## Sanibel has special fishing and boating laws

When the Sanibel City Council received complaints recently about disruptive activities of a few, non-local mullet fishermen in the Clam Bayou area, the point was made that many residents, visitors and fishermen aren't sure what is legal and what isn't in and on Sanibel waterways.

While a person may know it's illegal to place a fishing net where it blocks access to a waterway, is it illegal to use a net from a boat to fish near private docks? No, that fishing method is considered all right, provided the fisherman is licensed and attending the net and the activity takes place in a natural body of water.

According to police records, the offenses pertaining to fishing activities most often reported usually involve disturbing the peace -- fishermen making loud noises or shining lights in residents' windows late at night -- and those activities are definitely illegal, but aren't violations of "fishing" laws, per se.

The rules and regulations regarding fishing and boating in local waters are a combination of state, county and city ordinances. The rules in Sanibel waters sometimes may be more restrictive because they are site specific. "Sanibel waters" means all navigable waters or waters connected thereto within the boundaries of the city (which is 1/2 mile out), including all waters within the jurisdiction of the city in which the tide ebbs and flows -- whether or not the ordinary or mean high tide line of the ocean has been fixed by law (ordinance, statute, court action or otherwise), and whether or not lands lying under the tidal waters are privately or publicly owned.

## Osprey volunteers begin another year of nest watching

Volunteers for the International Osprey Foundation met saturday, Jan. 4, at Tarpon Bay to organize the monitoring of another osprey nesting season.

Ospreys, large eagle-like birds that are common to the area, have already begun nesting. The season lasts through April or May. The purpose of the volunteer study is to determine how many young hatch and fledge.

A total of about 40 volunteers form six groups to monitor the approximately 70 nests on Sanibel.

Saturday's meeting was chaired by Hartley Kleinberg. Questions were answered by osprey foundation founder Mark "Bird" Westall, who also demonstrated for new volunteers several of the calls ospreys make.

First Westall gave a history of the work. He said that the original osprey platforms on Sanibel were put up around 1974 and 1975 by George Campbell and Charles LeBuff.

Westall arrived on the island and asked Campbell in 1979 what kind of volunteer work he could do. Campbell suggested he take over the osprey program.

A survey by the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge staff in 1978 had found 19 osprey nests on Sanibel, according to Westall, who said he went out in 1979 and covered the island, even going back into the densest mangroves. He said he found 35 nests.

The number of nests has doubled since then as a result of the nesting platforms put up over the years by the osprey foundation.

Westall said that LeBuff suggested he start a foundation, so he incorporated the International Osprey Foundation in 1981 as an attempt to make it an international clearing house for osprey information.

Westall says he has traveled to Russia and to Mexico on foundation business. He also receives information from other areas. The foundation gives a \$1,000 grant once a

year for graduate research on ospreys.

A 25 foot fall out of a tree made Westall decide he needed volunteers to help him with the osprey research.

"I decided I didn't want to be a mile back in the mangroves with a broken back alone," Westall told the group Saturday.

He started banding the birds in 1980 and, by 1989 when the banding program ended, had banded about 350 birds.

### She's back

#### Sweedler returns following mercy mission to Yugoslavia

"It was really scary," said Marion Sweedler Sunday, just back from her mercy mission into the Croatian part of Yugoslavia. "There was machine gun fire around us a lot," Sweedler said.

The Sanibel resident was one of a group of 10 who took medical supplies and clothing to Yugoslavia to aid refugees there. They left the United States on Christmas Day and arrived in Belgrade on Dec. 26. They went on to Sarajevo and then by bus to their destination, the small

town of Medjugorje.

The group had brought with them 22 suitcases and 10 boxes full of items for the refugees, but when they arrived at Medjugorje the boxes were missing.

One member of the party drove back to Sarajevo and, three days later, the boxes were brought back. They had been cut open and looked through.

The number of suitcases had been restricted by the airline and the boxes had been opened by authorities.




A woman called police Jan. 5 requesting help getting her husband up off the floor. He had fallen. Police referred the call to the Sanibel Fire Department.

Diving conditions have been very good up until this past weekend, when the winds kicked things up. By Sunday afternoon, things had calmed down very nicely and conditions should be back to normal.

We had some great diving this past week -- not one, but two divers found junonia shells on one of our 55foot dive sites.

also brought in was a beautiful lions paw scallop shell.

We have been diving one of our new ledges -- called the "mesa ledge" a lot lately. It is in about 55 feet of water and located near the west ledge area. We were pleased and amazed to find a green moray eel on the ledge on New Year's Day. It is very rare to see even spotted moray eels as far north in the gulf as west of Marco Island, but I have never before heard of anyone seeing a green moray off of Sanibel.


He said tags have come back from Biscayne Bay, Port St. Lucie and the Myakka River but so far no tag has been returned from outside the Florida peninsula.

It takes ospreys about two weeks to build a nest, although they can do it in two or three days in an emer-

The female birds are larger and have some brown streaking on their chest.

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The incubation period with ospreys is 35 days. It takes about eight weeks before the young birds are ready for their first flight.

Although an osprey nest from the outside may look uncomfortable, with all the sticks protruding in every direction, actually the nests are soft inside. The birds pad them with seaweed and other soft things, such as clothing found out on a clothes line.

This makes monofilament fishing line a particular risk for ospreys. A tangle of the line will seem soft to them and they will put it in their nest. They or their babies can get tangled in the line and die.

Information gathered by the foundation on the ospreys is given to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service which uses ospreys as an indicator species. The health of an indicator species indicates to experts how other species are doing.

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
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

While most rules apply to all bodies of water within the city limits, the city also differentiates between natural bodies of water and man-made saltwater canals.

Natural bodies of water include: all the creeks and bayous in the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge, Clam Bayou, Dinkins Bayou, Mud Pond, Sanibel River (slough), Tarpon Bay, Ladyfinger Lake, Pine Island Sound, Blind Pass, Wulfert Channel, Halloway Bayou, Bowen Bayou (Kesson Bayou), Hard Working Bayou, San Carlos Bay and Gulf of Mexico.

Man-made saltwater canals include: Shell Harbor, Sanibel Estates, Caloosa Shores, Sanibel Harbours, Sanibel Isles (Seagrape, Buttonwood and Banyan waterways and Gasparilla Inlet) and Water Shadows (Sabal and Hibiscus waterways and Gasparilla Inlet).

There is a third category, inland water bodies (interior lakes, interior ponds or interior natural bodies of water) located in the city. It is illegal to wade, swim, bathe, float

Sanibel planning commissioners meet twice each month year-round, and receive no monetary compensation.

or dive in these. It's also illegal to operate a vessel with a motor, except a battery-powered electric motor designed for and operated at low speed (not greater than 8 mph, minimum wake and not on plane.)

The most basic law is that all Florida residents, nonresidents and recreational divers must have a saltwater fishing license to catch or attempt to catch live fish, unless covered by one of a number of exemptions.

The exemptions are: Any individual under 16 years old. Any person 65 years of age or older who holds a valid Florida driver's license or Florida voter registration card. Any Florida resident fishing in saltwater from land or from a vessel that has been issued a Vessel Saltwater Fishing License. Fishing aboard a vessel which has a valid saltwater products license (only one individual may claim this exemption at any given time). Any Florida resident who is a member of the Armed Forces while home on leave for 30 days or less, with valid orders in his or her possession. Any individual who has been accepted by the Florida Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services (HRS) for developmental services. Any individual fishing from a licensed fishing pier. A Florida resident who is certified as totally and permanently disabled shall be entitled to receive, without charge from the county tax collector, a permanent saltwater fishing license.

There are standard fishing and boating rules to follow in and on Sanibel waters, but, ultimately, the chief of police (with the approval of the city manager) has the authority to designate areas where water activities are regulated. Usually signage is posted at these locations.

One of the most regulated areas on the island is the Sanibel Public Boat Ramp facility, which includes the

ramp itself, the concrete retaining walls and the dock adjacent to the ramp, located on the east side of Causeway Road.

It is against the law to fish or to use cast nets (handheld or otherwise) for fishing within 100 feet of the facility. It is unlawful to clean fish, or deposit fish, fish parts or other marine animals or parts there. It's also against the law to swim, wade, bathe, dive or float, or water ski within 50 feet of the facility.

There are other specific regulations regarding the boat ramp facility, especially related to commercial activity. It is against the law to use the boat ramp facility for the picking up or dropping off of passengers for hire by vessel. (A vessel includes every description of watercrafting or capable of being used as a means of transportation on water.)

No one is allowed to use the boat ramp for any commercial purpose (or to further any commercial purpose) except when launching or retrieving noncommercial vessels, and when performing emergency repairs to vessels for no longer period of time than two hours.

While the Sanibel Fishing Pier, near the lighthouse, is one of the most popular fishing spots on the island (and you don't need a license), it is against the law to use cast nets there.


Although you can bait your crab traps or hooks with natural bait, chumming within 1/2 mile of any beach within the city of Sanibel isn't allowed. "Chumming" is the depositing into saltwater of raw meat or fish parts, including blood and oils thereof (but excluding poultry), in an attempt to attract fish.

## Appeals, variances focus of annual code review

The Land Development Code Review Committee recently completed its annual review of land use and development regulations on Sanibel, and the subjects of variances and the appeal process were in the foreground.

The Land Development Code (LDC) Review Committee is a subcommittee of the Sanibel Planning Commission, and is charged with reviewing sections of the code as potential problems arise, and submitting a yearly report to the City Council, which was done Dec. 17. The past year's committee was chaired by Planning Commissioner Louise Johnson, and other members are commissioners Bob Davison, Jim Levy and Jim Hermes.

Variances and the appeal process were the two main subjects in the LDC Committee's final report.

The committee reviewed the Planning Department's 1991 survey of the variances granted and the denials appealed to the City Council, and concluded that the number of reversals was not exorbitant.

Regarding appeals of Planning Commission approvals, it was decided not to recommend a change in the code.

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That leaves the courts as the recourse for anyone who wishes to appeal an approval, and an appeal must be filed within 30 days of the final decision.

within 30 days of the final decision.

The LDC Committee agreed that an appeal of a condition deemed unacceptable by an applicant should open the entire issue to review. Conditions added to Planning Commission resolutions are appealable to the City Council, because if they are unacceptable to an applicant, it is the same as a denial, therefore, appealable. However, because the commission might not have approved a particular request if the conditions were not included, the committee agreed the entire matter should be reopened if appealed.

There was a problem with timing of appeals, in that the Planning Commission is meeting when the City Council agendas are being prepared, so the committee agreed that 10 days, rather than five days, shall be the period for placing an appealed item on the City Council agenda. Also, the filing date of a resolution, from which the 15-day appeal period runs, should be considered to be the day it is


signed by the Planning Commission chairman or the first business day following if it is signed on a weekend.

Regarding variances, it was agreed that consulting attorney Dick Downes would prepare language for a two-tiered (positive and negative) variance process for the committee's consideration. The "positive" criteria would be the current seven criteria that are required to be met in order to grant a variance. The "negative" criteria would explain how it would not do anything detrimental when a particular positive criteria is not met.

The LDC Committee agreed that the Planning Department should prepare an ordinance for Planning Commission consideration to amend the code to allow for a variance process in the Interior Wetlands Conservation District. This was done at the Planning Department's request, and thus far does not appear to have the support of the Planning Commission. The City Council has not yet considered the ordinance.

The City Council accepted the LDC Committee's annual report at its last meeting, Dec. 17.

In a man-made canal within the city, it is against the law to take or attempt to take any saltwater fish -- except by hook and line or hand-held cast net or with no more than five blue-crab traps.

With Sanibel being a shellers paradise, one of the mostoften violated laws is the taking and keeping of live shellfish. Live shellfish means any living mollusc or echinoderm, with the exception of oysters, hard clams, Venus clams, bay scallops and coquinas.

Within the city of Sanibel, no one is allowed to harvest per day more than two live shellfish of any single species. A person may not possess more than two live shellfish of any single species at any time in that area of the city of Sanibel between the mean high water line and the city limits. There is an exception: the Department of Natural Resources may issue permits to harvest or possess more the normal legal limit for experimental, scientific or exhibitional purposes -- but the sheller must have the permit


in his or her possession during that activity.

Generally speaking, it is all right to take any shell within the city of Sanibel, as long as the shell does not contain any live shellfish at the time of harvesting, and as long as a live shellfish is not killed, mutilated or removed from its shell prior to its taking.

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Sweedler explained that the Serbians knew they were going to help Croatian refugees, "so they were not nice to us at all."

She said there were 3,500 refugees in one town and that in another, the medicine they had brought was given out in a sort of dispensary that had been set up there.

Sweedler said one of the members of her group was a doctor and "he was disgusted" at the lack of any medical facilities for the refugees.

She said that doctor plans to go back in June to try to

set up a clinic and she plans to go then also.

The clothes she brought were donated by friends and the suitcase of medical supplies came from Lee Memorial Hospital.

Medjugorje is famous as the place a vision of the Virgin Mary appears regularly to several visionaries. Sweedler said Sunday, Jan. 5, this has not been happening publicly since the Serbians let it be known they would kill anyone who had such visions.

Last Wednesday night, Jan. 1, Sweedler said, while they

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were at a private home, a group of men came and asked them why the United States was not coming to the aid of the Croatian people. She said the men told them to lea immediately for their own safety. She said they said the did not want Americans to die there.

So, they went to Belgrade on Thursday, Jan. 2. However, they were unable to get out of Belgrade until Saturday. Sweedler said they were told the weather was holding up the planes.

Another delay was that other countries are starting not to allow Yugoslavian airline planes into their countries. Sweedler said Germany has already banned Yugoslavian planes, and a German city was scheduled to be a transfer point for them.


While in Yugoslavia, Sweedler's group ran into the group of U.S. diplomats accompanying U.S. peace envoy Cyrus Vance and was able to discuss the situation with that group.

The flight back to the U.S. saw Sweedler's group transfer airplanes five times. Sweedler said she had not been able to get any sleep for the last 28 hours of the trip.

She said she brought back a spent bullet as a souven of the trip.



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
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
As far as boating is concerned, Sanibel has adopted the Florida Registration and afety Law of the Florida Statutes, so state boating laws are fully applicable within the city of Sanibel.

As a general rule of thumb, it is illegal to operate a vessel above idle speed in Sanibel waters. Specifically: It is unlawful for any operator or person in command of any vessel (except a public officer in the performance of his duty) to operate or permit a vessel to be operated in any of the canals or inland waters of the city of Sanibel, or within 300 feet of the Sanibel Public Boat Ramp facility, except to the extent necessary for the actual launching or retrieval of a vessel, at a rate of speed in excess of idle speed, or any speed which creates a wake that may cause damage to moorings, vessels or floating structures or other property.

There are rules pertaining to all personal watercraft (such as Jet Skis): The driver and passengers must wear personal floatation devices (PFDs). If equipped, lanyard-type engine cutoff must be used. Operation is prohibited from 1/2 hour before sunset to 1/2 hour after sunrise. The operator must be 14 years of age or older. It is illegal for the owner or the person having charge over permitting a person under 14 years of age to operate the personal watercraft. Livery renting of personal watercraft to a person under 16 years of age is illegal.

Basically, it's illegal to operate a vessel at any speed or in such a manner as might endanger or be likely to endanger, someone's life or limb or property.

## Luc Century



What would be an apt description of Luc Century?

Suddenly, the mind goes racing to a compilation of words or phrases. Which says it properly: fascinating? interesting? talented? experimental? spiritual? environmentalist? metaphysician? laid-back? family-oriented? dreamer? seeker? doer? sincere? receiver and giver of much love?

You could combine all of the above and still come up short. There seems to be no concise description of this New Jersey-born gentleman who was raised in Cleveland. There is one strong possibility: unique.

Luc was born June 23, 1955, in Newark, N.J. He has one sister that is two years his senior. His father and mother both work. They were always supportive and still are. It is a close-knit family bound together by great love, understanding and respect for each other.

When asked how his parents had aided him, Luc immediately replied, "They gave me space to develop my own realities. They accepted me and surrounded me with love, no matter what I attempted."

Most of his school days were spent in Cleveland where he graduated from high school. This was a happy but uneventful time.

There seemed to be nothing earthshaking about childhood that made any great impression on Luc or that he remembered vividly -- except fear.

frightened Luc. A thunderstorm would send him into a panic. A doorbell ringing that meant company was at the door put him into a flat spin. He felt that his teachers had filled him with fear about his learning abilities and career capabilities. There was constant concern about his homework. Had it been done properly? Would it be acceptable?

As a child, many things

Fear has been one of the things that Luc has fought hardest to overcome; he has conquered it and survived. He is now the master of this phobia, and his own fate. Luc is no longer afraid of what people think of him.

Luc spent four years at Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland. His major was business. He was never graduated, but explains, "My diploma came from the School of Hard Knocks with a major in Trial and Error. As for errors, I've stopped counting."

It was necessary to help pay for his education, and he did many odd jobs for a few bucks. One of these, as fate would have it, was working as a window-washer.

"I vividly remember cleaning heavily nicotine-stained windows in a private home. As I pressed the squeegee through the dense muck on the window, a design in glass suddenly appeared. It must have been a sign. Right then and there I knew that this was exactly what I wanted to do. I would make patterns on glass."


That was in 1974-75.

Luc served his apprenticeship in Denver and Memphis, Tenn. Along with glass, he suddenly discovered that he had a great affinity to working with stone.

Luc became aware of the Vietnam War Memorial in Washington, D.C., and suddenly felt that he must become a part of it. Something had spoken to him. He did not resist that something, but began his lifelong path of acceptance. This was the beginning of an important part of his being. The quest for realization, acceptance and choice.

Luc became quite intent as he explained, "In all phases of life, timing is imperative. One must realize how and when to receive these messages of fate, and it becomes vital to cultivate the ability to make judgments about which suggestions to act upon.

Luc simply contacted Maya Lin, the designer of the 58,000-name memorial, and told her of his interest and intent. She was not impressed. In fact, she gave him the well-known brush-off. To get him off the phone, she suggested that he call the project director.

Luc's follow-through was immediate, and he found himself talking to that project director. He told him that he had a process for putting the names on the black granite memorial that would save the government millions of dollars. (Luc's process eventually did!).

The project director, after hearing the words "savings and "millions" put everything on super-go. In no time at all, Luc had been given the job of consultant and engraver for the memorial. It was a challenge he relished.

Once the original job had been completed, the next hurdle had to be conquered. How do you add names and correct mistakes in spelling? This had to be done directly on the granite and Mother Nature made no exceptions when it came to weather conditions. Luc had to work in all types of inclement weather.

He speaks almost reverently about his contacts with the families, relatives and loved ones of the war casualties while working on the memorial.

"They experienced moments of such anguish and sorrow ... so much anger for the hollowness of the loss. And then -- almost divinely -- they expressed appreciation for the tribute paid their lost ones. It is impossible to describe, and extremely difficult to talk about."

Luc's home on Sanibel is a place of refuge, peace and superb working conditions with his loving partner and coworker, Dee Serage.

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

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## Overcoming the holiday sublime with post-holiday simple

By now you are probably tired of rich dishes and you want some plain, simple food. The holiday parties were parvelous, etc., but there comes a time when you want mething simple. Try the following.

Baked Celery and Prosciutto 1 head of celery, tops removed and stalks diced 2 ounces of prosciutto ham, minced

Salt and pepper

1 teaspoon onion, minced

1 cup cheese sauce (recipe follows)

1/2 cup bread crumbs

1/4 cup butter, melted

Butter to grease an au gratin pan

Pre-heat oven to 350 degrees. Cook the celery in boiling water until tender-crisp. Drain. Place in a bowl and mix in the ham, salt, pepper and onion. Put this in the au gratin pan and pour the cheese sauce over this. Bake 35 minutes.

#### Cheese Sauce

2 tablespoons butter tablespoons flour cup milk Dash of nutmeg Salt and pepper

Dash of Tabasco 1/2 cup Swiss cheese, grated

Melt the butter in a pan over medium heat. Whisk in the flour and when the roux starts to bubble, whisk in the milk, salt, pepper, nutmeg, Tabasco and cheese. Whisk until the cheese melts and then pour this sauce over the mix in the au gratin pan. If you do not want to use milk, save 1 cup of the water the celery was cooked in and use



that instead of the milk.

Corn and Oyster Bisque 5 ears fresh corn, kernels scraped off 3 cups water 1 bay leaf Salt and pepper 18 oysters, shucked, reserve the liquid 1 cup half and half 1/4 teaspoon Tabasco Parsley, minced for garnish Paprika for garnish

Put the kernels in a large pot. With the back of a knife, scrape all the "milk" from the cobs into the pan. Cut each cob into 3 pieces and put in the pan. Add water, the bay leaf, salt and pepper. Bring to a boil, turn to simmer, cover and cook 25 minutes. Remove the cobs and bay leaf; throw them out. Puree the mix in batches in a blender. Then place a sieve over the pan and press the puree mix through the sieve with a wooden spoon. Discard the contents in the sieve. Put the pan back on the stove and add the half and half, Tabasco, salt and pepper.

Cook over medium heat -- do not let it come to a boil. Add the oysters and the liquid, reheat and cook about 3 minutes or until the oysters start to "ruffle." Ladle into warm soup cups and garnish with the parsley and paprika. This serves 6 to 8.

Apple Apricot Crisp

1/3 cup dried apricots, minced

2 Golden Delicious apples, peeled, cored and thinly sliced

2 tablespoons brandy

1/4 cup flour

3 tablespoons dark brown sugar, firmly packed 1/4 teaspoon salt

3 tablespoons butter, chilled and cut into pieces

1/3 cup old-fashioned rolled oats

2 tablespoons sliced, blanched almonds Butter to grease a 9-inch pie pan

Pre-heat the oven to 400 degrees. Soak the apricots and apples in the brandy, toss to coat. Set aside to soak 10 minutes. Mix the flour, sugar, salt and butter until it makes a coarse meal. Add the oats and almonds, toss until well blended. Place the fruit mix in a pie plate, spread out and then top it with the oat-crumb mix. Smooth the top. Bake 45 minutes. This serves 2 to 3.

## Readers offer suggestions for Islander's top stories list of past 30 years

A little over a month ago, the week of Nov. 15, 1991, The Sanibel-Captiva Islander celebrated its 30th anniversary with a special publication. The issue that week, and following issues, featured a number of special articles noting the paper's anniversary.

- The initiation of Friends In Service Here.
- The auction at the S.S. Algiers.
- Formation of the Barrier Island Group for the Arts -and its progress.
- The construction of the BIG Arts Center on Dunlop
- The high cost of island living the past few years.
- All of the beach erosion.
- The islands' diminishing wildlife.
- The writing of the original city charter.
- Rapid escalation of the Sanibel city budget.
- The push for million dollar homes on the island and the resulting change in the character of the island.
- Tourism and the part it plays in island life.
- Wildlife and are we doing enough to protect it.

#### A review

## Park explains the whys and wherefores of modern art at BIG Arts

Theodore "Tad" Park is so knowledgeable of is subject matter -- art -- that his stored information rolls trippingly from his tongue. You dare not lose concentration for a moment or you are lost.

"Genesis of Modern Art," the evening's lecture on Thursday, Jan. 2, at the Barrier Island Group for the Arts Center on Dunlop Road, was exactly as titled. Park took as on a quick journey from beginnings in France, through multiple stages: impressionists, cubism, collage and assemblage, abstract expressionism, pop art, post modern, etc., to zeitgeist (spirit of the times) in the 1980s.

The locales of art centers changed from France to the United States, and now to Germany. Who knows what art may spring forth from the recently emancipated Eastern Block counties?

Park's slide presentation was an essential part of the lecture. Without those images, detailed descriptions of periods and eras of change are almost impossible. Multiple slides were used to represent these changes and very often Park made comparisons of new to old and old

Regardless of what Park discussed, it was the way he presented his facts that made the most lasting impression. He possesses quite special qualities that many lecturers

have spent years trying to acquire. Park speaks zealously about art, with a love and a passion that draws you into his special world of artistic fervor. His manner (and that is what ensnares you into his art trap) is never the hard sell of an egotistical genius. It is accomplished by imparting knowledge with the tantalizing temptation of a sorcerer.

Park's 1990 lecture "What is Art?" worked from a much broader base. He left you with definite questions to ask yourself about what is -- and what is not -- art.

This year's bits of wisdom, vocally and optically, helped one have a better understanding of today's art. Park also gave us a bit of a hint and a general guide to the kind of art we may be expecting in the near future.

This was especially true when he spoke of the juried art show currently hanging in the Phillips and Founders Galleries at BIG Arts. (Today is the last day.)

Park's explanations made us all a little more cognizant of the reason for certain choices by Judge Ileen Sheppard. It certainly helped understand her decisions for prizes and merit awards.

After the lecture, quite a few audience members went through both galleries again and looked at the exhibitions with a new eye and fresh understanding.

Park closed his lecture with the question, "What will the '90s bring us in art? And what will it bring to BIG

For BIG Arts, an early request would be a series of lecture/slide presentations conducted by Tad Park, the erudite young art expert we all admire and enjoy so much.

'Since I was city-born and raised, nature and the environment were recognized and dealt with -- but never with the amazing love and concern I now have. My favorite thought is, 'Tune in and listen to what your environment says to you.' I do not know of a better criterion."

Luc's glass and stone pieces are on display in various spots on the islands and surrounding areas: Sanibel City Hall, The Old Schoolhouse Theater, the new Activities and Recreation Center at the University of South Florida in Fort Myers and at some of the finer galleries.

The Sarasota Public Art Commission will soon unveil his latest work. This intricate piece of work was designed by Athena Tacha. It is a 250-feet-long path in the shame of an M -- a "Memory" path. There are 50 photos of old landmarks and many portraits that had to be etched into the red granite.

Luc is most pleased with the portraits. "They seem to have had a rebirth, a new life in the granite. To me, that has been most rewarding.

Each piece of Luc's etched glass is painstakingly handcrafted. Luc refers to these glass pieces as his bread-and-

butter line. His present successful project is called "The Wildlife Series.'

In discussing his work habits, Luc confides, "It is amazing that I find a new release, a different way of doing things, or a by-pass to a new ides, while repeating patterns in my current work."



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



## 'Can't Help Singing' is one of J.T. Smith's top revues



The Old Schoolhouse Theater on Periwinkle Way was aglow in two areas the night I saw "Can't Help Singing." One glow was from the stage area where four stand-up performers sang with skill and a burning desire to please. They were joined vocally and accompanied by one sit-down orchestra -- J.T. Smith at the piano. He also felt the urge to entertain.

The other beam of happiness was from the audience, glowing in the nostalgia of the tunes being performed. It seemed that each one of them had a special meaning for someone, perhaps recalling a special moment with a loved one.

Smith's singing of "The Last Time I Saw Parie" caused a few eyes to become misty as memories of another time passed through the memory bank.

A younger generation may have to accept these standard hit tunes as curios from a vast library of

special material. Or they may accept them on musical merit -- brilliant, hummable tunes. These songs may never completely replace rock 'n' roll, soul and other contemporary sounds, but it does offer alternates.

The setting by Ken Loewit is completely in tune with the Kerns era of innocence and prettiness. The white lattice, trellis and benches bespeak an afternoon outing of long ago. The first act costumes by Florene Francia are sweet and girly, representative of a period of daintiness and delicacy.

Don't get me wrong! There are many wonderful updated musical concepts and arrangements by that King of Madness, Smith, with a topical touch of acid zaniness.

Jennifer Brunson gives us another series of delightful comic portrayals. This pretty young ingenue has a delicious sense of humor and an unlikely delivery of songs.

Dan Brunson and Steve Dunne are funny, romantic, or playful as Smith and Kerns designate.

It is Carolan Berman who comes into her own in this production. There is a new approach to her delivery of three of the most successful numbers of the evening: "Why Was I Born?" "Can't Help Loving That Man" and a get-down version of "I've Told Every Little Star.'

Her presence has always been assured, but this time it is assurance with a total follow-through. "Can't Help Singing" brings audiences an exciting new look at Berman, the acting songstress.

"All The Things You Are," was a marvelously arranged and performed company number. It is always

## The Pridonoffs -- duo-pianists at their best

A large audience was assembled in the Phillips Gallery at the Barrier Island Group for the Arts Center on Dunlop Road on Saturday, Jan. 4. They were there to hear a concert of double piano works played by the Pridonoffs, Eugene and Elizabeth.

What they may not have counted on was the fact that all of the above was brilliantly executed by four of the most nimble hands and 20 of the most extraordinarily talented fingers in the concert field.

Before playing each number Elizabeth Pridonoff gave thumbnail sketches of the composers and explanations of the compositions they were about to play. She was most charming and her casual chatting gave the evening quite an informal, homesy-folksy,

Eugene and Elizabeth changed pianos several times during the evening and Eugene delightfully explained that that was done so that all members of the audience would get a better look at Elizabeth at work.

The first part of the program consisted of three

works: "Six Etudes in the Form of A Canon" by Robert Schuman; "Sonata for Two Pianos" by Francis Poulenc and "Music of Spain" by Manuel Infante.

Intermission discussions were all extremely favorable except a few members of the audience were not in total agreement with Elizabeth Pridonoff's remarks about the values of Poulenc's music and how it was classified by his peers.


A lovely and quite playful piece, "Jeuz D' Enfants" by Georges Bizet, opened the second part of the program. It was followed by "Concertino, Op. 94" by Dmitri Shostakovich.

The program concluded with "Fantasy, Op 5" by Sergei Rachmaninoff. The Pridonoffs explained that this was their first duo-piano presentation and a special favorite.

The audience's applause confirmed their favoritism. It would be most difficult for me to choose a favorite from the evening's delights but if it had to be, it would be "Music of Spain" by Infante.

A lovely gallery for a setting, a magnificent exhibition of art works all around you and the sensitive interpretation of excellent music by two gifted artists is indeed a propitious way to start the 1992 season at BIG Arts.

## Sea trout suffer while other fish bounce back

We always hope that the new year will bring something special to us while we are on the water and this year, I'm more enthused than ever.

First of all, with the exception of sea trout, fishing for some of our most popular fish like snook, redfish, Spanish mackerel and tarpon has been better than in the past 15 years ... maybe even 20 years.

You'll note that all those fish on the rise are now heavily regulated. The poor sea trout, however, is still under pressure from commercial netters and recreational anglers. That could change in the coming year with talk drifting around fishing circles of possible off-limit months, reduced catches or other measures to bring back this once most popular fish.

One of the first places I owned on Sanibel was a modest bungalow I used to tell friends was "the house that trout built." In the late 1970s and the early 1980s, sea trout were the core of my charter fishing business. Not that we caught a lot -- I always limited my anglers to 18 fish or less -- but trout were easy to catch, they were good to eat and the average tourist could handle the basic equipment to

In the past few years, primarily after redfish were regulated by the state with new size limits and off seasons, anglers turned to the sea trout and the populations have declined drastically.

If we have one good wish for the coming year, it would be to protect and bring back these wonder sport fish.

Speaking of the start of 1992, don't forget that if you need a saltwater fishing license, the old ones expired the last day of December, 1991. Basically, if you fish from a boat, you'll need a license. If you fish with a licensed guide, you won't need the piece of paper because we have a blanket license to cover everyone.

You might have been hearing the grumbling about where the money from the licenses is going. Remember that part was for reefs, more law enforcement and research. I can't say that in the past two years that the program has been in effect that any appreciable change in fishing locally has occurred from license money.

There were a few more patrolmen visible, but officers in the Florida Marine Patrol's higher echelons have been repeatedly forced from office for irregularities. So it seems, the more money we pour into this office, the deeper the corruption goes. And in the meantime, there's been no new reefs and no stocking of fish, and the patrolmen got new boats again.

One curious thing on the water for many visiting anglers

is the presence of commercial netters. The men who set out the gill nets primarily take mullet. These are fish which will not bite a hook and line, so they are netted with their roe being sold overseas for large amounts of

As a matter of fact, fishing for mullet around Pine Island Sound is some of the best in the nation. Netters from other states flock here in the height of roe season. This

stresses the mullet population, angers year-round local netters and causes a kind of stampede for the roe.

Someone made a comment the other day which brought it all into the light for me. The man said, "Wait a minute! If they are taking all the fish roe ... that's baby mullet. Pretty soon, if they take all the roe, you aren't going to have any mullet." Something to think about.

As for fishing, the members of the Sanibel-Captiva Guide's Association have been having a great winter season off shore a few miles with grouper, snapper and other bottom fish. This is one kind of fishing which has picked up with mild days and light winds. Some think it's the best grouper fishing ever. If we have a relatively warm winter, action should continue.





## The flats can offer unique shells

Searching the flats of Pine Island Sound doesn't always mean you have to take living shells. Actually, there are a couple of empty shells that you only find on these half

One of the most delicate and easily broken shells is a most unusual kind of long, slender clam called a jackknife clam. As with many shells, there is a second name and sometimes you will hear it called a razor clam.

I have never found a living razor clam and it takes a careful eye to pick out these dead shells. The easiest time to spot these light green or tan shells is at very low tide, while searching small pockets of water in the flats.

The thin clam is often found with both halves attached to worm casings or grass roots. They are easily broken, so handle them with care. The local razor clams might reach three inches in length and each side is about half an inch

They area members of a larger family of shells which are especially well known along the Pacific coast. Clams there can reach up to 5 inches and these hearty clams are

The second specialty shell to search for on the flats is the bright and shiny rose pedal tellin.

You will see lots of the white tellins, but on some flats there are those with a rose-colored strain which are very popular for collecting. It's not unusual to find half of this bright pink shell on the gulf beaches, but on the flats, without the strong wave and tidal action, perfect sets can be found.

Again, I've never found a living rose pedal, but they do die of natural causes and both sides of this pink shell can

be found. The rose pedal measures only 1 1/2 inches tall, so look carefully for them.

Shell number three on the flats is the small ribbed cardita. It's another shell you will commonly find half of on the beaches, but the living cardita is a burrowing clam, as were the first two, and it likes to live in those muddy bars of the bay.

The cardita is a hearty little thing, with small wing-like sides on its shell. Collectors look for ones with bright blue or purple insides.

One more shell of the flats is the tiny margin shell. These are about half the size of a coffee bean, but are very colorful and smooth. Early Indians used the cardita for both trading and decorations.

Unfortunately, many people go to the flats only to kill living shells, but there are many special ones out there too, which are empty.

Some books advise you to signal to say whether or not partner's opening lead has struck gold. Since today's East liked diamonds, he played the eight at the first trick. West obediently led the ace and another diamond.

East won the third diamond and led a trump. South took the top trumps and the ace of hearts, led a trump to dummy's jack, threw a club on the king of hearts and ended with eight tricks.

At Trick One. East must consider the defense of the whole deal, not just the diamond suit. Since a club lead through dummy is desirable, East must signal with the deuce of diamonds, asking for a shift.

Because East cannot be hoping for a heart lead, West shifts to clubs. East wins and leads queen and another diamond. West wins and leads a second club. After East takes the queen and ace, the lead of the 13th club promotes West's queen of trumps. Down two.

The key question in signalling is not "Do I like the lead?" but "How do I beat the contract?"

queen, 8 and 2 of diamonds; and ace, queen, jack and 10 of clubs. Partner opens one diamond, you respond one heart and he next bids two clubs. The opponents pass. What do you say?

#### Answer

Bid three clubs. You would prefer to have a point or two more in high cards to raise your partner's second suit to the level of three. However, this hand is much better than its point count suggests. All your honors lie in partner's long suits.



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


