The first grade won the attendance award for the 2nd consecutive month for having the largest percentage of parents present at the Parent's Club.



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
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
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MAIL BOAT TO GO?



BULL FIGHTING by cris gault

(Ed. note: Cris sent us this story while she was in Europe this summer and we have not had the space to print it until now.)

While touring Europe, we have visited and observed many points of interest, but to me, one of the highlights was the bull fights in Madrid.

Althou we have visited Mexico twice, we have skipped the famous art of the country expecting a heartless, gory slaughter - seeming to us unnecessary. But, with the viewing of our first fight in Spain, our opinions were at once altered. Bullfighting is definitely a graceful art equal in some respects to

the movements of ballet.

The fights are opened with the ceremony of "asking for the keys" with which to open the pens of the bulls. Two horsemen garbed in 17th century costumes make an entry, ride to the presidential box and ask for the keys.

Following the "asking for the keys," comes a parade. First enter the matadors - dressed in their flashy, tight fitting costumes. Next the assistants or teams which back up the matadors make an entrance. Then the picadores. These are followed by the mule teams which haul off the defeated bull.

After the arena has been cleared of all occupants, a trumpet is sounded to announce the entrance of the first brave bull.

Assistants of each matador make a few experimental passes

while he watches-determining animals defects and tricks in order that he might discover the best way to do his own work. Then the matador himself tries a few skillful passes-carefully dodging the bull-weaving the cape in and out. Following this, the picadores come out on horseback and attack the problem of "picking" the bull without getting gored. Three times a long sharp pole is driven into the bull to irritate the animal. All of the time the matador is watching. After the picadore is has completed his task, the matador once again attempts a few passes.

Authority members could not be contacted prior to Islander deadline, but there is a possibility that the decision will be appealed.

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




DR. LOUISEM. PERRY


Word has just been received from Ashville, North Carolina, of the death of Dr. LOUISE MERRIMON PERRY on August 9, at the age of 83.

Dr. Perry had been a winter resident of Sanibel since her marriage to NELSON R. PERRY in 1915. When she first arrived, she took up shelling as a hobby. Even as a hobby, however, she applied scientific and technical precision, and shortly became known as a world authority on

When her husband died in 1926, she immersed herself in her studies and her observations made up the book "Marine Shells of the Southwest Florida Coast a book which became a guide for scientists around the globe, as well as a guide for the most enthusiastic collectors.

In recent years, Dr. Perry had been confined by ill health, althou she continued to maintain her home here.

She is survived by several grandchildren, as well as many residents here who regarded her not only as an expert, but as a friend.



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
