Rare Indigo snake killed at refuge

The Eastern Indigo Snake that was sighted at the J.N. "Ding" Darling Wildlife Refuge in mid-February was found dead due to suspicious circumstances at the end of March. It had been the first confirmed sighting of the species, listed as threatened on the Federal Endangered Species register, in five years.

Refuge Officer Carol Pratt discovered the body of the six-foot-long male Saturday morning, March 27. It was close to its burrow and next to a trail in the refuge. Pratt said indigos were once common on Sanibel and the refuge has a trail named for the snake. She added they are now rare because of loss of habitat, extensive collecting for the pet trade, and accidental and intentional killings.

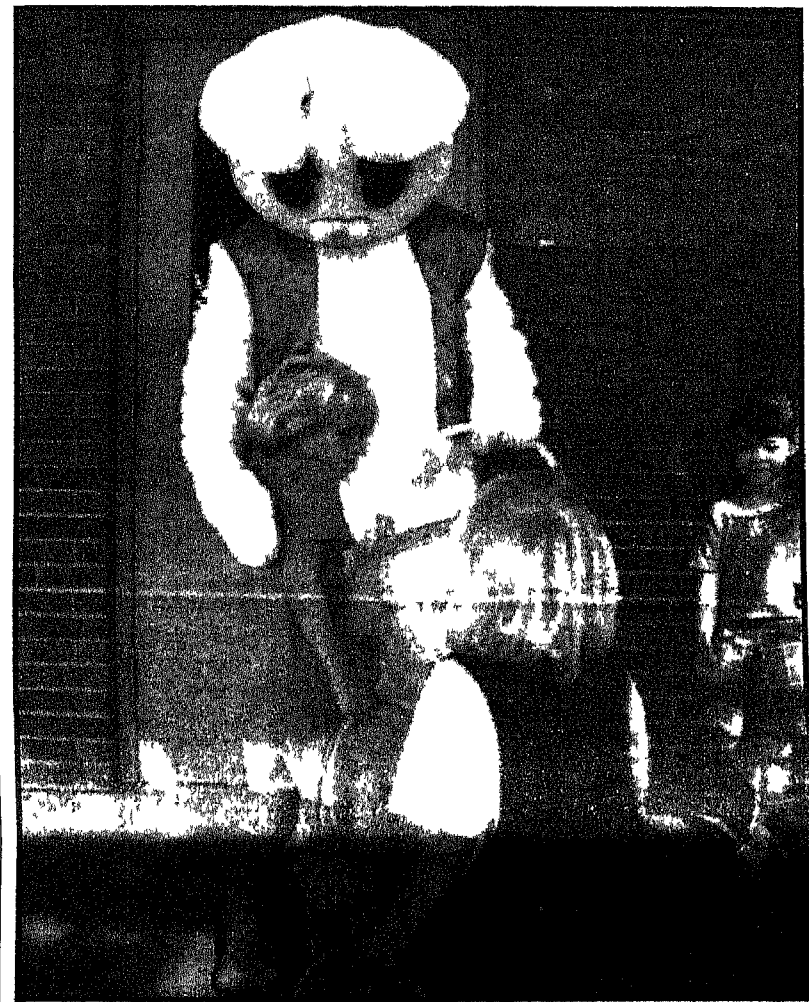
"This harmless native snake is glossy blue-black with iridescent scales and commonly co-exists with gopher tortoises in their burrows," she said.

Upon inspection of the snake, Pratt took it to Care & Rehabilitation of Wildlife for a necropsy.

CROW staff veterinarian P.J. Deitschel said that when Pratt brought the snake in for the necropsy, it was starting to decompose.

Towers on hold

Second opinion sought as moratorium moves forward

"Moratorium" — the mantra of telecommunication tower opponents — resounded through Sanibel City Hall again Tuesday.

This time councilmembers voted 3-2 to initiate a construction ban on new towers taller than 45 feet on the island for up to six months. Mayor Bob Janes and Councilmember Nola Theiss voted to oppose the process.

The vote followed an innovative and sometimes humorous presentation by Planning Director Bruce Rogers — during which Godzilla was projected on screen

Causeway concerns headed to county

The Sanibel City Council agreed to send a clear message to Lee County commissioners on what should be included in the pending Project Development & Environmental study and what should be scrapped, at least from Sanibel's perspective.

The council unanimously passed a resolution calling the Greiner Report assumptions flawed. The report was presented to county commissioners by the Lee County Department of Transportation to justify beginning the PD&E, a study on replacing or repairing the Sanibel Causeway.

The city's letter to the county commissioners clearly spells out Sanibel's preferences, which include:

- Consider the restoration of the existing drawbridge, replacement in kind of continued maintenance. Scrap the tunnel and fixed span options.
- Rebuild a drawbridge no higher than the current 26 feet and no wider than the existing 90-foot span.
- Remove existing structures if the bridges are replaced. Sanibel isn't interested in a fishing pier.

Sanibel detectives help arrest fugitive

Sanibel Police Detectives John Slater and Scott Ashby were instrumental in handing over a wanted criminal to U.S. Marshals Monday. Leonard Palacios Pantoja was wanted on a probation violation in California. He had been arrested on Sanibel Sept. 21 under the alias of Michael John DeFreitas for shoplifting at Periwinkle Place when he was charged with grand theft, petty theft, fleeing and attempting to elude an officer, marijuana possession and more.

Slater said, "After the arrest, we sent his fingerprints to

the FBI and it came back that he was wanted under a different name — Pantoja — and it gave all his aliases. He has a criminal history of burglary and larceny."

Slater said that there is also a warrant on Pantoja, originally from Chile, from the Immigration & Nationalization Service. "He had hired a lawyer and arranged a plea. We were there to identify and to pass on the outstanding warrant information to the bailiff in the court room. It was lucky we were there because the marshals were late getting there. The judge was able to hold his case. If we hadn't been there with the information, he might have pled out and walked, changed his name again and just

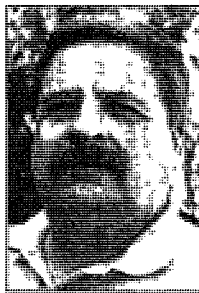

City notes

'Bob Davison Day'

Style, grace and a good sense of humor. Those were the qualities Mayor Bob Janes singled out when honoring Bob Davison Tuesday for his 13 years of service to the city.

Reading the resolution, Janes proclaimed April 6 as "Bob Davison Day," recognizing that the former mayor, councilmember and planning commissioner always "demonstrated the highest level of diligence, the utmost competence in analysis and an unsurpassed professional demeanor."

"I'm sure the council has better things to do than saying good-bye to me yet again," Davison said. "I feel like a guest who keeps saying good-bye."

He stepped down from the council last November, deciding not to seek reelection. But when George Madison unexpectedly resigned in January, Davison agreed to temporarily reclaim his seat until a special election could be held. Following Bill Hillebrandt's March 30 election victory, Davison again retired from city government, where he also served on the Sanibel Planning Commission from 1986 to 1994.

Commission seat open

Now that Hillebrandt is serving as a city councilmember,

his peers agreed to accept his resignation from the Sanibel Planning Commission. The council encouraged residents interested in filling his vacant planning seat to submit their resumes the Skills Bank at city hall.

Consent agenda approved

The following items were approved on the council's consent agenda Tuesday:

■ The council approved a resolution amending the city budget to expand the Summer Wreck Program, a children's recreation program, to eight weeks. The program's cost will be paid for by increased student tuition.

■ An interlocal agreement between Lee County and the city of Sanibel for work required under an Environmental Protection Agency stormwater permit was approved.

■ The council authorized an agreement for consulting services with Sea Systems, Inc. to physically monitor coastal erosion and accretion.

Dry spell leaves water in short supply

The Island Water Association reported a drastic spike in water usage Monday, the highest on record, said Interim City Manager Bob Pritt. While IWA is investigating a leak, Pritt said the current dry spell might have prompted people to soak their lawns and yards, causing the jump.

Pritt reminded the council that Sanibel permanently

prohibits people from watering their lawns between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., except when using low-flow devices, testing their sprinkler systems and applying fertilizer or pesticides.

If dry conditions persist, Sanibel police may begin to patrol neighborhoods, and the South Florida Water Management District is likely to implement its drought and water shortage plan, according to Pritt.

Water reuse permit sought

The council unanimously authorized Pritt to negotiate a contract with Dames & Moore, the top-ranked bid firm, to assemble a water-reuse report and apply for a permit to use

John P. VerColen, 52

John P. VerColen died April 1, 1999 in Denver, Col. He was 52 years old.

Mr. VerColen was born Aug. 10, 1946 in Rochester, N.Y. After spending many years with Eastman-Kodak and too many winters up North, he moved to Captiva Island in 1977 and started working for South Seas Plantation. Between 1978 and 1996, he divided his time between Sanibel/Captiva and Vail, Col. While here he worked at the Mucky Duck restaurants on Captiva and Fort Myers Beach as well as the Lazy Flamingo.

While in Vail, he loved to donate his time teaching blind children how to ski at the Vail Ski School for the Blind. He also worked for various restaurants and of course, what he loved most in life was golfing, so he worked at the golf course in Vail.

In 1996, Mr. VerColen became engaged to Patty Grey, owner of the Season's at the Green Restaurant and took up permanent residence in Vail.

He suffered a heart attack on March 25 and underwent open-heart surgery March 30. He died of complications two days later. Mr. VerColen will be missed by his

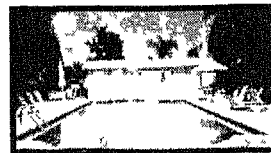

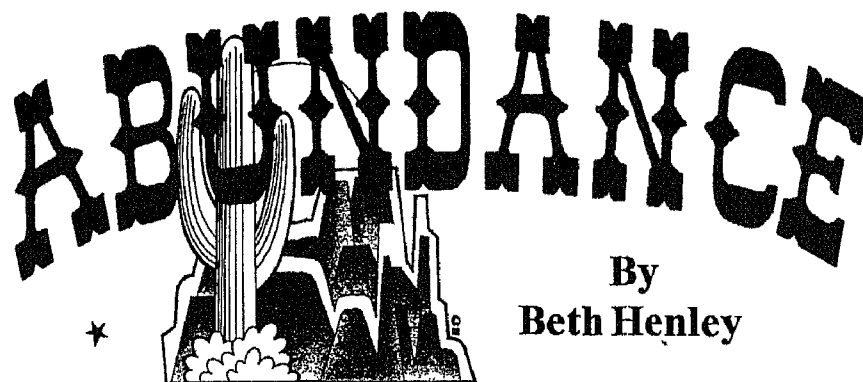

said, "It was such a neat meeting. Walking in this morning I knew Sam Bailey and Ralph Woodring, but they wouldn't know me. By the time we left, we all knew each other and our concerns. The involvement introduced me to a whole new segment of owners for name and business recognition. From my point of view, if you are here and not involved in what's going on, why are you here?"

During a quick stop for a cup of coffee and a slice of key lime pie at Sanibel Chowder Company, Trowbridge discovered he had visited 23 shops in an hour. It was now time to head to up island to make sure Captiva was not being ignored.

The first stop at the Captiva Civic Association brought back more early island memories. Paul Garvey, CCA executive director, reminded Trowbridge that as a kid he used to go with Trowbridge and his then-business partner, Al Duncan, by boat over to Fort Myers to get shrimp and fish for their restaurant, Scotty's (now the Jacaranda).

On Captiva, Trowbridge also ran into another familiar face, Candace Arnold, at her shop. Trowbridge knows her from when her family owned the Seahorse Shops on Sanibel in the 1980s.

He did learn from Wahid Kassar, owner of Gourmet Captiva, some Captiva business concerns. Kassar said all the talk on Sanibel is about sewers and not business.

"There is enough for Sanibel. Here we are without a visitor's center. People get lost on Captiva. We don't get much help here," Kassar said.

During lunch at the Sunshine Cafe, Trowbridge realized he had run out of business cards after visiting 14 shops on Captiva. He headed back to the chamber to return phone calls and finish up the day's paperwork.

Back at the office Liz Nocera, in her final days working as the executive director's

administrative assistant, is waiting with phone messages and correspondence to sign. Nocera, whose last day at the chamber is Friday, plans to work for temporary employment agencies and looks forward to learning about businesses other than accommodations.

After meeting close to 40 island business people, Trowbridge's day was not over yet. At 5:15 p.m. he met with Elaine McLaughlin, executive director of the Lee County Visitor & Convention Bureau, before giving a talk to owners of small inns and resorts at the Sanibel Public Library and fielding questions about their concerns at 7:30 p.m.

Previously, Trowbridge had commented his wife Doris had been so excited about his getting the director's job because she joked it would get him out of the house. Her wish is coming true.

In other proactive efforts as chamber director, Trowbridge has met with three of five Sanibel City Councilmembers — Steve Brown, Bill Hillebrandt and Andrew Reding.

Trowbridge said he told councilmembers he would like to have a city/chamber task force to look at how to make the city government more "user friendly" to businesses.

"I'd like to see five city people meet with five business representatives from all areas ... say construction, retail, lodging, restaurants ... to consider things that lead to better communication. So far, they (councilmembers) have thought it is a good idea," he said.

He has also expressed his personal interest in improvement of the bike paths on the island to council members. He feels that would benefit residents, visitors and businesses.

He is currently pushing for extension of the bike path at the crosswalk at the

community house to be continued across Periwinkle Way in front of the Pirate Playhouse to meet up with the path at Dunlop Road.

He also wants to initiate a daily flyer to be given to visitors who stop by the chamber that has current information about island events and special features. And, he is happy to say, island musician Danny Morgan's music is once again playing at the chamber to greet visitors.

"I'm working seven days a week right now. I had two board meetings during my first week on the job. Right now I'm doing emergency work and with a background in marketing and as an analyst, I'm looking toward future work," Trowbridge said. "Right now I'm having so much fun. I'm

Pratt had put the snake in the freezer for preservation and Deitschel had to let it thaw before doing a necropsy to see if the injuries were due to decomposition or trauma.

"The snake had a major fracture of the spine. When

I was able to open it up, there was massive internal damage. That convinced me it was death due to trauma," she said. "It is impossible to say specifically what caused the death. I can only say what I found and then people can give their

theories ... play guessing games. "All I can say is there was about a three inch area along the spine that was fractured and bruised by the kidney area, not by the head. Someone could have run over it with a bike or it could have been smashed with something. Unfortunately, there was too much decomposition of

the skin, so I can't say if it was a sharp or blunt object that caused the trauma. We're just fortunate to be able to tell that (a fractured spine and tissue trauma) was most likely the cause of death rather than death by natural causes."

If caught, the person who killed the snake, could face a \$100,000 fine and one year in prison.

Deitschel, who noted this was the first indigo she had ever seen, said, "It's a real tragedy. It was just sighted and now it's gone. I hate to think it was a malicious act; maybe someone was riding and just turning the corner and hit it. I just can't think that if that happened ... it's a black snake on a light background ... you

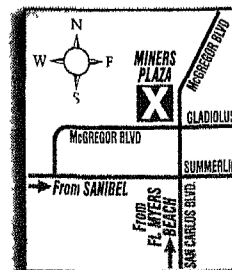

Chino Island transfer complete

The Trust for Public Land announced the official transfer of Chino Island in Pine Island Sound to the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge Tuesday.

The 54-acre barrier island is adjacent to two other islands — York and Coconut — owned by the Sanibel/Captiva Conservation Foundation. Chino is located beyond Tarpon Bay between the Sanibel Causeway and Pine Island.

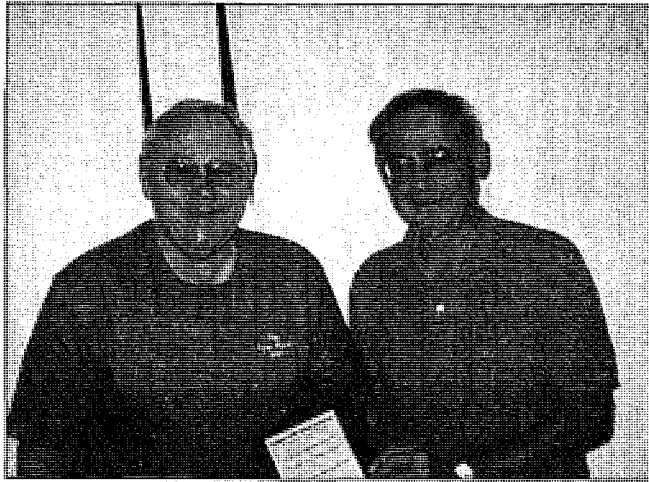
"The acquisition of Chino Island preserves critical nesting and feeding habitat for a variety of rare and threatened birds," U.S. Rep. Porter Goss, R-Sanibel, said. "Development there could have had serious impact on water quality and the natural habitat."

U.S. Sen. Bob Graham, D-Miami, said "As someone who has worked side by side with refuge employees and volunteers, I know that Chino Island's location within Pine Island Sound makes it a critical spot for wildlife. Its protection will enhance the refuge's preservation efforts."

Chino was initially permitted for development in the early 1990s but in 1997 the landowner elected to work with the Trust for Public Land to ensure the protection of wildlife and associated habitat along the coast.

"The 'Ding' Darling refuge is a wonderful place for families and children to enjoy the wonderful natural resources of Florida," U.S. Sen. Connie Mack, R-Fort Myers, said. "It was important to me to secure funding for the acquisition of Chino Island so that future generations could enjoy it as well."

Refuge Manager Lou Hinds said, "Development of Chino Island would have made it extremely difficult to maintain the integrity of the wildlife habitat in Pine Island Sound. We are quite pleased that (the trust) was able to facilitate this acquisition so that the visitor experience at 'Ding' Darling remains an outstanding one."

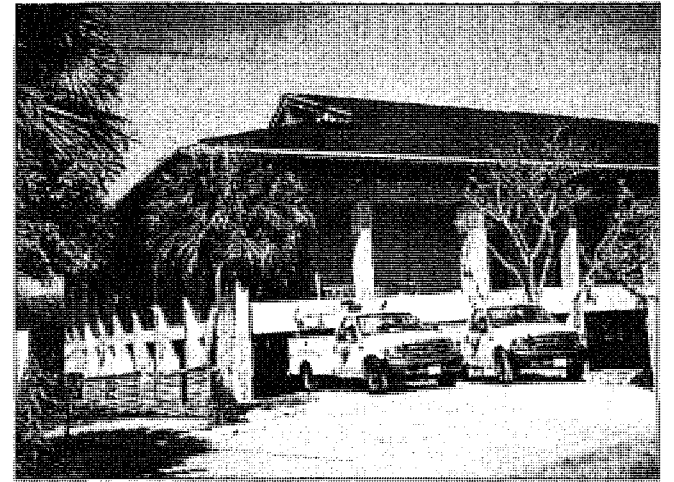

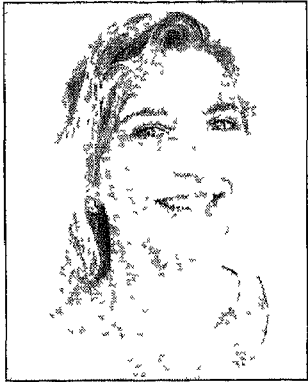
Bill to restrict teen driving inane

If this piece of inane legislation actually makes it into law, kids will be forced to violate it, and most likely with their parents' blessings. They'll simply duck down in back seats or hide in trunks, just as Minton and Geller likely did when sneaking into popular drive-in movie theaters back in their teen-age years.

Maybe Minton and Geller should be forced to be the adult supervisors. If any parent, for whatever reason, needs more than two of their children or kids' friends to drive off together, one of the two would have to go along for the ride.

I don't know what's going on in Tallahassee these days but if many more of these hair-brained ideas get serious consideration, I think we, the people, should require no more than two lawmakers be allowed to meet at one time and that they hand the Capitol over to Florida's teens. Teens, after all, know the Truth and are spreading it in their aptly named anti-smoking campaign that lawmakers — probably these same two guys — want to cut because they say it teaches disrespect for adults.

Speaking for teens across Florida, I'd like to say to Minton and Geller: Life's a two-way street.

Passing the Buck

To the editor:

As one of the private citizens who initiated the process to have Buck Key designated as a Lee County "Archaeological and Historical District," I was appalled by Lee County's Local Planning Agency's March 22 decision approving Mariner Properties Inc.'s irresponsible proposal to transfer development rights from parcels it owns on Buck Key to mangrove wetlands areas it owns at South Seas Plantation on Captiva. The LPA's failure to consider any

of the compelling planning and environmental issues raised by the 55-plus Captiva citizens who attended the hearing, and its eagerness to pass the buck (key) to the county commissioners, represented a gross dereliction of the LPA's discretionary authority and public responsibility.

The Lee County Planning Division, in its staff report of March 15, determined that the archeological sites of Buck Key are "significant at not only the local, state and national but also the international level" and that the tropical hardwoods and wetlands of Buck Key are "irreplaceable" natural

resources.

Nevertheless, in an exercise of tortured legal legerdemain, the staff accepted Mariner's indefensible premise that Buck Key should be deemed developable for purposes of allowing Mariner to transfer its alleged development "rights" from Buck Key to mangrove wetlands areas on Captiva. The staff's decision and the agency's rubber stamping of that decision are incomprehensible and inconceivable to anyone interested in sound planning principles and the protection of the precious

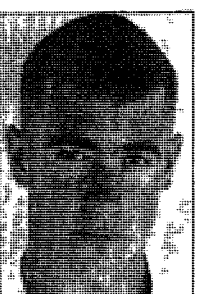

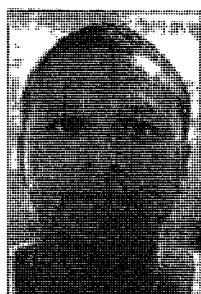

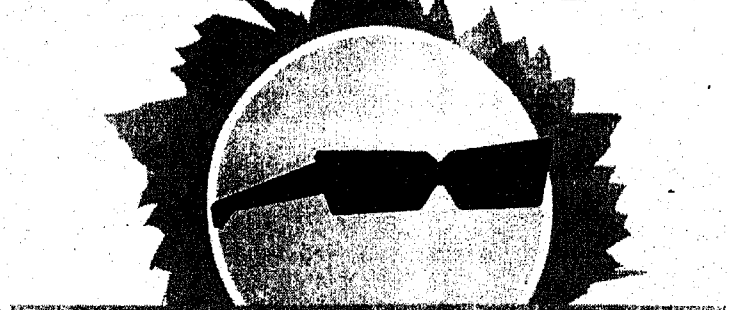

Gary Price to promote island publication

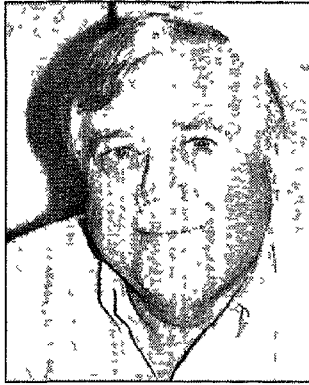

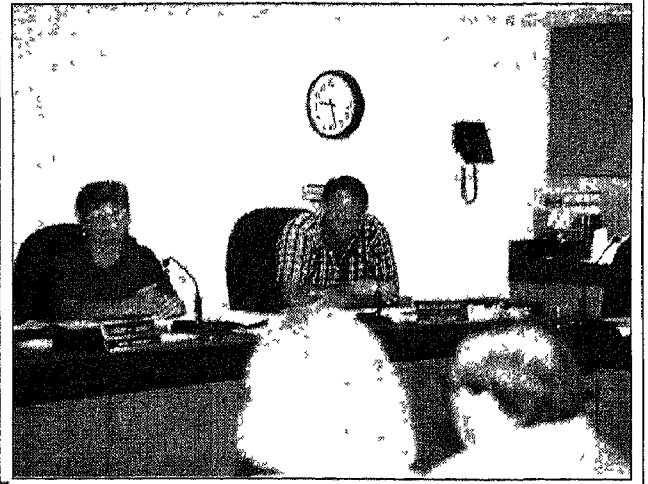
"I could be working 80 hours a week," Price said.

Three candidates running for IWA board seats

With three candidates in the running and three seats available on the Island Water Association's board of directors, the trio is assured a two-year term, barring any unforeseen complications.

Paul Garvey, a 19-year Captiva resident, currently serves as the executive director of the Captiva Civic Association, an IWA board member since 1995, and training officer for the Captiva Fire Control District. Previously, he served as chairman of the Captiva Erosion Prevention District and president of the CCA.

"I've served four years on the board of directors. It's been an honor and a privilege to serve with water company. It's a very well run organization presently developing several major projects, notably the deep

injection well, and I'd like to see them to completion," Garvey said.

Stella Farwell also has IWA connections, serving in a volunteer capacity. In 1997, she chaired the nominating committee and headed the teller committee in 1998.

"One of the great things I noticed about this year were a lot of kids taking part," Anders said. "It's great to see the parents out with the kids doing volunteer service for the island."

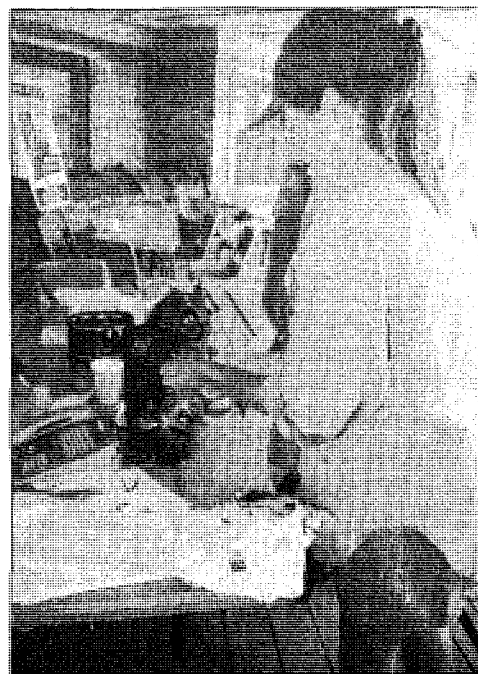

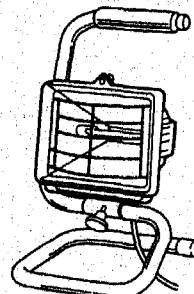

Documentary highlights Newton, uncommon friends

Years in the making, the friendship between James Newton and five icons of the 20th century — Thomas Edison, Henry Ford, Harvey Firestone, Charles Lindbergh and Alexis Carrel — will be presented in a documentary to be aired this Sunday at the Barbara B. Mann Performing Arts Hall.

The film, based on Newton's book "Uncommon Friends," published in 1987, sparked the interest of filmmakers John Biffar of Fort Myers and Brent Sheneman of Captiva. Recognizing a rare opportunity to capture first-hand glimpses of the great men on film, they began interviewing Newton and Ellie, his wife of 50 plus years.

"I was a journalist at the time I interviewed him. One thing led to another," Sheneman said. "He was so charming, a gentleman, and encouraging to us young people; he saw our fascination and was our inspiration. ... He was in many ways, a mentor."

Newton, who turned 94 March 31, arrived in Fort Myers as a young man and made his mark by developing Edison Park, a community across McGregor Boulevard from Thomas Edison's home.

Dubbed by locals as the "wonder boy," he became a friend of the elderly inventor who introduced him to Henry Ford and Harvey Firestone.

Famous for inventing the light bulb, Edison's genius is displayed for all at the museum that bears his name in Fort Myers. The museum and adjacent laboratory also give evidence of the hundreds of other ways he influenced the manner in which we live.

Ford made automobiles accessible to the masses, and Firestone manufactured the tires and changed the way corporations operate.

Newton later met and became close friends

with Charles Lindbergh and Alexis Carrel. Lindbergh marked his place in history by making the first successful solo flight across the Atlantic Ocean, and Carrel was a surgeon whose work influenced modern medicine.

Newton as a young man kept journals that give life to the conversations and situations he was part of so many years ago.

"In 1993, it hit John like a thunderclap ... we had to get James and Ellie on film to talk about and to relate the stories in the book," Sheneman said. "James had published the book, but John (Biffar) wanted them actually talking on camera. We put together a film crew without a client. We just knew this had to be done."

The concept attracted Paul Bush, who through his family's foundation, enabled the production to go forward. The Uncommon Friends Foundation, formed three years ago, agreed to match their participation.

"The sense of history and resources (Bush) brought to the picture made this happen," Sheneman said.

Walter Cronkite narrates the film and Sheneman said that his name was the only one on the list of possible candidates.

In addition to interviews with the Newtons, members of the Lindbergh family and other pertinent people, many scenes are recreated by actors. The film also uses archival stills and actual footage of events dating to the 1900s, some rarely seen before.

"This is the story of the 20th century. This incredible man (Newton) had personal touches with these men and these men helped shaped the philosophy of this century," Sheneman said.

The documentary is scheduled to air on PBS television next year and will be offered as an educational tool to schools. It will premier at the Barbara B. Mann Performing Arts Hall this Sunday, April 11, and Cronkite will be in attendance.

"This is a story that kids need to know. What better way to do it than with our specialty art form ... film?" Sheneman asked.

Tom Hoolihan, chairman of documentaries for the Uncommon Friends Foundation, and Stephanie Zito, interim director, said their mission is to reach young people and spark a

spirit of adventure by exposing them to these entrepreneurs.

"The film and an educational curriculum at fourth-grade level will be made available to schools," Hoolihan said.

Sheneman said, "Common people are capable of uncommon things. The uncommon things come to light only when you reach out and stretch yourself. It's attainable. Kids can live uncommon lives. The road less traveled is available if you feel like taking it ... take it."

The Uncommon Friends Foundation, which in addition to the Bush Foundation gets funding from the city of Fort Myers and other benefactors, will host the premier showing of the

Taylor wows the crowd

Singer/songwriter/comedian Livingston Taylor was a commanding presence on the stage at the Banner Island Group for the Arts Saturday night. Playing to a nearly sold-out house, Taylor brought his audience through the gamut of emotions with his funny and sometimes melancholy observations of life.

Taylor has the facial expressions and gestures of a full-time standup comic but comedy is only a small part of the routine he's been perfecting for some three decades.

He talked of the life experiences that inspired his songs, such as his frequent late-night, after-work dining on hotdogs, Slim Jims and burritos at 7-Eleven that helped him write, "I'm Not as Herbal as I Should Be."

He took "How Much is that Doggie in the Window?" and turned it around to write a song from the dog's perspective, trying to get the little girl to take him home. He promised to never bark unless they were outside or a stranger was approaching.

He wrote an hysterical anti-country country song and poked fun at folk music with a song about a songwriter whose character refused to do what he wanted him to, so he killed him off.

He told stories about his childhood in Chapel Hill, N.C., growing up with his brother, singer/songwriter James Taylor, and the rest of the clan. He talked of the first time he heard bluegrass music, after sneaking out of the house to buy cigarettes and stumbling upon a band at a gas station. He recalled first leaving home at age 16 and arriving in New York City with a banjo, on which he gave a medley of the totally inappropriate songs he was compelled to play on the instrument, including ones by Elvis Presley and Frank Sinatra.

Taylor, who now lives in Boston, said he was thrilled with the steamy Southwest Florida weather last weekend and apologized for refusing to allow the air-conditioning units to be turned on, lest they interfere with the sound of his acoustic guitar. He also played the piano.

When BIG Arts' John Friedman took the stage before the performance, he commented on the large amount of non-gray-haired people in the audience.

That was exactly the point, according to Danny Morgan, a noted island musician, who helped bring Taylor here.

"John Friedman asked me to help out, to get involved in BIG Arts," Morgan said, adding they wanted to bring some "young blood" into the concerts. "So I made a list of people I thought were really great, really terrific."

Morgan said he'd met Taylor a few times before but that they didn't really know each other. However, Morgan had seen him play and was extremely impressed.

"The main thing is ... how he was on the stage, playing by himself without any band. ... Having seen all these people — Dylan, Joni Mitchell, I'd seen James (Taylor) a bunch of times. But Livingston just blew me

away. I just loved the way he sang. I liked his expression and when you put that with the humor, the man is really spectacular."

So Morgan went about trying to get Friedman and the rest of the BIG Arts board to say OK. "I played all this stuff for John. I made him stay in my studio and listen to all the CDs. He took a stack with him of about 20 CDs. Then, he came back (with the go ahead)," Morgan explained.

Morgan said he wanted to start with Taylor because while he would draw a young crowd, he wasn't so far out there that BIG Arts regulars wouldn't enjoy the show.

Other performers Morgan hopes to help draw to BIG Arts include David Wilcox, Michael Johnson, Michael Franks and Mike Reid, whom he predicted will become "the Stephen Sondheim of our time. His musical sensibility is uncanny. I don't know anybody even in the same league."

For Taylor's show, Morgan set up the sound system and picked the performer up from the airport. And while he said he didn't know him prior to last weekend, Morgan said they had a great time together and now feels like he made a new friend.

"He came to Chadwick's to hear me play. ... he took notes and gave me pointers. We went to breakfast at the Lighthouse and he gave me tips about my singing. He's very generous," Morgan said.

Taylor also came to Morgan's house and the two jammed in his living room studio prior to Saturday's show. Morgan said the session could have gone on for hours but they had to get prepped for the show, most of which Morgan missed because he was on stage at Chadwick's.

Still, he had nothing but raves for Taylor and what he did see.

"He's a song guy. He loves great songs. And that's sort of the central idea I'm thinking about for this series, people who really create great songs. ... Certainly, BIG Arts has catered to people who make great music. And song is the idea of music and lyric, and being able to experience that on a real one-to-one basis," he said.

Morgan said he hopes the series and the increasing popularity of live music at restaurants and bars on the island will continue.

"If people around here hear someone like Livingston Taylor, they might support some of the music on this island, listen to the lyrics. I like being involved with trying to

Island man organizing wheelchair tennis program

Avid tennis player Bill Rosenberg is organizing a wheelchair tennis program for Lee County quadriplegics and paraplegics.

Rosenberg, who retired to Sanibel from Cleveland, Ohio, said he first became aware of wheelchair tennis about 15 years ago when a friend of his wife's, a Vietnam veteran who had lost his legs in action, invited the couple to watch a match.

"It was really inspiring to see those guys play. I'm a tennis nut. I play five or six times a week. And it's one of the few sports people can play that doesn't require a gymnasium and nine other players," he said. "I thought when I retired, if I had time, I'd do that. I retired two years ago. This is a tennis mecca down here. I thought, why not?"

He said he has three players lined up so far, none of whom have played tennis before.

Rosenberg has been working with Steve Martin, a wheelchair player who teaches tennis to able-bodied players at the Cape Coral Yacht Club, to get publicity and garner interest.

Martin was on the World Wheelchair Tennis Tour and was ranked in the top 20 until he injured himself, according to Rosenberg.

He added that wheelchair tennis is so great because chair-bound players can play with able-bodied players. The only difference in the rules is that the "chairs" get two bounces on the ball while the "legs" only get one.

"You can have fun with it, get the family involved, get in competition," he said.

Rosenberg plays for the Dunes Golf & Tennis Club on the Lee County Men's 50-plus League. He said a lot of the league players have volunteered their time to get wheelchair tennis off the ground.

Rosenberg has been playing in the local league since 1990 and loves the game because of "the fact that you can play tennis for such a long period of time in your life and you meet the nicest people on the tennis courts."

He noted the growing popularity of tennis, with 36 teams in the men's 50-plus league alone, and said it shouldn't be restricted to just those with working legs.

Rosenberg said the first games will be played either at the Rutenberg courts in South Fort Myers or at the Cape Coral Yacht Club April 13 or 17. The group will get together

at least twice a month.

And while players can use regular wheelchairs, Rosenberg wants to eventually get a couple of sports wheelchairs.

"They're lighter. The wheels are angled out so you can turn very quickly. You're much more mobile. You do get two bounces but the secret is getting the wheelchair in the right position to hit the ball," he said.

Rosenberg is excited three players have already signed up and he's hoping for more. "I'm looking forward to it. Anybody of any ability that wants to do it (should try)," he said.

In addition to players, Rosenberg is still looking for volunteers to hit balls, retrieve balls and the like.

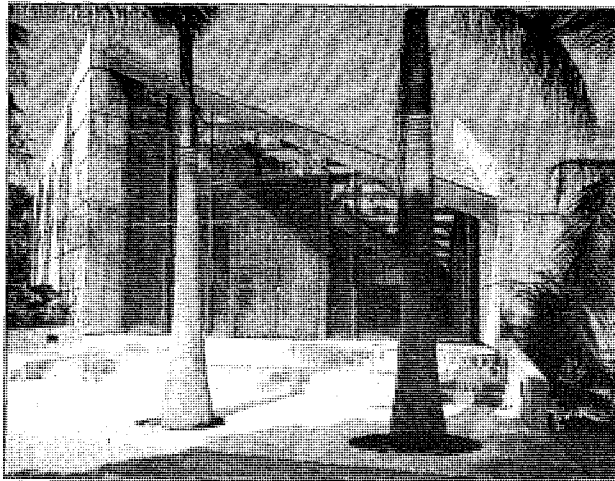

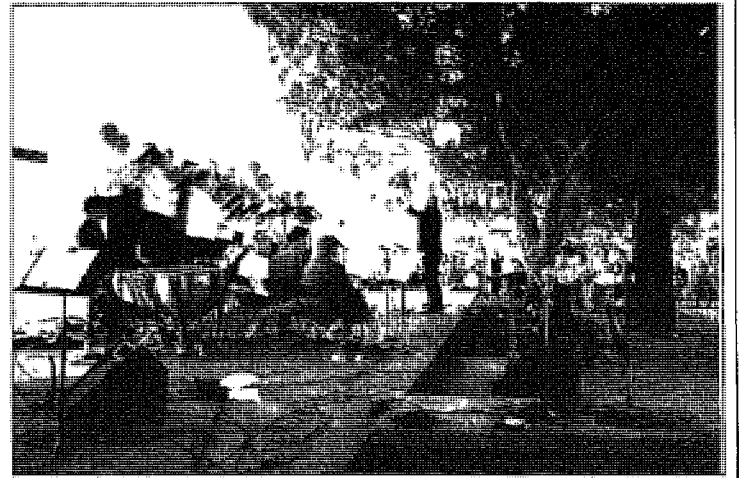

He added that while it is not a juried show, organizers will not accept anything that is not handmade.

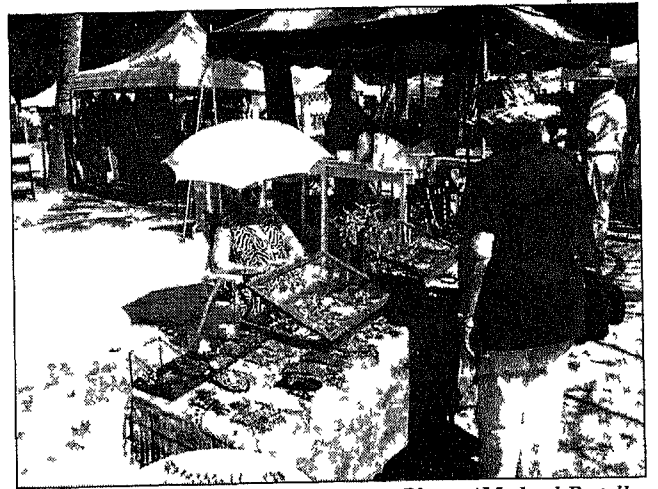

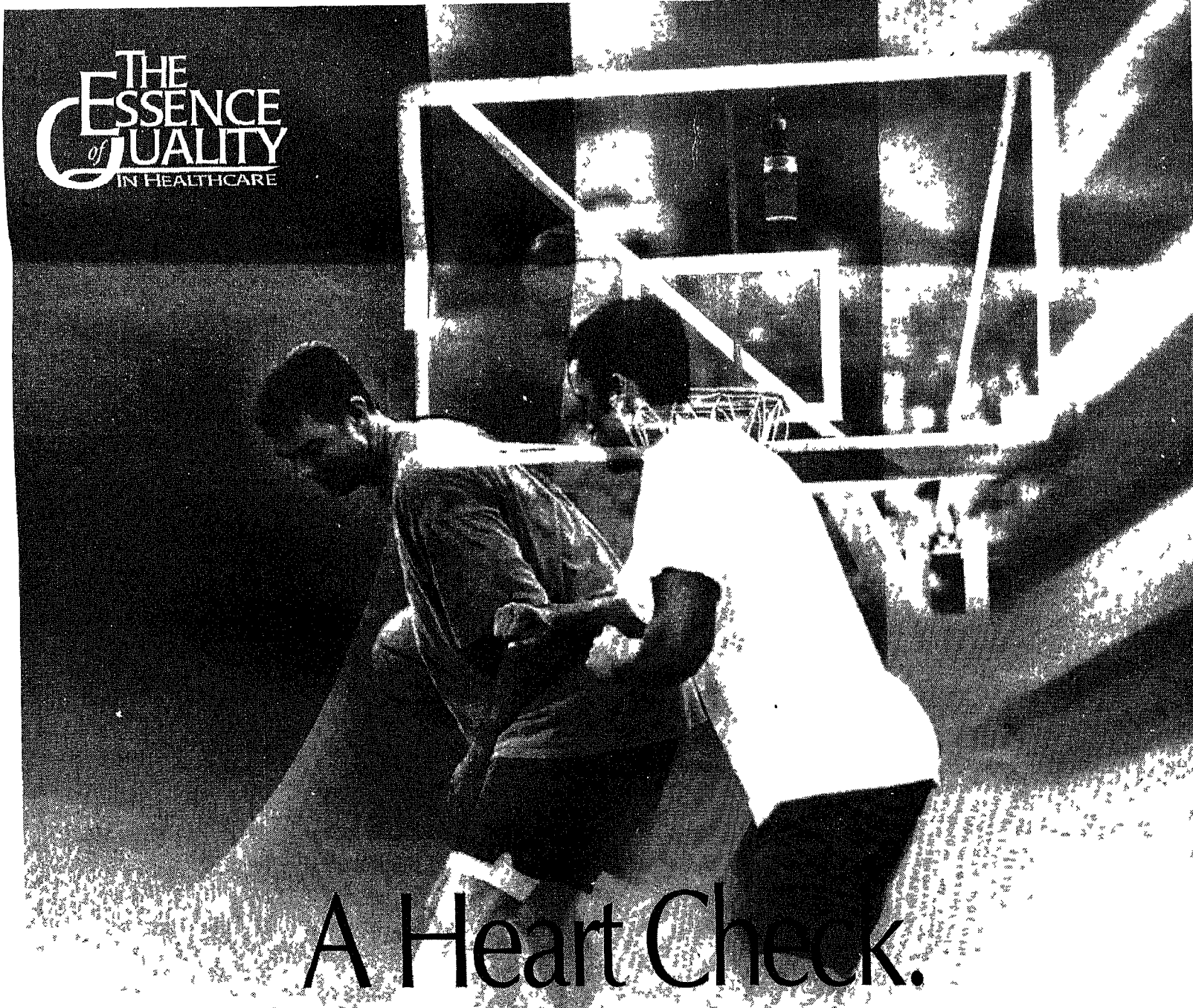
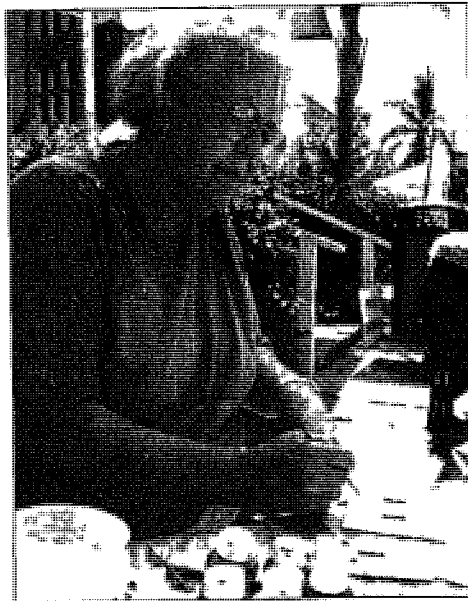

"Some had candy, some had plastic toys, coins, rings, plastic animals, tattoos, a variety of little toys," said Dave DeFonzo of the rec complex.

This year, the staff ordered most of the eggs pre-stuffed with the exception of the prizes for the youngest group, which had to be non-chokable size. In the past, the workers have had to stuff all the eggs.

"This is the first year we've done it this way," DeFonzo said. "All the staff hides them in the annual hunt. All the lifeguards and counselors come out early in the day and everyone takes a box of eggs and goes to a certain section."

He said one of the worker gets on the roof with a firecracker cannon that he fires at exactly 8:30 a.m. All of the eager kids are lined up at the starting line and off they go.

"It only lasts about 15 minutes and the eggs are all found ... all that work," DeFonzo said.

The children were divided into five age groups and two of the eggs in each age group had a coupon for a chocolate bunny the lucky finder could redeem at the rec center.

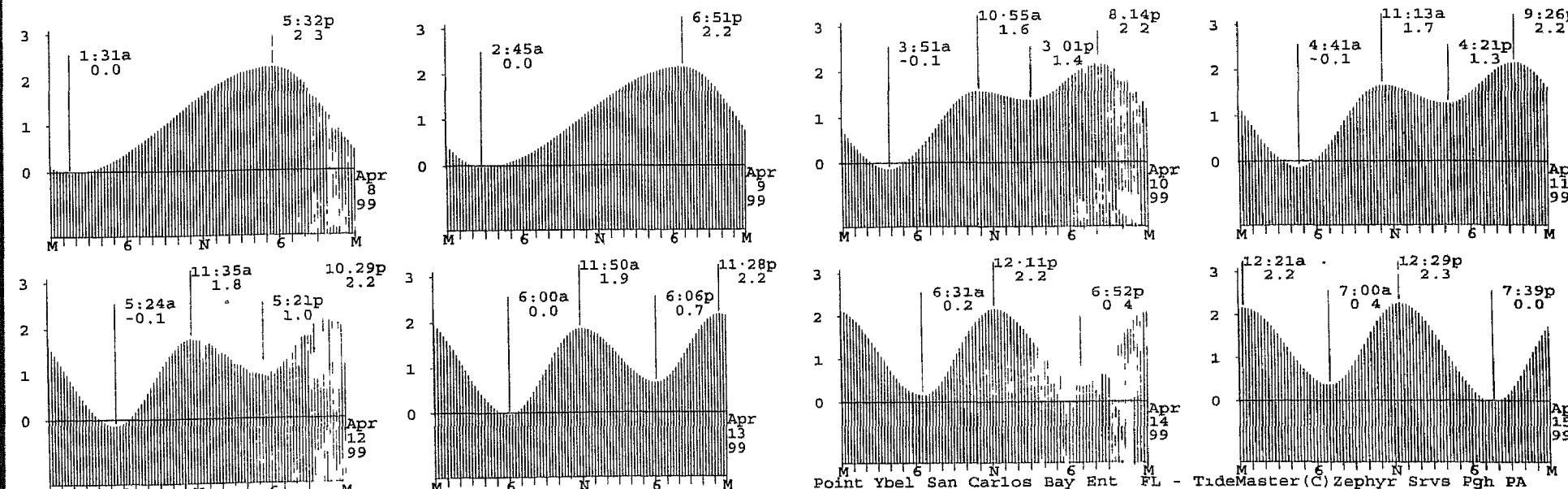

Library to help Sanibel School

Sanibel Public Library will add 1,000 books to the Sanibel School's library collection on a long-term lending basis by the onset of the 1999-2000 school year, by unanimous vote of the library's board of directors March 18.

"The decision came in direct response to the Sanibel School Advisory Council's plea for more books and to the library's mission, 'To be sensitive to the requirements of the community,'" board president Jack Perlowski said. "We saw an opportunity to perform a valuable community service."

The need for more books stems from the school's pending expansion from kindergarten through fifth grade to kindergarten through eighth grade. Once the details are worked out, the books will also be available to students who do not attend the Sanibel School.

The library has appropriated up to \$20,000 of the library's endowment funds to acquire the school loan collection. It will include a number of books to supplement the school's Accelerated Reading program as well as other fiction and non-fiction works appropriate for grades six through eight, as determined by librarians and teachers.

"The board's decision reflects the library's desire to strengthen the symbiotic relationship with our island school," Library Director Patricia Allen said. "We both want

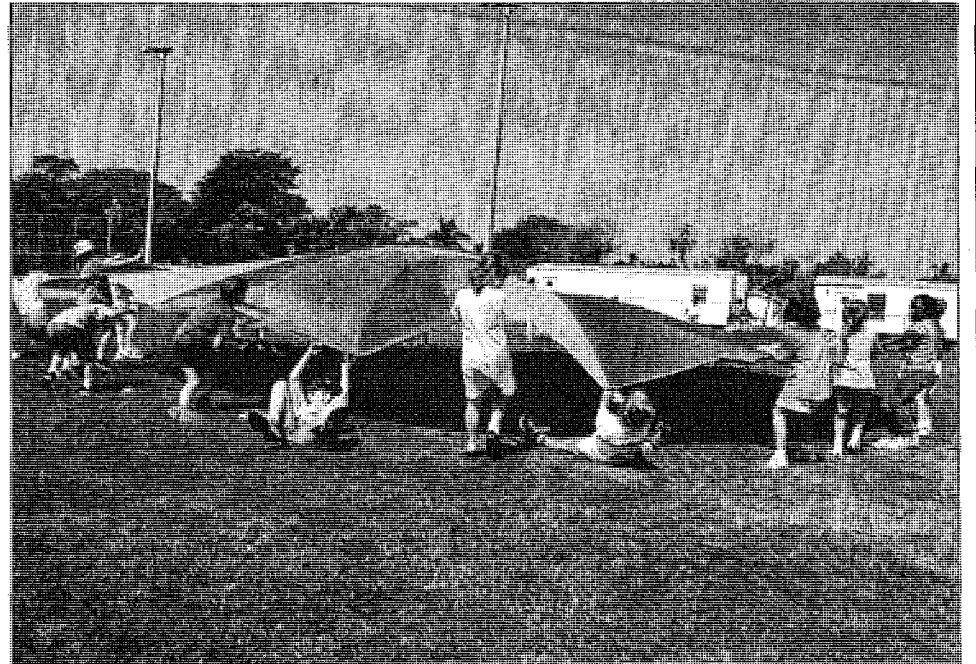
FIELD DAY FUN

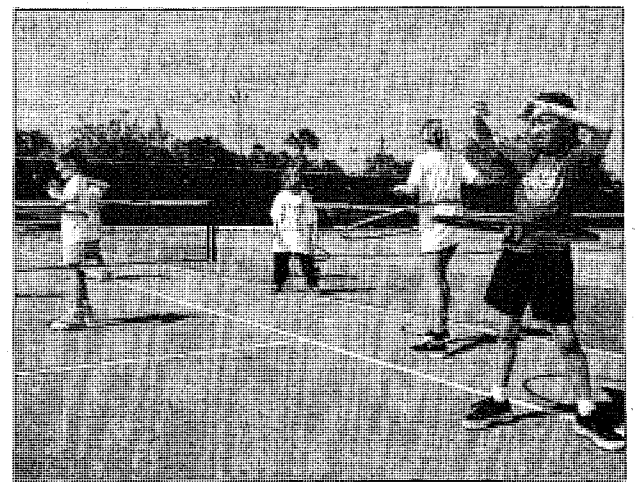

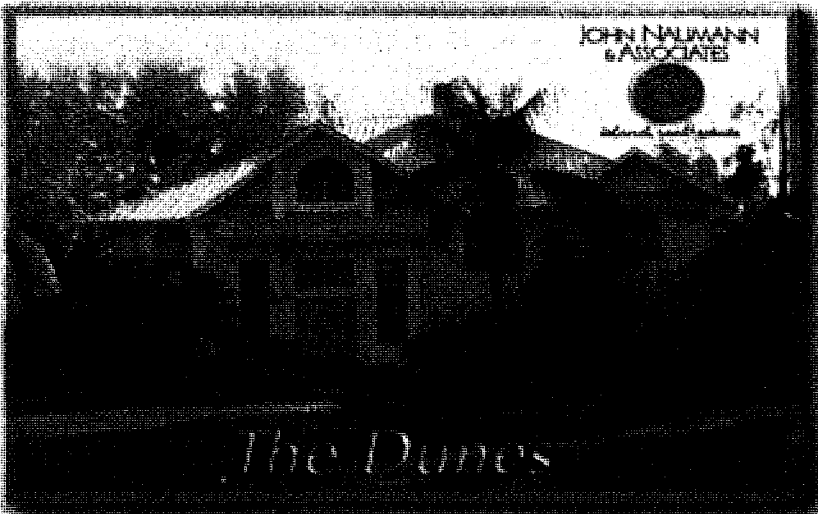


Sanibel School fourth-graders defy the laws of gravity playing group jump rope.

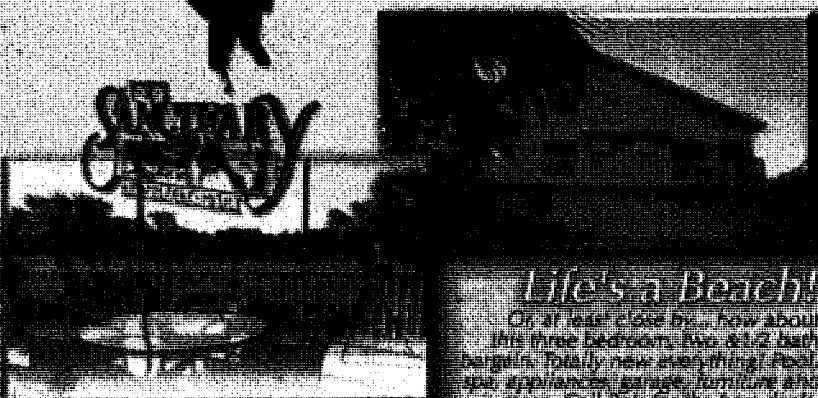

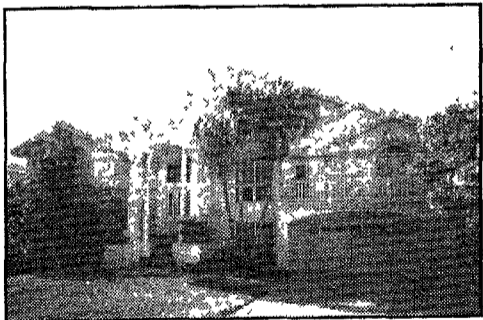

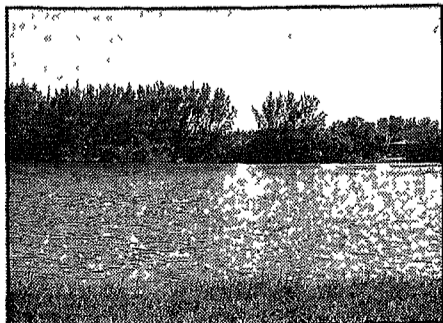

Islanders open ice cream shop in town

Vanessa Viglione and Dave Jensen of Captiva have opened an ice cream business on McGregor Boulevard near John Morris Road in Fort Myers. And Jensen's Real Homemade Ice Cream Shop, in business for just six weeks, is already seeing some repeat customers, many of them from the islands.

Viglione, a self-described ice cream addict, learned how to make ice cream after taking a course at Penn State University, which offers the longest-existing university course devoted to ice cream.

She learned about the course back in 1996 while watching a television show about ice cream. Jensen sent Viglione to Pennsylvania for the class as a special birthday treat.

"I was one of 144 students in what was the university's 106th year of offering the course. It's known as the course of ice cream for shop owners and ice cream manufacturers. The students who were enrolled represented 40 states and 12 countries. It was the course Ben Cohen of Ben & Jerry's took," Viglione said.

"Short of having children, it was the most rewarding experience of my life," she said. "I'm basically a shy person and it made me really test my communication and personal skills. It made me get over some personal hurdles."

It also made her somewhat of an ice cream snob.

"I knew I could never eat ice cream again without thinking about it," she said. "So I vowed not to eat bad ice cream again." Viglione figured the best way to keep her vow was to make ice cream herself. One thing led to another and after some brainstorming, she and Jensen opened Jensen's Real Homemade Ice Cream Shop.

She makes all the ice cream herself while her daughter, Amber, is the shop's manager. The mother/daughter team

has found working together to be more fun than they expected. They also have many more repeat customers than they thought they would after being open less than two months.

"We have a lot of repeat customers already who come in and know us by name," Amber said. "And I know their favorite flavors already, too."

Finding a favorite flavor at Jensen's isn't difficult either. Because everything is homemade, the ice cream doesn't have that typical chemical aftertaste many other ice creams have. And because there are a dozen flavors, the ice cream is consistently fresh and obviously thoughtfully prepared. Vanessa doesn't leave a stone unturned in the manufacturing process, as evidenced by the fact that she uses Danish sweet cream to make the Cookies & Sweet Cream ice cream. The significance? The sweet cream brings out the cookie flavor like no other cookies and cream ice cream anywhere.

The Vigliones not only offer sample-taking but recommend it.

The two said they have been pleasantly surprised by the number of islanders who have stopped by the shop for their ice cream fix. "We've been getting a lot of islanders who stop by on their way home from shopping on the mainland," Viglione said. "From what some of them have told us, a waffle cone lasts well past the four-way stop at Periwinkle and Lindgren and a shake lasts at least to the San-Cap/Tarpon Bay intersection."

Viglione has also been known to deliver to ice cream-starved islanders on her way home.

As for setting up shop on the islands, Viglione said she would consider it if the opportunity arises. For now, the mother and daughter team — joined by special appearances from Jensen on his days off from the family marina — hope to be scooping their way into the hearts of ice cream lovers.

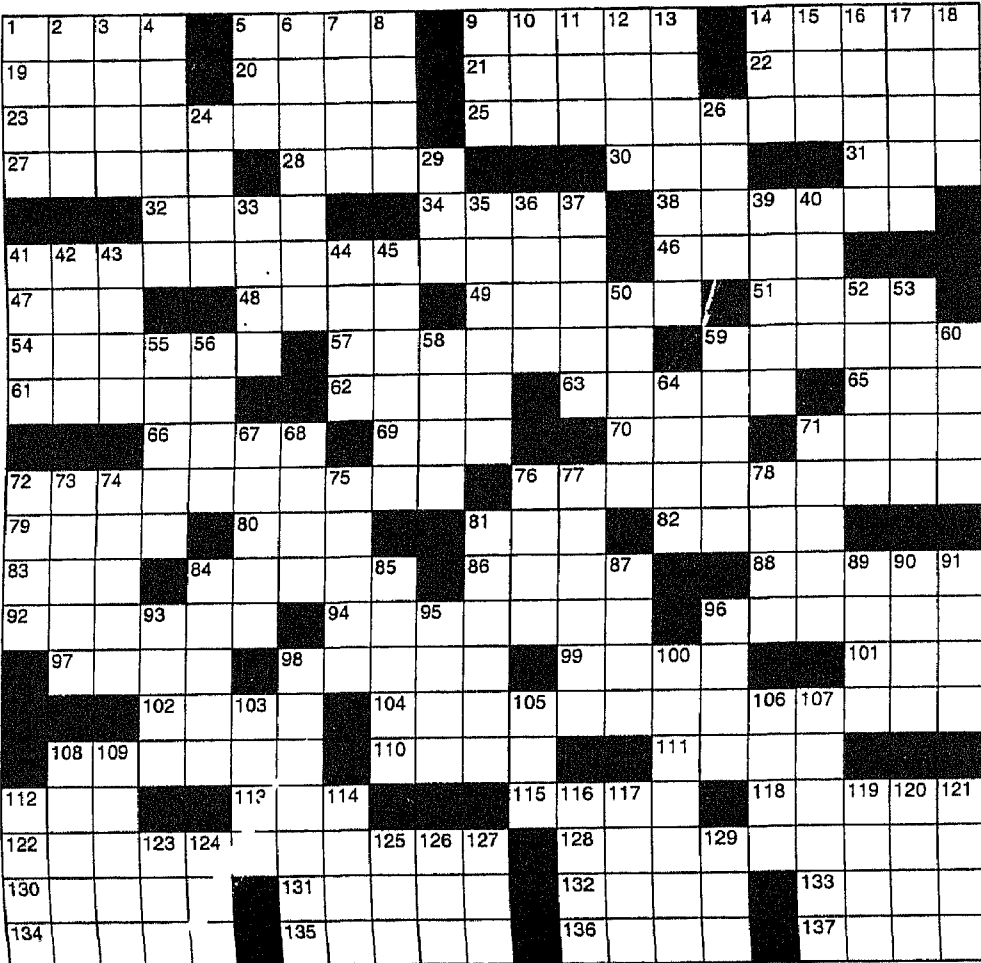

As the play progresses, declarer's picture of how the unseen cards are distributed steadily becomes clearer. Sometimes he gains all the information he needs early in the play, and sometimes he must wait until much later.

Take this deal where declarer, at trick one, learns essentially all he needs to know about West's hand. Let's say East wins the diamond lead with the king and returns a diamond to dummy's ace.

It isn't difficult for declarer to conclude that West must have the K-

Q of spades, K-Q of hearts and queen of clubs for his opening bid. Only 12 high-card points are missing after East produces the king of diamonds at trick one, and West must have them all.

Accordingly, declarer leads a club from dummy at trick three and finesesses the jack, knowing the finesse will lose. West wins and returns a diamond to the jack, whereupon South cashes the A-K-10 of clubs and queen of diamonds.

On the fourth diamond, West — now down to six cards — must discard a spade or a heart. Let's say he discards a spade, in which case dummy also discards a spade. South thereupon plays the ace and another spade. West wins and is forced to lead a heart from the K-Q-4.

If he leads the king, South has an easy time making a second heart trick, so let's assume he returns the four instead. Ordinarily, declarer would play the eight from dummy in the hope that West had the K-10-4 or Q-10-4, but here, with the knowledge accumulated earlier, South goes up with the jack to score his ninth trick.

It is a sad fact that many experienced declarers would fail to draw the obvious inference at trick one about the nature of West's hand. East's king of diamonds play clearly marks West with the five other missing high cards, and South should shape all his later plays to fit that assumption.

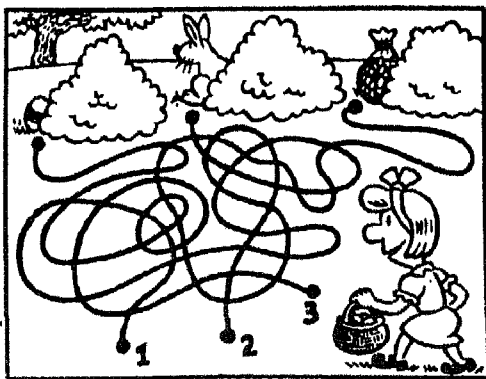

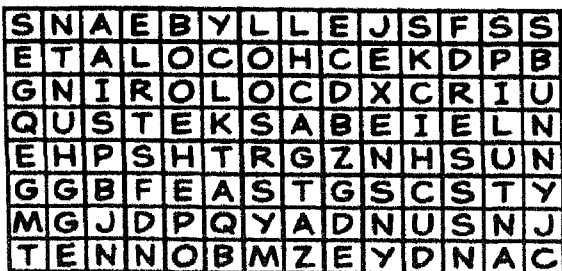

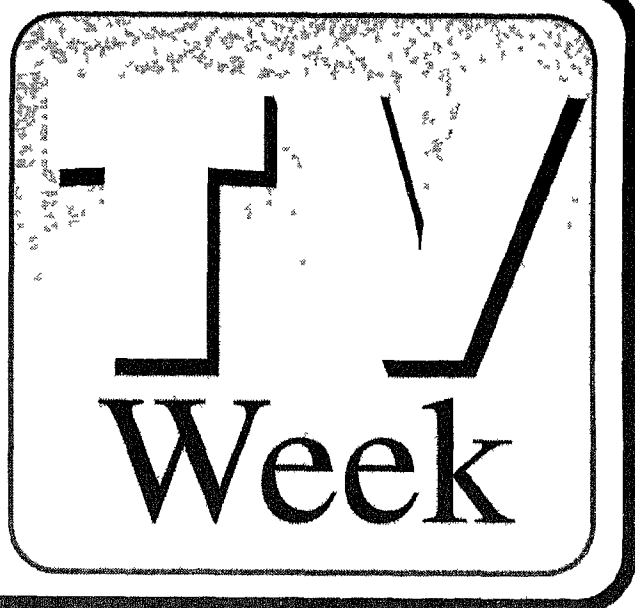

Tax audit nightmares

One of the most frightening experiences for a taxpayer is to receive the following type of letter from the IRS



Dear Taxpayer: We have selected your federal income tax return for the years shown below to examine the items checked at the end of this letter. We have scheduled an appointment for you.

If you receive a letter similar to this from the IRS, it does not mean that you should panic. The IRS often conducts routine inquiries that can easily be satisfied. In some cases, the IRS merely conducts a mail audit. In other, more complicated cases, a face-to-face meeting can be demanded.

In the event that you are chosen for a personal audit, it may be a good idea to take your financial advisor, CPA, or an attorney licensed to practice before the IRS to the meeting. Most issues are resolved satisfactorily by following these guidelines. If an impasse still persists, you can take the IRS to court. However, the process can be complex, time-consuming and possibly more costly than it is worth.

Remember that your best defense is consistency, cooperation and confidence in handling the situation in a professional manner.

The Alternative Minimum Tax: What it is and how it works

The Alternative Minimum Tax was created by Congress to help ensure that taxpayers — both individual and corporate — who enjoy economic income do not escape taxation through creative accounting and "over-use" of tax benefits provided under the regular tax system.

The AMT is actually a separate, parallel tax system with its own rules for determining taxable income, deductions and credits. The basic formula for the AMT is fairly straight-forward. The computation begins with "taxable income" as it is computed under the regular tax system.

This figure is then either increased or decreased, depending on circumstances, by AMT "adjustments." Next, AMT "preferences" are added. Then, the respective AMT "exemption" is subtracted. These "preferences" and "adjustments" are corrections designed to prevent high-income taxpayers from taking too much of an advantage of tax breaks that further economic or social goals.

The exemption amounts are much like personal exemptions under the regular system. They are \$45,000 for joint filers and \$33,750 for individuals. There is also a phasing out of these exemptions if income exceeds certain levels.

The result of these computations is Alternative Minimum Taxable Income. To arrive at the AMT, multiply the AMTI by 26 percent if the AMTI is under \$175,000 and 28 percent for AMTI over \$175,000. Finally, after deducting certain credits, the AMT is compared to the tax computed under the regular tax system. The taxpayer is then liable for the larger of the two taxes.

The interaction between the AMT and the regular tax system can make multi-year tax planning difficult. Consulting a financial planner or tax professional is probably a wise idea if you intend to engage in any significant tax planning strategy.
