

#### Valentine Tea

Iss Charlotta's tea room came to life last week as it rarely has since the mid-30s when it ended its career of offering light refreshments to travellers at Sanibel's ferry landing On Valentine's Day seventy guests enjoyed the old time ambiance of tea with tiny sandwiches and bite-sized desserts served in the tea room and under adjacent tent on the grounds at the Historical Village.

Entering into the spirit many visitors wore hats and even a pair of mesh gloves were in evidence. A low key fashion show, modeled by museum docents, added to the afternoon with outfits from Simply Sanibel, Helinda's, Tuna Luna and Casual Attitude.

Several guests went home with gifts won in a raffle organized by Dottie Miller who garnered prizes from local retailers and everyone received a handsomely packaged array of Clinique beauty products courtesy of Mr. Ford, manager of Jacobson's at the Bell Tower.

Charlotta Matthews was a daughter of Hallie and Will Matthews who came to Sanibel in 1895 and shortly thereafter turned their gulf front home into lodging for visitors. It was called Matthews Hotel and over the years has expanded into today's Island Inn resort

In 1927 Charlotta took leave from running the hotel and established her tea room next to the Bailey store on San Carlos Bay where the ferry

berthed on its trips to and from Punta Rassa. Her sister Annie Meade Matthews had married Frank Bailey in 1919 so it was somewhat of a family affair When the landing moved "up island" closer to the lighthouse Charlotta closed shop and returned to the hotel.

The little building, later used as a residence, remained on the bay side until the early '90s when along with the old Bailey store and a tiny post office it was moved to Dunlop Road, joining the Rutland house museum and thus creating a historical village

Mary McLaughlin who chaired the Valentine tea has declared the event both a social and financial success. Proceeds are earmarked to further the education and works of the volunteer staff.

Even more importantly it offered 70 people a peek into Sanibel's past a time when life was not easy but at the same time was simpler

The Historical Village, 950 Dunlop Road, is open each week Wednesday through Saturday from 10 a.m. until 4 p m. and Sundays from 1 to 4 p m. ❖





Wildlife Society Rovers in training

or a section of the public, the rovers are the I human face of the refuge. Many visitors do not stop at the Center for Education but just zip onto Wildlife Drive. They don't see or meet officers of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service; they don't see the official refuge videos or pick up educational material from the exhibits. When they leave the refuge and get back on Sanibel-Captiva Road, the rovers will be their only contact with representatives of "Ding" Darling.

For this reason alone, the rovers play a critical role at the wildlife refuge. Some visitors may develop a favorable or unfavorable impression of "Ding" Darling simply as a result of their experience with the rovers.

"Ding" Darling has become such a popular spot in the refuge system, in part, because of the fleet of rovers who walk up and down Wildlife Drive Equipped with radios and a knowledge of the Florida ecosystem, they help visitors understand what they see. The rovers answer questions and recommend places to look for particular birds or reptiles. They explain the rules governing fishing and other activities on the grounds.

The rovers are drawn from the pool of Wildlife Society volunteers. Currently there are about 60 Wildlife Society rovers, individuals with a love of nature and a desire to serve the public. JD Bolden, the Volunteer Coordinator for the refuge, has made rover training an important priority. During season he is running training sessions once per month. All rovers - whether veterans like Art and Molly Krival or rookies - take part in the training. Bolden wants to make sure rovers are prepared to meet any situation that may arise on Wildlife Drive.

U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service officer Steve Alvarez spoke to the rovers about the message the refuge would like to send to visitors. "The rovers could be the only people the public meets," said Alvarez. "We want the visitors to go away with the feeling that the refuge belongs to the American people. We're just here taking care of it.

Alvarez also wants the rovers to understand the role played by "Ding" Darling in the entire refuge system. As an important stop on the migratory flyways, "Ding" Darling helps birds on their voyages north and south. The refuge provides a sub-tropical habitat that is unique in the United States.

Biologist George Coppen spoke to the rovers about the ecology of the mangrove estuaries. He explains that the mangroves are the basis of the food chain. The roots of mangrove trees provide shelter for small fish to hide in; the mass of trees prevents erosion and keeps the land intact. Coppen said the mangrove estuary has been dubbed the "cradle of the ocean" and the "ocean's nursery." He shows rovers how bodies of salt and fresh water function interdependently.

Carol Pratt spoke to the rovers about the regulations at the refuge. For example, visitors must stay within certain areas of the refuge; a license is required for fishing. Pratt did a fine job walking the rovers through the legal and technical elements of life at the refuge.

Wildlife Society volunteers who sign up for roving usually do so because they have a special interest in birds. A large portion of the training concentrates on identifying the habits and appearance of the various birds at the refuge. #### Variance for **Docks Needs** More Verifying

lanning Commissioners on Tuesday at MacKenzie Hall voted to continue to 1:30 p.m., March 28, discussion of a variance and a development permit to modify an existing dock layout and then construct three finger docks and five boat lifts in Victoria Cove, 900-970 Victoria Way.

Neither applicant nor the Planning Department was prepared with ample information needed by the Commissioners to make a judgment but could be by the March deadline.

So Planning Director Bruce Rogers suggested to Commissioners that they 'have Walt Fraser (Victoria Cove Homeowners' Association surveyor) come to interpret his drawings (on various water depths) and also "someone who actually builds these" (docks). Therefore, there was the need for continuance, he said.

Water depths proved the stumbling block when Attorney Richard Brodeur had to apologize earlier for the drawings, the latter being the Planning Department's "cut and paste," therefore inaccurate on water depths on at least one of four attachments.

But Victoria Cove Homeowners Association applicants reprsented by Brodeur—Dr. Frank Vermes and Bob Maupin—had submitted separately information on "water depths" just prior to the meeting making it difficult for Commissioners to properly assign to their proper drawings. Planner Ken Pfalzer admitted "error made on the staff exhibit.

That, however, is not the burden of the Commission because "it is up to the applicant to provide all necessary information at least one week ahead of a scheduled meeting so planners have

a chance to review fully, in the opinion of Commissioner Dick Downes.

The variance would be to Land Development Secion I.E.7.c. to "allow the modification of the existing dock layout by creating four finger docks with seven boat lifts, with one finger dock and two boat lifts closer to the easterly property line (as extended into the waterway 30 feet) than the required minimum setback" (45 feet

from side property lines)."

The DP would "modify the existing dock by constructing three of the finger docks and five of the boat lifts in the waterway adlacent to the parcel."

Pfalzer for the Planning Department had found that any "development authorized is limited to the reconfiguration of the existing dock and the addition of five boat lifts in conformance. with the site plan (in linear feet about midway and around a curve).

Brodeur's contention was that "it's a hardship because of size, shape of the parcel with water depth greater on its easterly side and not practical to move docks to west. Introduced were also Fraser's photos taken on the site. •

Victoria Cove Homeowners Association wanted to treat all fairly, thus the application for variance and DP for three of the finger docks and five of the boat lifts (all to be essentially the same) but not in the middle of 210 linear feet "of a curve like a scimitar." Brodeur said. He requested continu-

Noted Pfalzer's memo: "The boat dock, including the portion of the existing dock that is to be retained, and the boat lifts shall be setback a minimum of 15' from both the eastern and western side property lines, as these property lines are extended into the waterway for a distance of 30' (the maximum waterward extension of the dock/boat

Nor can "any docked or moored vessel at the dock and boat lifts intrude into a navigation channel or obstruct navigation of the ranal," according Pfalzer. The applicant is to assure

Gates Castle informed us that an additional bicycle path, adjacent to the Sanibel River, running from the Sanibel Steak House to Casa Ybel, is scheduled for construction in 2001 We consider this a major step in alleviating hazards along Periwinkle Way, as well as providing a scenic path.

The members of the bicycle club suggest the additional bicycle path improvements as follows in the order of priority:

1) Widen the bicycle path on San-Cap Road from Rabbit Road to Tarpon Bay Road to eight feet.

2.) Continue to relocate existing bicycle path along Periwinkle Way from roadway In the interim, use uniform paint striping to better delineate tile separation of the road from the bicycle path

3.) Stanchions should be added to further separate the path paralleling the strip immediately west of Casa Ybel. (Cars traveling East encroach on the path prior to turning south),

4) Add a bicycle path on the north side of Periwinkle Way from Dunlop Road west We suggest that, as an interim step, a paved path be con-

structed on the north side of Periwinkle Way between Dunlop Road and the driveway into the Pirate Playhouse. This would provide access to the crosswalk at the Community Center.

5.) Pave bicycle path between the Chamber of Commerce and Bailey Road

6.) Widen the Rabbit Road bicycle path The condition of the path is deteriorating and this would be a good time to improve it

For your long-range planning, we suggest that you consider new bicycle paths between:

1.) Bay Road and Royal Poinciana Drive

2) Bunting Lane and City Hall land. Our club recently cooperated with the Lions Club in the financing of a gazebo on San-Cap Road. We would like the city to consider granting permission for the erection of a gazebo on vacant land on Periwinkle Way between Huxter's and She Sells Seashells This land is owned by Periwinkle Park. The owner is agreeable to giving appropriate rights to the city for the use of the land.

Motorized bicycles, particularly battery-powered, are being sold at Sam's Club, among other locations. We do not believe motorized vehicles have any place on Sanibel's bicycle paths. We recommend strongly that the only exception to walkers and bicyclists be limited to motorized wheel chairs. The legal appearance of motorized wheel-chairs is the large, big wheel type with the battery packs on the back and the

scooter types that are either rear-wheel driven or front-wheel driven. A motorized bicycle does not fall into either of these categories.







#### Southwest Florida's Voice In Washington

by U.S. Congressman Porter J. Goss, 14th District, Florida

This week Congress stood up for our mom and pop shops and passed the bipartisan Small Business Liability Reform Act, which I strongly supported. According to a survey of 1,200 small business owners, conducted by the National Federation of Independent Businesses, one in three have been sued and more than half have been threatened with a lawsuit in the past five years. The estimated cost for a business owner's defense in the average lawsuit is \$100,000 - that is enough to close a small business's doors for good and put all its employees out of a job.

The Small Business Liability Reform Act defines a small business as one employing less than 25 people. It protects these folks from frivolous lawsuits by limiting the punitive damage awards against small businesses to \$250,000. This will make it harder for trial lawyers to put small businesses out of business.

Small businesses make-up the backbone of Southwest Florida's economy. Our mom and pop shop owners employ a large percentage of our working families and are active members of our communities. This plan will give them the protection they need and


On Wednesday, my Intelligence Committee held its first public hearing

of 2000. Following Florida's common sense approach to government in the sunshine, one of my goals is to make more of what we do public knowledge. The hearing focused on the state of counterintelligence at our national weapons labs. Last spring the Cox Committee, on which I served, released its bipartisan report on alleged Chinese nuclear espionage at the Los Alamos nuclear weapons lab. These deeply disturbing findings served as a catalyst for tighter security at our labs.

In this case, counterintelligence represents the policies, mechanisms and other measures to prevent penetrations by other governments or rogue nations seeking to acquire our secrets. There is simply too much at stake in the realm of national security to be anything but proactive. The weapons labs are our crown jewels - they represent some of our most important and most secret technology. These labs provide a strong offense, but they don't do defense

As part of the Intelligence Committee's oversight duties we hired a renowned "spy" Paul Redmond (most known for catching the notorious CIA spies Aldrich Ames and James Nicholson) to conduct a thorough study of the new security measures at the labs. On Wednesday, Mr. Redmond

shared with us some of his findings.

He painted a picture of continuing problems plaguing counterintelligence efforts at the labs. This is consistent with what seems to be a culture of disdain toward security in the Clinton-Gore administration. We have seen this time and again, dating back to the lack of White House background checks and Filegate, to the most recent case of a Russian spy placing a bag at the State Department. Other nations want our secrets and they are going to continue to aggressively try to steal them. We cannot allow our security to be sacrificed any further.

# Do You Have A Gripe About Traffic Congestion?

he MPO (Metropolitan Planning Organization) needs your help in identifying congested roads for which it may be able to identify relatively low-cost or "quick fix" improvements. The idea is to improve the operation and safety of the existing transportation system without resorting to major construction Projects such as adding travel lanes or building new roads, bridges or overpasses,

Examples of low cost improvements include realigning minor roadways, designating reversible lanes or one-way streets, and changing road signing or striping. Other examples include installing or synchronizing traffic signals, and adding or extending turn lanes at intersections. Persuading employers to stagger business nours, and creating incentives to increase car pooling or the use of buses, bicycles or less congested routes may also help in some cases.

Last year, with the help of readers like you, several congested locations were dentified. Low cost improvements have already been completed to alleviate some of those problems. Others may be implemented within the next few years. Some of the improvements already completed include changing the traffic signal system on Bayshore Road at New Post Road, creating a four-way stop at Central Avenue and Hanson Street, and upgrading the traffic signal on Martin Luther King Boulevard at Oritz Avenue.



#### Noah's Ark Lights The Way

**T**f you want to talk job satisfaction, take a peek into Noah's Ark. The ladies who volunteer there couldn't be more pleased with their circumstances. They see their friends, help the customers and go home knowing they've done something for the poor.

"I like working with the girls," said Kay Richardson, who served as chairman this past Monday morning. "We never really lose one. They keep wanti-

ng to come back.

Noah's Ark, a thrift store located behind St. Michael and All Angels Episcopal Church at 2304 Periwinkle Way, has been running on Sanibel for 35 years. The store receives donations - furniture, clothing, jewelry, kitchenware, among other items - and sells them to the public. The proceeds go to a variety of charities.

"All the money goes to outreach, except what we use for operating expenses," said Richardson "Everything donated is used. If we can't sell it, it goes to one of the churches in

the area.

The store is part of the complex of administrative offices at St. Michael's and is the primary way the church relieves the needs of the impoverished. In the year 2000 Noah's Ark will contribute to more than 30 different charities, some as close as FISH of Sanibel and Hope Hospice and others as far

away as the South American Missionary Society and the Honduras Our Little Roses Building Fund.

The store is open five days a week in season (running from the middle of October to the end of April) from 9:30 a.m. until 12:30 p.m.. Out of season it is open on Tuesdays and Fridays.

Anne Hall, a volunteer who is the chairman on Thursdays, said Noah's Ark has been so successful for so long because of the continuing support of the local community. "The people on Sanibel and Captiva have been very generous," she said.

"I still enjoy working there," said Mary Holly, one of the bright lights of Noah's Ark for many years. "It's a real experience. It's crowded - people keep coming. And you wouldn't believe the prices - there are wonderful bargains...We have a real good time. We

get coffee and cookies. It's a fun bunch of gals to work with, and they know their job real well.'

There are about fifteen different volunteers at Noah's Ark each day. During season there are about 70 volunteers in total. Those are "Ding" Darling-like numbers! Some of the ladies work at the cash register while others circulate around the racks of clothing, answering questions.

"I love it," said Hall. "Everyone enjoys it here I think. I'm a widow and it's nice to have community and fellow-

Richardson said the constant influx of new donations is one reason why the job stays fresh for the volunteers. They always get a kick at going through a new set of dresses or perhaps an antique set of tea cups. "It's

the element of surprise," said Richardson. "We open the door in the morning and it's sort of like Christmas.

Noah's Ark has grown with St. Michael's and the island. The store began as a modest concern out of the choir office. About seven years ago they moved into a building of their own. Last year they just about doubled in size, adding a new area for furniture pieces. Large appliances are about the only traditional thrift store items they don't sell.

The volunteers are friendly and charming and make shopping at Noah's Ark a pleasant experience. They wear aprons with pictures of ani-





The Blackwood Brothers, a world-renowned gospel quartet from Memphis Tennessee, that gave a young Elvis Presley his first contact with professional entertainers, will perform at the BIG ARTS auditorium on Sanibel at 7 p.m., March 5.

Sponsored by Sanibel Community Church, the concert is offered free to the public as long as seating is available. The doors will open at 6:15 p.m

The Blackwood Brothers have won nine Grammy awards, 27 Dove awards cut 167 albums and toured 43 countries. Formed in 1934, the quartet is led by Cecil Stamps Blackwood, who carries on the great family tradition.

The quartet first came to national prominence in 1954 when they won the "Arthur Godfrey Talent Scout Show" on CBS radio.

The connection with Elvis Presley dates back to 1948, when Cecil Blackwood, current manager of the group, attended the same Sunday school as Presley in Memphis. Presley, a fan of gospel music, hung around auditoriums where the Blackwood Brothers sang during the early 1950s when they were the leading quartet in Southern Gospel music. The Blackwoods encouraged Presley's singing and let him in free.

By 1958, when Presley's mother

By 1958, when Presley's mother died, his rock 'n roll career was fully launched. Presley and his father Vernon requested the Blackwood Brothers to sing at their mother's funeral. Though on tour, the group chartered a plane and returned to sing Presley's favorite songs.

Though original members of the quartet have been replaced by new faces and younger voices, the quartet still sings the traditional songs they helped make famous. Their "Parade of songs" span their 65-year history, including How Great Thou Art Old Country Church, Just A Little Talk With Jesus, I'll Fly Away, and many

Cecil Blackwood is the second bartone in the 65-year history of the quartet. He was voted "best baritone" singer in gospel music numerous times by the Singing News Fan Awards.

Now singing tenor in the quartet is Steve Warren, who is known as "The Voice." Perhaps the most talented man in gospel music, he plays piano and most all other instruments. He's a songwriter, arranger, and can sing all four parts. He is the producer and arranger of current Blackwood Brothers recordings. Steve sang with the Masters V, J.D. Sumner and the Stamps, the Wayne Newton shows, and Branson Lights

Chris Blackwood is Cecil's grandson

and a fourth generation Blackwood. Chris sings with the quartet and assists Cecil with the tapes; CD's and other items at the concerts. Chris also helps his grandfather manage their road tours.

Eric Winston is the low bass singer and one of the lowest bass singers in the history of the Blackwood Brothers Eric is known for recording the lowest note by a gospel quartet singer-double low C.

Rick Price joined the Blackwood Brothers at the age of 19, helping Cecil with the road tours and fill in for the singers, as needed. After a departure from the group, he rejoined at the age of 43 and is now the lead singer and helps with the ministry and the management of the quartet.

Though admission to the concert is free, an offering will be received. The Blackwood Brothers Quartet is a non-profit organization and survives on donations to conduct nearly 300 crusades a year.







#### CROW Case Of The Week: Ring-Billed Gull

This week's case began in a neighborhood in northwest Cape Coral on Sunday, February 13
Gail Molloy, a Fort Myers resident, was driving in her car when she saw three young boys shoot a bird She stopped her car and got out She noticed the injured bird struggling and told the boys to help her get him

One of the boys went home to find a box At this point the boy s mother returned home and became angry when she learned what had happened Molloy and the three boys captured the ring-billed gull and Molloy brought him to CROW for treatment

An x-ray revealed a fractured ulna 'The BB lodged in the wing," said veterinarian PJ Deitschel "It's sitting smack in the middle of the bone"

Deitschel opted not to remove the BB She is hoping that the juvenile gull will heal itself. However, if he does not convalesce at an appropriate rate, she will consider operating. As a rule, Deitschel defers invasive procedures if at all possible.

The shooting angered Deitschel "This is not the first incident," she said "I had to euthanize two vultures yesterday that had been shot Their shoulders were obliterated There was nothing I

could do about it "

Deitschel informed Carol Pratt, an officer of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service at 'Ding" Darling, about the matter. The ring-billed gull is protected by federal law

Right now CROW is giving the bird antibiotics, painkillers and other supportive care. He is in a cage on CROW grounds

Some people mistakenly believe that ariimals do not experience pain. This is one reason why human beings shoot animals, they don't think they re doing much harm. Deitschel hopes there will

be increasing awareness in the public that an animal suffers from an injury as much as a human being

"We all have the same nerves, the same blood," said Deitschel "If it would hurt me, it's hurting them"

So far the ring-billed gull has responded favorably "He is eating and doing remarkably well," said Deitschel

If he continues to make progress Deitschel will put him in the shorebird cage with the terns and other gulls. It may take two to three weeks for the gull to start flying again \$\pm\$



#### Sand Dollar

ose Leal is usually a man of hope and glad tidings but this past week the Director of the Bailey-Matthews Shell Museum had some bad news to deliver the Sand Dollar is not really a shell Technically speaking the Sand Dollar ought not to appear in any shell collection. The sad fact is that the Sand Dollar is not a marine mollusk

But to discriminate against the Sand Dollar just because it happens to be an echinoderm is downright un American The Sand Dollar looks a lot like other shells and collections all over the world feature these delicate white creatures

Sand Dollars can be found right here on Sambel In the summer and fall sea sons swimmers often stumble across live Sand Dollars on the Gulf floor Live Sand Dollars are green and emit a yellow dye - which is harmless - when picked up The spines on the live Sand Dollar make it look and feel furry

These tiny bristles propel them, said Leal

It is prohibited to take live Sand Dollars on Sanibel Some people take them out of the water, not realizing they are still alive. The yellow dye is a clear sign however, that the animal is still alive


However residents and tourists may take the Sand Dollars that are no longer living They are white and brittle ind are easily broken. The white shell of the Sand Dollar (called a test ) is

famous for its pret ty flower pattern

If you look closely at a Sand Dollar, you swill see five tiny holes at the center inside the flower pattern called gonapores The Sand Dollars shoots eggs or sperm into the water through these holes they are also used for breathing

The Sand Dollar is peculiar in that it has five oval slots in its shell. These are called lunules They help the Sand Dollar burrow in the sand and to move food toward its mouth

The Sand Dollar is sometimes referred to as the Holy Ghost Shell because it appears to match key Christian symbols The flower has been compared to the Easter Lily The five tiny holes inside the flower have been compared to the five points on the star of Bethlehem The five oval slots have

been compared to the wounds of Christ on the Cross The bright white shell radiates the purity of the dove of



#### Behaviors As ID Clues


In January, we talked about many of the feeding hishaviors of water birds. Discussed were most of the clever tricks groups and indinauals of our feathered triends employ to gather their fish, worms, crabs and other morsels. But there are many more subile behaviors than these, and today we shall talk about a few of them, and how they may neep us identify various creatures to species.

Our most primitive bird, the Common Loon, is often a nfused with an immature

rmorant at a distance as they both indende in the water between dives inder the surface. They are both dark top and light below, and both are rather large swimming birds. But they are easily separated by the angle at union they hold their bill. Loons point their beak straight out, parallel to the profile of the hody. Cormorants hold their more slender head and bill slightly up distinguishing them easily.

Telling Ospreys and Bald Eagles at a great distance in the air can be tricky, too but behavioral clues make it easier. Ospreys hold their wings crooked, while eagles wings are straight out and that The white belly of the Osprey is rertainly a definitive field mark, but it cannot always be seen. This is an example of why we should learn several ways to ID a species, and not rely on one mark.


Terns are among our most difficult water birds to distinguish from each

other However, subtle clues do exist. especially with feeding behavior. The Forster's Tern, easily our most abundant in the cool season, feeds along shorelines quite close, usually working into the wind. The mighty Caspian Tern also hunts for its quarry (larger fish) inshore, looking like a Ring-billed Gull with a red bill. Royal and Sandwich Terns are seldom seen feeding near shore, however, as they hunt deeper. They are normally seen, therefore, resting on the beach with other shorebirds. Gull-billed Terns are somewhat odd, as they feed over salt marshes, unlike other terns who prefer open


Gulls are not quite the challenge of terns, but it is curious how Ring-billed Gulls venture inland with no inhibitions, while Laughing Gulls prefer the coast the vast majority of the time. The huge Herring Gull also has a peculiarity; they are often seen dropping various live




Solitary Sandpiper

marine animals like scallops from the air, trying to open them upon impact. The dainty Bonaparte's Gull is also unique in its habit of hovering just over the water, picking up shrimp in small flocks.

Plovers and sandpipers are distinguished by habit in that the former picks up food off the surface of the sand or mud, while sandpipers probe into the substrate. But many sandpipers have interesting behavioral clues we can watch for. Sanderlings probe like a sewing machine, using their short-for-a- sandpiper black bill. Spotted Sandpipers, seen frequently along Sanibel's shores and bulkheads, can be easily identified by their habit of flying with "stiff" wings, almost like paddles. Willets, one of our large and common sandpipers, are often seen flying slowly above the mangroves screaming their heads off. Least Sandpipers, our smallest water bird, is the species that is seen in ditches and tiny puddles, walking around probing for tiny invertebrates True to their name, Solitary Sandpipers are usually seen alone, in wet fields or pond edges.

And any yellow-legs seen running along the shallows scooping plankton or insect larvae is a Lesser, not a Greater Yellow-legs.

Try these behaviors out next time you watch water birds and see if you notice any of these actions. Between behaviors, colors, patterns and call notes, bird identification can be made easy!

#### Take Stock In Children

Take Stock in Children, a major program of The Foundation for Lee County Public Schools has purchased twenty scholarships for the program, and plans to purchase twenty more, for a total of forty this year. Two local organizations provided funding for seven scholarships: The Community Health Association, Inc., has donated \$14,400 to purchase four Take Stock scholarships and WCl Watermark Communities recently funded three scholarships.

The scholarships are purchased through Florida Pre-Paid and matched 100 percent by state funds. The support of local organizations such as The Community Health Association and WCI Watermark Communities has made it possible for the Foundation to fund one hundred and twenty-four Take Stock in Children scholarships since 1995. Take Stock in Children provides college scholarships, mentors and hope to deserving low-income youth. To be eligible to apply for a scholarship, the student must currently be a ninth grader in a Lee County public school and meet family income cri-

Selected students sign a contract promising to maintain good grades, regular school attendance, and remain drug and crime free. Upon graduating from high school, in return for fulfilling their performance pledge, the students receive a tuition scholarship: two years to a community college and two years to a Florida college or university. In addition, each student is assigned a volunteer adult mentor, who meets with the child at the school two or three times monthly.



#### Fish Facts

an fish hear? Fish have no external ears as we are accustomed to seeing in other animals, but most have an excellent sense of hearing. Water can carry sound over three times faster than air and much farther. #### Sanibel And Captiva Fishing

ater temperature in the gulf is on the rise. We are up to 68 degrees out there and the difference in the fishing is beginning to show. The grouper are moving around and gathering up on

new spots every day. This last week was some of the best grouper fishing we have experienced all year and this has been a great year for that type of fishing. We came in with a box full of grouper every day last week but it wasn't without having our patience tried. The fish would eat at a frenzied pace for about 15 minutes at a time and then would let up. Then you move to another spot and it would take 20 minutes to get them to bite and then the frenzy would begin. Only to last about 10 minutes. I think this is a pretty good indication that the fish are moving around and starting to move to more offshore distances.


It is time to get out those silver spoons and shine them up for the annual spring mackerel run. Distant radio talk offshore indicates that some of the king mackerel are down south of Naples and should be starting to progress north to our area. Schools of bait are moving up to the new warmer surface water and some of them are

being crashed by Spanish mackerel and bonita tuna. Silver spoons, diving bomber type lures, rigged ballyhoo, and small feather lures should start to get some attention from these toothy critters.

We got some good action from the snapper family last week as we boated some nice mangrove, lane, and a few trigger fish thrown in to make some good eating. The night snapper trips should start to pay off and it gets better if you travel more to the south toward Naples. Offshore will be the place to be in the next few weeks.

Inshore and backbay: Captain
John Carpenito reports that the
Spanish mackerel have started
roaming around the backbays
on the south end of the island
around San Carlos Pass and well
up into Pine Sound. The trout
that he has been catching have
been of exceptional size. Pompano are
still around and seem to favor the
windy areas of open water on jigs.

Captain Dave Godfrey has gotten into the snook pretty good this week. He is still finding them deep in the bushes and favoring the bass assassins and the large handpicked shrimp. He proved on a recent television show that you can still catch all varieties of fish under adverse conditions and at night. They wanted to see a variety of fish

caught on the show and Dave was able to produce what they wanted and when they wanted it.

All in all the conditions and temperature have moved into more normal parameters and the fishing is showing maximum improvement. More favorable tides and warmer temperatures should really be good for this coming week, especially when the wind clocks around to the south and southeast. Good fishing!



#### Gardening On Sanibel

"A chance to pause in awe of nature's glory, and the garden becomes a private retreat, a place of breathtaking drama and peaceful contemplation where the union of art and nature touches our soul'

(Author unknown).

For me, this is very true. I love to sit out on one of the various benches placed throughout my garden and just watch the plants, flowers, and birds. Yes, it is important that we attract birds and butterflies to our gardens with bird bathes strewn here and there and feeders full of seed nearby, with the blossoms attracting the butterflies - a perfect

By now you probably have pruned your shrubbery, fed all your plants and lawn and in general prepared for spring which is just around the corner. For those of you who will soon be journeying back to your northern homes it is important that you have all this done so your place will look as you want it upon your return. For the part-time home owners it is best to have perennials which require less care and then just add the small blooming plants when you come back in the fall for winter color.

There was an article in the paper

about the PH in our soils but did not give us any help. I had my soils tested, both places, and find that here on Sanibel, and especially if you live in an area where soil has been added to raise the elevation, you will have a high PH mine was 8. So you will need to add lime to the soil to bring it down wherever you plant vegetables, or

flowers.Otherwise the soil is foreign to our plants and they do not get the nutrients they need. Most of you have pools, and acid is added to bring down the PH, which is high alkalinity and the same is true with soil, the lime is the "acid" to

make a balance.

The plant this week is the Lavender, which is common to most of us as we grow it in our herb gardens, as much for the aroma as for any culinary use. The botanical name is Lavandula labiatae and is one of the very early plants used in Roman times in soaps and perfumes with many people using lavender to cleanse with as the water was so contaminated. When the first settlers arrived in this country they were astounded at the purity of the waters and that one could even drink it and not get sick! The plant is not as important to us except for the sweet aroma it gives out in our gardens.

I finally finished up that big flower bed, and by the time we moved a tree, a large bush, (with the help of a superman who happened by), carrying off two large trash cans of debris, added all the top soil, fertilizer, mulch and countless blooming plants, it broke my budget to bits! Oh well, .another venture next month! HAPPY GARDENING!☆

#### Weeds To Self Destruct

eeds are notoriously stubborn, but researchers may be on the verge of turning the pesky plants into their own worst enemy.

Their approach involves spraying the weeds with a natural protein derived from the soil fungus Fusarium oxysporum. Upon entering natural leaf openings called stomata, the fungus' protein causes a specific self-defense mechanism to shift into maximum overdrive.

The defense, called a hypersensitive response, normally helps weeds cordon off infection by instructing nearby cells to self-destruct. But in lab, greenhouse, and small-scale field trials, spraying the protein causes a mass cellular suicide instead. In dandelions, for example, this kills the weed's affected leaves three to 24 hours later.

The finding, by Agricultural Research Service scientists, may open the door to a natural herbicide that farmers, organic growers or homeowners could spray to check broadleaf weeds like dandelion, yellow star thistle, pigweed or northern jointvetch.

Plant pathologist Bryan Bailey and colleagues are exploring the possibility at several ARS labs-Biocontrol of Plant Diseases, Weed Science, and Soybean and Alfalfa Research. ARS is USDA's chief research agency.

Bailey's team originally discovered the protein, called Nepl, while trying to

understand how some fusarium fungi cause disease in crops like corn. Studies begun in 1998 ruled out the protein's role in causing crop disease, but also revealed its potential as a biological herbicide.

The team reports their findings in the January/February issue of Weed Science, Interestingly, Nepl only affects broadleaf weeds of the dicot family with cell receptors that can detect the protein. This suggests it could be sprayed onto monocot crops like com. wheat, or even turfgrass without causing harm. Another possibility is spraying Nepl to clear away certain cover crops, like hairy vetch, prior to planting.#

# The Simple Language Of Orchids Repotting Of Orchids

If you grow orchids at some point they must be repotted. I find this the least enjoyable task. If you own only a few orchids it's easy to take them to an orchid grower like Marilyn's Exotic Orchids in Fort Myers and let them repot the orchids.

As the number of orchids increases, in a collection, it becomes neces-

sary to learn the art of repotting.

The most asked question is "What is the best potting medium for epiphytic orchids?" There is no number one for everyone. I learned through failures which one works the best for me. The success depends on one's ability to adjust the watering and the fertilizing practices to fit the medium.

I prefer tree fern bark best. It drains readily, provides some food value as it decomposes and usually lasts for more than two years-that is the limit for most potting mediums. The three important needs of the orchid are good water

drainage, fertilizer and the roots aerated. All potting mediums should provide support to the plant. The roots of the orchid must not move. An exception to this rule is the Vanda that requires no potting.

I do not like aggregates (gravel or stone) as it contains no organic matter and no food. A fertilizer must be used.

Fir bark is very popular. It meets the three requirements listed above, but a higher nitrogen concentration is required. A 3-1-1 ratio of fertilizer is desirable. Remember, we do not have the needed calcium in our water. Do not buy a fertilizer if it does not contain calcium

Peat moss is off my list. It is highly variable specially from our Florida bogs. Peat moss can hold many times its own weight in water. The number one way to kill an orchid is to over-water.

Pearlite and plastic peanuts (styrofoam pellets) are on the "no" list. They always escape and float around the yard. Excellent potting medium already mixed can be purchased. The strangest medium I ever heard recommended was ground up tires. The lecturer claimed it was the perfect answer. Just the appearances and smell were a turnoff. Osmunda in the 1930s to 1950 was considered the best as the material is long lasting and supplies some nutrients as it decomposes. It may be hard to find.

Then there is the perfect solution and actually my favorite. Mount the orchid on a slab of wood or a piece of bark. No pot, no potting mix, no repotting, no problems. Test your medium choice on a few plants firsts. If the orchid thrives and blooms then gradually change over the rest of the plants.

Just grow Vandas on a wire, or an empty basket will do. Or, grow a dendrobium that loves the smallest pot possible and likes to be left alone.

His vision was a restaurant on Sanibel similar to those found in Key West that would be a casual family place, with a nautical theme, that offered a raw bar and other menu items that would appeal to the residents and visitors of this island paradise

Given the popularity of the restaurant today and the fact that there are now four locations, two on Sambel. one in Cape Coral and one in Bokeelia, it would seem that Thompson's vision was right on the money. He went on to say that they used the name "Flamingo" because the state was using the bird as a logo for the new lottery and therefore it was a recognizable symbol. Then since the first location at Blind Pass didn't have table service, it was decided to add the word "Lazy" to the name. It would certainly be safe to say that now more people in this area associate the Flamingo with his restaurants than they do with the lottery. And the hustle and bustle of the wait staff at each location suggests anything but lazy.

The trademarked logo of the

Flamingo wearing sunglasses has become so popular that both locations have a line of Flamingo souvenirs...tank tops, T-shirts, sweatshirts, golf shirts, cups and caps.

The original location at 6520 Pine Avenue near Blind Pass faces the Gulf of Mexico across the street and is a special attraction to beach goers and visitors staying at the upper end of Sanibel and Captiva. It has become almost a landmark since its opening because of its popularity as a casual restaurant and also for its take-out business that is so attractive to the tourists staying in the up-island motels

The second location added eight years ago at the east end of the island at 1036 Periwinkle Way is one of the first restaurants a visitor sees when coming on the island. According to Ron Rich, general manager of that location, "consistency of food quality, friendly atmosphere and 'come as you are' dining makes it a fun place to eat.' There's something about a nautical theme that makes a person relax, It begins at the front door with the gangplant-like entrance and heavy porthole windowed door. The interior is all pine and teak from floor to ceiling with booths large enough to accommodate eight people. The high wooden stools, the polished wood bar and the large and small tables scattered around the restaurant to accommodate different sized parties were all made by employees. This is the kind of place to have fun. The casual atmosphere lends itself to spending time there.

Although the Lazy Flamingo is not a sports bar there are television sets, seven or eight of them, spotted throughout the restaurant for viewing major sporting events. Rich commented that hockey has become a growing spectator sport here and Flamingo has a hockey TV package that has become very popular with customers

The menu abounds with the kind of food that attracts people to a family type restaurant. The raw bar offers ice cold oysters and clams on the half shell, peel and eat shrimp, smoked fish and three varieties of Conch (they remind us it's pronounced Konk), salad, chowder and fritters, reasonably priced at \$5.25 to \$7.95. For the raw bar afficionado there's "The Pot," two dozen oysters, clams or a combination of the two, steamed in beer with special spices for \$15.95.

According to Rich one of the items considered a house specialty of Lazy Flamingo is the Mesquite grilled Grouper sandwich or platter, two of the most requested items. The Flamingo is also noted for its Caesar salad and garlic bread, both favorites of regulars to the restaurant. The Caesar salad, garlic bread and French fries can be ordered in half portions for those with smaller appetites. Standard menu fare includes Mussels and Clams Marinara, Fried Shrimp, Prime Rib Sandwich, Steak Sandwich and a variety of chicken wings. For the avid fisherman who likes to catch fish but not cook them, the Lazy Flamingo will even cook the fish you catch and prepare it in a sandwich or platter with all

the trimmings for \$7.95. Luncheon and dinner specials are offered each day to complement the regular menu and include items such as hot or cold Stone Crab claws, crab cakes, fried oysters, baby back ribs along with soup and appetizers. What Lazy Flamingo refers to as its Liquid Assets is in reality its full selection of wines and ample selection of bottled and "on tap" beers. All wines are offered by the bottle or glass

The little grownups have a kid's menu of hamburger, chicken fingers, pasta, hot dog or grilled cheese for \$3.95 and they get a complimentary cup as well. Another Lazy Flamingo is in the early planning stages for opening in about a year at Gasparilla Marina, near Gasparilla Island.

Lazy Flamingo has two locations on Sanibel, 6520 C Pine Avenue, near Blind Pass. Phone 472-5353, and 1036 Periwinkle Way, Phone 472-6939. Reservations are not required. All seating is open. The restaurants are open seven days a week. Operating hours are from 11:30 a.m. to 1 a.m. 🌣



#### Three Days Of Rain

hat can be the meaning of three brief words a son finds in his father's sparsely written journal? Three Days of Rain, a story of inter-generational conflict, centers around the lives of two renowned architects and the attempt of their children to deal with the complex legacy they have inherited. The lives of both generations are more intricately intertwined than anyone realizes, and the powerful ways they have affected one another forms the crux of this moving play.

Three Days of Rain, by Richard Greenberg, was a 1998 runner-up for the Pulitzer Prize for Drama. It's a highly literate, carefully crafted work which presents many challenges for actors, director and set designer. In this Theater Conspiracy production, the three actors play the grown children of the two architects in the first act and then assume the roles of their parents in the second act. It's difficult to carry off, but for the most part, these performers are able to make it work.

The other striking thing about this production is that the three days of rain when the seminal events of this drama take place are not merely suggested by sound effects. Through a clever bit of set construction, it is actually raining in the theater (although

not on the audience, fortunately). The sheet of rain which falls steadily on a corner of the stage throughout the second act adds a startling sense of reality and immediacy to the play. It's an inspired theatrical device which highlights the dramatic intensity of the story.

Three Days of Rain opens in 1995 in a dilapidated New York apartment with dirty walls and a minimum of furniture. Walker, the son of a famous architect, Edwin Janeway, has discovered his father's hideaway and is trying to make sense of his father's journal, trying to understand the life of a man he feels he never really knew. His father has just died and it is evident that he remains a disturbing enigma to his troubled, itinerant son. Walker, who is played with passionate intensity by Bill Taylor, is soon joined by his sister Nan, a Boston matron whose neat, conventional appearance contrasts with Walker's disheveled looks. Nan is played by Lauren Drexler, who infuses her performance with a cool, restrained intelligence.

Joining Walker and Nan for the reading of their father's will is Pip, the son of Edwin Janeway's architectural partner, Theo, who died many years ago at the peak of a brilliant career. Pip, played by Gary Obeldobel, is a soap opera star whose life has gone much more smoothly than Walker's. The three have been friends since childhood, but the many reasons why there are conflicts between them are soon revealed when an unexpected

bequest from Edwin Janeway stirs up the inevitable undercurrent of rivalries and secret passions.

The second act goes back in time to 1960, where we see the parents of the three characters in the same apartment. Ned (the young Edwin Janeway played by Bill Taylor and Theo (played by Gary Obeldobel) are on the verge of making a name for themselves with the famous Janeway House they are designing for Ned's parents. Lina. (the mother of Walker and Nan, played by Lauren Drexler) is about to make a shift in her affections that will radically alter the lives of all the characters. The second act is all the more poignant because of what we have already learned in the first act about the fate of these three characters and their chil-

Director Stephen Hooper does a fine job with this complex material. Taylor and Drexler do a superb job of bringing these characters to life; Gary Obeldobel rises to the challenge in the first act, but falters somewhat in the second. Scenic design by Bill Taylor and lighting by Josh Walker serve the play well.

Three Days of Rain is a powerful drama that grabs hold of your heart and doesn't let go until the rain stops falling. This play reminds us how intricate and delicate the connections between us are and how our actions affect subsequent generations in ways we may not imagine.

Three Days of Rain will be playing at the Foulds Theater at the Alliance of

# **Pancakes** More Than Just A Breakfast Food

'n my family, we learned early on that pancakes aren't just for Sunday breakfast. They also serve well for an easy supper, whether they're pancakes, griddle cake or hot cakes. Or, if you use a thinner batter, they become crepes suitable for a sophisticated first course, main dish or dessert.

Today we're looking at sauces as a change from butter and syrup. First, we have a honied fruity sauce; next, a maple syrup spiced with cinnamon and dotted with chopped walnuts; and last, a delicacy that's possible any season because canned berries are used.

For the pancakes, you may start from scratch with a basic recipe. Opt for a good packaged mix, or try our cornmeal pancakes for a different taste

### CORNMEAL PANCAKES

½ cup all-purpose flour

- ½ cup commeal
- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 1 cup milk
- 1 egg 3 tablespoons honey
- 3 tablespoons melted butter

In a medium bowl, combine flour, cornmeal, baking powder and salt; mix well; set aside. In a small bowl, combine milk, egg, honey and melted butter; mix well. Pour milk mixture into flour mixture; stir only until moistened (batter will be lumpy). Pour about 1/4 cup batter for each pancake into a hot skillet or on a griddle, over medium-low heat; cook until bubbles form on surface and break, and the edges become dry. Turn pancake and cook 2 minutes longer or until golden. Makes 8 pancakes.

## HONEY FRUIT SAUCE

- 1 cup orange juice
- 1 apple, peeled, cored and diced
- 1 pear, peeled, cored and diced
- 1/3 cup honey
- 1 teaspoon grated orange peel

1 tablespoon cornstarch ¼ cup water

Combine orange juice, apple, pear, honey and orange peel in medium saucepan. Bring to boil, reduce heat and simmer to 10 minutes or until fruits are tender. Dissolve cornstarch in water. Stir into hot mixture; cook and stir until mixture comes to boil; simmer 1 minute. Makes about 2 1/3 cups. APPLE WALNUT SYRUP

- 1 cup maple syrup
- 1 large apple, peeled and thinly sliced (about 2 1/2 cups)
- 3 tablespoons butter or margarine ½ teaspoon cinnamon
- Dash of salt
- 1 cup chopped walnuts Squeeze of lemon juice

In saucepan combine syrup, apple, butter, cinnamon and salt. Slowly bring to boil, stirring. Reduce heat; simmer 8 minutes. Stir in nuts and lemon juice. Serve hot over pancakes. Syrup may be stored in covered container in refrigerator for several days. Reheat over low heat. Makes about 2 cups.



# Hill Station

by Elspeth M. Cox

't was the time of the cheetah. The sun was slipping behind the Kashmir Lhills in a tangerine glow and the chattering of the nightly squadron of parakeets was silenced. Everything was quiet and still. I wondered, as my husband Archie and I climbed our 87 steps from the house to the jeep track, if the cheetah was watching and waiting. Dangling his legs over some tree branch, relaxed yet alert.

It was the month of May. The evenings were longer and filled with the perfume of the wild rose. In our isolated hill station a get-together of the Canadians has been planned. A big occasion which we looked forward to, even if it meant a long walk on a dark mountain track. As the sun set, the mountain wind sprang up and we shivered inside sweaters and jackets.

Dinner was to be served in the old hotel, its green and brown timbered front, neo-gothic windows facing a

deep shadowy valley climbing up to the snow-covered Inner Himalaya. The hotel had been built in 1800, used as an officer's mess at the time of the Raj and called "The Bull's Head." Now it was renamed "The Grand View," the view being the only grand thing about

About 25 Canadians were gathered, enjoying the usual hors d'oeuvres, French fries, which we thought the only really safe thing to eat at that time. We anticipated a Western dinner of local roast lamb, mint sauce, fresh Kashmiri peas and roast potatoes from the Punjab. This to be followed by the highlight—a bread pudding. This nursery type dessert was part of the British heritage and very desirable. The cavernous dining room, with dark Victorian furniture and a single fireplace, echoed the English voices.

And then, suddenly, two of the engineers rushed in saying their wives had not returned from their morning walk. There was immediate silence and fear on everyone's faces. We had only our own resources and Archie quickly organized a search team with the one jeep and a driver. Within a few hours, a voice called from far below the track. The recovery began.

The Canadians took all night to bring up the injured wife with no pain killers and only ropes. But it was dawn before the other, Muriel, who had been dead for many hours, was brought up. The vultures had been circling the cheetah kill all day.

The hospital was an old stone build-

ing with ancient x-ray and some beds without any sheets or pillows. The Police Chief who spoke no English was very concerned about having the death of a foreigner. One of the Canadians brought a blue floral sheet to cover the body and I did notice the soles of Muriel's shoes were very worn.

In the hills, good soles on one's shoes are life savers.

There was no morgue, no ice. Indians cremate the day of death so we. had to make quick decisions. We were fortunate to have a convent in town run by a European order who offered their cemetery. Archie and I climbed up to the convent and sat in the parlour in straight-backed chairs, sipping tea and calmly discussing the details of a coffin, grave, and service. It was almost dream-like. I noticed the fringe on the rug was combed and every strand was parallel.

An old Indian carpenter knew how to make a coffin and the visiting priest promised an interdenominational service for the Protestant Muriel. Our final detail was to climb further up the hill to the cemetery and map out what

we thought would be the right size for a grave. Our cook would find two brave Indians who for a sum of money would dig the grave during the night.

Our first thought very early next morning was "we forgot about ropes." We found some thin, yellow nylon rope which had to do. Outside the chapel, the Canadian families shivering in the thin mountain air, frightened and disturbed, waiting for the coffin. My friend, Joyce, had on a black suit and a strange thought crossed my mind about why she would bring that to our hill location where we lived in expedition clothes. A strong smell of whiskey accompanied the thought

The nuns had covered the coffin with thin black cotton, decorated with white rickrack braid and wreaths of wild daisies. Father Hyacinth, bearded, in gold and purple robes, big brown

feet in sandals, had never had such a large congregation and rather forgot himself. He proceeded with the full funeral mass, complete with holy water on the Protestant Muriel and her widowed Church of England husband.

Carrying the coffin up the steep steps to the cemetery was a struggle and Archie put on two extra men as he saw the coffin slipping. At the grave side, the Protestant minister said a prayer as we joined the nuns in singing Abide With Me and we buried Muriel.

The mountain wind breathed through the pines and around the valleys and I could hear the fife band of the Kashmir Light Infantry practicing the song Over the Sea to Sky, a touching farewell to a Scot far from her birthplace. I clutched Joyce as she nearly fell into the grave scattering her roses. The nuns took us all back to the convent for tea and cookies, calmly helping everyone back to normal and trying to help us accept the Indian thought that Muriel was meant to die there, at that time, and in that place. It was, as the Hindus say "Om..."—welcome to the Gods.







### **Book Review**

# The Orchid Thief

by Priscilla Friedersdorf

Susan Orleans wrote an article for the New Yorker magazine and then became so fascinated by the subject and the lore of south Florida that she took a leave of absence from the magazine and enlarged the material into the book The Orchid Thief. Orleans begins her narration, "John Laroche is a tall guy, skinny as a stick, pale-eyed, slouch-shouldered, and sharply handsome, in spite of the fact that he is missing all his front teeth."

Laroche, a thirty-six year old eccentric has been employed by the Seminole Tribe in Hollywood, Florida to set up an orchid propagation laboratory. Orleans writes, "When I first met him he lusted only for orchids, especially the wild orchids growing in Florida's Fakahatchee Strand. Orleans devotes two years to researching her book, most of it with the strange man, John Laroche.

Orleans first meets him in a courthouse in Naples, "He was wearing wrap-around Mylar sunglasses .... a Miami Hurricanes baseball cap, and worn-out grayish trousers that sagged around his rear ... He looked as if he wanted a cigarette." He has been charged along with his Seminole assistants for removing two hundred rare

chids and bromeliad plants from the kahatchee, a protected area.

This book is beautifully written.

Orleans describes our area of Florida in a way that affirms its appeal to those of us who live here. "I do not consider myself a Florida person. But there is something about Florida more seductive and inescapable than almost anywhere else I've ever been." Her clever eye and quick mind catch the nuances of the hodge-podge of people and ecology that have shaped the state. "Sometimes I think I've figured out some order in the universe, but then I find myself in Florida, swamped by incongruity and paradox...

She and Laroche tramp through the swampy preserves and visit the Indian reservations in her introduction to the background of his trial for orchid theft. She describes the destruction to the nurseries "that produced more than a quarter of all the orchids sold in the United States" by Hurricane Andrew in 1992. The insight into the workings and business interests of the Seminole Tribe with their five reservations covering ninety thousand acres is eye-opening. From their farms. orchards, beef cattle and casinos the sixteen hundred members of the tribe earn a phenomenal income.

monly known as the "ghost orchid." "It only grows wild in the Fakahatchee with other varieties "that either live wild or die." His defense in attempting to collect this rare flower rests on his belief that since he is working for the Seminoles who are exempt from the laws protecting endangered species, he will also be exempt as he sets up a lab to clone the orchids and sell them. "I explained to the tribe that if you have a lab you can take just one or two plants and from that you can grow billions."

There is not a boring passage in this book. Laroche and his eccentricities furnishes the humor and the theme but Orleans has researched the introduction of the "deathless plants" of Florida, the melaleuca, alligator



### Film Notes

# Angela's Ashes

By Priscilla Friedersdorf



The film, Angela's Ashes is a faithful representation of the memoir written by Frank McCourt about his childhood in Ireland. McCourt wrote, "More miserable

than the ordinary childhood is the miserable Irish childhood and worst yet is the miserable Irish Catholic childhood." So begins this beautiful but disturbing remembrance of a man who waited until his sixties to write of his journey through life. McCourt had the unique experience of being born in the United States and then returning to Limerick, Ireland with his family. Being the eldest he remembered an America, "Where no one has bad teeth and everyone has an inside lavatory.

The film portrays the family's struggles to survive in poverty. The father, Malachy (Robert Carlyle), is a goodhearted, intelligent man who is afflicted by the 'Irish disease' of drinking. The mother, Angela (Emily Watson) is sharp tongued but forgiving, worn out by childbearing and despairing from the deaths of her children through near starvation, sickness and destitution. The father's humor and unfailing though immature, optimism in spite of their plight make his son's love and

affection for the irresponsible man understandable. Young Frank is played by Joseph Breen, his is the stellar performance among the many exceptional actors

The family must accept the shame of appearing before the local council to obtain used furniture and bedding for their shabby water-logged hovel at the end of a lane. In a reference to the father's drinking habits a council member says, "We're not handing out money to support the Guinness family." The little boy Frank, appeals to the Virgin Mary, "Will you tell Jesus that we're hungry."

The film does not present the Catholic Church in a favorable light, which is a gross understatement. The hypocrisy of religion is the underlying theme. Frank's father goes with him to seek a place as an altar boy for the intelligent little boy but they are curtly rebuffed by the priest. Malachy tells the disheartened little boy, "It's class distinction. They don't want the boys

from 'the lane' as altar boys." The boy is shamed as his mother begs at the door of the priests' home for the leftovers from their table.

In spite of the poverty and deprivation the film is not maudlin but life affirming. The wonderful Irish humor permeates the dialogue and you will find yourself laughing at the ironies, dogmatism and prejudices the boy encounters in his struggles. 





# Applying For Student Financial Aid

illions of students applying for federal student financial aid this Lyear will find the process easier and faster than ever before, according to the US Department of Education, the nation's largest source of college student aid. In addition, tax credits of up to \$1 500 per student for tuition expenses paid last year are available for 1999 federal income tax files

Streamlined forms have cut paperwork significantly said U.S. Secretary of Education Richard W Riley, and with electronic filing a student s aid application can be processed in a matter of hours Furthermore, tax credits can make college or training courses more affordable and reduce the amount of income tax families owe

This year an estimated \$51.4 billion

in federal grants, loans, and work-study opportunities will be awarded to some 8 4 million students out of 10 million applicants Even students who are not financially needy enough to qualify for grants or federally subsidized loans are eligible for loans at interest rates lower than those offered by commercial lenders.

Following are some facts that potential applicants may find useful

Applying for federal aid is free Filling out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is the first step in the process Students can file electronically or on a paper application Most state and institutional aid eligibility is determined by the FAFSA so students should start there Students are also encouraged to talk to the financial aid directors at the schools they hope to attend to learn about financial aid packages and other sources of assistance Students can obtain an FAFSA at high school guidance offices libraries, or by calling file Federal Student Aid Information

Center toll-free at 900-433-3243 (TDD 900-730-8913)

Electronic filing is faster, less errorprone An estimated 12 to 14 percent of paper applications are returned for errors adding time to the application process By filing electronically, students can avoid delays because the software immediately identifies errors and allows for on-the-spot corrections FAFSA on the Web is now available to students to apply electronically through the Internet at www fafsa ed gov FAFSA on the Web can be accessed with many popular browsers, including Netscape Navigator and Microsoft Internet Explorer

Help is available by calling the customer service hotline at 1-800-801 0576 (TDD 800-511-5906)

Reapplying for aid simplified Reapplying for aid is simpler than ever Students simply add a minimal amount of new information on the 2000-2001 renewal form and update any information that has changed since 1999-2000 (family size for example)

Students can also reapply electronically by using the renewal version of FAFSA on the Web For renewal filing over the web, students are given an electronic access code or PIN that serves as the student's signature Parents will still have to sign if the applicant's a dependent Check with the school financial aid administrator for questions about the renewal paper or electronic FAFSA or contact the Federal Student Aid Information Center

PIN numbers now available The department will mail a PIN (personal identification number) to new students who apply for aid in the 2000-2001 award -year The PIN can be used to access the student's account information online, access renewal FAFSAs, and take the place of the student s signature for FAFSA on the Web applications in subsequent years Beginning March 6, students can make corrections to an aid application through the Internet

Other useful tips

Print carefully and clearly using only blue or black ink or pencil, no other colored ink accepted

Have the student's Social Security number ready

Use W-2 forms and carefully estimate tax information if federal income taxes have not yet been completed

Be aware of deadline dates for the schools to which ,you are applying While students have an 18-month window to apply for federal aid, some schools have early filing dates for their own institutional aid that may be based on federal aid eligibility (a list of state deadlines in the FAFSA instructions)

Some schools use only the federal form Others have a separate form for institutional aid so be sure to check with the school


Do not report parents when answering the question "how many, students in the family are attending college? but do report oneself even if attendance is less than half-time, and other family members who are enrolled in a degree or certificate program and who are enrolled at least half-time

The forms are processed by computer, so do not attach additional materials and write only in the marked spaces on the application, never in the margins

Be sure to sign the application or separate signature sheet for electronic files (except electronic renewal files which are independent) and have a parent sign if required

In addition to federal grants, loans and work-study, families can take advantage of education tax credits up to \$1,500 for the HOPE tax credit for each student enrolled in the first two years of college or vocational school, and up to \$1,000 for the Lifetime Learning tax credit for those beyond the first two years of study for students enrolled in vocational, college, graduate and professional schools, or adults taking classes part-time to improve or upgrade their job. These credits can be claimed by eligible taxpayers when they, file their 1999 tax returns In 1998 4.7 million families received \$3.4 billion in education tax credits.

After a couple of warm ups the band started to play their 11 minute arrangement of the West Side Story Medley featuring Jay Corre on tenor and Jim Trimbel on trombone and of course Buddy Rich on an extended drum solo. The Chez shook, thundered there was pandemonium in the club, Don Lamond turned to me, tears coursing down his face, and mumbled. "I'm glad I'm not a drummer, to compete with Buddy." Stan Kenton commented "Rich is serious, Buddy is playing better than ever and not only continues to be a phenomenon but now leads band worthy of his own artistic stature.

he sunshine in Southwest Florida offers a plentiful source of free solar energy to operate solar water heaters. Initially, the equipment needed to capture and store solar energy is expensive, but it can pay off in the long run.

### Dear Mom and Me:

My parents are beginning to develop some serious health problems. We live two hours from a major city, and close to a popular retirement area. We thought it would be ideal for them to move closer to us. I made contact with local doctors, but found they either were not accepting new patients, or did not accept Medicare. I talked to a retired physician, who has also recently moved here. I asked her what advice she would have for me. To my dismay she said that when she moved here no one would accept her either, and finally she asked one group, "Do you recall that you referred your patients to me in Boston, and now you cannot find a place for me?" Two days later she was called to say that they would accept her. How is an average person without contacts going to find a physician?

### Dear Mad,

Finding a new doctor at any age can be difficult. Being a Medicare patient makes finding a new doctor all the more difficult for a variety of reasons. Call your local hospital and ask to talk

with physician referral services. Most if not all hospitals have a physician referral programs to help individuals find physicians. Call the retirement community and inquire what physicians they use. After you identify some physicians, find out as much as you can about the doctors, see if the physicians are in good standing with the medical board. Talk to the practice manager to determine the physicians training and board certification Drop by the office and observe how the staff talk with patients. Talk to staff members to get a sense of whether you would be comfortable as a patient in that office. Mom, I remember when you moved you had a difficult time finding a physician. ..

PryceDear Mad,

Yes, I did have problems and this is a very real, national problem. From the best sources it is only going to get worse, much worse unless there are drastic changes. There are many reasons for our present health care problems. As soon as one problem gets solved it seems two or three more problems arise. Along with tighter budgets, and a growing aging population something must be done. See if your parents present doctor has any contacts in the new area, sometimes this works or at least you might get on a waiting list. Make sure all their records are up to

In the meantime if an emergency develops go to the local hospital emergency department.





I came home from my transplant having been gone for almost sevenweeks. My treatment was completed and my only job now was to regain my strength and resume my life. "Oh and, by the way, we'll let you know in a few months if the treatment worked." Thus it was that I stepped out of one journey and into another. Much like Mary Poppins jumping into the chalk drawings on the sidewalk only to leave when the rain came to wash them away, I jumped out of the now familiar and strangely safe existence of a cancer patient in treatment and into the tentative and unfamiliar domain of a cancer 'survivor". As horrible as my treatment nad been, there was a certain knowl-2dge that accompanied the months I

endured it. It was an understanding that my cancer was being treated, eradicated and battled on a daily basis. I had formed an alliance with the chemicals that, in spite of the horrors they brought to my life, I would endure it all for the promise of a cure. I had kept my part of the bargain. I had done the thing I could not imagine doing, survived what I thought was impossible.

It is the hardest thing to wait and see. Life does not stand still in anticipation of your outcome. My children were still looking for their shoes in the morning, asking what was for dinner at night. The laundry needed to be done and the dog needed to be fed. I began to reclaim lost pieces of myself though they did not fit into the same puzzle anymore. Every interaction with my children, every plan beyond the day, every feeling was altered, however slightly, by the fear and uncertainty that lay ahead. And in this fear and uncertainty was housed the most difficult emotion of all which was grief. Deep within my soul I grieved and there were no words to express the losses there. No way to explain to another person what they were. While people around me celebrated in the victory of my survival and the optimism of a certain cure, I disciplined myself to bury my sadness and loss in the presence of others. I saved it for my shower in the morning, for after my family left the house and I was alone, for the middle of the night when everyone was asleep. It was then that I would allow the deepest of feelings to see the light of day. I would learn to listen and validate, to

soothe and calm, and to rejuvenate again and again the one emotion that would carry me from one day to the next and to the next and the day after that ... and it was this emotion we call Hope that provided me with sanctuary from what was otherwise unfathomable.... a life without it.. # deaRPharmacist

Q. I just read my toothpaste tube and it says, "If you accidentally swallow more than used for brushing, seek professional help or contact a poison-control center immediately." What's so

dangerous? ET Orlando

A. The FDA requires this statement on dental products containing fluoride. The Poison Control Center says a child has to ingest about a half tube of tooth-paste before any problems would occur. But after ingestion, fluoride mixes with the chemicals in the stomach to form hydrofluoric acid and this substance is very corrosive. Young children don't control the swallowing reflex very well and typically swallow tooth-paste. Oftentimes, they fail to spit out and rinse after brushing. Hence, the FDA has strengthened its warning

regarding fluoride.

The American Dental Association feels this warning greatly overstates potential danger and may unnecessarily frighten parents. But there are published studies in the New England Journal of Medicine and JAMA that show accumulated exposure to fluoride weakens the bones and increases the incidence of hip fractures. There are fluoride-free toothpastes available at

health food stores Consult your dentist to find out what is best for you and remember, it's not so much the tooth-paste, but the additive exposure to fluoride through the public water system, mouthwash, dental treatments and fluoride supplements that could be a problem.

**Q.** I went to the pharmacy to buy some Dimetapp for my 5-month-old baby The pharmacist refused to give me a dosage and I can't understand why. He told me to call our pediatrician My wife gave him a half a teaspoon and he did just fine, but I still wonder, what's the big deal?

HY Apopka

A. There are vast differences in the way a baby responds to medication compared to an adult Since the FDA does not specify infant dosages for many over-the-counter products, pharmacists are in a difficult situation because consumers usually come to them first. Should they make an educated guess based on your baby's age or should they tell you to call your baby's pediatrician?

Most pharmacists won't assume the liability associated with giving you a dose when a call to the physician would be more appropriate because some products can be dangerous if given to children. In many states, cough syrups that contain codeine are available without prescription but are not recommended for children since they are more susceptible to serious adverse reactions. Many allergy medicines are not recommended for children because of possible stimulation, rather than

expected drowsiness. And finally, some over-the-counter remedies might mask serious problems and delay a parent from seeking medical attention.

Q. What are good ways to increase fiber in my diet and what are the best fruits?

JB Crescent City

Basically, any food that is plant-derived is a source of fiber Experts have shown that fiber is important to the prevention of some serious diseases, but diabetics beware...foods high in fiber are also high on the glycemic index. Bran flakes are an excellent source of fiber. Add some raisins or figs to your oatmeal and you've got a high fiber breakfast Salads, fresh fruit, vegetables, whole grains are all loaded. So are baked beans and yams.

Did You Know? Avocados are really fruits and they are a good source of B vitamins, potassium and iron. One medium avocado has about 30 grams of unsaturated fat, the most of any fruit

# Soy Soothes The Circuits In Body Cells


barraged with chemical signals that pester them to respond. Miraculously, they do a pretty good job of filtering out the "noise" and staying focused on their purpose. But some cells lose the ability to regulate these signals, and they react before they should. Researchers now believe this loss contributes to chronic diseases, such as cancer and heart disease.

Foods play an important role in filtering out this chemical noise. Test tube studies more than a decade ago show that a 4 in soy foodsgenistein dampens communication from the cell's surface to its interior. Now, an Agricultural Research Service study gives the first evidence of this dampening effect in an animal.

For four weeks, chemist Norberta Schoene, based at the ARS Nutrient Requirements and Functions Laboratory in Beltsville, Maryland, fed young rats diets containing soy protein with high or low levels of genistein. Then she measured how the animals' blood platelets responded. Platelets are quite sensitive to outside signals and so

are a good model for studying cell signaling. In three different tests, the platelets from the animals receiving the high-genistein diet showed less response to such signals.

Schoene's hypothesis- Isoflavones may reduce over-responsive signaling that produces chronic disease. For example, if an order to divide gets "heard" by too many cells, it could lead to unrestrained growth as in cancer or an overactive immune system.

Japanese diets on average contain about 10 times more soy than North American diets, and the Japanese have a lower incidence of cancer and heart disease. The genistein-rich diets in this study had the equivalent of twice the average Japanese genistein intake. The genistein-poor diet contained the equivalent of the U.S. intake of soy. Tofu, tempeh and miso are some soy foods rich in genistein and other isoflavones.

# Dietary Guidelines

The U.S Department of Agriculture and the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services announced in the latest Federal Register that the final Report of the Dietary Guidelines Advisory Committee is available for public comment.

Correct Posture With Laptop Computers

Hope Hospice was able to justify to the Agency for Health Care







# Video Games May Improve Kids' Eating Habits

fun, fast paced video game called Squire's Quest! might entice kids to eat more fruits and vegetables, according to the scientists who are creating and testing it. Researchers at the Children's Nutrition Research Center in Houston, Texas, are trying out the action-packed computer game with 1,600 children in Houston elementary schools. The Nutrition Center is operated jointly by ARS, Baylor College of Medicine, and Texas Children's Hospital. ARS is the chief research agency of LISDA.

chief research agency of USDA.

Kids in the United States only eat about two to three-and-one-half servings of fruits and vegetables a day. instead of the five servings essential for optimal physical and mental growth and development, according to Tom Baranowski, a professor of behavioral nutrition at the research center and Baylor's Department of Pediatrics. 3 Baranowski leads the team that is

developing and testing the video game as part of an innovative new nutrition education program.

Each child playing the video games starts as a squire and enters into training to become a knight. Knights help to protect an imaginary kingdom, called "Five-a-lot," from invaders bent on destroying its fruits and vegetables. As squires earn points towards various levels of knighthood, they learn about fruits, 100-percent fruit juices, and veggies. The video game is part of a series of ten, 25 minute-long classroom sessions in which kids make tasty virtual recipes with fruits and veggies. Then they set personal goals for making those recipes at home, and for eating at least one more serving of a fruit or vegetable at a specific meal or snack.

Baranowski developed the video game and kid-friendly, behavior-change curriculum in collaboration with Baylor assistant professors Janice Baranowski and Karen Cullen, along with health educator Lauren Honess Morreale and freelance writer Brenda Congdon. The scientists expect to finish analyzing the results of their education experiment by the end of summer 2000.





# Sarasota Is A Great Florida Getaway






By day, though, the world-renowned center of upscale shops, restaurants and art galleries of St. Armands Circle is hard to resist. Built



mark on the community of Sarasota in so many ways His profound influence transformed this sleepy fishing village into an arts capital in the 1920s, and this influence continues today with the John & Mable Ringling Museum Complex.

The classic architecture of the Museum of Art complements the unbelievable artwork inside, amassed during a lifetime of travels and collecting by Ringling Most impressive are the giant works by Flemish master Peter Paul Reubens, seen as one begins the circle tour of the museum A wall-sized Triumph of the Eucharist and Triumph of Divine Love in the first gallery prove overwhelming by their sheer size. But as we move on to the European Renaissance collection, we can't help but wonder at the deep, dark colors of the gallery walls, moving from deep purple to teal blue, and burgundy red, deep wine, and pumpkin. It contradicts all we have learned about hanging paintings on white walls so as not to detract from them.

The works of Jorge Manuel Theotokopoulos, son of El Greco, proved riveting in Gallery 14 the Spanish Gallery. Three of his impressive paintings, circa 1578 to 1631, proved riveting I had seen El Greco's

Crucifixion in the Louvre Museum in Paris while on a college study tour, and marveled at his son's mastery of his father's skill-especially since one of Jorge's paintings was labeled Crucifixion.

Don't miss the West Gallery during your visit to the Ringling Museum of Art, where an all landscape collection is on loan from galleries throughout the U.S. and will be continuing until March 15

Inhabited for more than 4,000 years, Historic Spanish Point in Osprey, is a remarkable 30 acre peninsula overlooking Little Sarasota Bay. Now Florida's largest state park, Myakka offers many ways to get in touch with nature by canoeing, bicycling, camping, fishing, hiking, or even airboating on upper Myakka Lake.

These are the sites we made sure to visit during our weekend getaway to Sarasota, but there are so many more you might enjoy. One of Florida's oldest attractions is Sarasota Jungle Gardens, with its lush, tropical grounds, winding brick pathways, flamingos, peacocks, monkeys, alligators, and even a giant Aldabra tortoise named Roscoe.

While on Longboat Key, stop in at the Mote Marine Aquarium, a working marine laboratory with so much to offer the naturalist. And right next to Mote Marine you'll find many feathered friends at the Pelican Man's Bird Sanctuary. Like Sanibel Island's Crow facility, the Sanctuary is home to more than 39 avian species due to injuries that prohibit them from surviving in the wild


Caloosahatchee River.
