Sanibel tree-trimmer is recovering in intensive care ward

Friends of Duane Gillingwater, the Sanibel man who was critically injured in a tree-trimming accident last month, will be happy to learn he is recovering in the Intensive Care Unit at Lee Memorial Hospital.

Even though he remains in critical condition, Gillingwater's spirits are good. He would like to thank the many Islanders who

have expressed their love and concern through countless cards and letters, a friend of Gillingwater's said Friday. She added the ICU nurses have voted Gillingwater "the best patient they have ever had.'

Gillingwater was strapped to a 40-foot-tall tree when it crashed to the ground and pinned him underneath its branches nearly

four weeks ago. Since then he has lost 30 pounds, undergone four operations and received more than 120 units of blood.

The 37-year-old Gillingwater has no medical insurance. An account has been established in his name at Bank of the Islands for anyone who would like to help in the long recovery that lies ahead.

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
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


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

Can Islanders be tourists themselves?

Dolphin researcher believes in sharing her findings

To the Editor The Islander

A full year has passed since I began my study of the behavior and ecology of Sanibel and Captiva's bottlenose dolphins. I have spent more than 800 hours on the water, have gotten to know more than 50 individual dolphins, and have learned a great deal about their habits.

Although the results of my research here will be published as a chapter in a technical book and will form the central part of my doctoral dissertation, I feel strongly that my job is not done until I have shared my findings with the residents of and visitors to these Islands.

I believe that science is most valuable when it is shared with the general public in non-technical terms. Therefore, I have designed a booklet entitled "The Dolphins of Sanibel and Captiva" to provide the reader with facts about bottlenose dolphins in general and information about our local dolphins in particular.

The booklet will be illustrated with glossy color and black and white photos of dolphins (from among the 5,000-plus pictures I've taken during the past year). I believe this booklet will fill a gap because there are no books of this type currently available. It will allow residents and visitors to easily learn a few facts about the dolphins which fascinate and entertain them.

Publishing the dolphin booklet will cost approximately \$4,000-5,000, and thus, I extend a final plea to the people of Sanibel.

I need individuals or groups who would like to sponsor this booklet. Already, the Sanibel-Captiva Rotary Club has generously donated \$500 to this project. The booklet will be the most important part of my study my tangible contribution to the people of Sanibel and Captiva through which I can share the discoveries I have made about our very own dolphins. Refuge has new plans for Tarpon Bay Marina

Leases for commercial activities will not be renewed after this year

What is the proper balance between wildlife and human use in a fragile environmental area?

That question was raised by officials at the J.N. "Ding" Darling Wildlife Refuge recently when they looked closely at the commercialism of the Tarpon Bay Marina complex. The area, which includes a gift shop, shell shop and marina, is on refuge property that is leased out to concessionaires.

The refuge staff felt the balance weighed too heavily for human use at

the expense of wildlife, and they have planned some major changes.

The concessionaires, meanwhile, feel the refuge staff might have over-reacted. They say the changes will mean the breaking of a a "pretty big family" of people who have lived and worked at the marina area for many years. And they also look for any proof that some of their activities are harmful to an area they all recognize as a fragile environment.

When the current concessionaire leases run out in March 1987, they will not be renewed. The shell shop and the Red Pelican gift shop will have to find new locations. A marina will be allowed, but it will not have wet or dry storage or fresh seafood or deli sales. Fishing and shelling guides will no longer be able to work out of the marina.

"We feel it is just too commercial now," says refuge staffer Chris Olsen. "Things like a gift shop are just too inconsistent with the objectives of a refuge. And we do get complaints about offering guided shelling trips and selling shells on refuge property. To sell shells, you have a commercial harvest of wildlife — that just doesn't fit in a refuge's goals."

The refuge will allow a marina shop with bait and tackle sales. Canoes and skiffs will be rented for fishing and wildlife observations. And the marina will maintain a public boat ramp and boat gas sales. This operation will likely go out to bid in the fall.

Other ambitious plans for the area are contingent on funding and are meant primarily to make the area more self-guiding. Plans include a series of interpretive exhibits, a walking trail and an observation tower.

"We want to capitalize on the marine


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
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

environment — maybe present information on the manatee," Olsen said. "Manatees have been using the bay heavily. There is also some interesting history which could be related about Tarpon Bay. This is the type of thing which is more consistent with a refuge."

Olsen said 173,000 people visited the Tarpon Bay portion of the wildlife refuge in 1985. About 750,000 visited the entire refuge

'So about 25 percent are using the Tarpon Bay area. We want to capitalize on that," she said. "We have a great opportunity to inform the public on certain issues.'

"We know that the environment is

fragile here," said Graeme Mellor, who has managed the marina for the past eight years. The changes at the Tarpon Bay Marina mean Mellor will have to find a new job. "But I'd like to see more proof that some of our operations are harmful in any way," he said.

Mellor particularly wondered at how the dry storage could be harmful.

"I think those people who leave their boats here would be among those who are most upset. There are only two places here that have storage facilities," he said.

Mellor added that even the wet storage (docks) at the marina are lowkey. The biggest boats that comes in to use the docks are in the 20-foot range,

he added.

He feels the refuge is cutting out all chances a future marina would have to make any profits. At most, the proposed marina operation could support one or two people who would have to work continuously just to make ends meet, Mellor believes.

"But again, we just don't fully understand why the refuge is making some of these changes," he said. "If some of these operations are bad in any way and therefore are not to be allowed, it seems inconsistent with a policy that has allowed the refuge to construct a new dock with davits at the refuge


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
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
For Sale at the NATIVE PLANT NURSERY RED MANGROVE Rhizophora mangle

When Columbus reached the south coast of Cuba, he wrote in the ship's log that the trees were "so thick a cat couldn't get ashore." The impenetrable forest he referred to is the mangrove swamp and the dominant feature of that swamp is the red mangrove.

Numerous prop roots extend from the trunk of the red mangrove to anchor the tree in the muds of its favored habitat shallow bays and estuaries. Aerial roots dropping to the water from higher branches add further to the congestion of tangled roots and branches.

Through the process of photosynthesis the mangrove combines the energy of sunlight with water and minerals to form living plant materials. These plant proteins, primarily in the form of leaves fall into the water where they become food for crabs, shrimp and a variety of microorganisms. The small invertebrates nourished on the mangrove detritus become food for larger animals which in turn fall prey to even larger predators. Thus, red mangrove debris serves as the energy base for an extensive food web upon which almost all fish, shrimp, crabs, shellfish and other marine creatures depend.

With their tangle of roots, mangroves are effective barriers to storms and erosion. Planted along tidal canals, they provide a living seawall and can be maintain ed as a neat hedge.

The marina complex has been leased to Mac Hamby for the past 11 years. The marina was built in 1955. The arina and the two shops were in operation when the refuge bought the area in 1971.

"If you'd seen this area 11 years ago you'd be amazed," Mellor said. "Hamby, with his own money, has improved the area tremendously by planting trees, bushes and shrubs."

"Sure, we have mixed feelings here," Olsen said. "It's not easy to make such a decision. We know some people are going to lose their jobs. This is a disruptive thing to do. But we hope it will benefit wildlife in the long run."

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

Council rejects elaborate proposal for appeals

An ordinance amending the Land Development Code calling for a difficult, complicated procedure for City Council approval of denied variances and conditional uses was thrown out last Tuesday.

Following the advice of City Attorney David La Croix and planning consultant Dick Downes, the council unanimously denied the ordinance on first reading.

Planning Director Bruce Rogers also recommended getting rid of the proposed "contrived procedure."

La Croix and Downes drafted the ordinance at the direction of council. Councilmen were concerned that under new LDC rules they can approve requests for variances or conditional uses denied by the Planning Commission only when the commissioners recommend favorable action.

The elaborate process proposed in the ordinance would return to the council its discretion to hear on appeal all denied requests for variances.

Neither La Croix nor Downes favored adoption of the proposal they created.

Tuesday La Croix presented a simple alternative: 1.

Delete the portion of the variances section of the LDC that provides for council hearing of denials on commission recommendation only; 2. Make Planning Commission denials of variance and conditional use requests final, but give all applicants the option to appeal to the council; 3. Give the council the same five criterion as the commission to determine whether the variance can be approved, but allow the council to "stretch to the limits of logic" to find a favorable decision if they want to grant the request.

Basically the council can consider only two issues: would denial of the request create a hardship for th property owner, and would it be a detriment to th public if it were approved?

Mayor Louise Johnson said she would prefer to do away with the second step and allow all denials to be appealed.

She made the motion to "deny the ordinance and get rid of it."

Planning Director Bruce Rogers liked La Croix's new proposal. "It puts the Planning Commission back in its proper role — to make findings by the criteria with (the commissioners') feet held to the fire," he

State marine commission will decide on proposed Sanibel live shelling restriction

 A request for a LOCAL RULE TO LIMIT THE TAK-ING OF LIVE SHELLS to two per species per day within the corporate limits of the city of Sanibel has been forwarded to the state Marine Fisheries Commission.

Last Tuesday the City Council approved a proposal drafted by the city's Wildlife Committee, under the direction of Chairman Bill Webb, that would find violators guilty of a second degree misdemeanor.

A resolution passed by the council in 1979 encourages all city residents and visitors to limit the taking of live shells. The resolution, however, provides no penalties or force of law.

The Marine Fisheries Commission has the authority to approve local rules to control fishing in Florida and



is being asked to consider Sanibel's request at any early hearing.

In a cover letter to the commission City Attorney David La Croix emphasized that the rule is not intended to prevent or restrict the taking of live shellfish anywhere except within Sanibel's municipal limits, which extend 300 feet into the surrounding waters of the gulf and bay.

Live shellfish are defined as any living mollusk or echinoderm, excluding oysters and clams.

The Wildlife Committee's recommendation to amend the proposal to prohibit the taking of more than two live shellfish per day (instead of two per species per day) was considered too strict by the majority of the council.

Mayor Louise Johnson favored scheduling public hearings to gauge support for such a change.

But councilmen Fred Valtin, Mike Klein and Francis Bailey opposed any further delay and urged approval of the proposal as drafted.

Johnson deferred to their wishes and voted with

them to send the proposal on to the state commission.

● The use of WHEEL LOCKS AS A DETERRENT TO ILLEGAL PARKING was approved by a 4-1 vote of the City Council last Tuesday.

Councilman Francis Bailey cast the dissenting vote. He said the move was an over-reaction to the problem of collecting parking fines.

"It's getting close to a police state," Bailey told his colleagues.

But the rest of the council viewed it as a clear signal that the ciy is serious about its parking strategy and intends to enforce the regulations. Councilman Fred Valtin pointed out that there has been "wholesale disregard of the parking ordinance" with rental and out-of-state cars the biggest offenders.

Violators will have 24 hours to pay up before their cars will be impounded.

• Councilman Francis Bailey did not bow but did bend a little under pressure from his colleagues to dedicate a 25-foot strip of right-of-way on Beach Road needed to construct an experimental cul-de-sac.

"I would have given the city the land yesterday if I

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
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

Ralph Lloyd, assistant refuge manager, told the council last Tuesday that prescribed burns will restore and maintain native marsh veegtation and wildlife in the wetlands. Legion curve on Sanibel-Captiva Road.

Lloyd said this year's prescribed burn is planned for sometime this month. The exact date depends on weather and ground conditions. "Safety is the first consideration," he emphasized.

All burns will be under the supervision of the fire management officer at the Merritt Island refuge on Florida's east coast. Fire crews will be composed of firefighters from the Merritt Island and "Ding" Darling refuges and a helicopter pilot.

Planning for each burn begins one year in advance, Lloyd said, adding refuge officials needed assurance from the city that their habitat management program can be continued on a long-range basis. "A four-year permit would give us this assurance and a good start toward restoring and maintaining Sanibel's flora and fauna in the refuge marshlands," he said.

Mayor Louise Johnson and Councilman Mike Klein initially had a problem with approving a blanket permit, fearing the loss of city control.

Both were reassured when Lloyd said the city manager, Sanibel Fire Control District and Sanibel police would be informed well in advance of any burns.

Johnson and Klein then joined their colleagues in the unanimous vote to permit periodic burns in specific areas of the refuge for the next four years.

• Revocable licenses to permit TWO BOAT DOCKS IN PUBLICLY-OWNED CANALS IN SHELL HARBOR were granted by the City Council last Tuesday.

City Attorney David La Croix advised the council that licenses are required to permit encroachments into public rights-of-way on water as well as on land.

The dock owners assume the liability for any damages, and the city is "off the hook," La Croix said.

One week earlier the Planning Commission approved a development permit for a canal dock on property owned by Albert Ernecke after ruling the dock was not

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
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

an accessory use of an adjacent vacant lot. But issuance of the permit was contingent on the council's approving a revocable license to permit the dock in the public waters.

James and Betty Brunner were issue a short-form development permit for a dock on a Shell Harbor canal on the same condition.

Under the Land Development Code docks are an accessory use and are prohibited on sites that do not have a principal structure.

Councilmen Fred Valtin and Francis Bailey were puzzled as to what the harm would be in permitting a dock on a vacant canal-front lot.

"Why deny the owner use of his property for boating purposes only?" Valtin questioned.

Bailey pointed out that permitting the dock would only improve the quality of life.

Valtin's motion to direct staff to draft an amendment to the LDC to allow boat docks as a principal structure on a parcel of land passed by a 5-0 vote.

•A \$20,000 UPGRADING OF THE SANIBEL ELEMENTARY SCHOOL RECREATION COMPLEX will be a joint venture of the city of Sanibel and Lee County.

The City Council last Tuesday approved an interlocal agreement that provides for the city to super-

vise the project with the county providing the financial

Dick Noon, Sanibel's director of parks and recreation, said the one-time facelift will include: grading and resodding the men's ball diamond and reclaying the infield; recrowning the infield of the women's Little League ball diamond; installing a sprinkler system and water meter; replacing the existing light tower; and purchasing soccer goals (elementary standards).

Noon said the existing arrangement with the county paying for the maintenance of the facility and the city's recreation department scheduling events and coordinating its use will continue.

• Carrie Lund, executive director of the PIRATE PLAYHOUSE, NEEDS ONLY A GROUP ENTERTAINMENT OCCUPATIONAL LICENSE to produce plays at the community theater, the City Council decreed last Tuesday.

Under planning staff interpretation of the city's ordinance, Lund was conducting two businesses and needed a second occupational license as a theatrical producer.

During her first season at the Playhouse Lund paid the tax of \$150 for the group entertainment license and \$100 for theatrical producer under protest. Last November she renewed her theatrical producer license for the 1985-86 season but refused to pay the second tax.

On Feb. 21 Code Enforcement Officer Dick Baker cited Lund for failure to obtain a group entertainment license.

At a Code Enforcement Board hearing in April Lund was found guilty and ordered to pay the license fee plus a late penalty totaling \$187.50. She paid the fee and appealed Baker's decision to the City Council.

Lund did not attend last Tuesday's hearing, but in a letter to the council she maintained she was conducting only one business and it was inequitable to require her to pay two occupational license taxes.

"I fail to see how I could possibly be a theatrical producer without presenting entertainment by actors," she said.

The council sided with Lund and voted 5-0 that she needed only a group entertainment license to produce plays at the Pirate Playhouse. The \$187.50 she paid 4 this year will be refunded.



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
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
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
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


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
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


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


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

Various stocks can turn into good investment

Equities or stock are issued by corporations to give the shareholder an ownership interest in the corporation. Holders of common stock usually have voting rights in the corporation. Most major listed corporations pay dividends to their common shareholders (many have done so for more than 100

Among the investments that are suitable for a retirement plan, common stocks present the greatest opportunity for capital gains to the investor. Generally, when the corporation prospers the value of the common stock reflects the success. The potential gain to the investor is unlimited, but the possibility of a loss exists (limited to the purchase price)

Preferred stock is also an equity security evidence of ownership. Because it is entitled to receive dividends before the common shareholders, it is called "preferred." Preferred stock combines some characteristics of common stock (ownership) with characteristics of bonds (usually a fixed rate of return).

Convertible preferred stock can be converted into a specific number of common shares at the option of the owner. Convertible preferred stock offers appreciation possibilities linked to the earnings and growth of the company.

As the common stock rises in value to reflect this growth, the price of the convertible preferred should also increase.

Most listed securities give the investors liquidity. The continuous trading on an exchange allows the investor to buy or sell shares promptly at the open auction price.

The selection of equities should be based on one's investment objectives. There are potential long-term growth stocks for investors interested in long-term price appreciation with little concern for current yield. There are stocks that pay a high-rate of return in established quarterly dividends. with the possibility of price appreciation.

For conservative investors, there are shares of long-established corporations with a history of dividend payments ("blue chips").

And for short-term potential captial appreciation, there are more speculative issues for the aggressive investor.

They've got what it takes

These Sanibel couples enjoy the taste of success in their ventures

Almost every month we receive in our office a press release encouraging small business owners to come to free workshops and seminars at the Fort Myers Chamber of Commerce or at Edison Community College.

The press release inevitably starts out: "One expert estimates that 50 percent of the 200,000 small businesses starting in Florida in 1986 will fail ..."

Sanibel and Captiva certainly have their share of businesses that do not succeed. But Ken Meeker, executive director of the Islands' chamber of commerce, says the 50 percent figure for failure is way too high for new businesses here. Charmaine Kornieck, who handles occupational licenses for the city of Sanibel, agrees. She says the failure rate is nowhere near 50 percent on Sanibel.

However, with high commercial rental costs, over competition in some kinds of businesses, seasonal fluctuations in visitors and other complications Island businesses can and do run into trouble.

But some flourish, often to great extent.

President Ronald Reagan has picked next week as national Small Business Week. And in our continuing series of articles on small businesses, we will tell the stories of four couples (two this week, two next week) who have found Sanibel and Captiva to be the genesis of success in business. We'll focus specifically on how they have achieved that success.

n November 1982, Marvin and Helene Gralnick opened Chico's in Periwinkle Place. Fifteen months ago they opened a second clothing store — at Palm Ridge Place. And just three months ago the Gralnicks opened their third Chico's — at Chadwicks Square on Captiva.

The future holds even more Chico's — two are already in the planning stages, one on Worth Avenue in Palm Beach and another on St. Armand's Circle in Sarasota. Other locations are under consideration, both for company-owned stores or even for franchised operations. And within another year or two the Sanibel business might go public as on the stock market.

Have the Gralnicks "arrived" as far as small business success is concerned?

"Of course not," Marvin says. "You are always learning and growing — it's a constant process. If you say 'I've arrived,' then you'll likely begin to head backward.'

The Grainicks have hardly looked backward in the past four years. What triggered this success?

First, before they came to the Islands, the couple built a foundation on which they knew a venture such as Chico's would be on fairly solid ground.

Marvin has been involved in the importing business since he was a teenager. His family was in the business, and after he and Helene were married they spent considerable time in Mexico, working as craftsmen, designing leather goods and becoming involved with designing cotton clothing.

The two design 60-70 percent of all the clothing in Chico's. Their designs are crafted overseas and imported back to Sanibel.

But the Sanibel operation was really the first time the Gralnicks tackled all the details of owning and operating a small business.

"You always have doubts when you start a new venture, but you have to allow your enthusiasm to calm those doubts," Marvin says. "You have to be confident that you can be successful. It's that trust and faith that spurs you on."

The major problem the two had to overcome four years ago was the lack of a place to start their business. It took them more than a year to find a retail space to rent. A commercial building boom that is just now coming to an end makes that problem obsolete, they feel.

Although they agree location is important for a new business, the Gralnicks maintain the most important aspect of a successful business is the owners' ability and willingness to adapt to the market and find the right business formula for that

The Gralnicks' business formula evolved from their strong belief in natural fibers. They had learned that natural liber clothing is practical, comfortable and healthy. Unlike synthetics, natural fibers allow the body and skin to breathe.

They took that concept and developed a unique line of Island-style clothing, most of which they design themselves.

"We felt if we didn't have our own look, our own design, we could be any store — and we didn't want that," Helene emphasizes.

Designing their own line of clothes is one of the best moves the two feel they have made. Another 'good move" is importing their completed work from southern Europe and other locations, they

"But there are disadvantages in doing this, too," Marvin says. "You have to handle quotas and customs, be able to transfer cash overseas, realize that overseas there is often no recourse for problems that come up. And you have to buy in tremendous quantities. So you have to be very sure you know what you're doing."

The other key to the success of Chico's is the Gralnicks' relationship with their employees. In fact, they think it might be the most important aspect of success. To bring their employees more into the

business, the Gralnicks hold regular breakfast meetings to solicit input from employees.

Chico's has grown to three stores in four years and will likely spread even further afield in the future. But the Gralnicks are determined not to grow just for the sake of growth.

"We've turned down a lot of offers from people who want to set up a Chico's. We'd rather have five or six great Chico's than 15 or 20 mediocre ones," Marvin says. It's important for us to grow slow with a strong foundation compared to fast and haphazard growth. We don't want to dilute the concept.'

ack in 1978, Bill Boyd left the Air Force after 12 years of service. He moved to Sanibel to vacation and use the Island as a base to send out resumes.

A year later Gail Boyd moved to the Islands, looking to support her two children.


The two met, married, and in the past 5½ years have started nine businesses. Rightfully so, they are proud that all are successful, even if now many are run by other people.

The Boyds began by working for other people, and now they own their own shopping center — Olde Sanibel on Tarpon Bay Road.

"We've done well here, but we've worked hard for it," Bill says.

And with the hard work came risks - but the Boyds made sure to take those risks in a logical, step by step manner.

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


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
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

Before they met on the Island, Bill was an investigator in the Air Force and Gail was a suburban housewife with a degree in education. It might not seem the ideal background for a successful business career. But Bill's hobby was cooking, and his first jobs on the Island were as a chef. Gail picked up work when she arrived as a manager of a motel.

With their combined cooking and management experience, the two were ready to take their first steps into business on their own. First, Bill and a partner bought Casa del Mama restaurant and changed it to the Quarterdeck.

Later that year Gail drove by the old Post Office and saw a "for rent" sign. Without any idea of what they might put there, she quickly told the owner she

'We had to make a quick decision. We took a risk that we could develop something," Gail says.
"But the key was the location. We just had a feeling it would work out."

With Bill's background, it made sense to focus on a restaurant — the old Post Office became the Old Post Office Deli.

Six months later the adjacent building, a dress shop, became available. The Boyds took another risk and rented it. Then the parcel of land on which the two buildings sat went up for sale.

"We figured we owned the two businesses, so we should go ahead and buy the land," Bill says. "One thing led to another."

But the Boyds were not yet ready to sit on their accomplishments. They planned a two-phase development of the property. To finance the first phase they sold the Quarterdeck and the Post Office Deli. To finance the second phase they found

"We didn't start with unlimited resources," Gail says. "We built one thing on another. We always took a risk, but we did it one step at a time.

The second phase of Olde Sanibel center was completed almost three years ago. Since then the Boyds have once again taken over the deli. They also run the Sanibel Five and Ten in the center. Gail does the bookwork for the businesses and runs the dress shop.

'We're at a plateau for now," Bill says. "It's time to consolidate and appreciate.

The Boyds continually stress it was hard work that brought them success.

"If you're in business, you've got competition somewhere. Based on what you put into it, you'll either make it - or you won't," Bill says.

"For us, this wasn't an investment," Gail adds. "We're working to support ourselves. Business is too hard to do here as a hobby."


Coast Guard responds to county's request for restricted bridge openings

HELP FOR HOOKED BIRDS!

Among the most common injuries to birds received at C.R.O.W. are those caused by their entanglement in fishing line. If a pelican grabs your bait when you are fishing and gets hooked, you can help! Please follow the steps outlined here:

- 1. Reel bird in slowly.
- 2. If in a boat, use a landing net and boat the pelican.
- 3. If on a pier, walk the pelican to shore gently.
- 4. Cover bird's head with shirt or towel to calm it.
- 5. Hold middle of bill with one hand and place your other arm over bird's back and around wings.
- 6. Carry bird to get help.
- 7. Cut line close to hook and get all monofilament off wings, legs and body.
- 8. If possible, cut barb from hook and back hook out.
- 9.If not possible to remove hook, place bird in large box or wrap in towel and bring to C.R.O.W.
- 10. Call C.R.O.W. at 472-3644.

Koalas in trouble

On a recent trip to Australia we learned that the darling of nature lovers, that species that even rivals the giant panda in public esteem, the koala, is in real trouble throughout much of its range.

For years, road kills and fires have been buffetting the remaining populations of koalas. But more recently a serious disease has entered the picture and is causing much mortality. It is conceivable that the species will soon be on the verge of extinction unless something be done to combat this serious threat.

A good example of the koala population crash is in the state of Victoria on Phillips Island. As recently as 1973, there was a total population there of nearly 1,000. Today it has crashed to 150. The main factor probably is the disease Chlamydia psittaci.

Chlamydia is not unknown in these parts. It is the causitive agent of psittacosis, a disease originally thought caused only by members of the parrot family, the psittacine birds. Later it was found that doves, willets and egrets also carried the disease to man. At that time a broader name, ornithosis, was contrived to describe the disease. This term no longer restricts the carrier members of the parrot family but ludes many other birds.

A kind of chlamydia is very prevalent in America today. It represents a new kind of venereal disease. Almost 5 million new human cases are expected in 1986. So far it has received little attention (so little, in fact, that it has been called the "invisible disease"). Were it not for the catastrophe of AIDS, I am sure chlamydia would be all over our newspapers.

For a long time chlamydia was thought to be viral. More recently it has been perceived as being closer to the bacteria for several reasons:

• 1. It responds to tetracyclines and rythromycin. Viruses are not afted by antibiotics.

2. The organism contains both DNA and RNA and has a structure similar to the gram negative bacteria.

Consequently, these fixed, non-motile, intracellular parasites are considered to be true bacteria.

Wild birds have been found infected with this disease in South America and the United States as

well as in Australia. In Australia heretofore the disease was commonly associated with parrots, cockatoos, lorikeets and budgerigars, and also with some non-parrots such as doves, willets and the snowy egret.

Birds are believed to become infected by inhalation. When people get this disease it is usually from inhaling dust in a cries (or via the common veneral route as suggested above).

That this infection, historically considered to be con-

fined largely to birds and humans, would now endanger the already severely endangered koala is alarming to say the least.

Richard Jones, who heads the Fund for Animals in Australia, told me that if immediate and accelerated research on the relationship between chlamydia and the koala cannot be funded, then we are in danger of saying goodbye forever to that most cherished of animals. Jones will mount a campaign to raise the necessary funds so that studies can be accomplished Australia

We visited a CROW-like establishment in Queensland called Lone Pine Sanctuary. We looked in vain for a lone pine, but in our search we found many other interesting things.

At Lone Pine we saw the largest of all bats, the flying fox of Australasia. One was hanging on an electrical wire, presumably dead from electrocution, but its grip was strong even in death and it hung to rot in the dampness. One wonders whether six weeks hence a picked-clean skeleton will hang from that wire.

Lone Pine Sanctuary is devoted to the care of many wild animals, much as is our CROW, but there they emphasize the koala. They have some 100 specimens, even a pure white albino one. This must be about the rarest of all rare creatures in the world. At Lone Pine they are very successful in breeding these finicky and delicate creatures.

There we were able to examine many koalas, even hold one in our arms to examine its structure in detail.

Too many people speak of the koala "bear." This is not a proper term to use because the koala really is a marsupial, that large group of animals that has done so well and radiated. and speciated into all habitats in isolated Australia.

The young of all marsupials are born at a very early stage in their development, in some cases only 12 days of gestation. These tiny embryonic, hairless, blind creatures crawl from the birth canal up along a saliva-dampened route on the mother's underbelly which leads to the opening of the pouch. There they secure a lockhold on a teat, where they remain through the major developmental period until they are able to like independently of the mother's milk, often several months later.

So unlike the placental mammals who develop quite extensively in the mother's womb and some of which are born in a very precocial state with eyes open and fully equipped with hair, etc., (e.g. the guinea pig), the marsupials undergo their major development after they are locked onto a teat in the pouch. Months later their heads pop out of the pouch and can be readily observed.

It would be sad indeed for the world to lose this living emblem of Australia to the disease chlamydia which, given a bit of research, can be conquered. Perhaps the almost 5

million new chlamydia human cases in America will spike research whose findings can be spun off to help save the koala.





If you have answered any of these questions affirmatively, then you should consider volunteering at the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge.




The volunteer program at the refuge has grown tremendously in the past three years. Training is provided for newly recruited volunteers. Come join us and do something for wildlife.

SCCF honored for conservation efforts

The foundation is one of only two organizations in Florida to receive a 1986 Chevron Conservation Award

The Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation has received a 1986 Chevron Conservation Award for its seminal work in establishing coastal conservation and wetlands protection programs in Southwest Florida.

The non-profit foundation was responsible for the formation of the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge and numerous educational programs' that promote the understanding and appreciation of Florida's barrier islands, interior wetland systems, wildlife habitat and native plant communities.

Many of the environmental programs initiated by the foundation now serve as models for similar programs throughout the nation.

In all, 1986 Chevron Conservation Awards went to 20 individuals and five groups from the public, private and non-profit sectors. The recipients represent a cross-section of people from 12 states, the District of Columbia and Mexico. Each will receive a \$1,000 cash award, a citation and a bronze plaque commemorating their achievement. The awards will be presented at the Chevron Conservation Awards ceremony on May 22 at the Four Seasons Hotel in Washington, D.C.

William Penn Mott, director of the National Park Service, will deliver the keynote address at the ceremony.

Although 1986 marks the first year Chevron Corporation has sponsored them, the conservation awards date back 32 years and constitute the oldest program of its kind in the nation. It is designed to pay tribute to various individuals and organizations throughout North America that have spent years, often an entire lifetime, preserving and protecting key

elements in the environment.

Gulf Oil Corporation sponsored the awards from 1980 until last year, when it became part of Chevron. Prior to 1980 the program was sponsored by American Motors Corporation.

Ed Zern, outdoor writer and director of the awards program since its inception 32 years ago, said the honorees' accomplishments reflect a widespread but often unsung commitment to the conservation of America's wildlife and natural resources.

"We are pleased to honor individuals and groups who are dedicated to conserving our renewable natural resources," Zern said. "The range of honorees' activities shows how our concept of conservation has matured over the past three decades," he

Noting that these honorees often work in virtual anonymity and do not seek or expect recognition for their efforts, he said, "Through their work, which often goes unnoticed by the rest of us, the quality of our environment and the quality of life have been improved significantly. This is something that will be good for all of us and for our children, and for theirs."

Among the winners are three each from Montana and California, two each from Florida, Virginia and New York, and one each from Alaska, Georgia, Michigan, Missouri, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, Utah and the District of Columbia.


The various contributions of the Chevron Conservation Award winners have been significant in molding and shaping conservation programs throughout the country on the local, state and national levels.

make sure it is forwarded to Jones for his laudable efforts.

Naturalist-conservationist George Campbell participated in a New York Zoological Society study on Sanibel nearly 50 years ago. Subsequently, he visited the Island many times and moved here in 1974. Before moving to the Island he spent 25 years establishing and working with pharmaceutical manufacturing laboratories in two dozen countries all over the world. He is founder and chairman of the Southwest Florida Regional Alligator Association and international coordinator for the Fund for Animals, Inc.

Naturalist-illustrator Ann Winterbotham moved to Sanibel 20 years ago from Massachusetts, where she was born and educated and taught art for many years. Through her efforts as a founding member of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation and as chairman for seven years of the Sanibel Planning Commission, much of Sanibel remains a nature preserve.

BIG Arts' new president has big plans for bringing arts to the Islands and taking Islanders to the arts

At its annual end-of-season banquet two weeks ago, Barrier Island Group for the Arts, among other things, elected new officers for the coming year. Installed as its president was a former Island resident whose name is almost synonymous with the visual arts in our community.

The election of Polly Matsumoto seems especially appropriate because she is a founding member of the organization.

At her Fort Myers home, surrounded by her huge textured wall hangings and husband Ikki's colorful prints, Polly talks about what she hopes to accomplish as BIG Arts' president and her shortrange goals for the organization.

Nearly two years ago she and her family moved away from Sanibel, and though she maintained charge of the very successful annual craft fairs, she says she became "uninvolved" with BIG Arts. She felt this year would be the right time to become reacquainted with the Island arts community, partly because she and Ikki plan to open a gallery on Sanibel this fall.

But there are other reasons, too. Matsumoto has a head full of fresh ideas that as president she hopes to have the power to implement.

"The last few years BIG Arts has been continuing what it was doing" and that partly meant concentrating on the performing arts, she says. She would like to shift that focus a little by bringing visual artists to the community to conduct workshops — and by taking the community to the artists.

"I'd like to organize a bus trip to the new art museums in Miami," she says.

As she shows visitors a number of hand-carved, highly stylized wooden animals she obtained in Mexico, she explains that she would like to make a film of the Indian who carved them, showing him in his environment producing his art. And she hopes to bring the artist here for a visit.

The project would require extensive funding by both BIG Arts and the Florida Fine Arts Council, but Matsumoto

is determined to carry out the plan even if it means doing it on her own.

Matsumoto also wants to continue some of the events that have become almost Island institutions (and which also happen to be the big money

makers) the arts and crafts fair and Jazz on the Green. She adds, however, that at this point she is not sure how involved BIG Arts will be with the latter event.

Chicago Lyric Chamber Ensemble members may or may not return next year. If they do, Matsumoto hopes there will be a change among the members perhaps the addition of a soloist or a dif-

ferent musican or two, just to give Islanders a change of pace.

"I would also like to do the house tour again," she says. For that event, a past favorite of some Islanders, several Island homes were opened to the public for tours. Matsumoto says she has a few friends "who have great houses" and hopes to talk them into hosting the tour this

Matsumoto was one of the original handful of Islanders who wanted to organize an arts group as an antithesis to the city's policy of taxing artists.

"There weren't any organizations around to help promote the arts," she says.

And that, she says, is still the group's main objective. "Our role is to provide some (cultural) inspiration for residents — and some entertainment for tourists."

Soon a planning committee will be formed to begin working on the 1986-87 calendar. She encourages anyone to let her know of any particular event they would like included this year. Write to Matsumoto in care of BIG Arts, P.O. Box 563, Sanibel FL 33957.

While mulling over a list of activities, she also will be getting ready for the opening of the Matsumotos' new art gallery this fall. The building, a restored old Island home, will house both her weavings and Ikki's works, as well as the work of other folk artists such as the wood carver mentioned above.

Finding an appropriate building for her gallery was not easy; finding a place to hold BIG Arts events has proven for past administrations to be an even more difficult task — and likely will continue to be.

"The lack of a good facility is our biggest problem," she laments. "But it's unrealistic at this point to expect to get

our own place this year."

But there is one goal for BIG Arts she hopes is within reach during her tenure.

"It would be kind of nice if we could make the events pay for themselves," she says.



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

Adults probaby will like these capped-sleeved pullovers, too

I have been designing a series of one-skein children's sweaters, but I can predict there will be some adults that will want one for themselves.

The capped sleeve pullover displays three kittens (five for the adult size) across the front yoke. The back of the sweater shows the kittens' tails. The child's sweater will fit a 3- to 10-year-old; the adult size is medium. Because it is knitted with large needles, the stitch has quite a lot of elasticity.

Use number seven and number 11 needles and one 100-gram skein (two for the adult size) of a good quality four-ply worsted yarn.

With number 11 needles, cast on 40 (58) stitches. The large needle gives ease to the ribbing. With number seven needles, rib in knit one, purl one for 10 (16) rows.

Change to number 11 needles and knit (k) one row, purl (p) one row for 30 (44) rows or eight inches (12 inches) from the bottom. Begin the following steps on the knit

- Step 1 Cast on two (six) stitches, k 42 (64).
- Step 2 Cast on two (six) stitches, k four (six), p 36

(58), k four (six).

- Step 3 k four (six), p 36 (58), k four (six).
- Step 4 k 44 (70).
- (For the adult size, repeat steps three and four three times more.)
- Step 5 k four (six), p three, * k two, bring yarn forward between the two needles (yf), slip one, throw yarn back between the needles (yb), k two, yf, slip

one, yb, k two, p three, * repeat between *s three (five) times, k four (six).

• Step 6 — k seven (nine), * p eight, k three, * repeat between *s three (five) times, k four (six).

Repeat steps five and six five times more. • Step 7 – k four (six), p three, * slip two stitches onto

- cable needle, hold in back, k two, then k two from cable; slip next two stitches onto cable, hold in front, k two, then k two from cable, p three, * repeat between *s three (five) times, k four (six).
- Step 8 same as step six.
- Repeat steps seven and eight three times more.
- Step 9 k four (six), p two, * slip one stitch onto cable needle, hold in back, k one, then k the stitch from the cable, k six, slip one on cable and hold in front, k one, k one from cable, p one, * repeat between *s three (five) times, p one more, k four (six).
- Step 10 k seven (nine), * p one, k six, p one, k three * repeat between *s three (five) times, k four (six)

• Step $11 - k \sin (10)$ rows, bind off loosely.

Sew 1/2-inch buttons for eyes. Tie a six-inch piece of black six-strand embroidery floss into a square knot for the nose and whiskers. Trim and separate the six strands. Spray with hair spray to keep them separated.

Follow the same steps for the back. On the first repeat of Step 5, knit the tails as follows: k four (six), p three, * k two, yf, slip one, yb, k one. With number seven needles, cast on 10 stitches by knitting into the next k stitch and each new k stitch made. Now bind off 10 stitches, k one (this has probably already been knit in the binding off process), yf, slip one, yb, k two, p three, * repeat between *s three (five) times, k four (six).


Make three-inch (four-inch) shoulder seams by overcasting the edge. Backstitch a narrow side seam.

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

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
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

Like riding a bike, you never forget how to row

Gingerly, I stuck my toe in the boat. At 25 inches wide, the craft didn't look very stable. I looked dubiously at John DeVere, the boat's owner, who was urging me to get in.

"It won't tip," he reassured me for the 10th time. I eyed the boat again and took a deep breath. It

wasn't that I was afraid of falling in — it was losing my self respect I was worried about

Earlier I had told DeVere (somewhat boastfully) that I had been on a women's eight crew in college. I thought handling a smaller craft, such as the ones he owned, would be a cinch. I just hadn't fathomed that the rig would be this small. What if I were to land in the drink? But the humiliation of looking like a chicken proved the bigger motivating factor. I got in.

Not only was the boat much smaller than the ones I had rowed in college, it was ever so much more sensitive to my every movement, I quickly discovered. As I leaned forward to strap my right foot in, the boat suddenly lunged to the port side. As I overcompensated, it lunged back to starboard. The little shell, like a thoroughbred under an inexperienced rider, shuddered nervously.

Finally, after much ado, I managed to push free of the dock and after several awkward maneuvers, made it to the middle of the canal. It had been years — too many — since I felt the solid grip of an oar handle in my hand. Yet the feeling was familiar, as though I had rowed the day before.

Memories of my college rowing days came back to me. I remembered carrying the cumbersome paddles, and I remembered the hardness of the wooden seats. I could even smell the water of Lake Mendota that stretched out along the University of Wisconsin campus.

I remembered the anxiety of race mornings, and the knot that my stomach became as we waited on the starting line for the command to row.


The long and torturous workouts came back to me; I thought of the way our coach used to shout at us from the motorboat flanking our shell, and how that used to inspire me. I remembered the cameraderie among the crew, and the self-discipline it took to belong.

I remembered the parties — how odd it was to walk into a room where nobody was smoking and everybody, for once, was at my eye level — or even taller. (Most people who row are above average in height.)

I recalled those extraordinary mornings when the water was like glass, smooth enough to put the crew in a fine mood. On those days the boat would glide so fast and so gracefully I felt I was part of a precise, well-oiled machine and that I could row forever.

Of course, there were many times when I wanted to stop rowing and jump out. The stroke, contrary to how it might look, is ac-

Regatta weekend will provide a taste of rowing

There is a newcomer to the Southwest Florida Regatta this year, thanks to the efforts of Sanibel resident John DeVere.

For the first time rowing will be included among the boating events that make up the annual regatta.

The United States Rowing Association-recognized event, sponsored by Miller beer and Pepsi, will take place from noon to 5 p.m. this Sunday, May 18, in front of the Robert E. Lee hotel in Fort Myers. DeVere says a 500- and a 1,000-meter course will be set up for the racers.

DeVere, president of the Sanibel-based Orca Rowing Club, is not sure exactly how many shells will compete. His main concern is that the event will give people unfamiliar with sculling a chance to become acquainted with the sport. Regatta planners anticipate that 500-600 spectators will turn out for the rowing event.

A self-proclaimed rowing "evangelist," DeVere stresses that throughout the day clinics will be held giving people the opportunity to try rowing first hand.

"Somebody will be around all day to answer questions. We'll be happy to show them how," he says.

DeVere himself is a relative newcomer to the sport. "I've just discovered something that's been around for 200 years," he says.

In the short time he's been rowing his blood pressure has dropped from 120 over 80 to 100 over 64. It's not surprising that DeVere, who owns 2½ (he co-owns one) shells, touts sculling as the best sport in

the world as far as physical fitness is concerned.

He claims rowing also has helped his daughter Jennifer's diabetes condition. A skilled and avid rower, the 12-year-old often takes one of the family's shells out alone, rowing out in the bay to count dolphins or to a nearby island for a picnic. Sometimes the whole family, including John's wife Julie, go out on the water together.

"There's no place better in the world for rowing," DeVere said, citing the extensive canal and water systems in Southwest Florida.

Those interested in joining Orca, or finding out more about this weekend's race, can call DeVere, 472-5468. He's more than willing to convert newcomers into his rowing "religion."

tually a precise, difficult and strenuous motion that utilizes practically every muscle in the body. During races I used muscles I didn't know I had.

Stroke after stroke, I pulled until my arms and shoulders were ready to fall off and my thigh muscles were about to spring. Just about the time I decided I simply couldn't pull that oar one more time through the water (which by that time felt like peanut butter), the puny coxswain screamed "POWER TEN!" (our cue to drive the boat even harder for the next 10 strokes). Repressing the desire to hit her over the head with my oar must have triggered bursts of adrenalin, because somehow I always managed to call up that extra umph to cross the finish line — often in the winning boat. There was never any doubt that the effort was worth it.


Now, years later on Sanibel, I found myself barely able to keep my rig from crashing into a docked yacht as I attempted to dodge an oncoming power boat. Eventually, I got the feel of the little shell enough to go a distance up the canal and back. As I did, it occurred to me that my lingering regret over having to give up rowing when I left school could be remedied by taking up sculling. With a little practice, I might just get the hang of it, I thought hopefully.

At the moment, however, my paramount concern was returning to the dock — where DeVere stood watching — with my boat and my dignity

intact.

Well, the boat made it back in one piece, anyway.

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
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
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

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Weekend races will test the power of speedboats and racing sculls

Two more different boating races probably could not be conceived. Both take place this weekend as part of the Southwest Florida Regatta. And both should be of interest to Sanibel and Captiva residents.

The Nissan Dealers Offshore 150 will send power-boats soaring off at speeds approaching 120 mph. The second race will be the first-ever first Southwest Florida Sculling Championships.

The offshore races will be visible to Islanders from the Lighthouse Beach all the way past the Sundial, according to Regatta executive director Dave Auble. The races will run between 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. WEVU television will broadcast three hours of live action on the 150-mile race.

"The speeds have really jumped amazingly in the past year. Some of these boats can do 140 mph," Auble

said. "In the first two races of the season, the bigger boats are averaging over 100 mph. Last year most boats averaged in the 80s."

This year's course probably will not produce any record speeds, Auble said, because it was drawn up to be most advantageous for spectators and has plenty of turns. However, Auble added, under peak conditions boats could approach 120 mph.

Rowing sculls can move pretty fast, too, but they are, of course, moved by muscle power. The sculling races will happen off the Best Western Robert E. Lee Motel in North Fort Myers, on Sunday afternoon, May

The genesis of this race is the Orca Rowing Club, which was started on Sanibel by John DeVere.

When DeVere got the club moving last summer, he called sculling "the sleeper sport of the 80s." And already it is part of the Southwest Florida Regatta.



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We've got two more weeks to land the elusive snook

The last day of this month marks the end of the snook season for two or possibly three months. That means we've got only a couple of weeks to catch these great eating Florida gamefish. But first a few heart-to-heart thoughts about catching this popular fish.

In all my time as a fishing guide I've only had one group specifically ask **not** to catch snook. They had tried it. And they had tried it again and again after that. They would fish for anything but snook. Why?

Unless you are a fanatic, snook are not easy to catch. There are a few snook fanatics around, but I think they are vampires because you only see them at night. They like solitude. They like not fighting for a place to fish. And they have discovered a few very important things about old Mr. Snook.

One is that snook are less cautious at night. Maybe they can't see the leader attached to the live pinfish or shiner. Maybe they can't detect the sinker. Maybe the light of day irritates their eyes. Maybe a hundred things. But early morning and evening into late night are good times to catch them.

Bait is important in two respects. It must be very fresh and it must be alive. You might find it interesting to note that up at Boca Grande Pass the first tarpon are caught on large shrimp. Yes, a fish that can weigh in excess of 100 pounds likes to eat a four-ounce shrimp. Snook are the same way in early

spring

Shrimp of over four inches or so make good snook bait. Other fish love these baits, too, so get as many as you can.

Many area marinas are stocking small live pinfish. These baitfish will also take snook this time of the year. The pilchards, or shiners as we call them locally, are also a top bait if you're going after snook.

If you are a caster, then hook up with one of the new rattler-spinner tail MirroLure plugs. Those with red head and white body seem to be as good as any. Up under the Blind Pass Bridge, where many snook are caught at this time of the year, casters like to take the larger, leadhead, plastic body lures and cast right under the bridge from the shore. Tip

the jig with a little shrimp. Green bodies and white bodies seem to be working, too. Be prepared to cast a lot and to lose many rigs.

Wading on either side of the free public pier at the Lighthouse is always a good bet, too, with an outgoing tide and at night. You want to cast close to the pier pilings. This popular spot can be absolutely loaded with anglers during the day, so you don't even want to show up until 10 p.m. or so.


When you wade fish, you really should have a couple of items. One is a landing net, another is a small flashlight and of course a pair of pliers to cut line to change lures. Don't forget the bug spray, either.

For those with boats, the wait for dark or dawn is not as critical. With a boat you can get to more isolated passes or structures and do just as well as the shore-bound anglers.

So it's a matter of fresh bait, persistence and timing. Around bridges and piers, I would say an outgoing tide is best; on the beaches, the incoming tide will be better.

Good luck this week. Remember that you can only possess two snook, both of which must be at least 24 inches long.

P.S. The Florida Marine Patrol now uses plainclothes officers and unmarked boats. They regularly check Blind Pass Bridge, the fishing pier and around the passes.




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

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


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It's spring, and all sorts of strange things are washing ashore

Spring brings some pretty strange looking things. our beaches. Some are interesting, others are comical, and still others present minor problems for

It took a long time for me to realize that there are seasons in the ocean just as there are on land. Spring is the rebirth of many kinds of sea life, and that's why you can observe a wider variety of beach life now than you could in the winter months.

One thing that always draws the curious is the sea cucumber. These greenish creatures are about five to seven inches long and do, if you squint, look like cucumbers. The big difference between the two is that the sea cucumber moves. There are times when pring storms will wash many of these harmless

It's fun to examine them, but then you should return the living ones to the water. They remind me of a large land snail without a shell.

Sea cucumbers are not really what you want for collecting purposes. But next time you see one, take the time to examine it.

You probably know what horseshoe crabs look like. These primitive animals have a wide range of living habitat, and it's not unusual for folks from as far north as Cape Cod to be familiar with them.

Horseshoe crabs are mating right along the surf now. They are very shy, unaggressive creatures,



and you can easily step on them. They all have a long, sharp rigid tail that they wave around when they are picked up or disturbed.

I've always suspected that people who report they have been stung by a ray might have accidentally stepped on a horseshoe crab instead. Either way, take time out to observe the horseshoe crabs. Once dead, they make interesting shell displays. But please give the live ones room as they swim in our waters

One of my favorite springtime animals is the lovely little sea hare (more correctly called the Wilcox sea hare). When you see one gliding effortlessly by, you probably won't know what it is at first.

Sea hares have soft, rounded bodies and light,

delicate wings. I've always felt they were the original underwater butterflies. They have little ability to fight strong winds or currents, so if you are working a beach with those conditions at this time of the year, you just might come upon sea

Once on the beach, sea hares often release a purple dye. This is harmless to us, but it serves as a sort of protective smoke screen for the hares. They can grow up to 10 inches and are a brownish color.

There is supposed to be a small shell inside this very unusual mollusk. As you know, most mollusks have an exterior hard shell, but sea hares are just the opposite. I've looked over several dead sea hares and have yet to find any indication of a shell. Scientists say it's a small nut-like structure.

Good shelling this week. Please observe the live shell restricting of two per person, per species. And if you should find a can or bottle on the beach, please make a little room in your shell bag for it and help keep our beaches clean for everyone to enjoy.

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


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

Bob Potts Memorial tournament raises \$4,000 for Lions charities


