





Although each of your experts may know one aspect of your financial life in great depth, you're the only person who has the big picture. Be sure your team of advisers understands your financial strategy so that they can advise you in a coordinated, productive way as you work toward your financial goals.

How can you get the most out of your financial team? Here are a few tips.

 When choosing advisers, keep in mind that you'll want to rely on them for many years as your finances evolve. So even though your cousin, the corporate attorney, may be able to write a simple will, you'll need someone with more relevant expertise when it comes time to set up trusts or plan your estate.

 Ask business associates and friends whose judgement you respect to recommend professionals who understand personal financial matters.

• When you meet the accountant, lawyer or financial consultant for the first time, explain your current and anticipated needs clearly.

• Make sure you feel comfortable with this person's outlook and methods. If, for example, a financial consultant specializes in aggressive investments and you prefer a lower-risk approach, ask the consultant to refer another associate who will be able to match your viewpoint.

 Ask questions about anything you want, including fees. Lawyers and accountants are usually paid by the hour; rates vary widely around the country. Certain services, such as drafting a simple will, may be done for a flat fee. Financial consultants are paid by commissions on your securities transactions.

• Keep each member of your team abreast of major changes in your situation. Only by knowing all pertinent facts can they advise you properly.

In the end, a carefully selected and properly managed financial team will help you determine and achieve your financial goals.

Seekers of financial advice should use caution

If you're seeking help with your financial planning, you will find that many different types of professionals offer this type of service.

In addition to individual planners, many attorneys, accountants and insurance agents also are "financial planners."

A financial planner analyzes the strengths and weaknesses of your current savings patterns, helps to formulate personal financial goals and assesses your needs and priorities with regard to insurance, taxes and estate plans. Based on the degree of risk you're willing to assume, a financial planner will suggest strategies to achieve these goals.

The federal government and most states, including Florida, do not license financial planners. However, a person who holds himself out as an "investment adviser" or who renders investment advice as defined by Florida law, is required to be registered.

Florida law defines an investment adviser (or consultant) as a person who receives compensation for advising others about purchasing, selling or investing in securities. Some exceptions exist for stock brokers and dealers, attorneys, certified public accountants, banks, bank holding companies, and trust companies which offer investment advice in connection with their regular business.

Also exempt are prople who give investment advice exclusively to insurance or investment companies or people who don't hold themselves out to the general

public to be investment advisers and who have no more than 15 clients within 12 consecutive months in Florida.

If you're dealing with a financial planner, check his educational background and professional certification. A college degree in accounting is useful but not

In addition, many planners are certified by one of the following organizations: the American Society of Chartered Life Underwriters, the Institute of Certified Financial Planners, the International Association for Financial Planning and the International Association of Registered Financial Planners.

Financial planners commonly use initials to specify their designations: CFP stands for Certified Financial Planner, ChFC for Chartered Financial Consultant. and CLU for Chartered Life Underwriter.

If the financial planner offers investment advice, he must register with the state of Florida and with the Securities and Exchance Commission. Registered investment advisers usually use the initials RIA after their names.

The comptroller of Florida, Gerald Lewis, has a tollfree hotline number, 1-800-848-3792, which you may call before investing any money. His office will tell you if your investment adviser is registered with the state. The office also has the addresses of the various financial planning associations to which you may write to confirm a planner's certification.





Leaky copper pipes still under discussion

Sanibel city councilmen are not satisfied with Island Water Association's efforts to solve the problem honmeowners have been having with copper plumbing pipes that have developed leaks.

The leaks are caused by premature corrosion of the copper pipes, and city staff members have been looking into the problem for some months.

Mayor Mike Klein and Councilman Lennart Lorenson, both victims of leaking pipes, consider IWA's system of adding chemical substances to reduce the "aggressiveness" of water produced by the IWA's reverse osmosis plant "too little, too late."

IWA's General Manager Bob Hollander explained in a letter to City Manager Gary Price that, in the two months since the problem surfaced, IWA has been seeking ways to further protect its water supply system and the plumbing pipes connected to it. "While the degree of protection has always been within the parameters s by regulating bodies," Hollands said, "We have been successful in i creasing it to even higher levels during this period.

"We will continue to maintain the enhanced protection indefinitely," l

added.

and Price said the results of tests IW
had conducted on the corroded pipwere not conclusive.


But after increasing the amount corrosion inhibitors added to the water a test using tabs placed in various places throughout IWA's system for specific length of time revealed the water was much less aggressive Price said.

Klein said IWA has not solved the problem and suggested the corporation conduct more extensive research in what components in the water a causing the corrosion.


If you did, it's bad news. The man who came running out of the door happens to be the bank president.

Once in Naples, Sanibel Police Department Lt. Lew Phillips and sergeants Jack Primm and Dick Church trained with other officers to qualify for the state required certification course.

Primm explained that most of the work was reviewing shotgun and police combat procedures and barricade shooting. "It's a refresher course to practice shooting by sitting and kneel-

ing in certain positions," Primm said.
At the F.A.T.S testing site, each officer was able to react in two scenios.

"It's realistic training for any officer," Primm said. "It shows you how you would react in certain situations and it surprising how some officers respond."

All three Sanibel officers scored high in the firearms tests. Each was also awarded a certificate for the completion of the training.

Both Primm and Phillips said the techniques and procedures they learned at the school will be applied and taught to other SPD officers in the



The White Ibis

An ancient bird once served for Christmas and Thanksgiving dinner whose crimson beak ensured its survival

he J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge is a favorite feeding ground for many water birds. But since only the white ibis boasts a crooked beak, it always stands out from the crowd.

This salient feature, which ornithologists tactfully call a downcurved bill, serves two purposes. For the benefit of budding bird watchers, it immediately distinguishes one white species from all the others. But in the pale-blue eyes of Eudocimus albus, its crooked beak ensures survival.

Indeed, the downcurved bill with a pointed tip is perfect for probing holes and pulling out the bird's preferred prey; crustaceans. Although hopeful herons and egrets frequently follow the white ibis, the latter generally swallows its catch before tailgaters have a chance to steal it.

At a pinch, the white ibis will settle for small frogs, fishes, slugs, or snails. But the bird's predilection for crayfish plays an important ecological role.

By consuming vast quantities of crayfish, ibis colonies prevent the crustaceans from destroying fish populations. Moreover, ibis droppings in the waters around their mangrove roosts promote the growth of plankton, the foundation of the marsh food chain.

Since the fossil record of the ibis family is about 60 million years old, the birds have played their ecological role for an extraordinarily long time. While their record in human history is much shorter, ibises have generally fared far better than some of their relatives.


The ancient Egyptians believed that one of their gods, undeterred by the prospect of sporting a downcurved bill, periodically appeared in the form of an ibis. They revered the sacred ibis to such a degree that the bird was often mummified, buried with a dear departed pharaoh, and guaranteed immortality.

Unlike the Egyptians' sacred ibis, our white ibis was once a source of nourishment rather than reverence. Indians hunted them extensively, and early Floridians often served eudocimus albus on a hot platter at Thanksgiving and Christmas.

But although plume hunters decimated the ranks of great and snowy egrets, they generally ignored the white ibis. After all, milliners who paid a small fortune for lacy nuptial plumes were not interested in adorning their fancy chapeaux with crimson bird beaks.

During the breeding season, the white ibis's reddish bill, face and legs turn bright red, a comehither color that the opposite sex finds utterly irresistible. Thus between bites on the feeding grounds, an ibis often attracts and courts a mate simultaneously. Other wading birds should be so

For example, egrets spend a lot of time parading around and displaying their nuptial plumes in order to attract a mate. Subsequently, courtship takes place in the rookery. While their mating game may not be tiring, it's certainly time consuming.

But when a white ibis goes a courting on the feeding grounds, it often turns to the rookery with a willing mate. Without further ado, the pair gets down to the business of building a nest and producing eggs.

In terms of ensuring survival of the species, a crooked bill that turns crimson has much to





Counted cross stitch doesn't scare people anymore. Once their arm was twisted to try it, they found it to be quick, easy, and attractive. A blank fabric comes to life as the needler counts from a printed chart and makes corresponding stitches. The stitcher chooses the color, size, fiber, and weave of the fabric. It can be bold and easy, or minute, requiring a magnifying glass. Now, they can make their own chart.


A popular project of many is a stitched poem, wedding, birth announcement or favorite saying. Often there is no chart to follow, but there are many alphabets designed for these customized samplers. I have included a very basic upper and lower case alphabet. The letters are all worked in back stitch not cross stitch and are quick to do.

Print your sampler line by line on a piece of paper. Count the squares needed for each letter. Notice that no squares are needed for the letter "i", but two squares are needed for the "m" and "w". Write this number at the end of the line.

Count one space between each letter and two spaces between each word. Add this number to the end of the line. Total the two numbers. Calculate the other lines in the same manner. Now, will the longest line fit on





Ken Turney

Painter who reveals the world's beauty in his works

When Fort Myers artist Ken Turney was president of the Arts Council of Southwest Florida, he used to open up the meetings with a word of thanks to God for creating such a beautiful world.

"As we paint," Turney explains, "we're trying to convey a message to people. In a beautiful painting, we're telling people that the world is beautiful. The artist just happens to capture to the beauty on canvas."

At 77, Turney has been capturing the beauty in the world for more than half a century. Painting with the Sanibel-Captiva Art League on a Thursday morning, Turney can turn a simple island sun scene into a masterpiece on canvas with brilliant corals, hazy violets and shady pastels. The historical Lighthouse turns into a rugged symbol of the island when portrayed by Turney. And the beach, with its beige

sand, skyblue waters and a slick, yellow umbrella covering peaceful beachgoers, comes to life on canvas with Turney's brushstrokes.

But Turney's love for beauty goes beyond portraying it on canvas. The work he does with his hands can be seen in the variety of International Fireball and El Toro class dinghies he has built over the years. His love in using his hands to create, and using his mind to supply the creativity, can also be remembered by the many display windows he designed for retail stores and for an entire floor of offices for the Alexander Grant firm of accountants.

As a creator, Turney has seen and done it all, it seems. As a member of various art leagues, Turney has gained exposure on and off the island and residents of Sanibel and Captiva have appreciated his work for many years. Next month, islanders can enjoy his work as it will be featured at the Sanibel Public Library.

Turney came to Southwest Florida in 1978 after having visited the area several times. While on a December vacation in Periwinkle Park, Turney and his wife, Dorothy, decided to transfer their roots permanently. Turney left his wife on the sunny beaches of Florida while he traveled back to Boardman, Ohio, to sell a boating operation.

"It took me two years to sell out," Turney says of his boat business, "but I knew I wanted to be in Florida so I waited and waited."

Finally, with the business sold, Turney bought a place on McGregor Boulevard and settled in to the comfort of warm weather.

Often down at the Fort Myers Beach marina, Turney found himself admiring the artists who painted beach scenes every week.

"At the time, I said to myself, 'I used to do this,' and decided it was time to paint again," he says. He joined the Fort Myers Beach Art Association and soon became affliated with the San-Cap Art League and the Naples Art Association. During the next several years, he added the Lee County Alliance of the Arts, the Florida Watercolor Society and, most recently, the Barrier Island Group for the

Joining the various leagues, Turney says, gave him a chance to see different artists' works and

learn more about art.

It also helped him obtain more creativity for his own work.

But, Turney explains, he's always had a knack for creating something and over the years, he's realized how everything has a place in society.

From an early age, Turney began displaying his talents in the art field. At the age of 12, he designed and had printed hand-colored Christmas cards that he sold to neighbors and friends of his church. In high school and college, he won awards for poster

From college he went on to become a display director in retail stores. "I loved working with others in creating a window," Turney says. "Our ideas would come together and we'd use certain colors to attract our audience. It was a great thrill to see customers walk by and admire your window."

At the age of 50, Turney was taken sailing for the first time. He was so taken back by the beauty of the sport, that he bought a day sailor and learned to sail and race. Sometime later, he dabbled with building boats and went on to surprise his daughter at her graduation with a boat he had built especially for her. The following year, his second daughter, who was envious of her sister's boat, requested a boat and again, Turney built another.

In the meantime, Turney continued to paint But with other projects in the works, Turney didn't devote his entire attention to the art until he settled in Florida.

He turned to watercolor painting in 1981 after visting Maine. "I was so taken back by the mountain scenes and brilliant colors that I knew watercolors would capture the scene best," he says.

At home in Florida, Turney turns to the beauty of the Florida sky, sea and environment for his inspiration.

"Just the other day, I was watching a sunset over Sanibel," Turney says. "It was unlike any that I've ever seen. After the sun went down, I relaxed for awhile and thought about the beauty of the scene. In my head, I chose the colors I would work with and how I would use the sequence of paints. I predetermined the painting in my head."

Turney smiles when he speaks of his own work but says the greatest compliments on his paintings come from the audience not reviewers.

"Everyone always thinks it's so complimentary to be given a review from an art critic. I believe that mass judgment is more accurate and more acceptable than the highly refined end products delivered by specialists," he says.

"In fact, I value my wife's opinion simply because

she's an integrated part of the mass."

In reality, Turney says, his wife does provide input to each painting and of course, there are a few pieces of his work she likes better than the rest.

And he does not mind criticism, he says, because he's learned to deal with individual comments, whether good or bad.

"I know my work isn't going to appeal to everyone, but if it makes at least a few people see the beauty in the world, then I've gotten my message across," he explains.

The San-Cap Art League's October show will feature Turney's watercolor paintings at the library weekdays from 1 a.m. to 4 p.m., Wednesday evenings from 7 to 9 p.m. and Saturdays from 10 a.m. to noon.

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

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
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

'Moon over Parador' has moments of charm

Directed by Paul Mazursky Starring Richard Dreyfuss, Raul Julia and Sonia Braga Rated PG-13 (profanity, sexual situations) Playing at the Bell Tower West, Fort Myers

"Parador" is a hypothetical hybrid of Paraguay and Ecuador that exist only in the imagination of Paul Mazursky ("Down and Out in Beverly Hills"). It's also the banana republic setting for the new film that he produced, directed and co-scripted, "Moon Over Parador."

Richard Dreyfuss stars as Jack Naoh, a New York actor of moderate success who's just completed a film in Parador as a cut-rate Don Johnson. He bears a striking resemblance to the puppet dictator of Parador, one Alphonse Simms. (Dreyfuss' older brother was used when both actors appeared in the same frame. Part of the fun is figuring out which one is being used in these opening scenes.)

When Simms dies suddenly, Jack is called on by the Fascist chief of secret police, Roberto Straussman (Raul Julia), to take his place. Unwilling at first, Jack is ultimately persuaded by an absurd combination of flattery and the threat of violence. When Straussman snarls, "Play the part or I'll kill you," Jack replies, "You'd make a very good director."

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
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Sea trout shortage makes finding a keeper almost impossible

If you are having a difficult time finding some legal-size sea trout, you're not the only one. The rest of us are hunting hard to find a few keepers, too.

It's sad to see the decline of this fish and very few people in higher places are paying much attention to what I see as a steady decline in trout. If you've been fishing specifically for trout, you might agree.

It seems that the commercial net fishermen get the blame for just about everything from the cost of a fish dinner in a restaurant to killing sea grass. The truth of the matter is we are all gradually contributing to the loss of what used to be our most easily caught fish.

Ten years ago, on a bad day my charters could catch a dozen legal-size 12-inch trout. And in that bunch, there would be a couple of fish 15 inches or more. I had a trout mounted for a lady which went 28 inches.

Now, it's a good day to get six legal fish, and finding one over 15 inches is a rarity. It's a shame for two reasons.

One is that the once-popular trout could be caught by just about anyone, with or without a boat. Heavy.

fishing experience was not a factor. Just cast out a popping cork over the grass flats and sooner or later, a trout would come to it. We used to drift the same flats time after time, catching a fish or two each drift. Last time I drifted the flats for trout, we caught some pinfish, a lizard fish, several catfish and a couple of undersized trout.

The other disturbing factor in this problem is that the net fishermen have been cut off from catching redfish, as we all have. The result was that in order to keep an income flowing, they had to look for trout to fill that redfish void.

Lots of anglers I know are quick to jump on the

netters for the shortage of trout, but there are several other factors entering into the situation.

A man on the mainland who sells bait and tack was talking with me a few days ago about the tro He had an interesting point. He said to think about the catfish population. It hardly ever declines. The trash fish are unhooked and released in most instances. Their numbers are probably about the same as 10 years or even 100 years ago.

The competition for food between the trout and catfish has to be fierce. The loss of grass beds, th hunting grounds for trout, are continuing, while the growing catfish population gobbles up food.

There are still some fine catches of sea trout meach day, but lower your expectations when you head out, because the number of fish around the islands is declining and the average size being caught is smaller than just a few years ago.

It's starting to become obvious, at least for this area of Florida, that yet more fishing laws are in works to set catch limits and increase the minimusize for these fish. It reminds me of an old Pogo cartoon: "We've met the enemy, and they are u

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These weeks of strong winds from hurricanes continue to make for excellent shelling, particularly for the ones we have not been seeing much of in the past few months.

However, shells with strong holding abilities can dig into the sandy bottom when waves build in front of the winds. Shells like the pens, the left-handed whelks, horse conchs and others with body weight and the ability to hold on usually weather bad

The rounded shells lack those strong foot muscles of the whelks and conchs and often are washed ashore -- to fulfil the dreams of collectors.

Olive shells are one of those easily dislodged and sent to the beaches. The living olives burrow only an inch or so below the sand. Unlike angel wings or

some other clams, the olive doesn't burrow down, it lives parallel with the sand.

The pear whelks are favorites of collectors and some wonderful specimens are coming to the beaches, because, once again, they have no holding power in the moving sands. The operculum of this shell is relatively small. That, combined with its habit of living on top of the sand, is why so many have been found recently.

The shark eyes are members of the moon snail

family. They could be the size of a golf ball, and roll about as easily. A close cousin is the natica, one of my favorites. Both are easy victims of rough sea conditions and many of each have been found in the past month.

Oddly enough, another member of the moon family, the lady's ear, digs into the sand very well. It uses a massive muscular foot to anchor itself and although any shell can be sent to death on the beach, ly, the lady's ear, digs into the sand very well. It the lady's ear hold its own on a wave-battered beach.

Good shelling this week, so please observe the twoliving-shells-per-person law. There is great temptation to load up a bucket when you are lucky enough to find many living shells, but please help us keep a few for the new generation.
