# State looks into erosion problem at South Seas

Islander staff writer A state inspector looked into erosion Friday, Jan. 17, at South Seas Plantation on the north end of Captiva. The persistent erosion has been threatening a fire access road to

the resort's Land's End Villas buildings. An 11-man South Seas crew was busy Saturday morning putting in sandbags to fight the erosion. It was the seventh time this year that sandbagging had been attempted to-stop or delay the erosion beside Redfish Pass, according to the workmen.

The northern point of the island has been subject to erosion during previous winters. However, this year the erosion "is more pronounced and came sooner," according to Fred Hawkins, a South Seas official.

Normally, the angle of the waves shifts in the middle of February and Captiva's tip accretes through the summer. So, this year's problem should last only a few more weeks if normal wave patterns hold. With weather patterns

# Lot across from Bailey's Shopping Center may be developable

The Sanibel Planning Commission took the first steps that will make further development possible on the lot across from Bailey's Shopping Center that's now being used as an auxiliary parking lot.

At its Jan. 14 meeting, the commission voted unanimously to recommend approval of two ordinances that revive and amend two specific amendments that pertain to the Bailey Shopping Center, owned by Francis Bailey, Sam Bailey and John Kontinos. With the re-establishment of parking requirements, it will be possible to reduce the number of parking spaces currently provided on the 2.3acre parcel on the west side of Tarpon Bay Road. The reduction from 131 parking spaces down to a minimum of 20 parking spaces would allow for further commercial development there.

What are the owners planning to build across the road from Bailey's General Store?

"What makes you think we're going to build anything? Maybe we're going to sell it," was all Francis Bailey would tell the Islander. Sam Bailey and John Kontinos could not be reached for comment.

No matter what is eventually done with the unpaved lot across the street, it is going to take some serious replanning of parking spaces in the overdeveloped, nonconformowners want to create 300 parking spaces on the 6.2-acre commercially zoned site, where now there are 254 parking spaces. When the previous ordinances were enacted in 1979 and 1981, Bailey's center had a surplus of 55 spaces, but parking standards have changed twice since then. In addition, commercial floor area ratio standards and vegetation buffer requirements have been established since then.

Ray Fenton, representing the owners, called it a 'fairness and equity" issue, not merely a technical planning issue. That Bailey's Shopping Center has the only movie theater on the island "penalizes" the owners by making them subject to special rules which require 50 more parking spaces. That Bailey's center provides the neighborhood with three recycling facilities complicates traffic flow. Because Sanibel doesn't have parking formulas for a center such as this, as most communities do, the situation warrants special consideration regarding parking for the 15 businesses operating there. The fact that the original development order allowed for construction of a 70,000-square-foot center, and that only a down-sized 54,000-square-foot center actually was built also should carry some weight in the commission's deliberations, Fenton said.

# **Beached dolphin dies on Sanibel**

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A beached dolphin died Sunday, Jan. 19, in front of the Clamshell condos at Olde Middle Gulf Drive. Beach-goers, officials and the part-time Care and Rehabilitation of Wildlife veterinarian tried fruitlessly to save the distressed mammal.

Steve Eiffert, who is staying at a local resort, removed a hook from the dolphin and unwound fishing line that was wrapped around it.

Barbara Britton of New York City called police.

Sylvia Guthrie was among those who attempted to revive the dolphin. She said that some of the people there thought at first that the dolphin was trying to give birth because it seemed to be laboring and its stomach was so swollen.

However, after a great amount of water and sand had been spewed out of the animal through the blow hole, the swelling had gone down.

Guthrie said she reached into the dolphin's mouth and removed two fish.

After some effort by the beach-goers, Guthrie said, the dolphin was breathing on her own and her heart was beating.

"She was breathing but I'm sure she was exhausted," Guthrie said.

Dr. Mark Huff, the part-time CROW vet, arrived. He consulted by phone with veterinarians at Sea World. However, by the time he had returned to the beach, the dolphin had died.

Asked what the condition of the dolphin was when he arrived, Huff said, "I saw an animal that was getting ready to die."

Sanibel Police officers and J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge officer Bill Baird were also on the scene.

A necropsy was performed Sunday evening on the dolphin by a veterinarian with the Florida Marine Patrol. That examination found at least 30 fish in the stomach of the dolphin, according to Dr. Huff, who said he did not know the cause of death. The Fort Myers Florida Marine Patrol office was closed Monday for the holiday.

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"All we want to do is go back in time to '79," Fenton said.

There are a lot of people who'd want '79 standards, said Commissioner Louise Johnson. She said she'd rather find a way to readjust the parking situation than re-enact the old ordinances.

Planning Director Bruce Rogers said it was staff's opinion that re-enacting the ordinances was the best vehicle by which the owners could accomplish their goals without setting a precedent.

The commission voted unanimously to find the ordinances consistent with the Comprehensive Land Use Plan and the Land Development Code and recommended approval. A resolution to that effect will be considered Jan. 28. The commission's recommendation will be forwarded to the City Council.

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All the following information was taken directly from Sanibel Police Department reports.

Christopher Andre Ventura and Terry Lee Hoffman, both of Sanibel, were arrested Saturday, Jan. 18, for trafficking cocaine and for possession of marijuana. They denied switching and Cada arrested both men. In searching the vehicle, a black nylon gym bag was found under the front seat. According to police it contained 29 grams of cocaine in one package plus four one-gram packages, a four and a seven-gram package of marijuana, \$3,045.70 in cash, plus a variety of other items including hemostats, a pipe and scales.

A woman on Sunday, Jan. 19, left a threatening message on the answering machine of a Sanibel relative who had inherited silverware that the woman wanted.

A portable oxygen unit was found on Bowman's Beach Jan. 18 and was returned to its owner.

Nancy Barker of Fort Myers was charged Jan. 18 with careless driving after an accident on Main Street. There



were no injuries in the accident.

A Sanibel woman complained Jan. 18 that an unknown man with an accent had caller her trying to sell her illegal drugs.

The owner of a Sanibel business complained Jan. 18 that two men were sleeping in a car behind his business. It turned out the two men were waiting for the brother of one of the men to get off work at a neighboring business.

James M. Cahill of Fort Myers was charged Jan. 18 with going 64 mph on the Sanibel Causeway.

Friday night, Jan. 17, a Sanibel man met a man and a woman at a local bar. They asked to be driven home but after getting in his car they seemed to have difficulty remembering where home was. So, the man dropped them off at Fire Station 2. Later he noticed his waist pouch containing his credit cards was missing. It had been on the front seat.

Police notified a man stopped at Pick Kwik Jan. 17 that

he was too drunk to drive. They drove him home.

A female blond Labrador retriever was found at large on Wild Lime Drive Jan. 17. Its owner did not want it back so police found a new owner for the dog.


Three nuts were missing Jan. 17 from the site of the Periwinkle bridge construction project.


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With city officials and the school children looking on, one of the two tree seedlings is planted on the grounds of Sanibel Elementary during the Arbor Day celebration.

# Students plant live oaks on Arbor Day

The trees planted Friday beside the school were a Jim lowie oak, whose parent tree is in Louisiana, and a Treaty oak, whose parent tree is in Tallahassee.

Mayor Mike Miracle told the gathering that Sanibel has been designated a Tree City U.S.A. since 1988, and it is activities such as the Arbor Day celebration that make possible that designation.

The program Friday was conducted by third grade students. The master of ceremony's job was very efficiently done by Jesse Wood, who also led the pledge of allegiance and the singing of America The Beautiful.

The service also announced that starting Feb. 1 in Tallahassee, environmentalist and runner Tim Womick will be running the length of Florida giving speeches and planting trees as he goes.

# Trailer park to get variance

Because it won't increase the density in an already nonconforming, overcrowded area, the Planning Commission voted unanimously to recommend approval of a variance to setback standards on six recreational vehicles sites at Periwinkle Trailer Park. The variance will allow the six recreational vehicle owners to replace these older units with new ones, in the same locations, that are set back a minimum of 10 feet from the drainage way in the park, rather than the current standard of at least 20 feet. The six sites are particularly shallow in depth, about 42 feet, and to accommodate a 32-foot recreational vehicle in compliance with current regulations would be impossible. The commission found the request meets all seven criteria granting a variance. A resolution to that effect will considered Jan. 28.

In other business conducted at the Jan. 14 meeting of the Sanibel Planning Commission:

• By a 4-2 vote, the commission recommended denial of a variance that would allow three six-unit multifamily buildings to be constructed 49.3 feet high, rather than 45 feet high, on WEST GULF DRIVE property located between Island Inn Resort and Seascape condominium.

Section 1.03 of the Sanibel Charter shall be amended to read as follows in full:

Section 1.03 - Intergovernmental Relations

The city may exercise any of its powers or perform any of its functions and may participate in the financing thereof, jointly or in cooperation, by contract or otherwise, with any one (1) or more other municipalities, state or local governments or civil divisions or agencies thereof, or the United States or any agency thereof. The procedure to be followed before the city may do any of the above shall be as follows: All contracts, and agreements as mentioned above shall be introduced in writing, shall be read by title, or in full on at least two separate days at a regular meeting of the council, and shall, at least fourteen days prior to adoption, be noticed once in a newspaper of general circulation in the city. The notice shall state the date, time, and place of the meeting, the title of the proposed agreement, contract, etc. The city shall enact all interlocal agreements by ordinance. Additions in text indicated by underline; Deletions by strikeout.

How the ballot will read on March 10: NO 3 SANIBEL CHARTER AMENDMENT INTERLOCAL AGREEMENTS WITH OTHER **GOVERNMENTAL BODIES TO BE ENACTED** BY ORDINANCE

An amendment to the Sanibel City Charter, amending Section 1.03 to require all contracts or agreements with other governmental bodies to be adopted by ordinance at a council meeting; to require prior reading at two separate council meetings, and at least 14 days prior to enactment be noticed once in a newspaper of general circulation with date, time and place of the council meeting. Shall the above-described amendment be adopted?

#### Sanibel Municipal Reform Committee comments:

Proposed amendment #3 requires that all intergovernmental contracts and agreements be by written ordinance. This proposed amendment is in compliance with the Florida Statute which defines an "ordinance" as "an official legislative action by a governing body, which action is a regulation of a general and permanent nature and enforceable as a local law." (Florida Statutes 166.041(1)(b)) Notwithstanding its objection to this amendment, the Charter Review

Committee 1991, in page 7 of its report, states that "it may be a good idea to amend the section to provide procedures since the charter provides none now. Nor does the state statute ..." This finding by the Charter Review Committee 1991 emphasizes the necessity for specific procedures to be followed which would be accomplished with the use of ordinances requiring public notice as recommended by the Sanibel Municipal Reform Committee in this proposed amendment.


Proposed amendment #4 would amend Section 3.02 by changing the term of a City Council member from four to two years with a restriction to two consecutive terms. The Sanibel Municipal Reform Committee believes that the limitation of tenure in office is desirable in order to introduce fresh views and ideas in running the

affairs of our city. The committee further believes that such changes would prohibit the chance of cronyism, lethargism and the like. This committee knows of no statute in city or state government or in the congressional House of Representatives where "chaos" or ineffectiveness occurred as a result of the limitations of terms of office.

# Commission OKs conversion at West Wind Inn plant, which the Planning Department does not consider

# Guide's association members have interesting (?) year

You would think that being a fishing guide has some controlled risks, but nothing much more than an occasional bite from a Spanish mackerel or an errant hook in the finger.

In the past year, we in the Sanibel-Captiva Guide's Association, collectively, have set some kind of record for injuries. And, we're to a point where we're afraid our insurance company is going to lump us into the same risk category as bungee cord testers and chain saw jugglers. Setting the pace is veteran guide John "Duke" Sells, a great and long-time friend who was seriously injured in a head-on collision last Saturday, Jan. 11, in Hendry County.

Sells has been a fixture in the fishing scene around the islands for many years and has served as vice president of the guide's association since its inception. He has won the first two celebrity Caloosa Catch-and-Release Tournaments and regularly fishes all over the United States and Central America.

It was just a few months ago that he was involved in a plane accident in Miami, where a truck trying to lead his small plane back from the runway rear-ended the craft. Sells suffered neck and back injuries and was just



recovering when Saturday's accident happened.

Two people in the vehicle which hit Sell's 1986 Toyota station wagon were killed and several others were injured.

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ticks. Well, at least the latest group is edible ... I hope. My trouble is, I'm having a problem grasping the concept of this all. Let me see if I have the facts straight.


First, something like 8,000-9,000 cars come to Sanibel each day, and just throwing some numbers around here, let's say that half of them are hungry tourists. Now recall, if you will, a few years ago when this guy from New Orleans who personally knows two of my friends, burned the daylights out of some pan-fried fish when he was called to the phone and an assistant accidentally spilled about a pound of black pepper in the skillet.

That is how the blackened fish craze really started. The chef came back, looked at the ruined fish and said to the manager that it was time he looked for a new job. The waiter said, "What about my customer?" And the manager said, "Take out the fish and say it's the chef's special." While the chef was cleaning out his locker and stealing a load of fillet mignon, the waiter rushed in and was screaming, "More! Fix more of the burned fish! It's delicious!'

What I am saying here seafood lovers (if I get the full




# Beachview event benefits islanders



# Atlanta Symphony Orchestra performs at Barbara B. Mann Hall

The weather was not so bad, or the temperature so low on Friday, Jan. 17, that it would cause people to stay away in droves from the Barbara B. Mann Performing Arts Hall.

What happened?

The Atlanta Symphony performed an exciting evening of music. Misha Dichter, featured pianist, played superbly. But, where was the audience? Why was there such a small group of music lovers there?

The evening opened with a most satisfying reading of Sibelius' En Saga, Op. 9. Maestro Levi conducted scoreless, as he did the remainder of the program. I felt this to be the most satisfying piece of the evening.

Dichter is noted for his performances of Liszt. His technically brilliant playing of the Liszt Concerto No. 1 in E-Flat Major did nothing to diminish his reputation.

It doesn't seem humanly possible to be able to execute the complicated, cascading finger work demanded by the composition.

During the playing of the Liszt, there was such a commotion back stage that Levi was compelled to wait for silence. He signaled a violinist on stage right to go out and quiet things down.

This is the second time within the space of two weeks that backstage noises have

interrupted performances. Some careful patrolling of that area would seem to be called for. There is absolutely no excuse for this kind of thing to happen in a professional theater.

After intermission, the evening's closing selection was Dvorak's Symphony No. 8.

The star of this musical segment was Levi himself. It was a pleasure to watch him in preparation for the many crescendos. At times he seemed to almost to levitate.

A special guard rail had been added to the conductor's platform during the intermission. Apparently Levi gets so carried away when conducting Dvorak the it was feared he might back off the edge By the way, why was this monumental piece of stage equipment left unpainted? A can of black spray paint would have done the trick almost immediately.

The music ended and there were numerous curtain calls. The audience obviously wanted more. There was no encore. Is this becoming the current trend?

The management of Barbara B. Mann Performing Arts Hall is bringing to Southwest Florida the best attractions available in the popular and concert fields. They deserve support. That can only be demonstrated by ticket purchases and attendance.

Phillips has indicated she is pleased with the increase in new memberships and reminds present members that now is the time to renew.







# Williams, 'Icon of the Ivories,' plays Harborside

On Jan. 15 at the Harborside Convention Hall, I was seated in a nest of Roger Williams fans. As they swooned to each arpeggio, each endless run of keys and each majestic chord, an old saying come to my brain numbed by constant piano glissandi. The one extremely clever musical set occurred in the second part of the program. Williams explained that many audiences who had made a great effort to hear him in concert were often disappointed. Why? Because Williams had not played their favorite tune during the course of the evening. So that this wouldn't happen tonight, he asked the audience to call out their favorites.

The house lights were brought up and from all sections of the audience came tune after tune. The stage manager wrote them down on his clip board and gave them to Williams.

The list included such popular melodies as "Misty," "Send In the Clowns," "Near You," "Clair de Lune," "Tennessee Waltz" and many others. Some startling requests bought a quick retort from Williams. In no special order, those were "On Wisconsin," "Nola" and Wintergreen for President."

Williams took the list and proceeded to improvise a medley that was truly creative. His great sense of humor." musically speaking, came to the fore as he used "On-Wisconsin" as the theme melody to tie the piece together.

There is no question in the world that the audience was happy as larks. A gentleman seated behind me commented, "Williams is tops and that orchestra is great. They never missed a beat."

Who could ask for anything more?



# Ballet Florida performs an evening of joyful dancing

Fort Myers Community Concerts opened its 1992 season Monday, Jan. 13, with a ballet performance. Ballet Florida, a relatively new professional company that evolved in 1986, laid its foundations as a student company of the School of Ballet Florida in 1973 under the artistic directorship of Marie Hale.

"Command Performance," choreographed by Lambros Lambrou with music by Dmitri Shostakovich, opened the program. This "neo-classical" ballet featured the full company in the most elegant burgundy and black costumes. Great technical demands were made by this ballet of both soloists and ensemble alike. Performed in three movements, the first movement

featured Manuel Ureta and Jessica Benton joined by six couples. The choreography was challenging to say the

least, because of its exacting foot work, precision turns and daring lifts. Nevertheless, the complications of this piece were

performed with style and great joie de vivre by both soloists and ensemble.

The legato second movement, a pas de deux presented Kacy O'Brien and Steven Hoff, who danced with such ease and confidence that it belied the requirements of strength this sustained, off-balance partnering takes to execute well. Their transitions from lift to lift flowed with the smoothness of silk.

The third and final movement brought back the full

company who blazed in full glory of dance pyrotechnics, which brought down the house, and gave them many curtain calls.

The two gold medal award-winning "Belong" pas de deux choreographed by Norbert Vesak was the second ballet of the evening. "Other Worldly" would best describe this particular piece, danced to perfection by the supple Nicole Kimball and the athletic Steven Hoff.

Two dancers bathed in a mosaic pool of blue light merge and dissolve through dance in liquid, seamless grace. Dazzling, effortless, incandescent are the merest adjectives one could shower on these astonishing dancers and their rendition of this demanding pas de deux.

"Percussion for Six Men" was the third presentation of the evening, and clearly was the piece de resistance. Choreographer Vincente Nebrada quite simply has contrived a ballet that pulls out all the stops.

Not only does this piece test each dancer's ability, but also his musicality to the nth degree. Percussive sounds by their very nature end each musical segment sharply, crisply and abruptly. The dancers must also end every complicated step, jump and turn with the same exactness -- both in solo and in unison. Believe me, that is a formidable task. Credit must be accorded these six Ballet Florida men, who might possibly be the best male dance ensemble I've seen since the heyday of the Joffrey Ballet.

The closing ballet was "Rhapsody in Blue," choreographed by William Soleau to Gershwin's familiar music. Program note: "A vivid reminiscence of the

dancing inspired by one of America's most popular composers."

My only carp in an otherwise incredible evening was the placement of this piece. Following the tour de force of "Percussion for Six Men" would be difficult at best. There was nothing amiss with the choreography or the execution of "Rhapsody in Blue," but my personal choice would be to open with this coolly sophisticated ballet and close with the stronger, showier "Command Performance."

This gifted, effervescent young Florida Ballet company won audience approval from first to last with their joy. confidence and skill. Their repertoire is new, daring, and best of all, enjoyable.

Much credit must go to Artistic Director Marie Hale and the school where these dancers are trained. Hale's dedication, determination and vision are quite unique. She best sums it up in her own words, quoted from a company brochure:

"I believe in the rights of dancers to be challenged and encouraged, the rights of choreographers to have their visions fulfilled with integrity and artistry, the rights of audiences to be stimulated and inspired, to feel elation, compassion, joy and laughter."

Brava, Marie Hale! You have succeeded on all counts. Include me as one of your company's ardent fans. Good luck on your first national tour, come back very soon so we can again share in celebrating the joy of dance.



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

When today's deal arose in a team match, both declarers expected to win four top cards in the side suits and six trump tricks.

The first South planned to get five normal tricks and a ruff in dummy. He therefore took the top spades and ruffed a spade. West threw a club.

South then cashed dummy's hearts. When East showed out (not surprisingly in view of East's bid), South lost three diamonds and a trump.

The other declarer won the first spade, led a club to the ace and ruffed a club before taking dummy's A-K of hearts. If trumps broke normally, South could cash the ace of spades, ruff a spade and return with the ace of diamonds to


draw the last missing trump. When trumps broke 4-1, South had a plan in reserve. He

ruffed another club with a low trump, cashed the side spades and could then ruff a spade in dummy and a club with the queen. Ten tricks!

Principle: When you can count your tricks in different ways, adopt the safest play.

Weekly Question You hold: 10 and 2 of spades; ace, king and jack of hearts; jack, 6 and 3 of diamonds; and ace, 10, 5, 4 and 3

of clubs. Dealer, at your right, opens one spade, you double, and your partner jumps three hearts. The opening bidder passes. What do you say?

#### Answer

Pass. Your double promised an opening bid and four-card support for the unbid major. Partner's jump response is only invitational. He has about 10 points and may have only four hearts. With greater strength, he'd jump to game or cue-bid two spades.







# **CROW** treating injured osprey

The staff at the Care and Rehabilitation of Wildlife last week amputated the right wing of an osprey that was shot at Fort Myers Beach.

The bird was allegedly shot by a beach resident as it sat on the sailboat behind his home. The nest of the bird is on that home and the resident allegedly refused last week to let officials examine the nest to see if it contained eggs.

Because ospreys are a species of special concern, charges are possible against the man who allegedly shot the bird.

The osprey will never be able to fly again and so will have to remain in captivity, either at CROW or some other facility.

# Abbott discusses dangerous mollusks at Bailey-Matthews Shell Museum fund raiser

Some slides and parts of a couple of video tapes helped illustrate the talk given by R. Tucker Abbott last Tuesday, Jan. 14, on behalf of the Bailey-Matthews Shell Museum.

A larger-than-expected crowd showed up at the Sanibel Community Center, resulting in shell museum volunteers, including Dr. Abbott, working to set up additional chairs.

The talk was a three-part arrangement with a dangerous mollusk slide show first, followed by videos of zebra mussels and ending with slides illustrating plans for the island shell museum. The museum is scheduled to be built later this year if the necessary exceptions and-or changes in city laws can be obtained to allow that construction.

Although billed as a dangerous mollusk talk, Abbott led off by telling people "you have a better chance of getting hit by lightning than being bit by a cone shell," attacked by a rogue octopus or paralyzed by a shellfish.

He showed a slide of a giant Indonesian clam but said there has never been verification of a death by one of those clams.

Only a few deaths have been caused by cone shells, according to Abbott. He also said local octopus can bite.

Abbott said some shellfish can be poisonous. He suggested, "Try it on your cat first and if it survives, you can eat it." If the shellfish is poisonous, it should do the cat in after about five minutes, according to the former malacologist for the Smithsonian Institution.

He showed slides of all sorts of snails, including one that caused a blood disease that resulted in over 100,000 deaths last year, primarily in Africa.

Abbott revealed that the ship worm which ruined the dikes of Holland and which sank the Golden Hind was not really a worm at all, but actually was a very skinny clam. The Golden Hind was Sir Francis Drake's ship.

The world-renowned malacologist also discussed and showed slides of clams filling irrigation canals in California.

# New tower, impact study funding, video equipment among refuge hopes

With more than a quarter of the year gone, no annual budget has yet made it down the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service chain of command to the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge.

However, the refuge has hopes of being able to do four programs under a 50-50 cost sharing program with local community groups, refuge manager Lou Hinds said Thursday, Jan. 16, at the monthly meeting of the refuge's conservation council, a citizen advisory group. These projects include: • Replacement of the observation tower on Wildlife Drive. The "Ding" Darling Society would provide the other half of the funds for that project. • Creating a video of the refuge. This \$14,000 project would be done by Lynne Reiger's son, who is a professional video producer and who would match the \$7,000 provided by the refuge with equipment and studio time. Within the next week or so, the refuge will hire a helicopter to photograph Tarpon Bay and to survey the refuge for exotic plants.


An environmental assessment study is to be done of the extension of refuge boundaries. The possible additions of Tarpon Bay, the Florida State Botanical Site and land at Wulfert are among the boundary extensions prompting the study. Hinds said that BTS, the developer of The Sanctuary at Wulfert, is expected to legally transfer its donated land to the refuge by the end of this month. The refuge is close to finishing its first draft of its Tarpon Bay management plan. However, the plan will not be released until after it has been reviewed at the regional U.S. Fish and Wildlife office in Atlanta. Hinds said the refuge had decided not to take brine water from Island Water Association because some naturally-occurring elements in that water, such as aluminum, copper and strontium, could tend to concentrate in refuge impoundments and become harmful to wildlife.

Abbott showed part of two video tapes on the zebra mussel. He stopped each tape after a few minutes, saying that was enough of that one. The first tape described how the mussels clog up electric power plants on the Great Lakes. The second was on how to protect your boat from the mussels.

Abbott pointed out that the zebra mollusks which first appeared in the Great Lakes in 1988 have now travelled half way down the Mississippi. He said they wipe out the food that baby fish eat so they are hurting fishing.

Finally, after parts of the two video tapes were shown and his short talk, Abbott said the zebra mollusks weren't a concern here because they could not live in salt water.

To close the program, Abbott described what the activities of the shell museum will be and showed slides illustrating future plans for the center.



# On the mend

This baid eagle was brought to Sanibel recently for treatment at the Care and Rehabilitation of Wildlife hospital. The eagle was found on Fort Myers Beach suffering from only a minor wing injury but mainourished and dehydrated. The big bird will be treated at CROW and eventually released back into the wild.

# **CROW** plans

• Purchase of video equipment, including player and projector, worth about \$5,000.

• A \$270,000, three-year wildlife impact study which would look into the entire ecosystem of the refuge and determine, among other things, the maximum wildlife carrying capacity of that ecosystem and the impact of people on the system. The matching funds for that study would come from the University of Florida, which would carry out the study.

Other items discussed at last Thursday's meeting included:

Hinds emphasized that the elements occur naturally and that the association currently pipes the water into the Gulf of Mexico, which would dilute it sufficiently.

Steve Mullins suggested that the ani be taken off the interpretive sign at the Bailey Tract because it has been about four years since anybody has seen an ani there. Hinds agreed.

Mullins also said controlled burns at the Bailey Tract had greatly changed the composition of the wildlife using it.

# Let's try a few seafood dishes

Let's have some seafood dishes. Shrimp, scallops and oysters are plentiful (not cheap), but you can stretch them. One pound of shrimp can serve 4; 16 oysters, the same number; and the following scallop recipe serves 2, but can easily be doubled.

The shrimp dish I learned from Executive Chef Bob Chapman at Chadwick's Restaurant.

Shrimp with Green Peppercorn Sauce pound medium shrimp, shelled and cleaned

- 1
- 1 1/2 tablespoons olive oil 1 1/2 tablespoons butter
- 1/4 cup bourbon or brandy
- 1/4 teaspoon garlic, minced
- 1 medium shallot, minced

2 tablespoons green peppercorns

- 1 cup heavy cream
- 1/2 cup sour cream
- Tuesday, Salt and pepper

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1/2 cup fresh dill, minced

Heat oil and butter in saute pan, add the shrimp and cook 2 to 3 minutes or until just firm. With a slotted spoon, remove the shrimp and place on a warm platter, set aside. Deglaze the pan with the bourbon, add the garlic, shallots, green peppercorns and cream. Cook over high heat until the liquid is reduced by half. Take the pan from the heat, whisk in the sour cream, add the salt and pepper. Place the shrimp back in pan and reheat, fold in the dill. Do not let it come to a boil. Serve over a bed of angel hair pasta.

Spinach and Oyster Soup 16 Oysters, shucked, reserve liquid 1 tablespoon olive oil 2 cups fresh spinach leaves, washed, drained and patted dry



## Salt and pepper

1/2 teaspoon garlic, minced

2 cups half and half

- 3 tablespoons butter, room temperature
- scallions, minced for garnish 2

2 tablespoons parsley, minced for garnish Strain oyster liquid through a fine sieve into a bowl, set aside. In a medium-sized pan, heat the oil. When hot but not smoking, add the oysters, salt and pepper and cook until the edges of the oysters start to "ruffle." With a slotted spoon, remove the oysters to a bowl and set aside. Add the spinach and garlic to the pan, stir and cook over medium heat about half a minute. Add the strained oyster liquid and cream, bring back to a boil, add the butter bit by bit and boil until the mix is reduced by about 1/4. Place the oysters back in the pan, simmer until heated through. Ladle this into warm soup cups and garnish with the scallions and parsley. This serves 4.

Scallions with Saffron Sauce

- 1/2 cup water
- 1/2 cup dry white wine
- 2 bay leaves 6 peppercorns

1/2 pound sea scallops, cut in half



Pinch of saffron

Dash of Tabasco

1 garlic clove, minced

1/4 cup potatoes, peeled, diced and cooked in boiling water until just tender, and drained 1/2 cup heavy cream

Salt

1 tablespoon fresh dill, minced for garnish In a medium-sized enamel pan, put the water, wine, bay leaves and peppercorns. Cook over high heat until the liquid is reduced by half. Strain this through a fine sieve and discard the solids. Put the liquid back in the pan, add the scallops and any liquid from them. Add the potatoes and cook over medium heat about 7 minutes. You do not want to overcook the scallops. Serve over pasta or white rice and garnish with the dill. This serves  $\hat{2}$ .



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# A 'No' vote will stop this 'storm' before it forms

Recently, the Fort Myers News-Press stated that "There's a storm brewing in Sanibel," referring to the possible turmoil to be caused by the proposed charter amendments to be voted on by the citizens of Sanibel on March 10. We Sanibel voters should see that the forecast storm turns into a healing spring breeze rather than a destructive hurricane by voting "No" to referendum questions #2 through #12.

These amendments are being proposed by a relatively small group of people, the Municipal Reform Committee. It is reported that they are unhappy with rising taxes and, as the chairperson, Mrs. Frederick Leas, says, because: "We don't feel we have 100 percent control over our elected officials. Voters should have 100 percent determination of public policies" (Islander, Jan. 14, 1992). Has anyone tried to arrive at difficult decisions in a committee of 20 or 50, much less over 4,000 voters? It would be total paralysis.

As one who has been concerned with the welfare of Sanibel and its citizens for the almost 15 years that I and my family have been permanent residents, I would advise all Sanibel citizens to reject these 11 proposed amendments as being counter productive to the well-being of our city.

Years spent at various times as a citizen representative on city committees, Planning Commission, City Council and as mayor have given me a close look into the workings of the city. Certainly, I have not always agreed with the decisions and actions taken by the council and the administration; however, my recourse has been and is to voice my concerns to our council members and to our city manager. If not satisfied, I should work to elect a different council who could in turn bring pressure to bear on the city manager or discharge him.

# Sanibel needs to consider mixed zoning

As I watch the big, steep roof going on the new row of stores on Palm Ridge Road, I wonder why Sanibel, like most every other city in America, doesn't take better advantage of land use.

On top of the stores there could easily be apartments for rent at a reasonable rate.

Instead the Planning Department seems to like to put up Below Market Rate Housing using more virgin land.

There are so many obvious plusses to zoning that permits apartments over business establishments: • The same land space is used round the clock.

• The parking spaces are used by customers during the day and by residents after hours. Then when the residents go off to work, the spaces are again mostly vacant for customers.

• Residents actually become a built-in source of security after hours for the business that would otherwise be deserted.

• Permitting people to live in the business area means they can walk to stores and often to work, cutting down on traffic and saving fuel.

If we mean to save our environment and still faccommodate people on fixed incomes and young workers whom we would like to have live here, we need to consider mixed zoning. There are few remaining business plots left.

government, the power to elect our neighbors to act for us and to influence them to act the way we think best. To have the legislative and fiscal operation of our city bound up by numerous referendums in an attempt at pure democracy would be crippling to all of our best interests. The answer to perceived problems with the city is not to make wholesale changes to a carefully crafted charter that, with only minor changes, has served us well since incorporation as a city in 1974.

Those proposed amendments that appear less constricting to the efficient management of the city bring no special benefit if they are enacted. We don't need to add another staff member to serve as city clerk when the city manager or his designee currently serves that mostly clerical function well (Referendum question #7). Nor is it useful to prohibit the council from delegating to the city manager the power to execute contracts, deeds and other documents (Referendum question #5), a perfunctory administrative service.

Portions of Referendum questions #11 and #12 are actually against Florida law according to attorneys and could involve Sanibel in costly litigation.

The proposals in question #6 could destroy the productive relationships within the staff and between the legislative and administrative departments by encouraging what is a long-standing problem in Lee County government. It would allow a single council member to investigate staff activities and performance with a possible debilitating effect on employees.

Matters dealing with special assessments, levying taxes, setting the budget and employee salaries would be required to go to referendum if proposals in questions #2, #11 and #12 were adopted. Efficient government would be severely hampered and unnecessary costs incurred by numerous referendum elections.

Although I assume that the members of the Municipal Reform Committee are sincere in their concerns about putting more control in the hands of the people, these amendments are not the way to do it. Even when the proposed amendment (question #4) could conceivably accomplish more accountability by limiting council terms to two years, question #4 also includes a two-term limit which would eliminate continuity and experience on the council. As with many of the referendum questions, too many issues are combined to allow a positive response on one particular issue which might have merit.

Thus, do not cripple our city by changing our charter irresponsibly. Examine each one of the proposed amendments for yourself. Copies of the referendum questions and informative brochures are available throughout the city. Check the newspapers, the Sanibel Annual Report/Calendar, the Municipal Reform Committee, the Charter Revision Committee and the Sanibel Charter Defense League.

Then, I trust that you will join me and the Charter Revision Committee and the Charter Defense League, and many others in voting "No" to referendum questions #2 through #12 on March 10.

radio and television stations" but fail to identify the stations. I suggest you determine the exact stations that will broadcast the alerts. The last time I decided to evacuate (in New Jersey) because of a hurricane, the local television was on automatic control, broadcasting yesterday's weather forecast -- "possible showers." The radio stations were playing music.

Your warning flags system indicates various colored flats can be raised at several locations. Probably a good idea, but please identify the locations, and I suggest posting a color code sign at the base of the flag pole.

The key to a successful evacuation is a good flood warning system. Sanibel citizens need to know exactly how and where reliable information and warnings can be obtained so as to make the evacuation decision.

# Public Works attempting to find better ways to clean up island litter

#### To the Editor The Islander

The recent picture showing Public Works employees "spearing" roadside litter from a city truck was taken before December 1991, prior to discontinuing this practice at the direction of the city manager. Our goal is to provide the best service using the most economical method, and utilizing a vehicle for litter pick up is the most economical. However, the "spearing" was perceived as improper and has been discontinued. The current procedure is for two employees to pick up trash at the 16 beach accesses from the Lighthouse to Blind Pass each Monday, Wednesday and Friday morning, including parking lots, beach areas and foot paths. This is normally completed in four to eight hours, depending upon the time of the year. On Tuesday and the first half of Thursday, the same employees remove litter from the 63.1 miles of city roadsides. The practice of driving for roadside litter pick up still continues; however, the passenger now exits the vehicle to pick up the litter. This driving procedure was put into effect a year ago, and replaced walking the entire length of the roadsides. There was no change in personnel or equipment used, with both methods utilizing two men and one pickup truck. Two employees using a vehicle can cover the same area faster and safer than a single employee. We found the previous walking procedure covered approximately 1/2 to one mile in an hour. With the scattered condition of litter, this causes a lot of unproductive time walking between litter. By driving

rather than walking, the same distance is covered at three to five miles an hour, providing a more productive effort by the same crew. As an example, Sanibel-Captiva Road is seven miles long, with 14 miles (both sides) of roadside to clean. When walking, it takes two employees 10 to 14 hours, while when driving the time is cut to three to five hours. With this saving, our normal 63 miles of road can be covered in 13 to 21 hours as opposed to the 63 to 126 hours it previously took walking. During tourist season it is necessary to supplement this time in order to keep our streets reasonably clean.

Consideration has been given to the purchase of a vehicle similar to a golf cart where one employee could drive and more efficiently pick up litter. This idea was dismissed since the state does not allow these vehicles on the road, and the city must adhere to the same regulations for our operation. There is a piece of equipment that will meet all requirements for efficient, safe litter pick up that was considered for purchase during our last budget session. This item was not approved because we could not demonstrate that it would reduce labor expense, and could only be justified by an unnecessary increase in more frequent litter pick ups.

The city is proud of the work the Public Works Department performs, and will continue to explore new ways to give good service at the most economical means. Thus, any comments or helpful suggestions are always appreciated.

# Arbor Day brings back fond memories of trees back home

Arbor Day! It brings back a flood of memories of another place, South Louisiana; another time, the late '20s; and people with a genuine love for trees.

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The trees were revered by people. They wrote stories about them, produced plays about them, even wrote poems to salute them.

We were taken as children to see the trees, some famous and great trees, to honor them and even gain strength from their great strengths.

My earliest recollection about a tree was when I was about 4 years old. It was about a live oak tree that filled the corner of our yard, extended over the top of the roof on the south side of our two-storied house.

It was an old tree! Some declared that it probably dated before the Civil War. It was a huge tree, some 50 feet or more across and considerably higher. Her branches laid across the ground, inviting all who cared to climb her welcoming arms.

Little Moses, the other hired hands' children and I roamed around in her huge branches most everyday. Little Moses always climbed to the highest place in the top of the tree. My courage would only take me up 20 feet or so.

The old oak tree over the years became one of my best friends. In spring, she put on a new set of bright green leaves. During the summer, she provided the coolest spot on the farm. By fall, she covered the ground with her golden leaves, providing happy days for us children to play in the mounds of her leaves.

Many of the birds considered the old oak tree their special haven.

She even enjoyed the tire swing my father hung from one of her heavy branches. We would scream with delight as we swung back and forth, trying to touch the sky.

She was always there to provide a place to cuddle in her lofty branches -- a special place to tell the utmost secrets and to share the deepest sorrows.

The first time I had ever seen it snow in Louisiana was the year I was in the sixth grade. Our teacher, looking out the classroom window, cried out, "It's snowflakes!" We all rushed out into the schoolyard to catch the flakes, to feel them, to taste them, to try to keep them forever.

I ran the half mile down the country lane after leaving the school bus that day to see how the old oak tree liked the newly fallen snow.

There, in her lofty branches, she had collected little drifts of snow for me to hold. Her leaves glistened like jewels with the snowflakes melting away.

You could just see she loved the snowfall by the way she bowed and swayed in the evening winds with her caressing sounds and sighs.

I have known and loved many other trees, like the



mulberry tree, all laden with purple plump fruit; or the pines, that stood so straight and proud; to the cypress, that made the light brighten up even the darkest shadows.

Some day, I sure hope you will come back and allow me to share with you, the romance I've had with other trees. But it was the old oak tree that captured my heart and my soul. I believed that she was as deeply involved with me as I was with her.

I gathered her acorns and planted them wherever I went. By sowing her seeds, I could somehow see that she would never really die.

She was my refuge until the day I left home to go away to college ... to learn more about trees.

Yes, trees were so very special to the people of Louisiana. It was said in times of great floods and storms it was the trees that saved the people. The people, in return, game them a special place in their hearts.

A Few of Faye's Tips ... One of the best trees for Sanibel, I believe, is the black sapota. It is not only a beautiful shade tree but also a special fruit tree. The fruit, when ripe, looks and tastes






