Council Grapples With Budget And How To Fund Bike Path Upgrade

Thile Lee County, Fort Myers and other local governments are promising cuts in property tax rates because of windfalls from growth and higher home values, on Sanibel, it's quite a different story.

With the island close to build-out, growth is virtually stagnant, so Sanibel can't count on substantially higher ad valorem revenues like other Southwest Florida governments.

Sanibel leaders seem destined to raise the millage rate this year if they want to maintain existing services and carry out current projects. They also want to add to the budget \$1.5 million to make the Periwinkle bike path safer.

Council had hoped to set the millage rate on Tuesday, but after more than five hours of discussion on the fiscal 2006-07 budget, the members deferred the decision to 9 a.m. today, Friday, July 28.

They must meet an August 3 millagesetting deadline, which is the first step in the state-mandated budget process. In the meantime, council members were hoping to scour the proposed budget for items they can shave to help pay for the bike path realignment and other projects they consider necessary.

Kids' Fishing Event To Kick Off "Ding" Darling Days







Council Grapples With Budget



Sanibel City Council's considering adding \$1.5 million to the budget to realign this stretch of bike path along Periwinkle Way between the Sanibel Steakhouse and Casa Ybel Road because they consider it dangerous

On Tuesday, they tried to focus on "big ticket items" in the staff-prepared \$44 million tentative budget that calls for a millage rate of 2.4801 — the same rate as the current fiscal year. That rate would generate \$12.361 million in fiscal 2006-07. That's \$2.143 million more than this year — but not enough to pay for for all the added costs such as a possible lawsuit over releases from Lake Okeechobee.

The bike path realignment project was not in the budget but the council seemed unanimous in wanting to add it. The council members don't want to delay a solution to the dangerous situation much longer. It's been discussed for the last 11 years.

A slightly higher rate of 2.5 mills — which equals \$2.50 for each \$100,000 of appraised value — was discussed, but that would generate only about \$100,000.

Sanibel property has an appraised value of \$4.957 billion, up from \$4.092 billion last fiscal year.

For the owner of a home with a taxable value of \$620,000 — the average — the tentative 2.4801 millage will amount to \$1,537 in taxes. In addition to the operating



millage, Sanibel citizens will pay for several projects they voted for including 0.0475 mills for land acquisition, 0.2363 for the sewer system and 0.1145 for the recreation center. That would bring the total taxes for the average home to \$1,784.

Once set, the milage can be reduced but not exceeded.

Besides not getting a share of the causeway tolls the city used to count on, and with the possibility of losing revenues from the weigh station, which the county wants removed from the new causeway, city leaders are faced with higher costs for everything including payroll and insurance.

Sanibel is still paying for loans for the sewer system, settlement costs from the lawsuit it lost to the county over the drawbridge, and costs associated with Hurricane

Charley.

Sanibel property owners will, however, benefit from Lee County's proposed 11 percent tax cut made possible by a 40 percent hike in property values. County and school board taxes account for the largest portions of the taxes Sanibel owners pay.

t 9 a.m. on August 1, council meets at city hall. We regularly meet the first and third Tuesdays each month- all day. We hear comments from the public, review reports and updates from the staff, sometimes hold hearings on pending ordinances (local laws), and deliberate a range of policy and budget questions.

August 1 is the first day for filing your comments on the Army Corps planned water releases between now and 2010. Call city hall for directions at 239-472-

At our meeting, staff will provide the results of its study of accommodating both vehicular traffic and a shared use path not adjacent to the traffic in the section of Periwinkle between the Sanibel Steakhouse and Casa Ybel Road. For over 11 years this topic has been discussed. How long should it take until a solution is implemented? How long is it acceptable to play roulette with safety issues? Hopefully, no senior or small child ever will be hit by a car. But it could happen. Should we be cautious? What options exist? How does one decide which option is best? How long will it take to implement a solution? Are the choices so difficult to implement that "passing the buck" to the next council is the solution? In 2004 the then council had taken steps toward a solution, but Hurricane Charley knocked the item off the city agenda. Now, we're approaching

Also on August 1, staff will bring council its analysis of the recent business roundtables. For three days, in 15 workshop groups, island business leaders discussed their challenges. It was the third step in a systematic effort to assess how the residential community and the business community can most successfully integrate into our barrier island natural environment. Prior to the roundtables, the city conducted a survey of resident

views on island business as well as a survey of occupation license holders to learn of their concerns and challenges. All this data will help plan the future.

In a recent address to the Chamber of Commerce, I noted that the island's external environment is changing - new bridge, new population boom, polluted water releases from Lake O. The island's population is changing – a new generation, not totally familiar with the struggles in the 1970s to create this environmental sanctuary, a generation young enough to want Wi-fi access. The island's businesses are also changing - struggling with natural disasters, tolls, the need to revitalize facilities and increased off-island competition. Together we're turning a corner. While it is common to use such moments to catalog past problems, fears about the future, and to long for "the good old days," it is principally the time to identify

and pursue new opportunities.
What's next? What needs to be improved? What needs to be protected? Which tasks belong to the local government? Which belong to the business community - the chamber or other business organizations formed around a location or because of business type? Do residents have a role is creating a healthy balance between the natural and built environments - residential and business? Should residents reconsider their purchasing routines and shop more on-island? Is a healthy business a "cookie-cutter" business, identical to those off-island, or is being unique important? Is a healthy business the biggest in size and volume or does quality sometimes trump quantity? Where's the line between survival of the fittest and survival of the most creative?

When Bill Gates was a one-room operation, he was far from the fittest. He was the most creative. He was provided a lot of technical assistance to get his ideas into the mainstream. Could island residents with special skills offer expertise to island business? What's the chamber's role in offering technical assistance to non-members who might become tomorrow's members? Could the city's permitting process be more accessible? Are parts of the Land Development Code hard to understand? What's next for our small business initiative?





Storm Reparation For Captiva And Sanibel Includes Beaches

he dredge is gone, the beach is wide, the groin is complete, the pipes are loaded and moved. The 2005-06 beach renourishment project for Captiva and Sanibel is finished except for some beach vegetation plantings. The focus has changed.

Hurricane season is upon us and we're focused on preparedness. Personal preparedness, organizational preparedness, community preparedness... and, yes,

beach preparedness.

Coastal Planning & Engineering Inc., the engineers for the project, has been actively involved in beach preparedness. Over the past year, their engineered projects have resulted in 11.7 million cubic yards being placed on Florida's beaches through beach nourishment. This is enough sand to fill 5 million pickup trucks, or cover 2,000 football fields with three feet of sand, or build a three-foot by three-foot mound of sand that would reach from Miami to San Francisco ... and back. On Captiva and Sanibel alone, they placed more than 1.3 million cubic yards of sand along the Gulf shoreline

between fall 2005 and spring 2006.

While most of us think the best use for a beach is lounging, walking or playing Frisbee, its most important use is for storm protection. Wide nourished beaches make the Captiva and the northern 6,000 feet of Sanibel's coast safer from

Tom Campbell, president of Coastal Planning & Engineering, edited a special Spring/Summer 2005 issue of Shore & Beach, a quarterly peer-reviewed technical journal published by the American Shore & Beach Preservation Association, which focused on the 2044 hurricane season. "It was very clear that nourished beaches performed better than non-nourished beaches during 2004 hurricanes, Campbell said.

He also prepared an analysis of the impacts of Hurricanes Katrina and Rita. While wide beaches didn't make much difference in areas hit directly by these huge atypical storms, he did find that huge areas outside the "bull's-eye" were protected by wide beaches.

Over the last two hurricane seasons, it has really been brought home to me how important beaches are in reducing human misery resulting from storms," he said. "We may not be able to slow a direct hit like Katrina, but we can make a big difference in lesser hurricanes and outside the eye of the big ones.

A study by Dr. Robert Dean from the University of Florida found that in a 50-year storm event, a 50-foot widened beach reduced storm damage by 24 percent and a 100-foot widened beach reduced it by 39 percent. This happens because sandy beaches absorb the "punch" of the storm surge along the

Reducing storm damage is a good thing for everybody. For those right on the coast, it may mean the difference between a home or no home. For everyone else, it means a faster recovery and less community impacts such as loss of tourism or loss of tax base, which could result in fewer jobs and higher taxes. Right now, the state of Florida is conducting a study of the effect on property values in communities hit by the hurricanes of 2004 that come from having a healthy







Al Nave was born in Bradenton Florida in 1927 and came to the islands for the first time with his mother and stepfather Martin and Sadie Hiers in 1939 to look for shells, which were plentiful at the time.

Martin later bought property and built a home on Donax. At close to the same time Martin started work on the Hiers Cottages which would eventually become Hiers By The Sea on West Gulf Drive where the Condominium By The Sea now sits. Al had just gotten his plumbing licenses and Martin needed a hand in building the cottages and also with the plumbing.

Al and Goldie came down from Bradenton where they lived and Al would work from sunup to sundown for \$100 a month and all the beans and fish they could eat no fresh vegetables because there were none or a place to store them.

The cottages were built with concrete made from the sand and shell gotten from the beaches. A little side note here: I can personally testify that was some of the hardest concrete ever made as we worked on the cottages through the years. Drilling the walls could burn up drill bit after drill bit.


Goldie always says the bugs and mosquitoes were so horrible you just can't imagine. As people (there we about 100 people on the islands at the time) learned that Al was a plumber they began to ask him to do small projects and thus he and Goldie decided to start Nave Plumbing. Al and Goldie purchased the property which is now Sanibel Square from an attorney in Fort Myers, Dixie Biggs.

In 1949 they began to build their first home on Sanibel. The home, which was an A-frame home, was 14 feet by 16 feet and is still there today and forms the main structure of Goumas Chocolates in the Sanibel Square Shopping Center. Total cost of construction: \$500. They lived in the home for about a year with no electric or water. Eventually water and electric came and they built on an addition and the children were

Al, Goldie, and kids Chuck, Curtis and Yvonne lived in the home until they built a new home in Caloosa Shores, a subdivision located just off Wulfert Road. and moved in 1969. They lived here until they sold the home and constructed a new home on the Nave Property and moved in 2001.

Through the years there have been a lot of businesses come and go from Sanibel Square among them Si Bon a French style eatery, The Nimble Thimble, a sewing center, Dr. Gentry who was where Gournas Chocolates now stands, Tuesday's Child, Dunham of Maine, a men's clothing store, Sanibel Glass and Mirror, Henderson Print Shop, and an art gallery just to mention a few.

Nave Plumbing in the first years did everything for everyone, gutters, pumps, wells and just about anything that anyone needed done. Al worked and Goldie did the billing and they worked together to build a business that is still thriving business today. There were many famous clients throughout the years J.N. "Ding" Darling, Kendall Gillette from the Gillette Company, Alice O'Brien with the 3M Company, TV announcer and actor Durwood Kirby, and of course Porter Goss and many, many others that escape me at the moment.

Al took on any and all jobs from the plumbing end from building his own septic tanks to the other end of the spectrum which included us helping on the building of the sets for a motion picture Night Moves which stared Gene Hackman and was filmed on Sanibel, much of it at Woodring Point. The inside scenes were filmed at a set that was built inside a building at the old Casa Ybel resort.

We watched the movie when it came out and I recalled one scene where the actors were inside the set at Casa Ybel at a sink and we were on the other side catching the water in a five gallon bucket.

In the early years the winter visitors to the islands would call with the date they were returning and ask Nave Plumbing to light their gas water heaters and appliances so they would be all set when they arrived.


Al and Goldie said recently that the only business on the islands at the time of their arrival was Bailey's (the old store on the bay) and Jack's Place, a small eatery where the Dolce Vita now stands. It was at very best and worst an interesting time.

There have been several interesting people, or as Al and Goldie call them, "characthat have worked here over the years and many of them have left very interesting stories behind. One such character was Irv Rhodes, an amazing plumber and a prototype Florida Cracker. Now Irv liked to roam the islands and fish, drink and upon occasion wreak havoc on local watering holes. Among his great interests was alligator hunting which at the time was looked at a bit differently than today.

Al tells the story that salesmen came across on the ferry and brought new plumbing parts and ideas and tried to sell their products. On one particular occasion a gentleman

salesman from New Jersey came across on the ferry and, according to Al, this guy had never seen any animal in the wild except maybe a stray cat or dog. Al and Irv were taking the salesman back to catch the ferry for his return trip after his sales pitch and toward the end of what is now Periwinkle, which was then a dirt road with sawgrass and cattails on each side, a five-or-six foot alligator crossed the road. Not wanting to let this opportunity passed Irv shouted to Al to stop the truck whereupon Irv dove from the truck and into the cattails and sawgrass and onto the back of the gator. All that could be seen from the truck was Irv's legs and an occasional gator tail whipping through the air. After five or so minutes Irv came out of the bushes carrying the gator and proceeded to break its neck and lay it on the side of the road and told Al they would pick it up on their way back. "Al started the truck, Irv got back in and they continued their trip to drop off the salesman at the ferry landing.

Al looked across to see this poor "city fellow" who had by now turned a deep shade of pale. He either could not or would not utter another word. They loaded him on the ferry and waved goodbye. Till this day Al doesn't know if the guy was in shock

or simply swallowed his tongue out of fear.

We have spent a lot of time working at the business. Al and Goldie have instilled a very good work ethic in each of us. We have learned that earning an honest living with your hands is not a curse but something you should take pride in.

Through the good and bad times Al and Goldie persevered and have passed down a legacy of hard work, honesty and a genuine love of the islands to everyone who has come in contact with them.

The Naves have raised three children and have six grandchildren and four great-grandchildren. Along with a good work ethic they have also given the children a great love for sports. Yvonne went to college on a softball scholarship and currently has a daughter who is very active in basketball and other sports in high school, Chuck, Curt and I have played every sport known to man. Al still plays in a men's softball league in Fort Myers for men over 70. Chuck plays baseball in the Roy Hobbs league often alongside his son Chad. Curtis and I still play softball and we have brought home a long sought after prize. We have been lucky enough to be players on the Florida Heat/Nave Plumbing/Joe Blacks/ Worth softball team that has been World Champions three times. So it has not always been all work and no play.

While recently clearing some old stuff from the barn in the back of the property we came upon some of the old equipment that we used during the early years. Among them was a road jack machine that we used to drive pipes under the road for Island Water Association so they could set meters on the opposite side of the road from the mains. Also well driving equipment that we used to drive wells before city water. This brought back a lot of memories and made me think what it must have been like back

when Al and Goldie came here.

Slowly the islands grew and so did the plumbing business and the property, a building here and there all built by the family and workers mostly during summer slow time.

Sanibel and Captiva were different back then. When there was a job to be done there were no addresses just names – the Bailey house, the Gray Gables and so forth; everyone knew where to go simply by name. Al became involved in the volunteer fire department and was the chief for 25 years. The times we far simpler, everyone knew everyone, there were dances at the Casa Ybel, fish fries on the causeway, and a real sense of community, although no one thought of it that way.

I have heard all the stories about the ferry boat rides and the fact that Captain Crumpler knew that all the women on the island we pregnant before the husbands. They would take the ferry to the mainland and see the doctor and then inform the captain that they were with child and may need an emergency trip at a certain time.

The Naves have watched the islands grow from a bug-infested mosquito haven to the wonderful place it is today.

The causeway made a big difference with commerce and the number of people that now call the islands home. There have been hurricanes and tropical storms. The one most remembered by Al and Contain was Donna of 1960. There was a radio tower on the property and Al climbed to the top during Donna's eye and took pictures.

Among Al's favorite stories, and he has a million, is the one about his first meeting with "Ding" Darling, who was staying at a cottage at 'Tween Waters. During the early times of Nave Plumbing there were no telephones so all requests for plumbing were

made by word of mouth or by letter.

Where the Barrier Island Title is today was once our plumbing office and warehouse. We didn't always man the office and if someone needed something they would simply come in get it and write down what they got on a sheet of paper. That is the way business was done back then. We had no contracts just your word and a handshake.



I listen to the stories that they tell and count myself lucky to have been around long enough to have experienced some of the wonderful times that the entire family has had.


The people that have been so much a part of the development of the islands have such a rich history and we are fortunate to still have some of the real "old timers" to share island history with us.

Registration

The next ACT test will be administered on September 16. College-bound high school students who wish to take the exam must register by August 18, the deadline for having the registration postmarked. There is a late registration postmark deadline of August 25, but an extra fee is charged for late registrations. Students can register online at www.actstudent.org, or registration forms can be picked up at high school guidance counseling offices.

The cost is \$29 for the traditional ACT and \$43 for students who choose to take the optional ACT Writing Test. Some colleges require a writing score but many don't, so students should find out the requirements of prospective colleges before registering for the exam.

ACT scores are accepted by virtually all U.S. colleges and universities, including all Ivy League schools.

ACT's website (www.actstudent.org) has helpful information, sample tests and the opportunity to order inexpensive test prep materials.







"Nan had the ability to make every person, no matter how insignificant, to feel loved. Everyone she met felt impor-




Funds Wanted For Girl Needing Transplants

fundraising account has been established for Brittni Colas, a 14-year-old Fort Myers girl who needs four organ transplants. Brittni has been diagnosed with rare vascular malformations that have caused portal hypertension and internal blood clotting.

Friends and family are rallying around Brittni to help her as she waits for life-saving

medical care. Organ transplant recipients of Southwest Florida, Inc. are also reaching out to her by offering financial and emotional support.

On July 14 heart transplant recipient Mike Terry visited Brittni at her home to learn more about her situation and offer her the resources of The Fletcher Fund. While Brittni has health insurance, her family must still pay for numerous medical and travel expenses.

"She's a brave young girl, and her mother has done a lot to find her the right care, said Terry. "We're hoping The Fletcher Fund will help Brittni make it through this difficult period, and that she will have successful transplant surgery soon."

Britnni needs transplants of the liver, stomach, pancreas and bowel. The family has located a hospital in Pittsburgh that can perform the transplant surgery. Scheiner, heard about her story and offered the use of his jet airplane when she gets the call from the hospital about an organ donor.

"We feel blessed by the outpouring of caring and the community support," said Brittni's mother, Marci Wingenfeld.

Brittni receives a shot of blood thinners twice a day and takes acid reducers to pre-

vent upper Gl discomfort and bleeding. She visits a hematologist twice a week and makes regular trips to the Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh, where she will receive her transplants.



Star Watch By Gary Becker - The Sky in July: Looking West

Late July inaugurates a period of about three weeks when meteor rates begin to climb. The kickoff results from the activity of about a half dozen smaller meteor streams in combination with Delta Aquarid meteors which max during the morning hours of Friday and Saturday. Hourly rates of 10-15 shooting stars acan be expected. Your best results will be obtained by observing overhead from a rural setting after 3 a.m. Mixed in with the lot of mostly fainter meteors * may be several dazzling fireballs, signaling the beginning of August Perseid activity, the best known and observed meteor event of the year. I'll be talking more about the Perseids in several weeks. Because of the new moon on Tuesday, this week is also favorable to continue our tour of the 10 p.m. sky. Check out Jupiter in the SW as darkness falls. It will be the brightest sky object until the moon gains prominence early next week. Last month, Jupiter was nearly due south during evening twilight. By late August, Jove will be setting by 10:00 p.m. To Jupiter's right, and considerably lower in the sky, will be Spica, the brightest star of Virgo, the Virgin. Although its low altitude may betray its hot, blue-white color, it is producing energy at a rate of nearly 2,200 times the output of our sun. Above Spica, in the West about midway up in the sky, will be Arcturus, the third brightest luminary in the nighttime heavens. Although Arcturus appears 2.6 times brighter than Spica, it is actually generating only 1.5 percent of Spica's total energy. This conundrum between energy output and brightness becomes clearer when the distances to these stars are compared. Powerhouse Spica is nearly 900 light years distant, while Arcturus is only 36.7 light years from the sun. www.astronomy.org





CROW Case Of The Week: Crested Caracara

Tou could live on Sanibel Island for 20 vears and never see a crested caracara in the sky. These birds love the open woods and fields of such inland Florida areas as Alva and Buckingham.

"They are interesting birds," said CROW Veterinarian Dr. PJ Deitschel. "They are in the falcon family and sometimes catch live prey, but they are also scavengers and will chase away vultures to feed on carrion.

On April 30 a juvenile crested cara cara, weighing over one kilogram, was delivered to CROW by Lee County Animal Services. She had been found on the

ground in Lehigh Acres with fractures in her right wing of the humerus and ulna. The humerus was the more serious injury because it was not well aligned. The caracara was quite bright and alert and began screaming as soon as she was touched.


They are extremely vocal birds, which makes it hard to handle them," said Deitschel. "They are so loud, and they don't stop, so you have to take them in another room and shut the door.

Surgery would be required, but CROW staff gave her 48 hours to stabilize and rehydrate before putting her under anesthesia. She was pale from blood loss and had a considerable amount of bruising on her right wing.

On her third day Deitschel inserted a pin in her shoulder to make sure the humerus healed in correct alignment. "It went well," she said. "It wasn't easy, but it did go as planned. For a surgery you always have to go in with one or two back-up plans. We were able to go with Plan A.

The caracara responded nicely to the surgery, and was soon eating large meals. However, her wing drooped in the following weeks, and staff frequently had to adjust her wrap to keep her from stepping on it. One of the arts of wildlife rehabilitation is providing sufficient support yet allowing enough freedom for the bird to stretch and exercise his or her muscles.

We don't do a body wrap," said Deitschel. "We like the bird to be able to do some range of motion on their own. So the staff had to play with the wrap a good bit."

Staff removed the wrap on May 17 and Deitschel pulled the pin on May 21. She was moved unstairs to the large aviary, where she would have more room. 'There's only so much time we could leave her in a metal cage without her going crazy," said Deitschel.

The caracara had good stability at the fracture site, though she was a little tight in the elbow. When her primary flight feathers continued to drag on the floor, staff taped them lightly to her side. Deitschel handled • her physical therapy, which was kept to the minimum because of her stress level and screams.

On June 21 she went

outside to the small-flight cage. "It was not encouraging at first," said Deitschel. "She had good extension, but she couldn't fly at all. I started to doubt myself, and wondered if I had missed something in surgery. But since she had been improving I decided to be patient and back off, which is the hardest thing to do.

Her flight feathers were somewhat damaged, but she eventually began making small attempts at flight. She kept jumping up to her perch, which seemed to indicate that she wanted to flu.

The transition to the air came quickly and suddenly. In a matter of days she went from a grounded bird to a raptor making magnificent 150-foot flights. "She was steady, not any kind of a lean," said Deitschel. "I was pretty amazed, actually."

On July 21 CROW staff released her back to Lehigh Acres. CROW - Clinic for the Rehabilitation of Wildlife, Inc., 3883 Sanibel-Captiva Road; 472-3644, www.crowclinic.org, is a non-profit wildlife hospital providing veterinary care for native and migratory wildlife from Lee County and along the



Finding The Good Water

ost of Pine Island Sound remained littered with dead fish last week. These conditions made for a lot of running but pretty good fishing action when you found areas of clean red tide-free water.

Bait at the south end of the Sound still died quickly with red tide still around. I have been running north, almost to Charlotte Harbor, to catch lots of good lively bait up there. Look on any flat edge from Useppa to Jug Creek and chum it up. Bait was plentyful all week with a nice mix of pinfish and shiners in just a few casts of the net.

The docks on the northern end of Bokeelia held lots of snook and a few small redfish on both tides. Earlier in the day seemed to be the better bite though. The snook eat both pinfish and shiners. The docks that held lots of glass minnows had the most fish.


One fish swirled and missed a crab under a float but that was the only tarpon action on my boat this week.

If you are in the tarpon though, you can eventually get them to eat, it's just being there when they do turn on. Just watching and sight fishing to rolling tarpon keeps me interested even when they don't eat. Look around the north side of Cabbage Key and Useppa during calm waters for rolling fish. Most of the ones sighted were in four to eight feet of water. The ones I found stayed in the same area all week.

Matlacha Pass is almost totally clear of red tide. The wind direction and tides seem to have left it clear of dead fish as well. It's a huge area to fish but has some great fishing. There is very little boat traffic in the pass and the channels are very well marked.

Stay in the marked channel until you find a good looking shoreline or spot. Idle over, watching for oyster bars; a lot of the pass is very shallow so take care when leaving the channel. If you have not fished Matlacha Pass, this is a great time to check it out. The water is very clear and loaded with fish right now. North of the bridge has been holding huge pods of shiners. Try the Masters Landing area – both the shoreline and dock. Also the flats out there are in awesome shape and hold lots of trout.

While fishing the south end of Matlacha Pass last week we had a school

With snook busting on the glass minnows, simply throw a freelined bait in close and they take it right away. Most of the snook were 22 to 26 inches with a few in the 30-inch range. Snook season is still closed until September, so release them carefully.

I did spot some good numbers of tarpon in the northern sound this week but they did not respond well to my baits. of over 100 redfish come right by the boat. Throwing baits to them we caught three or four fish before the school moved on. By keeping one of the redfish on the hook it kept the school around the boat longer. The redfish charged and ate whatever was thrown at them.

Single redfish moved up and down the clearer patches of white sand bottom



So, my story unfolds for all the boys and girls who are still within us. For you see we are all still young at heart.







emale crabs and ■ male crabs tend to move differently both through the river and in different cycles. Male crabs stay more or less in the same area. Males prefer to spend their time in low salinity water. In the estuary, the



area where the river water and the incoming ocean water meet is often turbulent and varied in salinity. The water quality upriver is made up of overlapping layers. The water closer to the bottom is heavier because it's influenced by the incoming sea water although somewhat diluted. The layer of water above is mostly the result of fresh water coming down river and heading out to sea. Male crabs prefer this lower salinity water; accordingly, they are usually found upriver.

Females, on the other hand, move about quite a bit. These crabs are swimming crabs: evolution has flattened the last pair of their ten legs, which act like oars or paddles. Females can be found in the upper estuary or down near the mouth of the river in nearly full-strength salt water. Where you find them depends

in their life when they have molted (shed) approximately 20 times, and they are about to undergo their terminal molt. During the time when the female is still a soft shelled crab after this molt, the male inseminates her. The female's shell then hardens, and she starts to move towards the open ocean. She now carries the sperm from the male, but she has not yet fertilized the eggs. She holds the sperm packet for up to a year, using it to fertilize multiple spawns. To reach the ocean, she travels via Conservation a system called the natural-tidal cycle. The system has been called the ebb-tide

> toward the sea. Crabs migrate mostly at night when predation pressure from visual predators is at a minimum. Even in night though, there is still the possibility that there will be some predator lying in wait. To minimize her exposure to these dangers, she spends some of her time swimming up toward the surface and some of her time swimming down toward the bottom. As she moves up and down in the water column, the current moves her along downriver by the outgoing tide. When the tide turns and becomes a flood tide (incoming), she spends her time either on or near the bottom.

Richard Forward and Jonathan Cohen have found that the rhythm of these movements is endogenous (built-in) to the females. They performed experiments in the laboratory with females at different stages of spawning, finding that under constant conditions females with mature eggs underwent frequent bouts of swimming up and down in their tanks. These periods coincided with the time of area's ebb tide. The crabs also tended to remain on the bottom of the tanks during the area's flood tide.

The same rhythms were not present in females with immature eggs. The upand-down movement also disappeared in

females after they had released the larvae they were carrying and when they were under constant conditions. Furthermore, this rhythm was not affected by manipulating the light/dark cycle in the lab.

Once the crabs are at or nearly at the ocean, and when they are ready to spawn, the female secretes a mass of eggs onto the underside of her abdomen. While she is laying the eggs on her abdomen, she is fertilizing them at the same time. The eggs are a bright orange or $% \left\{ 1\right\} =\left\{ 1$ yellow, the result of the presence of the yolks in the eggs. The color begins to change as the eggs develop and the small crab embryos consume the yolks. The eggs become darker and darker until they appear almost black. Then they hatch and the crab larvae are released into the

open ocean currents, where they will float as plankton and undergo several molts before they settle down to the bottom to begin life as a crab that most of us know.


After the female spawns, she then makes her way back upriver, employing the same transportation method she used to get downstream except now she uses the flood-tide transport. In other words, she starts swimming up and down in the water column only during flood tides. So the current carries her upstream. When the tide turns to an ebb tide, she stays on or near the bottom.☆




financial guidance. Well let me see, who does that leave? Latko?







The U.S. Bank Championship in Milwaukee has been a tour event for over four decades. Most people know this event as the Greater Milwaukee Open, but U.S. Bank became

the title sponsor in 2004. Between 1940 and 1967, events took place in Milwaukee sporadically. The 1940 Milwaukee Open was won by Ralph Guldahl by two strokes over Ed Oliver. The tournament record is held by Loren Roberts, who had a 20-under-par total of 260 in 2000 to capture the event by eight strokes. Last year, a steady Ben Crane fired a 1-under 69 in sweltering heat on Sunday to win the U.S. Bank Championship in Milwaukee by four strokes over Scott Verplank.

Tiger Woods became the first man to retain the British Open title in 23 years on Sunday when he produced a clinical fiveunder par final round 67 to win by two shots and secure his 11th career major. Having triumphed at St. Andrews last year Woods matched Tom Watson's feat of back-to-back titles in 1982 and 83. This

was his first victory since his father, Earl Woods, died May 3 after a brutal bout with cancer. Some questioned whether Woods could regain his focus, especially after he was sent packing after two rounds at Winged Foot in the U.S. Open. Chris DiMarco, who briefly got within a shot after 13 holes, finished second at 16-under after a 68. Ernie Els was third at 13-under after a round of 71.



Golfing Tip



our drives. The most classic example is Tiger Woods, who leamed to shorten up his backswing and we all know that he can still pound the ball down the fairway. Three things should be worked on to shorten the backswing and keep your drives getting good accuracy and distance. At the top of the backswing, the distance from the right shoulder to the right hand must be increased. You also have to make a full shoulder turn through impact. Finally, the right elbow has to be at a 90 degree angle when you start the downswing to promote a correct follow-through.

This year the campers at the Sanibel Recreation Complex's summer program joined the jet-set crowd as they "visited" glamorous locales across the globe. "We picked an aviation theme," said Youth Director David DeFonzo. "The counselors were the pilots, the kids were the passengers. We toured around the world."

The summer started in Africa and made stops at destinations such as Italy, China, Antarctica, Australia and Mexico. The theme prompted a couple of real life field trips around Lee County.

On July 11 a group of campers visited the Fort Myers airport for a tour of Southwest Airlines. "The kids got a chance to see the \$14 million baggage system,"

said DeFonzo. "It was like a Dr. Seuss book with the network of conveyor helts"

The kids also took a stroll out onto the tarmac, guided Terry Kent of Southwest Airlines. "We were out there as the planes came rolling into the catwalk," said DeFonzo. "We watched them fuel the plane and load the food. In the terminal people were glued to the window looking at us. We were right next to the plane, it was neat."

The Americans did not do well in London, and even worse in Paris, but they were feeling good about their play this past week on home turf in Indianapolis, Indiana.

Born and raised on hard courts, where your sneakers grip the cement and the squeaks can be heard around the stadium, Americans James Blake, Andy Roddick and Robbie Ginepri steamrolled into the semifinals at the RCA Championships.

Blake had leapfrogged Roddick in the ATP rankings during Wimbledon this summer, moving up to No.6 while his Davis Cup teammate free-falled to No.11.

Blake had the privilege of receiving the No.1 seed for the RCA tournament, and he made good on it with superb play throughout the steamy week in the Midwest.

There was quite a bit of anticipation for the match, which aired this past Sunday on NBC, for it was an unofficial battle for the top spot in American men's tennis. Blake had broken an 0-6 streak against Roddick at Queen's Club in June – had that been a fluke, or was he really better than the former World No.1?

The final lived up to its hype, as the two blasted winners from all sides of

the court and engaged the crowd with their personalities. Blake won 4-6, 6-4, 7-6 with an all-court attack that turned up the wattage as much, or more, than Roddick's 140 mph serves.


"This is one of the best finals I've ever played," said Blake. "I had to play like that to beat a champion like Andy. I played my best tennis; it's very satisfying to have done it in the final. Andy and I wanted to prove that U.S. tennis is back now. We're on our surface now and we want to do well going into the U.S. Open and hopefully for the rest of the year. I like the way that things are going." (Atptennis.com).

"This is only final besides the 2004 Wimbeldon final (where he lost to Roger Federer) that I can say that I've played my best tennis and lost," said Roddick, who now resides in Austin, Texas after growing up in Boca Raton, Florida. "Sure I'm disappointed now, but I'm sure I will look back at this week as a success. Hopefully this is a turning point." (Atptennis.com). One of the keys to the match was

One of the keys to the match was Blake's backhand return of serve. He is one of the few players on the Tour who can step in close, take the ball on the rise, and blast it for a clean winner. Many players get tangled up like a pretzel when Roddick kicks his second serve high off the court, but Blake was able to time it beautifully and at critical times defuse his opponent's biggest weapon. His backhand down the line, in the ad court, when it's on, is a shot not even Roger Federer can cope with. Roddick had held serve 45 times straight before Blake broke him twice in the second set.

With the win, Blake rose another spot to No.5 in the world, a career-best. This year he is 37-15, and can place his RCA trophy next to the hardware he won in Sydney, Australia and Las Vegas, Nevada. His return from a 210 ranking after a broken neck, shingles and the death of his father in 2004 has given the Harvard graduate a Lance Armstrong-like story. Even his rivals seem to be happy about his success. "He's just playing great tennis right now," said Roddick. "It couldn't happen to a better person." (ESPN.com).

Roddick jumped on a plane for Los Angeles after the match to enter the next event in the U.S. Open Series. His victory in the doubles final with partner Bobby Reynolds let him leave Indiana with a win and a certain amount of momentum. Roddick seems happy to be back in his element and NBC analyst Jim Courier

talked about his high caliber of play. Much has been made of his week of practice in California, right after Wimbledon, with legend Jimmy Connors, and he certainly looked his best in 2006. Roddick said he is going to keep Connor's tips "to himself," but, as Courier pointed out, he is hitting the ball more aggressively on the return of serve and stepping inside the baseline more.

Five more hard tournaments to go before the U.S. Open in late August in New York City, where Andre Agassi will say goodbye to the sport. Catch most of the action on ESPN and NBC.

Twins On The Rampage Charge Into Play-Off Race

ike a runaway locomotive showing no signs of slowing down, the Minnesota Twins resurgence from a lethargic early-season loser to the hottest team in baseball is an amazing revival.

Less than two months ago, the Twins were mired near the basement of the American League Central Division. Poor hitting and poor pitching plagued this team that had dominated the AL Central as recently as 2002-2004.

But suddenly it all changed – a turnaround that had the Twins charging back into the playoff race early this week with a sizzling 32-8 record (.800) since June 8. And what a crucial week this is

for Minnesota.

Trailing the World Champion Chicago White Sox by just two games in the Al Wild Card race, the Twins faced the White Sox in a crucial three-game series in the Windy City and then returned home to host first-place Detroit in a weekend series. Monday night they won the first game in that series, defeating Chicago seven to four.

What's the reason or reasons for the 180-degree improvement by the Twins?

Pitching, the hallmark of this team's past success, is the No. 1 reason. The Twins are first in the American League in strikeouts and have walked fewer batters than any staff in the league. And just look at these individual records:

• Rookie sensation Francisco Linano, who was pitching right here for the Fort Myers Miracle just two seasons ago, won his 12th game last Sunday to improve to 12-2 with the major league-best 1.93 ERA. His strikeout to walk ratio is 125-29 and his 125K's are fourth highest in the league

• Former Cy Young Award Winner Johan Santana, one of the best starters in baseball, leads the league with 152 strikeouts and his 3.00 ERA is No. 4 in the AL.

 Veteran hurler Brad Radke has been fantastic in recent weeks. He posted a 2.09 ERA in June and 3.32 through the first three weeks of July.

Solid hitting is the second reason for their amazing revival

• Catcher Joe Mauer continues to hit at a record pace for a catcher. He started the week at .381, the best in the major leagues.

• First baseman Justin Morneau (.308) is among the league leaders with 80 RBIs, and is likely to become the first Twin in more than 20 years to hit 30 or more home

• The timely switch of infielder Nick Punto to third base has seen his batting average climb to .321.

What's even more amazing about the Twins resurgence is the fact that they have been playing without their two star outfielders, Shannon Stewart and Torii Hunter. both out with injuries.

Like magic, Jason Tyner was called up from the minors to fill in for Hunter and he responded with a solid .333 batting average at the start of this week.

Shrewd managing by Ron Gardenhire, the decision to go with youth from their talented farm system, and the best home record in baseball have melded into a race for post-season play by the Twins.

Miracle in Title Chase

A six-game winning streak last week moved the Fort Myers Miracle baseball team within a half-game of first place Clearwater in the West Division of the Florida State

The Miracle, early this week, had a 16-12 second-half record. They need to win the season's second-half division title to qualify for post-season play.

The six-game winning streak was reminiscent of the season start for the Miracle when they ran off six consecutive victories. During the current steak, the local team scored a total of 49 runs, averaging more than eight a game.

Is Your Room **Unbalanced?**

alance is best described as a state of equilibrium among a variety of home furnishing objects and color schemes used in a room. Everything placed in a room must have a "balance" or relationship to

everything else in the room.

Have you ever walked into a room and instantly felt natural and comfortable? It's likely the balance of furnishings, window treatments, lighting, accessories and color schemes helped give you that feeling. And an uneasy and uncomfortable feeling is likely caused by the room being totally out of balance

In the world of design there are two kinds of balance: symmetrical and asym-

Symmetrical balance tends to be more formal. It typically features objects arranged equally on each side of a point of interest. For instance, visualize a fireplace mantle with matching candlesticks flanking a beautifully framed piece of art. Another example would be a dining room buffet with identical candlestick lamps flanking a decorative floral arrangement which has been placed in the middle of

the buffet.

Asymmetrical balance is generally the opposite of symmetrical balance, and therefore tends to be more informal. Asymmetrical balance is created when objects of unequal size and shape are grouped together. Visualizing our same dining room buffet, in an asymmetrical arrangement, we would see one candlestick lamp with a decorative floral arrangement comfortably nestled close to the lamp, and a beautifully framed piece of art hung slightly off center.

While both types of balance can be used beautifully in any room design, generally speaking, a room which combines both kinds of balance is more aesthetically pleasing, and visually interesting.



Baseball Sluggers Stamps Issued By Postal Service

he U.S. Postal Service has issued 39-cent Baseball Sluggers commemorative stamps in four designs in a pressure-sensitive adhesive pane of 20 stamps. The stamps were unveiled in mid July in Bronx, New York, at Yankee Stadium. The stamps were designed by Phil Jordan of Falls Church, Virginia.

With the issuance of the Sluggers stamps, the U.S. Postal Service recognizes the accomplishments of four baseball greats: Mickey Mantle, Mel Ott, Roy Campanella, and Hank Greenberg. Remembered as powerful hitters who wowed fans with awesome and often record-breaking home runs, these four men were also versatile players who helped to lead their teams to victory and set impressive standards for subsequent generations.

• Roy Campanella was major league baseball's first black catcher and played with the Brooklyn Dodgers. As a talented all-around player, he hit 242 home runs during his 10-year major league career. A catcher in five World Series, he was named most valuable player three times.

• Hank Greenberg is remembered as baseball's first Jewish superstar and one of the all-time greatest right-handed batters. Twice named MVP, he had a career batting average of .313 and 1,276 RBIs and was selected to four consecutive All-Star teams from 1937 to 1940.

· Mickey Mantle was a famous switchhitter whose powerful home runs were matched by his impressive speed as a runner and outfielder. Synonymous with the New York Yankees for nearly two decades, Mantle was enormously popular with baseball fans and is still considered one of the greatest players ever to take the field.

• Mel Ott is remembered for his easygoing demeanor and his unusual but powerful high-leg-kick batting stance. Ott distinguished himself with the New York Giants

for 22 seasons and was the first National League player to hit 500 home runs. He led the league in home runs six times.

Lonnie Busch of Franklin, North Carolina, based his illustrations for the stamps on historic photographs, simplifying and adapting the portraits to resemble old-fashioned baseball trading cards. Two hundred million stamps have been printed. Booklets of 24-cent stamped postal cards in the same four designs are also available for \$9.95.

Customers have 30 days to obtain the first day of issue postmark by mail. They may purchase new stamps at their local post office, Contract Postal Unit, by telephone at 800-STAMP-24, and the Postal Store Web site at www.usps.com/shop. To obtain the first day of issue postmark, customers must affix the stamps to envelopes of their choice, address the envelopes (to themselves or others), and place them in a larger envelope addressed to: Baseball Sluggers Stamps, Postmaster, 558 Grand Concourse, Bronx, NY 10451-9998. After applying the first day of issue postmark, the postal service will return the envelope through the mail. There is no charge for the postmark. All orders must be postmarked by August 14, 2006.

That is a trust? Too often those of us who practice in the estate-planning arena don't stop to explain the basics. A trust is really nothing more than a contract between the "settlor" or "grantor' of the contract, and

the "trustee" who carries out the terms of the contract. The grantor has assets that he places under the auspices of the contract, and the trustee carries out the terms of the contract. In a "self-directed" trust (more commonly known as a revocable living trust) the grantor and the trustee are the same person.

So if your trust says to pay you whatever you want from the trust, but don't pay any creditors if you should have any, does that protect you? No. The reason being that you have unbridled access to the trust amounts and assets, and in having that access a court will rule that you have the obligation to pay any creditor from those trust assets

What if you make your brother the trustee? Now you are one step removed

from having unbridled access. But if you still have the power to revoke the trust or amend its provisions (naming different beneficiaries or removing your brother as trustee, for example,) then a court will find that you still control the trust and therefore the assets held by the trust are subject to the claims of creditors.

So what if you then make your brother trustee and create a trust over which you no longer have the power to change beneficiaries or name a different trustee? Again, you are another step removed from a "self-directed" trust and the facts and circumstances surrounding the governance of the trust may be determinative. For example, has your brother ever denied you anything that you asked him to purchase or pay as trustee? Another consideration once you relinquish the right to amend the trust is the question as to whether the transfer of an asset to the trust constitutes a "taxable gift" to the ultimate beneficiaries of the trust.

Funding Trusts

Funding a trust is an expression you may hear frequently from an estate-planning attorney. What the attorney is referring to is the action of placing the asset into the trust. Some people believe that simply listing an asset, such as a parcel of property or a brokerage account on a

Schedule A constitutes the funding of that asset into the trust. In most cases, this belief is misguided.

In order to properly "fund" an asset to the trust it is necessary to record a deed transferring the property into the trust, change the ownership of a bank or brokerage account into the trust name, or preparing and signing an "assignment" of non-titled assets into a trust. Listing those assets on the trust schedule therefore is indeterminate so long as the other steps have not been taken.

Revocable v. Irrevocable Trusts

Recall that in the opening to this chapter I compared different characteristics of a trust to determine whether it would be subject to the claims of creditors. There are two very basic categories of trusts. The first category is the revocable trust and the second category is the irrevocable trust".

In a revocable trust typically you are the grantor or settlor and you may also (but you are not required to be) the trustee. The common characteristic to all revocable trusts is the ability to amend or revoke the provisions of the trust. If you have the power to amend or revoke the trust, then the assets funded into the trust are usually subject to the claims of your creditors.

In an irrevocable trust you do not have the power to amend or revoke the trust, or even change its provisions. Typically you are not serving as a trustee of an irrevocable trust. Assets transferred to the trust are generally considered either a "present" gift to a beneficiary of the trust or may be considered a "future" gift of a beneficiary to the trust.

Life insurance trusts are commonly irrevocable. This is due to the fact that the life insurance will not pay until your demise, and therefore you can restrict access to the trust without harmful effects (unless you are counting on the cash surrender value, in which case you should consider a different type of trust). By placing the policy into an irrevocable trust, you can minimize (or avoid) the inclusion of the policy into your estate for federal estate tax purposes. Because you usually do not have access to the assets of an irrevocable trust, you generally are able to protect those assets from the claims of creditors, or at least erect a significant hurdle in front of a creditor as to those assets.

Beneficiaries of Trusts

If you are a beneficiary of a trust, does that typically mean that you are entitled to trust assets? This depends upon what type of trust it is and whether you are a current, vested beneficiary or not. Say, for example, that your parents have created a revocable trust for their own benefit. Assuming that you are named as a beneficiary at the death of the survivor of your parents, you are not vested yet since they haven't died and they retain the power to amend or revoke the trust. So you have no present rights to the trust.

What if one of your parents (say, your father) dies and his trust says to pay all of the income of the trust to your mother for the rest of her life and then the remainder to you upon your mother's death. You certainly aren't entitled to any income or assets from the trust until your

MORTGAGE REFINANCING CAN STOP PAYMENT INCREASES

There's bad news and good news on the mortgage front. The bad news is that interest rates are continuing to rise and monthly payments for homeowners holding relative to fixed-rate mortgages. adjustable-rate mortgages (ARMs) are ominously increasing. The good news is that despite slowly rising rates, currently available interest rates are still at historically low levels. And borrowers who hold ARM loans can refinance with a secure fixed-rate mortgage at very favorable rates.

A particularly popular option for borrowers who want to exchange their ARM with a fixed-rate loan is the 15-year fixed mortgage. "Mortgage rates are drifting upward following the release of the recent Consumer and Producer Price Indexes that came in at the upper end of market expectations for inflation," said Frank Nothaft, chief economist for Freddie Mac, a major buyer of

existing home mortgages.

"Even though lenders are offering greater interest rate discounts on ARMs, the rate savings has declined The ARM share of applications has dipped to 32 percent. If the Fed continues to raise short-term rates, the ARM share will likely decline further," Nothaft said.

Another popular option for borrowers wanting more protection from rising mortgage payments but still need a low interest loan is the five-year Hybrid ARM. With these mortgages, the rate is fixed for the first five years, then reverts to a one-year ARM for the remainder of its term.

Q: I suspect that my husband of 10 years is cheating on me. He did before we were married and told me it would never happen again. Are there signs to look for when a spouse cheating?

A: One of the main signs is listen-

ing to your intuition. If your intuition is telling you that your husband may be cheating, pay attention. There are warning signs of infidelity, and statistics from the American Association for Marriage and Family Therapy suggest that 15 percent of wives and 25 percent of husbands have had sex outside of their marriage. When emotional affairs or sexual initmacies without intercourse are included, the number jumps by 20 percent. Some of the warning signs are as follows:

1) A Cry for Help. When a partner tells you that something is amiss and you don't acknowledge it. You may hear something to the effect, "This marriage isn't working," or "I am not happy.
2) Sudden Change or Interest in

Appearance. If your spouse is changing his appearance, i.e, physical changes

such as working out more, buying new clothes, hair changes, he could be on the prowl. If he is making changes and no one else is involved, this could be an opportunity to improve the marriage for

3) Unconstructive Criticism. If your spouse is constantly criticising you then it is possible he is setting it up unconsciously to put blame on you; also, if your partner starts fights then says you are argumentative.

4) Your spouse gives guilt gifts. This is done to make you look the other way and even deny that he could possibly be having an affair.

5) Sneaking. If your spouse is taking secret phone calls or is not around as much, he could be sneaking around.

Obviously, it is important to confront your spouse. If he denies it, bring up specifics and suggest the two of you seek counseling. Sometimes people with a background of these things, may be more prone to repeat them. There are exceptions and people can change patterns in their lives. Chicken Pox

Thile standard doctors carry about standard stethoscopes and standard tongue depressants, I carry in my pockets red noses, various magic tricks, a whoopee cushion, an egg and several litres of lint. The egg was starting to nauseate my staff so I switched to a plastic egg but based on a recent study I will soon no longer be carrying any egg at all.

"Doctor, I just brought Billy in so you could confirm that this is indeed chicken pox," pronounces little Billy's mother as Billy stands there all wide-eyed and spotty. I then reach behind the unsuspecting lad and produce an egg, "Yep and by tonight he'll be growing feathers and should start clucking."

This diagnostic declaration will undoubtedly mean expensive counseling for Billy many years hence but as we all share a

laugh about Billy's psychological damage I remind myself that for the 13,000 North Americans who are hospitalized and the 150 who actually die of chicken pox each year, it is no laughing matter.

Enter the chicken pox vaccine. With more than 80 percent of American toddlers now immunized against chicken pox (varicella) the number of hospitalized victims of this "benign" illness has dropped to less than 1,500 per year. The vaccine is turning out to be an impressive chicken soup for the poxy sole.

A mother and daughter team, Lizzie is a retired RN and health educator, and Pryce is a licensed psychotherapist in private practice who specializes in the care of elders and people with chronic illnesses.

Dear Mom & Me,

My father's first wife divorced him because she didn't think he made enough money and he was not successful. They had two children who did not see their father because their mother denied him access.

After a while he became very successful and he married my mother. My brother and I are from the second marriage. We were raised very comfortably and we adore our parents. Time has passed. My mother suffers from severe dementia and she is in a nursing home. My father was unable to live alone any more so we

placed him in a retirement area near my mother. We thought we had made the right decision.

Suddenly out of the blue his daughter from the first marriage has appeared. She has told us she wants as much of my father's money as she can get, and will take legal action to get it.

One day she went to his retirement home and took him to her house for a visit. She did not return him and then one day during the second week he fell and broke his hip. She literally "dumped" him back to the retirement home and they immediately took him to the hospital for surgery. Rehab of course will be next but we are at a loss to know what else his daughter might do.

What action should we take?

Dear Jessica,

If your father is of sound mind, he can do whatever he chooses to do with his financial resources. However if he is impaired he should be protected. His attorney might be interested in being alerted to a possible threat.

It is very sad when adult children become so abusive that they feel they deserve their parents' assets, and they want them as soon as possible

Lizzie

Dear Jessica,

If your father is a dependent adult and you think he is being abused, exploited and/or neglected, your first line of defense is to call adult protective services or your local equivalent. Adult protective services will be able to guide you. If your father is not dependent and you feel that your half-sister is stealing from him, that

would be considered more of a criminal matter. Your question should be directed to law enforcement.

However, if your father is not dependent and your half sister is not stealing, it is your father's money, and he can dispose of it in any way he wishes.

If your father still lives in an assisted living community, and family problems are interfering with his care, your county may have a long term care ombudsman program that can provide support and direction. Talk with the staff at the community and he/she should be able to advise you.

Safety Program For Alzheimer's

The Alvin A. Dubin Alzheimer's Resource Center is offering a safety program for Alzheimer's caregivers in Lee County. The program was created to provide caregivers with tools to implement an emergency plan to prevent crises. Each safety program packet includes two components: 1) an emergency plan kit and 2) an identification bracelet for the memory impaired person.

The emergency workers who come to rescue the caregiver may not know a memory-impaired adult resides in the home, and therefore, may leave the person with Alzheimer's alone when they take the caregiver to the hospital.

The Safety Program Universal Symbol, included with the emergency plan kit, is designed to alert emergency workers that a memory-impaired person resides in the home. The symbol hangs on the front of the home's refrigerator. The corresponding packet of forms, which contain important emergency contacts and care instructions provided by the caregiver, are located inside the refrigerator. Once a trained emergency worker sees the symbol, he or she will automatically know to search for an Alzheimer's client in the house and, using the information in the refrigerator, take appropriate measures to see that care for this person is provided.

The Dubin Alzheimer's Resource Center caring staff works closely with local law enforcement and emergency workers throughout Lee County to help train them on how the safety program can assist them when they respond to an emergency involving the caregiver of an individual with memory loss.

The safety program packet is provided at no charge, through grants from the Southwest Florida Community Foundation, Lee County Medical Society Alliance, and the Cape Coral Community Foundation, to caregivers caring for a loved one with memory loss in their homes in Lee County. Each packet contains all the items necessary to participate in the safety program. Instructions to put the emergency plan in place are included with each packet and assistance is available from the Dubin Alzheimer's Resource Center.

bracelet for individuals with memory loss to wear at all times. Identification bracelets help local law enforcement identify individuals who are separated from their caregivers and are unable to find their way home or even tell someone where they live due to memory impairment. Each bracelet (or necklace) is engraved with the person's first name or nickname, a code number which matches their application number, the words "memoryimpaired" and the phone number for the Lee County Sheriff's Office. Both the Dubin Alzheimer's Resource Center and the Lee County Sheriff's Office maintain records of enrolled persons' application numbers and identifying information. Being able to look at a bracelet, make a phone call, and escort the lost person to his/her home reduces the time memoryimpaired persons are away from their homes and saves police departments valuable effort. A brochure with an application to obtain a bracelet is included in each safety program packet. Bracelets are provided at no charge by Walgreens. The Dubin Alzheimer's Resource



deaRPharmacist

Pharmacist: Q: Does drinking water immediately after swallowing liquid medications dilute the medicine?

- T.W., Irving, Texas
A: No, it doesn't
dilute it in any way,
although this is a
common myth.
Fresh, clean water

is extremely important to good health because it dilutes toxins in your body and helps keep your cells alive and vibrant. I don't like fluoridated water, but this is inevitable in some cities (unless you buy bottled) and, in fact, could be the subject of a column in and of itself.

You have to think of water as a "vehicle" towing the medicine down your esophagus and into your stomach, where the breakdown can begin. Without enough water, you run the risk for heartburn, reflux and worse than that, corrosive damage to delicate tissues or ulceration. Water is needed when swallowing all forms of medication – capsules, tablets and pounders.

Would it shock you to learn that even inhaled meds like Albuterol, Advair and Xopenex are best taken with a full glass of water in order to rinse the throat out and prevent irritation? Generally speaking, the more water you drink with your medication, the better off you are, especially with irritating medicine such as liquid potassium or osteoporosis medications like Fosamax, Boniva and Actonel.

Q: My mother has been confused, short of breath and weak. One of the nurses at the hospital said I need to get her to another doctor immediately because she takes Prozac (fluoxetine) and Xanax (alprazalam) together. Is this combination safe for a 73-year-old lady?

- P.S., Scottsboro, Ala.

A: "Safe" is a relative term in health-care. What's safe for me may not be safe for you because of genetics, allergies or individual metabolic processes. For your comfort, I will tell you that this combination is used safely in lots of people, but they take the Prozac in the morning and the Xanax at night, not together.

In an older person, this same combination may not be so safe, and since this is an opinion column, I'll tell you that the Prozac would not be my personal pick simply because it has such a long half-life in the body. That means that it takes the body a reeeaaally long time to process the drug, and levels can spike very high if someone has compromised liver or kidney function, which is common in the elderly. A different medication, such as Paxil or Lexapro, might be a better choice for someone who is older, since it is broken down faster and eliminated more easily.

It's good that you took Mom to the hospital with those symptoms. A medical doctor needed to assess her to make sure that her heart and circulation were functioning properly.

DID YOU KNOW? Taking about 1,000 IUs vitamin D per day can cut your risk for breast cancer by up to 50 percent. D is found in dairy products and by lying out in the sun during safe times.

mother's death, but are you vested? Your father has died so he can't change the terms of the trust. The answer is that you may or may not be vested.


If your father granted your mother something known as a "power of appointment" over his trust, then you may not be vested. Your mother may have the right to redirect the trust proceeds away from you (perhaps to your children or charity for example) by exercising the power of appointment in her will. So even though your father is no longer alive and capable of changing the terms of his trust, he granted your mother that same right so you are not yet vested.

Trusts are complex legal documents. There is much more on this topic, but I hope you have a general understanding of what trusts are and how they work.
