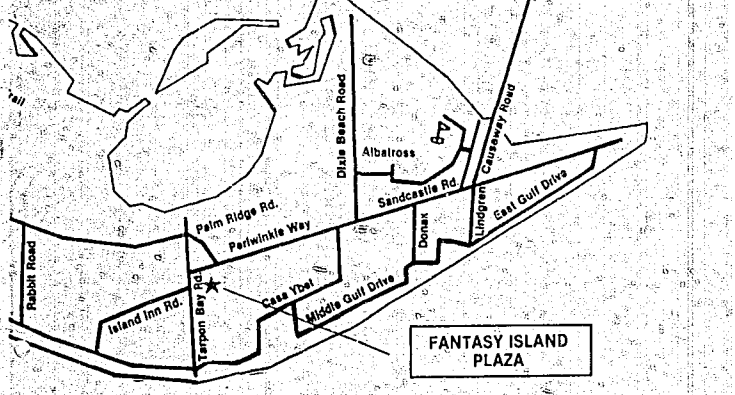

fourth of july

Bailey brothers reminisce about mullet and swamp cabbage and Fourth of July

Back in the good old days, Fourth of July celebrations on the islands were not especially well-organized, but they were memorable to the Bailey brothers.

"It was a big summertime event," says Sam Bailey. "I don't know who instigated it." It was always held on the Sunday nearest the holiday and it consisted mainly of a fish fry. The fish was mullet and the trimmings were hush puppies and swamp cabbage. Muggins Underhill of Fort Myers Beach and Jake Stokes were two who brought in the mullet.

Frank P. Bailey, the founder of Bailey's General Store and father of modern-day movers and shakers Francis and Sam Bailey, got involved in helping out with the provisions. The store was always closed on Sunday anyway, although the brothers remember that their father made a point of going in to the store at 10 a.m. and 5 p.m. to take care of Western Union customers.

In the thirties the fish fries were held at the pavilion owned by Charlie Knapp in front of the old Casa Ybel Lodge and later at the Sanibel Lighthouse.

Some things the brothers remember differently. Sam, who is younger, remembers later parties at Casa Ybel, although Francis is sure the pavilion burned down in 1935.

Francis missed the July 4 fish fries from 1941 to 1947 because of the second world war.

In 1951, Sam remembers, he volunteered to get the swamp cabbage and chopped down twelve trees. The fish fry was definitely at the lighthouse that year and Francis remembers they found out Beulah Wiles was pregnant.

There was a different crowd every year, usually about fifty people. Sometimes visiting tarpon fishermen would be there. The brothers regret they have no photographs of the celebrations to help jog their memory. "It's just not something you think about at the time, you take it so much for granted," Sam reflects.

One year Henry Rhodes brought his guitar and another time Langley Willis played harmonica. He later got killed in the war.

"The women made a bluff at pulling their skirts up and going shelling," recalls Sam. The men exchanged commentaries over soft drinks, ice tea and beer after Prohibition was over. There were always a few bottles of home brew around as well.

The Baileys don't remember any political speaking, often a feature of other Fourth of July picnics.

"There were only 41 voters," explains Francis, a Sanibel city councilman. He cannot recall any gubernatorial candidates bothering to take the ferry ride required to campaign on Sanibel until 1963. Candidates for sheriff and county commission would come and knock on doors, he said, and both brothers remember a candidate for tax collector, who, for obvious reasons, chose to use his middle name and campaign as Vivian Lee.

One moonshine still was on Beach Road and another was about a quarter-mile in the bushes from the gulf-side south of the bayou near where Periwinkle Way Trailer Park now stands. Sam went looking for it once and found it.

"We used to call it the bayou," interjects Francis. "They call it the Sanibel River now."

The moonshine was made from sugar cane. Talk about stalking through the brush leads to some observations about island vegetation. You could see for vast distances in those days, says Sam. "People talk about 'native vegetation' who don't know what they're talking about," says Francis. "There were no pepper trees then, very few Australian pines, no bottlebrushes or metaleuca."



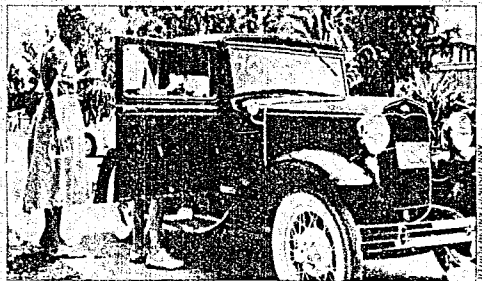

owners to support the plan.

Tenbroek supported his request saying that South Seas property owners were paying for 11 percent of the \$8.2 million project but were receiving less than 20 percent of the sand.

The area "historically has the most extensive erosion rate on the entire island," Tenbroek said, pointing out that over 700 feet of beach had been lost since 1926.

His request caught the three CEPD members in attendance — Paul Garvey, Hans Wilson and Sheila Hoen — off guard. "This should have been brought up earlier," chairman Garvey said.

Tenbroek countered that it had only been within the last 30 days that the plan had been agreed upon.

Garvey then asked Applied Technology and Management consulting engineer Karyn Erickson if there was documentation to support Tenbroek's request.

Erickson said she had "missed some data" concerning the area in question that showed more sand had been dumped on the beach than previously believed.

The sand, some 11,000 cubic yards, was the result of two additional beach scraping projects in 1984 and 1985. Erickson said information and permits concerning the project were "not on file" and thus were not used in computing that area's erosion rate.

Including the 900-foot stretch of beach could add \$200,000 to \$250,000 to the cost of the project. The extra expense, however, would be borne exclusively by South Seas property owners since they are the ones who would be deriving the extra storm protection and recreational benefits.

The extra work, though, could delay a finalized version of the plan and create a snafu of sorts for Regional Research Associates consulting with Dr. William Stronge.

Stronge said the change could cause problems in obtaining \$1 million in federal funding if it upsets the delicate balance between storm protection and recreational benefits.

The federal government requires that storm protection account for at least 51 percent of the benefits in order to qualify for federal funding. Financing for the plan is tied in with property assessments based on a complicated formula that takes into account anticipated storm protection and recreational benefits that will be derived from

the proposed project.

Stronge warned that the board "shouldn't start changing figures for political reasons," and said that any changes to the plan would have to be documented by the engineer to make it defensible in court.

The board then directed Erickson and Stronge to develop an alternative restoration and apportionment plan based on the changes requested by Tenbroek. The new information is to be delivered to the board in time for the July 18 meeting.

In other action, the board:

■ Directed the consultants to prepare alternative financing proposals to fund maintenance on the project, either through avialorem taxes or a special assessment. Maintenance on the project is estimated at \$1.1 million. The maintenance plan recommended by the consultant calls for adding sand to the beach three times over the next 10 years, at intervals of four, eight and 10 years. Maintenance would extend the life of the beach to 20 years.

■ Could not reach a decision on whether \$550,000 collected in 1982 to pay for Blind Pass groin extension should still be used for the groin, or diverted to help defray the cost of the beach restoration plan. Wilson and Hoen said the money should be used for the groin as it was originally intended. Garvey thought otherwise. The cost for the groin extension is estimated at \$650,000. The board will readdress the issue July 18.

The 5½-hour meeting attracted 13 people. □

The true history of Sanibel — Part I

By Art Stevens

There have been conflicting reports over the years on the precise history of Sanibel. There is controversy over how Sanibel got its name, who the early settlers were and exact dates of important historical events.

Being the consummate reporter, I embarked on a lonely but important mission — to research Sanibel's history and set the actual facts down once and for all.

To accomplish this monumental task, I scoured every document, book and piece of paper I could get my hands on. I interviewed

countless historians and studied family trees of Sanibel families whose ancestors were among the early settlers.

What follows is a chronology of the most important dates in Sanibel history. Tear up all your present Sanibel history books. They are inaccurate. Now the full story of Sanibel can be told.

One million B.C. — Neanderthal man comes to Sanibel from Miami to avoid the crowds. Led by their fearless leader Spam, this hardy group of prehistoric men settled in caves on the present day site of Sundial. Their hunting tools were

rudimentary, but were adaptable to the new gulf environment.

Dinosaurs roamed freely in the heavily vegetated inner regions and the Neanderthals avoided these massive predatory beasts at all costs by camouflaging themselves as pepper trees.


600,000 B.C. — The Neanderthals were followed by the next species of man, the Rosenthals.

250 B.C. — Wandering nomadic tribes crossed the Continental Divide to settle in the estuary fault basin region of southwest Sanibel. Unaccustomed to the vast climatic changes confronting them, their dietary habits became radically altered. They learned to eat shells from Sanibel's shores.

The "shell people," as they have since been referred to by historians, learned to cook such rudimentary dishes as shell steaks — with real shells; shellac, a fine porridge; and shello, a delicate dessert.

They maintained their quaint

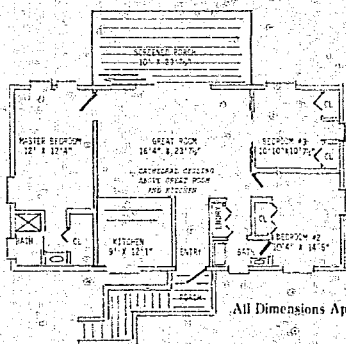

Return of the mini skirt

While Seventh Avenue has millions of dollars invested in mini-skirts for fall,

Sanibel and Captiva shop-owners are taking a wait-and-see attitude, at least until they've covered the holiday cruise wear markets for fall.

And while the issue may be big enough news to warrant first page coverage in the *Wall Street Journal* recently, at least 10 shop-owners, managers and buyers locally are not looking at make or break on the bottom line on skirt length.

"You're not doing that, are you?" asked a regular customer of Jonna Erlander of Jonna's in Periwinkle Gardens. She told Jonna long distance she had just watched a Calvin Klein show on TV and was afraid her good friend, Jonna, might buy short.

But Jonna isn't buying much of it and, in fact, is getting new fashions from Amsterdam and the skirts are still long, she says.

But at least one customer has remarked to Carroll Mathews, owner of The Last Resort in Jerry's Shopping Center that "they're showing nothing but mini length in Paris."

Mathews herself is taking the longer view — for some, "I'll be going to Atlanta soon to do some buying for fall and definitely expect to see them up. I hate it. It's confusing for everybody. But, yes, we'll have some minis."

Candace Colter, manager and buyer for Arnold's on Periwinkle Way, doesn't see that happening for the age group her store caters to. "It's taken three years to get the women to wear them longer, they're comfortable now, and I can't see them ready to give them up."

Colter thinks some women will wear short, fancy evening clothes, though, and that's the emphasis she sees from Seventh Avenue.

But Lorry Eible, owner of Foxy Lady, also in Periwinkle Gardens, says the short look is "very, very strong."

"It's definitely going to happen this fall and already is in our

store," she added. "Europe started it a year ago and it takes about a year to come here. There are two miniskirts: the short-straight and the layered ruffle minis."

As for Sweet Caroline's in Olde Post Office Square, they've always had minis — "rompers and play dresses."

"We're buying both," according to Barbara Dickson, proprietor, "and we'll be showing both."

At least one fashionable manager and saleswoman, Ann Thomas, of "Oh! Susanna" in Periwinkle Place, doesn't herself want to abandon her long skirts. "I can't imagine not wearing the longer length, it's so comfortable," she said. She was wearing a silk camisole with a long, full hemstitched cotton skirt with elastic waist that day, she said. Moreover, on the last working day she had worn another long skirt and with flats.

Said Thomas, "I think (minis) only look good on 17-year-olds with good legs. But we're seeing lots of young vacationers from the north in short skirts this summer."

But Jim and Mary Herman, owners of Maggie Elliott, One Step Up and Peaches for Ladies in Periwinkle Place are "not going to be doing much in the way of short skirts."

Herman would make an exception for ages 16 to 22 and even then only for sizes 3 to 7. "They can wear a mini skirt, and, in fact, we've had a line of mini-dresses that we've carried for a long time for our junior customers."

"...but it's the men who like them," protests Peggy Mott, owner of the Changing Room in The Village.

"The women were telling the designers what they wanted for a long time," she said. "And now the designers are trying to get control again... it all depends on us if we fall for it."

On the strength of belief that island women, fashionable or unfashionable, won't "fall" for it, all ten stores will continue to carry long as well as short this fall.

Or, as Jonna says, "The women who live or come here are confident in themselves and wear what they like. They can't be dictated to."

Island Inn remodeling will allow all diners an ocean view

Winter guests at the Island Inn won't have to jockey for a table overlooking the gulf anymore. Come November, everyone in the dining room will have a view.

The "main building" of the 57-unit seaside hotel — the one containing the dining room — is being remodeled to make room for more offices, a larger lobby area and a card room. Lost in the shuffle will be the dining room's "L" shape, which prevented about half the diners from viewing the gulf's tranquil turquoise-green waters. The feat will be accomplished by adding 16 feet to the front of the dining room and expanding westward.

"When it's finished it's going to be really pretty," said Milbry Rushworth, whose husband John is president of the Island Inn Co. Inc., a group of some 170 investors. The group purchased the historic inn in 1958 to prevent it from being torn down and replaced with "steel and glass," Rushworth said.

The main building, a pale green single-story structure with clapboard siding, was built by the

Matthews family in 1895, and was one of the first guest houses on the island.

Nestled among palms and sea grape trees, the inn has undergone three major remodelings in its 92-year history.

While the primary purpose of the remodeling is to create additional office space, the end result will be a more comfortable dining room. Air conditioning will be added and diners will have more elbow room. "We're not increasing our volume in

any way, shape or form," said Rushworth. "We're just using the space to better advantage." Diners were "pretty jammed up before," she said.

Remodeling began two weeks ago. The work is expected to be completed by Nov. 15.

Even with the improvements and the addition of air conditioning, Rushworth said there are no plans to open the dining room during the summer months. □

CMI president Ashwill retires, Squires takes over

Fort Myers builder William B. Ashwill retired Wednesday from CMI Construction Inc., the company he helped found 15 years ago.

He was succeeded as president by CMI vice-president Timothy W. Squires, 43.

lies in the dedication and versatility of our personnel. I will really miss them all."

Ashwill, 58, will remain on CMI's board of directors, but plans to spend more time in his home in North Carolina and with his family.

Squires said there would be little change in the company's direction. "We will continue to strive to maintain our strong reputation for honesty and integrity in every project we complete," he said.

Ogden Group to buy the Observers and Island Reporter

There has been an agreement in principle for the Ogden Corporation to purchase five weekly newspapers, a shopper and a monthly publication from Scripps Howard for an undisclosed amount. The closing is scheduled for July 31.

The publications are the Island Reporter, Fort Myers Beach Observer, Fort Myers Observer, Cape Coral Observer and North Fort Myers Observer, Charlotte Shopping Guide and Island Fun Book.

Dick Kalfus, who will remain as publisher of the seven publications, said the Fun Book has a circulation of 30,000 on Sanibel, Captiva and Fort Myers Beach and the other publications have a combined circulation of 110,000.

Ogden, a newspaper/radio conglomerate with headquarters in Wheeling, WV, owns the Cape Coral Daily Breeze, a daily newspaper, and four weeklies, the Sanibel Captiva Islander, Pine Island Eagle, Fort Myers Beach Bulletin and Lee County Shopper.

Kalfus said the papers will not be merged, but will be operated independently.

"It doesn't surprise me that valuable properties are in demand and change hands. The Observers, the Island Reporter and the Charlotte Shopping Guide are powerful entities in their respective marketplaces. They assume an aggressive profile and therefore serve to interest aggressive companies," Kalfus said Monday.

"I'm delighted that we've become part of the Ogden Corporation family and look forward to this as the beginning of a significant growth period," he said.

Scripps Howard acquired the publications April 1 in a trade with the Tribune Company for eight weekly newspapers in the Tampa area.

Islands' hotels rack up unheard of occupancy rates

Monday evening's Chamber of Commerce Sizzler broke previous attendance records as island merchants flocked to hear Lee County's tourism guru tell them what they already know: business is booming on Sanibel and Captiva.

For the month of March 1987, the hotel occupancy rate was an astounding 98.4 percent. Executive director of the Lee County Tourist Development Council, Frank Nocera, said that, according to the research firm retained by his office, such a rate has been possible for a single resort or facility, but has been unknown for an entire area.

During April, the most recent month for which statistics are available, the occupancy rate at island hotels, motels and condos was 84 percent. Sixty to seventy percent occupancy is considered typical for the hospitality industry.

Television commercials in Tampa and Miami are plying Sanibel and Captiva and urging frazzled urbanites to drive on over, even without reservations. Nocera said once the visitors get to the area,

they can easily be channeled to Fort Myers Beach if there are no vacancies here.

At the same time, Lee County is no longer relying on Florida visitors for the summer season. Nocera said the number one market for this time of year is the Midwest corridor — Cleveland, Chicago, Detroit, Flint, and Indianapolis.

Visitor expenditure trends reveal a higher household income than ever before and yet these visitors are spending fewer dollars here. The reason, said Nocera, is the concerted effort of Central Florida, especially Disney World, to get visitors to stay longer and spend as much money as possible.

Technology may be utilized to compete with other Florida markets. Lee County advertisements throughout the country already carry toll-free numbers. Nocera is looking at a system now in place in Reno, NV that ties the toll-free number directly into a computer reservations system.

Telemarketing operators answering the phone "qualify the consumer and close the sale. This ties

promotion into hard sales," said Nocera, speaking the lingo real estate people understand.

Another option being explored would allow Lee County to collect the two percent "bed tax" on tourism locally instead of waiting for a check from Tallahassee. Nocera said the "float" or short-term interest on sizable amounts of money can be significant.

Last year tourism contributed \$507 million to the Lee County economy.

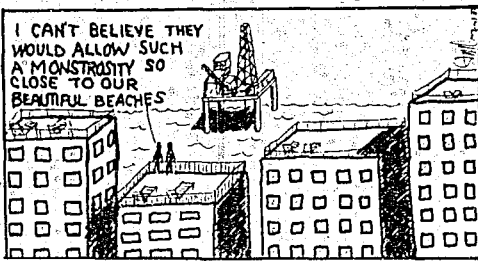
Next, Secretary of the Interior Hodel — the same guy who wants to ring Florida with oil wells

Plus and minuses of surimi — fake fish

That delicious crab salad you ate for lunch may not have had any crab meat in it at all. And the lobster Newburg? You guessed it. No lobster in it. If you like shellfish, you've probably been fooled by eating surimi when you thought you were eating crab lobster, shrimp or scallops. The newsletter published by the University of California, Berkeley, and the School of Public Health recently reported on this interesting addition to the American diet.

For centuries, the Japanese have been making these fake foods from a produce called surimi, or fish paste. At the present time there are over 2,000 different products available which are created from this fish paste. When purchased in the supermarket, it is usually labeled as "imitation crab meat," "sea legs," "King Crab," "C-Food" or something which would tip you off to its true origin, but restaurant menus rarely tell you their seafood dishes are made from surimi.

The economic future for surimi products in this country looks very bright. Food scientists are predicting bologna, baby foods, and even ice cream made from surimi. It is less expensive than the real thing, and can contain 75 percent less cholesterol than shellfish. It is a high-quality pro-

tein produce and is readily available. The taste and texture are excellent when used in salads, soups, or casseroles, which is why you didn't know you were eating it.

Most surimi found in America is made from Pacific pollack, an abundant, lean, white-fleshed fish. After the skin and bones are removed, the fish are ground up, and then washed and strained many times. This removes blood, any pigments, and the fishy odor. It also removes some of the fat, vitamins, and potassium. Sugar or sorbitol is then added to this flavorless, white, odorless protein paste. The sugar decreases any damage from freezing. Salt and starch are usually added to enhance the flavor and texture. Then the desired flavor is added to this pulp using natural shellfish or liquid from boiled shells, or the flavor may be entirely artificial. Coloring may be added, and the paste is then formed into the shape of whatever it is supposed to represent.

Fish eaters today are concerned about the con-

tent of omega-3 polyunsaturated fatty acids which might lower the risk of cardiovascular disease. Unfortunately, the pollack from which most surimi is made is low in fat and therefore low in the omega-3s. This may be only a temporary problem, however, because food scientists are looking for ways to make surimi from a common Atlantic fish called menhaden, which is high in omega-3s.

Surimi is a good high quality food product, but it can be a rip-off if you pay the price for real lobster and get flavored fish paste instead. The rest of the downside story is that the sodium content might be quite high, having as much as 10 times the content of real shellfish. Total calories are about 25 percent higher, and there is some loss of niacin and potassium. The FDA says that surimi products must be labeled "imitation" if they resemble any actual type of seafood and are nutritionally inferior to it. The ingredients are always listed on the package, but they can be buried in the fine print. Restaurants are under no obligation to tell you they have added surimi to the dishes they prepare.

Unless you are on a low sodium diet, however, surimi is a good way to add low cholesterol fish protein to your diet. And, when they find a good way to add more omega-3s to the product, it will be an even better way to improve your well being. □

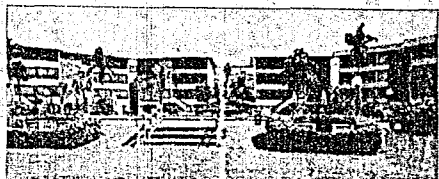

custom of slurping liquids from shells, then eating the shells. Present day descendants of these early tribesmen have carried on the customs of their ancestors. They can be seen in Sanibel restaurants eating their plates.

1225 A.D. - The shell people stayed in Sanibel for many centuries and their civilization flourished until the great shell famine of 1225. With fewer shells to feast upon, severe malnutrition and outright starvation took place. The number of shell people dwindled as a result and the tribe was forced to migrate to Palm Beach where they went into the suntan lotion business.

1250 - 1350 - During this period, there were no inhabitants on Sanibel. The island flourished as a garden primeval where wildlife in its natural form abounded. Flying creatures known as birds built nests in tall growths henceforth referred to as trees. This was a period of calm transition for Sanibel. The return of man was not far off.

1350 - At last, the return of man. The Vikings discover Sanibel and find they can't adjust to any temperature that is above 20° fahrenheit. They decide to use Sanibel as a penal colony for captured Byzantine tribes. Thus the first modern day settlers of Sanibel, sent by the Vikings, were hunting tribes from Mesopotamia called Sanibelites. Now it can be told that Sanibel got its name from the Sanibelites who were outcasts in Scandinavia but learned to work the land in Sanibel. The Sanibelites lived in Sanibel for three centuries.

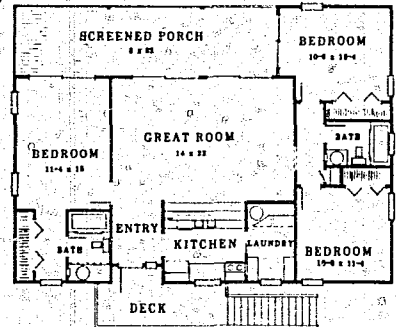
1618 - A turning point in Sanibel's history. Ponce de Leon, forever in pursuit of the fountain of

youth, made his way to Sanibel thinking he was in Paris. Compasses were not very accurate in those days. His small band of followers tricked the native Sanibelites into selling their beloved unspoiled island to de Leon for \$24 and the next year's first round draft choice. de Leon named the island Fountainbleau and established a beachhead there.

1750 - Fountainbleau, which has been governed for over a century by de Leon's followers had relegated the Sanibelites to servant status. An elitist class system evolved consequently causing stirrings of unrest on the part of the Sanibelites who initially accepted their situation with stoic resignation. As the years passed and the distinction between the ruling Fountainbleaus and the subservant Sanibelites became more marked, civil strife became more frequent.

In 1750, Bailius, the warrior leader of the Sanibelites, led a rebellion against the by now fat and lazy Fountainbleaus and forced them to flee. Bailius, for whom present day Bailey's supermarket is named, became the patron saint of this island. He quickly changed the name of the island to Baileyville which it was so named until more radical sects of the Sanibelites overthrew the existing government in 1823 and named the island Sanibel. However, Bailius' birthday February 30, is still celebrated as an annual holiday in Sanibel.

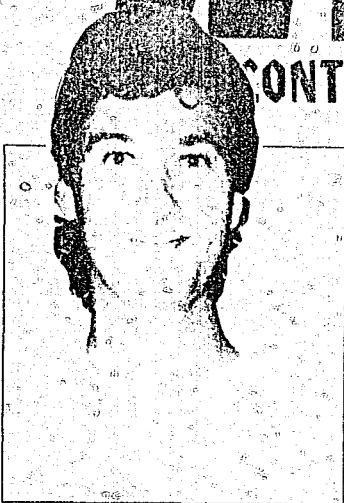

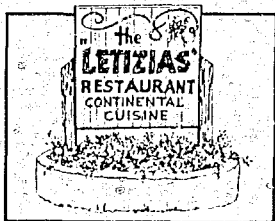

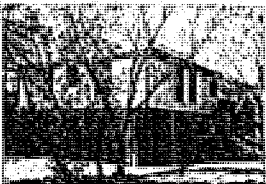

based firm which captures nuisance animals alive and unharmed.

Members of the city wildlife committee, during a briefing of Spicer's research, wanted to know more about his trapping techniques after learning of his success at nabbing raccoons.

Spicer haunts the traps with various fruit — apples seem to be a favorite — and sometimes he uses fish. As for the fable that raccoons always dip their food in water, he nods negatively.

Spicer will continue the first phase of his research through the summer, with radio tagging to track a sample population being the last phase of his work. He hopes to return in January if he can find a place to live during season.

Radio tags, which he is using, are small transmitters mounted on a collar that Spicer attaches to the raccoon after trapping and sedating it. The transmitter will emit pulsing frequencies that speed up or slow down depending on how fast the animal is moving.

Data collected from the radio tagging survey will help determine sleeping habits, movement patterns and other biological and behavioral characteristics.

As far as what island residents can do to help Spicer's research, he asks people who find road-killed raccoons hearing the yellow ear tags to call SCFC. Also, he said residents should not mess with living raccoons, especially those he has tagged for his study.

"A lot of people have a misconception that they're these nice little cuddly animals," said Spicer. "They're mean as hell."

Plumbing the depths

Though the islands are not noted for diving, there are good spots — if you know where

The only entry under the Lee County heading in the 1968 edition of "Erving's World Wide Skindiver's Guide" is "Sanibel-Captiva Island." It reads: "Noted the world over as a famous shell collecting area."

"With the new causeway you can reach by car. Extremely clear water, especially in cooler winter months."

"Enter the water on the Gulf side about mid island but don't cross private property . . ."

As vague as that description is, another book, "Ned DeLoache's Diving Guide to Underwater Florida," published in 1980, says even less. It not only fails to mention Sanibel and Captiva, it doesn't list Lee County. One has only to drive over the causeway or stroll along the beaches to see why.

For a diver Lee County waters are pathetic. On a good day you're lucky if you can see more than two or three feet. At times, especially during the rainy season, visibility is so bad that you literally can't see your hand in front of your mask. Not exactly the kind of conditions that make for an enjoyable underwater experience.

So why a story on diving you ask? Because there are some good spots around. Quite a few of them in fact. Trouble is, they are almost all offshore.

To get any kind of decent visibility — a prerequisite for most divers — you need to get out of the bay, beyond the brackish reaches of the Caloosahatchee River. Out where the water turns blue.

"Once you get offshore about eight miles you've got as good a visibility as anywhere," says charter Captain Skip Eckartz, the only local guide who specializes in diving charters.

Further out, in the 12- to 50-mile range, visibility is comparable to the Florida Keys, at times exceeding 100 feet. "Once you get offshore there's some good diving," says Sanibel diver Gordon Tracey.

There are rocks, ledges, coral reefs, and numerous wrecks, all of which provide the potential for an exciting dive. But you've got to know where to look. If you don't, says Tracey, "It's like a desert out there."

Because the sport has only recently begun to attract the kind of attention here that it has in other parts of the state for years, much of the offshore waters are still virgin territory. "It's basically an unexplored area," says Eckartz. That is changing rapidly, though, as more and more divers descend upon Lee County. "It's definitely growing," says Eckartz. "In the past two years my phone calls for diving charters have doubled."

Adds Tracey, "It's not unusual to be on some of the better known wrecks and have another boat



come up and dive."

Tracey averages about one or two offshore trips a month and claims to know the location of about two dozen wrecks, only about half of which he's dove on.

Like fishermen, divers tend to be a bit secretive about the really good spots. But that too, is changing, thanks to Fort Myers diver Ed Korzep. Korzep, who owns Underwater Explorers Diving Center and School on McGregor Boulevard helped update the newest edition of "Ned DeLoache's Guide to

Underwater Florida" so that it now includes several spots off Sanibel and Fort Myers Beach. Among the places mentioned are:

The Gardens, located about eight miles from sea buoy No. 1 off Fort Myers Beach on a 210 degree course. The area offers lots of soft coral and an abundance of tropical fish. Depths are around 25 feet with visibility averaging 15 to 20 feet.

Another popular and interesting spot is the "mud hole," one of

several freshwater springs offshore. The mud hole is located about nine miles from the same buoy on a 197 degree heading. On a calm day the spring can be spotted by the change in water color and a boil on the surface. Large jewfish and shark frequent the area with visibility anywhere from five to 20 feet.

A favorite haunt for local spearfishermen is the "W," a three-foot high rock reef shaped like the letter it is named after. The reef is located about 16 miles from sea buoy No. 1 on a 24 degree course. The area is loaded with snapper, small grouper and an occasional lobster. Depths are between 43 and 48 feet with visibility hovering around 25 feet.

The Pinnacles, 22 miles due west of the same buoy is another interesting rock formation, this one resembling steepies which rise about 15 feet off the gulf bottom. Visibility is usually about 30 feet, depths to 55 feet. The area is also popular among fishermen and at times there are so many boats there that it resembles a parking area, said Tracey.

One of the best wreck dives is an old mine sweeper sunk in 70 feet of water, 25 miles off the buoy on a 209 degree course. The 60-foot ship, is loaded with snapper and grouper.

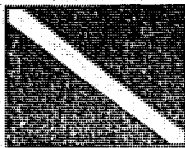
Also popular is the West Ledge, a series of ledges, some a mile long, running east and west about 22 miles out on a 300 degree heading from Sanibel Light. Equally popular among fishermen, the ledge is home to numerous grouper, snapper, shark and barracuda. Here, too, you're apt to find a lobster or two. The ledge is in about 60 feet of water, with visibility also about 60 feet.

Of course these are just a few of many known sites in the area. Shells can be collected just offshore with only a mask, fins and snorkel. Deeper dives, naturally, necessitate the use of scuba equipment and a boat.

If you've never been diving before, it's best to start with the basics: mask, fins and snorkel. Using tanks requires training and courses are available at most dive shops.

If you plan to go diving, the law requires that you fly the "divers down" flag to let boaters know you're in the water. There are also rules on spearfishing. You can't spearfish within 100 yards of a beach, fishing pier or bridge, or within 100 feet of a jetty, nor can you spear gamefish or ornamental reef fish. When you're in water designated as a park or recreation area, Tarpon Bay for example, you can't even possess spearfishing equipment.

Florida Marine Patrol duty officer Michael Cuffia offers a bit of extra advice. "Never dive alone and watch out for sharks."

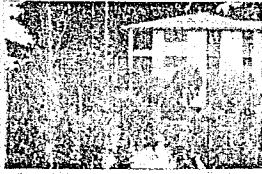

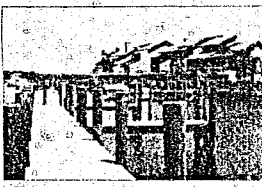

Sanibel author's 'Portrait of a Maverick' tells of computer's infancy

Along with torrid romans a *clef* and diet publications, an occasional book about business can be found on the best-seller list. The autobiography of the man who was fired by Henry Ford and went on to become touted as a presidential candidate, *Incarna*, was number one for 1986. Department store magnate Stanley Marcus had *Minding the Store* in 1972 and *Quest for the Best* in 1979.

With the corporate conscious eighties, there is an obvious demand for this type of material. Currently, number one in the hard-cover non-fiction category is *Hammer* by octogenarian capitalist and Sovietologist Armand Hammer.

An outstanding contribution has been written by Sanibel winter resident James C. Worthy and is hot off the presses of Ballinger Publishing Company, a subsidiary of Harper & Row.

Portrait of a Maverick is about William C. Norris, founder of Control Data Corporation. The author was associated with the company and its chief executive officer for more than twenty years, first as a consultant and then as member of the board of directors. What emerges is a spellbinding glimpse into the post-war years of the computer's infancy and one man's struggle to have technology positively affect life as we know it.



Starting in 1957 with a handful of employees in warehouse space rented from the Minneapolis Star and Tribune Company, Norris built "one of the great corporations of the world in an industry from which giants like General Electric, RCA, Xerox, and Bendix has retired in defeat."

He was a Nebraska farm boy, a ham radio operator who went on to study electrical engineering and was working as a sales engineer for Westinghouse Electric Company when World War II intervened in his career in a fortuitous way. He was assigned to top-secret cryptology or code-breaking, and specifically to a group within the

unit that was charged with developing speedier processing devices. This work is reported to have carried a higher security classification than the building of the atomic bomb.

By the time the war was over, Norris and his fellow officers had begun to realize the importance of research into data processing and looked for ways to keep the group together. They founded Engineering Research Associates (ERA) in St. Paul in 1946 and began to supply exotic electronic hardware to the U.S. Navy. ERA soon picked up contracts with other government agencies and by the end of 1952 it was estimated that ERA had designed and built more than 80 percent of the installed value of commercially available electronic computers in the United States at the time.

ERA was later acquired by Remington Rand and became part of Sperry Rand's Univac Division. Norris and a few of his associates left to form Control Data Corporation, which became one of the world's leading multinational corporations.

From the beginning, the company's business strategy consisted of several key concepts. They were: 1) to act as subcontractor, producing components for giants of the industry such as IBM and Burroughs; 2) to target the scientific and engineering markets; 3) to emphasize the international side of the business; 4) sell data processing time and services to companies not large enough to need a computer of their own; and 5) employ company resources to solve social problems by seeing those problems as business problems.

The going was not always easy.

There were antitrust suits with IBM over establishing market position. A suit that was filed by Control Data in 1968 and settled out of court in 1972 is background for one of the funniest parts of the book, with accounts of Norris and IBM's Thomas V. Learson requiring each other to make appointments to make telephone calls, using route names, and meeting alone in a hotel in Omaha to negotiate.


The company's efforts in the area of employing the hard core unemployed, disadvantaged and minorities were so committed that a company attorney was assigned to visit area jails on Monday mornings and bail out these trainees when necessary.

The educational computer program PLATO (Programmed Logic for Automated Teaching Operations) was a Control Data product. The company was an early innovator in encouraging employee health care.

But by 1983, Control Data experienced serious reverses with a catastrophic loss of \$567 million. These problems were a result of the company's slowness in adapting to the desktop computer and a shakeout in the computer business in general. Control Data had specialized in sales to other computer companies and so was doubly hit.

Many in the company and in business journalism blamed Norris personally for the company's misfortunes, claiming that his quiet tendency to look beyond the bottom line was responsible. He eventually retired early in 1986, but still maintains a position as chairman emeritus, a three-story Tudor office on company grounds.



Visiting English columnist decries lack of talent in arts

Englishman Geoffrey Barker puts it this way: "There is a lot of room for brilliant new talent on a lot of fronts."

Barker, currently an arts and political columnist for the London *Daily Telegraph*, tells it both plain and fancy to readers of his column "Second Opinion," and magazines *Papers & Queen in Britain and Art News in the United States*.

The columnist, his American-born wife, Ann, and their 3 1/2-year-old son, Fredrick, are now on Sanibel, having exchanged residences with islanders Ehan and Ellen Joy for a month. The Barkers live in London but annually travel to the United States.

Barker generally writes concisely, but when it comes to the dearth of talent in cinema, theatre and dance in the West, his words are truly unadorned by flowery descriptives.

"Trash is what he unabashedly calls the cinema as it emerges from Hollywood, Britain and Western Europe. "It is in a wretched state... and this last decade has been the most miserable since they started."

He cannot envision an enduring quality to the surprisingly "trivial, violent and rarely serious films of the West. "I have a feeling that in 100 years the films from Communist countries — Poland, Czechoslovakia — will be the ones remembered — the lack of freedom in Communist countries (meant that movie makers come to grips with the serious issues of our age."

Fine arts, too, is in lamentable condition. Citibank, New York, and presumably its network worldwide, has a special service for its million dollar clients, he says. "It advises them how to spend their money for fine arts in Sotheby's... which blurs the main role of the auctioneer as agent of the vendor."

The astronomical amounts of pounds being paid for paintings by impressionists, among them most notably Vincent Van Gogh's *Sunflowers* at Sotheby's recently, points up another unfortunate trend in the realm of fine arts, as it pertains to collectors, he notes.

"Since 1985, Americans are showing increasing signs of getting out of dollar investments and into art," Barker says. Thus "we have the spiraling prices — such as the \$40 million paid for the Van Gogh," purchased by a Japanese.

Although the Japanese are winning most of the battles, the Americans are chasing them up to those levels... despite the dollar not being competitive currency at the moment."

Impressionists and 20th century paintings from the School of Paris are the most sought after by the 100 wealthiest collectors, Barker claims. A breakdown of these would be 70 Americans; 15 Japanese and Far Eastern buyers; 13 British, European and others, according to Barker.

Proferring his Sotheby's catalog, Barker said "The owner of this Horace Vernet — the poor man's Delacroix — 'The Boar Hunt' wants 400,000 to 600,000 pounds, but the bid was only 285,000 pounds."

As for the theatre, he points out that 12 to 16 musicals are showing in London at the moment. "This is not altogether a happy state... Bland and non-controversial theatre in London, besides the musicals presently consists of American comedies of the 1920s and 1930s and classical favorites: Shakespeare, Strindberg, J.B. Priestley and T.S. Eliot."

Then there is the opera. "These days in London we talk Pountney's 'Carmen' or Zeffirelli's 'Carmen' rather than Bizet's..."

As for dance, its audiences will gaze nostalgically backward to the recent past of the great choreographers Ashton, McMillan, Balanchine, John Cranko of South Africa, Glenn Tetley and Jerome Robbins. "We just didn't understand what was such a stupendously fertile period of dance invention between the years 1950 and 1990," he says. "The paucity of talent we are living through in the 1980s — helps one to see that."

The 42-year-old Barker prepared for his career with credentials neither in art, history nor political studies, but in history. He had attended public school at Dulwich College "which is more famous for its art gallery than its school," he maintains. The collection is Britain's "finest private one."

At 18, he went to Cambridge to study history; and after graduating, went on to Oxford for his "D. Phil.," as he refers to the doctorate in philosophy.

"I'm an historian by university upbringing," Barker notes but says he knew nothing about either the performing or visual arts fields 10 years ago. He has since "read the necessary books, written the necessary essays and talked to the right people" to become an expert, an avenue that could be open to

anyone, he infers.

"But you've got to do your history first," Barker believes and decries a certain tendency at Cambridge and Oxford these days toward more specialized education.

Barker's start in journalism at age 24 was in *Independent Television* in London. When it was pointed out to him that he couldn't keep his head still nor cease talking out of the corner of his mouth, he joined the staff of the *Daily Telegraph* and worked at political causes until 1979 when he left and wrote for magazines. In 1981, he returned to the newspaper as a political columnist and remained in the job until a new editor appointed him arts editor.

"I was most reluctant to take it because I had to drop the political column," says Barker. "But journalists must be kept fresh and be able to move from subject to subject... The job lasted for a year."

Now he has embarked on the writing of the two columns, the one satirizing the political scene and the other on the arts.

"Look at me now!" he exclaims. "I'm a relaxed man."

Well, on Sanibel, yes. But the *Daily Telegraph* arrives in the mail box daily nonetheless. And he is not so relaxed that he isn't writing for the magazines even from here. □

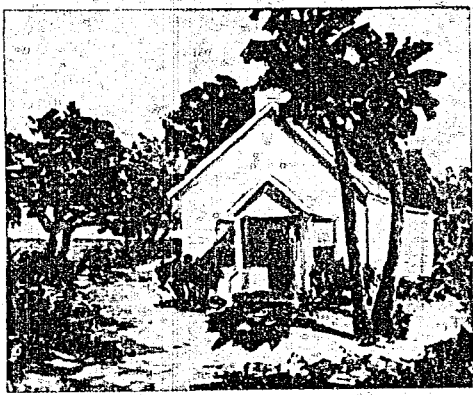
The murals will depict Florida animals, birds and vegetation and complement a grey carpet with design of sandpipers, also designed by Matsumoto.

Panel near doors will have individual wildlife — "a raccoon, heron, crab, owl, Florida panther, dolphin and fish so that the kids who can't read can identify the doors," said the artist.

A hand rail in natural oak will separate a light blue sky above it (to the ceiling) and a deeper blue sea below it (to the baseboard), according to Matsumoto's preliminary drawings. Against these backgrounds will be stylized birds and animals in more or less natural habitats.

They were 'Born on the Fourth of July'

It's Yankee Doodle Dandy time again. Before the computerized coloring by Ted Turner of the James Cagney classic its showing on TV was usually limited to the July 4 holidays. During the past year almost every week has been celebrated as "Yankee Doodle Ted Turner-time" on his Atlanta-based WTBS.

The 1942 movie is a nostalgic biography of George M. Cohan. Born in Providence, Rhode Island, on July 4, 1898, he wrote the stirring song "Over There" in 1918 on the eve of the American entry into World War I. The immediate publication of the song had the youth of America charging with patriotic fervor to the recruiting stations. A further tribute to "the man who owned Broadway" is a stage musical *Give My Regards to Brodway*, which opened in Chicago in 1985 and is presently touring the stock circuits throughout the country.

Being born on the "glorious fourth" doesn't automatically insure patriotism — but it's a good start. Louis H. Mayer, often described as the ruthless and tyrannical executive head of the MGM empire during the 1930-50 era, was born on July 18, 1885. He emigrated from Russia as a child and became the most powerful movie mogul in history. Despite his reputation in some darker areas he was also noted for the exaltation of virtue and patriotism in all movies made under his protective wing.

George Murphy was an MGM star of the same era, and later served as U.S. Senator from California. On top of all that he was born on July 4, 1902. With unmistakable Irish charm he smiled and tap-danced his way through screen musicals with Fred Astaire, Gene Kelly, Judy Garland — and even Shirley Temple. Now starting his 85th year, he is active in scores of public services.

Washington, D.C. at least twice a month, confers with Bob Hope regularly, and is writing a book called *Fakes, Frauds, Follies, and Some Good Guys*. Yet he found time to write a letter last year thanking me for a story I featured in this column — to include a correction in an ailment attributed to him, which was really one suffered by his wife of some 47 years. He's another "real live nephew of his Uncle Sam."

Although "almost" doesn't really count for much, the list of those "a day late and a dollar short" include: Dan Ackroyd, Ned Beatty, Merv Griffin, Art Stevens, and Olivia de Havilland. A happy birthday anyway to all those who arrived shortly before or after the big day.



with a grain of salt

One man's poison is another's feast

A few hundred years ago, a very patriotic young lady, who had been brought up a Royalist, was shocked and horrified when a dastardly traitor tried to overthrow her king and take over her country. He even raised an army for his nefarious schemes, which tore at her very soul.

As she was a very good cook, she decided to take matters into her own hands and rid her king of the bothersome fellow. She infiltrated into the very center of the enemy camp, and finally worked her way up to personal cook for the leader. Chortling with glee, she fixed him a casserole comprised of the fruits of the deadly nightshade, which she, along with everyone else of her generation, knew were fatally poisonous.

Her plans came to naught, however, since General George Washington was very pleased with the delicious eggplant-tomato dish she had prepared.

I do not guarantee you that this is the same recipe she created; however, I do guarantee you that it is very simple, and non-caloric, since it contains no oil, which eggplant normally soaks up like a sponge.

Peel and cube one eggplant. Oddly enough, it takes as long to cook in a full size microwave as it does on top of the stove, and if you have a half pint microwave, it will take longer. If you happen to use a pressure cooker with ease, it takes two minutes. On top of the stove, covered, having added about 1/4 cup of water, it takes eight to ten



minutes. You can tell it's done when it is quite tender and looks translucent.

Drain well in a colander and put in an oven-proof casserole dish which will fit in your toaster oven. Add two ounces of grated mozzarella cheese, 1/2 cup grated parmesan or romano cheese, a scant tsp. garlic powder and eight ounces of your favorite bottled spaghetti sauce. Mix thoroughly, pat down, and put a light sprinkle of grated cheese and a little more mozzarella on top, if you like.

Bake in a pre-heated toaster oven for approximately 20 minutes or until heated through.

This recipe can be doubled or tripled with

ease, although, of course, you will have to put the bigger casserole in a regular oven.

It is absolutely delicious, eaten immediately, and almost better served cold the next day.

I do want to warn you of one thing... eggplants are famous for being deceiving; sometimes an eggplant will only cover the bottom of a loaf pan after it is steamed, while another of the same size might produce a good two and half to three inches of depth. Adjust your added ingredients accordingly. The proportions given here are for about two and a quarter inches of eggplant in a regulation loaf pan.

But as I said before, it is, terrific cold the next day, so don't worry if you have leftovers; they won't be left for very long!

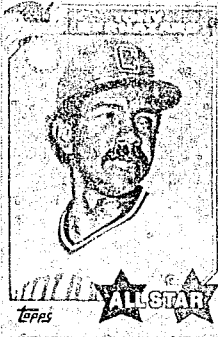

Baseball card collecting becomes major business

The variety of reasons people can find for visiting South Seas Plantation on Captiva Island must approach the infinite. Ed Gaddy of Nashville, TN came up with a unique one. He was in the area for a major baseball card show at Cape Coral Country Club last Sunday.

Baseball card collecting is one of the fastest-growing hobbies in the country as more and more adults are discovering the thrill of owning a classic item which will appreciate in value. In fact, says Gaddy, many people are getting into baseball card collecting for the wrong reasons. Coin dealers and investors have dramatically inflated the prices in recent years.

The owner of E. Gadd's Baseball Cards in Nashville, Gaddy learned about the Cape Coral event from a listing in the current issue of *Sports Collectors Digest*. He had previously visited South Seas when he won a vacation in an auction on a Nashville public television station and then later when his parents owned a time share.

Gaddy was being a mainstream, humdrum life as a spare-parts salesman for a dredging company in 1979 and something made him get out his old baseball card collection from 1952-64 when the hobby was still pure. He got a price book, looked up the values and discovered that his collection, started with nickels and dimes, was now worth several thousand dollars.

He began taking his collection around on the flea market circuit in Nashville, Knoxville, Memphis and Chattanooga and opened his

business six years ago.

Having been rained out of a golf game on Saturday, Gaddy left the show early on Sunday to take advantage of a lovely day on the South Seas course. He said his business is doing quite well and his main purpose at the show was to "pick up some things for resale."

Nashville's home town team, the Nashville Sounds, have boosted the local business with such admired players as Don Mattingly and Steve Balboni. Old timers such as Joe DiMaggio and Pee Wee Reeser recently attended a major show at Opryland and Bob Feller of the Cleveland Indians is coming to Gaddy's shop in August for an autograph appearance.

Autographed 8 by 10 glossy pictures now constitute the heart of Gaddy's personal collection displayed on his E. Gadd's Wall of Fame. He has a quarter of a million cards in the back room of his shop to enable collectors to complete almost any set.

Besides the autographs, Gaddy is proudest of his 1954 Red Heart Dog Food Star Mural and his 1953 Cardinal Yearbook.

There are four major baseball card companies now, says Gaddy. Topps is the only one that still comes with gum. "It's the biggest set and the easiest to get." Donrus started the promotion phenogonoff and Fleer is another company, which has caused some volatility in the market.

"They had too much product in 1983 and then had to cut back. This year they were sold out in December."

According to Gaddy, the hottest new card is Eric Davis of the Cincinnati Reds. Wade Boggs is also a

A few hundred years ago, a very patriotic young lady, who had been brought up a Royalist, was shocked and horrified when a dastardly traitor tried to overthrow her king and take over her country. He even raised an army for his nefarious schemes, which tore at her very soul.

As she was a very good cook, she decided to take matters into her own hands and rid her king of the bothersome fellow. She infiltrated into the very center of the enemy camp, and finally worked her way up to personal cook for the leader. Chortling with glee, she fixed him a casserole comprised of the fruits of the deadly nightshade, which she, along with everyone else of her generation, knew were fatally poisonous.

Her plans came to naught, however, since General George Washington was very pleased with the delicious eggplant-tomato dish she had prepared.

I do not guarantee you that this is the same recipe she created; however, I do guarantee you that it is very simple, and non-caloric, since it contains no oil, which eggplant normally soaks up like a sponge.

Peel and cube one eggplant. Oddly enough, it takes as long to cook in a full size microwave as it does on top of the stove, and if you have a half-pint microwave, it will take longer. If you happen to use a pressure cooker with ease, it takes two minutes. On top of the stove, covered, having added about 3/4 cup of water, it takes eight to ten



minutes. You can tell it's done when it is quite tender and looks translucent.

Drain well in a colander and put in an oven-proof casserole dish which will fit in your toaster oven. Add two ounces of grated mozzarella cheese, 1/2 cup grated parmesan or romano cheese, a scant tsp. garlic powder, and eight ounces of your favorite bottled spaghetti sauce. Mix thoroughly, pat down, and put a light sprinkle of grated cheese and a little more mozzarella on top, if you like.

Bake in a pre-heated toaster oven for approximately 20 minutes or until heated through.

This recipe can be doubled or tripled with

ease, although, of course, you will have to put the bigger casserole in a regular oven.

It is absolutely delicious eaten immediately, and almost better served cold the next day.

I do want to warn you of one thing... eggplants are famous for being deceiving; sometimes an eggplant will only cover the bottom of a loaf pan to the depth of one inch after it is steamed, while another of the same size might produce a good two and half to three inches of depth. Adjust your added ingredients accordingly. The proportions given here are for about two, and a quarter inches of eggplant in a regulation loaf pan.

But as I said before, it is terrific cold the next day, so don't worry if you have leftovers; they won't be left for very long!!!

New express mail service

The freshly painted orange and blue collection box labeled "Deposit Express Mail Only" in front of Sanibel Post Office is the postal service's latest innovation to give express mailers advantage of not waiting in lobby lines. Postage must be prepaid (\$10.75) on meter strip or stamp for up to two pounds. Mailing containers and express mail labels may be obtained in advance at the post office, says Sanibel Postmaster Paul Adams.

The box in front of the post office will be collected at 12:30 p.m. for dispatch at 12:55 p.m. The list of destination post offices guaranteed delivery by 3 p.m. the next day may be checked by asking clerk about specific first three digit zip code destinations, Adams adds.

The box is also collected at 4:15 p.m. every day for dispatch at 5:15 p.m. However, this is a more limited network of zip codes for overnight guarantee. The 12:30 p.m. collection has a wider range of guaranteed overnight destination cities, he says.

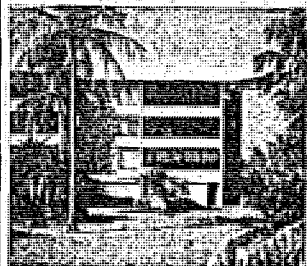

Proposed new rules will give tarpon, redfish a break

The Florida Marine Fisheries Commission (MFC) held three days of hearings in Fort Myers on fisheries rule proposals. It turned into three days of testing the endurance of those who came to present input.

The first day was to deal with final proposals on stone crabs, a decision on limiting Sanibel's live shells, followed by a workshop on redfish and a policy decision on amendments to the current redfish closure rule.

By the end of the day, when the meeting room had to be vacated, nothing on redfish had been settled so it was carried over to the next day and the starting time set an hour earlier than previously scheduled.

It took two hours to reach a final decision on redfish the next morning. After everyone had their say and several recommendations proposed by the commissioners were amended, amended again, died for lack of a second, or failed to gain enough votes, a proposal was finally approved which would open the season from Oct. 1 to Dec. 31, 1987, allowing one redfish per person per day for recreational fishermen, five fish per boat per day for commercial fishermen, with no fish larger than 27 inches allowed. The remainder of the original rule for redfish would remain in effect, i.e. minimum length of 18 inches, fish must be landed whole and no treble hooks allowed when fishing with a natural bait.

The goal of the MFC is to develop a "permanent" rule before this "temporary" rule expires on Dec. 31, 1987. Otherwise, the permanent closure rule will remain in effect until such time as an acceptable "permanent" rule can be developed to replace the closure rule.

The MFC strategy in passing the permanent closure rule until repealed was to discourage any legal challenges to proposed temporary or permanent amendments such as delayed the Spanish mackerel rule for many months.

The temporary redfish rule proposal must go to another public hearing elsewhere in the state and then, if no changes are made, go to the Governor and Cabinet for final approval.

When the redfish topic was finally resolved, a brief recess was called.

For several weeks, in anticipation of the hearing on tarpon, Florida League of Anglers (FLA) had been providing all available information to local clubs, tournament sponsors and individual tarpon anglers and asked that they send a representative to provide their input and comments on tarpon to the commissioners. A motion had been made at the December, 1986 workshop to advertise that the commission was seriously considering a ban on the killing of tarpon except under certain condi-

Ralph Honk, a member of the Sanibel club as well as the Cape Coral club, also presented comments. Representatives from the taxidermy industry spoke. As did representatives from the Suncoast Tarpon Roundup, Tampa, the Hillsborough Tarpon Tournament, Tampa and the Venice Tarpon Tournament, and several guides' associations.

Most speakers expressed support for conserving the species and some clubs and groups have been leaders in encouraging release for several years. A few groups did not support no-kill at present. They asked that more research be conducted. If research showed the species to be in trouble, they would then support no kill.

Almost every speaker asked the commission to undertake research on the tarpon to determine more precisely what condition the stocks are in. Some were disappointed that the commission seemed to turn a deaf ear to that request. The commission is not funded to conduct research. Research is the domain of the Department of Natural Resources. As far as we have been able to determine, no request for funds for tarpon was included in this year's budget request to the Legislature.

As a source of funds for tarpon research, the commission suggested that the Legislature be asked to institute a tag, or stamp, whereby those who wished to kill a tarpon for a world record or a trophy mount could purchase a stamp for an unspecified sum (perhaps \$10 or \$50), similar to the stamps sold to finance research for ducks and other game.

Dick Pope, representing the Don Hawley Foundation which sponsors the Don Hawley Tarpon Flyfishing Tournament in the Keys, announced that the Hawley Foundation would award \$10,000 to the commission for tarpon research and that a further \$10,000 to \$20,000 was expected to be raised to add to that sum.

The final decision by the commission was to reduce the current bag and possession limit to one per person per day until June 30, 1989 and then to zero. This was to allow time for the Legislature to act on the stamp recommendation, in which case this rule would revert to one per person per day.

Proposed rules for redfish and tarpon

REDFISH — From Oct. 1 to Dec. 31, 1987:
 One per person per day in possession, for recreational fishermen; five per boat per day for commercial fishermen; no fish longer than 27 inches; minimum length - 18 inches; fish landed whole; no treble hooks allowed when fishing with natural bait.

TARPON — From effective date of rule:
 One per person per day in possession until June 30, 1989.

(Both proposed rules subject to another public hearing and then must be approved by the Governor and Cabinet.)

Some of the local club representatives had prior commitments for the afternoon, so FLA asked the commission chairman if he would reschedule the tarpon workshop to immediately follow the recess. Chairman Fox was agreeable to the suggestion and when the meeting reconvened 30 speakers were heard from.

Larry Paul led off, representing Sanibel Island Fishing Club, followed by David McQuade, president of South West Anglers Club. Tom McAllister, vice-president of the Cape Coral Club represented the majority views from that club, and Lou Martelli spoke for Port Myers Beach Tarpon Club. Ken Blank gave the opinions for the Southwest Florida Tarpon Rodeo sponsors. Carlene Baum, vice-president of Sanibel Island Fishing Club and
