

# Unique Raffle

Previous articles have detailed three of the prizes: a six-hour guided shelling tour, a \$500 shopping spree at Chico's and a beauty package from Sanibel Day

The final two prizes are unique in beauty and artistry. Fiber artist Maria Wohr, The Island Weaver, will contribute a one-of-a-kind, hand-woven wall hanging which could also serve as an oversized throw, with a finished size estimated at 52 by 74 inches. Originally from Fish Creek, Wisconsin, Wohr has exhibited and sold her weavings through galleries in such locations as Chicago, Nantucket, Naples and Donegal, Ireland. She has resided on Sanibel since 2000.

"I have always wanted to do some-thing for Zonta," she said. "I was hon-ored to be asked to create a unique weaving to help the club raise funds for their work." The piece will be woven from 40 different and mostly hand-painted yarns in a variety of textures and soft, peach and aqua tints reminiscent of a Sanibel beach at sunset. From design to completion will take an estimated 60 hours of the weaver's time and she will have used more than half a mile of threads: the completed work will have an estimated gallery value of \$2,500.

Rounding out the raffle prizes is a handmade, locally designed necklace sporting a miniature Sanibel pail and shovel crafted in 14-Karat gold on an 18 inch, 14-Karat gold chain. Donated by Congress Jewelers, who for several years has supported this event, this beautiful island-style piece has a retail value of



# Refuge Workers Ordered Not To Play Green Algae Blame Game

Iniformed employees and volun-teers at Sanibel's "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge have been ordered to keep mum when visitors ask who is to blame for the green algae in the impoundment.

Rob Jess, refuge manager, said Wednesday that he is not preventing employees from explaining the cause and effect, but has asked them not to point fingers.

Sanibel Vice-mayor Mick Denham, an eight-year refuge volunteer, who, along with other city leaders, has been fighting the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the South Florida Water Management District to stop releasing water from Lake Okeechobee, told the council Tuesday he felt "muzzled" by the directive.

The city is considering filing suit against the two agencies for sending polluted water down the Caloosahatchee River. They say it will destroy the estuary if it's not stopped

Denham told the council, "Something has happened which caused them to muzzle their staff and volunteers relative to these water issues. I find that somewhat disturbing." Now Denham is saying he may "have to rethink whether I continue as a volunteer. I feel extremely uncomfortable with my role there.'

Jess, who has been outspoken in the past on the effects of the fresh water discharges on the wildlife refuge and how to combat them, now says he's leaving it up to organizations such as PURRE

(People United to Restore our Rivers and Estuaries) and the "Ding" Darling Society to fight the releases.

Jess did say that he's very concerned about the state of the refuge, which is a world class birding attraction. "We have talked to a few birding experts locally and they are seeing some significant habitat changes.

"Some birds are utilizing the algae but a great many other species are going elsewhere," he said.

The water release issue has become a huge political hot potato. After stockpiling water in the dry season to irrigate the sugar cane fields that depend on it, water managers lower the lake level in the rainy season to prevent it from flooding towns to the south. In Southwest Florida, there's concern that continued releases will harm tourism, real estate values and human health,

Council member Steve Brown com-

mented that Jess was called to Atlanta the day he was scheduled to speak at the South Florida Water Management District meeting in Fort Myers earlier this month. "They must think we are dumb and stupid here. It is coming from Jeb Bush and

George Bush," Brown said Some 16 items on Tuesday's agenda related to water issues, and council spent several hours discussing them.

Sanibel's environmental director, Rob Loflin, said it was still unclear whether the turtle and shoal grasses, which sustain marine life, can recover. Loflin reported that Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation's marine lab was studying the grasses and had data that showed they had "taken a dive and are down to virtually stubble" and that ouster beds were dead. He said this concrete data can be valuable to the city's potential lawsuit.

Meanwhile, the high profile law firm of Beveridge & Diamond, hired by the city to develop a legal strategy, has met oneon-one with city leaders and will report to the council within 30 days on its findings and options.

Also, the City of Sanibel has obtained a date with the governor to talk about the lake releases. That's set for March 30 at 2 p.m. in Tallahassee.☆



# LeeTran Invites Public To Workshops

ee County citizens are invited to attend any of a series of public workshops to express their opinions about the future of public transit in Southwest Florida.

The workshops will be held on: Monday, February 27, 3:30 to 5:30 o.m., Lee County Public Library, 921 SW 39th Terrace, Cape Coral; and Thursday, March 2, 4 to 6:30 p.m., Lakes Regional Library, 15290 Bass Rd.,

Lee County Transit (LeeTran) is updating its development plan, a process that takes place every three years.

"The input we receive at these workshops will be used to help evaluate where needs exist," said Transit Director Steve Myers. "We want to hear from both users and non-users, to learn what enhancements will encourage them to use public transit more often.

Follow-up public workshops will be held in mid-April and early June for comments on the goals and objectives formulated out of the first round of workshops.

The draft of the updated transit development plan is scheduled for release on July 1.

# **FDOT Awards** Over \$7.7 Million

The Florida Department of Transportation has awarded the Lee County Port Authority, operator of Southwest Florida International Airport and Page Field General Aviation Airport, over \$7.7 million in new funding for four projects.

Three of the four projects relate to the international airport and funds were allocated as follows: \$6.9 million for construction of the new terminal: an additional \$420,000 for the runway rehabilitation project and \$237,000 towards the purchase of an aircraft rescue and fire fighting vehicle. The fourth project, the construction of taxiways at Page Field, received \$187,000.

"We appreciate the FDOT's support of these important projects at Southwest Florida International Airport and Page Field," said Robert M. Ball, executive director of the Lee County Port Authority. "These funds are essential to the continued expansion of both airports and permit us to meet the needs of our patrons now and well into the future."

Airport construction is funded with grants from the Federal Aviation Administration and the Florida Department of Transportation; airline rents and fees; and other airport revenue, including bonds. No property taxes are used for airport operation or construction.

# Sheriff Deals With County Growth And What Happens Next

In a very candid talk with the Sanibel-Captiva Lions Club Wednesday, February 15, Lee County Sheriff Mike Scott described how he is dealing with unprecedented growth in the county and the unanticipated disasters that are part of his day.

In 2005, his department responded to 45,000 calls for services ranging from a lost dog to Hurricane Wilma and the double homicide in Gateway.

To accomplish this huge task, the Sheriff's Department employes about 1,200 people who are divided almost equally between civilian support staff, jailors and patrol officers.

The Sheriff's Department also uses about 600 vehicles, including helicopters, boats, motorcycles and especially motor vehicles. Not surprisingly, the \$125,000 average monthly fuel cost to run these vehicles is his largest operating cost and his greatest concern. As he says, "You can't respond to 911 calls on foot." So he is not cutting costs by reducing services, but rather by working more efficiently.

The department has experimented with using hybrid vehicles, but ongoing experience shows that the hybrid cars are not as well equipped as regular patrol cars and don't perform as well on the

high end... meaning high speed chases. It takes a third of his staff to guard the 1800 prisoners that are currently incarcerated in the Lee County jail. In addition to providing three meals per day for the prisoners, the department must also provide medical coverage. This latter cost is mushrooming, and is a constant concern at the jail as at any for-profit enterprise. The modest fee that is charged each inmate is not much of a factor in reducing costs because so little of it is collected. Many immates are indigent when they arrive in jail and are unable to pay.

In response to a question concerning the wisdom of broadcasting areas of concentrated traffic enforcement, Mike countered that the whole idea is driver awareness in order to change driver behavior. Last year we killed more people than ever before were killed on our highways.

There are currently no cameras at intersections to catch motorists running red lights. The cameras that you see are there to monitor traffic backup in order to change the cycle time of the light.

Although Florida is looking into providing such cameras, there is not complete agreement on the fairness and efficacy of their use.

Scott does not see the need for enacting a new law against using cell phones while driving. In his opinion, there are currently careless driving statutes on the books that would cover accidents caused by the use of a cell phone while driving, and actually, eating while driving is more prevalent and therefore a greater men-

Scott's big push before the next "big one" is to install electrical generators at major intersections so they can be used to power traffic lights when power goes off. He will not use deputies to direct traffic when hurricane-induced general power outages occur because it is too dangerous.

Scott decided to end the question and answer period when someone asked him

what kind of wax he uses on his head. Actually, he has a full head of hair, but clips it short for low maintenance.

Long-time residents frequently comment that the Sheriff's Department has never been run as well, and with less bad news as the current one.

Perhaps Scott is applying some of his head wax to lubricate the vast, complicated, expensive machine that is the Lee County Sheriff's Department.\*





The Clam Bayou Preservation
Association (CBPA) has
changed its name to the Bayous
Preservation Association (BPA) to reflect
its expanded interest in the entire Blind
Pass ecosystem.

"As the Clam Bayou culverts were under construction, people started to ask me, "What about Dinkins Bayou and Sunset Bay and Blind Pass?" said Tim Gardner, one of the original CBPA leaders. "We, therefore, began holding meetings to determine the level of interest."

For the past six weeks, the BPA has held neighborhood meetings for the people living on the waterways on the west end of Sanibel and south end of Captiva.

"The response has been beyond our wildest dreams. By early March we expect to have nearly 400 members," stated Bill Vanderbilt, a Sunset Bay resident. What is also important is the vast majority of our members are registered voters."

In the short term, the BPA's goal is to support the Blind Pass restoration project. Lee County hand-delivered the permit application to the Florida Department of Environmental Protection in Tallahasee this week. Once it is initially processed the agency will post the application on the DEP Web site. Lee County anticipates construction in 2007.

"Our number one priority is to support the re-opening of Blind Pass and associated dredging and restoration in that area. We are hoping it will improve the environment for the entire ecosystem," Dr. John McCabe said. "In addition, we'll be working to include water quality monitoring and bottom profiling in the associated bays, bayous and channels, so we can document the improvement."

Gardner added, "This project demon-

Gardner added, "This project demonstrates the value of cooperation among individuals from a variety of agencies and backgrounds, all working together to improve an environmental situation."

The Bayous Preservation Association is a tax-exempt, nonprofit corporation dedicated to the protection and preservation of the Blind Pass ecosystem. The ecosystem includes Clam Bayou, Dinkins Bayou, Roosevelt Channel, Sunset Bay, Wulfert Channel, the Albright Island area and Blind Pass.

# State Launches Construction On Caloosahatchee Reservoir

The Florida Department of Environmental Protection and the South Florida Water Management District will begin construction of two Acceler8 C-43 (Caloosahatchee River) West Storage Reservoir test cells. The test cells will provide valuable information that will be incorporated into the final reservoir design.


The C-43 (Caloosahatchee River)
West Storage Reservoir will comprise a significant portion of the total water storage requirement for the C-43 basin. The reservoir will capture and store regulatory water releases from Lake Okeechobee, reducing the number and volume of harmful discharges to the coastal estuaries. The project will also will improve the health of the ecosystem by decreasing excess water flow to the Caloosahatchee estuary, revitalizing fish and oyster habitats by maintaining desirable salinity lev-

A special groundbreaking ceremony will take place Friday, February 24 at 9:30 a.m. at Berry Groves on State Road 80. Scheduled speakers include Florida Department of Environmental Protection Secretary Colleen Castille, South Florida Water Management District Governing Board member Alice Carlson and South Florida Water Management District Executive Director Carol Wehle.

Invited guests include members of the Florida Legislature; state, county and municipal elected officials and community leaders; and members of environmental organizations, agricultural community, recr. unal and business groups. In addition, water resources managers, project engineers and South Florida Water Management District Governing Board members will be available for interviews.

#### Star Watch By Gary Becker - Spring: It's Just Around the Corner

Thu

🕻 Perhaps you haven't noticed, but spring is just around the corner. Surc, you're saying! We have just experienced the heaviest snowfall of the season, and this weekend feels more like windswept Fairbanks than Miami. The weather may still be wintry, but did you notice how quickly the snow melted off the roadways and pavements from last week's storm? That is a certain sign of increased solar energy from a sun that is climbing higher into the sky each day. In fact, 🔭 today at noon the sun is 12 degrees higher in the south than it was two months ago on the date of the winter solstice, December 21. By the end of this week Sol has climbed an additional two degrees. If that argument is not persuasive enough, then observe the nighttime sky. By darkness at 7 p.m., Orion, with its three famous equally bright and equally separated belt stars, is due south and mid-sky. In the northeast the Big Dipper is beginning to make its annual ascent, handle down, cup up! Give the Earth an additional three hours of spinning, and the firmament will take on a decidedly vernal appearance. The Dipper's handle ares gracefully downward to a reddish Arcturus of Bootes the Herdsman, near the eastern horizon. The Pointer Stars, or top two stars of the Dipper, which help to locate the North Star, point in the opposite direction to spring's Leo the Lion, high in the southeast. To Leo's right is bright Saturn, now positioned due south by 10 p.m. Looking farther to the right, the luminous winter group of constellations, Orion, Taurus, Auriga, Gemini, and Canis Major are beginning to crowd the western horizon, literally on the way out. It's a sure sign of change when the bright stars of winter give way to the fainter luminaries in the east, proclaiming spring, www.astronomy.org





# 22007 Water Conservation Grants Available

The South Florida Water
Management District has initiated
the application process for its FY
2006-2007 WaterSIP Grant program.

For the current year, WaterSIP, which stands for Water Savings Incentive Program, will distribute up to \$1 million district-wide for projects that conserve a measurable amount of water. To date, WaterSIP has conserved more than 1.4 billion gallons a day.

This annual program provides match-

ing funds up to \$50,000 to water providers or community organizations for installing water-saving technology such as low-flow plumbing fixtures, rain sensors, fire hydrant flushing devices, and other water saving projects.



wallows are fast-flying, insectivorous birds that are highly migratory. They are told from the chimney swift by their deeper wing-beat and lighter under-sides, plus a longer, forked tail. Many swallows are seen zipping by, giving the observer only a guick glance by which to identify them. One must know what to look for, and have a quick eye.


If you are lucky enough to see the long forked tail of the barn swallow, which is our most abundant swallow, the ID is fairly easy. Others are not so simple, and seeing them coming is as important as how their rear appears. Look at the head of an

oncoming swallow, including the upper chest.

If the bird is immaculate white below, sharply contrasting to the dark dorsum, it is a tree swallow (unless you are in the far West). This species breeds over much of North America, except the Deep South, and winters along the gulf coast. Most birds are the flashy adults, with their blue-green backs a dead giveaway. In the far West, watch for the violet-green swallow, with its green back and white sides of the rump.

Two very common swallows throughout the Lower 48 are the bank and roughwinged, and they are rather similar except for their chest. Banks have a conspicuous band across the chest, set off by brilliant white before and after. Rough-wings have a





grayish throat, gradually becoming off-white on the belly. They superficially resemble a small female martin.

Joining the barn swallow in becoming more and more abundant is the cliff swallow, frequently seen in summer nesting under bridges and overpasses. The impression of a passing cliff is a very dark head, quickly becoming a beige underside. As they pass by, their beige rump will appear, but be warned that bank swallows have a bit lighter rump than their back and tail.

Looking very much like a cliff swallow is the cave swallow, which is expanding its range eastward as you read. They now nest in East Texas, and the Carribean population has begun breeding in South Florida. Most cave swallows have a light throat, contrasting to the cliff, and the cliff has a light forehead (colloquially called a flashlight), that really helps when seen from the bridge, looking down. These two species need a

# CROW Case Of The Week: White Ibis

n Valentine's Day Toni Westland was standing at the front desk in the administrative building at the "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge when a woman, out of breath, came running in. She said she had just

seen two "big white birds" wrapped up in fishing line out on the refuge. She apologized several times for not having her cell phone and relaying the information more quickly.

Westland, an education specialist at "Ding" Darling, got on the refuge's new radio system and put out a message to volunteer rovers on Wildlife Drive. In a short time rover Denny Souers spotted the birds and called back, telling Westland there were two white ibis caught in monofilament out in the water at the 2.5-mile mark.

"Can I get to them?" she asked.
"You need a kayak," replied Souers.
Intern Cheryl Parrott, who is trained
in the capture of injured wildlife, overheard the conversation and volunteered

to accompany Westland. Education intern Debbie Ruppersburg also joined the rescue party.

The trio drove to the maintenance shed, where they grabbed a kayak, paddles and life jackets. They threw the equipment in the back of a U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service vehicle and drove up Wildlife Drive. "It was a challenge maneuvering along Wildlife Drive because the visitors did not know the rush we were in to get to the entangled birds!" said Westland.

At the 2.5-mile marker, which is a high-use fishing area by a water control structure, the three women jumped out of the truck and launched the kayak. Ruppersburg stayed on the bank to help manage the crowd of onlookers already beginning to form.

Westland and Parrott paddled to the first bird, whose legs were tangled together by line and a two-inch lure. Parrott reached for the ibis and lifted up his head. The bird slumped to the side, dead. Parrott cut the ibis loose and wrapped him up in a towel.

"It was a terrible tragedy," she said.
"His feet were tied, he probably panicked and then drowned. This bird had no chance."

After the line was cut, the other ibis,

in shallow water near a tangle of mangrove roots, stood up and began to walk away. Apparently the two birds had been connected to the same line.

"We started paddling after him, and then he disappeared into the mangroves," said Westland. "Cheryl jumped into the water and followed him, but was soon sinking to her knees in the mud. It reminded me of when I lived in Wisconsin trudging through the high snowbanks."


The bird traveled close to 50 feet in the twisting mangroves before Parrott caught up to him. She had to hop into a tree to snag him.


Holding his bill in her hands, she looked around and realized she could not see the trail back to the kayak.

"Toni!" she shouted. "I've got the bird! Talk to me so I can find my way out!"

Westland kept up a stream of encouragement until Parrott had made her way back to the kayak with an extremely frightened and stressed ibis. Westland was still cradling the dead ibis in her arms. "You would not believe the crowd we had," she said. "People started asking questions and snapping pictures. They wanted to know what was going on or if the second bird would survive. As an educator, it was the perfect teachable moment, to show the public the devastating effects of improperly disposed fishing line."

Parrott checked the live bird's wings, and found they had normal range of motion. However, in the course of the examination Westland noticed an open





gash on his right leg, and so they decided to take him to CROW. Westland called ahead on her cell phone so the staff would be prepared for their arrival.

After handing over the white ibis to Veterinarian Dr. PJ Deitschel, Westland dropped off Parrott so she could clean herself up -- and returned to the scene of the rescue with Ruppersburg. "We were both angry and frustrated about the dead bird," she said. "We wanted to do something right then, so we put the kayak in the truck and went up to the next water con-

trol structure. We cleaned up fishing line for the next two to three hours... I ended up putting the monofilament we collected in a giant tub which I use for educational programs at the schools."

At CROW, Deitschel gave the ibis, who was very agitated, pain medication, antioxidant vitamins and valium. "There was a lot of mucous in his mouth, and his respiration was quite fast and labored," said Deitschel. "The good news was that the skin laceration had done little damage to the muscle itself."

Staff placed the ibis in a cage in intensive care. "One hour later the bird was standing but still pretty reactive," said Deitschel, "We anesthetized her and put in eight stitches. I was glad they brought him in because the wound could well have gotten infected in the wild."

Not long after surgery the ibis was frantically thrashing around his cage. "We started with bach flowers, but that didn't do much, so I gave him more valium," said Deitschel. "We didn't want him to hurt himself more or get all the other animals in the clinic excited and upset."

The next morning Deitschel was happy to see that the stitches were holding well and there was no sign of limping or lameness. However, the bird remained highly agi-

tated so staff moved him to the small flight cage, where he flew beautifully. With the bird flighted and his wound cleaned and closed, Deitschel decided not to impose the stress of captivity any longer.

That afternoon volunteer Jan Rutledge took him back to the refuge for release. It had been a harrowing 24 hours for the white wading bird. "Jan said he walked around a little bit and then shot off like a bolt," said Deitschel.

Westland views the case as a chance to raise awareness about monofilament and increase efforts at "Ding" Darling to remove hazardous hooks and lines. She would like to build on the existing programs to prevent future wildlife deaths.


"We need to be responsible, ethical fisher people," she said. "The birds fly into the refuge to rest and to feed. We need to do more for them, and continue to conduct periodic cleanups at the refuge. We have got to create better land stewards, and continue to push forward with more education. And it's not only birds. Manatees, dolphins and sea turtles and many other animals get tangled in fishing line too."

This Friday (February 24) a group of volunteers are meeting at "Ding" Darling for a three-hour cleanup. Westland said NBC-2 is planning to cover the event to increase awareness of this important issue. There are local families and groups currently conducting their own clean-ups at the refuge to help the cause – they welcome anyone visiting or wanting to help to call them.

"We would really appreciate the help, and so would the wildlife," stated Rob Jess, refuge manager. "Florida is historically the fishing capitol of the United States, and as long as birds, wildlife, and humans share the same space, we will all need to do our part in retrieving discarded and entangled fishing line." # The Simple Language Of Orchids **Adventure Stories About Orchids**

n our early years of the Sanibel-Captiva Orchid Society searching for a speaker for our annual December holiday luncheon, I askeď an old friend of mine, Barney. I had become friends with him in Master Gardeners.

I really befriended him as he sat alone, was different, in appearance only, than others. I was doing a weekly gardening show for WINK-TV and I often interviewed

Barney. He was an unusual, fascinating character who knew plants and the Fakahatchee Only after his untimely death did we

come to fully learn of the greatness of this modest, kind man.

Books now list him as the person who had the greatest knowledge of the Fakahatchee Strand State Preserve.

Finding his name in the best seller The Orchid Thief by Susan Orleans, I bought a copy for him and I underlined his name, and the words that he had the greatest knowledge of the Strand of any living person. He wept when he read the words. He closed the book and handed it back to me saying he did not have 10 dollars for the book. I gave it back to him with a hug and explained it was a gift.

Tears filled his eyes.

Barney was that kind of man. Thinking back, I vividly remember the day I asked him to be our key note speaker at the Sanibel-Captiva Forest Country Club Orchid Holiday Luncheon. At first he was most reluctant to accept the invitation as he felt we on Sanibel were different from him and his wife.

He had grown up in the Fakahatchee area in a family of very modest means. He shared with me that after serving in the war he had to come back to the Fakahatchee, to the area that he loved. and was home to him.

I recall so well his remark that after he had met our orchid group he felt so loved and accepted by our members that he wanted to return and share his knowledge of orchids with us.

At his invitation we visited his area and he showed us with pride the swamp that he felt so close to in nature - the swamp that was part of him.

Barney accepted our invitation to speak at the holiday luncheon that year and he was amazing with his knowledge of plants and his Fakahatchee slides that only he could have made.

He told me the next day that had been the nicest day for him and his wife in their entire lives.

Barney never got to keep his promise of returning to share his special knowl-edge of specie orchids with us - he died a few weeks later.

We have fond memories of this wonderful humble man that made us aware of the importance of the Fakahatchee -Strand State Preserve.

He is now an important part of the history of species orchids in Florida.

He has two Grammy nominations for Joe Lovano Celebrating Sinatra, and in 1998 he received vet another Grammy nomination for Joe

He has received jazz artist of the year honors for the third time from Down Beat magazine. In his 2002 Blue Note

release, Lovano explores the music of one of the great musical figures of our time on Viva Caruso. The album finds Lovano investigating many of the popular melodies made famous by the Italian tenor. In January of 2003, OH! By Sco LoHoFo, one of the most anticipated jazz projects of the new year, was released. # Symphony Welcomes Guest Pianist Nakamatsu

enowned American pianist Jon Nakamatsu will be performing Rachmaninoff's Rhapsody on a Theme by Paganini with the Southwest Florida Symphony on Friday evening, March 17 at 8 p.m. and Saturday evening, March 18 at 8 p.m. at the Barbara B. Mann Performing Arts Hall, 8099 College Parkway, Fort Myers, FL. The complete program follows:

Nakamatsu continues to draw unanimous praise as a true aristocrat of the keyboard, whose playing combines elegance, clarity, and electrifying power. Increasingly, critics laud Mr. Nakamatsu for his subtle and unmannered performances, in which his prodigious gifts are placed solely at the disposal of the composer. In the words of Richard S. Ginnell of The Los Angeles Times:

"Every note was also precisely defined, clearly articulated, with nothing smeared thanks to his light use of the damper pedal. He vividly caught the extraordinary scene-painting and impishness of

the conclusion of Schumann's Papillons and brought a cool, controlled drive to the finale of Mendelssohn's Fantasy in F-sharp Minor... Nakamatsu topped off the evening with List's transription of Schumann's Widmung (Dedication) and a fascinating rendition of Chopin's Polonaise in A-flat Major, building it gradually and patiently until the flags were waving grandly at the close."

A native of California, Nakamatsu came to international attention in 1997 when he was named Gold Medalist of the Tenth Van Cibhurn International Piano Competition, the only American to have achieved this distinction since 1981. Nakamatsu, who at the time was a high school German language teacher without formal conservatory training, seized the Van Cibhurn jurors and audiences with the polish, musicality, and technical brilliance of his playing – the result of many years of private piano study starting at the age of six.

Nakamatsu's brilliant but unassuming musicianship and eclectic repertoire continue to make him a favorite on the concert circuit. 





This is the life story of the gravel voiced, black clad entertainer Johnny Cash. Joaquin Phoenix is amazing as Cash and he is nearly equalled by Reese Witherspoon as country singer June Carter. Both stars have been nominated for Academy Awards for their roles in the highly acclaimed film.

Phoenix does a superb vocal replication of the husky voice of Cash and personification of his hard-edged life as a country singer from a hard scrabble life. Phoenix growls the harsh gutteral notes of Folsom Prison and handles his guitar in the same unique way as Cash. His portrayal is a tour de force.

The actors do not stint on the demanding vocal performances required for their parts. The most moving of these is the reinactment by Phoenix as Cash singing for the immates of Folsom Prison and the sexually and emotionally charged duet Going to Jackson with Witherspoon as Carter.

The long friendship/affair betwen Cash and Carter as they tour together becomes a series of missed opportunities and thwarted love betwen two people who have a strong attraction but commitments elsewhere.





Cash was the son of an angry, struggling, cotton farmer and his devoutly religious wife living in a camp furnished by the ERA (Emergency Relief Administration) during the '40s in Dyess, Arkansas. His difficult childhood, his stern, disapproving father, the loss of a much loved and admired brother and early years of futility as he seeks to make a living, all contrast with the enormous success he achieved with his music and song writing.

Čash is arrested for possession of controlled drugs, and his cynical father remarks, "Now you won't have to work so hard to make people think you've been to jail."

# Let Sleeping Pines Lie Until November 21

ith a moratorium until November 21 on any decision to eradicate Australian pines on public and private property, Council member Tom Rothman was worried that with another hurricane season starting in June, there are trees that could block evacuation routes.

He wanted city staff to report on any such trees,

He also wanted the city to survey residents on their wishes for the non-native trees.

"This would not be binding," he said, "but would give us some better direction..."

But other council members felt that the city staff was routinely doing its part to protect the evacuation routes and that the council's pledge to table the pines issue until November should be honored.

Council took no action on Rothman's equest.

Rothman also wanted to know what would happen to grants awarded pine removal.

City Manager Judie Zimomra said those grants involved removal of pines on public, not private property. She said she had already identified trees that could damage some of Sanibel's 116 sewer lift stations if they toppled.

A city vegetation sub-committee has recommended destroying Australian pines on public and private land.

Sam Bailey came to the defense of the pines, saying, "You can tell me to trim them," he said, but not remove them. "I am 82 years old and I am still pretty tough," he said. If the council tries to tell him to get rid of them on his property, he said, "You are going to have a fight."

# 48 Trevino Of Old Is Back On <sup>§</sup>The Links; Credits Revolutionary **Back Procedure**

Contr ed-ridden for two years suffering excruciating back pain, Hall of Fame golfer ee Trevino has returned to the Champions Tour pounding the ball nearly 300 yards off the tee and entertaining the galleries with his wit and humor. "I'm pain free. I plan to play the entire circuit. I might even play in some of the

majors this year," Trevino said last weekend after competing in the Ace Group Classic majors this year," Trevino said last weekend after competing in Naples, where he shot respectable scores of 71, 73 and 74.

Trevino, a two-time winner of the local event, credits his recovery to a remarkable advancement in back surgery that could revolutionize the treatment of back pain and provide relief for the hundreds of thousands - perhaps millions - of men and women afflicted with back ailments.

Sitting in the locker room of the Club at TwinEagles after last Sunday's final round of the Ace Group Classic, the 66-year-old Trevino enthusiastically described his surgery

last year in Cologne, Germany, known as X STOP.

More than 4,000 X STOP procedures have been performed in Europe, and just last month the practice was approved in the United States by the FDA. X STOP was developed by St. Francis Medical Technologies, Inc. of San Francisco.

X STOP is a titanium metal implant designed to fit between the spinous processes of the vertebrae in the lower back. It remains safely and permanently in place without


attaching to the bone or ligaments in the back.

The 45-to-90-minute procedure in which the X STOP is implanted keeps the space between the spinous processes open so that when a patient stands upright the nerves in the back will not be pinched or cause pain.

'I walked out of that hospital, went back to my hotel to rest, had the procedure checked the next day and flew home to Texas. I was home three days after I left," Trevino said, explaining there was no removal of bone or tissues.

We walked Trevino's final 18 holes last Sunday and he was the Trevino of old. He yakked and joked with the gallery, walked at a brisk pace, waved to passing cars and busses, and provided his fans with tips to improve their golf games.

Trevino explained that the medical community in the United States must be educated on X STOP before it can be practiced here. He recently participated in a seminar attended by 250 medical professionals where he described his amazing recovery as a result of the surgery.



Hall of Fame golfer Lee Trevino explains his revolutionary back surgery


"There's no rehab required. I'm telling you I feel like a new man," Trevino said.

With a slap on the back and a quick joke or two, the winner of six major championships in a 46-year professional golfing career, jumped to his feet and said he was off to Tampa where he will compete again this weekend in the Outback Steakhouse

# Golf History

Feb. 24, 1931 - Having retired from competition, Bobby Jones traveled to Warner Brothers studios in Hollywood to film the first-ever instructional motion picture, "How I Play Golf." Jones, who was paid a \$250,000 fee for the entire series, worked with performers such as W.C. Fields. Slow-motion sequences in the series were considered revolutionary at the time by some golf instructors who observed swing movements that they had never imagined.

# Golfing Tip

The chip-and-run shot is one of the most difficult parts of the game to master, yet it is the part of our game that we spend the least amount of time working on. This nonchalant approach to the chip shot is what separates the cream of

the crop from the remainder of the field. Here are a few easy steps to practice whenever you have that difficult chip-andrun shot in front of you. Narrowing your stance is the first bit of advice. If you are a right-handed player, put more weight on your left foot to keep the loft out of your shot. When you are ready to take the shot, play the ball inside your right foot with your hands positioned ahead of the ball. Finally, make a putt-like motion. keeping your wrists firm and strike the ball with a clean, crisp stroke.

# Golf Quality Corner: Rhythm

by Brad Murray

et's take a look at rhythm today.

Freddie Couples' long, languid, powerful swing surrounded by a gallery of graceful Eucalyptus trees at Riviera. Loren Roberts, the "Boss Of the Moss" with the sweetest, silkiest putting stroke I've ever seen rolling in an eight-foot par save to help secure a record third straight Senior Tour win down here in Naples yesterday.

Ice dancers sliding and gliding and spinning and shining in the Olympics. The Italian four-man cross country ski team with an inspired win for the home crowd. Ski jumpers timing a perfect take off and flying like eagles. Rhythm, inspirational examples surround us.

Here are a couple of thoughts in relation to bringing an oily, relaxed, natural rhythm to your golf game. I was playing a round of golf last week week with a friend down in Bonita Springs. On the front nine he was thinking too much and trying too hard and topping and miss-hitting too many shots. He was getting frustrated because he knew he could do much better. After the front nine I asked him what he was working on. He mentioned a couple of things he was trying to do and a couple of things he was trying not to do. He also had a new 3-metal and a new sand wedge that he was struggling with. He was definitely on overload.

I offered the possibility that he let it all go - all the trying and concern all the effort-

ing and grinding. Just breathe deeply, clear your mind and swing. Let your swing through the ball be your practice swing. Let go of the ego and the pride and the hoping and just make your swing. No need to add anything to it or take anything away from it.

Well, he began to find himself and his natural rhythm on the back nine as he

dropped all the thought he should or shouldn't do and relaxed, and made his "practice" swing his "real" swing. More relaxed, better rhythm and flow, more clubhead speed, longer, straighter, more solid shots, and a repeating swing action. I could actually see the tension fall away from his neck and shoulders and smile of contentment on his face.

The moral of the story is, "One ounce of letting go and relaxing is better than tons of trying and technical information. If you want to dig a little deeper into the concept of the kind of rhythm that is the result of relaxed concentration I highly recommend the book The Inner Game of Golf by Timothy Gallwey. His chapter called Relaxed Concentration and the Performance Triangle is particularly illuminating. I invite you to take a look. It's a great book.

When we get to the place where we are focused, with lots of feel and a clear thought, our natural rhythm will flow - effortlessly.

See you next week. We'll talk about simplicity.



For baseball fans here that share this love of the game, the day arrived as pitchers and catchers for the Boston Red Sox and the Minnesota Twins reported to Fort Myers for the opening of spring training. Position players will report this week, Wednesday for the Red Sox and Friday for the Twins.

With the opening of Grapefruit League play less than two weeks away, ticket sales are brisk for both teams.

Gordon Lowe, ticket manager for the Red Sox, said nearly all games in the 17-game home schedule are sold out except for the traditional day-night games March 3 with Boston College and Northeastern University and the final three games, March 27, Tampa Bay; March 29, Pittsburgh; and March 30, Cincinnati. Seats also are available for March 5 when the Red Sox will host the Australia National Team that will compete in the World Baseball Classic.

Some standing-room-only and lawn seats will be available on game days, he said. In addition, a few regular seats may be sold later if there are returns from group sales and other sources, he said.

'Ticket sales have been nearly as strong as last year's record sales when we had just won the World Series," Lowe added.

Across town, Patty Creem of the Minnesota Twins said spring ticket sales are ahead of last year as is the season ticket base.

The March 24 game against the New York Yankees sold out in minutes, and the March 2, 5, and 23 games against the Boston Red Sox also are sold out. Just a few tickets remain for the March 22 night game against the Cincinnati Reds that features a post-game fireworks show.

The Twins' 18-game home schedule concludes April 2 when the Twins will host their Triple-A farm team, the Rochester Red Wings at 1.05 p.m. "This is a very special event," Creem said, "as all of the revenues from this game will go to local charities. We hope to raise \$75,000 to help out local youth sports organizations negatively impacted by Hurricanes Charley and Wilma.

In the weeks ahead we will discuss in detail the rosters and outlook for both teams. But here's a quick look as spring training opens:

### Boston Red Sox:

Manager Tony Francona returns for his third season after a 95-67 record a year ago and having won the American League Wild Card. (They lost in the first round to the eventual World Series Champion Chicago White Sox.)

The lineup cornerstones returning are designated hitter David Ortiz, left fielder Manny Ramirez, catcher Jason Varitek, and pitcher Curt Schilling.

Gone, however, are center fielder Johnny Damon, shortstop Edgar Renteria, first baseman Kevin Millar, and pitcher Wade Miller. But the Red Sox did make some major moves in the off-season bringing in pitcher Josh Beckett, centerfielder Coco Crisp, shortstop Alex Gonzalez, and third baseman Mike Lowell.

The starting pitching last season was a disappointment, but with the addition of Beckett, and if Schilling returns fully recovered from ankle surgery, there could be a big improvement.

The key to success, however, is the power of Ortiz and Ramirez who combined last season for 92 home runs and 292 RBIs. There isn't another team in baseball, including the Yankees, who have such concentrated power.

### Minnesota Twins


After three consecutive American League Central Division championships, the Twins slipped to third place last season with a 83-79 record.





ive-time British Open Champion
Tom Watson may play his last
Masters next April if his present
plans prevail, he announced at last
week's ACE Champions Tour event in
Naples.

It is not that his game is slipping, the charismatic 56-year-old golfing Hall of Famer commented, but rather the yearly lengthening of the Masters course at August, Georgia.

Referring to the additional 285 yards tacked on for this year's event, Watson said that benefits "you know who," referring to Tiger Woods and his long-hitting competitors on the regular PGA Tour.

The youthful-appearing Watson, winor of an amazing 39 events on the PGA Tour, including eight majors, believes he is hitting the ball as solid and as long as ever, but believes the Masters is enough of a test of championship golf without stretching it out to unnatural length. Watson said that in addition to the monster length of the holes, the fairways at August are usually soft in April, adding to the course's difficulty.

In a wide-ranging interview in Naples during last week's tournament, where Watson finished tied for third, the Kansas native says he plans to play in 14 or 15 events this year, including five straight majors

Asked about the 400-plus-yard drives on the PGA Tour this year, Watson said

he believes the maximum lengths have about been reached with the current golf

"Manufacturers have taken advantage of the specifications and the new balls travel further and straighter," Watson added.

"I was always one of the longest hitters because I hit the ball high. The big difference now is that you can't work, or curve the new balls. Formerly, you could hit the ball high or low, curve it on purpose."

Watson said the Champions Tour, formerly the Seniors Tour is "name driven." "Arnold Palmer, Sam Snead, Lee Trevino and Chi Chi Rodriquez carried the tour in the early days."

Commenting about the longevity of Hale Irwin, still a top player on the Champions Tour at 60 years old, Watson described Irwin as "in great shape, tall and lean, with the perfect build for a goifer."

Watson foresees a healthy future for the Champions Tour with more big names from the PGA Tour, but is puzzled by the absence of Greg Norman, "I wonder why a great player like Greg Norman is not out here?"

Watson predicts an increasing number of foreign players on the Champions Tour, "and, we might eventually have a Ryder Cup type competition."

Such foreign stars as Mark James

(England), John Bland (South Africa), Jose Marie Canizares (Spain), Des Smyth (Irelaud), Mark McNulty (England), Vincente Fernandez (Argentina), and Isao Aoki (Japan) are regulars on the Champions Tour.

Watson also recommends playing different formats such as alternate shots, scrambles, skins and best ball to spice up the competition for fans.

Despite his record as one of the premier golfers of his era, Watson has never won an event in Florida. However, he has finished runner-up four times since 2000 in Naples, winning a total of \$579,980.

As Watson joked, "Second place isn't



# SAround The Islands With Anne Sanibel Pottery Turns 25; Cedar Chest To Show Ancient Artifacts

here are certain island businesses that are constants through all the ups and downs and changes that time

One is A Touch of Sanibel Pottery, which proves the point by celebrating its 25th anniversary this year.

If you haven't been there for a while, stop by. Despite its location at 1544 Periwinkle Way, the pottery is

a beautiful, calm space in the midst of the season's bustle. And it has many artistic and practical items so you're sure to find something you love, whether it be a set of hand-made door knobs or a wall plaque engraved with a heron.

It's been 25 years since Dave and Barb Hoggatt bought the business from Mark Heimann when it was called The Wheel, They were visiting from Indiana when they found out that the pottery was for sale, and they jumped at the chance. The Hoggatts - he was a marketing major and she had majored in elementary education had been operating a pottery in Indiana.

The pottery is a faith-based business and the Hoggatts feel as though they themselves are the clay in the hands of God and that He directs their work and their lives. Some of their creations contain scriptures etched into the clay by Barbara.

'It gives us an opportunity to reach out and touch someone," Dave said.

For a time, they lived inthe shop and Dave recalls bathing his baby daughter, Celia, born in 1984, in the big kitchen sink. In 1988, they remodeled and expanded the pottery, doubling its size. At one time, Celia's juvenile creations called gum savers, made by pinching gobs of clay, and her birdbaths, were big sellers in the store.

Their lighthouse oil lamps have been staples throughout the years, and as for their Sanibel souvenir mugs, "You can't ever

make enough," Dave said. Other items I noted include the butter keeper, a ceramic crock that allows you to keep the butter at room temperature so it's always ready to spread. All their ceramics are food-safe.

The couple also does custom work such as lavatories and back splash tiles. Cedar Chest Fine Jewelry is having its annual Rare Coin & Artifact show Tuesday and Wednesday, February 28 and March 1. This is a rare chance not only to see and feel ancient coins, Byzantine crosses and other items dating back several centuries BC, but also to buy them.

Many are presented as lovely pieces of jewelry, crafted with removable mounts so that the coins and fragments of coins are not altered or damaged, said John Pollard, who heads the store's coins and artifacts section.

Cedar Chest always has a fine selection of such artifacts, but for the show, it will more than double its display space and will bring in items such as a gilded Foo dog from the Far East, bronze oil lamps from the Juadea region of Palestine, and an eight escudo Spanish gold coin salvaged from a wrecked galleon from the Plate Fleet.

Pollard said Byzantine bronze reliquary crosses are very popular at present, and he will have several for the show in addition to those already in stock





Whitehall never sanctioned discord, nor Commons nor the House of Lord. The Zulus too did not want war Sir Bartle Frere, an awful bore for his own glory, on day of the dead moon sent boys to death, far too soon.

The story is told by a passionate fellow, as nannygoats graze and sheep bellow Zulus and English he knows all by name, all still remembered, in battle the same. After three hours his story is done There's not a dry eye, not even one. We whisper with him to the African air "salagahle" -my dear, go in peace . . .


Black History Society. The featured speaker was Dr. Harold Russell, chairman of the Diversity Committee at International College.

Parks, known as the "mother of the civil rights movement," was the brave woman who refused to give up her bus seat to a white passenger in Montgomery, Alabama in 1955. She passed away in 2005 at the age of 92. She was the first woman to lie in state in the Capitol Rotunda in Washington, DC.

The Intermodal Transfer Center, now known as the Rosa Parks Transportation Center, was opened in November, 2000 as a hub for all forms of public transportation in Lee County, mainly the Greyhound and LeeTran bus lines. The City of Fort Myers donated the nearly two acres of land for the Center and the Florida Department of Transportation contributed \$2.3 million of the cost. Lee County built and operates the center.\*


# Reading Series Features Poet Ritchie



# 74 Book Review ₹ Too Many ₹ Questions



The new book of short stories by Sanibel resident S. R. (Bob)
Maxeiner, Jr. has eight stories and the first, Valentine's Day is a perfect reminder of the reaction most of us have to the silly and sugary passages confronting us on the racks as we seek the obligatory card for our loved one.

Willoughby scans the ridiculous verses remembering painfully the year he forgot a card and learned the real message: "If Mama ain't happy ain't nobody happy", and he chooses.

In this collection Maxeiner has focused on the everyday experiences of our lives and the impact we sometimes have on others. Back-up is a conversation between two people, each alone and both seated in the worst section of a restaurant. Brian is a short, sensitive portrayal of a high school boy who has caused the death of another person. Too Many Questions is a long story, at nearly one hundred pages almost a novelette, about a high school girl who is harassed by two young men who are guilty of a crime which she alone unravels.

The most touching story is Fish in which an older man swims effortlessly and reflects on his life; but is he swimming or suspended between life an death?

# U.S. Pullout Could Mean Iraq Civil War, Speaker **Predicts**

esponding to a question from the audience, Middle East Scholar Reuel Marc Gerecht predicted a possible civil war in Iraq if American troops are withdrawn prematurely from the three-year-old conflict in the Middle

"No," Gerecht responded to the question, "Can democracy survive in Iraq if the U.S. pulls out its troops?

"Some people, like Donald Rumsfeld (secretary of defense) would like to pull out sooner than later," Gerecht told the capacity crowd in Schein Hall, "but it is not going to happen.

"There may be a gradual reduction, with a shift to fire fights with the insurgents," Gerecht continued before The Distinguished Scholars lecture series, sponsored by the FORUM at BIG ARTS on February 15.

But, there will be a worse case scenario if the Americans pull out; things will fall apart, there will be sectarian strife, a good chance for civil war and all hell will break loose." Gerecht added.

Speaking on the subject, Whither Iraq, Gerecht, a resident fellow at the American Enterprise Institute and a former agent at the CIA, Gerecht defended

the decision to invade Iraq.

When asked what if the United States had not invaded Iraq, Gerecht commented that Saddam Hussein might have continued his territorial ambitions and resumed production of weapons of mass destruction.

"It is naive to believe he (Saddam) would have abandoned his aggressive appetite," Gerecht added.

Another provocative question tossed at the speaker was whether the U.S. should bomb Iran's nuclear facilities.

There is a lot of internal turbulence on this issue inside neo-conservative circles," Gerecht stated. "There are three or four nuclear facilities crucial to the

Iranian program, and if we blow these up it would retard their program. Rest assured, the Iranian cleric leaders want this weapon.

Gerecht praised President Bush's decision to intervene militarily in the Middle East as helpful in breaking the cycle of dictatorships in the region and spreading democracy.

However, Gerecht opined, the election by Palestinians of the Hamas Party should result in a "cut off of all aid" for that country because Hamas is a "without a doubt, a terrorist organization.

Despite his support, Gerecht stated, "In Iraq there are many things to depress you such as the level of violence. We

should have been more aggreesive against 75 the insurgency, but I see no diminuation any time soon in the level of violence."

Asked about the relatonship between Iraq and Iran, Gerecht said "they are not passionate brothers, more like distant cousins.

"Not very good," Gerecht responded when asked about the quality of U.S. intelligence in the Middle East. "We have never had a good intelligence collecting ability there, but you are never going to solve your problems by intelligence

Gerecht noted as an example of poor intelligence in the Middle East, the CIA reports back in the '50s that the Shah of Iran would rule into the 21st century.

Citing Egypt as another example of emerging democracy, Gerecht foresees "the crack up of tyrannies, and the growth of democracies" in the Middle

In his present position, Gerecht studies Iraq, Iran, the Middle East, Afghanistan, Central Asia, the former Soviet Union and terrorism. He was educated at John Hopkins University, Princeton, University of Edinburgh, Cairo University and the American University of Cairo.

The speaker was introduced by Dick Wright, FORUM chair, who also moderated the question and answer session. Gerecht was the guest of honor at a reception in Phillips Gallery immediately following the lecture program.☆



# Nationwide ACT Test Deadline Is March 3

ollege-bound high school students can take the ACT assessment on April 8, the next nationwide test date. The registration postmark deadline is March 3. Late registration postmark deadline is March 17. The cost is \$29 without and \$43 with the writing test (an additional \$18 fee is required for late registration).

Students can receive registration information from their high school guidance counselors or they can register on ACT's

website at www.actstudent.org. The website also features test tips, practice tests, online test prep, and a database for students to find out if a prospective college requires a writing score.

ACT scores are accepted by virtually all colleges and universities in the nation, including all Ivy League schools said Ken Gullette, spokesman for ACT.

Scores are used, along with a student's high school GPA, high school courses taken, extracurricular activities and other information to help determine if a student is academically ready for college-level coursework.

"In April, many juniors take the ACT," said Gullette.

"When they get their scores, they

should examine them carefully, talk with parents and counselors, then get extra help from tutors or peer helpers and take courses that will strengthen any academic weaknesses. Students can retest early in their senior year and then report only the score they want colleges to see."

The ACT assessment is an achievement test that includes four exams; English, reading, math, and science. Students who take the optional writing test will add 30 minutes to the 3-hour normal testing time. Most colleges and universities don't require a writing score, so students should check the writing test requirements of colleges they're considering before registering for the ACT.




