

Islander arrested on grand theft, forgery charges

In what's being called the biggest arrest on Sanibel since a 1985 murder, island resident Constance Methvin "Connie" Heldenbrand of Anchor Drive was charged Thursday, Feb. 14, with stealing more than \$100,000 from her Sanibel employer, Dr. Rob Simmons.

According to the arrest report, Heldenbrand, 42, stole the money from Simmons and office partner Dr. Ernest J. Gesiotto while she worked as their office manager and bookkeeper. She reportedly forged her name on their business checks and then deposited the funds into her personal banking account.

Simmons told police that when he confronted Heldenbrand about the thefts, she admitted that she had committed the crimes over a period of about 1 1/2 years, which is the length of time she was employed there. Simmons reported this to the police Feb. 8.

A police investigation revealed well in excess of 10 business checks of Simmons that had been made payable to cash, with Simmons' signature forged on them. They were endorsed "For Deposit Only" to the personal account of Heldenbrand and her husband. In a sworn statement, Simmons identified the check signatures as forgeries, and said that he never gave Heldenbrand permission to make out the checks, sign his name on them or deposit them into her personal account.

Police also discovered that numerous private insurance company checks, as well as Medicare checks made payable to Simmons, were deposited into Heldenbrand's personal account as well without Simmons' knowledge or permission.

Numerous personal checks from Simmons' patients were also found deposited into Heldenbrand's personal account. Patients would leave the "payee" line blank so that Simmons' office could stamp the check payable to the doctor. But on a number of those checks, Heldenbrand would type "CASH" on that line, and again deposit the check to her own account.

Sailboat strikes, damages pier

The Sanibel Fishing Pier will be closed indefinitely until work crews can repair damage caused when an 85-foot sailboat crashed into it last Friday, Feb. 15.

The St. Petersburg-based wooden sailing vessel "Ruwach" had been anchored in the bay, but drifted into the western side of the pier while Capt. Kenneth Rodway and his wife, Elizabeth, were sleeping below deck. The vessel's bow struck the end of the pier, approximately 30

feet from the covered portion of the structure, and had begun to break down a portion of the pier's railing.

Since there was significant damage to the fishing pier, Sanibel Mayor Mike Miracle came to the scene Friday afternoon and granted the Sanibel Police Department's request to close the pier to all foot traffic.

Sea-Tow of Cape Coral removed the vessel, a task made difficult by winds gusting up to 50 mph and a steady wind at about 30 mph, which kept the vessel hard against the pier.

Pepper removal amendment may reduce land donations

The Planning Commission passed a resolution Feb. 12 that finds the proposed ordinance pertaining to removal of Brazilian pepper consistent with the Comprehensive Land Use Plan. The ordinance is now on its way to be considered for passage by the City Council.

The proposed amendments may be consistent with the stated goals in the plan but, if passed by the City Council, may severely reduce the chances of the city or the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation ever being the recipient of large tracts of land donated by developers.

For years it's been customary for a developer to use large portions of land parcels to calculate the density of a development project, and then donate the pepper-infested acres for preservation by either the city or SCCF. The

increased density or coverage and the tax breaks the developer received were considered by both parties to be a fair exchange. All that would change if the developer is forced to pay up front for removal of all exotics from the land if it's to be used in any way.

The proposed amendments would require the removal of Brazilian pepper (and melaleuca trees) from all areas of a piece of property that are intended for development. This would include any portion of any land parcel that's used for the calculation of density or development intensity, impermeable coverage, or vegetation removal and developed area. Responsibility for thereafter keeping the pepper off the land would be a negotiable condition of a development permit.

At the Feb. 12 public hearing before the Planning Commission, everyone seemed in agreement that the best

way to manage land and keep it from development is for the city or SCCF to own it. But several people questioned the wisdom of passing an ordinance that would encourage a developer to keep the land rather than donate it.

Erick Lindblad, executive director of SCCF, asked some questions and expressed some doubts about whether the pepper could be permanently managed effectively. How would the city enforce the ordinance? If the developer decides to hold onto the land, can the city ensure that the land will not be developable sometime in the future?

Lindblad showed a slide of an aerial view of Sanibel where the pepper has been eliminated through proscribed burnings and chemical treatment. He spoke of the importance of long-term land holdings to allow for

A loose barge carrying 10 million gallons of gasoline was expected to run ashore on Sanibel between 9 a.m. and 10 a.m. Saturday, Feb. 16, Lt. Flatow honored at annual CASI seminar

Wil Flatow, president of the By the Sea Condominium Association, was honored at the Sixth Annual CASI (Condominium Associations of Sanibel) Seminar at the Sundial Beach and Tennis Resort Friday, Feb. 15.

Flatow was presented the first-ever CASI "Dedication to Service" award, which recognizes persons who make significant service contributions to their condominiums or their community.

Runners-up for the award were Charles Dufner, manager of Loggerhead Cay, and Kip Buntrock, who was nominated by Sand Pointe Condominiums.

The annual award is named for the late Warren Hyde, a past-president of CASI and a tireless worker for his condominium, Sanibel Surfside, where he served as president and manager from 1978 until his death July 10,

1988. Hyde had also served the city of Sanibel as acting city manager while the city searched for its first full-time manager. He came well qualified for the job, having spent 22 years as the city manager of Edina, Minn.

Sanibel Mayor Mike Miracle and City Manager Gary Price filled in, giving the group a summary of current issues facing Sanibel city government.

Children 'enchanted' with Fantasy Walk



Adventure in Florida

Couch potatoes need not apply.

But if you're looking for something a little more adventuresome than a ride on Space Mountain, you're in the right place. Long before theme parks, Florida, as one of the nation's final frontiers, claimed a history and heritage of adventure.

Gone, perhaps, are much of the untamed and rugged lifestyles that attracted little over a half-century ago. Still to be found throughout the state, however, are activities that retain the flavor and fervor of Florida's derring-do days.

The modern-day adventurer can experience challenge, excitement and often an elevated heart rate at my favorite, decidedly non-sedentary activities.

Skydiving DeLand

I sometimes wonder, when I look back, what I enjoyed most about my two skydiving jumps 15 years ago. It's a toss-up between the intense excitement (read fear) as I stepped out onto the wheel of that C-182 at 3,000 feet, and the peaceful void of the ensuing chute ride. Or was it just being able to say I did it? (Obviously, I still enjoy doing that.)

Whatever the attraction, skydiving rates -- in my logbook, anyway -- as the ultimate endeavor. Skydive DeLand manages to subtract some of that fear element with its tandem jumping operation. Here, a first-time jumper connects to an experienced instructor for a 13,500-

feet ride. It's a great way to try out skydiving before taking the "leap" into lessons, or just an out-of-the-ordinary way to spend a day.

Tandem jumping requires 45 minutes of training at \$125. Skydive DeLand also offers accelerated free-fall courses, which take four to six hours. The first two jumps cost \$250 each. Prices reduce thereafter, and package rates are available.

Lobstering the Keys

Stalking the spiny lobster is an adventure you can experience few places in the U.S. The Florida Keys have earned a reputation for lobstering because the crustaceans are fairly populous there, and because the tapwater-clear seas allow easy spotting.

Which doesn't make capturing lobsters a breeze. It takes

a fair amount of specialized equipment and hand-eye coordination to snare these prickly critters with their muscle-bound tails. I have yet to be successful, despite various tips I've collected through the years, including sticking the head of a rag mop into likely holes to entangle the lobster's pointy protrusions.

Aside from mops, mask and snorkel are useful tools. Take along a net bag to carry your catch. Dive shops also sell snazzy lobster lassoing devices. Hunt the rocky areas, be kind to the fragile reefs and abide by regulations. Lobster season ends March 31. The lobster's head must remain attached to the tail while you are at sea, and must measure at least three inches. Your catch limit is six per person or 24 per boat.

Dive shops, boat rentals and snorkeling charters practically outnumber lobsters in the Keys. A boat is not necessary equipment, however, since you can find lobsters close to shore. Most dive shops and many resorts rent snorkeling equipment.

Next time: Aerobatic flying, canoeing and swimming with the manatees.



Another possibility in regard to the Blind Pass erosion

To the Editor

Further in regard to the erosion of Sanibel near Blind Pass, I find it increasingly difficult to get my boat from Dinkin's Bayou into San Carlos Bay because of a buildup of sand across the east end of Blind Pass. As the experts ponder whether or not Captiva's groin is causing Sanibel's erosion problems, I would hope they would consider and address the following possibility.

Since the problem is rather recent, logic suggests that perhaps, before the groin, there had been some shifting of

sand back and forth from Sanibel to Captiva and vice versa. But now we have sand disappearing in the widened portions of Blind Pass, and also, sand appearing in the widened portions of Blind Pass near its eastern end.

Might it be that sand that previously would have shifted from Sanibel to Captiva is being caught by the groin and sent into the pass with the incoming tide where the eventual widening of the pass so slows the current that the sand settles and interferes with traditional boat traffic?

Recently brought to our attention was a document prepared by The Citizen Advisory Committee on Florida's Coastal Resources Management entitled "Color the Coast" (a children's coloring book) that included the following outline drawings and accompanying teachings.





Heldenbrand would intercept phone calls and mail from patients who questioned why their checks were made out to cash, Simmons told The Islander Monday. He found a boxful of letters in his office that had been addressed to him and marked "confidential," which he believes Heldenbrand had been hiding from him.

"A patient finally did manage to get through her defenses with a check made out to 'cash,'" Simmons said. "If that hadn't happened, we'd probably still be in the dark."

Heldenbrand was charged with one count of first-degree grand theft, 10 counts of forgery and 10 counts of uttering a forged instrument. She was released on a \$50,000 bond, according to the Lee County Jail.

"I don't know of anyone being arrested on 21 counts here before," said Det. Janet Cali, who spent the week investigating the case along with Det. Sgt. Wayne Hinz. Cali said she believes this is the biggest arrest on Sanibel since Mark Dowell was jailed for the murder of Realtor Sheila Lankin in 1985. Cali and Hinz worked on

that case as well, she said.

"The Sanibel Police Department has been incredible. I've been so impressed by them," Simmons said. "If there's a nice side to this, that's one of them."

When confronted by Simmons, Heldenbrand showed no sorrow for her actions, Simmons said.

"In my opinion, she was absolutely remorseless," Simmons said. "It was a very professional thing on her part. She was so skillful in making you trust her."

While an investigation continues to determine the scope and magnitude of the crime, Simmons' office is busy picking up the pieces, including re-doing its entire insurance file. Patients are invited to contact the office if they have any questions or have experienced any inconvenience as a result of the event.

In the meantime, Simmons' has re-hired the only other office manager he's ever had who had left the job to raise their children: his wife.

"We have a lot of public confidence to regain," Simmons said.

scientific breakthroughs, possibly in biological control.

Lindblad pointed out that with this amendment the incentive is lost for a developer to donate the land and have it preserved forever.

Commissioner Jim Krieger pointed out that there was little economic advantage for donation if the developer also has to go to great expense for pepper removal. Krieger said it would be worth the developer's wait for a different Planning Commission, City Council or a different set of rules. The tax advantage is a relatively small consideration, he said.

Commissioner Ernie Klautt disagreed, saying that the extra units and financial breaks still would be attractive to the developers. He also said there was no way SCCF could clear and maintain the donated lands without the city becoming a partner in the pepper removal. There's no point in the taxpayer paying more ad valorem taxes when the job of pepper removal can get done just as well with this ordinance, Klautt argued.

Commissioner Bob Davison said it was pure speculation to think a future council would grant more density on a given parcel of land, which already has a set density. He said the commission should act on the facts as they exist today.

Developer Warren Stringer simply stated that he won't give land if this ordinance is passed. He said if he's going to be forced to pay \$200,000 to remove pepper from his large parcel, he'd rather keep the land and do what he wants to do.

Stringer also brought up the enforcement aspect. He said his plans are for a retirement home, and wondered if the city would "close him down" if some pepper grew back on the property.

Wanda Slayton, president of the Audubon Society, said the society is in opposition to the forced removal of Brazilian pepper. She said nothing should be done to discourage the donation of land.

Commissioner Jim Levy said that he will support the proposed ordinance if its passage will inhibit the developer.

Attorney Jerry Stone pointed out that the ordinance applies to both small and large development applications, and that removal of the vegetation possibly could cause water runoff.

The vote of the Planning Commission was 6-1 to find the proposed amendment consistent with the land use plan. Krieger cast the dissenting vote.

Community Church gets OK for expansion

The Planning Commission Feb. 12 recommended approval of a development permit for Sanibel Community Church's expansion plans, which include a 9,537-square-foot addition to its fellowship hall building and 102 more parking spaces. If all goes as smoothly as the first public hearing did, the development permit should be in the church's hands by the end of February.

The church's proposed addition to the fellowship hall building will not only expand the fellowship hall itself, but also includes a kitchen, meeting and storage rooms, a parlor, a loading dock and porches.

Sanibel Community Church plans to complete the development in two phases. Phase I will be completed by the end of February 1992, and includes all site improvements (building construction, rearrangement of the existing 100 parking spaces, installation of wastewater disposal system and development of a storm water drainage system) except for the northernmost 102 parking spaces and the adjacent driveways. Phase II, scheduled to be completed by December 1992, would be the installation of the additional 102 parking spaces and the driveways.

While the city staff differed on whether one or two driveway accesses should be permitted, the commission decided that two driveways 150 feet apart should be allowed because of the great distance between the western parking area and the sanctuary. The current access will be used on Sundays only to drop off passengers who otherwise would have to take the long hike.

The 8.18 acres of church property is located immediately west of Jerry's Shopping Center, south of the Gumbo Limbo subdivision. Community Church representative Steve Reynolds said there may be no further need to use Jerry's for Sunday parking after the improvements are complete.

The Brazilian pepper will be removed by hand from the development site.

A final hearing will be held Feb. 26.

City files objection to DER's intent to permit Silver Key bridge

The City Council, by a vote of 3-1, passed a resolution Feb. 5 authorizing City Attorney Bob Pritt to file a document formally objecting to the state Department of Environmental Regulation's intent to issue a permit for a bridge and causeway to Silver Key. The resolution states that the bridge and causeway "would be severely damaging to the environment and inimical to the public interest."

Pritt pointed out that it's unclear whether the city has a standing in the administrative hearings in such a case, because the Notice of Intent refers to "... persons whose substantial interests are affected ...," and it is questionable whether the DER is allowed to let Sanibel be a "person."

Councilman Francis Bailey explained his dissenting vote by saying, "It's not the way to go about it."

Also at the Feb. 5 City Council meeting:

- The council unanimously passed an ordinance relating to OCCUPATIONAL LICENSES and occupational license taxes; amending Chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances. The amendments require separate licenses for separate businesses in single locations, deletes lawn sprinkler systems from landscaping services, adds shelling to charter fishing, deletes septic tank cleaning service category, specifies number of pump nozzles to gasoline service stations, adds marine cleaning and detailing to automotive service, adds home-watch service category, adds commercial art to advertising agencies, adds word processing and computer to stenographic services, adds child care center category, deletes swimming pool services (cleaning and maintenance) category, requires installation of alarms by certified contractors under detective services, adds sales and primary and accessory uses to equipment rental and leasing services, and adds services not requiring contractor license to appliance repair shops.

- The City Council upheld the Planning Commission's Jan. 8 decision to deny Harriet "Hap" Connelly's request for a variance which would allow an illegal dwelling unit located below base flood elevation at her PERIWINKLE WAY property.

- During discussion of the SURVEY OF LOW-RENT UNITS on Sanibel that are not already in the city's Below Market Rate Housing program, the staff was directed to determine if census reports gleaned from the current census can provide the information needed, in lieu of the city designing and conducting a survey on its own. The information should be available this summer.

CITY BRIEFS



- The councilmen unanimously passed a resolution approving a contract with SOUTHEAST RECYCLING CORP for the purchase of newspaper collected at the city's drop-off recycling center. The company currently provides the red recycling container, empties it at no cost, and reimburses the city \$10 per ton for the collected paper. The contract formalizes the current arrangement for one year. Deleted from the contract was a clause that placed public liability on the city while the containers are on the Dunlop Road site.

- The council unanimously passed a resolution approving a contract to prepare Assessment Roll Relating to Uniform Collection Method with Lee County Property Appraiser Ken Wilkinson regarding the SHELL HARBOR CANAL AREA MAINTENANCE DREDGING ASSESSMENT.

The council also passed a resolution approving an agreement between the city and Lee County Tax Collector Dick Steele regarding the Shell Harbor maintenance dredging assessment.


In addition, the councilmen unanimously passed a resolution authorizing City Manager Gary Price to enter into a contract with Johnson Engineering Inc. for engineering services for the Shell Harbor area canal maintenance assessment project.

- The City Council unanimously passed a resolution accepting a quit-claim deed from Container Products Corp. for public road right-of-way on CASA YBEL ROAD, the last curve near the intersection of Gulf Drive. This will enable the city to straighten out the curve bordering Butterknife subdivision.

- The council passed a resolution approving the revised PERIWINKLE/DONAX & PALM RIDGE & CASA YBEL INTERSECTIONS fund. The resolution approves a budget amendment that establishes a new Capital Project Fund to include the engineering costs associated with analyzing the Periwinkle Way/Donax Street intersection, simply reallocating the budget already appropriated to the Periwinkle Way/Casa Ybel Road and Periwinkle Way/Palm Ridge Road intersections studies. There is no monetary increase.

- The council unanimously passed a resolution approving amended deed restrictions for GOPHER



WALK subdivision, by requiring that all utilities be installed and maintained underground.

• The City Council unanimously passed a resolution approving SANIBEL COMMUNITY CENTER's request for 20 additional special events permits for 1991. The Land Development Code currently allows only six events per year at any given site, so each year extra permits are almost routinely approved for the community center.

• The council unanimously passed a resolution accepting two easements with ST. MICHAEL AND ALL ANGELS EPISCOPAL CHURCH. The one adjacent to Periwinkle Way is for bicycle path, utility and drainage purposes; the other is for drainage on the side property line.

• Two months late, the City Councilmen and staff finally were able to sign the plats for VICTORIA COVE subdivision, after approval had been granted last Dec. 4 with the condition that the plat be returned to the council in two days with the required signatures from the developer. City Attorney Bob Pritt had already prepared a resolution repealing the resolution which approved the plats, but action by council was unnecessary after the plat submission and signing

At the Feb. 12 Planning Commission meeting:

• "If you want justice, go to the Planning Commission. If you want mercy, go to the City Council," one of Commissioner Ernie Klautd's oft-repeated phrases, was the top and bottom line when the commission denied Jimmy and Laura Burnsed's request for a variance from Land Development Code flood and stormproofing standards that would provide for after-the-

fact approval of the construction of the living area below the required lowest floor elevation of their WILD LIME DRIVE residence. The illegal apartment houses their ward, who has Down's Syndrome and cannot share the family's immediate space. The commission's hands were tightly bound by the seven criteria that must be met before granting a variance. The commissioners extended their sympathies, offered apologies for having to deny the request and all but promised that the council's decision could come straight from the heart.

• The commissioners unanimously passed a resolution granting Jacquelin Goeller-Giattini's request for a variance from Land Development Code wastewater disposal standards to allow the installation of an on-site mounded wastewater disposal system 92 feet, in lieu of 100 feet, from the mean high water line of Bowen Bayou. The variance for the INDIAN COURT single-family residence is needed because of the lot's irregular configuration and insufficient depth from the canal.

• The commission gave tentative approval of Jane Epranian's request for a variance from code commercial district standards, to permit the construction of a 12-foot by 14-foot storage addition to set back 35 feet, in lieu of 50 feet, from the center line of Brauw Avenue, for CALAMITY JANE'S CAFE, located within the Olde Sanibel Shops on Tarpon Bay Road. The storage area is needed to satisfy the Lee County Board of Health directives to provide for indoor storage of the restaurant's ice maker and food refrigerator equipment.

A final hearing will be held Feb. 26.





Arthur M. Fraade




Sanibel's pioneer black families

The Prestons

(Editor's note: The following article is the third in a series of four describing the lives of the Sanibel's pioneering black families.)

By the end of the first 15-hour working day at the Island Inn in 1952, Irene Preston was ready to pack it in, pack up and return to her children and home in Thomasville, Ga. She hated Sanibel. The working conditions were miserable, the pay -- \$15 a week -- was miserable, the living quarters were miserable and so was she.

Somehow, her husband, Roosevelt Preston, persuaded her to stay through that first season, October through April, and she would return for many more, however reluctantly, for 38 years. Today, she is executive director of housekeeping at the hotel, so very different from what it used to be.

Roosevelt, who was born in Troy, Ala., first came to Sanibel in 1934 and by the time he died in 1981, he had become "a fixture" at Island Inn. He had four children from a previous marriage -- Louise, Roy, Roscoe and Willie Frank -- all of whom would eventually live with him and Irene on the island, as did their stepsisters and brothers, Thelma, Laura, Matthew, Calvin and Roosevelt Jr.

In the early days, however, no provision was made for the children. There were two buildings for housing the employees, each with one bathroom and four bedrooms and one of these had a living room for socializing. Irene and Roosevelt shared a room with two other people with only a curtain for privacy. Not that they spent much time there. They were up very early in order to get into the bathroom before they had to report to the dining room at 6 a.m. There they set up tables then waited on the guests as they come in for breakfast. After that they cleaned the guests' rooms until lunch time, repeated their dining room routine, cleaned rooms and then hurried back to their quarters for a quick shower and a change into white uniforms.

Often, it was 10 p.m. or later by the time they had served dinner and cleared the tables. But that was not the end of the working day for Irene. She did laundry for the guests, washing everything in a big #3 washtub with a wash board one evening and ironing it the next. She charged 5 cents for a pair of socks, 15 cents for underwear, 25 cents for shirts and 30 cents for dresses, with or without ruffles. This money,

along with their wages and tips, was sent back to her mother in Thomasville who cared for their children.

But difficult as all this was, the terrible mosquitoes which blackened the screens day and night, the awful drinking water, the seven-day work week without even Sundays off, the worst of all was the separation from her children. Laura Scurry recalls that sometimes she did not even recognize her mother and how much this hurt her.

After all the guests had left Island Inn in April, Irene and Roosevelt helped close it, then drove to Thomasville to spend May with their children. Then it was on to South Hampton, Long Island, N.Y., to work the summer months at a resort there. In 1963, when they stopped at Thomasville at the end of the summer, Irene flatly refused to go on without the children. A few weeks later, Roosevelt called her from Sanibel to tell her that he had bought a trailer and built onto it to make room for the whole family. What he didn't tell them was that there was no bathroom and they would have to use one in their old quarters. Nevertheless, Irene would have their children with her, both her own and Roosevelt's by his former marriage.

Later, the Island Inn Company, which had bought the inn in 1957, removed the old buildings and built concrete block houses for its employees. At last, the Prestons had a nice home of their own.

When Roosevelt first did jobs for them in 1934, Mrs. Hallie Matthews and her daughter, Charlotta, were managing the hotel, which at that time was known as The Matthews. It was they who established the feeling of family which would remain through the years. Other managers came and went and sometimes, especially in the early days, there was not enough money, usually in September, to pay the bills or the help and the Prestons had to wait for their wages. It was not until Milbry and John Rushworth became managers in 1964 that everyone got a day off and none did "double duty", but either waited on tables or cleaned rooms -- not both. It also was the Rushworths who initiated the employee Christmas





party for which they did the cooking. Until then, there were gifts for all but no fanfare.

Looking back on their hardships, Irene admits that she and her husband were overworked and underpaid, but she shows no resentment and bears no grudge. She explains it very simply, "We were family."

Two of the older Preston sons, Roscoe and Willie Frank, have died, but the other children are doing well. Thelma and Calvin hold college degrees; Laura and Matthew have had two years of college. All have responsible jobs and continue to "go up the ladder."

stopped at a part score in clubs. Second, West's bid guided South to the winning line of play.

South won the third round of spades and looked for his ninth trick. For lack of anything better to do, South ran the diamonds, discarding clubs from his hand.


Discarded hearts

When West followed to three rounds of diamonds and then discarded two hearts, South knew the whole hand. West had obviously started with six hearts, three spades and three diamonds. His 13th card was a singleton club.

South therefore cashed dummy's two aces and led a heart, playing low from his hand. West could take two heart tricks but then had to give South a trick with a queen of hearts.






Cooking out for a few good friends

WHAT'S COOKING?

See, I do not always have to use pounds of butter, heavy cream and wine in my dishes. (Yes, I have been accused of doing this and I also can assure you that it hasn't stopped me from doing it!)

Cucumber and Mint Soup

- 4 tablespoons butter
- 3/4 cup onions, chopped
- 4 large cucumbers, peeled, seeded and chopped
- 2 cups of potatoes, peeled and chopped
- 3 cups chicken stock

- 1/2 cup of half and half
- Salt and white pepper
- 1/4 cup fresh mint leaves, chopped
- 2 tablespoons white wine vinegar
- Mint leaves for garnish

Melt the butter in a heavy pan, add the onions and cook 15 minutes on medium heat. Do not let brown. Turn heat to high and add the cucumbers, potatoes and chicken stock. Bring to a boil, turn to simmer, cover and cook 20 minutes. Puree in batches in a blender. Pour back into the pan, add the mint, salt and white pepper, vinegar and half and half. Cook for 3 minutes. Pour into a bowl and when cool, cover and refrigerate. Pour into mugs and garnish with mint leaves. This serves 8. I have done this hot, too. Either way it is delicious.



presentation of a female star impersonation. One also couldn't expect neater scenic and lighting effects than those supplied by Ken Loewitt. One couldn't help wondering where and how the prolific J.T. Smith manages to keep pulling that new-"something or other" out of his well-filled talented, hat.

The audience we were a part of seemed to be immensely pleased but strangely aloof. They were ungriving and lacked that return of electricity to the performers that is so necessary for a completely successful performance. The cast gives, and if you return in kind, the cast takes that energy and soars.

The story line is a bit of froth. However, credit must be given to Mark Agnew and Smith for the attempt to do something a little different from the average composer-lyricist presentation: "-- then he wrote, and then he did," or no explanation at all. The problem with a story line is that once it is introduced, it must be attended to and sometimes this gets sticky and a little awkward. The fact of the matter is it simply gets in the way of the forward momentum necessary for this kind of cabaret presentation.

There seemed to be a concentrated effort to make up for anything that seemed suspect by speeding up the tempi. The rapidity of tempi gave certain numbers an unnecessarily frenetic quality that prohibited the audience from savoring the lyrics. This was a general fault in both acts. Swiftiness does not energy make.

After such rapid show-upon-show concentration and lengthy rehearsal and performance schedule, a general tiredness may have lulled the company into feeling that audience approval would only come with "going for the burn." This feeling can and does backfire.

The company as individuals are audience-pleasers: Lauren Cohn cavorts with telling effect, Robin O'Leary sings a great song, Jeffrey Phillips is the classy talent that the future must reckon with and Gregg Arntson gave probably the best performance of the evening.

Arntson was totally in command. The part he played demanded no push, so he rode with the punches. He has a very good voice, those "every mother's son" good looks plus a smile made for Colgate commercials. Arntson and the audience bond immediately.

Smith acts as your theatrical guide, a sort of musical stage manager refugee from "Our Town." He gets his laughs and exudes his own personal style of charm, American and Gallic.

"Everything is Coming Up Roses" needs playing. After its first week shakedown, it'll undoubtedly become another entertainment triumph -- one of the sold-out hits associated with Smith, the director, arranger and choreographer, and Robert Cacioppo, artistic director.



A Few Faye Tips

I remember keeping geranium trees for many years in New Jersey. I still haven't been able to achieve that here. They seem to just burn out after a year.

Camellias grow well here ... if you keep them in pots. They must be kept in the shade, given acid fertilizer and water.

Controlling mosquitoes

There are several thousand species of mosquitoes in the world. About 75 species can be found in Florida, 46 of which can be found in Lee County. Three are typically found on Sanibel and Captiva. One potentially can carry encephalitis.

Dr. Richard Levy of the Lee County Mosquito Control District spoke of research efforts to control mosquitoes at the Friday at the Center Talks on Feb. 8 at the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation.

Mosquitoes, as with most invertebrates, go through a series of growth and development stages. Each stage of each species utilizes a different habitat. Egg, larva and pupae stages are in aquatic or moist environments. Research on control targets specific bodies of waters.

Biological, physical and chemical control methods are used. Gambia, a guppy-like fish, consumes mass quantities of mosquito larva, but cannot keep up with the enormous reproductive capacity of mosquitoes. Dragonflies, flatworms, hydras, copepods and damselflies also naturally control some of the mosquito population, but all are insufficient to control the vast quantities of mosquitoes in Southwest Florida.

Shepard's purse, a wild mustard, has seeds with a sticky mucous coating. Mosquito larva attached to the mustard seeds eventually are pulled under water when the seeds sink. A vegetable-based oil film on the surface of the water clogs breathing tubes of mosquito larva and drowns them as well. Lessons from nature are being studied to unlock keys to physical control of this pesky insect.

Recently, researchers have been studying nematodes that are parasitic on some mosquitoes. One looked promising because it not only destroyed mosquitoes, but also was able to complete its own life cycle, thereby being self-maintaining. Unfortunately it does not tolerate salt water.

Another nematode of promise does tolerate salt water, but because it does not hatch synchronously, it is difficult to mass produce. It seems no predator or parasite can tolerate the vast range of tolerance of a salt water mosquito ... yet. The Lee County Mosquito Control District is working on the problem.

The Lee Mosquito Control District's research has become so well known and established that 30 agencies around the world, including the World Health Organization, have signed cooperative agreements with the local agency. The chemical industry has slowed its research on mosquito control agents, so Lee County is taking up the slack.

It takes \$10 million to \$20 million to research and market a biological control agent. It takes \$30 million to \$50 million to get a chemical control agent through research, testing and safety regulations. One bacteriological agent, tested but not passed by the Environmental Protection Agency, has been on hold for six years because no one is willing to take ultimate responsibility for the O.K.

Chemical control agents are now being enhanced with a newly patented delivery system developed for our county. Acrylic polymer gels have been used in diapers for super-

Baked Pinto Beans
1/2 pound dried pinto beans, picked over, washed and soaked over night in cold water
2 quarts of water
1 bay leaf

4 tablespoons olive oil
1 cup onions, diced
1 teaspoon dried sage or 2 sprigs of fresh
1 one-pound can of peeled, chopped tomatoes

Salt and pepper
1 medium jalapeno pepper, cored, seeded and chopped
3 tablespoons tomato paste
3 tablespoons fresh cilantro, chopped

Pre-heat the oven to 325 degrees. Drain the beans and cook in the 2 quarts of water for about an hour. Do not over-cook so they become "mushy." When done, drain and set aside. In a saute pan, heat the oil and add the onions and cook until they are wilted. Add the tomatoes, sage, bay leaf, salt and pepper, jalapeno, tomato paste and cilantro. Bring to a boil, turn to simmer, cover and cook for 20 minutes. Remove the bay leaf. Place the beans in a casserole that has a lid and pour the tomato mix over them. Stir in very gently so that all the beans will be coated. Place lid on and put the casserole in the oven for 30 minutes. This serves 6 to 8.

Lettuce and Grapefruit Salad
1 head bibb lettuce
1 small head of red leaf lettuce
1 bunch of watercress, stems removed
2 ruby red grapefruit, peeled and cut into sections
1 cup nasturtium leaves or 1 stalk of Belgian endive, trimmed and julienne cut

1 avocado, peeled and chopped
Salt and pepper
3/4 cup real honest-to-goodness French dressing (do not ruin the salad with that bottled stuff)

Wash, trim and dry the greens. Put all the greens in a large salad bowl. Add the avocado, grapefruit sections and salt and pepper. Toss. Pour the dressing over this and toss to coat the leaves. Serve immediately.

For the last time, here is the recipe for classic French dressing.

French Dressing
1 cup best grade olive oil
1/4 cup wine vinegar
Salt and pepper
1 teaspoon Dijon mustard

Blend all these together
Do not ruin the above salad with iceberg lettuce. If you can, buy the loose leaf type.

absorbency. The gel has also been used as a soil enhancer to retain moisture. Four patents and several others pending have been granted the Lee County Mosquito Control District for combining this substance to chemical control agents.

The gel allows the chemical to be released slowly thereby cutting down the number of applications required. In other instances, the gel is packaged and can be tossed into small reservoirs of water such as discarded tires. The polymer turns the water into a gel and eliminates the possibility for mosquitoes to reproduce.

Most chemical agents have a short half life, that is, the organic compound begins to break down into non-toxic chemicals after a few days. The gel sustains and stabilizes the toxins for up to 180 days.

These patents can generate income for Lee County. It is the intention of the district to license its research technology to agro-chemical companies and other insect control agencies.


It is possible that this research may one day generate enough funds to make the district self-sustaining instead of being paid for through property taxes. In 1989, 2.3 percent of the tax bill went to mosquito control. With the gross taxable value on Sanibel being almost \$1.5 billion, being assessed at .455 mills, it means about \$680,000 for the district came from Sanibel property owners. Some day there may be some relief from that burden.

The barn owl

This raptor's interesting to some, frightening to others



While Macbeth is busy killing Duncan offstage, Lady Macbeth tells the audience that she just heard an owl shriek. Thus, everyone knows that King Duncan is dead, for everyone knows that owls are death's messengers.

In addition to being harbingers of death, owls were always bad news in the superstitious eyes of *Homo sapiens*. For since time immemorial, man has viewed the nocturnal raptors as prophets of doom, witches in disguise and dreadful spirits of every conceivable description.

But in the belief that evil was the best defense against evil, mankind decided that dead owls had redeeming social value. Therefore, owls were commonly crucified in public places, where their bloody bodies presumably warded off all kinds of catastrophes.

Moreover, the raptors provided essential ingredients for "medicines" used to combat everything from baldness to the bubonic plague. While some potions required owl wings, feathers or eggs, more sophisticated

concoctions called for the ashes of their charred eyes and feet.

Alas, reason rarely prevails over superstition. Indeed, many civilized people still refuse to walk under ladders, avoid stepping on cracks, steer clear of black cats and toss salt over their shoulder -- just in case.

Therefore, and well into the 20 century, the deadly combination of man's superstition, prejudice and ignorance took a heavy toll of the world's owl population. However, barn owls undoubtedly suffered more than others, and for several reasons.

Chief among them is the fact that barn owls inhabit every continent. Thus, the ubiquitous bird is the world's most common owl. It's also the most familiar, for it nests and roosts in barns, wells, water tanks, bell towers, tree hollows and

other cave-like places.

In addition to being readily available for anyone wanting to crucify an owl to ward off evil, or provide body parts for magic potions, *Tyto alba* terrified superstitious people. For seeing the "white owl" at night was enough to make almost anyone believe that he'd seen a ghost.

Moreover, should a rational individual require more convincing evidence, the bird's blood-curdling shriek soon provided it. No wonder people say the barn owl should have been called the screech owl, and the latter -- which doesn't usually screech -- should have been named something else.

Finally, the Barn Owl Family's 11 species are quite different from the 140-odd members of the Typical Owl Family. *Tyto's* tail is short and square rather than rounded, and its middle claw has a serrated

edge -- a handy "comb" for smoothing ruffled feathers.

However, the most striking difference between *Tyto* and other owls is its face. For while owls generally have a circle of special feathers around their eyes, the barn owl's "facial disc" is heart-shaped, pure white and covers its entire face.

Thus, although some people consider the "monkey-faced owl" interesting, many continue to find it frightening. Fortunately, enlightened farmers have considerable respect for the free rodent-extermination service provided by the "rat owl".

And yet, the sight of a white shroud swooping around at night and shrieking like a banshee is enough to make almost anyone believe that he's seen a ghost.

In the final or trophy round, TMS/Flamingos fell in a close contest to KT Beef and Inside-Out remained undefeated by passing KT Beef, 12-9.



More tales about funny fish antics

We talked several weeks ago about the goofy things fish do, especially the mullet. We've got a couple of new stories this week and we'll touch upon some of the latest fishing reports.

Mullet are those fish you see leaping out of the water for no apparent reason. They are the same ones visitors get all excited about, thinking them to be bass. Mullet are not high on the evolution scale. These fish has brown rice for brains.

That is why when one tried to climb up on the beach the other day at Johnson Shoals, I didn't pay much attention to it. With mullet, doing dumb things is normal.

My golden retriever, Sea Urchin, wasted little time in noticing this odd behavior and soon was chasing the mullet as it tried unsuccessfully to jump up on the beach. She eventually did get the mullet and carried it to an old friend of ours, Carol Sellars, so she could feed her cat.

And that's the last time that particular mullet tried to jump out of the water and onto the beach.

Snook have this aggravating habit of living under docks. When hooked, you would think they would head away from the trouble at warp speed. Instead, snook often

circle back into the pilings. I lost yet another Rattle Trap lure this week.

The smaller snook are still in the canals around Sanibel Island, but remember that the season is closed until the first of next month.

We call winter anglers who fish exclusively for sheepshead, "sheep herders," and they have been having a pretty good winter on the black-and-white striped fish.

There are people who get very good at catching sheepshead and I get tickled watching them crowd around docks and piers in their boats. There is a gang from Pine

Island that practically lives on the rocky seawall just inside Redfish Pass, next to South Seas Plantation.

Anyway, if you can find calm days to fish about 2-4 miles offshore of Redfish Pass, there have been some big sheepshead in the 4-5 pound class. That makes for great big fillets and the fish put up a good battle on light tackle.

The best bait still is fresh shrimp, but cut bait will work on most fish out in the gulf. Small grunts cut in pieces work well, as will frozen squid.

We have been experiencing a good run of Spanish mackerel, considering the windy and cooler weather of the past week.

They appear when the weather calms and fishing can get great for a day or two, until the next front comes by. The main thing is that the mackerel are taking size 1/0 silver spoons. If you can cast net some shiners, all the better. Even the silvery shiners have stuck out the winter with us though, and any anglers lucky enough to net some are sure to get the fish to strike offshore.

Snapper also go crazy for shiners in the deeper water.

Good fishing this week and if you happen upon a suicidal mullet, I know just the dog to catch it.



A few oft' asked shelling questions

Just when you thought it was safe to go out on the beach again, did you see where another giant man-eating clam was found on the beach?

That guy must have weighed over 300 pounds. Come on, that's an old shelling joke, people.


It's that time of the year when I get a lot of funny questions about all sorts of things concerning shelling, the beaches and the water. Here are a few you might have wanted to ask yourself.

How come there are two tides some days and four tides other days and only one tide very once in a while?

This tide thing is hard to understand and we shellers pay close attention to it, because low tides are always the best time to plan your shelling trips.

Basically, the tides are tied into the moon phases. Our water level rise and fall is about two feet. In some parts of the coastal United States, there are only two tides, but they can be whoppers.

So, there is a rotation of tide phases, based on the moon's phases. The best days for shelling are near full and

new moon times, when there will be lower, low tides.

The end result is, get a tide chart, look up those low tides and get out accordingly.

What's the best time of the year to go shelling?

Many will say the winter, because cold fronts and resulting high seas and low tides can dump lots of new shells on the beaches in a matter of hours.

If you hear an "old-timer" (those who were here before the causeway was built in 1963) say that he found mounds of shells, that's probably because he happened upon a beach after such a storm.

For me, I like the summer, because the waters clear around the upper islands, so you can walk the beach and wade in the water for shells.

Do the shells get washed to the beaches from deep water?

Shells line the beaches and some wave action will push shells a few hundred yards to the beaches, but basically many shells live within a hundred feet or less of the shore.

So, there isn't a mass migration of living shells. The shells are on the beaches, many buried in the sand. Good shelling is usually a matter of whether or not the shells are covered with sand or not.

Do the living things inside make the shells, or are they born with shells in place?

Shells are pin-head sized when hatched from egg casings. As the mollusk inside -- complete with eyes, digestive system and other internal organs -- grow, so grows the outer shell.

There is a time when some shells will show "baby" colors, then grow into adult colors. Some, like sand dollars, start out sand-colored and are always that way. Others, like the fighting conch, go through an array of color changes before reaching maturity in 5 years or so.

Living shells eventually reach their growth potential and even reach that middle-age spread, not getting taller but wider.

Are there any alligators in these waters?

Nope. The sharks ate them all. (Ha!).

Good shelling this week and please observe the live shelling law on Sanibel -- limit yourself to two live one per species.
