

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

# County won't reconsider left turn to Punta Rassa

Council tells DOT rep not to come to meeting By EMILIE ALFINO

Paul Wingard, Deputy Director of the Lee County Department of Transportation, intended to go to city council's Aug. 15 meeting to discuss the county's determination not to put a left-hand turn into Punta Rassa. But Councilman Tom Rothman suggested taking that item off the agenda.

"Wingard's position is very clear," Rothman

Wingard outlined the county's final determination about the left-hand turn into Punta Rassa in an Aug. 8 e-mail to city officials.

"We do not intend to change the current design plans, which will eliminate the left-turn movement into Punta Rassa when traveling in the eastbound direction, or exiting from Sanibel," Wingard wrote.

I find this disappointing," Councilman Steve Brown said. "It's going to make life very difficult for our fishing guides and many

According to Wingard, the primary reason for elimination of the left turn was to ease the flow of through traffic at the toll plaza and the traffic light, according to Wingard.

While we do not disagree that some individuals will be inconvenienced, the benefit for the majority of drivers passing through this intersection far outweighs that inconvenience,' Wingard's memo said.

The county's study of the traffic in the area showed that the number of vehicles making the left-hand turn into Punta Rassa was relatively small in comparison to the number of vehicles

passing through the intersection.

"Furthermore, to make changes to the design at this point would require us to revise the permits for the project," Wingard wrote, "and thus have the potential to delay the project considerably.

"I don't believe a lot of consideration was given to [fishing guides and boaters] when this decision was made," Brown said. "The county expects them to go further along McGregor and make a U-turn. he problem is that it's going to be very difficult to make that kind of big U-


# City honors City Engineer Garcia

#### Fresh water - how much is too much?

#### To the editor:

In the months after the Army Corps began releasing large amounts of water into the Caloosahatchee, the ecosystem of the waters in Southwest Florida have been drastically changed.

The nutrients found in this water have greatly impacted the water quality. Recently, five different kinds of algae blooms have appeared in the Caloosahatchee estuary. This not only has an effect on the fish and wildlife that inhabit these waters, it also hurts those who are interested in fishing or who make a living from the tourism industry.

The Army Corps' current Tentatively Selected Plan, or TSP, is going to continue to severely damage the fragile ecosystem of the Caloosahatchee Estuary. In order to alleviate the estuary and inhibit the amount of damage done to this waterway, the Army Corps TSP must be altered to recognize the considerable damage that has already been done to the estuary.

The Army Corps biologists have recommended an amount of water that can be released from Lake Okeechobee and still maintain healthy waterways.

However, the TSP for 2007-2010 will release polluted water into the Caloosahatchee at a greater rate than suggested by these biologists.

In order to ensure that these measures are followed, and to allow for increased oversight of the water releases, the language of the proposed schedule should prohibit any water releases greater than the amount proposed by biologists.

The release schedule followed by the Army Corps should reflect the most current data and their biologists' recommended release amount. There are opportunities to relieve the stress that the Caloosahatchee River and the estuary are currently experiencing due to water releases. The South Florida Water Management District currently owns or leases 450,000 acres of land that could possibly be used for water storage.

In addition, the TSP does not propose managing water levels through small, multi-directional water releases. Utilizing both the land for emergency water storage and alternate methods of water release will take the burden off of the Caloosahatchee and its already fragile estuary.

The Caloosahatchee River and the estuary must be protected. The local economy is reliant on these waters through both the tourism industry and the fishing industry. We cannot afford

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# Looking back: two years after Hurricane Charley

Only two years after the devastation of Hurricane Charley, the City of Sanibel is

"Recovery is nearly complete, we are just about 100 percent. It is important to understand that recovery is not an event, it is a process that takes time and commitment," Ava Hinojosa, Director of Operations for the Sanibel-Captiva Islands Chamber of Commerce explained. "Sanibel is very fortunate to have a community that has come together and has offered a variety of resources to help overcome our challenges.'

On Friday Aug. 13, 2004 Hurricane Charley made landfall on Sanibel and Captiva. The category four storm brought with it savage winds over 138 miles per

Hinojosa, who remained on the island with her husband and family, felt the intensity of the hurricane. "My mom and niece Jamie were visiting from California and experiencing Hurricane Charley with the howling winds and the sound of trees and pool cages falling was eerie for us. At one point I thought our roof was going to peel


Hinojosa and her family were fortunate not to suffer as much damage as others. She said, "We ended up faring well compared to most, but did have some damage and part of our roof was compromised."

Two years later, Hinojosa looks on the bright side. "The storm forced our accommodation industry as well as some restaurants to refurbish and remodel their tired structures and many are looking better than ever," she explained. "With this and the addition to the new tree plantings along Periwinkle Way and Dunlop Road, yes, the vitality of the city is back.'

Fire Department Chief Rich Dickerson feels good about the island's recovery from the catastrophic event. "Hats off to the City of Sanibel. I think it went pretty well considering. We've obviously been determined and bounced back.

While the many businesses and homes on the island are doing well two years later, Saint Isabel's Catholic Church on San-Cap Road is struggling to heal from the disastrous blows of Charley. Reverend Christopher Senk explained, "A large portion of the roof was blown off and it caused a failure of all of the inside-pews, floors, walls. We've had to re-do the entire worship space as well as the entire office space."

For Senk and members of his congregation, the battle to re-build has been difficult. 'After Charley we thought after a year we would have the construction behind us,' Senk said. "We are looking forward and filled with hope for the day we can have

Due to construction the church's space is limited. "So much of our social life came to a screeching halt," Senk explained.

Saint Isabel's looks to move into the rebuilt church space shortly after the new

The effect of the hurricane is not limited to the island. Hinojosa explained, "To this day, we still get calls at the Chamber's

Visitor Center from potential visitors asking if the island is open. There is so much misinformation circulating on a global basis which impacts the economy of our island community. One goal for the Chamber is to combat this negative press and invite guests to come see and enjoy the beauty that our island sanctuary offers.'

turn with their trucks and trailers."

The county is investigating whether it can make some improvements to one of the median openings east of the current Punta Rassa turn, before the traffic signal at Shell Point.

"We do believe this is feasible," Wingard wrote. "However, we do not intend to go any further with this option until the project is complete."

Brown called for the city attorney to draft a resolution stating Sanibel City Council's displeasure.

Brown said such a resolution would support the citizens and professionals on Sanibel who are going to be inconve-

"I don't know what good it will do except show our support," he concluded. Realtor Betsy Belbedia said she appre-

ciated the council's resolution.

"That intersection is critical for the same reason they put a traffic light there in the early 1990s," Belbedia said. "At least one person died there and there were extremely bad accidents. Unfortunately, the same thing will have to

happen again before the county will do

"Maybe the only way the county will listen to us is after a disaster," Vice-mayor Mick Denham said. "It's a very sad situa-

Belbedia said she is part of an active group at Punta Rassa and the Sanibel Harbour Resort. Mayor Carla Johnston suggested Belbedia and her group meet with county commissioners, Wingard, and the local media.

"The county is just immovable," Johnston said.

Wingard said once the causeway is completed, the county will evaluate the need for a place to make a U-turn, as well as the space needed for westbound cars waiting to go to Sanibel.

Those factors will enable the county to locate the expanded median opening as close to the toll plaza as possible without negatively impacting those waiting vehi-

The new causeway's grand opening is tentatively scheduled for Jan. 27, 2007.



# Estuary improving, refuge the same

Mayor urges public comment to Army Corps

City Environmental Biologist James Evans reported on the state of the estuary at city council's Aug. 15 meeting.

"Sea grasses appear to be recovering, and there is a lot of new growth," Evans said. Faster-growing sea grass species are colonizing where other grasses have vanished, he said, still providing habitat.

'Over time, if conditions are good, [the original grasses] will come back," Evans predicted.

If conditions are good.

Evans also reported that the deeper grass beds still are covered with algae.

"There is still a lot of algae in the refuge," Evans said. "There are still large green mats of algae and green filamentous algae.

Fish activity is at a minimum there, he said, with virtually none of the once-plentiful mullet, and there are fewer wading birds as well.

The salinity in the estuary is good right now, as is the water clarity. "These are most likely the result of the lack of rain and discharges," Evans explained.

The matter of how water will be released from Lake Okeechobee in the future current is under review by the Army Corps of Engineers, with a public-comment period about to begin.

Evans attended the recent meeting of the Lake Okeechobee Regional Advisory Committee, where he said the majority of stakeholders, including agriculture, the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, utilities, Caloosahatchee River advocates and others were unanimously against the Army Corps of Engineers' Tentatively Selected Plan (TSP) for the

get will be hashed out with the citizens of Sanibel, beginning with a public meeting Saturday, Sept. 9, at 9 a.m. council gave staff direction on ways to fund the path

City staff suggested using funds from building permit revenue, the increase ad valorem revenue gained from increasing the proposed millage from 2.4801 to 2.5, some of the reserve set aside for various initiatives and contingencies and from the recreation center reserve, the first repayment to the general fund from the sewer system loan, and several other sources.

These suggestions will be spelled out in the budget document presented at the Sept. 9 public meeting.

Councilman Steve Brown didn't want to spent \$1.5 million in one year and suggested making the shared-use path improvements over two or three years.

Brown, returning to the meeting a little late after a break, said, "I was late because I was looking for my Clause outfit at home. We don't have \$1.5 million!

He stressed that spending that much on the shared-use path could take money away from other necessary projects on the city's agenda for the upcoming year.

Mayor Carla Johnston pointed out that spreading out the project over two or three years would involve increased costs in the second and third years, estimated by Public Works Director Gates Castle at about \$75,000 in each delayed year.

Vice-mayor Mick Denham suggested other places to find money in the city budget that might be more acceptable and would result in more money being available for other city initiatives.

His suggestion to reduce the disaster budget, though, was rejected. Zimomra reminded council it isn't just a hurricane fund but is there for all disasters, including storms that don't meet federal standards, a collapsed culvert, or any other emergency.

Ultimately, council directed staff to rework the money sources for the shared-use-path improvements, leaving the disaster fund whole and \$750,000 remaining for other city initiatives.

#### Dunlop, Bowman's Beach Rds to be prototypes

The city has selected two locations to be prototypes for the expansion of the shared-use path system.

Dunlop Road and Bowman's Beach Road will be used to develop conceptual plans for two future shared-use

Castle said they were selected in part because they are

so different.

"Dunlop is a winding road and not very well suited to mixing cars and bikes," he explained. It also includes destinations that would make it a popular path for walkers and cyclists, including the library, City Hall, BIG ARTS, and the Historic Village and Museum.

Bowman's Beach Road, on the other hand, is straight with little vegetation and one destination, Bowman's Beach Park.

This location has been in the beach parking budget for several years now but never was done," Castle said. "There has been a lot of discussion of these sites over the years.

One site suggested by the Parks and Recreation Committee, but rejected by the Public Works Department, was the portion of Bailey Road from Periwinkle Way to Sand Castle Road. Castle said a shared-use path for that segment of road already has been designed and there is no need for a consultant to work on it.

A public workshop regarding the Shared-Use Path Master Plan Update will be held Nov. 14.

#### City, Fire District to study flexible delineators

City council voted to leave it to the Public Works Department and Sanibel Fire & Rescue District to study four areas on Periwinkle Way where the Fire District says the flexible delineators along the shared-use path would interfere with the passage of emergency vehicles.

Those four areas are in front of Huxter's, Sanibel Steakhouse, Trader's, and the Island Cow.

"The Fire District has identified these areas as problems for emergency vehicles to get through," Castle explained. "There are either vegetation, signs or ditches. Staff is willing to work with the Fire District to either relocate signs or remove the delineators to make the fire department comfortable with the situation.'

"I think this is a very reasonable approach, rather than taking down all the delineators," Councilman Tom Rothman said.

Mayor Carla Johnston said she would support whatever Castle and the Fire District come up with together. "Hopefully it will satisfy both safety concerns,"

Johnston said. The city voted unanimously to repeal the resolution allowing the city to acquire through eminent domain property necessary to construct a "bypass" behind businesses on Periwinkle Way.

The official comment period on the TSP begins Aug. 18 and lasts 45 days. Comments sent earlier than Aug. 18 may not be effective, and Mayor Carla Johnston urged people to re-send their comments.

The lake regulation schedule for 2007 to 2010 that they are about to set within the next couple of months must be our first and top priority," Johnston stressed, "because it sets forth for the Army Corps of Engineers how much they are allowed to release down the Caloosahatchee. If they have a legal document that requires them to release water in excess of biologists' recommendations, we only have a harder battle. It's critical that we not let this one go by.'



# Remove lower branches from your mango tree

Dear Ron:
We had a 40- to 50-foot-tall mango tree before Hurricane Charley hit, It is now about half that size. This year the tree grew lots of branches

along the trunk of the tree, practically down to the ground. And we got loads of mangos. Can we remove the lowest branches to about six feet above the ground without causing damage to the tree? (Talk about low-hanging fruit, the raccoons have enjoyed the season!)

#### Dear Ann and Dan:

Mango trees are very susceptible to breakage during high winds, so it would be wise to trim the lower branches. This will help form a solid trunk and will

The mango (Mangifera indica) is native to India and Burma, recommended for zones 10, 11 and southernmost 9B, and is moderately salt-tolerant.

#### Repot your root-bound bird of paradise

#### Dear Ron:

When we moved to our house in January there was a bird of paradise plant in a pot, rather pot-bound. I feed it regularly and try to remember to water it, but it has not flowered yet. What's the story with this plant?

#### Dear Colleen:

It can take several years before blooms are produced on a bird of paradise, usually in late summer. Once an immature flower emerges, it can take a few months before the bloom opens. To help it along, your bird should be placed in an area that provides full sun during part of the day for optimum flowering, and shade during part of the day to keeps its leaves green.

Birds of paradise are hungry horticultural critters, and during the first few years, they should be fed monthly during the spring and summer months with an acid-forming fertilizer.

Water your plant weekly in the absence of rain. You should also repot your plant. Gently loosen the root ball and place it a new container slightly larger than the present

The orange bird of paradise (Strelitzia reginae) and white bird of paradise (Strelitzia nicolai) are native to South Africa and can be planted outdoors in zones 9B-11. They are not salt-tolerant.

#### Replanted hibiscus may have suffered root damage

Since 2002 I have had a hibiscus in my front yard and it is my pride and joy. The hurricanes of '04 and '05 caused the plant to become partially uprooted, but I restaked it and the plant continued to have gorgeous flowers for a while

This spring only occasional flowers have sprouted and most of the buds appear shriveled. The plant appears sick. Help!

#### Dear Bobbi:

There may have been some damage to the roots during the replanting process and this could be depriving your hibiscus of adequate water and nutrients. I suggest you trim your plant by about one-quarter, then dig a trench around the rootball.

Make it about 1-foot wide and 1-foot deep and deep and fill it with soil that has been incorporated with peat moss and composted cow manure. This will provide the enriched soil and good drainage necessary for the growth of healthy new roots.

Watering in a root stimulator may also help. And you should feed your plant at least three times a year, from March through October, with an acid-forming fertilizer such as one labeled for ixoras, azaleas or palm trees.

The hibiscus (Hibiscus rosa-sinensis) is native to China, recommended for zones 9-11 and is slightly salt-tolerant.

#### Dig out the invasive asparagus ferns

#### Dear Ron:

We have a hedge in front of our house and I have noticed a lot of asparagus fern cropping up in it. What is the best way to get rid of the fern?

#### Mango fruit

#### Dear Jim:

Because the small white storage bulbs that dangle from the roots of asparagus ferns are very stubborn, digging them out is the only safe way to eradicate the plants. Using a herbicide would likely damage or kill the plants in your

Asparagus fern (Asparagus aethiopicus, sprengeri or densiflorus), is a category 1 invasive exotic and should never be planted.

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## Sewer rates increase to pay debt to general fund

City council took action Aug. 15 to repay over 10 years \$3.5 million owed to the city's general fund by the Sanibel sewer system.

This repayment, which amounts to \$350,000 annually, translates to a rate increase of \$7.92 a month for Sanibelians connected to the sewer system. Their total monthly bill will go up to \$47.53.

The loan was taken in 1998 to build a deep-well injection system and a transmission system to pump sewage from the treatment plant to the deep well at the Island Water Association site.

A letter to the city from resident Candace Hines prompted Mayor Carla Johnston to question the sewer fee structure and whether it is equitable.

Hines wrote, "The entire rate structure should be rethought. Could not the rates be tied to square footage of the house or the number of bathrooms, or both?"

The rates were just reviewed in July and do not come up again for review until July 2007.

"I think it may be useful next July to look at whether we can make it more equitable," Johnston said. Vice-

mayor Mick Denham concurred. Hines lives in an older, one-bedroom cottage. "I have one bathroom (1950 vintage), no dishwasher, no trash disposal, no outdoor spigot," Hines wrote. "That I pay the same as the McMansions and the huge estates is really outrageous. The logic and fairness of that type of charge

is baseless and faulty. Do rethink everything. Complicating any change in the rate structure is the seasonal nature of Sanibel and how to equitable assess homes that are empty for significant portions of the year.

Councilman Tom Rothman requested staff to prepare a report on alternative rate structures, their cost, and a review of how other municipalities structure their sewer

"We have a very compelling letter from a citizen," Johnston said, "and that's why I like getting letters from

# Council passes outdoor dining after revisions

For the first time, Sanibel has outdoor dining regulations, and restaurants can apply for outdoor bonus

After several revisions, including one during its Aug. 15 meeting, city council approved procedures for restaurants to add seats for outdoor

Council sent the planning department back to the drawing board after the Aug. 1 public hearing, seeking to tighten the language in the ordinance to forestall a few potential problems. The new regulation:

- sets a cap on the maximum number of outdoor seats at 32;
- calls for an initial permit period of 24 months, at which time council will review the performance of the regulations;
- prohibits littering and states that garbage will be properly collected,

stored and disposed;

prohibits noise distrubances and unreasonable odors.

The two-year initial permit system allows for a trial period after which the city can evaluate performance under the regulation and determine whether it has been consistent with the Sanibel Plan, according to Planning Director Bob Duffy.

Restaurants that receive approval for outdoor dining will have to pay the sewer connection charge for the additional seats. The planning commission had discussed the possibility of deferring this charge.

"After review, it became clear this would be premature, because the fiscal impact and methods of administering it are not worked out," Duffy explained.

After the two-year trial period, the city may abolish or fine-tune the outdoor dining regulation based on information and experience gathered during the 24 months.

"At the end of that two years, we'll report back to council on the perfor-

mance of the ordinance," Duffy said. "If they decide to continue it, then we'll work with applicants to renew their permits.

The city then will review the per-

Florida state law precludes the city from prohibiting smoking in outdoor dining areas as was suggested at the Aug. 1 council meeting. However, Councilman Steve Brown wouldn't let that issue blow away.

"Can we recommend not smoking?" he asked, suggesting signs saying, "We ask that you don't smoke" be placed in the outdoor dining areas.

"I think it's just a common courtesy," Brown said.

Duffy said he would discuss this

possibility with the city attorney.

"The regulations recommended by the planning commission and revised by council are now in place, and we look forward to revieweing applications from restaurants," Duffy concluded.

#### Council meets with city attorney in 'shade session'

City Attorney Ken Cuyler met with council members during a "shade session" — a meeting that, because of attorney-client privilege, is not open to the public in accordance with Florida's Sunshine Law. Cuyler called for the shade session to brief council regarding a lawsuit against the city by the owner of the property on which the Winds store sits. The property is on Periwinkle Way near the intersection of Palm Ridge Road and includes another commercial building behind Winds.

Cuyler explained the owner, S.W.F. Sanibel Inc., wants to change the way it owns the property to what is called "condominium ownership." This does not mean residential condominiums. It is a manner of ownership that would allow tenants to own their units as well as an undivided interest in the common elements of the property. S.W.F. Sanibel Inc. sued the city on the premise this change in the form of ownership should not be subject to local review because they are not seeking a change of use, development, or construction.




While Base has two children, one is

you go to kick up your heels and have a good relaxing time. I think that's the message that we've got to get out to the tourists along with conservation."



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
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


