One Sanibel woman who attended the service said she was deeply moved by the message that, "We should all think about doing more for other people — the way Herb

Purdy, 65, was attempting to rescue four stranded sailors whose 36-foot boat had run aground offshore from South Seas Plantation near Redfish Pass. As Purdy tried to throw a line to the sailboat, however, his 22-foot fishing boat capsized in the 10- to 15-foot seas.

He was last seen clinging to the side of his boat late Tuesday morn-

 Dr. Herbert Maguire and his wife, Zonia, and sons Ian and Stephan of Louisville, Ky., — all were plucked from their boat by a U.S. Coast Guard helicopter.

Officials say Purdy decided to try to reach the Maguires after he learned one of the boys on board was injured. Ian Maguire, 16, suffered what was first thought to be a broken leg but turned out to be only a sprain when an anchor line became tangled around his foot.

The Coast Guard and divers from the Lee County Sheriffs Department searched the churning gulf waters into the night Tues-

Post-Christmas traffic sets new records

Visitors waited until Santa desposited his gifts before they descended on Sanibel and Captiva this holiday season.

Several traffic and visitation records were set between Christmas and New Year's Day.

"We were surprised there were some openings (at Island accommodations) right around Christmas Day," reports Rita Groh of the Sanibel-Captiva Chamber of Commerce. She added the chamber staff speculated that because Christmas fell on a Friday, many northerners waited until after Dec. 25th to head

"But after Christmas, the chamber was busier than day, Dec. 30, a record 1,526 people walked through the chamber doors.

On that same day more than 10,000 vehicles crossed the Causeway from the mainland. Only five times in

history have some many cars crossed the span in a single time. The first time was Dec. 30, 1986; the four other times all were recorded in March last year.

"It's extremely rare to have so many cross the Causeway," Leonard Bergstrand of the Causeway office says. "Still, we expect a 7-8 percent increase each month over last year's figures, so it might not be rare in the future," he adds.

While traffic frequently backed up along Summerlin Road before the toll booths throughout the holiday week, Causeway officials are optimistic that the new system replacing ticket books with decals will speed things up in the future. Causeway ticket books were no longer valid as of Dec. 31.



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

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Coordinator is disappointed in response to Citizen Dispute Settlement Program

In two months mediators have heard only two cases on the Island

In the two months since the Lee County Citizen Dispute Settlement program opened a satellite office in Sanibel's City Hall, only two requests for help in settling neighborhood conflicts have been received from

"I can't believe it," says Evelyn Williams, CDS coordinator who has been at City Hall every Monday since Nov. 9 waiting for the phone to ring.

"But I'm not giving up," Williams says, adding she plans to continue to be available in the New Year to hear complaints from Islanders who have problems they have been unable to resolve with their neighbors, their employers or local businesses

CDS offers free assistance to those people who can no longer talk to each other and for whom going to court appears to be the only solution.

The Citizen Dispute Settlement Program, operating in Lee County under the auspices of the Twelfth Judicial Circuit of Florida since 1980, has a record of 70 percent success using mediation to reach compromises acceptable to both sides.

The program is based on the philosophy of former Supreme Court Justice Warren Burger that, "The notion that ordinary people want black-robed judges, well-dressed lawyers and fine-paneled courtrooms as The best thing about the CDS programmer. the setting to resolve their disputes is not correct.

"The crux for success is that both parties really yet has had no inquiries. want to arrive at a reasonable solution and are willing to give a little," she adds.

Williams says her service failed to settle the first complainants to CDS," she suggests. complaint heard at the Sanibel office thus far. It involved a customer's refusal to pay for work that was not done to his satisfaction. "Neither side would change his position," Williams says. "They decided to let the courts settle it."

Williams is more optimistic for success in the second hearing scheduled for this Friday, Jan. 8, when a CDS mediator will attempt to solve a case involving non-payment of wages to an employee charged with damaging his employer's property.

Mediators are volunteers trained in professional

communication and conflict resolution techniques. The mediator does not decide right and wrong in the

case, but simply listens to all sides and assists participants in communicating and reaching a mutually satisfactory agreement which is put in writing. CDS provides follow-up on all negotiated


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

With Webb's encouragement, Veenschoten considered working toward a master's degree in wildlife management. But with a young family to support, he opted-instead to go into the retail business in the 1950s.

His life-long interest in fishing and the outdoors prompted him to chose the sporting goods business. By the time he sold his business in 1970, he owned four sporting goods stores in Erie and a ski shop in western New

"Sporting goods" includes guns. And in one of his Erie stores, Veenschoten had a good-sized collection of antique guns. But by 1970 he was ready to devote all his time to his hobby, dealing in antiques, and turn it into a full-time profession.

"Antiques were always my main passion; it's the thing I've always come back to." he says.

Throughout his retail career, he also kept up with his interest in wildlife, however. He served 25 years with the Erie Zoological Society.

In the antiques business Veenschoten traveled around the country to be in shows and to investigate rumors of a good antique for sale. One time he drove to Rome, N.Y., because a fellow dealer mentioned that a nice chest had

been found in a farmhouse attic. "I got there and found a Queen Anne highboy!" Veenschoten says with a passion as yet unsubdued. "It was most beautiful, made out of cherry, from the 1740s or so. I had no help to bring it down from the attic, but there was no way I was

going to leave without it." He didn't. During his visits to Sanibel during the past dozen or so years, Veenschoten has had a lot of

"finds" that he has sent back up north. Once he had a call from a man on Fort Myers Beach who said he had a seven-foot-tall, 19th century clock that he just couldn't keep running. Did Veenschoten want it?

While talking to the man, Veenschoten realized the clock owner lived on the water. So he jumped into his own boat for the trip across San Carlos Bay. The address turned out to be a houseboat. The clock wouldn't work because it was constantly rocking on the waves. Once on dry land it worked perfectly — and Veenschoten had another collector's item on his hands.

A lot of people like antiques. But Veenschoten admits he is obsessed. Why? "I'm not sure I really know," he muses. "But I

Looks can be deceiving

Lynette Christiansen looks more like a cheerleader than an Army paratrooper

Imagine this: you are part of a meteorological crew in the 18th Airborne Field Artillery.

After the first wave of combat paratroopers jump from the night sky, it's your turn to jump into the darkness from 1,000 feet in the air. You land hard with your 75-pound pack, then you race to your station to help guide in the field artillery.

Sounds like a manly thing to do, doesn't it? This rigorous physical and mental activity probably sums up "macho" for lots of people — but not for Lynette Christiansen.

Christiansen, 27, is one of the Army's few women paratroopers. In the entire 1,500 strong 18th Field Artillery, there are 15 females. Only four of them jump from planes.

Christiansen wants to join the Green Beret Parachute Club and hopes to become a helicopter pilot.

Over the holidays Christiansen took a break from the U.S. Army to visit her mother, Charlotte Cestaro of Sanibel. The diminuitive blonde hardly looks macho, but instead rather resembles a college cheerleader — except for the clear, tough and penetrating eyes.

Now stationed at Fort Bragg (home of the Green Berets), Christiansen already has made more than 20 jumps, many of them at night.

"It's fun," she says, without cracking a smile. "You're full of adrenaline. You don't have time to be afraid. You're just thinking about all the safety measures.''

She adds that she joined the paratroops for the adventure and the prestige — and also to prove that she was willing to go that extra mile with hopes of helping her career.

The silver wings of a paratrooper are much sought after, says Christiansen's friend, David Simko, a 12-year veteran who is now a "black hat" (jump instructor). He took part in the invasion of Grenada and looks the part of a traditional soldier. In fact, he looks like he's right out of the French Foreign Legion. He is Christiansen's biggest supporter.

Christiansen earned the chance to make it in the paratroops. She joined the Army in 1980 and worked with the ordnance branch, fixing all kinds of optical instruments. Upon completing her enlistment, she headed to Bowling Green College and signed up for the ROTC program. Even then she intended to go back to the Army, but as an officer.

Now back in the Army, she's applying for Officer Candidate School.


She went though jump school last summer. Instructor Simko says only about 18,000 out of 23,000 people make it through the Basic Airborne Course. The threeweek course involves five jumps, including two with combat equipment and one at night.

The school is often the end of the line as far as

Cooking on the wild side Islander staff writer

If you provide the flowers and weeds, 'Cattail Cakes and Chickweed Snakes' has the recipes you need for good eating

wild plants when she and her husband bought a 200-acre farm just outside her hometown of Syracuse, N.Y. "When we bought the farm I didn't know what a robin looked like," she says. "But I loved the country and wanted to know about everything that

was growing around me." An Italian friend had a good understanding of herbs and foods that grew wild. With that friend, Boots began exploring.

While she was learning about the plants on her farm she and her husband made the decision to use their acreage for growing Christmas trees. They had originally planned to build a golf course (both are golf enthusiasts), but when they realized that the land was already heavily forested with pine and fir trees, they opted instead for a cut-your-own Christmas tree business.

By interplanting the trees they were able to avoid the use of fertilizers and pesticides. They mixed many varieties of evergreens including Douglas fir, white and blue spruce and Austrian pines. The result was a

natural forest in which birds nested and wildlife and wild plants thrived with the trees. Boots believes it was a natural transition for her to go from identifying the plants on her property to cooking with them. She believes that everything put on this earth is special and has a purpose.

"Some people like rare orchids," she says. "I like the common things. Everything, no matter how ordinary it seems, has its own story to tell and says to me 'Here I am. Use me."

When her friends began telling their other friends about the interesting dishes Boots was cooking up from milkweed and cattails, she was invited to garden clubs and other organizations to give demonstrations. That is when she began cooking with flowers.


"I wanted these people to stop spraying poisons all over their gardens, so I gave them recipes for their roses and tulips," she says. (She also has recipes for natural pesticides in her book.) Next she and her husband

bought a restaurant in Jack's

Reef, N.Y. which they named Abby's River Lodge after their young daughter, Abby. The restaurant was not a health food bar but a traditional restaurant featuring local fish and New England lobster. But Boots made sure





regular jumping for many soldiers from the Army, Navy, Coast Guard and all the other services that use the training school. Most get their wings but do not plan to be in an airborne division. But not Christiansen. This fall she

made 15 more jumps. "The most vivid one was the last one," she says, her voice becoming more animated. "My helmet came off when I exited the plane. The strap was trying to strangle me. I was trying to get it set, knowing there were other jumpers all

50 troopers exited the plane in one pass at one-second intervals. It sounds dangerous, but accidents, such as a parachute not opening or getting tangled in another chute, are rare. Most injuries usually come with bad landings, Christiansen says.

Simko, who has completed more than 300 jumps, sees women becoming more and more of a role in all the Armed

"I'm all for it — as long as they do their job like anyone else," he says. "If you prove you can do the work, and if you are extremely safety conscious, then you just become one of the guys,"

Christiansen adds. Combat is not for the women in today's army — but perhaps in the army of the future.

"I think women would make better killers," Christiansen says seriously. "We have that strong urge to protect our family, home and country. And in sharpshooting, women are proving to be better shots then men."

Christiansen might resemble a cheerleader. But appearances are deceiving. She's a soldier through and through.

her salad bar included cattails and pigweed.

But what was natural to her often shocked her customers. She laughingly remembers the reaction of some of the farmers who would stop in. "They'd say, 'You mean this is pigweed? I pull this out when I plant my spinach," she remembers.

Two years ago Boots and her husband divorced. She relocated to Sanibel to live in the home she owns with her father. While on the Island she decided to put together the cookbook. She says the concept really was born 10 years ago when she began putting down recipes for her local Junior League. Most of the recipes in Cattail Cakes and Chickweed Snakes are based on plants she found up north, but she is busy learning to adapt her recipes to and exploring the uses of Florida vegetation.

Boots particulary enjoys using hibiscus and mahoe (sea hibiscus) flowers, which she says can be used in any recipe of hers that calls for gladiolus or day lillies.

The purslane she writes of is a northern variety, but she says it is interchangeable with the sea purslane that grows here throughout the season.

Another Florida plant she highly recommends for use in salads or sauted with garlic is biden. This common plant grows wild on Sanibel and Captiva and is identified by the tiny, white, daisy-like flower it bears.

During her interview with The Islander last weekend, Boots made marigolds to grow, why not try

ed on Sanibel, several of which came right from the newspaper's backyard. Included in the salad were biden, dog fennel, smilex, hibiscus flowers, cattail stalks. prickly pear pads and leather fern fronds. She tossed it all with her own honey-oil-vinegar dressing. It was delicious, particularly the leather fern frond, which tasted much like artichokes.

Boots reccomends that Floridians who want to cook with flowers plant nasturtiums and marigolds, which she calls "poor man's saffron." Both plants grow well here and can be used in a variety of natural food recipes.

Hibiscus Fritters

Mix up some pancake batter and heat oil in a saucepan until almost boiling. Take hibiscus flowers (which you have washed and removed the pistils from) and dip them in the batter. Hold in the air to drain, then fry for about three minutes on each side, turning once. Drain on paper towel. Sprinkle with powdered sugar and serve plain or with maple syrup for a Sunday breakfast treat.

Cattail Stirfry When cattails are about a foot high, pull up on the stalks, peel off

the outer layer of papered leaves

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
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



Oh, what a web we weave...

Whether you call it spider weaving or buttonhole netting, the results are beautiful

One of the many crafts being taught this season by both the Sanibel Community Association and the Sanibel-Captiva Adult Courses is the delicate art of spider weaving.

Actually a form of buttonhole netting, the term "spider weaving" was coined by Trudy Prevatt of Three Crafty Ladies, who will teach this form of offloom weaving this winter for

the SCA.


Prevatt explains that it is not neccessary to include a small spider web in the center of each piece. When she first began learning this craft the fine netting so reminded her of a delicate web that she chose to include a traditional one in each of her works, hence the

Each piece is begun by wrapping a metal ring (the size of the ring is optional) in acryllic macrame cord. A weaving needle is then used to stitch heavy

string in a circle around the inside of the ring forming a base for the weaving. Still using the weaving needle, the artist chooses from a wide range of weights and colors the varns she will use to fill in the ring with a series of half-hitches

The procedure is quite simple, but the results are beautiful. Because there is no

when she meets and begins working with Tom even though he is the epitome of "show business" news. As a couple they are your basic mismatch, but the temptation is still strong.

This is all played out against the fascinating backdrop of network news broadcasting. The scenes where we get to see behind the camera — the deadlines, near misses, split-second timing and the incredible pressure that go into each broadcast are extremely well done.

Brooks has assembled a dandy cast — and, oh, the lines he gives them to say! His original screenplay is loaded with dead-on observations and witty responses. Characterization is established early on and convincingly. An added bonus is Jack Nicholson in a great cameo role.

Broadcast News is slightly flawed by what I call a "non-ending." The romantic triangle is not resolved in a satisfying way, leaving the viewer feeling rather cheated. In addition, Jane's struggle to reconcile her professional scruples with her libido does not always ring true.

This film is most successful when it stops sermonizing and just shows us how things work.

Broadcast News is about current trends, complex issues and even more complex people. It's about love and friendship in the workplace, and it's never been done any better.

would be much less.

Nevertheless, Strohmeyer watched with interest as changes took place in the steel industry. The first crisis, he remembers, took place in 1959 when the workers went on strike for 116 days. And every year for the next three years, the workers went on strike protesting wages and working conditions. "This was the beginning of the end," Strohmeyer

Consumers discovering foreign steel and the rise of

the mini mills in the south added to the decline. In the mid-1970s the second crisis occured. Workers were in trouble because of a no-strike agreement and because of inflation. By 1980 Bethlehem Steel faced the threat of a shut-down. However, Strohmeyer points out, closing the mill would have cost far more than keeping it open.

Today the steel plant employs roughly 35,000 workers; in its heyday, Strohmeyer points out, there were nearly 100,000.

In his book he also points out several ways in which to improve the system. A complete restructuring of the mills would help, he says, in addition to improving the quality of the product. He also believes that workers should be more involved in the business in order for everything to run more smoothly.

Strohmeyer ended Crisis in Bethlehem with these changes in mind.

He feels confident that the book will continue selling. Already the Library Journal has called it one of the best business books in 1987, and several schools are using it as a required course textbook.

Strohmeyer is pleased with the results of the book, but he recently turned his attention back to jour-

nalism. He has accepted a position as Atwood professor of journalism at the University of Alaska in Anchorage. He will stay there for one year and then return to Bethlehem. His regular visits to Sanibel with his family, he says, will continue.

His return to Bethlehem will not prompt a sequel to his first book, Strohmeyer says. The typing and researching will end for the time being - perhaps until another crisis occurs in the industry.

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



chases this past year. It is nearly impossible to knit a sweater for less than \$10. And most of the pretty cotton and silk yarns that are used in the ready-made sweaters would total \$25-\$40 purchased by the skein.

So what's going to happen to us and to our knitting customers?

To add to my apprehension, I picked up the current issue of Knitters magazine to find the lead article titled: "America's yarn shops: On the endangered species list?" In this, Warren Wheelock, a marketing director, stated: "Ready-to-wear, with Perry Ellis and Vittadini and all the great designers, 'turned on' the whole knitting industry six years ago. But they did their job too well ... now you can often buy a sweater cheaper than you can knit one."

After experiencing doom and gloom, a customer stopped in to tell me she must have something to knit. She didn't care what; she just needed something to do with her hands.

And I had almost forgotten about all those others who needed to quit smoking, had to recuperate (or be by someone's bedside), who were preparing to watch a TV miniseries or sit through the Super Bowl, or just felt the need to create something. I remember knitting in the

until you see the crispy white cucumber-like section at the bottom. Cut in one-inch lengths. In a wok or large skillet, heat 1 tablespoon oil, two cloves garlic, 1 teaspoon diced ginger. Stir for two minutes. Add a little water, a handful of diced cattails shoots peppers, broccoli ... any vegetable you especially enjoy. Stir-fry until barely tender, add a sprinkling of soy sauce and roasted peanuts. Serve over rice.

Natural cooking is not Boots' only interest, however. Soon she will leave the Island to return to her studies at Warner Southern College in Lake Wales, Fla. She is working on a degree in elementary education, and when she graduates she will leave Florida for South Dakota to teach on a Sioux Indian reservation.

She decided to become a reservation teacher after working in South Dakota with the Sioux in a program sponsored by the YMCA. In the two months she lived there she came to care deeply for a people she says are "truly displaced."

"We did a terrible thing to the Indians," she says. "We took away their land, and when we did that we took away their religion. Their whole lives were entwined with the natural world around them, and they don't know how to live without that.'

Boots says she already has learned quite a bit about the edible plants of South Dakota and looks forward to learning from the Sioux as she teaches their children.

For people on Sanibel who are interested in learning more about edible wild plants, she recommends they read The Field Guide to Edible Plants by Lee Peterson; The Nature of Sanibel by George Campbell; or a book by Julia Morton on using wild plants for survival in southern Florida.

She also cautions people not to eat plants growing near the road because they might have been sprayed. And, she stresses, never begin picking from the wild without first being guided by someone who is knowledgeable. Not all plants resemble the pictures in books, and many poisonous plants can be mistaken for an edible relative, she says..

Boots does, however, encourage people to learn about and use the food provided by nature. By using common plants as our grandparents and as the Indians did, we can learn about our environment while eating good, healthy food, she says.

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
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
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

Sanibel angler hopes to educate fellow sportsmen about fishing rules and regulations

There are an estimated 58,000 tarpon fishermen in the state of Florida. And one of them is

Sanibel resident Larry Paul. But Paul is a little different from many other area anglers. He is founder of the Sanibel Island Fishing Club and a member of the Fort Myers Tarpon Hunters. More important, however, he is the first person from Southwest Florida to be appointed as a representative of the International Game Fish

Association. The main duties of the IGFA are to regulate rules throughout the world concerning the management and conservation of fishing and also to maintain

records for world record catches. There are 215 representatives in the IGFA. Until Paul was appointed last fall, only two Florida areas — Key West and Destin were included in the IGFA

membership. Paul received the appointment on Oct. 5, 1987, after have been an IGFA member since 1981. His duty as an individual is to create a liaison between anglers in the area and the IGFA headquarters in Fort Lauderdale.

IGFA officials take several criteria into consideration before appointing a representative. They analyze the designated area for the number of fishing clubs, the species of fish available and recreational anglers who fish the waters of an area.

Sanibel met the requirements and also had a qualified representative in Paul.

"I was honored to be chosen," Paul says. "Fishing's been a hobby of mine for years. Now it's nace to combine the recreation of the sport with the management end of it."

Paul has spoken at more than 10 meetings at area marinas, fishing clubs and other related angler centers since his appointment. He gives information on the IGFA and also listens to any

problems fishermen may have. He recently attended a meeting to discuss a state-wide ban on taking tarpon. Some people in attendence maintained that no changes were necessary in existing rules, Paul says. Others stressed a need for a "kill

stamp" in which a person would pay a \$50 fee for taking a tarpon. These anglers also would only be allowed one tarpon per year.

Paul, whose favorite sport is tarpon fishing, agrees strongly with the "kill stamp."

"If people abide by the rule, then they'll be participating in the conservation of the tarpon," he says.

"Tarpon aren't made for eating, anyway," he adds. "The most a person can do is string it up and take a picture of it."

Paul says what a person should do after catching a tarpon is measure it, take a few pictures from the side of the boat, pat it on the head and throw it back into the water.

He is concerned with the conservation of the tarpon, but that's not the only reason he enjoys being a member of the IGFA.

He likes to educate local anglers about new fishing rules and regulations.

He is part owner of Woody's Health Foods, Shell World and a fire and restoration business called Damex. But he still donates

Every morning for eight consecutive days, 12 swimmers braved the chilly Florida temperatures and dove into the waters of the rec center swimming pool on

eight men and four women from the team swam 8,000 yards doing various sprints and


After their practice ended at 10 a.m., the team returned to Fort Myers Beach where they were staying. In the afternoon, Horgan

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Island anglers will miss catching redfish this winter

As we start the new year many serious anglers are quite concerned about which fish we will be able to catch in the coming months.

As of Jan. 1 snook and redfish are off-limits. The ban on snook lasts for two months; the state still hasn't decided how long it will protect the redfish.

Snook never were all that popular as gamefish in the winter months, anyway. But redfish surely were. and many a guide and recreational angler are wondering if this will be a long-lived ban or just something to protect the fish during the height of

tourist season. We still have the old stand-bys — seatrout, grunts, sheepshead, small snapper and occasional grouper.

Think about the anglers who go to the Florida Keys every winter. In the past few weeks the state has closed federal waters for Spanish and king mackerel fishing. The kings are the backbone of the fishing industry in the Keys. Add to that the ban on snook and redfish in the back country of the Keys,

and those anglers are down to snapper and dolphin. These are the dolphin fish, of course. And with

more pressure on them, some folks fear the average fish caught will simply become smaller and smaller. Right now there is no minimum lenght or bag limit

The efforts of the state to try to preserve or bring back faltering gamefish populations are commendable. But I've always felt that under these circumstances a greatly reduced bag limit is much preferable to cutting off a fish to anglers altogether.

In the meantime, we are far from being out of fish around Sanibel and Captiva.

For you readers up north who had to trudge out to

the mailbox in knee-deep snow just to get your copy of The Islander, Christmas Day down here was in the mid-80s. It was a sunny day, and the fish were biting. That kind of weather continued for several days (in fact, Fort Myers was among the high temperature spots in the nation).

Warm weather turns on the fish. Some wonderful catches of grouper in the gulf, bluefish in the passes and trout on the flats were reported. All it takes is decent weather in order for just about every angler to get lucky on the water.

For you anglers who are visiting our Islands now that the holiday crowds have thinned out a bit, the best place to drown a shrimp is at the public fishing pier on the Lighthouse end of Sanibel. Also, you shore anglers should be working the

Causeway for trout when the wind is calm. Good fishing this week. I'll report on any plans for redfish as soon as I hear about them. Even extending the one-fish rule of the past few months instead

of imposing the no-fish rule sure would please a bunch of anglers.

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It's house-hunting time for octopi and hermit crabs

Hermit crabs and octopi love to look for new shell homes this time of year. Don't be surprised to see a "dead" shell moving along the beach when you are out walking Sanibel's shoreline.

We had an interesting incident on the boat recently as we headed home after a morning of shelling. We had two youngsters on board who had found a pair of old, worn out whelk shells.

Both shells were in a plastic bucket, and it wasn't long before the octopus living in one of the shells decided it had had all the boat ride it wanted.

The kids started yelling, so I stopped the boat. We all peered into the bucket and saw the six-inch octopus trying to climb up the side of the bucket and make his escape.

We don't see as many octopi around here in the summer months as we do in the winter. This time of year it's possible to see a few in shells or just washed ashore by themselves during a strong storm. Don't be alarmed by these creatures. The only

thing they can do is cling to you with the many suc-

tion cups on their legs. They live off shells and fish, feeding with a beak-

SHELLING

Most octopi are very shy and not at all ready for a confrontation with a sheller. As a matter of fact, people who don't carefully inspect their "empty" shells once they return from the beach very well might discover a bad odor the next day. The octopus will back into the inner reaches of the shell and will

want to capture prey or move around the bottom of

Octopi and a close cousin, the squid, have a bad reputation as "sea monsters" that can grow to great

lengths and do things like turn over large boats and so on — if you believe the movies. But the octopi we have around here are far from dangerous.

I might recommend, however, that you use another shell or perhaps a piece of driftwood to remove a live octopus from a shell you want to keep for your collection. They really to attach themselves to things with all their legs, so handling them with bare hands is not so wise. Gently place another shell under the creature and return it to the water.

The other thing you might see coming out of a shell you just picked up is a hermit crab. We're not talking about the land crabs so many people have as housepets. These guys need water to survive — so don't take them home.

There are several kinds of hermit crabs around the Islands. They are strong little crabs, capable of carrying fairly large shells over the floor of the gulf as they look for something to eat. As they grow, they have to move into larger shell homes, so they are always on the lookout.

"The Sanibel area is important to me," he says. "And now that we're on the map of the IGFA, I'll try to help area fishermen as best I can."

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
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
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
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
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
