

Celebration of community; civic leaders recognized

Sanibel Community Association's Tony Lapi named 'Citizen of the Year' by Chamber of Commerce

Perhaps no one in the entire city of Sanibel has been busiest this past year than Sanibel Community Association President Tony Lapı.

Wednesday afternoon, the hard work, long hours and unparalleled devotion to the city of Sanibel paid off, when he was named as the Sanibel-Captiva Chamber of Commerce's "Citizen of the Year."

Wildlife Committee: Looking to the past to save the future

Did you ever wonder what Sanibel was like before man arrived, carved roads through the center of the island, built sprawling resorts along a once untouched waterfront, and constructed a bridge that would, over time, destroy what was at the very core this island?

Over the past century, Sanibel has undergone dramatic changes in wildlife habitat. The island of Sanibel was, at one time, a wildlife sanctuary.

But now that homes, resorts and commercial areas are developed and the island is approaching buildout, the Sanibel Wildlife Committee is talking about the re-introduction and re-establishment of species that once flourished on this barrier island.

Thursday, members of the Sanibel Wildlife Committee convened to discuss the criteria and possible ramifications of giving wildlife such as Whitetailed deer, the Bobwhite quail and the American crocodile a foothold here.

"We're looking into further enhancement of the wildlife diversity on Sanibel," Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation Executive Director Erick Lindblad said explaining the three sets of criteria that have already been developed. According to Lindblad, the committee is looking into the re-introduction of

and declining species and the control of exotic species.

"The whole idea of getting rid of the (Brazilian) pepper is to create a habitat that was here before the golf courses and all the development," Wildlife Committee member and founder the International Osprey Foundation Mark "Bird" Westall said. "We're cautious and I think that's the way to go."

·Westall said the committee is currently setting up the criteria to determine which species should be introduced and if that species would have the ability to establish a strong hold on the island.

Westall said if the habitat is right, there might not have to be a re-introduction. "Quail might come out here on their own, if we ever get to that point where we could provide enough of the tall grasses. We need a viable habitat for them before we do anything."

One of the more touchy areas with the state of Florida is attempting to bring back the endangered American crocodile. The species now is limited to areas south of Sanibel and although one does make a nest here on Sanibel, no population other than that one exists here.

"The crocodile fits under rare and declining species," said Lindblad explaining that the rare and

species that were once here, the enhancement of rare declining species will get top priority. "But we're doing this systematically and not playing favorites."

City Council member and the council's liaison to the Wildlife Committee Andrew Reding agrees. "The crocodile is not a reintroduction, so it is even more of a priority."

Westall said he's optimistic that Sanibel can once again be a home to a healthy population of crocodiles. "I think we can establish a healthy population of crocodiles here. If people on Sanibel can't co-exist with crocodiles, then we won't be able to reintroduce them anywhere."

Although Westall points out that the American crocodile is more docile than the alligator and is nothing like its cousin, the Nile crocodile, the state is still reluctant in re-introducing it into areas it once inhab-

The criteria currently being examined will give the Wildlife Committee a basis on how to judge what should be re-introduced or enhanced further.

'We have to look at things both politically and environmentally. We want to prevent an ecological disaster," Westall said. "That's why establishing this criteria is so important."

"I was fortunate in business. I feel like I'm kind of paying my debt to society," Dick said.

Hulit encourages everyone to become a volunteer. "It's easy to sit home and vegetate. Some type of

volunteering is good. There are plenty of jobs to do at the Hospital," he said.

Peggy has been a volunteer Hugger in the pediatrics area of HealthPark.

"We work with sick kids. They want to do some normal kid things. They want someone to sit and rock them or play a game. That's what Huggers do. We are really frustrated grandmothers." She is grateful that she can help the children, and says, "We get back more than we give."

"The volunteers take their work seriously and offer unselfishly of their time and expertise," said Lee County Hospital Volunteer Coordinator Donna Bradish who, along with Director of Volunteer Services, Carol Simons manages hundreds of volun-

"In total, this February between Lee Memorial Hospital, Health Park and the Care Center, we had 1,195 volunteers," Bradish said.

Edna and Dell Hanner of Sanibel are included in that lofty number. Edna has been a cuddler at Health Park for less than a year, working Sunday evenings from 7 to 11 p.m. in the intensive care unit. She rocks and cuddles the babies in the neo-natal room, who may have life threatening illnesses or are premature. Edna is dedicated to her job and is thrilled to see the babies get well and go home to their families.


"They even have a reunion when the parents bring back the babies for us to see how they have grown," Edna said, proudly adding that she was the first to cuddle one of the quadruplets born there recently.

Dell has been a volunteer at Health Park for two and one half years.

"I first drove the trolley and now I sit at the front desk," he said. Dell went on to explain that he greets people, makes them feel welcome and directs them to their destination.

"I always wanted to tell people where to go and now I can," he jokingly said.

The Hanners both agreed that many of their friends have followed in their footsteps. Seeing their enthusiasm, the friends also joined the program.



"It doesn't matter how old you are or even if you are handicapped, if you can drive, they'll (HealthPark) find a job for you," Dell said.

Bradish admits that they do occasionally advertise for volunteer help, but fill most of their requirements by word of mouth.

At the present time she is looking for year-round residents to fill positions, several positions are new to the program.

Volunteers are part of the open heart surgery operations. They are in the operating room during the surgery and periodically go out to the waiting room to update the families. Many of these volunteers are cardiac patients themselves, and having first hand experience, are able to understand the extreme emotional turmoil and the suffering of the families.

All volunteers undergo a training program and must agree to work one day a week, usually for a four-hour shift. Cuddlers, one of the most popular jobs and for which there is a waiting list, train for six to eight hours. Other areas may require as much as 18 hours training before the volunteer is permitted to go to work.

Volunteers are needed for many areas of hospital functions. Some are receptionists; others perform clerical tasks in the office while Huggers work with children of all ages.

HealthPark Care Center is on the grounds of the hospital on Summerlin Road and cares for both short and long term patients.

Bradish said that HealthPark Care Center needs receptionists, greeters and people to help deliver meals and assist patients to activities and the dining room. The friendly atmosphere of the Care Center makes it seem like a hotel where everybody is treated

The resident pets, birds in cages, Cleopatra the cat, rabbits and hamsters, also need the attention of will-

The next HealthPark volunteer orientation program is scheduled for May 5, from 8:30 a.m.-12 noon. Bradish suggests calling to make a reservation, 334-

Still others on the committee and list of criteria are the most important within the community would prefer the cute and cuddly animals to the intimidating crocodile.

"Some have proposed some species that have problems," Reding said pointing to the endangered Key deer. "We're sure the Key deer never existed on Sanibel."

Reding said although the idea of reintroducing and furthering the enhancement of certain species has council support, the Wildlife Committee is proceeding slowly in order to make sure every precaution is carefully examined. "I think the method we're using is the correct one," he said.

Committee Chair Molly Krival agrees that caution is the foremost concern. "You need to examine the impact of what the ramifications will be," said Krival explaining that at the top of the

questions (such as proper habitat) and at the bottom are the less important questions (will the species be a nuisance).

Krival explained that without the proper habitat, the species would fail to survive. "We've lost some species like birds and snakes because of the loss of the habitat. But we're bringing a lot of the habitat that we've lost back."

According to Krival the problem with the re-introduction and enhancement is that the city has to prove to the state and federal government that there will be absolutely no harm to the environment.

"It's very tedious," Krival said. "But if we have the habitat, they will come back."

Recreation Complex expansion gets nod from council

The Sanibel Recreation Complex will be growing by about 4,000 square

The Sanibel City Council, Tuesday, unanimously approved a plan that will add a weight room, racquetball court and a multi-purpose room to the Sambel Recreation Complex on Sanibel-Captiva Road.

"The expansion gives a home to our teen program," said Sanibel Parks and Recreation Director Dick Noon explaining that no additional land will have to be developed to provide additional parking.

Noon said the architect feels the project can be completed with \$132,897 in impact fees. The completion of the interior of the racquetball court may increase that amount slightly.

City Council member George Madison said he was pleased with the growth of the teen program and added that the Rec Center's expansion will only further its advancement.

"I want to commend you in the way this has taken shape," Madison said. "This community needs to take care of its kids and this is one way of doing it" - Mark S. Krzos



the treaty, many countries in Europe are struggling with the concept of maintaining unity within their own borders.

Seven years after the fall of the Berlin Wall, the integration of the Continent, East and West, seemingly made possible by the disappearance of the former ideological blocks, is far from becoming a reality. The pan-

European geopolitical situation has been casting more shadows than rays of light for its united future. The Eastern countries were quite naturally impatient to catch up to their Western neighbors. However, the

economic situation in Europe has not been as favorable as it was at the end of the eighties and the good intentions of the West to offer economic aid to its eastern neighbors has been preempted by the West's preoccupation with struggling to maintain its own status quo. It is not surprising then, that one by one the people of these countries have exercised their newly acquired right to use the democratic process to turn the power over to the members of the former Communist parties who had denied them that very right for almost fifty years. More than a vote of confidence for the ideology of Communism, theirs is a vote of protest against the haste of the changes that have been imposed on them and the fact that they have been suddenly stripped of all social securities: jobs, housing, health insurance, as meager and dissatisfying as these services may have been.

The Eastern European countries are not the only ones protesting against the loss of social securities. Workers in France paralyzed the country for practically the entire month of December last year in protest against the extreme measures proposed by the French government in order to balance its budget in time for the terms of Maastricht. The breath of economic crisis has been breathing down the neck of Germany as well. Industrial production is down and unemployment has been over 10%, a record low since the formation of the German Federal Republic in 1949 with four million people out of work. These grave problems are taking place in the two countries considered to be the solid economic nucleus of the European

The behavior and attitude of European politicians has been compared to the courtiers in Anderson's fairy tale, "The Emperor's New Clothes." The comparison is not at all far-fetched, but perhaps right on target. The Manufricht Treaty is like the nude

Emperor and the politicians are the courtiers who look on and see the problem, but continue in their obsequious homage, not daring to speak out and say the obvious. It is not their hypocrisy which will save Europe and it is questionable whether a Europe with no growth, galloping inflation, and sky-rising unemployment is worth saving.

As the politicians of Europe struggle with meeting the terms of Maastricht and refuse to consider the possible necessity of modifying its terms or postponing the date of the implementation of European monetary union, many countries in Europe are threatened by separatist movements from within. From the North Sea to the Adriatic Sea, there is hardly a country of the Old Continent which is immune to this desire of division amidst the eulogy of European unity.

From the dissolution of the former Union of Soviet Socialist Republics to the dismemberment of the former Yugoslavia, the desire for independence seems to be a universal one, whether the pretext be nationalism, religion, ideology or outdated colonialism. Even the inveterate democracies of Western Europe cannot be considered invulnerable to this trend. Since the 1970's, the IRA in Great Britain, the Basque terrorist group in Spain, and the members of the Corsican separatist group in France have been planting the seeds of violence in their respective countries. Even the quiet and neutral country of Belgium has difficulty in settling the differences between its Dutch speaking Flemish and its French speaking Walloons. In Germany, both East and West are not without regret and doubts concerning the benefits of the unification of their country. And in Italy, recent years have seen the birth of a party called the Northern League which preaches Federalism, but in its more extreme moments threatens to

fracture the country in two, dividing the industrial north from the impoverished south.


These are issues which particularly concern the individual nations of Europe. However, if the European Union is to be more than a fictitious and utopian dream, these questions should implicate the interest of all Europeans. For four years Europeans witnessed their own paralysis and inaptitude in resolving the problems in the Balkans. Now European nations are united in their efforts to instill peace in the region, but they arrived at this not without the aid and efforts of American diplomacy. Moreover, Europeans cannot allow themselves to be indifferent to the fact that an island in the Mediterranean would like to detach its political roots from those of France or that the Basques would like to cut the Atlantic Pyrenees from the Spanish map. The violent and destructive means that these terrorist organizations use to reach their questionable ends affect everyone.

One incident earlier this year illustrates how such seemingly national problems may have international repercussions that can jostle the harmony even among EU members. This regarded Belgium's refusal to extradite two presumed Basque ETA members to Spain. The affair was hardly an encouraging harbinger. Furious with the decision of the Belgian State Council, the Spanish government announced that it would no longer adhere to the clauses of the Shengen Convention that concern judicial and police cooperation. Brussels may have been acting within its rights, but its refusal can hardly be

considered a reflection of the spirit of the Shengen convention which is to create a unique judicial area. This event demonstrates the need to create rules of arbitration concerning such matters. More recently, the problems within the British beef industry have put the EU's ability to settle its differences to the test.

The Maastricht Treaty should be the tool that helps the various nation members to better the lives of its citizens, not the weapon that serves in implementing their social and economic destruction. Europe is becoming a very private and elite club with only one country holding the right cards for proper membership, Luxembourg, the smallest country of the Union. It is pointless to create a game whose rules are so difficult that nobody is able to play without risking self-annihilation. If the political leaders do not open their eyes to the changing realities and find the courage to speak out against terms that are too strict and which require a price of sacrifice perhaps too high to pay, not only the countries of central and eastern Europe, but the citizens of the countries who make up the very historical core of Europe, may begin to question the advantage of belonging to such a union. By looking the other way these leaders risk eliminating the social services that have long been the mainstay of European civilization and leaving the gate open to the many ghosts of near-sighted nationalisms.

into the interview, she was on the phone with a friend from Lutheran Ministries who works with runaways. Lund said she would love to develop a program to have those runaways shadow a theater staff member, learning all aspects of the theater world.

"I am really fueled by the work that is done about the country and reading about the power of the theater in a lot of people's lives and I feel as though my life has been incredibly affected by it," Lund said. "I feel as though the life in the theater that I've had has offered me so many opportunities to do anything I want to do. And I feel that kind of power is possible for anyone."

Lund is a proponent of ACE-Arts for a Complete Education, which promotes art programs in the school system by teacher training, parental involvement, and fund raising.

"A movement that hasn't been as noticeable in this county is arts for complete education. Its an organization that advocates arts programs in the schools," Lund said. "What our county has not fully recognized in our school districts is the arts is part of our core curriculum. We need to move to make arts more available in our schools. Not as an individual subject, like music or dance, but integrated into all subjects."

It is to this end that Lund sees the Pirate Playhouse as an influential and fundamental arm of Arts education.

"I firmly believe that even though we are isolated on the island we have a responsibility for those off the island," she said. "The world has so many problems we could be making a difference in the lives of others, particularly children and I think that's where my skills could be used. It is something that's not easily seen—the results of arts exposure in someone's life—but it does

have lasting result in people lives. I've heard too many testimonials in the lives of young kids that it turned them around from someone who is destructive to a path that is constructive."

Lund encourages children to enjoy the arts through the "Shakespeare"

Lund encourages children to enjoy the arts through the "Shakespeare Program" in whereby children are admitted free of charge, to introduce them to Shakespeare in a live and exciting atmosphere. The Pirate Playhouse began these efforts with the Artsreach production of "Twelfth Night" last fall. Hundreds of Lee County students were exposed to Shakespeare through Lund's efforts.

"It took almost shoving it down their throats and giving it them for nothing to make a point that this is a very good partnership," Lund said of the school district's acceptance of the program. "It's economical for schools and profitable for the students and in our theater it made everyone feels so rich to do what we love and make it good for kids. We discovered the who is not

only for kids but for all audience of all ages. I am hoping more parents become aware of what the Pirate Playhouse has to offer so they can advocate and insist on the schools maintaining the program and making it a part of the curriculum."

Lund explained a teacher can spend up to 20 hours of classroom time teaching a Shakespeare play. Orientation lessons plans and a trip to the theater are completed using less than 10 hours through Artsreach.

"The student will know the play better, remember it much longer, and have an experience in the theater," Lund said adding this fall Artsreach will produce "Comedy of Errors." "We are increasing public performances so I am encouraging those who missed last years not to this year."

It is for this tireless quest to bring the arts to the community that the chamber selected the 39-year old mother of two to receive the award honoring her lifetime achievements.

Lund arrived on Sanibel at the end of 1984 and was the Founding


Producer of the Pirate Playhouse; She was responsible for the rezoning of the original Bailey General Store permitting space to be utilized as a theater.


"I vacationed here with my family and I saw a production at the Old Pirate Playhouse with Ruth and Phillip Hunter and when the building came available for sale I made and offer to purchase it," Lund said, adding her offer wasn't accepted. But there was already an offer to purchase the tiny theater and it was sold one more time after that without Lund being able to place a successful bid.

So Lund struck out on her own and produced her own work for three seasons. "And at that time our work was so approved by the community the then Pirate Playhouse Board of Directors hired me back," Lund said. "The new building had not been constructed yet so we had our last season in the old theater and moved over in 1990."

Lund, along with husband Robert Cacioppo, co-founded the companies


Broken rods and other misconceptions

Andy was down from Michigan last week. Between appointments and windy days we squeezed in as much time trying to hook the big ones as was feasible. We caught some and we lost some. On the last evening we were able to get out, I broke one of my best rods in half trying to hoist something stubborn and large off the bottom.

We were back in the mangroves when it happened. It was almost dark and the wind was kicking like a wild horse in advance of a low that had come up from Mexico. We were freelining white baits down a tidal creek looking for the elusive snook when I got the initial strike. Whatever it was, it hit hard and strong, putting that huge bend in my rod that anglers lust for. When it failed to break the surface in the next few minutes I knew that it wasn't a snook. Within a few more minutes I knew that it was running too slow to be a redfish and that it was too powerful to be a catfish or sea trout. That left me with two possibilities: it was either a big sting ray or a nurse

After a ten minute tug of war I managed to convince this sea creature to come to the side of the jon boat. Once there, it decided to hunker down in the muddy bottom and remain put. That was my first opportunity to do the right thing, which would have been to grab the knife, slip it as far down the line as I could, and cut this behemoth lose. That was also the exact same moment I became ego involved with the battle.

It became a matter of pride for me to



finally see what it was that I had managed to hook......a ray or a nurse shark? It's important to note that I was going to cut it loose regardless. It was just that the battle had gone on so long and the animal down there in that salty brine was so bull headed that I wanted to prove a point. Does this sound familiar?

I knew that my rod was too small to simply pull it up out of the mud so I backed off the drag and stuck my pole in a nearby holder. I would out smart this fish. As soon as the pressure was off, the fish would think that it was free and start swimming away. Once out of the mud I could turn it and finally find out what it was. That plan worked great. After a five minute wait the fish started swimming up current again and I picked up the rod and started working it back to the boat. It almost came close enough to the surface for me to see it. Had it been earlier in the day I'm sure I could have seen it. But it had grown

that much darker and right after getting this big lug back to the side of the boat it proceeded to dig in. At that point I was getting angry. That was my second opportunity to cut the line.

Instead of cutting the line, or at least going back to my initial strategy of wearing it out by letting it run again and again, I decided that after nearly twenty minutes it was exhausted. I started to muscle it up out of the mud. I poured on the juice, bending my light weight rod and testing the very limit of my 17 lb. test line.

Andy looked at me like I was crazy. He told me to just cut the darn thing loose. I said "no, I want to see what it is first!" Then the rod snapped like a Butterfinger candy bar being shared by two teenagers at a baseball game. Once it snapped, there was no longer any play left in the rod, and sensing something had happened, the big fish swam off in a

• flurry. The line parted instantly. Was it either a ray or a nurse shark? I never did find out.

Later that same evening I got to thinking about the whole incident. I wasn't concerned about the rod, or about replacing it as much as I was about why I did it. Why had I became so wrapped up in a stupid battle with a fish that I never intended to keep anyway? I thought about other situations in my life where the right thing to do would have been to cut the line rather than hang on until the rod snaps. Investments, relationships, possessions, memories, occupations and friendships all came to mind. Moments when I knew that it was stupid to hang on any longer, but where I felt compelled to. Where the simple gesture of setting it free was far easier than the pain of a shattered rod and the complications that inevitably ensue.

Pride is like that. The fish that was buried in the muck of the back bay wasn't proud. That fish was just trying to survive. As I thought about it further I realized that pride is like a human muck. Once in it, we find in difficult to see clearly, and harder still to make the right decision. The harder we try to hold on, the deeper and deeper we bury ourselves in that swamp of self satisfaction. Next time I'll cut the line before something breaks. After all, wasn't I the one who was really set free?




Ron Riggs shows off his back hand in the 3.5 division.

Getting another view of the vision statement

Calling the city's own Vision Statement a distraction to the city seal, Sanibel City Council members and self-proclaimed art critics decided Tuesday that the newly constructed Vision Statement signs should be placed on each side of the council.

The newly constructed sign developed and painted by island artist Sharon Chamberlain made its first appearance behind Sanibel Planning Commissioners March 25. But nothing was said.

Chamberlain, who hand-letters sea grape leaves, said the \$350 signs took about 20 hours and has done other signs around the city as well.

Two weeks ago the green lettered

and green trimmed sign that straddles the Sanibel City Seal, was criticized by a few City Council members who said the sign took away from the Seal of Sanibel.

This week council members debated the appropriateness of the sign again and decided it would still serve its purpose hanging on the side walls of MacKenzie Hall without detracting from the seal.

"Beauty is in the eye of the beholder. I like it very much and it keeps with the atmosphere of the island," Councilman George Madison said explaining that he believes the size of the sign and wording is totally appropriate.

Sharon Chamberlain defended her work telling the council her instruc-

tions were to make the signs casual and is greater, such as the entrance to City legible from anywhere in the room.

"It wasn't supposed to be highlypolished. Not ever a Renoir or Picasso is loved by all," Chamberlain said.

Council member Andrew Reding, who proposed the sign, said he liked the way it looked. Resident Ernie Klaudt said he thought the statement was in the wrong place and should be moved to the back of MacKenzie Hall.

"The City Council should be forced to look at the words, not the public," Klaudt said. "You should look at it and apply it to every decision you make."

City Council member Bob Janes had a slightly different point of view. Janes said he thought the signs should be moved to a location where the visibility

Hall or the cupola.

"They do conflict with the seal, so I'm inclined to have it moved to another location," Janes said.

But Reding was unwilling to budge. "It belongs in here ... so we can look at it and remember it."

Council members decided the signs would remain, moving them to opposite walls. One sign will be placed behind City Attorney Bob Pritt and the other sign will be placed behind City Manager Gary Price. The map of Sanibel that is currently on the wall behind Price will be removed.







Sanibel and Fort Myers Beach opposing offshore drilling

The city of Sanibel has been extremely vocal in its opposition to offshore oil drilling. Now the Greater Fort Myers Beach Area Chamber of Commerce has called on the Fort Myers Beach Town Council to pass a resolution opposing offshore drilling in Gulf waters,

In a March 20 letter, Fran Myers, chairperson of the chamber's legislative committee, reminded the council that the Beach chamber has consistently opposed drilling since 1985, fearing the work would foul Florida's west coast beaches.

Myers noted the Collier County commission recently adopted a similar resolution. She urged council members to adopt an anti-drilling resolution and to forward it to state legislators.

The letter is in response to the most recent attempt by Apalachacola-based Coastal Petroleum to secure drilling rights in Gulf waters. The company applied to the Florida Department of Environmental Protection for permission to drill 12 exploratory wells along the west coast, from off Marco Island to the Big Bend region.

Since 1990, Coastal has been attempting to secure drilling rights from the state but has had to fight a number of legal battles with environmentalists along the way. In 1992, its application for a drilling permit expired because the company failed to provide sufficient follow-up information to state regulators.

At the beginning of 1996, the company won the right to conduct tests for

ations. It's when the oil being pumped out of the well has to be transported that you have to worry, they say.

Officials from Coastal Petroleum, however, say the industry has vastly improved its safety record and those fears are no longer valid. Anyone fueling those fears is just spewing propaganda, according to Coastal officials.

Coastal Petroleum is backed by the Lykes Bros., a Florida meatpacking firm that manufactures hotdogs and lunch meat. The company owns oil and gas leases on 880,000 acres of the Gulf, from Apalachicola to Naples.

The resolution offered by the Beach chamber requests the governor, state cabinet, and other state and federal officials to "insure that the United States Department of Interior adopts a 30-mile, 5-year coastal buffer around the state of Florida and removes all waters off the Florida Keys and Everglades from the 5-year oil and gas leasing program."

This is the same resolution the chamber sent out originally in November of 1986. That action was necessary to prevent irresponsible offshore oil development and to protect Florida's coastal resources, Myers said.

Sanibel Natural Resorces Director Rob Loflin said the city of Sanibel has sent out multiple resolutions opposing offshore oil drilling, but all the resolutions in the world will mean nothing until the state and federal government steps up to the plate.

"Until the state and federal government buys them out of the lease, there's not much we can do," Loflin said. "We can do resolutions forever, but until those leases are bought, we'll be singing the same song over and over."

To date, Fort Myers Beach has taken no action on the request.

Residents speak about West Gulf Drive building restrictions

The Sanibel City Council has made no decision on what to do about restricting a section of West Gulf Drive to single-family residences only. Instead, council members heard residents on both sides of the issue complain that their rights as property owners will be taken away because of a mistake the city made when it drafted the 1985 Land Development Code.

Some residents along the beach claim the city is taking away rights that they have as property owners with a proposed ordinance limiting permitted residential use to exclusively single-family use. The land in question encompasses 93 separate parcels of land, comprising roughly 100 acres.

Almost a year ago, a resident of the Rocks subdivision asked city staff if the development of duplexes were permitted in the West Gulf Drive vicinity. After determining duplexes were permitted, members of the Rocks Civic Association insisted the city made a mistake in not carrying forward the single-family use restriction when it adopted the Land Development Code in 1985.

According to City Planner Jean Woodring the historically predominant land use in the area west of the Sandals Condominium has been single-family residential. Sanibel's initial Comprehensive Land Use Plan adopted in 1976 permitted singlefamily, duplex and multifamily residential uses in the West Gulf Drive area. But in 1977, Jack Stormer, then President of the Sanibel Rocks Civic Association petitioned the Planning Commission and City Council to limit the area to single-family use only. The city reacted favorably towards the request and adopted the limita-

Woodring said the Planning Department's position is the city's failure to fully embody the mandate set forth by City Council in 1977 into the 1985 version of the Land Development Code was simply an oversight and was not done intentional-

But that is precisely why some residents along West Gulf Drive

are up in arms. They believe they have right to build under the 1985 land development code allowing for varied construction.

West Gulf Drive resident Vincent Wolanin said when he acquired his property he also acquired the zoning rights.

"We have rights that were granted to us when we purchased and invested in these properties after 1985," Wolanin said. "I'm here on a principle...and what we can do to protect our investment."

Although Wolanin said West Gulf Drive may never see duplexes in that area (most homeowners want to maintain it the way it has been), they have the right to subdivide their property. If the city were to pass the proposed amendment, Wolanin said the city should be forced to pay compensation for the possible loss of economic benefit to those homeowners. Wolanin maintained the issue is not single-family housing, but property rights.

West Gulf Drive resident Tony Lapi said he believes that the residents seeking the restriction are fearful that duplexes along West Gulf Drive are on the horizon. But Lapi insisted it's just in not the case. Lapi recommended that council send the proposed ordinance back to the Planning Commission in order to find a solution suitable to everyone in the area.

"If you want to have

this worked out...let the neighborhood work it out," Lapi said.

Resident Larry Bator said he believes if the proposed ordinance fails, duplexes will still not be built. "If it passes, those that suffer a loss should be compensated," Bator continued. "This has been on the books for 12 years. How many duplexes have been built? None."

But residents of the Rocks and some along West Gulf Drive feel that the city's inadvertent omission to carry the single-family limitation forward in 1985 took away their rights.

John Filchak said no matter how the city looks at the issue, someone is going to lose some rights. "I've always had the understanding that this...was single-family residences only."

Bob Kaiser said he wants the city to reinstate the city's original intention of keeping West Gulf Drive single-family only. "It's the right thing to do," he said.

Peter Pappas said he's in support of the ordinance proposed and condemned the position the beachfront homeowners are taking. "The power of money to use as a threat is injurious to a community...I regard such action as extortion," Pappas said. "There are other ways to do this."

The Sanibel City Council will continue the public hearing May 6 at 1:30 and plan to render a decision at that meeting.

A TWO-WAY FINESSE PROBLEM East dealer. Both sides vulnerable.

Let's say you're declarer at six notrump on a given hand, and that after the opening lead you see that you have 12 ice-cold tricks regardless of how the opponents' cards are divided.

This is a happy state of affairs, apparently, but, sadly, situations like this don't occur very often. Most of the time you'll have a choice of different ways to play the hand, and the skill you display in choosing from various alternatives is what determines how good a player you are.


Consider the present case where West leads the heart jack against six notrump. The correct play at the start is very simple. You win with dummy's queen, lead the queen of clubs and finesse. If East was dealt the king, making the slam would be certain, but, unluckily, West produces the king and returns the ten of hearts.

You win with the king and, since you now have 11 sure tricks, your only remaining chore is to guess which way to take the two-way spade finesse. This is a matter involving skill, not luck, so you put your thinking cap on and try to solve the


The task proves to be an easy one because, when you cash the ace of hearts, you learn that West started with five hearts, after East shows out on the third round of the suit. You continue with three rounds of clubs, learning that West started with exactly four clubs. You then cash the A-K-Q of diamonds, learning that West started with at least three diamonds.

With 12 of West's 13 cards accounted for, you now know he cannot hold more than one spade. You therefore lead the spade five to the king and return a spade to your jack, knowing the jack will win. Thanks to your careful "spadework," this finesse, unlike most others, is 100 percent certain to succeed.

Ospreys inspire long-lasting life lessons





rmed with a telescope and binoculars, fourth graders David Schultz and Rita Irving and fifth grader David Esoldi headed out to observe one of the osprey families in residence at Sanibel Elementary. Students in Georgia Brown's science class, they have been studying the osprey since January.

Listening to bits of their conversation reveals that their studies have paid off. "You know the immatures (the babies) have spots on their wings and it's fluffier. . .They have orange eyes too. . .The adults have yellow. . .Look, the male has a sheepshead. . . He will eat the fish head sometimes before he takes it to the immatures. . . We don't want to get too close here. . .Look at this (through the telescope); it's perfect. . . You can see the mother pulling bits of the fish off to feed the immatures. . You know some people get the osprey confused with the eagle."

By school's end in June, students in Brown's fourth and fifth grade classes will each have completed a paper on the osprey. The papers must have six informative paragraphs, a glossary with word definitions, and a works cited page which gives credit to their sources of information. The classes will also submit an article to Dragonfly, a national science magazine for and by students in grades three through six. The students were published in the magazine's premier issue last year with research done on the gumbo-limbo's limited need for water compared to the sea grape.

year we have studied the osprey. Last year we did the eagle. It is a challenge for the students to come up with the bird for next year. Sanibel Inn celebrates Earth Day tomorrow



"I learn with the kids. I gather the resources—the Internet, bird books, books from the Sanibel Library and our library," Brown said. "Since we do a bird every year, some of the same references are used, but it doesn't get boring for me. It is good that the students can follow a full nesting cycle. They take a lot of life lessons from this unit—family, responsibility, reproduction."

"Since there was a delay in breeding this year, the nests have been erratic. Some are still in the downy state and some are fledglings (ones that are ready for flight). One student reported a fledgling flight, but, of course, as scientists we can't rely on limited data; we have to have further observations," Brown said.

In addition to classroom work, Brown sends student teams on data gathering expeditions daily on school grounds with the binoculars and a telescope. After 15 minutes they bring back a report on their observations. From the project students learn many skills including mapping and using the Internet for reference.

Brown added, "The students have made contact with a Canadian osprey group through the Internet. They are also following articles in the newspapers relating to the osprey population."

Brown explained the telescope was

made possible through an Apple Grant from the Lee County School System Foundation. Brown is waiting on an adapter to connect the telescope to a regular camera. She explained, "The students can then take the pictures to put in their reports. We now have the technology to scan the photographs into the computer so that the students can print them in their papers."

She added, "Our fifth graders become Junior Naturalists as part of the "Ding" Darling program. Proceeds from a fun run there raised money to purchase four pair of binoculars. I

would love to have at least 15 pair. In fact, if anyone has any they want to donate, that would be wonderful."

Mark "Bird" Westall of the International Osprey Foundation visited students telling them of the impact of environmental conditions on the osprey

Westall said, "Those kids are going to grow up and be involved in decision making some way, maybe even to be Sanibel city council members. They are going to be much more environmentally conscious. That's what it's all about. That's cool!"

Facts from future scientists, leaders...

Editor's note: The following are excerpts from student papers written at the Sanibel Elementary School.

Andrew Richter, fourth grade—"The osprey is also known as the fish hawk. It is the symbol on the Canadian dollar bill. Their scientific name is Pandion Haliaetus.

If the osprey thinks it spots a fish, it will almost stop in midair and take a closer look then make a decision. It dives directly toward the water reaching speeds of sometimes 80 mph, feet first. It grabs the fish with its claws. With one swoop of its wings it comes out of the water.

Osprey's talons are an important body part. Its talons are specially made for catching fish. They have four talons of even length and they can change their toes so that they have two in front and two in back of each foot. They also have spicules on each toe for holding extra slippery fish."

Bethany Highsmith, fourth grade—"The male osprey has a white chest and head. The male osprey also has brown wings and a brown mark across his eye that looks like a mask. Another feature of the male is his yellow eyes. He has an average wingspan of 159 cm. The male weighs an average of 1.4 kilograms.

The female osprey looks much like the male in appearance except it has brown streaks on its chest. The female weighs an average of 1.6 kilograms. Her average wingspan is 163 cm.

The immature has orange eyes. The feathers on its wings are deep brown with cream speckles. It has a white chest with brown streaks. It gets all of its adult feathers in about 18 months."

Jessica Ogden, fifth grade—"An osprey will make a nest out of anything. Some examples are branches, sticks, driftwood, cornstalks and seaweed. . . An osprey nest can get up to several hundred pounds. When a nest is that big it can be seen in the skyline from a mile or two away.

The eggs of an osprey are beautiful. They vary from white to cinnamon in ground color and are daubed with chocolate brown. Once the eggs hatch it takes five to six weeks until they will resemble their parents. Adults take turns sitting on the eggs. The mother osprey sits on the eggs 70 percent of the time.

Eight weeks after hatching, baby ospreys are considered fledglings. While the ospreys are still fledglings the male brings the food for the female to divide. When the young get a little older, they take turns standing on a fish and tearing it themselves."

has been 75 chicks with a high of 86 in 1995. About half the active nest territories are in use, but not all those contain eggs or chicks.


Various theories for the decline in numbers have been put forth. Unseasonable warmth throughout winter may have upset the biological processes of the ospreys. Another idea is that last summer's red tide depleted area fish populations so greatly that there was not enough food to build strength for mating pairs or to feed fledglings.

Westall said, "Periodic environmental extremes cause things to happen, systems to fail. Usually the drastic impact is short-lived. The last time was in '83 when an El Ninio brought 28 inches of rain. A whole bunch of osprey chicks died in the nests. At this time the red tide is one of the obvious things that sticks out."

He continued, "If it is red tide, it can be positive. The system should recover and by this time next year we should have increased fish populations. If next year we observe things going back to closer to normal, we're okay. If we see a continued crash for the second year, we should really throw out the alarm. So far this year, the media are doing a good job of letting public know about the situation without alarm. But if something shows up next year, then we go to the next step and call in the scientific community. But, remember, the ospreys are indicators. They are telling us something. This could just be a 'cough or a cold' in the eco-system or it could be more serious. We just have to keep a very close look."

Turtles, people hear the music of the beach

"How do they know to go toward the ocean?" a young mother asked.

"Scientists say the light," Lucy explained.

"What do you think?" the mother asked. "These are South Carolina turtles like my boys here," Lucy said, smiling at us. "I think they just love beach music.


From a mother's love of saving the threatened Loggerhead turtle population on Pat Conroy's fictional barrier island, Isle of Orion, came the title of his latest book, Beach Music.

And the people on Sanibel who hear that beach music are getting tuned up for the parts they will play during Sanibel's sea turtle sea-

The Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation monitors Loggerhead sea turtle nesting from May through October. During that time volunteers identify and monitor nests on a daily basis and send final data to the Department of Environmental Protection to provide important information used to increase the survival of this threatened species. During this time gulf residents and visitors are asked to divert their lights from the gulf. (See city ordinance story Section A.)

Sanibel's efforts are in the hands of Dee Fulk who works with 24 permitees, experienced volunteers listed on a permit issued by the Department of Environment Protection. Permitees Nancy and George Madison head up the other volunteers. Nan

Hall works with three to five volunteers on a Captiva Permit.



She explained, "Holding a little loggerhead and feeling its

flipper push against your hand is the most exciting moment. It is almost magical. But it's not just about turtles; it's about people and turtles."

"The most important thing is to increase the awareness of our connection with and our affects on nature. Take a look at this planet. If you develop a love for all life, it may change the way you treat it. If a person is connected with nature then he may help do his part by not polluting the water with plastic bags that kill the turtles. People will begin to see the

Last year Sanibel East beaches had 55 nests; Sanibel West had 222; and Captiva had 117 with a total of 29,609 live hatchlings. That was up 100 over the previous year, but Fulk pointed out that Loggerheads don't nest every year. She said few conclusions can yet be drawn from the nesting data since it has been collected for such a short time period (30-

40 years) but that the population world-wide has plummeted. A notice to beach residents from the SCCF notes that pollution, lighted beaches, loss of nesting habitat, boat collisions and drowning in shrimp

other fishing gear have caused a drastic decline in sea turtle popu-

lations. Last year was a good year and the turtles also

proved to be good meteorologists. Nancy Madison, who is in her third year of volunteer work along with

her husband George said, "Last year the sea turtles nested lower than the year before when they were high in the vegetation. George and I were concerned that storms would loosen the nests. But there weren't any bad ones. Did the turtles know?"

The mother loggerheads, who can grow to more than three feet in length and weigh between 250 and 400 pounds, come from the gulf and select their

> nesting site. They emerge at night to dig an egg pit and deposit 40 to 180 leathery, ping-pong ball sized eggs and usually nest two or three times in a single session. After they have laid the eggs, they use their front flippers to put dry sand over the hole.

This is where the work of the volunteers comes into play. Tracks coming from the sea and heading back out indicate the possibility of a nest.

Every day of the week volunteer walkers cover an.


assigned area of the east end of the beach from Buttonwood to Tarpon Bay. There are six zones. A Jeep patrol covers the west end on a daily basis. On Captiva a mule (a beach dune vehicle) is used for the entire stretch of beach. Walkers in the early morning look for turtle tracks from the night before. If they note tracks, they report to their assigned permittee. Permitees put a stake three feet to the right of the nest with an sign that notes the existence of a sea turtle nest and the







Fulk explained, "Normally that's all we have to do but in high activity areas such as resorts we will flag off a triangular area."

Close to hatching time (incubation is 55 to 65 days) permitees look for evidence of a ball which precedes the hatching. They are the only volunteers permitted to handle the sea turtles.

Fulk explained how a hatchling uses its egg tooth (a sharp extension) to saw through its rubbery egg shell to push its way out. Fulk said, "The turtles work collectively to get to the surface of the sand. They wiggle their way out. As they wiggle, the sand filters down and the turtles rise. They get to a point to where they sense a cooling. At that point they emerge almost in a volcano-like eruption. There can be 100 little sea turtle bursting forth in a matter of minutes."

They usually emerge after dark using the light of the horizon to orient them to the water. If they are lead away from the water by artificial light, they die of dehydration, exhaustion or being crushed.

Three days after an emergence, permitees begin the data collection. They dig up the nest and take out the contents. Fulk joked, the turtles say, "The last one out, turn out the lights!"

They count the number of egg shells, the number of unhatched eggs, the number of pips (turtles in the shell) live, the number pips dead and the number out of the shells dead or alive. That data is submitted to the DEP at the end of turtle season.

Fulk explained that an individual turtle does not return to the exact same spot every year but they generally return to the same area.

"I've been out on the beach in 100 degree heat looking for eggs. There's evidence of an emergence, and I've dug a 5 foot by 5 foot hole 3 feet deep with ants and bugs crawling up my nose looking for those eggs, but all the discomfort goes away the moment I feel that little loggerhead in my hand."

Nancy said, "We had the opportunity to see a mom lay her eggs and then walk back to the ocean. When she finished laying, she sort of stopped and sighed on her way back and then the waves came over her and she was gone. It was sort of mystic."

George said, "It's so beautiful to see something you understand that you just won't understand."

Conroy's description of the hatchlings making their way to the water reveals not only a truth about the turtles but also about the people around them:

"When the first turtle hit the first wave it tumbled up side down and righted itself quickly undeterred. It had felt the element it was destined to join and when the second wave hit, that turtle was swimming. Pure instinct drove those tiny turtles toward the surf as the topography and smell of that beach had imprinted themselves forever in their newly hatched primitive brains."

Those on Sanibel who are working to save the turtles are saving a home for not only the turtles but the humans who have the island in their blood.

People count in turtle count

Island residents have a variety of opportunities to become involved in SCCF's monitoring of the Loggerhead sea turtle nests from May through August.

VOLUNTEER—Nancy and George Madison, volunteer coordinators in their third year of participation, got involved through seeing a published call for volunteers.

Nancy said, "Of course, we were aware of the program before we moved here in mid-season." Mid-season to most would be the height of tourist season, to the Madisons it was mid-turtle season.

She said, "We were lucky to get involved in the program because we moved here in July and there happened to be a zone open."

Dee Fulk, director of the SCCF program, said, "Just watch out when you say 'I want to get involved!" People get hooked on the program as evidenced by George Madison's comments.

He said, "If you can get a kid educated and involved you have him for life. Anyone who gets involved becomes a convert. You learn that all life is interconnected. Everything spills over. These are lessons you take with you everywhere.

He added, "I defy anyone to get involved with SCCF and not have it change their lives."

Both Madisons said that being a volunteer is a great opportunity to educate people. Nancy said, "When you are on the beach you can have as many as 20 or 30 people around asking what you are doing. The greatest thing is when someone says, 'Thank you!' for telling them about the turtles."

George emphasized, "You're there not just for the turtles, you're there for he people."

According to the Madisons there are just a few spots left for beach walkers, but there are many other ways to help. Volunteers can be substitute walkers to fill in for vacation times. Other options include helping distribute informational flyers to resorts and condominiums, helping with special events, and helping with routine office work. There is a mandatory volunteer meeting Thursday, April 24 at 7:30 p.m. at the Foundation. Updated guidelines will be presented and patrol assignments made.

Students from the Southwest Florida Marine Institute have already contributed to the volunteer effort. They made over 400 sea turtle nest stakes. SFMI is a rehabilitation program that works with youthful offenders in an education and marine environment. Fulk said, "Volunteers are invaluable. Just think what it would cost if we had to pay these people. All the walkers even!"

ADOPT-A-TURTLE—The cost of the turtle monitoring operation runs from eight to nine thousand dollars to maintain the beach vehicles and fund the materials needed to mark and maintain the nests. Adopting a nest is making a tax-free donation to help defray the cost of the program. At the end of the season those who adopt will receive a report of the data collected from the nest they adopted, a Foundation Sea Turtle Research T-shirt, and a Certificate of Appreciation from the Foundation. The contribution is \$50 and adoption forms may be picked up at SCCF. Fulk noted that throughout the year donations are made. On Captiva Dick Sneider donated money for a new beach vehicle for Captiva. And \$6,217.43 from Captiva's ABC sale has been dedicated to their program.

GULF RESORT AND RESIDENT COOPERATION—Fulk said, "Most things we ask people to do are common sense—turn off lights that shine on the beach, lower the lights, close the drapes, direct or reflect light inwards, raise vegetation heights, avoid flashlight and fishing lanterns, keep beach furniture and beach toys off at night, take down tents and volleyball nets."

Flyers are distributed to all rental agencies for their guests. They note that lights confuse the nesting females and disorient hatchlings. Produced by SCCF, it also adds these guidelines: Never disturb or harass nesting turtles by making noise or shinning lights. It is illegal to harass nesting sea turtles or to have in your possession eggs or any part of a sea turtle. Watch out for disoriented hatchlings or turtles lured to the road. Keep the beaches free of litter. Sea turtle deaths have been caused by their mistaking balloons, plastic bags and Styrofoam for food. Do not remove nest identification markers. Stay clear of marked areas. If you find a lost sea turtle hatchlings, place them in a dry bucket, hold them in a shaded area and notify the Foundation.

George Madison noted, "Some resorts are especially helpful. This is a great opportunity for the resorts to enhance their offerings, an opportunity for

visitors to learn and see the nests. The Sundial and the Sanibel Inn make it a part of their environmental programs."

He said, "Ninety five percent do the right thing and another 95 percent of the five percent left would if they knew the guidelines. The main thing is to make sure everyone is informed."

Fulk related the emergence of one nest drawn to condo lights. "The hatchlings were headed to the condo lights, and we were running in all directions scooping up hands full of turtles pointing them toward the sea. Others ran up to the condos to get the people to shut off their lights. We knew exactly where they had gotten because we could see drapes flying closed and lights going out."

Sanibel Jewish community celebrates Passover

Joining Jewish communities around the world, Sanibel's Jewish community will begin its observance of the Passover seven day festival with the tion of what it means to lose one's free-

traditional meal know as Seder, Monday evening, April 21. Special foods and reading for the Haggadah (the story) which are part of the Seder meal remind the participants of the Exodus from Egypt in Biblical times, and the responsibility to cherish freedom in the contemporary world.

The theme of the Passover holiday is the

escape from bondage to freedom. Central to the observance of Passover is the attempt to experience the taste of degradation and the feelings of pain that were the fate of Israel during its ancient bondage to Egypt's Pharaoh. Bitter herbs and other symbolic foods are eaten to recall the bitterness of servitude and the harsh burdens imposed on the Hebrew slaves during the building of the pyramids. Matzoh,

yeast, because of Israel's hasty flight from slavery, is called the "bread of affliction" and must instigate in today's Israel (the Jewish people) the recogni-

dom, joined to a sense of obligation to all humanity for the triumph of freedom everywhere.

The highlight of the family gathering at which all of the symbolic foods are carefully explained is the recitation of questions by the youngest child present, old enough to inquire of those gathered around the festive

table: Why is this night different than all other nights? Why do we eat of these symbolic foods—the bitter herb, matzoh, and parsley? It is then the responsibility of the adult participants to engage the children in the telling of the story of Egyptian bondage, and the redemption by which God brought the Jewish people of that time to freedom. Leading them through the desert, God brought them to Mt. Sinai where Israel acceptance of moral responsibilities, implicit in the commandments, signaled the pinnacle of human freedom.

Perhaps the most widely observed of the many Jewish holidays, this occasion brings members of the family together to celebrate the Jewish people's essential encounter with divinity. Jewish belief suggests it is our choice of right over wrong, of good over evil, above all other human actions, which reveal in us our divine image. To truly observe the Passover, one must internalize these values, and transmit them to the next generation.

The story is recited from the Haggadah, in response to the child's questions, with a narrative, largely taken from the book of Exodus, but with contemporary readings as well. For example, one of the additions to the contemporary Haggadah is a reading from the Diary of Anne Frank. This following quote from this diary of a teen age girl, who with her family is hiding from the Nazis, echoes the determined faith of the Seder service that Freedom and peace, which constitute God's redemption in history, will one day come to humanity:

That's the difficulty in these times: ideals, dreams, cherished hopes rise within us, only to meet the horrible truth and be shattered. It's really a wonder that I haven't dropped all my ideals, because they seems so absurd and impossible to carry out. Yet I keep them because in spite of everything I still believe that people are really good at heart. I simply can't build up my

the unleavened bread baked without received the ten commandments. The hopes on a foundation consisting of confusion, misery, and death. . . I think that it will all come right, that this cruelty too will end, and that peace and tranquillity will return again.

Not all of the Seder is occupied with such somber thoughts. There is also time for joyous singing and merry making. Children interrupt the Seder's mood to search for what is call the Aftkomen, a piece of matzoh, reserved and hidden at the beginning of the meal. The child who find it receives a reward, which is usually bestowed by a grandparent.

But one of the impressive Seder readings and songs, which follow the meal, is the welcoming of the prophet Elijah, who, in Jewish tradition, announces the coming of the messiah and the time when "swords are broken into plowshare and spears into pruning hooks, when every man sits under his vine and fig tree, and none makes him afraid." The door to the house if flung open at this moment, and the gathered family joins in singing a song of welcome to Elijah.

Finally, the end of the Seder approaches. Everyone is sleepy by now, since four cups of wine must be imbibed during the festive meal, which serve as a symbol of gratitude and joy for the four promises of freedom recited in scripture. The leader of the Seder speaks the word, "Shalom" (peace) to which everyone responds: "Shalom for us! Shalom for everyone!"

Sanibel resident honored for teaching excellence

rofessor Robert L. York was caught off-guard when Edison Community College President Kenneth Walker strolled into his computer art class and announced York is being crowned as the ninth annual recipient of the prestigious Thomas A. Edison Award for Excellence in Teaching.

"I knew I was nominated, but I was dumbfounded that I won," York said, "I was really surprised "

York was nominated for the award by a fellow colleague who cited his innovation in art technology, his longlasting influence on students and his dedicated service to community art projects. He was surprised with the award April 10 after 26 years of makir g teaching art his personal masterp ece.

"I've been here since 1971, so I've been here a number of years," said York explaining he believed one of the reasons he won the award was due to his commitment to technological advances in the art world. "I've always been interested in computer graphics and I pushed my students to learn as much as they can about it."

As the winner of the award, York vill receive a \$2,000 cash award, a \$1,000 professional development stipend and a bronze medallion. A committee of faculty, staff and community members chose him from a list of 16 candidates.

York, who moved to Sanibel from Fort Myers in 1978, was instrumental in the forming of BIG Arts.

"In those days we met in Pete Smith's living room," said York who still serves as an instructor. "We decided that there ought to be an island art center. Now look at the place. It's incredible."

York is also the chairman of the Art in Public Places Board for Lee County and says that one of the projects his students were most proud of was the emblem and color design for the Fort Myers Police Department cruisers.

"It was a class project and we worked with the Fort Myers Police Department and the 3M Corporation," York said proudly.

In his spare time, York said he likes to paint and sculpt and cites the abstract impressionists as his influence. His personal art work is exhibited in private collections throughout the United States and in several foreign countries, in corporate settings and in the permanent collection at Ball State University.

York has been a member of the faculty at Edison Community College since 1971. He received his Associate of Arts degree from Averett College in Danville, Va., and his Bachelor of Fine Arts degree, with a major in graphic design, from the College of William and Mary. He also has a Master of Fine Arts degree from the University of North Carolina.
