

Special meeting called for 'election' clarification

Sanibel City Attorney Bob Pritt called a special session of the City Council on Oct. 30, in order for the council to consider a resolution that authorizes a hand count of the ballots and votes for the election of City Council members on Nov. 6 and any runoff election.

The extraordinary action was deemed necessary after Sanibel Deputy Clerk Renee Lynch and Lee County Supervisor of Elections Philinda Young asked Pritt for a clarification of the meaning of the term "in the election" in a section of the City Charter amended by referendum in 1989.

How that term is interpreted could have far-reaching effects on the results of the upcoming election.

In a letter sent to all the candidates last Friday, Oct. 26, Pritt explained that the amended section is one which explains the election process. It provides that the candidates receiving the highest number of votes are elected if they also get votes from a majority of electors who voted in the "election." The question is whether the "election" referred to in that phrase is the City Council election or the general election.

Pritt enclosed a six-page opinion written to Lynch, in which he concluded that "election" is intended to mean the City Council election and not the entire general election.

A possible scenario was included in the opinion, which uses the actual numbers from the 1988 City Council election for former Seat 3: The total ballots cast were 3,526: 913 votes were cast for Candidate A, 580 votes were cast for Candidate B, and 1,648 votes were cast for Candidate C. The total votes cast for candidates for Seat 3 were 3,141.

If "votes from a majority of the electors who voted in the election" is based upon the 3,526 (total ballots) figure, a candidate could be elected with 1,746 votes; if based upon the 3,141 (total votes for council candidates) figure, a candidate could be elected with 1,571 votes.

Depending on the interpretation, the front-runner in the Nov. 6 election could win or face a runoff.

Pritt told the candidates that if they disagreed with his conclusion or, for any reason, "find that this position is (or turns out to be) damaging to their aspirations," they

Burning issue ignites debate

The proposed Lee County incinerator was the issue open for debate last Wednesday, Oct. 24 when a varied group of people gathered at Riverdale High School in east Fort Myers.

The cast involved included three people in favor of the plant, three opposed to it, one moderator, media representatives, a number of sheriff's deputies and an audience to provide the chorus.

The audience seemed by its applause and occasionally shouted comments to be opposed to the incinerator. The rule that applause would not be allowed was not enforced.

The entire Lee County Commission plus the political opponents of the two running for re-election were in the audience. So were other politicians.

The side opposed to the incinerator argued that it was most expensive way to handle waste, that recycling preferable and that it would release hazardous substances into the air. The supporters argued the incinerator was a necessary part of an overall plan that includes recycling and landfill, that people who assert that 80 percent of waste can be recycled are not living in the real world and that no unacceptable health risk is posed by the facility. The audience had been asked to submit written questions and it complied so well that the forum would have lasted all night if all the questions had been asked. As it was, it lasted about four hours. A variety of people from Sanibel were recognizable in the audience. The panelists opposed to the incinerator included Craig Volland, a civil engineer from Kansas City, Mo.; David Dee, head of a Boca Raton recycling company; and Richard Swartz, a county commissioner from Lake County. In favor of the facility were: Lee Casey, Lee County Director of Solid Waste Management; Sam Rosania, recycling coordinator for Lee County; and Dr. Frank H. Lawrence, a medical doctor from Portland, Me.

Beware the creatures of the night (real and make believe) this Halloween

Vampires won't be the only ones lurking outdoors after dark this Halloween, looking to suck your blood.

The bite of an encephalitis-infected mosquito can be just as fatal, so the Lee County Health Department suggests trick-or-treating before it gets dark, then spending the fright night indoors.

"It's too early to lower your guard," said Jim Burgess, encephalitis surveillance supervisor for the Lee County Mosquito Control District.

A mosquito trap set overnight on Sanibel Oct. 24 yielded well over 2,000 mosquitoes, of which 1,472 were *Culex nigripalpus* mosquitos, the kind responsible for transmitting the encephalitis virus to humans, Burgess said.

"That was the highest mosquito count in the county," Burgess said. "Anytime the count is over 1,000, the

Barbara A. Swanson of Fort Myers was ticketed for allegedly going 52 mph on Sanibel-Captiva Road Wednesday, Oct. 24.



There's more to vote for than city candidates

In the Nov. 6 general election, Sanibel voters will be asked to cast "yes" or "no" votes for the following amendments to the Sanibel City Charter and four amendments to the Florida Constitution.

Sanibel City Charter amendment: Payment for City Council and Planning Commission members. Authorizes \$3,750 annual compensation for City Council members. The City Council would set the annual salary for members of the Planning Commission, but it would not exceed that paid to council members.

Constitutional amendment No. 1: Earlier legislative sessions. The legislature would be required by 1992 to shift its convening date for annual 60day regular sessions from early April to early February.

Constitutional amendment No. 2: Three-day wait on handgun purchases. A handgun purchaser would have to wait three business days, excluding weekends and legal holidays, before he or she could take a handgun home after buying it. Violators would be committing a felony and would face up to five years in prison and a \$5,000 fine.

Constitutional amendment No. 3: Limiting state mandates. City and county governments would be excused from state laws that require them to spend funds unless the law fulfills an important state interest and is enacted by a 2/3 vote in both House and Senate. The state would provide funding. Exempt are laws covering criminals, pension benefits and elections.

Constitutional amendment 4: More open governmental meetings. Beginning in January, meetings between two or more members of the legislature would be reasonably open to the public if the meeting could lead to agreement on pending legislation. Similar meetings between the governor, the Senate president or the Speaker of the House also would be reasonably open.



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Exhibits at the Library

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On display at the library through November are two unusual collections, "Marine Algae Collages," and "Digging up Bones.'

"Digging up Bones" are fossils self-collected by amateur Paleontologists from various sites in Florida and the Northwest Nebraska Badlands. The Florida fossils date from the Pleistocene and Pliocene epoch (1-5 million years ago) of the Cenozoic era. The Nebraska fossils are from the Olizocene epoch (24-37 million years ago) of the Cenozoic era.

The "Marine Algae Collages" are various types of seaweed collected from Long Island Sound. The seaweed is selected, identified and arranged into pleasing compositions. The algae retains its natural colors of red, pink, green, brown, and purple. ☆. ☆ <u>ି</u>ଦ୍ଧ

Something strange in the neighborhood

Ghosts. They were once relegated to the attics of dilapidated and abandoned houses -- only to be let out on Halloween, and then secreted beneath bland white sheets. Their film appearances were limited to a cartoon apparition named Casper and spooky opaques with the monosyllabic vocabulary of "boo".

Today's ghosts are much more sophisticated and trendy. Trustworthy, even. Normal, everyday people -- from waitresses to stock brokers -- are consulting them to improve the quality of their lives.


They dress better, too, often in high-tech special effects on the silver screen. They are welcomed into the finest establishments, including Sanibel's old Pirate Playhouse, where the ghost of Philip Hunter is said to stalk.

Kelly Duncan, former islander and Pirate Playhouse trouper, claims she has seen the spirit. And liked it.

"It was never a bad feeling. I was never really frightened," she said. "I actually found it kind of comforting."

Duncan had heard stories about the ghost of Hunter, a retired actor who, with his wife Ruth, ran the Pirate Playhouse until his death several years ago. Duncan had two opportunities to meet Hunter's ghost during the 1988-89 season when she returned to Sanibel and joined the company that played there.

"I was napping in the back room, which used to be Ruth and Philip's bedroom," the actress said, describing the experience in a phone conversation from her current



home in Seattle. "The back door squeaked and opened, and a very tall figure appeared. It startled me. I sat up quick and it was gone!".

Duncan says she knows she had closed the door. She was sure it was Hunter's ghost because it was tall and thin, as was Hunter.

"I've always believed that when a person dies his energy doesn't die. There's so much energy put into theater ... I had no doubt Philip was still in that building."

Hunter's ghost visited Duncan a second time after that. The cast had partied late one night at the playhouse following a production. As they were saying goodbyes in the parking lot, Duncan remembered she had left the box of ticket revenues in the theater. She went back for it.

"I got this eerie feeling that I wasn't alone," Duncan recalls. "And then this piece of paper came flitting through the room ... like it came out of the ceiling. I ran out of there without the box. I thought to myself, "This is too weird."

The slip of paper, Duncan said, contained information

on abortion, an issue the Hunters actively fought against during their tenure at Pirate Playhouse. They often handed out such tracts to theater patrons at the box office.

Although others call the stories about Hunter's ghost a publicity stunt, Duncan firmly believes in psychical phenomena. "If you're open to it and not afraid, it happens to you," she says. "People will call you nuts. But so what?"

"Maybe it's past-life memory intruding on present time. Or it could be race memory or some kind of telepathic or clairvoyant contact," the silver-screen ghostbusters explain to the woman who finds a chilling monster in her fridge.

"From the physical point of view," writer Hans Holzer, former real-life ghost hunter, "a ghost personality ... consists of an electromagnetic field that contains all the emotional impulses or stimuli accumulated prior to passing."

With more scientific mumbo-jumbo, Holzer expounds upon much the same theory as Duncan's belief in the immortality of human energy.

Duncan, however, concludes her theories on spiritual beliefs with a totally unscientific observation: "It's more fun believing than not."

though they gave the safe answer that the letter was illegal, but now are going to investigate to determine if it really is or is not illegal.

Instructions in the letter shows that the money sent (\$1) to any individual is for payment to be placed on a new mailing list so that in reality this is a mail order program.

It seems to me that that letter is more legal than the hundreds of junk mail letters received that offer for sale varying types of items, but also included in the mailed package is a so-called sweepstakes. They say you do not have to purchase anything to participate, but the implication is that your chances are better if you do. The law:

Mailing of any newspaper, circular, pamphlet or publication of any kind containing any advertisement of any lottery, gift enterprise or scheme of any kind offering prizes dependent in whole or in part upon lot or chance, or containing any list of the prizes drawn or awarded by means of such lottery gift enterprise or scheme, whether said list contains any part or all of the prizes, is unlawful.

The junk mail falls directly into that category where the chain letter does not.

I am making the assumption that your investigating reporters will follow up on the quick statement made by the postal authorities, and print the final decision as to whether that specific chain letter is or is not legal. If it is Once again, my hat is off to Pat Degand for a job well done! May God bless her and her family!

On Jan. 14, 1987, I volunteered to be coordinator for Sanibel for the "Save Our Homes" drive originated by a Lee County citizens group and directed by Ken Wilkenson, Lee County Property Appraiser, who had been appointed president of the organization. I was handed a box containing 1,000 petitions with instructions as follows: "Ballot Title & Summary -- Homestead Valuation Limitations. I am a registered voter of Florida and hearby petition the Secretary of State to place the following amendment to the Florida constitution on the ballot in the general election to be held Nov. 8, 1988."

11-30-87: Sen. Fred Dudley, R-Cape Coral, and Rep. Keith Arnold, D-Fort Myers, proposed and sponsored an amendment to the state constitution limiting the annual property tax to 3 percent. It stalled in both places.

1-1-88: A Political Action Committee formed to promote a statewide referendum regarding property tax increases. However, we needed financial support (about \$250 and a petition campaign of 400,000 signatures) to


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
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
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
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State, county candidates stump on Sanibel

If there was any hot air around last Thursday night, Oct. 25, it could only be found indoors at Sanibel Community Center, where almost 100 people came in from the first cool, blustery weather of the season to hear what some off-island politicians had to say about a variety of issues.

The occasion was another Candidates' Night sponsored by Committee of the Islands, but unlike the previous forum with Sanibel City Council hopefuls, this one featured candidates for state and county positions.

COTI moderator Bob Maurer set the rules and held the candidates to them, despite the protest from County Commissioner Bill Fussell's representative, who felt it was "not very efficient" and "not democratic" that representatives of absent candidates were not permitted to participate in the question-and-answer period or the allotted speechmaking time given each candidate present. Absent candidates' representatives were sidelined during the forum but were allowed to answer questions afterward.

Attending were incumbent state Sen. Fred Dudley and his opponent Bill McLaughlin; Connie Allegra, who's running for state representative; Bob Southern, one of four Lee County Commission candidates; and both candidates for the District 5 school board seat, incumbent Barbara Wallace and Carlo Lane.

The question-and-answer portion covered many of the "hot" issues.

When asked if schools should be paid for on a pay-asyou-go basis from current property taxes or with longterm financing, Wallace answered that, in the past, the board considered the pay-as-you-go approach to be the most fiscally responsible, but now she "understands amortization" and supports a lease-purchase plan that would allow the board to bond money to build schools.

Lane said he favored long-term financing, and added that if the district boundary system was pulled in, children could attend schools closer to their homes, which could

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reduce the need for so many new schools. He also favored 12-month usage of the schools and gave an example whereby the year would be divided into four quarters and the students would attend three of the sessions.


Neither Dudley nor McLaughlin favored amending the Growth Management Act of 1985. In answer to whether Proposition 3 would decrease the effectiveness of the Growth Management Act, it was explained that it wouldn't be affected at all because it is not retroactive in its application.

One questioner specifically asked Dudley if he still supports legislation such as he introduced in the state senate that would give to landowners (such as Lykes Bros.) the submerged land between high and low water on Florida's creeks and rivers. Dudley said he would require the Department of Natural Resources to list all properties of dry land where it claims state ownership, and favors a system to give property owners 180 days to appeal.


Allegra said that if the waters are navigable the public should have access. She said she would not take money from companies that want to take that right away. McLaughlin said that any prohibition of the public from sovereign lands should be prohibited, and that the DNR should be funded enough for sovereign waters to be defended at all costs.

As far as the incinerator issue, Southern said he favors proceeding with caution and that all options should be investigated. He mentioned an idea for an intermediate processing center, which would take the "headaches" out of recycling by being the agent to sort, transport and market recyclables, as well as share the profits with the governing body. He favors most of the energy being put into recycling.

On abortion: McLaughlin is pro-choice; Dudley said, "personally, it's wrong," but as a matter of public policy abortion should only be allowed in cases of rape, incest or when the health of the mother is at stake. He said abortion should not be allowed "after the fetus is viable," but never explained what he meant, after a doctor questioned his statement.



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
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Bill McLaughlin's comment appears to be an eye-opener for Sen. Fred Dudley.



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Dudley, Allegra and McLaughlin each support a bottle bill. Dudley and McLaughlin specifically favor having deposits on other products (plastics, Styrofoam) as well, but Dudley qualified his support of deposits on plastics to be "only if they don't reach recycling goals."

Regarding the lottery, Dudley referred to it as a fraud, and McLaughlin said Dudley had "waffled" on the subject by not being a stronger advocate for getting the money back for enhancement programs. Allegra said the legislature should act more responsibly by doing "as much as budget constraints would allow."

Dudley, McLaughlin and Allegra each claim to be active supporters of the Save Our Homes petition, and Allegra pointed out that her absent opponent, Rep. Tim Ireland, did not sign the petition nor did he sponsor the legislation.

A two-part question regarding the Sanibel bridge and causeway was asked of county commission candidates: Will you see that the causeway repairs are done to everyone's satisfaction? Will you uphold the referendum that is the law on Sanibel now, and listen to what the people have told you? Southern agreed that Los County had


Southern agreed that Lee County had reneged on its responsibility to maintain the causeway structures in anticipation of tearing it down, and said it now is the county's responsibility to "make it right." Southern touched the hearts of many when he talked of his love of the beauty of the causeway and its "enjoyable atmosphere." He said that when its condition is deteriorated to the point of needing replacement, the new design should conform to what Sanibel wants, i.e. "Take politics out of it and inject common sense into it."

When contacted after the meeting, Southern's opponent, incumbent Doug St. Cerny answered yes to both, "no questions asked! ... It's not government's place to force something on people when they don't want it."

Incumbent Bill Fussell said he would make sure the repairs are done, and was waiting for the results of Sanibel's own inspection report. He said that it was a "total surprised" to him that the people didn't want the replacement because, as a commissioner and representative of Sanibel, Porter Goss had given every indication that islanders didn't like being detained by the drawbridge and they all wanted a new bridge.

Fussell's challenger, Vicki Lopez-Wolfe was not available for comment.

The most applause that night was for Maurer when he informed the audience that the bed sheets on the candidates' tables were his.



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


go before the Supreme Court. This was a statewide action. 4-25-88: At this point, we had enough signatures for the court and discussed the possibility of the Academy of Trial Lawyers representing our initiative before the court. Regardless, we were going to the court as soon as the signatures are verified by the state Elections Office.

5-10-88: The measure sponsored by Sen. Fred Dudley and supported by the "Save Our Homes" group led by Ken Wilkenson called for a constitutional amendment and would have needed to gain 3/5 approval from the House and Senate before going on the November ballot for voter approval. The measure passed the Senate by a 6-3 vote in the same committee that killed the proposal the year before. Rep. Keith Arnold sponsored a bill in the House but it was not scheduled for committee hearings. "The bill has some problems with some of the House leadership,"

5-88: During 1987-88, I had eight to 10 strong sales people out getting signed petitions as we wanted to get them on the ballot in the 1988 referendum. We signed up 2,340 petitions out of the 3,400 registered voters here. The most signatures came from Gumbo Limbo, The Rocks and Shell Harbor. We were told that we had the highest ratio of any place in the state, only to find out that all of our work was for naught as the '87 and '88 petitions were destroyed because of the wording. See the first paragraph about "Homestead Valuation Limitation" regarding the date Nov. 8, 1988. All the signatures were null and void if they were received before that date. I just recently found out about this from Dudley at the





Candidate's Night on Oct. 12, 1990. This accounts for our shortage now.

4-7-89: At the meeting of the Southwest Florida Consortium of Local Governments, all the members were represented except Cape Coral. No formal action could be taken as all three members (Sanibel, Lee County and Cape Coral) needed to be present. This was hard to understand. Although there were no representatives from Cape Coral present at the meeting, the other two members agreed to include "Save Our Homes" in their legislative priority package, which, ergo, instructed lobbyist, Paul Pillar, to lobby for SJR-36 (Dudley) and HJR-281 (Arnold).

11-90: We will have two big problems on election day on Nov. 6, 1990 regarding "Save Our Homes." This is causing me more anxious moments than at any time in the four years I have served as coordinator.

#1 -- Since our '87 and '88 petitions were destroyed by the legislature, we must have about 400,000 petitions replaced statewide. There is no weapon that takes the place of signed petitions. That's why we have to be careful on voting. Be sure the candidate is one who sympathizes with "Save Our Homes" and keeps taxes to a minimum. I would like to have two or three tables set up at the polling place, Tuesday, Nov. 6 from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. for the signing of petitions. Each person will work two to three hours -- the more volunteers the shorter the hours. # 2 -- Congratulations! If issue #1 is a success, now comes the touchy part -- finances. We are very short. I have never asked for any money from any of the petition signers but now we are at the end of the line and we must ask. We don't have enough to print the petitions. Wilkenson travels all over the state soliciting new counties and attending legislative meetings and pays this out of his own pocket. He tried a part-time lobbyist but ran out of money; a fund raiser wanted too much (70 percent). We could not raise enough to over-rule the legislature to go to the Supreme Court. We have to depend on donations as we don't have enough corporations to help. Coca-Cola has given Wilkenson limited support and might consider more. One theory is that corporations shy away from offering support in the belief that the amendment could shift more tax burden to corporations. Wilkenson does not believe in this theory.

Total donations, that I know of, to "Save Our Homes" so far in four years, has been \$80. Maybe some have been sent direct to Wilkenson, that is why I like to receive the petitions at my house so that Sanibel will get full credit . for the hard work and generosity.


Hubcap theft suspects' Corvette impounded

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

Development at St. Michael's authorized by planners

The Planning Commission Oct. 23 recommended approval of conditional use and development permits for a 24-foot extension of the existing two-story framed profile of St. Michael and All Angels Episcopal Church on Periwinkle Way, as well as the construction of a new 3,230-square-foot building to house Noah's Ark thrift shop and an on-site driveway which will access the rear of the church's property on Dunlop Road, across from the Historical Museum.



In other business at the Oct. 23 Planning Commission meeting:

• The commission recommended approval of Jerry Stern's request for a variance to parking standards which will allow a medical office in the Sanibel Promenades on TARPON BAY ROAD with less than the required number of parking spaces for the commercial uses. The commissioners added the condition that the office be operated in such a manner so as to ensure that no more than four parking spaces are used. A second hearing will take place Nov. 13.

• The Planning Commission unanimously recommended approval of Greg Turner's request for a temporary use permit to allow for a temporary sales office in a model home on Bella Vista Way in an 18unit non-resort residential development known as COLONY BEACH ESTATES. A final hearing is scheduled for Nov. 13.

Actions taken at the Oct. 16 City Council meeting included:

• The councilmen unanimously passed a resolution that in effect amends a previous resolution to update the names of the six CANDIDATES FOR CITY COUNCIL, changing James Levy's name to Jim Levy on the ballot.

• The council voted unanimously to pass a resolution upholding the Planning Commission's decision to deny Stanley and Diana B. Gordon's request for a variance to allow the installation of a staircase that would encroach in the Bay Beach ecological zone at their home on LIGHTHOUSE WAY. The Gordon's request for a variance for an air conditioning platform in the same zone was previously granted by the commission.

• The council voted unanimously to pass a resolution making a zone boundary interpretation of the exact location of a zone line between Mangrove Forest and Upland Wetland ecological zones on Brenda Bayly's **DINKINS BAYOU** parcel. Rae Ann Scholle, of Environmental Consultants Unlimited, presented her findings, which were fully supported by the Planning Department, and called the request "so simple, it's confusing," when the council's discussion became unnecessarily tangled.

Planners to rework ordinance forming sensitive land district

Planning commissioners Oct. 23 studied the first draft of an ordinance establishing an environmentally sensitive lands conservation district, and after due consideration and with little public input decided to send it back to the Planning Department to iron out some of the more sticky points in the language.

It also was deemed "Too much too soon without public comment," by Commissioner Jim Levy.

The ordinance was made necessary when the voters passed a City Charter revision last year that requires action to remove land from an environmentally sensitive lands conservation district be taken only by an ordinance adopted by 4/5 of the membership of council. The charter establishes a procedure to remove land from the district when, in fact, Sanibel does not have such a district.

The proposed ordinance is only the first of several steps in the formation of that district. The amendment to the Comprehensive Land Use Plan would merely establish the framework of the district -- a statement of purpose and general objectives and policies for the district. Following that would be a Land Development Code amendment that would be more specific -- would set the boundaries by way of a map, contain specific objectives and the permitted uses and development standards for the district.

One of the questions raised is whether to include only city-owned lands or to also include federal, state and privately owned lands. Currently, the city owns some 100 acres of environmentally sensitive lands and is considering the purchase of approximately 400 acres more. J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge contains 5,000 acres of federal land, the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation owns 1,000 acres and the state of Florida owns approximately 175 acres -- that's more than 60 percent of Sanibel owned and managed for conservation purposes.

The general purpose of the ordinance is to provide better protection and ensure preservation of these lands, according to Assistant Planning Director Ken Pfalzer. Protection works better when lands are managed within a system, and the ordinance would ensure the enhancement and restoration of natural systems. This also would be one of the advantages of including lands other than only those owned by the city.

Another benefit for inclusion of lands other than just city-owned lands would be to further restrict lands in the event that they are sold or developed, which is not so farfetched regarding the federal lands.

Commissioner Jim Krieger suggested that the city not complicate matters by trying to add federal or foundation lands. He said the city should set up the district with only its own lands, get a proven track record and then get the cooperation of the other agencies.

The mention of "management" of the lands led to several more questions, including that of a reference to the Surface Water Management Plan. Commissioner Jim Levy adamantly objected to the inclusion of such wording, pointing out that it is a political issue. He said the Surface Water Management Plan has been a "big bugaboo" in the community for some time and possibly was a factor in the defeat of the \$10 million bond issue. Bob Janes -- who would do the managing and what budgetary impact would be incurred?

Erick Lindblad, executive director of SCCF, said he knew the board would be wholeheartedly in favor of a district that would ensure the city-owned lands are preserved for conservation purposes. Since it hadn't been formally discussed with the SCCF board, he would have no way of knowing exactly how encumbered SCCF lands would be if put into such a district, or if his board would even want to do such a thing. He suggested the commission hold off on any action until the issues can be further studied.

Commissioner Louise Johnson agreed with Levy regarding the inclusion of references to the Surface Water Management Plan, and said she wouldn't want the ordinance to provide open-ended permission or a mandate to have structured management put on the lands.

Johnson made a motion to recommend passage of the ordinance with certain language changes and deletions, but later withdrew her motion when she saw it was "causing such consternation" among her fellow commissioners, all of whom advocated further consideration in greater depth.

The matter was continued until the next Planning Commission meeting on Nov. 13.

• The council heard first reading of an ordinance amending the Code of Ordinances to allow for a new FEE SCHEDULE FOR COPIES OF PUBLIC RECORDS both certified and noncertified. A second reading of the ordinance will be held Nov. 6.

• The council unanimously authorized the city staff to proceed with actions necessary to protect the use of the CITY SEAL by making it a registered federal trademark.

• The council decided to give a "token \$1,000" to the COALITION FOR A DRUG-FREE LEE COUNTY, after it had requested a donation of \$5,000 from Sanibel. City Manager Gary Price said the request not only came in after this year's budget hearings, but the organization already has received \$16,000 from Lee County. Other questions regarding management were raised by Commissioner Ernie Klaudt and Commission Chairman

would certainly be within their rights to make a legal challenge and obtain a court determination.

He cautioned the candidates that the right to such a challenge may be very limited in time because of the proximity of the runoff election (Nov. 27) to the City Council election (Nov. 6). He also suggested they may wish to seek the advise of their own legal counsel.

Pritt outlined the proper procedure for the timeconsuming task of hand counting the ballots:

"1. Tally the votes for each candidate.

"2. Count the number of valid ballots cast for the office of city councilman. This consists of any Sanibel elector who voted for either one or two council candidates. Whether the person voted for one candidate or two candidates, each ballot is still one ballot. Do not include any ballot in which there was no vote for council, or three or more votes for council.

"3. Find the one candidate with the most votes. Then divide the number of votes he or she received by the total

number of ballots upon which there was one or two votes for council (ballots cast for council). Did the top votegetter also get more than 50 percent of the ballots cast for council? If so, he or she is elected. If not, he or she goes into the runoff election with the next two highest votegetters.

"4. Do the same for the second highest vote-getter. Note that in the 1990 election, with six candidates for two seats it is rather unlikely that the second vote-getter will also have a majority. Thus, there will probably be a runoff with at least the second and third highest vote-getters, and perhaps the first."

Pritt also noted that the results of the election may be delayed somewhat because of the now-necessary hand counting of the ballots.

Pritt told The Islander that after the election is over, it is likely that the new City Council will be considering some proposed changes to the City Charter regarding elections.



and that the release of mercury into the air is the primary concern. He said the danger was not as great in past years when paper was the primary component of trash. Now dangers are greater in the ages of electronics and plastics.

Lawrence later countered that people in the vicinity would get .001 milligrams of mercury from the facility compared to the

between 20 and 75 milligrams of mercury people get from food during their lifetimes. Dee estimated that people could recycle 85 percent of their trash and added that recycling is much cheaper than incineration.

Rosania later countered that he had recently come back from looking over the Seattle recycling effort which has received praise nationally and he found they were only succeeding in recycling at a 28 percent rate by Florida standards.



Swartz argued that the incinerator raises costs and requires a constant stream of garbage while lowering the amount communities deliver.

He said that trash collection rates doubled and that since the amount communities had to pay depended on what they brought to the facility, towns in the county were pushing recycling, which put more of a




"You either take garbage to the incinerator or you take dollar bills," said the articulate commissioner.

Providing Halloween treats for island children proved to be quite a trick for the merchants of the Periwinkle Place shopping center last Saturday, Oct. 27.



"If we don't get \$2,000, I'll be really, really surprised," she said.







Goblins, witches and broomstick lace

Grab a broomstick from a Halloween witch and crochet yourself a stole for your winter cruise. Yes, you actually can crochet lace with a broomstick handle and a crochet hook. If your broomstick "flew away" or if the handle is too rough, a size 50 knitting needle can be used. It's called a Broomstick Lace pin.

You also need a size G crochet hook and 3 skeins (100 gms. each) of 4-ply knitting worsted. Don't be too concerned about the type of yarn. A stole doesn't have to be exact measurements and textured or fuzzy yarns make a nice effect.



Each row is worked in 2 steps, working to the right, picking up loops with the hook and then working these loops of the pin in groups of 5. To get started, chain 150 *loosely* with the crochet hook. Holding the broomstick Lace pin in your left hand, slip the loop from the crochet hook onto the pin. Skip the first chain and insert hook in next chain, pull up a loop and slip the loop onto the pin, being careful to keep loop straight. Continue working into each chain to put 150 loops onto the pin. Do not turn your work. The side facing you is the right side.

Step 1: Insert hook from left to right through first 5 loops on pin (Fig. 2) and slip these 5 loops off, being careful not to tighten first loop. Wrapping the yarn over hook, draw through all 5 loops. Chain 1 (Fig. 3). Work 5 single crochets in the center of these same 5 loops (Fig. 4). Insert hook from left to right through next 5 loops on pin. Slip these 5 loops off and work 5 single crochets in the center. This is the second group made. Continue this step until there are 30 groups.

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Yorkshire pudding and other treats

I love Yorkshire pudding. For some reason, it is usually just served when you have a standing rib roast of beef. Why just beef, I do not know. After all, it is nothing but an enormous glorified pop-over which I have a great weakness for.

We have Yorkshire pudding with a roast leg of lamb, and if you do not like lamb fat, use left over beef drippings or butter. All you have to do is make sure you have 1/4 cup of either to coat a very hot, two-quart souffle dish with.

Yorkshire Pudding

- 2 eggs
- 1 cup milk
- 1 cup sifted flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 cup beef drippings or butter

Pre-heat oven to 450 degrees. Place the eggs, milk, flour and salt in a blender and blend thoroughly. Let sit 30 minutes. Place the well greased dish in the oven to get it very hot, then remove from oven and pour the batter in and place the dish in the oven for 10 minutes. Turn the oven down to 350 degrees and bake 15 to 20 minutes



longer, until it is brown and puffy. Remove from oven and with a sharp knife cut slices and serve immediately.

While browsing through a food and wine magazine, I found a very unusual recipe for mashed potatoes. I can hear each and every one of my readers saying, "So what's so unusual about mashed potatoes?" Believe me, this recipe is, try it.


Walnut Mashed Potatoes 2 1/2 pounds potatoes, peeled, diced and cooked until tender and drained

- 4 ounces shelled, ground walnuts toasted in a 350 degree oven for 5 minutes
- 1 cup warm milk
- **3** tablespoons butter
- Salt and pepper

Minced parsley for garnish

Mash the potatoes. Place the steel blade in a food processor and pour in the walnuts, adding the milk slowly. Blend until you have a smooth paste. Add this paste to the potatoes along with the butter, salt and pepper. Blend in well. Turn out in a warm serving dish and garnish with the parsley. This serves 8. You can do the walnut mix ahead of time and then blend it into the potato-butter mix at the last moment.

NOTICE TO ALL REGISTERED VOTERS IN THE CITY OF SANIBEL

On November 6, voters registered within the City of Sanibel will have the opportunity to elect two members to sit on the Sanibel City Council for 4 year terms.

Also before the Sanibel voters at this time is a proposed charter change which would allow compensation for all Council, and Planning Commission members if Council approves, which reads on the ballot as follows:

> NO. 1 SANIBEL CHARTER AMENDMENT

ARTICLE III., SECTIONS 3.03 AND 3.16


An amendment to the Sanibel City Charter, authorizing compensation for City Council members and Planning Commission members.

Shall the above-described amendment be adopted? YES NO

The full text of the operative section of the proposed charter amendment reads as follows:

Section 3.03. [Same] - Compensation and expenses

The salary of the city council members shall be three thousand seven hundred fifty dollars (\$3,750.00) per year. The salary may be increased, but not more often than annually, and not in any amount in excess of the



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cost of living for the year immediately preceding as reflected by the United States Department of Labor Cost of Living Index. The council members shall also be entitled to receive their annual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their official duties.

Section 3.16. Planning commission.

There shall be a planning commission, advisory to the council. The planning commission shall have such functions and duties as delegated it by ordinance of the council. It shall consist of no fewer than five (5) residents of the city, appointed by the council. They shall be paid for their services such compensation as shall be determined by the council, by ordinance, which shall not exceed that of council members, and which shall not be diminished during a term of office.

EXPLANATION:

This means that, if the voters approve the charter amendment, the initial salary will be \$3,750/yr and, in the future, cannot be increased more often than annually nor can any increase exceed that of the U.S. Department of Labor Cost of Living Index for the previous year. To date since the City's incorporation in 1974 neither the City Council nor the Planning Commission have received compensation for their work on behalf of the City.

Upon approval by City Council the Planning Commission can also receive compensation as long as it does not exceed the Council's and, once approved, it cannot be reduced during a Planning Commission term. Reimbursement of expenses has always been permitted.


Cypress JVs gridders close big; Panther ladies win county cross title

Charlotte wrapped up the win in the second half thanks to lapses by both the Panther offense and defense. Sixteen third quarter points paved the way for Charlotte's eventual





Sea horses -- an oddity of the sea world

Sea horses are some of the few fishes we shell collectors look for when adding to our displays.

The strangely-shaped sea horse is sometimes found on the beaches after a storm. Although technically a fish, the sea horse's living habits and feeding patterns make it more like a mollusk.

Of course, the sea horse is one of the most recognizable of all sea shore creatures and has been popular for centuries. The sea creature gets its name from the similarities between its horse-like head and that of the real animal.

The sea horse has several unusual things about it. For instance, it uses its ears to move about the sea grasses where it lives. There are no real fins on the creature, even though most agree it is a fish.

Secondly, it carefully searches up and down blades of eel defautle grass looking for tiny crustaceans to eat. Apparently the horses will eat tiny shells or shrimp, but in an odd manner. The sea horse's nose is almost trumpet shaped and it feeds by inhaling food and water with a



sudden move.

The fish's long tail curls around the sea grasses to hold it in place. It can change colors slightly, blending in well with the surrounding grasses. We are not sure if it has any predators, but its bony, armored body would put off most thinking about eating it.

I've come upon several sea horses which have just been washed to the beach and handling them is an experience. The living ones make a clicking sound that causes a noticeable thumping in its body. We put them in a bucket of water for return to calmer waters later. The ones we find dead present a bit of a preservation problem. Probably the best way to avoid a stinky situation is to immerse them in alcohol for several days. You can also use Formalin, but I'm not too sure that cure doesn't smell worse than the problem with this chemical. You can also sun day them if time allows. The sea The

You can also sun dry them, if time allows. The sea horse's body dries hard in a few days. When I was a youngster growing up in St. Petersburg, I

would go into the souvenir shops to look at the tiny sea horses that were suspended in liquid in paper weights.

There were people who would use long seine nets to comb grass beds for sea horses. There was a couple from Pine Island who used to to this as a part-time living, but I believe they ceased operations several years ago.

Women might be interested to know that the male sea horse carries the fertilized eggs in a special pouch he grows, which is quite a reversal of animal life. As a historical note, it was the male sea horse who invented the headache after the first time carrying around the kids.



Cold front signals change in fishing season

Our first cold front passed through the islands last Friday and it signaled a change in the way to fish, and what type of fish we will be after for the next few months.

Two days before the weather changed and the humidity dropped to a tolerable level, one area guide jumped a couple of tarpon. These are primarily hot weather fish, but they were following schools of migrating mackerel.

At the same time, another guide was trying a very dependable shark spot and couldn't get a bite. Sharks, too, are headed south for the winter.

Many of our bigger fish follow schools of bait toward warmer waters, until the spring. Then it's north they come for a welcome reunion with anglers.

So, we are in that transition time when tarpon rods will be put away and the light tackle trolling and casting rods will replace them.

What will happen now that the cold front has passed? It will be a good time to switch to trolling offshore for great eating Spanish mackerel and even king mackerel.



While several kinds of school baits will slowly drift south in the next month, huge schools of mackerel will roam offshore, within easy reach of small boaters.

Most of this action will be from 3-5 miles off the beaches. And lots of times you'll be able to troll 300 yards off the beach and limit out with four Spanish mackerel per angler. Each fish must be a minimum of 12 inches long to keep. You should see some of the larger ones in the 18-24 inch league.

Bluefish are also running now, but spotty. They don't

always have a flock of feeding terns hovering overhead, as the mackerel, ladyfish and jacks often do. The blues will be surface feeders, but more often they will be down a couple of feet and trolling up the first one should lead to several more.

Bluefish must be 10 inches long and there is no bag limit on them.

Please count and measure your mangrove (gray) snapper carefully. As the cold weather months approach, anglers like the scoot offshore and do some bottom fishing for grouper and snapper.


Each snapper must be 10 inches long and you cannot have more than five fish per person. Sometimes you can hit a hot hole and get five in just a few minutes. As mentioned earlier in the month, the Florida Marine Patrol officers are about carefully measuring fish and writing tickets for too many or fish we call "shorts."

I am still amazed that nearly a year after the saltwater license was enacted, some out-of-state anglers don't know they need a license. Check with the Bait Box on Sanibel or Jensen's Twin Palms on Captiva Island for the license. Good fishing. It's certainly going to be a welcomed cool change as we start our trolling and bottom fishing season.



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

A Darling of a party

Refuge notes Ding's birthday and honors duck stamp artists

The annual celebration of duck stamps and remembrance of J.N. Darling's birthday was held Saturday, Oct. 27 at the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge on Sanibel.

The primary speakers were Jim Hautman, the artist who painted this year's duck stamp; Kip Koss, Darling's grandson; and Norma Opgrand, chief of the Federal Duck Stamp Program.

Also honored were the Sanibel Elementary School students who won this year's junior duck stamp contest.

Sanibel Elementary held the country's first junior duck stamp contest last year. Opgrand liked the idea so much that the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is now working on establishing a national junior duck stamp contest. Opgrand introduced Dorothy Dee, who is heading that effort. Opgrand said California has held a statewide pilot project contest which received 3,000 entries.

She announced that next year pilot programs will be started in Florida and Illinois.

The first place winners in this year's Sanibel Elementary junior duck stamp contest were: Anya Ciesienski in third grade, Melissa Way in fourth grade and Kerry Dvorin in fifth grade.

Runners-up prizes were given to Phillip Fischer and William Hennessey in third grade, Jessica Mayeron and Catherine Dalten in fourth grade and Tommy Daltin and Jeremy Evans in fifth.


Duck stamps were originated by Darling and are used to raise funds for the preservation of wetlands. Each year an art competition is held for the picture to be used on the stamp.

Hautman, who is 26 years old, is the youngest winner since the contest was established in 1960. He said that both his mother and father are artists and that his father had collected duck stamps since they first came out.

He started entering the duck stamp competition in 1984. For this year's entry he sketched in black bellied whistling ducks and then photocopied the painting and drew in eight different backgrounds. He asked family and friends which background they liked



Six week later the Secretary of the Interior called to tell him he had won. The next day he met President George Bush.

Hautman said that winning the duck stamp contest had been his biggest goal when he began wildlife painting and that now that he had reached that goal "it is even a bigger honor than I had thought."

During a question and answer session, he was asked if any monetary award comes with winning the duck stamp contest. He answered no, adding you do get a heet of stamps and retain some rights in regard to the painting. He didn't mention that those rights to a fee from poster sales and print sales have made past duck stamp artists millionaires. Hautman also has done the art work for the state duck stamps in Delaware, Minnesota and Nevada. He is also the artist for the second Australian duck stamp. Koss told the crowd in the auditorium of the refuge visitor center a little about his grandfather and introduced a man who had been a friend of Darling's. That friend was Sherry Fisher, who was president of the J.N. "Ding" Darling Conservation Foundation from its founding in 1962 until 1982.

Refuge's Wildlife Drive to be closed on Fridays

An new unmanned, unmarked half-mile walking trail through the wilderness is now open on Sanibel. The trail winds through the 180-acre Sanibel Botanical Site owned by the Florida Department of Natural Resources.

The entrance to the trail is located on Sanibel-Captiva Road on the opposite side from the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge. It is a short distance west from the entrance to the refuge's maintenance facility.

The only way to identify the trail entrance is that it is less overgrown than the area around it.

The DNR plans to put in a bike rack and interpretive signs on Nov. 20, according to Valinda Nichols, manager of the Koreshan State Historic Site in Estero. Employees of the Koreshan facility have been given the job of maintaining the Sanibel site. Nichols said they plan to send somebody up one day a month to maintain the trail.

An exploration of the trail Thursday morning revealed that a winding swath has been cleared through the vegetation, but that some limbs had already fallen across the trail. No attempt has been made to level off the

ground.

The trail returns upon itself eventually, so it provides a circular tour of the property, which contains a variety of vegetation. However, Brazilian pepper predominates.

The land had been purchased with funds from the U.S. Park Service Land and Water Conservation Fund, which requires development for public use. The park service had been pressuring the DNR to open the land to public use.

U.S. Rep. Porter Goss' office is trying to get the state to transfer the land to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, it was revealed Thursday by J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge Manager Lou Hinds.

Such a transfer would be expected to take at least a year to happen. Hinds said the refuge would not want to develop the site further but would like to try to eliminate the Brazilian peppers.

There is no parking allowed in the vicinity of the site, so it is considered as something that will be used only by bicyclists and pedestrians.

Lee County School System environmental resource teacher Rick Tully said Thursday that he could foresee only using the site for classes two or three times a year.

The word "ghost" was never used within hearing distance of the hired-hands. They were very superstitious and it was a fearful thing for them.

White sheets carried another connotation in those earlier days. On Saturday nights, the men would gather on the hill south of town with white sheets over their heads, two slits for eyes and hear complaints against, mostly, the hired-hands.

White sheets were never used at Halloween as they created fear in the minds of some people, whether it

New island walking trail open

The Wildlife Drive through the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge will be closed permanently on Fridays starting Dec. 21. The road closing is an attempt to reduce the impact of people on the birds in the refuge by giving the birds a day free of interaction with humans. In addition, starting next October (1991), tour buses and Mopeds will be banned from the refuge trails, according to refuge manager Louis S. Hinds III. Hinds made the announcement during the refuge citizen's advisory board meeting Thursday, Oct. 25. The closing of the drive on Fridays will not affect other parts of the refuge. The Visitor Center, Tarpon Bay and the Bailey Tract will all remain open. Another change this winter at the refuge will be the hiring of a seasonal law enforcement officer and the establishment of a remain-on-the-dike zone. The law enforcement officer will make sure visitors remain on Wildlife Drive and don't climb down off the roadway to take pictures and investigate the water's edge. The restricted area begins at the observation tower and stretches beyond the recognizable islands of tree limbs. Those changes are the result of a study conducted a few couple of years ago by Mary Varley. That study found that people were having an impact on the birds in the refuge. It said particularly disturbing to the birds were photographers who ventured down off the road to get closer to the birds. Friday was selected as the day of the week to close the drive because it is the day the smallest number of visitors use the roadway, Hinds said.



Hinds said the tour buses were not only objectionable to the birds but also to other refuge visitors.

He said the primary problems were the noises of the buses, which are left running even when stopped, and the dust cloud created by the blast from the air conditioner in the back.

The sand strip started slightly further out into the gulf than the Captiva terminal groin and almost reached that



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
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groin. It was visible for only a short distance to the south. However, waves were breaking on a barely submerged sandbar down to in front of Santiva Cottages.

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

In August, the staff handled 4,711 calls, topping the previous month's total of 4,589.

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

Also, during the early morning of Oct.



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


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
