City closer to settling lawsuit with Lee County

Sanibel City Council voted Tuesday to dedicate its share of surplus revenue to reducing tolls on the Sanibel Causeway, providing Lee County does the same.

Council, by a 4-1 vote, moved to allow City Manager Judie Zimomra to continue negotiations with County Manager Don Stilwell in the hopes of reaching accord between the two governing bodies. Councilwoman Judy Workman voted no.

The agreement accepts the county's terms calling for Sanibel to apply its 21 percent of surplus revenue to reducing the discount program on the causeway and transponder fees. But the resolution that council approved stipulates that the city's contribution will remain in effect only for so long as the county dedicates its 79 percent share solely to toll reductions.

City Attorney Ken Cuyler will draft a preliminary stipulated agreement and present it to council for consideration during the 9 a.m. public hearing of Tues., Feb. 15 at MacKenzie Hall.

Some at the hearing wondered if a settlement would result in higher taxes for Sanibel residents or a decrease in city ser-

"Our share has to be replaced to keep our budget in place," Bernie Lubetkin, a private citizen, said. "Am I as a citizen better off or worse off? That's what I want to know.'

Vice Mayor Dick Walsh said the proposal amounts to residents and business owners paying \$2.37 for every \$100,000 of taxable value. Based on an average property value on-island of \$500,000, most islanders will pay about \$11.85 to make up the shortfall.

Another resident, Barbara Cooley, said

the proposal isn't right for islanders because it puts tourists first.

'It sounds like you are asking me to pay more taxes so day-trippers' tolls can go down," she said. "I'm afraid it sounds like city council is giving up without a fight."

Others, like Workman, said the settlement terms simply aren't good.

'To me, when you negotiate a settlement there is some compromise involved," she said. "The longer we negotiate the more they take."

Workman said she was unhappy with the county's decision to withhold the second payment of surplus tolls to Sanibel from last year — \$202,795 — and with the lack of protections built into the settlement proposal.

'I think this is a bad deal, we're not get-

ting anything out of it," she said.

Lubetkin said that the amount of taxes that islanders pay to the county will go up as well because the county's typical annual portion of toll revenue — about \$3 million will have to be recouped as well.

Planning Commission Chairman Jack Samler urged council to seek a unilateral settlement with the county where both parties retain their shares under the interlocal agreement and agree to drop all claims against one another. Cuyler responded that such a strategy wouldn't work because the county has maintained in court that the interlocal agreement is invalid.

"I don't have faith in the interlocal agreements anymore," Councilmember Steve Brown said while predicting the county will punch holes in the city's pro-

Walsh said he believes the county "won't stab us" because of Sanibel's status as a source of bed taxes through the resort



John Filchak, a 17-year island resident, said that Rogers' dedication raised Sanibel above other cities he and his wife, Mary, have visited, such as Jackson Hole, Wyo. and Cannon Beach, Ore.

"He's done a great job of planning for us," he said. "He's a very objective, honest person."

The city hasn't advertised for Rogers' replacement yet and is not close to soliciting for applicants, City Manager Judie Zimomra said.

Administrative Services Manager Jim Isom is currently conducting a job audit of the position to determine what duties

ing the intent of a handful of charter amendments on the March 1 ballot clearer to residents.

Voters on Sanibel will soon find a orm letter from the city in their mailboxes that will attempt to dissect the five "people's choice" amendments to the City Charter that will appear on the ballot next month.

Brought forth by Vice Mayor Dick Walsh and other members of the community, the proposals address building heights, development density, the

amount of vegetation removal and impermeable surface coverage allowable in development projects, alterations to the city's primary roadways and term lengths for planning commission mem-

If approved, the charter would be amended to permit changes to those elements only through voter referendum.

Walsh said that the intent of the proposals is to allow voters, rather than a majority on council, the power to decide key issues that affect all residents.

Changes to development density, for

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Council continues EAR review to next meeting

By the time they got to the Evaluation and Appraisal Report of the Sanibel Plan on Tuesday, city councilmembers quickly realized that additional public hearings would be necessary before signing-off on the document.

After conducting city business in the morning, followed by a closed-door executive session and then a lengthy public hearing concerning the Sanibel Causeway litigation, council quickly realized they weren't going to get through the 55-page summary before the sun set on the day — or maybe not even before dawn.

For that reason, council voted unanimously to discuss only a portion of the document this week, with the idea of picking-up where they left off the next time around. Thus, a third public hearing will be held at 10:30 a.m. on Tuesday, Feb. 15 at MacKenzie Hall.

"Planning (Commission) had 14 meetings on this and we're going to approve it in two?" Councilman Steve Brown asked as council debated how quickly they should complete the process.

Governing bodies are required by state law to conduct a minimum of two public hearings to consider EARs. But there is no provision to prevent them from conducting as many public hearings as necessary to iron-out the document before transmittal to the Department of Community Affairs. Council must approve the document and deliver it to Ken Pfalzer, Sanibel's acting planning director, prior to the May 1 deadline imposed by DCA.

Council began with the question of high-rise development, and started on the ground floor by trying to find answers to elementary questions such as what constitutes a "story."

"No, really, I want to know," Mayor Marty Harrity asked Pfalzer. "I'm not being facetious."

Pfalzer replied that a story equals the distance between the floor and ceiling of a structure. He said that he was not aware of any definitive measurement.

In considering the number of dwelling units that can be rebuilt following natural disaster, Pfalzer said it "wasn't clear" what could be built back in excess of allowable density. The EAR says that rebuilt structures which exceed permitted density must be scaled-back to reduce

Forty-two hundred multi-family dwelling units exist on Sanibel, Pfalzer said, twice the amount of allowable density

"I like to think there is room to accommodate existing density but it's not a slam-dunk," he said.

Council also deliberated ways to reduce water consumption, and Councilwoman Judy Workman suggested adopting regulations put in place by the South Florida Water Management District.

"The amount of water people are using is incredible," Vice Mayor Dick Walsh said.

Island resident Hazel Schuller said that the shared-use master plan is insufficient as presented in the EAR because it fails to address the allowable number of beach chairs that resorts are allowed to set up on Sanibel's beaches. Walsh replied that the problem is determining how to police it.

"Our ordinances become looser and looser," Schuller

Jennings defiant under pressure

Councilman Jim Jennings was a frequent target for criticism at Tuesday's council meeting despite a packed agenda that included Sanibel's lawsuit against Lee County and the second public hearing of the city's proposed tweaks to the Evaluation and Appraisal Report of the Sanibel Plan.

Jennings, who was recently found guilty of 56 counts of election violations by the Florida Elections Commission, adamantly denied the findings throughout the marathon session as fellow councilmembers and city residents took turns lambasting him for compromising the city's election process.

Resident Marie Gargano referenced the historic elections in Iraq this week as an example of how important a "clean" process is, and how people have fought and died for the right to cast their votes.

"Clean elections in the state, in the country and in the world are something we all hold dear," she said.

Jennings, who repeatedly denied the allegations while pointing out that the commission's final report is due Feb. 15, said that the Florida Ethics Commission, a separate-overseeing body, had determined there was no probable cause to believe that the councilman, who defeated Nola Theiss to secure his seat two years ago, had violated the code of ethics for public officers.

The ethics commission, who probed allegations that Jennings had solicited and accepted gifts from people who lobbied council and failed to file his gift disclosure form in a timely manner, dismissed all charges against him following their probable cause hearing.

Jennings invited his detractors to present proof of his alleged violations rather than engage in name calling and finger pointing.

"The Elections Commission findings are not final," he said. "What is stated in a hearing in November isn't always stated in a final order."

Not everyone who spoke on the matter criticized Jennings, however.

Resident Steve Smith said that some of the people "conducting this witch hunt" are the same people who began the process of investigating Jennings.

"To me, false accusations, character assassination and innuendos destroy the character of the community more than any bridge," he said.

Council considered two resolutions directly connected to the allegations against Jennings, voting 5-0 to support non-partisan elections as per section 5.02 of the city charter and tabling another by a 3-2 vote that calls for censure on the part of council toward any elected official who fails to obey the city's election laws.

"While it's true that we don't have the right to remove or fine, we want the public to understand that we, as a council, don't accept or condone that type of activity," Vice Mayor Dick Walsh said.

"You defrauded the electorate in this community," Councilwoman Judy Workman told Jennings in a scathing appraisal. "It has never happened in the past and we don't want it to happen in the future.

"If it does continue, someone is going to speak out on it. It's not going to be swept under the rug."

Workman's volley also included Mayor Marty Harrity, who accepted a \$500 contribution from off-island sources when he ran for council. Workman lobbied for limiting donations in city elections to on-island sources as a discussion item, but City Attorney Ken Cuyler said there was no provision in state law prohibiting such prac-

"Maybe to some people \$500 makes an impact, but not to me," Harrity said.

While council unanimously decided to back the idea of enforcing the charter to ensure non-partisan elections, they couldn't decide on the matter of censuring councilmembers found guilty of violating election laws. They voted 3-2 to consider the matter at a later time, with Workman and Walsh dissenting.

Louise Johnson, a former mayor, told Jennings from

should be required of applicants, she said. Part of the audit is contact with neighboring cities to find out what the position of planning director entails in those communities, Zimomra added.

Since Rogers held the position for 27 years, conditions may have changed and other responsibilities may have to be identified, she said.

Phyllis Bogen, who served on the commission for six years, said Rogers' eventual replacement should demonstrate a "strong commitment" to preserving Sanibel's character as a sanctuary island where residents can enjoy greenspace and wildlife unencroached by the spectre of development.

"Somebody who understands Sanibel," she said. "To bring in someone from the outside would make for a longer transition."

Nola Theiss, a former city mayor, took the opposite stance when asked what qualities the city should seek

out in its new planning director.

"They have to be committed to the plan — we don't want them to be so ingrained in the community that they go to one side," she said of potential applicants. "It's crucial that they stand taller than any special interest


Klaudt, now a resident of Fort Myers, said he has watched Rogers' work closely and expressed optimism that the city will continue along the path that Rogers helped blaze.

"The city has done very well since I left, and I have the utmost confidence that it will continue to do so," he said.

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

The high rises are coming! The high rises are coming! Or maybe not.

I have been following quite closely the present debate around the issue of the March 1 vote on Sanibel Charter amendments. I must confess I find myself both troubled, confused and somewhat amused at the case being made by supporters of the amendments. It would seem, on the face of them, that voting for the amendments would be the prudent, logical and timely thing to do. After all, how could anyone argue with the premise that protecting Sanibel from "high rises, over development and County road widening schemes" is the right thing to do? They make it sound so obvious, so democratic, so easy. Just say

In the first place, I am confused by the case being made for the necessity of the amendments. Every single candidate for Council office is running on a platform of avidly protecting the character, scale and small town qualities of Sanibel. Where did all this angst about political deceptions, dark plots and "sky is falling" predictions that Sanibel is but one vote away from becoming Marco Island come from? If I ever saw a town that had a firm grip on controlling growth, this is the place.

It is somewhat amusing that the amendment proponents are telling Sanibel voters, in effect, you can't be trusted to vote for candidates that will protect the island's vision (you voters are not smart enough to see through their political plots) but you can trust us, the true believers in Sanibel, that we know best. Just vote for our amendments.

More importantly, I am deeply troubled that they are not telling the whole story and fabricating significant "facts" about what can and cannot happen in the form of land development on Sanibel. Their central premise is that "only three votes on the Council" are needed to usurp the Master Plan and Zoning Code and turn the island over to greedy developers who will promptly blanket us in towering high rises. To bolster their case, they remind us that only 35 years ago, County planners proposed a land use plan that would allow 90,000 residents on the island. Thus we must take that power away from government with these amendments. But they omit one little detail. The Sanibel Council can not change the Master Plan without approval of the State Department of Community

Affairs. Chapter 163 of the Florida Statutes gives the State Planning Agency the power to veto local plan amendments that are not consistent with Regional and State growth policies.

Guess what? Since the 1986 adoption of the Local Government Comprehensive Planning Act, and in the wake of Hurricane Andrew's devastation of South Florida, Regional Planning Councils and the State have declared vulnerable coastal areas and in particular, barrier islands like Sanibel, to be Coastal High Hazard Areas. Rule 9J-5, the administrative code for evaluating Comprehensive Plan consistency with State Growth Policies, prohibits density increases in such High Hazard Areas.

In other words, the master planned population holding capacity of the island today is what it will remain. What you see is what you get. If you think I'm kidding, take a trip to Tallahassee and try to talk DCA into even a tiny increase in density. Be sure to call me and tell me what they said.

After the worst year in Florida's history for hurricane destruction measured in the billions of dollars and many lives, the pressure today to expand and further tighten such limits on growth is overwhelming. The county planner's onceupon-a-time dream of high-rising. Sanibel is consigned to the dust bin along with draining the Everglades and bulldozing mangroves on the Caloosahatchee. This fact alone should make voters ask what is really going on here? Changing the charter to stop something that can't happen is not only dubious, it is reckless.

As for the amendments on limiting lot coverage increases or height increases, they are directly tied to the issue of density increases. Density drives everything. No density increases, no high rises and no wall-to-wall paving of lots with massive parking garages. Their scare tactics quickly unravel as so many hyped fantasies.

The other thing I find fascinating is the fear that Periwinkle Way will be widened. To what? Four lanes? Consider that everywhere the bike path crowds up the edge of the road such as at Casa Ybel Road, across from Hallmark Cards and in front of the Bookshop or several other places, the existing road right of way is barely wide enough for the existing road and bike path. To widen it the county would have to be prepared to buy not

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The truly upsetting thing that amendment proponents do not tell voters is that many applications made by homeowners on the island for hardship relief to build a pool, add a bedroom addition or any slight increase in lot coverage would require a referendum for final approval. A property owner could have a legitimate hardship and get approval from city staff, boards and the commission but still get turned down at the polls. Unfortunately, voters that do not understand an issue or see the relevance to their own concerns usually just say "no." Lose a referendum vote and you can kiss your bedroom addition goodbye, even if the law says you deserve it. Unless of course, after spending \$5,000 dollars to get your appeal on the ballot, you then mount a months long campaign to "educate the voters" about your addition at significant additional time and expense, you might, just might win the vote. This is not protecting Sanibel. This is an invitation to a small group of people to meddle in your property rights and second-guess elected officials and professionals. Bad idea.

To compound the problem, many homes and business structures on Sanibel were built decades ago and no longer conform to the current code — making them "legal non-conforming structures." It has been estimated that as many as 50 percent of the island properties have this non-conformity. Just imagine trying to rebuild after a disaster or a fire and seeking approval only to replace what you had? It's back to the voters. Good luck!

So, is there anything good on the amendment ballot? I really don't have a problem with limiting building heights. High-rises should never happen here. But the proposed "no increase in height" limit is shortsighted and much too constraining. Many older buildings were built with low ceiling heights that today feel cramped and out of date. Some new facilities like a gym or a ball-room could require a small adjustment in added height. New architectural designs that avoid the boxy, flat-topped styles of the 1960s and use high pitched roofs that have better storm wind resistance and more appealing roof lines would be stopped. Why? To protect our way of life? Hardly. This amendment, too, needs a lot more thought.

In my judgment, this rush to amend the charter is unnecessary, poorly thought through, fraught with unintended penalties on small businesses, homeowners and good design, and should be ditched, like the county planner's grandiose plans of 1970. Just vote no.

Dear Sanibel Council,

Discussion of tolls, bridges and settlements need to include a discussion of the County's possible role in changing the very nature of "the Sanibel we know and love today" and the fiscal future of Sanibel.

Please look at Lee County's \$30,285,000 Bond issue proposal. This is an interesting document, containing several pages relevant to the current toll issues and the future of Sanibel.

Attached are these bond pages for your review:

- Page A-27 Direct your attention to the 100 percent increase in toll revenue between 2004 and 2005; \$6,300,000 increasing to \$13,500,000. This is a 100 percent increase. Please notice the significant toll monies earned in future years, ending with \$20,600,000 in 2035.
- Page A-26 Direct your attention to the 46 percent increase in traffic to Sanibel projected over the life of the bond issue.
- Page A-6 Direct your attention to the phrase "a new emphasis on public transportation will reduce gridlock during the tourist season".

Several comments and questions are appropriate for this Council to consider in their deliberations with the county:

Sanibel has over 30 percent the beaches in Lee County. The county advertises and promotes the island beaches in their tourism promotions. The county plans over-passes along Summerlin to deliver more traffic, faster and easier, to the beaches of Fort Myers and Sanibel. The new causeway bridges add to this scenario of more cars and more people. Is it a given that "progress that is inevitable" and more traffic is perceived as good for business? Do you believe that?

Do the residents of Sanibel have the right and obligation to ask and expect answers from our elected representatives for the following?

1. What do we want Sanibel to look like in the future? Is "Sanibel as it is Today" in jeopardy?

- 2. What island natural systems are in jeopardy as this increase in people and cars happens?
- 3. What plans are contemplated or in place to protect the island's natural resources from this increase in people and traffic?
- 4. What are we residents being asked to sacrifice in what is termed "quality of life"?
- 5. Will the ambiance and economic niche that Sanibel businesses enjoy today be sacrificed?
- 6. Who benefits from this pressure placed on the island and its residents?

- 5. Do you plan to first explain to Sanibel residents the effect on our tax rate of any proposed settlement with Lee County? If not, why not?


Thank you for your time and efforts on our behalf. I and any others will attend your next Council meeting to hear the answers to our questions.

To the Editor:

In your January 27 edition, Mr. Tom Gilhooley, President of COTI, explains his support for the charter amendments being presented to the voters of Sanibel on March 1. We would like to address some of the issues raised in that letter.

First, we would like to note that these amendments were not developed with public participation. There was no opportunity for the Planning Department professionals, the city attorney, neighborhood associations, or anyone else to have input to these proposed changes in the City Charter. These documents were written by six (or seven) private individuals and their private legal counsel. This does not reflect the Sanibel Way or good government.

The Sanibel Good Government Coalition has therefore asked experienced city planners and legal experts to assist in the review of these amendments. We support appropriate efforts to protect Sanibel and maintain its tradition of controlled change that keeps humans and nature in harmony. However, upon review it is apparent that the amendments as written create legitimate concern that they could have unforeseen consequences for the residents of Sanibel. In today's litigious environment, it is important to be sure that laws do not create more problems than they solve. The risks are great: property values, property rights and the financial security of the city. Furthermore, we fail to see the need to rush to judgment. Current local and state laws provide adequate protection from increased densities and high rises. The City Council cannot make any changes to the Comprehensive Plan without state approval. Even COTI admits that they know of no plans to increase densities or develop high rises. Why does COTI want us to rush to an uninformed decision to solve a problem that doesn't exist?

There is concern when referenda become the process of government. Referenda are often driven by special interests, subjected to "spin," and do not receive the learned debate and public input of the traditional legislative process. Mr. Gilhooley states that this is not "government by referen-

dum." Well, with nine complex ballot initiatives that impact regulations, property rights and could result in significant potential litigation, that is very much Government by Referendum. We would be better served by the traditional governmental process.

The second misconception is the idea that a "single vote" of a City Council member can change everything on Sanibel. This is a scare tactic that is very disingenuous. As noted above, state law (Chapter 163 Rule 9J-5) prevents any changes to the Comprehensive Plan without state approval. Furthermore, Sanibel is in a coastal high hazard area and as such no increase in density would be allowed by the state. Again, there is no reason to rush to solve a problem that doesn't exist.

The height, impermeable area, and density charter amendments are all very complex issues that raise more questions than they resolve. It is apparent that there are many confusing issues that can be interpreted differently than COTI's advertised opinions. There are many questions: are referenda needed for variances? is a fire a natural hazard? how high is a "floor"? or "could" improvements in the bike paths along Periwinkle be prevented? The fact is that neither Mr. Gilhooley nor the writer has the final answer. The courts will be deciding the answers. This leads to uncertainty and long delays in real estate transactions. Ultimately, this can cause declining property values and prevent needed renewal and rebuilding.

Then there is Amendment No. 1. This is COTI Director Andrew Reding's personal initiative calling for more referenda on the causeway. It would require the City to have a referendum every time there is any issue regarding the causeway. And the City Council would have no authority to reach a resolution without exhaustive and financially disastrous litigation. It is conceivable that it could even prevent

settlement of the current litigation.

We trust that Mr. Gilhooley and the six (or seven) drafters of these amendments are well intentioned. We also do not believe that because someone earns their living on Sanibel as a Realtor, contractor, or business owner, that they do not care about the character and lifestyle of the island. In fact I have not met a person who lives on Sanibel that would support high-rises or increased density. We need to trust that the current City Council members and Planning Commission members, just like those before them, will protect the interest of those of us who are fortunate enough to live on this beautiful piece of creation. Read the Amendments; trust your neighbors and join together for what is best for Sanibel. The real detriment to the character of Sanibel is the loss of trust and respect.



The four story height limitation on Sanibel is a myth. It can be changed by a development-friendly Planning Commission and a development-friendly City Council.

It is generally believed that this land trust scheme goes back to the bad old days when Florida politicians and developers worked together for mutual enrichment. It is modeled after the Illinois Land Trust concept.

What you can do

You can get together a group of friends and form a land trust. See www.warda. net/LTSC.html for details on a firm that specializes in helping you get started. The potential dollar gain is enormous.

If you find this type of profiteering offensive, you can vote to make sure it never happens. The upcoming election has candidates that say "trust me, I would never let that happen," and there are those who will make sure it never really would

happen. Those who will truly protect Sanibel are Carla Johnston, Tom Rothman and Mick Denham.

To the Editor

As did all other Sanibel residents, I received a letter last week from a political action committee known as SGGC. It says that "The Sanibel community has an opportunity to once again, as they did in the election two years ago, send another strong message to the 'special interest activists' (etc)." My only "special interest" is to keep Sanibel the way I found it.

Referring to the Peoples' Choice amendments, they say "It totally eliminates the ability of Sanibel citizens and all of our property owners to appeal directly to our elected officials." They certainly didn't do their homework there. Under the three proposed amendments dealing with limiting building height, limiting the number of dwelling units on each parcel of land, and limiting how much non-vegetative structure can cover property, appeals for variances don't change from what they are right now. Sanibel has been a paradise for Gillian and me since we chose to retire here. As we have learned the history of Sanibel's incorporation as a city to resist Lee County's grandiose development plans, we give thanks for those who established our city charter and gave the residents of Sanibel control of our island. We see the later development of the Sanibel Plan to control building height, density and footprint as a work of great foresight that has helped create this island jewel on the SW Florida coast.

For over 40 years there has been a planning commission and a city council that have honored the Sanibel Plan and made decisions based on its building code rules. Yes, Sanibel has grown, business has prospered, tourists in season are overfilling the streets, but we recognize that adherence to the Sanibel Plan has preserved this island's charm.



Sanibel has become Sanibel because of the forethought of leaders three decades ago who had a vision for the community and introduced stringent local zoning laws that work. This process has worked for decades and attracted like-minded people to live here. Anyone who has built or modified a building on the island knows that the codes are tough and fair. industry and as a heavily-advertised tourist destination through the Visitor and Convention Bureau. He also said that the working relationship between Zimomra and Stilwell could eventually lead to costsharing between the city and county for road maintenance.







GARDENING

Mature white bird of paradise can't be cut in half

Dear Ron: I have a white bird of paradise that is about 25 feet tall now. My question is: Can I cut it down to about 10 feet without harming the plant? The previous owner didn't really take good care of it and it only has a few leaves at the very top and a very unwieldy trunk — it's not very attractive at all. I'd like to keep it but I'd like to keep it smaller and fuller.

— Elizabeth Garrett, Estero

Dear Elizabeth: At 25 feet, your white bird of paradise (Strelitzia nicolai) has exceeded the typical mature height of 20 feet. As a herbaceous plant, it is related to the banana and the travelers tree, it cannot be cut back without disfigurement and likely harm to its health.

I think you have two choices: 1) remove the plant; or 2) wait until March, feed it with palm fertilizer, allow it to grow out, transplant a pup from the base, and discard the mother plant.

By the way, both the white bird of paradise and the orange bird of paradise (Strelitzia reginae) are natives of South Africa and were introduced to the New World in the 1770s when they were discovered in the Cape of Good Hope by explorers sent by King George III of England.

The king named the orange bird of paradise "reginae," or queen, in honor of Queen Charlotte, and the white bird of paradise "nicolai," in honor of Czar Nicholas I of Russia.

The white bird of paradise has long green leaves that may reach nine to 12 inches in width. It produces flowers that are white with a blue tongue and emerge from a reddish bract, and may be up to a foot wide and tall.

Birds of paradise are adaptable to hardiness zones 9B-11 and are not salt-tolerant.

Here are some care tips for gardenias

Dear Ron: I have a gardenia plant that has grown quite large. When and how do I trim it, and how should I care for it?

Dear Richard: Where do you have the gardenia plant-

For best growth, it needs full sun most of the day to promote blooming and light shade during the rest of the day to keep the leaves green. It should be fed with a quality palm fertilizer, applied every other month from March to

October, because the leaves of gardenias quickly turn yellow without adequate nutrition.

You can trim your gardenia — but by no more than one-quarter — after the threat of frost has passed (around the first of March), again after flowering has ended in May, and then in late summer or early fall. Keep the ground mulched to minimize water loss and maintain a stable soil temperature.

The gardenia (Gardenia jasminoides) is adaptable to all Florida hardiness zones, is native to China, and has low salt tolerance.

Surinam cherries are category 1 invasive exotics

Dear Ron: I want to plant some Surinam cherries in front of my house. How should I plant them and maintain them?

John Walker, South Fort Myers

Dear John: First, I need to point out that the Surinam cherry is considered a category I invasive exotic by the Florida Exotic Pest Plant Council. Such plants are defined as "altering native plant communities by displacing native species, changing community structures or ecological functions, or hybridizing with natives."

That said, here are some general guidelines for planting and maintaining fruiting shrubs used as hedges.

Place the plants three feet on center. The planting hole should be twice as

wide, but no deeper than the shrub from its soil surface to the bottom of the con-

Enrich the soil with liberal amounts of peat moss and composted cow manure, set the plant, then water it in thoroughly, adjusting the plant as you go so that its soil surface is level with the ground in your garden.

Mulch the ground and water the plants daily for a week, then four times a week for two weeks, then once a week after that. Fertilize the area spring, summer and fall with a quality palm fertilizer, at which times you can lightly trim the plants into hedge form.

The Surinam cherry (Eugenia uniflora) is native to Brazil, grows in zones 9B-11,

and is not salt-tolerant.

Tuesday, March 1

Opening the season will be the Musicians from Marlboro, a touring extension of the famous Vermont Marlboro Festival. More than 25 artists travel each year representing the festival with concerts throughout the country. Many of today's leading solo and chamber music artists to American audiences including Yo-Yo Ma, Jaime Laredo, Murray Perahia, Paula Robison and Harold Wright had their careers launched in this series as well as artists now heard in the Emerson, Juilliard, and Tokyo quartets. Master cellist Marcy Rosen performs at the Sanibel Music Festival with Min-Young Kim, violin; Joseph Lin, violin; Harumi Rhodes, violin; Michi Wiancko, violin; Hung-Wei Huang, viola; Richard O'Neill, viola, and Clancy Newman, cello.

The focus of the Musicians from Marlboro is to present chamber music of rarely-heard works and masterpieces of varied instrumentation. He was immediately re-invited to perform the Tchaikovsky Concerto with the Symphony in October of that same year. Now 24, Weiss has established himself as an extraordinary young talent who exhibits maturity, depth, and remarkable technical skills. "Every so often, a talent comes along that is so natural, genuine and exciting you can hardly believe your ears," said the Cincinnati Enquirer about Weiss.

In addition to his solo work, Weiss has developed a keen interest in chamber music repertoire. In June 2003, he attended the Amelia Island Chamber Music Festival on a fellowship and performed



the lectern that no Sanibel candidate had ever run on a political platform before.

"I don't recall using the word 'Republican'," he responded. "If I'm incorrect, show me."

Also speaking from the lectern, resident John Carney responded to Jennings' call for proof, insisting that Jennings had billed himself as the "Republican candidate" on signage displayed at polling sites during the 2003 city elections. Carney said he could produce literature from Jennings' election campaign as proof of the


infraction. A partisan election, Carney said, "discourages harmony and encourages divisiveness." Workman agreed.

We should have taken action two years ago but we neglected to," she said.

Even discussion of other city matters afforded Jennings little measure of relief.

When resident Peter Pappas addressed council regarding the proposed settlement with the county over the Sanibel Causeway litigation, he took a poke at Jennings' purported infractions, saying that the county no longer viewed Sanibel as a viable community, partly as a result of the controversy surrounding Jennings. City residents are also jaded, he said, partly due to the charges against him.

"Many of our own citizens have lost confidence in our council," he said.





City Council

A shopping destination for daytrippers, either now or in the future or when the areas of San Carlos Boulevardie and Miner's Corner are further built up, is not in Sanibel's interest if public policy prevails.

Summing up discussion of commercial growth on the islands at a special meeting last Friday, Mayor Fred Valtin said: "I gather there is concurrence that we wish to reaffirm previous public policy that Sanibel not become a destination shopping area and to the extent that we legally, feasibly and practically can do so, that we come to grips with this (policy)."

10 years ago February 3, 1995 Causeway tolls reveal tourism stats

The Sanibel tolls are the true measure of tourism in Lee County, according to Lee County toll director, Carol Goldwasser as she broke down the monetary figures as to who paid the full three bucks and who purchased the discount stickers to enjoy the sand, surf, and sun of

Sanibel.

According to Goldwasser, 1,311,004 drivers paid the full \$3 round trip toll. The figure represents 40.8 percent of the total traffic crossing the causeway in 1994.

traffic crossing the causeway in 1994.

"That adds up to nearly \$6 million in revenues for Lee County," Goldwasser said.

According to Goldwasser, the number of people who paid the \$3 toll is down slightly from the previous two years that posted 1,315,307 in 1993 and 1,282,963 in 1992.

However, the decrease does not show the total number of cars that have passed through the causeway gates. "3,209,764 vehicles passed over the causeway in 1994 and that is an increase of 1.3 percent over 1993 which shows that 3,169,915 vehicles passed over the causeway," Goldwasser said.

Visitors and residents alike are entitled to purchase the six-month stickers at \$15 and annual stickers at \$25 which allows for those to pass through the tolls with only a 50 cent fee.

"Typically, visitors don't pay for the stickers, so the number of people who paid for the \$3 toll is a good indicator of tourism traffic,' Goldwasser added.

5 years ago February 3, 2000 Stormy skies at Council

More than 60 people gathered in MacKenzie Hall Tuesday for the second reading and public hearing on the controversial "Dark Skies" ordinance. After more than seven and a half hours of intense debate, often turning caustic toward the end of the afternoon, the council voted 4-1 with Councilmember Steve Brown dissenting, to continue the discussion at a future date.

Much of the morning discussion centered on clarifying details of the proposed ordinance, as questions regarding bulbs, dock lighting, holiday decorations, security, and the turtle lighting ordinance emerged once again. Councilmember Andrew Reding, sponsor of the proposed ordinance, reiterated that the "Dark Skies" ordinance does not change existing dock, holiday, or turtle lighting ordinance language, and that the Sanibel Factory stores had recently changed their parking lot lighting to full cut-off fixtures at the request of the shopping center's security. Reding also gave a brief presentation depicting "the good, the bad, and the ugly" in outdoor lighting in Sanibel, citing some locations, such as Sun Trust Bank and Colonial Bank as examples of good, aesthetically pleasing, full cut-off lighting.

example, can be enacted through a super majority vote of four councilmembers.

"Four people can change it and I think it needs to be protected," Councilwoman Judy Workman said.

The action came at the request of Sanibel resident Armand Ball, who suggested City Attorney Ken Cuyler draft a letter explaining the consequences of implementing them. Council voted 4-1 Tuesday to direct Cuyler to do so, with Councilman Jim Jennings voting no.

"Certain items on here are confusing people," Ball said. "The city attorney could put in simple language what would be the effect of those items."

Councilmember Steve Brown hesitated to endorse the suggestion, saying such a letter might be misconstrued by voters.

"A mailing from the city might be interpreted as the city giving support to the referenda" he said.

the referenda," he said.

Mayor Marty Harrity suggested including a disclaimer on the form letter, informing voters that it should not be seen as an endorsement by the city of the proposals. Cuyler said he would submit a draft letter for council approval during the public hearing scheduled for 9 a.m. on Tuesday, Feb. 15 at MacKenzie Hall.

City Manager Judie Zimomra said the letter should educate the public but not take a position on the matter. The city has done this type of mailing before, she pointed out, mentioning the referendum on the purchase of Pond Apple Park in November 2001 as an example.

Mayor Marty Harrity said discussion is required before making changes to the city's Land Development Code. But resident Barbara Cooley responded that council acted to cut off debate when it voted 3-2 not to include the amendments on the March 1 ballot. Walsh and his coauthors had to circulate petitions throughout the community in order to get them on it, she said.

"I am not concerned about a lack of debate," said Walsh, who is not seeking re-election. "I think we'll have debate coming out of our ears, which is wonderful."

Sanibel resident David Berger said that most people in the community don't know what the amendments are and don't want to take the time to read them to find out.

"Yes it's on the Internet and looks lovely on the (city) Web page, but then you have to get a magnifying glass to read it," Ball said.

Megan Stockberger, also a first time visitor to Sanibel, arrived at CROW recently and will be working and learning about wildlife for a month. Megan grew up in Sullivan, Indiana and graduated last May from Oakland City University in Oakland City, Indiana with a major in biology. She has been exploring masters programs in animal behavior, and felt an experience at CROW might help her make some decisions in this area of study. Megan loves animals and is excited about learning at CROW with Dr. PJ Deitschel and Dr. Amber McNamara, who also grew up in Indiana.

During 2004, CROW had 42 students visit, work and learn for periods of time ranging from four weeks to one year. They represented 34 different educational institutions, including Ireland, Scotland and Peru. The challenges are many in treating the ever-growing wildlife patient load at CROW and the students are an integral part of caring for CROW's 3,500 patients each year.



REDstart fingerlings arrive at Marine Lab


An excited crowd of volunteers and staff welcomed the arrival of between 5,000 and 7,000 redfish fingerlings at the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation's Marine Laboratory.

The fingerlings are part of the lab's REDstart habitat study, a project that surveys redfish habitats to determine optimum environments for the species. When they have grown to a suitable size, the juveniles will be tagged and released into


Pine Island Sound.

Florida Fish and Wildlife transported the fingerlings to the lab from a state-run hatchery in Port Manatee. On their arrival, the fish were acclimated to water conditions in the vats where they will live by gradually replacing the water in the travel containers with water from the project system.

Once the juveniles adjusted to temperature and salinity conditions, the volunteers moved them to their new home using what Florida Sea Grant Marine Agent Bob Wasno called with a smile, "a high-tech system:" a bucket brigade.





Hirst, there was Hurricane Charley. Now, chaos strikes Hagain. This time in the form of proposed amendments that are presented in a less than orderly, muddled kind of way.

Proposed Charter Amediannents 4, 5 and 6 focusing on building density, height and land coverage could require that, in the event a non-conforming building is damaged more than 50 percent, rebuilding will be put to a public vote. What would happen if people voted against your wishes to rebuild? How woould your home or business be affected? What are your property rights?

- Did you know that more than 70 percent of the homes and condos on Sanibel Island don't conform to Code? That virtually ALL homes built before 1979 are nonconforming?
- The amendments would take away governing responsibilities from city council and do away with public hearings.
- Waiting for costly special elections would make rebuilding a time-consuming chore.

These amendments do not provide for an orderly build-back after an emergency, so your property could lie in disrepair - unusable - for who knows how long and at what cost. A real rat's nest.

Now, proponents of these amendments and others from Camp Chaos will tell you that the change will protect our island from over-development or high-rises. Not so. That's just a scare tactic. Sanibel Island is already 90 percent built out, and present laws and zoning will not permit high-rises or over-development.

As it stands now, our city council, through staff recommendations and public-hearings, votes on rebuilding procedures that are required to conform to all flood zone and building requirements.

Let's stick to what works to maintain our fabulous Island lifestyle.

Read the amendments very carefully, if you can actually make it through the mumbo-jumbo. Do it today.
