# Commission rejects port proposal

The Lee County Commission, sitting as the Lee County Port Authority, rejected 4-1 the proposed deep water port in south Cape Coral.

Environmentalists from Sanibel and from Pine Island who crowded into a small courthouse meeting room did not get to say anything as the commission voted immediately after the presentation by Bechtel Inc.

Commissioner John Manning made the motion, which was worded as a recommendation to Gov. Bob Martinez and the Florida Cabinet that they reject the project.

Bechtel said they plan to develop the project under the Florida Quality Development program in order to raise its standards above normal development standards.

Commissioner Charley Bigelow said putting it under that program also reduces local control so "a vote on this thing may be meaningless." However, he added that a negative vote by the commission would send a message to the governor and, "I can't see the governor and cabinet approving this if they want votes."

The lone opposition vote on the motion came from Commissioner Bill Fussell. He reminded the other commissioners that they were meeting as the port authority rather than as the County Commission and they were considering what method to use to bring jet fuel to the airport.

Fussell said he thought they were going to have a public hearing at some point in which the various methods including the port, railroad, pipeline, barge, and truck transportation were discussed at one time and he opposed eliminating one of the possibilities before such a hearing is held.


Fussell also said he thought the public should have an opportunity to speak on the port issue.




finally underway Several months ago – August to be exact – our staff came up with an idea to help the city celebrate its 15th anniversary. By that time, the City Council had decided that it did not plan

Gift idea

on noting the community's birthday. Taking the proverbial bull by the horns, we decided that if the city wasn't going to hold an official celebration, then we would do it ourselves — in the form of a gift to the community, paid for through donations from the community for the entire community to enjoy. Our plan ... a glass sculpture, which is appropriate since in some circles the 15th anniversary is the crystal anniversary.

Taking the lead was reporter Ann Travelstead, who got the project moving by contacting island artist Luke Century, who jumped at the idea and came up with a fitting plan to sculpt a glass figure featuring an area native - the dolphin. The dolphin idea wasquickly accepted because of the mammals' abundance in our waters and because there is a dolphin on the city's official logo.

Step one was complete. We came up with the idea and then found a willing, talented artist who proposed a perfectly acceptable sculpture idea



The next step obviously was to contact the city to see if it would accept our gift.

That's when we encountered our first snag. You see, you simply can't give the city a gift. Following the bureaucratic process to the letter, even a gift must first be approved. And since this was a piece of artwork, the plan first had to be reviewed by the city's fine arts committee - a committee established by the council to review such ideas.

Meeting the committee turned out to be a problem because when we approached the city, most of the committee members were not on the island. Several, it seems, are part-time residents, or perhaps we chose to propose our

gift idea during the height of vacation season. Whatever, when we finally met with the committee in October, the project was approved, but Century's initial idea for a single dolphin splashing out of the surf was not well received by the group members. When told it was too "Disney-like" or "performing-dolphin-like," Century said, "No problem. It can be altered." And, it was.

Now, instead of featuring just one vertical dolphin, backed by a splashing wave, the work now includes three noted area dolphins on a larger, wider, horizontal wave background.

From the moment the idea was proposed in our office, the time frame involved with completing the project was a concern. We hoped to get the artwork created, paid for and presented before the end of the current calendar year. 1989, afterall, does mark the 15th year of incorporation.

Waiting to meet with the arts committee, taking care of the artwork alterations and then -anew twist — awaiting final approval from the City Council in early November, greatly

decreased the time period to get the work done. Although it may seem we have "come a long way" since the proposal's inception in August, the path to get where we are today has been a bit rocky.

Donations are coming in — the community has welcomed the idea with praise and appreciation. We are pleased and are pushing to complete the work.

# COMMENTARY Abiding by regislation law

One of the greatest characteristics of Sanibel used to be that the people who lived here generally accepted their fellow islanders' face value. Terms such as "of uncertain origin" or "possibly illegal" were never considered when referring to any group of islanders who organized to support what they believed in.

We may not have agreed with particular groups, but we agreed they had the legitimate right to exist. Interestingly enough, these groups, of which we have had several, did abide by the registration law.

There was the **Concerned Property** Owners of Sanibel (CPOOS) in 1975. This organization has since disbanded. There was the Sanibel Taxpayers Association, also formed in 1975. This organization is alive and well. There has also been the Save Our Shores group, which existed until that issue was resolved - twice.

There is now the Save Our Bridge Committee, also properly registered. The Citizens' Committee for the Bond Issue, which sent a brochure with COTI's address, I presumed to be as legal as I presumed COTI to be, and I'm confident that if there were any question, it was resolved. Following the old concepts, I accepted it at face value.

Much of the literature from the organizations for or against the bond issue did not identify the officers, which is perfectly legal and does, in fact, protect them from personal harassment which. unfortunately, has happened.

It was of some concern that our charitable organizations elected to participate in this legislative matter. Clearly, from the vote, they were not speaking for the majority of them members. However, their mission remains vital to our island and they are as deserving of support as ever, but it would be advisable for them to check the tax codes.

This bond issue is over, or should be. The people have

Planner Jennifer Antalick received Murty's nomination for the most comprehensive staff report of the year, and updated commissioners on the progress made in the project.



# 3,050 miles and 23 days later Shadowfax reaches Hiva Oa

1989

Shadowfax and crew (Capt. Scott McPhee, Gret-ben McPhee and David Poole) left Santa Cruz in the alapagos on Sept. 16, along with our Bulgarian iends, Vladimir and Jorjet, aboard Aquarius,

The weather was fair but cold and it would be six ivs before we were far enough from the Humboldt urrent to take off all our winter clothes.

We had heard and read so much about yachts being ttacked by whales along the route to the South **Pac**ific island, we decided to keep our depth sounder on at night. Whales sleep on the surface and the depth ounder will let them hear you coming and help you avoid upsetting a 20-ton monster. I don't know if this really works but we saw only one whale and that was e first day out.

t's hard to explain three weeks at sea on a small at. I guest it's like a short prison term. Actually, it's that bad. The trip was all with the wind behind us and the seas were almost always comfortable.

The fourth day out we put up our mizzen staysail. This is like a small spinnaker which is flown from the mizzen mast (the far aft mast). This sail, along with the jib, carried us along at seven knots for 177 nautical niles during that 24-hour period.

One night, while Dave was on watch and Gretchen and I were sleeping, we heard a loud "ping" that woke us up. It happened again a few minutes later. We think we were "pinged" by a submarine. They probably wanted to know who was crazy enough to run their depth sounder in the middle of the Pacific Ocean. New technology keeps away whales, attracts submarines.)

Twenty-four hours a day is hard work for a boat. Seven days out, things started to break. The most important item aboard broke first.

Gandolf, our autopilot, came down with some kind of 12-volt virus and just quit. The prospect of steering Shadowfax by hand for two weeks was quite disheartening. We took Gandolf apart for a little open heart surgery. Our knowledge of mechanical things is fine, but when it comes to circuit boards and logic centers, we're a little lost.

This works on every point of sail except with the wind behind. The lines would hold course for five minutes and then we had to fine tune to get back on course.

After the first 24 hours, I was figuring out how long it uld take us to drift to Tahiti, if we put the sails away i just went below. After all, even a haystack will go wnwind. Nobody likes to steer, so Dave and Gretn said, "Yeah, that's the ticket, let's drift." Calculations came to 67.7 days. Too long!

On the fifth day of steering, I had Gandolf apart and as injecting 12 volts into various circuits and sistors, hoping to jump start him or, at least, make in suffer as we were. All of a sudden, Gandolf tarted to click. This was encouraging. We put all the rcuits back, hooked up the drive chain and crossed ur fingers.






Groundbreaking set for new **Pirate Playhouse**

Pine Island Sound. With the successes of captive dophin reproduction, it should no longer be necessary to remove dolphins from the wild. However, in a recent issue of your newspaper, reporters quoted a number of facts about dolphins

that are not entirely accurate. I would like the opportunity to clarify some of these. When speaking of a dolphin's life span in captivity,

one must be very careful of the origin of the statistic. While it is true that some facilities have abysmal survival rates, many have dolphins living

much longer due to increased knowledge of better husbandry practices. I am well acquainted with one, the Dolphin Reserch Center, which has two dolphins in their 30s and several in their 20s who show no signs of expiring any time soon. The center's oldest died when he was 44.

To say that a dolphin's life span in the wild is 40 to 50 years ignores the fact that not every dolphin lives that long. In the Indian River dolphin population, 60 percent of dolphins do not live to celebrate their 10th birthday.



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Dolphins in the wild also develop ulcers. While it seems that concrete tanks, a heavy show schedule and poor lighting may contribute to a captive dolphin developing ulcers, not all do. The Dolphin Research Center operates a critical care unit where other facilities send such stressed dolphins for recovery and they have an exellent record of success.

A dolphin is not necessarily controlled, even with hunger. Long ago, trainers discovered that the best way to work with dolphins was to gain their cooperation. Starving them into submission did not always work and, sometime ago, the Navy conducted research to that effect. Conversely, dolphins do not need to be bribed with fish to participate in training. While attending a week-long educational program at the Dolphin Research Center, I often observed the dolphins performing exuberant behaviors without any prompting just to gain people's attention.

Once released, captive dolphins also do not become "killer dolphins." Joe and Rosie, two bottlenosed dolphins were released by the ORCA-TIDES Foundation in 1987 after participating in language research for seven years. They have been spotted with other wild dolphins, so I doubt that they are "killers." -

To categorize all dolphin programs as "totally a money-making operation at the expense of a natural resource" ignores the educational benefits derived from well designed programs. People who wish to swim with dolphins at the Dolphin Research Center must attend two hours of educational presentations which includes conservation information. I know of letters received from swimmers telling of tuna boycotts that they have started in their schools and places of work in support of saving dolphins from death and harassement in tuna nets. Further, I attended a week-long college-accredited program at the Dolphin Research Center called Dolphinlab of which only 11/2 hours out of 60 is spent swimming with dolphins. My fellow students have also returned home and carried on campaigns of their own in support of dolphin preservation, from letters to editors of local papers to promoting a

county-wide ban on tuna being served in local school cafeterias.

There is a great deal of good that can come from a personal experience with marine mammals. I doubt very much that the save-the-whales movement would have received as much attention were it not for dolphins in captivity.

On the issue of research permits, there are two types; those issued by National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) for research involving the invasion of the dolphins' bodies, and those issued by the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) for noninvasive work. Since the Dolphin Research Center does not permit invasive research, they have not obtained a permit from NMFS, but do have one from APHIS.

In closing, let me add to a comment on abuse. "The abuse is having a highly intelligent sea mammal in captivity ... alone, in small, noisy or poorly lighted pools, with insufficient stimulation and intellectual challenge." I invite anyone to visit the Dolphin Research Center where dolphins live in large natural sea water pens with only a low fence separating them from the open sea and have them determine for themselves if all captive situations are abusive.

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
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
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# Experiment - you might like what you cook up

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Reading one of my favorite forms of literature, I came across a recipe for Chicken Piperade. This dish comes from the Basque area where every family has its own version.

In the past, I have written about this dish but the recent recipe was different than the one I have done before.

A Piperade is good, plain, country cooking which we both like as long as it is not greasy, heavy and overcooked.

Another country dish we are both fond of is a puree of potatoes and rutabagas. This is a

combination you seldom see in this country outside of the Pennsylvania Dutch areas ... most folk find rutabagas too "strong." I jazz this dish up with

freshly ground nutmeg and cream. If you cook them "my way" you will like them.

You should never be afraid of trying out different types of food and using what may sound like offbeat combinations. Do try different foods and blends; use your imagination. Don't be like an acquaintance of ours who, when faced with some slightly offbeat dish, would say, "How do I know I'll like it?" She obviously will never know until she tries. have had many. **Chicken** Piperade 1 broiler chicken, cut up

1 tablespoon butter 1 tablespoon olive oil

1 medium onion, chopped 1 medium green pepper, cored, seeded and chopped

1 medium red pepper, cored, seeded and chopped 2 medium tomatoes. cored, peeled and chopped 1 garlic clove, minced Salt and pepper to taste 3 sprigs fresh parsley 8 large fresh basil leaves

(or 1 teaspoon dried) In a large saute pan. brown the chicken in the oil and butter, brown on all sides. Remove from pan with slotted spoon and drain the chicken on paper towels, set aside. Drain the excess fat from pan, put back on stove on medium heat Add onions, pepper, tomatoes, garlic, salt and pepper. Cook for 5 minutes, stirring.

In a large casserole with a lid, place the drained chicken. Pour the vegetable mix over the meat and add the parsley and basil, cover and cook for 11/4 hours in pre-heated 325 degree oven. This will serve 4 people. Pasta is an excellent accompaniment.

Puree of Potatoes and Rutabagas 3/4 pounds of rutabagas. peeled and diced 11/4 pounds potatoes, peeled and diced Salt and pepper 2 tablespoons butter 1/4 teaspoon freshly grated nutmeg 1/2 cup heavy cream, heated Chopped parsley for garnish

Cook the potatoes and rutabagas in boiling water until tender, but not mushy. Drain. Place them in a food mill fitted with the medium blade (you can use a potato ricer.) When you have done this, whisk in the salt, pepper, butter, nutmeg and heavy cream. Spoon into a heated vegetable dish and garnish with parsley. Serve

# Managing mackerel populations

King and Spanish mackerel support very important commercial and recreational fisheries in the United States. This is especially true in Florida where 75 to 85 percent of all the commercially caught Spanish mackerel for both the Gulf and South Atlantic are landed. In 1988, nearly 3 million pounds of king mackerel and more than 5 million pounds of Spanish mackerel were landed by Florida's commercial fishermen. Recreational anglers took over 4 million pounds of king mackerel and over  $2\frac{1}{2}$ milion pounds were from Florida waters.



With the exception of a few small resident populations, king and Spanish mackerel are a migratory fishery resource. As such, they are not confined within manmade boundaries. Although they do not make great transoceanic trips like their cousins, the tuna, mackerel do travel thousands of miles on extensive migrations.

By 1985, the Gulf of Mexico and South Atlantic Fisheries Management Councils recognized that not only had the king and Spanish mackerel stocks been over-fished but also that there are two migratory groups off the U.S. the Gulf group and the Atlantic group. To complicate matters, there is mixing of these two groups off southern Florida.

Both the U.S. and Mexico have a vested interest in the mackerel fishery because of its migratory nature and its economic importance. Ongoing cooperative research between federal governments of the U.S. and Mexico, in the form of mackerel tagging and age, growth and genetic studies, are being conducted to address this interest scientifically. The exchange of landings data and research results are part of the effort being made to determine the relationship between king and Spanish mackerel caught off the U.S. and Mexico.

Continued research is necessary to provide information to the councils, especially on such issues as over-fishing.

In 1985, the Gulf Council felt that it would take a decade for fisheries to make a comeback to the 1978 and 1979 levels. In an attempt to restore previous levels of mackerel stocks, the council enacted reductions using quotas and bag limits for both the commercial and recreational catches. Although these measures were not popular, it appears that the decline has been arrested, such that the mackerel spawning population has apparently increased. As a result, the total allowable catch and the allocations for both recreational and commercial fishermen in the Gulf of Mexico and South Atlantic have been increased for the 1989-90 fishing season.

In spite of the increase in allocations, there is sure to be a heated debate this November when the management councils must adopt an appropriate definition of "over-fishing" in accordance with the new guidelines.

The migratory nature of king and Spanish mackerel, combined with the mixing phenomena and conflicts among user groups, make mackerel management a difficult and controversial task.

# **Island** osprey watchers sought

The International Osprey Foundation is seeking volunteers to help monitor the island ospreys and their offspring this year.

A training session will be held Saturday, Dec. 9, at 10 a.m. at the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation facilities at Tarpon Bay. Call volunteer coordinator Pattee Loveland at 463-7722 during business hours for more information.

There are 65 osprey territories and as many as 80 potential nesting sites on Sanibel. The number of occupied territories has almost doubled in the 11 years the foundation has been monitoring the raptors.

In recent years, osprey expert Mark "Bird" Westall, with his wife, Janie, and a handful of volunteers, have gone out in all kinds of weather and on all types of terrain to check every osprey nest on the island.

"The birds are doing fine, but we need help," said Westall, a founding member of the foundation and a Sanibel City Councilman.

The foundation has put up numerous artificial nesting platforms which have boosted the island osprey population and have lured birds off power poles, which used to account for many deaths. Volunteers will be assigned specific areas or nests to

monitor during the nesting season, which is mid-December through the end of April.

In his letter to Gardner, Gov. Martinez referred to the transportation permits that had been granted to the National Aquarium regarding dolphins to be taken from the Charlotte Harbor State Aquatic Preserve. # Cool weather brings in mackerel, bonito schools

We've had such a mild fall that it made us wonder if our fall run of Spanish mackerel would ever start, but the past few days have produced limit catches of these fish and others. Spanish mackerel move north in the spring and

south in the fall as they follow bait fish up and down the coast. If we have a colder fall, with several fronts, this brings the fish to our area in October or

early November. Along with the late mackerel are schools of bonito, ladyfish and a few bluefish.

Remember that the laws on several of our fish have changed in the past year. The bag limit for

Spanish mackerel is now four per angler, per day. There is also a 12-inch minimum on the colorful fish.

There is no bag or size limit on bonito. These fish remind me of tuna. They can reach up to 15 pounds or so, and they are some of the strongest running light tackle fish we encounter.

Bonito and even mackerel are around the island in limited numbers all year, but the gathering of great schools of bait along shore brings them together for our angling.

The strong easterly winds of the past few weeks have kept the gulf waters flat off Captiva and Cayo Costa islands and that's where fish were feeding. We found a school of bonito just 200 yards off the beach on North Captiva Island.



There were also schools near the causeway bridges and off the bar at the eastern end of Sanibel




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# Even man-of-wars have a natural enemy

One of the most dangerous animals found around Florida beaches is the Portuguese man-of-war. It's a purple, floating jellyfish which can inflict a painful sting. However, there is an even more unusual shell which eats the feared man-of-war.

My first experience with the floating purple ballon was while taking a certification dive for a SCUBA course in the Florida Keys. I was rising towards the surface, looking down at the reefs, and when I looked up, it was into the long tenacles of a man-ofwar. It wrapped around my face, but with the mask

on, it made contact with only my neck and ears. The poison quickly spread and by the time I got in the boat and took my equipment off, I looked like I had been lashed with a whip. It went away in a day or so, but I quickly learned to scan the surface before I came up.





'Twas the week before Christmas

The month of December in a needlework shop is very unusual. No one is interested in starting a new project. Everyone is frantic about finishing their Christmas gifts. We sell more yarn needles than




ever to sew up sweaters, small circular knitting needles to rib a neckline and double pointed needles to complete the toe of a stocking. And, it is very necessary that there is white fuzzy yarn on hand for Santa's beard.

Many families have new members that need a stocking with their name on it. The duplicate or darning stitch, as it is sometimes called, is a very quick process. Using a large, blunt point yarn needle, threaded with a contrasting color, make stitches directly on top of knit stitches, exactly duplicating their position. Letters are usually seven stitches high and five stitches wide. Write it out in pencil first, using the letter "V" for each stitch. Count the number of spaces the name will require (allowing two spaces between each letter) and center it on the stocking. Your stitches should be loose. Tug and stretch the work after each stitch. Another last minute finishing technique is making a pompon. These furry balls of yarn go on the top of a hat or decorate packages, which won't get crushed in the mail. Cut two cardboard disks 3 inches in diameter, or the desired size of the pompon. Cut a  $\frac{3}{4}$ 

inch hole in the center of both. Thread a yarn needle with two long strands of yarn. Place the disks together and wrap them tightly with yarn, by circling the needle around the outside and through the hole. Leave the ends free. You will have to use two or three more double strands of yarn to fill the circles. Slip scissors between the disks and cut all strands around the outside edge. Draw a strand of yarn around the bundle of yarn. Knot the strand and leave long ends to attach it to your project. Remove

the cardboard pieces and fluff it outward. Large pmpons are great for attaching to key chains which won't get lost in purses. Experienced travellers also attach pompons to their luggage for quick identification at baggage claims. What a great





As "Dad" opens, investment banker John Tremont (Ted Danson) is called home to California when his cranky mother (Olympia Dukakis of "Moonstruck") is hospitalized with a heart attack. It's not so much

Mom who needs him as John's almost octogenerian father. Jake (Jack Lemmon), who has grown helpless and senile since retirement. Jake responds positively to his son's care and

encouragement and is soon getting his driver's license and playing catch in the backyard. His rebirth is shortlived, though, when after Bette Tremont's

release, it is discovered that Jake has cancer. At this juncture, John moves into the hospital to care for his dad, who's plunged into. catatonic despair by an insensitive physician. John again brings his father back from the edge only to have him sink into schizophrenia. It seems that Jake has retreated into a fantasy world for much of his life, and now that imaginary life is threatening to take over. His psychiatrist encourages him to live more joyfully, and this he does with abandon, until he's hospitalized once more for cancer.

This may begin to sound a bit like the "disease of the week" show and with good reason. A lot of soap opera has been packed into this lone film, where one or two crises would have sufficed. What worked for a while becomes ancient with repetition as "Dad' lurches toward a tearjerker finale.



It should be pointed out that the cast, particularly Lemmon and Dukakis, has managed to a certain degree to salvage Goldberg and his film. Lemmon (in heavy make-up) uses his considerable skills to make Jake sweet and engaging while riding the roller coaster of illness and recuperation.

Dukakis is convincing as the joyless and domineering Bette, and Danson is competent as their son. Kathy Baker, who was outstanding in the recent "Jacknife" and "Clean and Sober," is basically wasted as John's sister.

It's a tribute to the solid acting in "Dad" that we are able to care about the characters in spite of the implausible events.



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
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
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# Environmentalists: Merger will weaken submerged lands protection By Steve Ruediger

would be weakened under proposed regulations drafted for the planned merger of the Bureau of Aquatic Preserves into the Bureau of Submerged Land Management, environmentalists charged Tues- group members answered that they had not written it day at a hearing at the Lee County Courthouse.

Various speakers from the audience pointed out that the new rules allow self-permitting of docks rather than a public hearing process, allow docks to be built in six-foot-deep water rather than the current four-foot limit, allow bridges to be built over submerged lands to barrier islands currently not connected by bridges in contrast to current regulations which do not allow such bridges, eliminate consideration of the cumulative effect of small projects and allow dredging.

"This seems to be an effort to scrap existing laws under the guise of efficiency," commented Bob Southern of the Sierra Club.

Lee County Commissioner Ray Judah testified that existing language provided more protection for natural resources. Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation Executive Director Erick Lindblad told the panel taking testimony that it was misleading to say at the beginning that the intent was to manage and protect natural resources when that was not what the regulations would do. The three-man panel taking the testimony during

the hearing was chaired by Larry Wood, bureau chief of the Florida Bureau of Submerged Land Management. Saying the meeting was to be informal, Wood introduced the other two men on the panel as Jim and Charles. The crowd of about 100 people never were told any more about them. Wood told the crowd that the merger of the two

departments would improve protection of aquatic preserves by providing more personnel to deal with them. Gene Boyd, president of the Greater Pine Island

Civic Association, quickly testified that he had examined the proposed flow charts for the merged department and couldn't find where any more person-

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nel would be dealing with aquatic preserves.

The panel frequently responded to objections to the proposed rules by saying it was only a draft and they Florida regulations protecting submerged lands were already looking into making changes to meet that particular objection.

Finally, somebody asked if they did not know who had written it, how would they know who to report back to with suggestions for changes based on the testimony they were receiving?

After some hesitation, the panel members said they would report back to Percy Mallison, director of the Division of State Lands. Later they said they would report to Tom Gardner, director of the Department of Natural Resources.

Bob Repenning of the DNR told the crowd there were some problems with the proposed regulations but that actually they were an improvement over the old regulations. He pointed out that the new regulations outlawed live-aboard boats staying at anchor over state-owned submerged lands and prohibited putting telephone and electric wires and water pipes over submerged lands. Those regulations had not previously existed.

those two items be added to the old rules and that otherwise the old rules be left the same.

The specific proposal on which testimony was being heard was to eliminate chapters 18-20 and 18-21 of Florida regulations and create a new chapter, 18-25, which theoretically was just a merged version of the eliminated chapters.

When they were asked why there were so many wording changes which seemed to have nothing to do with the proposed merger of the two departments, the hearing panel members said they didn't know.

Richard Huxtable testified that conservationists had worked for years to protect the natural resources of Florida.

"If you rip the guts out of 18-20," he said, "You are ripping the guts out of us."


