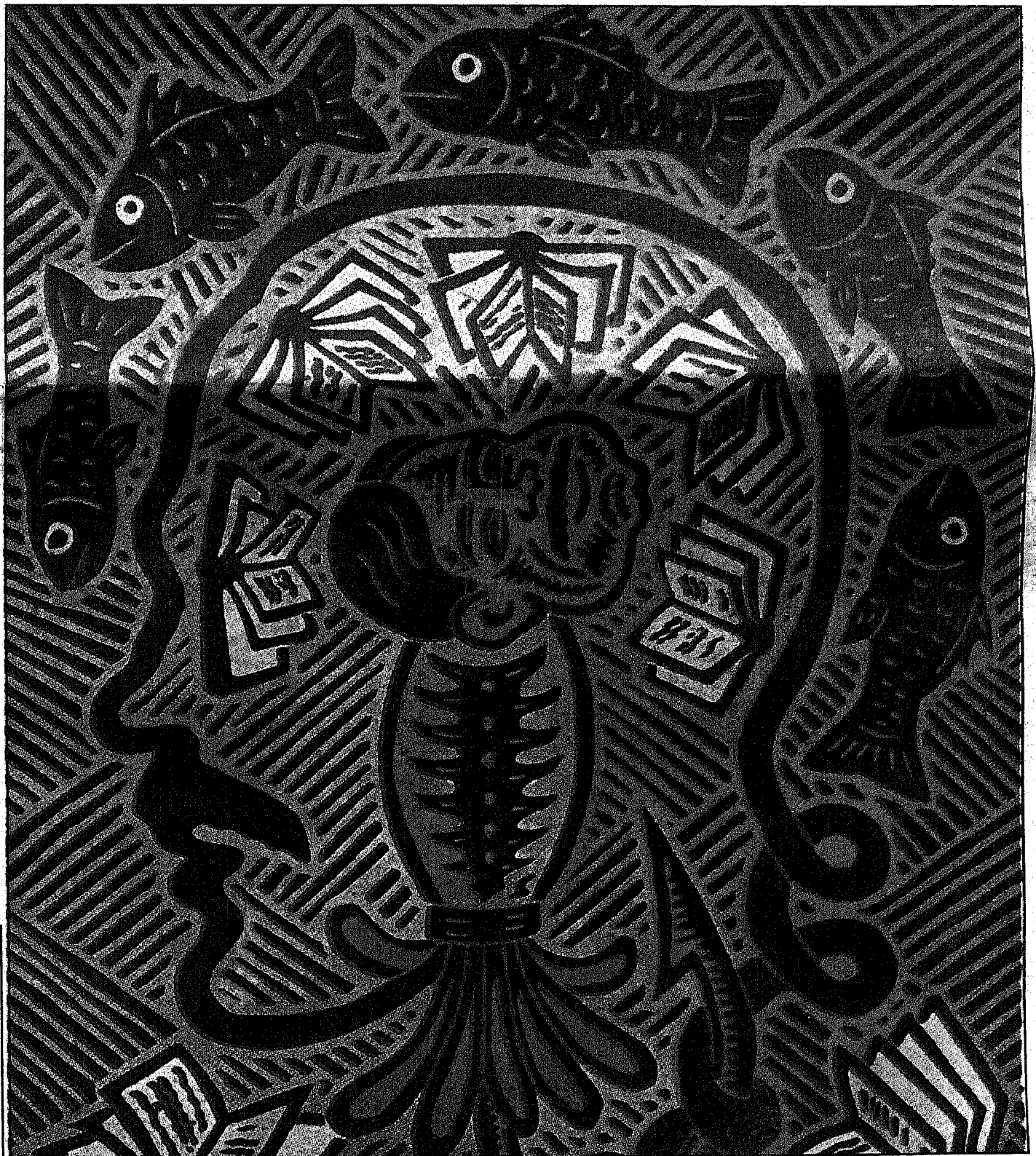

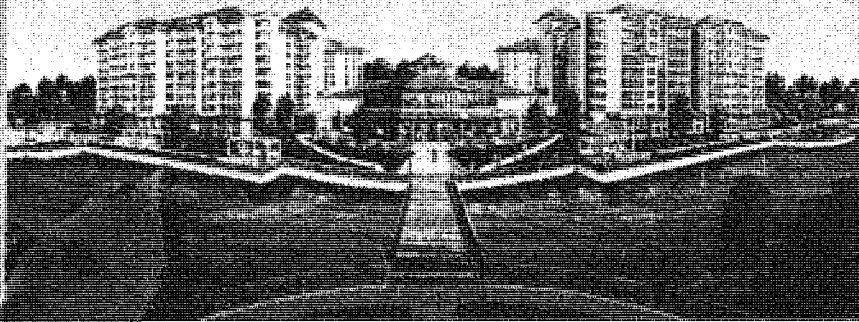

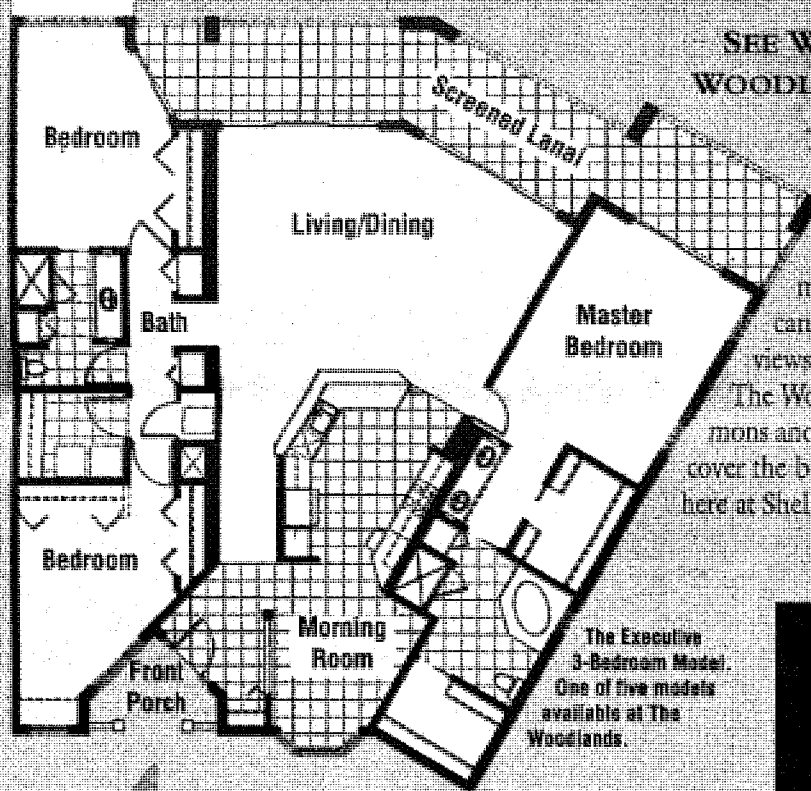

Islanders sound off about Causeway

County consultants came in blue suits, islanders came in shorts and T-shirts and the media came in force Tuesday to the first of a series of issue analysis meetings on plans to replace the Sanibel Causeway.

The meeting was originally scheduled as a regular Sanibel Planning Commission meeting to which county officials had been invited. Lee County, however, seemed keen to get the public involved to avoid repeating the fiasco of ten years ago when islanders held a referendum which brought plans for a new high span bridge to an abrupt halt.

So, at Tuesday's meeting, the county had private consultant Kris Cella, hired to handle the "public out-

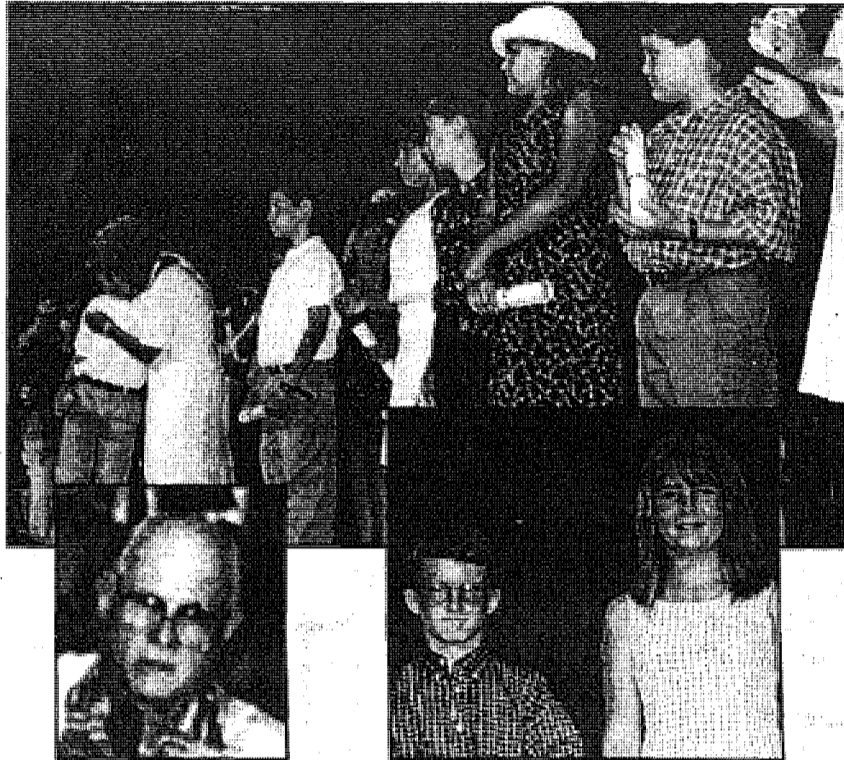
reach" phase of the new bridge, lead the discussion. Cella's firm, Cella, DeBerry & Associates Inc. is an engineering, permitting and consulting company. The county also advertised heavily and switched the meeting to Schein Hall in the BIG Arts complex to accommodate a large crowd.

There was no shortage of issues. One of them was scepticism about the process itself. Many in the audience were concerned that the issues they raised would not really be instrumental in designing the bridge.

"What is the role of the people of Sanibel?" asked resident Charles Cox. "Role — as opposed to input? Whatever the procedure is, there needs to be a clear role

Council to decide what to do with all the !@*#*+@!

The bridge may be the controversial issue of the moment, but another issue which may be equally important to the future of Sanibel is under discussion at City Hall Tuesday.

The issue is sewage and how to treat it — and it's not an issue most people care to talk, or even think, about.

But even in paradise such matters have to be dealt with and on Tuesday afternoon city council members will be immersed in options for treating Sanibel's wastewater, (the sanitary sounding term for sewage)

At issue is whether to treat it, truck it, pipe it, inject it, let it percolate or pump it into the ocean.

"It" is both the raw sewage and the clarified water remaining after the sewage has been treated.

Currently, sewage from households hooked up to the Sanibel Sewer System is gravity fed into the sewer lines and pumped to the treatment plant on Donax. There, it goes through a clarification and chlorination treatment which leaves the sludge at the bottom and clear water at the top. The sludge is trucked off the island and the remaining water is then pumped to irrigate golf courses at The Dunes or Beachview.

The problem at present is that the city has excess effluent, or too much remaining water, and is facing fines by the Department of Environmental Protection of up to \$10,000 a day unless the problem is solved.

The alternatives to solving the problems to be outlined at Tuesday's council meeting include:

- Using the current treatment plants at Donax and Wulfert;

- Dismantling the Wulfert plant and expanding Donax; or
- Not treating sewage at all on the island

The latter alternative would pump raw waste off the island to the Fort Myers Beach wastewater treatment deep well injection site.

Assuming that wastewater is treated on the island, there remains the problem of what to do with the remaining water, and under discussion at Tuesday's council meeting will be a myriad of alternatives including:

- injecting it into shallow wells or deep underground aquifers at Donax or on the Island Water Association site;
- creating artificial wetlands; and
- pumping it 3,000 feet out into the Gulf of Mexico

Any alternative will be expensive. The city has already committed \$8 million to the sewer system and any

Flurry of white butterflies invades Islands

Recently, anyone traveling the highways and byways on both the islands and the mainland could not help but notice a great quantity of white butterflies flitting about. They seemed to be congregating by the roads and many, unfortunately, did not look both ways before crossing and suffered an untimely death by windshield.

According to Dee Searge, the butterfly expert at the SCCF, the presence of these white butterflies — called great southern whites — in such numbers by the roadside was, indeed, an anomaly. To what can it be attributed? Just try to guess...

Would you believe El Niño? (What else?)

Dee explained that the warm, wet winter we have experienced in Southern Florida, courtesy of El Niño, caused a proliferation of host plants for the great southern whites. The plants these butterflies prefer to lay their eggs on, saltwort or *batis maritima*, grow by the ocean along with mangroves. Southern whites will also lay eggs

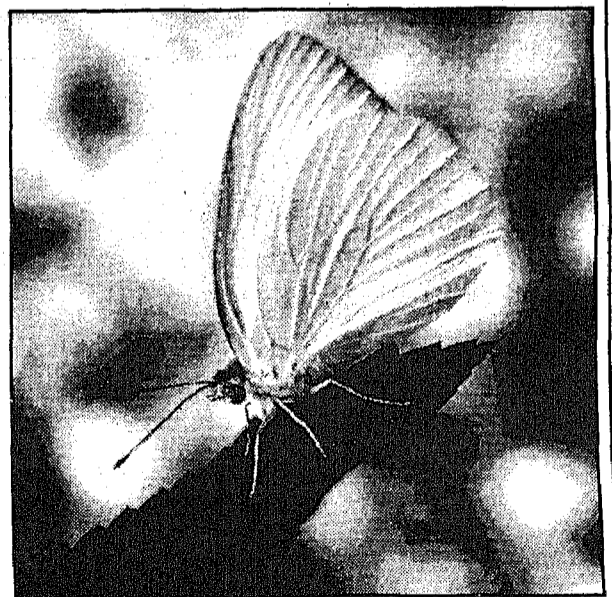

of the alternatives will be additional expense. The injected well with IWA, for example, will cost \$1.2 million.

Discussion on the wastewater treatment alternatives begins at City Hall at 1:30 p.m. on Tuesday, June 15.

on some weed-like plants which grow along the roadsides and in open fields. That is what they were doing in such numbers along San-Cap Road. These alternative larval hosts have dried up now and gone to seed, and most of the butterflies seem to be gone now, too.

"There was a real abundance of great southern whites around, that's for sure," said Dee. "Butterflies are very specific about what they will lay their eggs on. Caterpillars are very specific about what they will feed on." The whites came out of the mangrove fringe, crossed the road and found what they were looking for — pepper grass and members of the mustard family.

It's anyone's guess why so many great southern whites ended up on Sanibel during the annual Butterfly Count taken Mother's Day weekend. Some 3,000 were documented by Dee and others on SCCF and Federal properties and in private gardens around the island. Only 50 or so have been spotted in each of the previous five years the count has taken place on Sanibel.

Great southern whites (*Ascia monuste*) are members of the *Pieridae* family which has over 1,000 documented species — most are predominantly white, yellow or orange in color. It is believed that the word butterfly originated from a member of this family, the bright yellow Brimstone that was known to early British naturalists as the "butter-colored fly."

The great southern whites, found only in the new world, are common across southern Florida, especially along the coast. They are well-known for sporadic migratory movements, sometimes in large numbers, but what triggers their migration is something of a mystery. They normally don't stray far from coastal areas, but have been known to fly out over the ocean where they die for lack of a landing spot. Their flights, which take place throughout the year, most often in the daytime on sunny days, are purposeful and direct.

"The great southern white is a migratory butterfly," said Dee, "But not in the sense of a monarch, which travels many, many miles across oceans. It is thought that it migrates because of overpopulation, in search of enough food to support the next generation."

Normally, adults live anywhere from 2 weeks to a month, so those counted on Mother's Day would have died off by now. But, because each adult female can lay up to 300 eggs, simple multiplication leads one to conclude that there should be tons of these creatures flying around still.

According to Dee, the population might be in a lull. Perhaps a good number have migrated north where it is not so crowded. Perhaps the butterflies are experiencing sexual diapause — a state during which the life expectancy of adults is extended but egg-laying ceases until conditions are right.

"A butterfly's life-cycle is so complicated. The more I learn, the more I discover the less I know. I just read that the eggs of great southern whites are salt tolerant, which makes sense since their favorite host plant is only so high [about 24 inches tall] and grows where a high tide could engulf it. Butterflies take cues from the environment. It's mind-boggling how they know what they seem to know."

Dee says that some have surely gone back to the mangroves, for there is always a population there, although it is less visible.

"This was a first for me — an emergence like this," said Dee. "Often you don't see any of one kind of butterfly one day and then they seem to be all over, but never like this year with the great southern whites. Not since I've been observing — which is not all that long, in the scheme of things — not in 6 or 7 years."

The books in the library say it is not so unusual for great southern whites to be observed in outbreak numbers and then see the population return to normal. This just hasn't happened here, at least for awhile, for "Butterfly Dee" would surely have heard about it.

Dee not only oversees anything to do with butterflies at SCCF, like the butterfly count and the Butterfly House (which, incidentally, deserves a visit), she is also in charge of the Landscaping for Wildlife Program. She can tell you what to do (and what not to do) to encourage the well-being of native wildlife — butterflies included. As Dee says, "What could be more fun than to create a garden butterflies will enjoy and then sit back and observe them enjoying?"

Dee is off this week to attend the annual meeting of the North American Butterfly Association (NABA) in Denver, Colorado. It is the NABA which conducts the annual butterfly count, although in less tropical parts of the continent the count is done on the Fourth of July. She'll be back at SCCF soon and would love to help you start Landscaping for Wildlife.

Sanibel Causeway's 35th Anniversary *Part II*

The Bridge: The great money-making machine

When the Sanibel Causeway was opened 35 years ago, it was expected to be a money-making machine.

Financed by an issue of \$3.9 million, Lee County Bridge and Causeway Revenue Bonds, it was touted by Lee County commissioners as "self building and self supporting" and expected to be able to retire the bonds within 20 years. (The causeway to little-known Boca Grande opened in 1959 and was making four times as much as expected. Commissioners estimated that the bridge to popular Sanibel Island would be even more profitable.)

The actual revenue they obtained eventually exceeded even their most optimistic aspirations. The Sanibel Causeway has brought in gross revenues of more than \$91 million since it was built — nine times the projections in the 1959 study. Minus some \$17 million in operating expenses and \$5.6 million in repairs, the net revenue over 35 years is approximately \$68.7 million.

Last year alone, the Sanibel Causeway generated \$6,022,003. Some \$1.28 million of that went in operating expenses and another \$1.33 million in repairs, leaving a net revenue of nearly \$3.5 million.

Lee County does not retain all the profits. Sanibel gets 21 percent of the net revenue (which last year amounted to \$730,000) and Captiva gets four percent.

The Sanibel Causeway has always made a profit, but at first, the number of vehicles crossing the new causeway was under the number projected by the initial 1959 study. By 1973, however, it was meeting expectations and six years later, in 1979, the number was 62 percent over estimations.

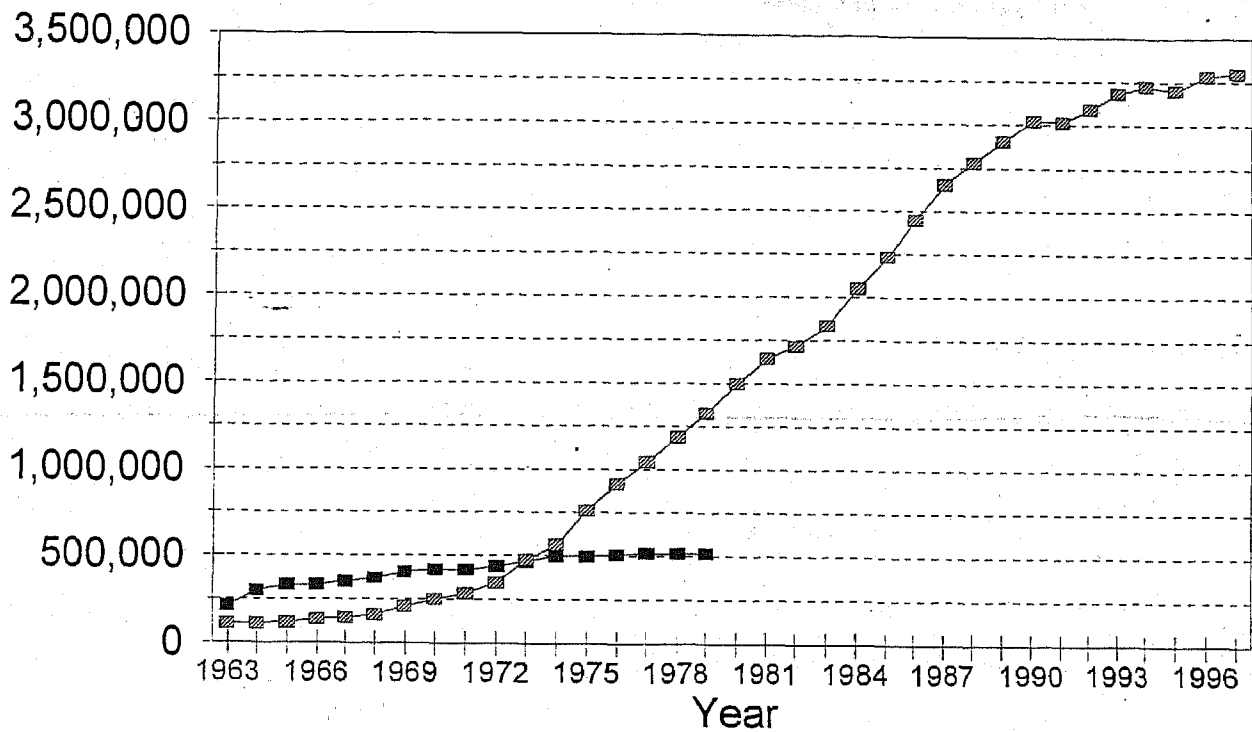
As the popularity of the island grew, so did toll revenues. Last year, nearly 3.3 million vehicles used the bridge to Sanibel; 30 times the number that crossed in 1963. The \$3 toll remains the same.

The initial bond was paid off and although there has been talk of the toll changing, it never has. Instead the surplus has been used for the creation of other facilities within the county. As early as 1967, a proposal to decrease the tolls was opposed by Sanibel residents. When the bonds expired in 1974, a county-appointed committee proposed removing the toll on weekends. It was residents of Sanibel who begged them not to, fearing that the island would be overrun by day-trippers. County commissioners acceded, deciding instead to float bonds on the causeway to pay for a massive county road program.

The bond issue came up again in 1985 when Lee County proposed introducing a new county wide toll authority which would allow causeway funds to be used to fund bridges throughout the county. (Tolls on the bridge could only be retained as long as they are used to pay off bonds that built or improved the bridge, then County Commissioner Porter Goss said).

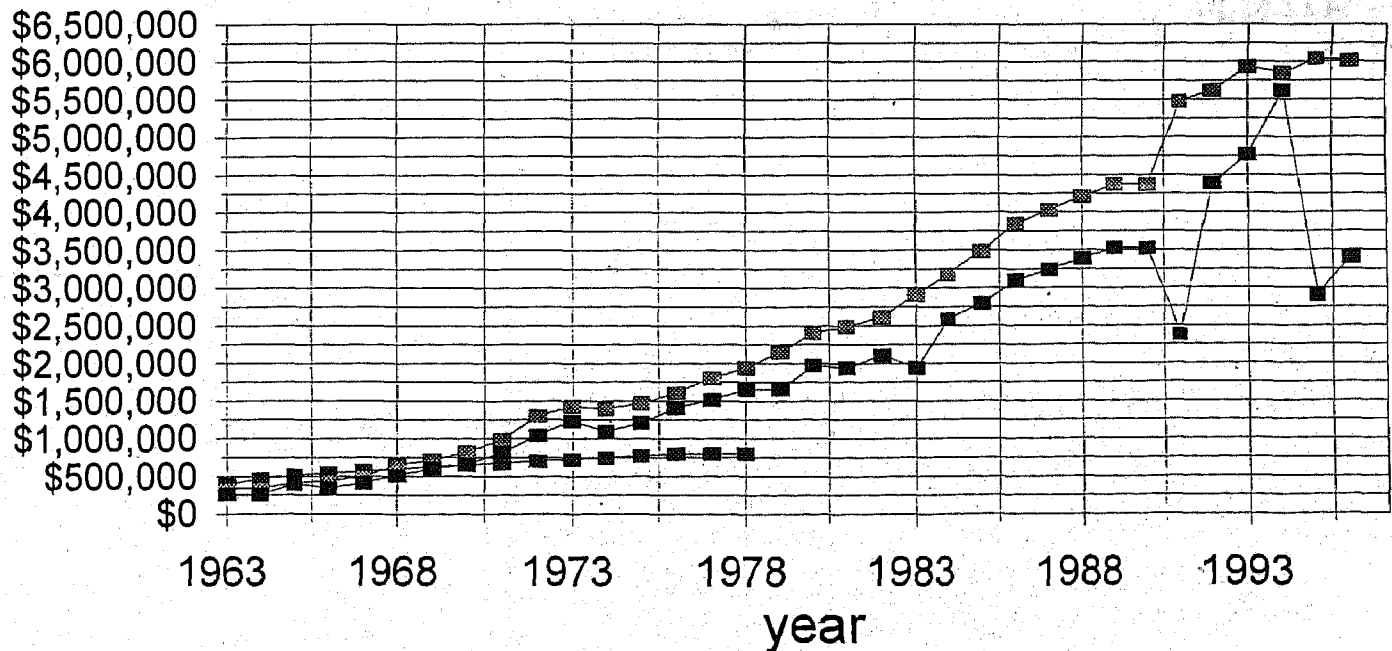
In 1987, a \$75 million bond created the Transportation Facility Enterprise Fund which combines toll revenues from the Sanibel Causeway, the Cape Coral Parallel span and the Midpoint Memorial bridges.

OBITUARY

Jean B. Campbell

Jean B. Campbell, 80, a 25-year resident of Sanibel, died on Friday, June 5, at her home. Born in Decatur, Ill., Campbell graduated from DePauw University in Indiana in 1939. Always an adventurer, she traveled through Europe by bicycle in 1940. After studying aviation radio and the theory of flight at Emory Riddle School in Miami and learning Portuguese, she taught in São Paulo at the Brazilian Air Force Academy (BAC). Brazil was an allied nation and many of Jean's students participated in the invasion of Italy and were shot down. Jean grieved for them the rest of her life.

In 1946 she married George R. Campbell, who was also teaching at BAC and they moved to Hatchet Bay Plantation on Eleuthera, where George was assistant manager of what was, at the time, the fourth largest chicken farm on earth. Their son David was born there, attended by the only local doctor, a veterinarian.

The family moved to Grosse Pointe, Michigan in 1954, where Jean became a specialist in painting Russian icons on driftwood and developed a passion for photography, particularly portraiture. Her

avocation took her all over the world and continued after the family's move to Sanibel in 1973. She developed a 30-year chronicle of the lives, from infancy through adulthood, of her friends and their children in Glenfinnan, Scotland. She had planned to go again this summer.

"There are photos from every year of some of these people's lives," David said. "Some bloomed, some failed, you can read it all in their faces — a detailed record of two generations of a tiny village in an isolated part of Scotland. She sent the people their pictures every year, and last year the local (and only) school mounted an exhibition of all of them.

Jean was active in the Sanibel Island Writers Group and was preparing her autobiography — the tales of her adventures — which her family plans to publish posthumously.

Campbell is survived by her son, David, of Grinnell, Iowa, and his wife, Karen Lowell; her grand-daughter, Tatiana Lowell-Campbell; and by her estranged husband. A memorial fund is being established to supply books to the primary school in Glenfinnan. Contributions should be sent to Mary Scott, Teacher—Achaphubuil Primary School, Achaphubuil (near Ft. William, Highland Region), Scotland. A celebration of Jean's life will be held on Sanibel this autumn for all of her friends.

more than just an opportunity to give an opinion."

"Receiving our comments is different from utilizing them in the process," added resident Cheryll Corbin. "In the past this has been overlooked. We don't want it to be discounted this time."

"We voters took a stand ten years ago," said Jay Halcrow, coordinator of the now defunct Save Our Bridge group which organized the referendum on the issue. "I want to remind you there's an ordinance in place. It's not something you can go over with a slick presentation."

Cella said that although the final decision would be made by Lee County, when she took the project on she was assured that people on the islands would be listened to.

"I agreed to take this project because I was assured by Lee County that this was not just to placate the islanders but that everyone would be listened to," she commented.

Another major concern was that the "do-nothing" option — leaving the Sanibel Causeway as it is — would be kept in consideration by the county.

"Is it possible to get an objective evaluation of the no-build alternative?" asked resident Bill O'Neill, who said he had 35 years experience of cost justifications for this type of project. "You get consultants and engineers and contractors involved and there is a very strong financial bias toward building a large high rise bridge. Can we have an objective analysis of the no build alternative?"

Cella said that Lee County's policy of using separate engineers in the planning and construction alleviated some of the tendency to drive up the cost.

The prevailing sentiment in Schein Hall on Tuesday seemed to be a desire to keep the bridge as it is. If it needs to be replaced, they said, they wanted the "like/kind" alternative — a replica of what is now.

Most opposition was to a high span bridge. Part of that opposition seemed to stem from a feeling that Sanibel was being exploited by the county.

"I'm wondering if there aren't commercial and developmental interests that are for this high rise bridge," commented resident John Dillon.

"I came to the islands from San Francisco where there's a deep water shipping channel with barges more than a city block long," added Leslie Cook. "I'd like to address the timeliness of this in relation to the Buque bus and the transportation of natural gas containers."

Cella said that the Buque bus, which travels between Fort Myers and Key West, was limited by what is upstream and that the plans for natural gas and oil transportation was to pump through pipes underground after 2002.

The chief reason for wanting to retain or rebuild the bridge as it is, however, seemed to be aesthetics.

"Whatever the final project is, it should be at least equal to the present bridge in terms of aesthetics and recreation facilities," suggested Mike Gillespie.

A large number of residents commented on the beauty of the present causeway and on the recreational possibilities on the spoil islands. Resident Jon Lillequist suggested retaining the spoil islands and raising and hardening the road in those areas.

Only J.N. Ding Darling Director Lou Hinds and Sanibel Captiva Conservation Foundation Director Erick Lindblad advocated removing the spoil islands in order to restore the flow. Lindblad pointed out that his environmental concerns extended into the Caloosahatchee.

The least important issue to Tuesday's crowd, it seemed, was hurricane evacuation. Retired Cape Coral engineer Robert Godman was greeted with groans when he said that building a high span bridge was urgently needed because the spoil islands would wash away in a hurricane.

On the other hand, they seemed to like resident and Realtor Jack Samler's suggestion that the county consider selling the causeway to Sanibel at a reduced price since it's so dilapidated.

Other suggested issues from the audience included, among others:

- control of number of people who come to the island;
- looking into new techniques for repair and construction;
- preservation of wildlife habitats;
- not widening channel under drawspan;
- off-island parking with transportation to the island;
- two laning the bridge going off the island;
- fishing platforms;
- study on whether drawbridges affect crime statistics;
- suggested uses for old bridge; and
- limiting opening of the drawbridge.

Suggestions that future meetings be held in the evenings or on weekends so that more people could attend will be considered. Cella was opposed to suggestions to delay all the meetings until environmental and other studies are completed and winter residents return.

The next meeting will take place on July 14. The additional meeting scheduled for August 11 may, however, be delayed.

If the bridge is built, the earliest it could be completed is 2006. Cella pointed out that the Midpoint Bridge was 20 years in planning and execution, including several prolonged legal actions.

"We're not in a hurry," she said. "We're keeping an open mind to the process."

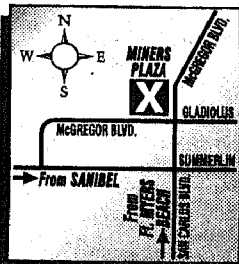

SPD has just received a brand new Honda 4-TRAX Recon — beige with green SPD markings — to replace the old one, whose transmission eventually gave up the ghost. The new one has head lights, tail lights, black "luggage" racks front and back, and a top speed of 35 mph.

But don't expect to see officers or police aides bucking along at top speeds like that on a regular basis. "This is basically for beach patrols," Cdr. John Terry explained, "with more emphasis on conservation enforcement than we've had before. We'll use it some for alligator complaints, but mainly to respond to calls about unleashed dogs on the beach, shelling violations and so on — misdemeanors that an officer actually has to witness to do anything about. We'll be doing more fishing license checks and be more alert to legal species, sizes and the like. We've always done this kind of enforcement, but it hasn't been a real high priority before. This will be more of a 'program' and the officers who'll be out there will have special training in what to look for."

Mark Steele, Anthony Thompson and Jane Cechman will be the primary officers on the daily patrols and will be pro-actively pushing awareness and education in order to gain enforcement. "We also will respond at night," added Sgt. Jamie Phillips who, along with Sgt. Mike Cooper, is overseeing the new effort.

"We hope that the more educating we can do, the fewer the numbers of violations there will be," Thompson said.

**Shades of Green —
community landscaping**

It becomes increasingly apparent that not only are the City's vegetation standards neither understood nor communicated effectively, but that the rationale behind them must not have been appropriately explained or demonstrated. To that end, an *ad hoc* committee is proposing to initiate a yearly, interactive event that would better inform and encourage landscapers, property managers, realtors and residents of the need to maintain a "sustainable Sanibel." The operative word here is "interactive" — the committee feels that only the sharing and exchange of information can build a full understanding of what is at stake.

A sustainable Sanibel can be defined as a diverse community where human needs are met in ways that do not threaten the health of the natural environment. Sustainability depends on each one of us accepting the responsible role of stewardship, of living in harmony with the island's wildlife and natural habitats. One can also protect and enhance one's financial investment by safeguarding the integrity of one's own habitat along with other island habitats. We think this goes a long way toward answering "What's in it for me?" and/or "Why should I care?"

Sustainable Sanibel includes the concept that an island home is more than just a zip code. Our community of homes and our community landscape reflect a philosophy,

Time to say 'enough is enough!'

With the present focus on the possible expansion of the Sanibel School to eighth grade, Island voters need to take due care not to lose sight of the proverbial 'big picture.'

The Sanibel School expansion effort is a result of only the latest School Board fiasco, known by the misnomer 'School Choice.' While the majority of the School Board promised over 95% of students would receive their first choice middle school preference, only 67% of Island students did, leading to school assignments in Bonita Springs and Dunbar, over 40 miles from Island homes. Aside from the adverse impact on the lives of children and their families, the School Choice program dictates that even if one Captiva student was assigned to Bonita Springs, school bus transportation must be provided for that single student — hardly a wise use of taxpayer dollars in a district where students still sit on the floor and share textbooks, and teachers receive salary adjustments well be-

low the increase in the cost of living. Sanibel currently sends over \$21 million (yes, million!) annually to the School Board in school taxes, not including the contribution from Captiva. Yet the three male members who consistently vote as a majority on this same School Board, including Bill Gross and Doug Santini who are running for reelection this year, refuse to send a school bus onto Sanibel to pick up students even at one central location for transport to the International Baccalaureate program at Ft. Myers High School — a highly respected college preparatory program for which the Board also receives an additional appropriation for every student involved.

Ft. Myers High School students from Sanibel and Captiva must find their way to the toll booth at 6:30 a.m. for school bus pick-up, and are dropped off- island at the toll booth every afternoon, despite the danger to students and the potential liability to the School District. Walking or biking safely home across the causeway is not an option, so Island parents must somehow adjust their work schedules and fight seasonal traffic to get to the toll booth to pick up their children. While these students wait at the toll booth for pickup every morning and afternoon, the Cypress High School buses pass by them only partially filled, on their way on and off the island. These are only samples of a lengthy list of continuing illogical, costly and, at

times, dangerous decisions being made by incumbents Gross and Santini. All voters need to have long memories and support the three women School Board candidates at the coming September primary election — Katherine Boren (the only incumbent who has consistently fought the male majority to no avail), Terry Wampler, and Barbara Wallace.

It is widely known that the next School Board members will likely be elected at the September primary because almost all candidates are Republican. Every vote will be absolutely critical this September.

Voters who need to register, to request an absentee ballot, or to switch party affiliation to Republican in order to vote for Katherine Boren, Terry Wampler, and Barbara Wallace must contact the Supervisor of Elections at 339-6300 before August 1st.

The future of all children in this school district, including those from Sanibel and Captiva, depends on each of us

joining together to say "enough is enough!" at the ballot box this fall.

Removing islands is 'bad science'

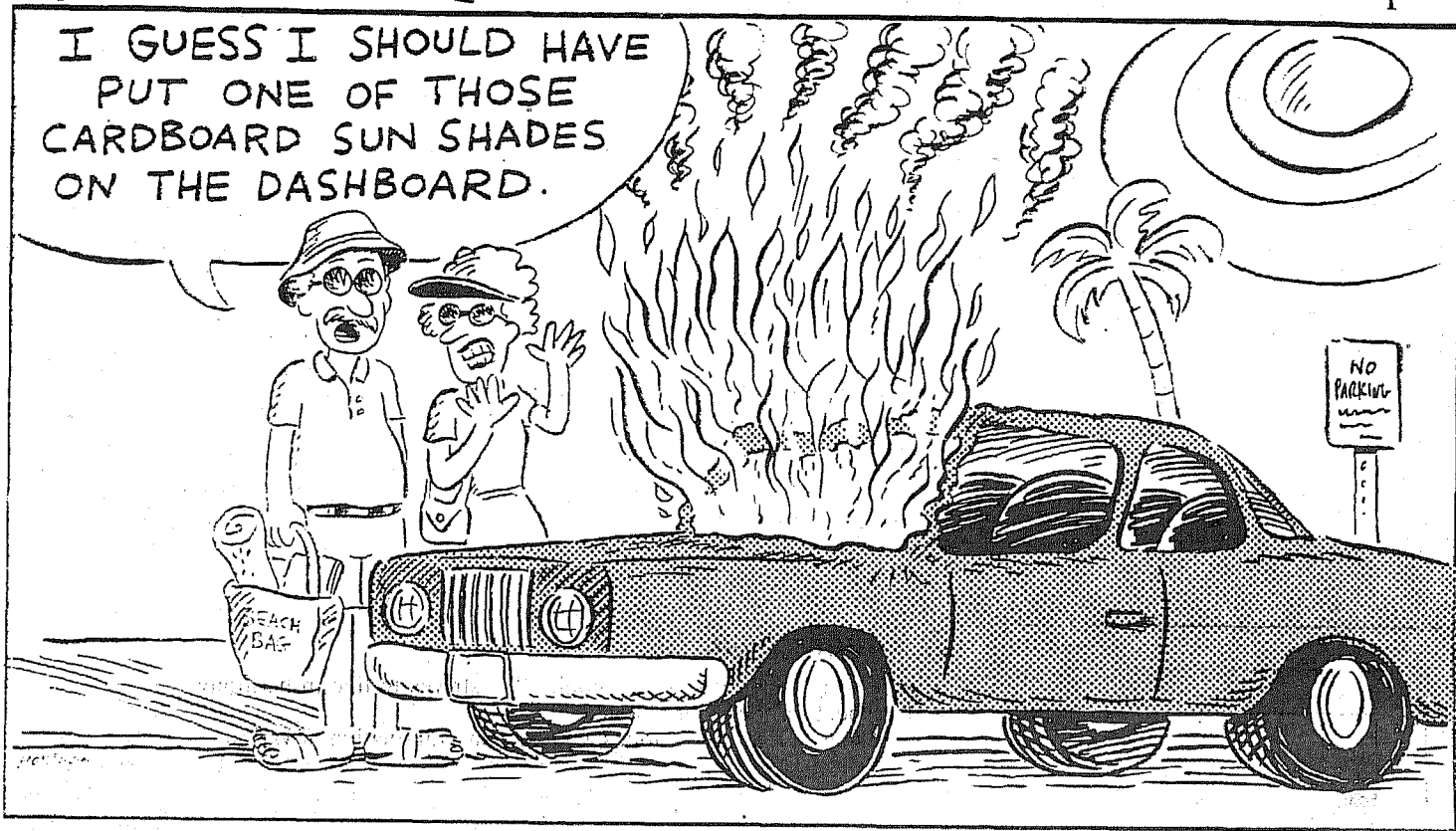

Caloosahatchee transforms from a river to a canal or drainage ditch. The bottom is flat and featureless. Most of the banks are spoil piles, 40-feet high. This waterway no longer performs as a river, with wetlands that slow and filter runoff. Instead, agricultural chemicals and silt are shot straight down the ditch into the bay in high volume and at high speed. Then there is the effect of the Lake. The 30-foot barrier formed by the rim canal prevents the natural sheet flow of water into the Everglades. Unnaturally large amounts of fresh water are diverted down the Caloosahatchee canal into the bay. I believe that man's modification of the river and the lake have had far more effect on the bay's water quality than the causeway.

Since the causeway was completed, the quantity of people, automobiles, boats and concrete in Lee County has probably increased by 1000%. Air quality has suffered; rain scrubs the pollutants from the air and deposits them in the bay. Instead of first filtering through the land, huge volumes of rain water now run directly into the bay carrying pollutants. Septic fields and sewage treatment plants all over the county eventually drain into the bay.

Boat motors all release exhaust products directly into the bay. All of this has had more effect on the water quality in the bay than the causeway islands.

Although most of Sanibel/Captiva residents don't use them for recreation, the causeway islands have a significant recreational value to other county residents. If the causeway islands disappear, people from around the county who do use the causeway for recreation would instead continue over the new bridge and increase the pressure on the Gulf beaches. In a county that is planning to fill in a wetland to double the size of an under-utilized airport, a handful of scallops seems a reasonable trade off for the recreational value of the causeway islands.

Instead of eliminating the causeway islands, the new bridge project should make them larger and enhance the available recreational opportunities with a fishing pier, a boat dock, better rest rooms, and perhaps a permanent food vendor. The tourists will keep coming, but they need something to do instead of driving up and down Periwinkle Way.

On the Water

You thought Honda just made cars?

It's been just over a year that I have had a four-stroke outboard engine on my boat. Is it the future of boating or a good way to get around environmental laws? Here's some thoughts on the next generation engines. My Honda 90 hp was the biggest one made a year ago. And while Honda

had been producing four-stroke (no oil added to gasoline) engines for several years, other companies like Yamaha and a few major American firms had started out with smaller engines. Most were under 50 hp. I had a boat made for me which would run with six passengers and use the

Honda 90 to do it. As far as I know, I'm the first guide in this area to use the Honda for commercial use.

Federal pollution laws are changing and engine makers are being forced to make cleaner burning outboards. The four-stroke Honda is basically a car engine sitting upright and, it's said, far better at keeping the air and water clean than a two-cycle engine.

If there are drawbacks, certainly one is the relatively small horsepower the present engines come with. Honda has a 130 hp now, but what about boaters who need 200-250hp?

Also, four strokes tend to behave somewhat like inboard engines. They have to be taken up to full power slowly and brought back down the same way.

The good parts of running a four-stroke are quietness, no smoke, no buying and mixing oil...and enormous gas savings.

That last one is most important to guides. I average 4.7 gallons per hour; at trolling speed, the Honda uses hardly any fuel.

This week a writer from a national boating magazine is coming down to do some tests on the boat and engine. He'll

check the fuel consumption, too. Should be an interesting test. I'll tell you how it went.

Did you catch the story about how freshwater trout in a couple of Texas streams were dying mysteriously? It turns out they are eating fire ants?

Seems the fish have been going belly up in big numbers this year. Finally someone discovered they are eating too many fire ants which fall into the rivers.

If you've ever felt that fish are smart, just remember this story. You have to wonder how many fire ants trout will eat before it realizes it's tongue is on fire.

Shelling

Shelling this week has been turning up a lot of colorful lettered olives. Snorkeling was not as clear as we wanted, but just walking the beach was turning up enough to keep us looking.

People digging in the muddy bars off the south side of Sanibel Island have been doing well—as long as they don't come in contact with stingrays.

Good shelling and fishing this week.

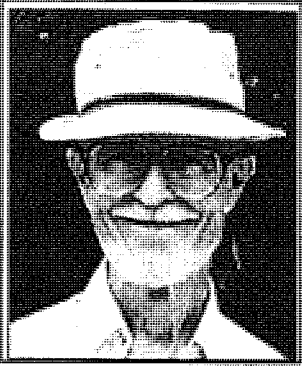

Not a pretty legislative session

Now that our representatives in Tallahassee have closed up shop for the season, it's time to review the record. It's not a pretty one.

Consider, for example, HB 4141, a bill written by lobbyists for Big Sugar and introduced by Naples Republican Burt Saunders. Saunders' bill was designed to give the Joint Legislative Committee on Everglades Oversight veto power over the federal plan to restore the Everglades. The federal restudy of the Central and South Florida Flood Control Project, authorized by Congress in 1996 and conducted by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, is scheduled to be completed and presented to Congress next year.

Saunders' bill was quickly endorsed by the editors of the *Fort Myers News-Press*. Slightly reworded, the bill was also endorsed by prominent conservation groups and the Florida Department of Environmental Protection. Charter members of the Theodore Roosevelt Society, a newly-formed group of Republican environmentalists, offered no comment.

But when Rep. Porter Goss and several other members of Florida's congressional delegation sent word that the legislation could jeopardize federal funding, many of those who had endorsed Saunders' bill earlier, switched sides to lead the fight against it. All the major newspapers in the state, (except the *News-Press*) ran editorials urging Governor Chiles to veto the bill.

Meanwhile, legislation crafted by lobbyists for Flo-Sun, a large Everglades sugar producer, was offered as an amendment to a bill that would have created Florida 2020 (a land acquisition program designed to succeed Preservation 2000). Florida's eminent domain law, perhaps the most generous in the nation, allows landowners who feel they can bargain for a higher price, to appeal lower court decisions all the way to the Florida Supreme Court. Win or lose, Florida taxpayers pick up the tab for all of the legal fees. Federal condemnation law is less generous.

The amendment, introduced by Rep. Earl Ziebarth (R - Deland) was designed to force the federal government to use Florida condemnation law to acquire land in the Everglades, guaranteeing higher costs for the taxpayer and slowing the acquisition process. Critics dubbed it the "Fanjul Welfare Bill." "Realizing the Florida 2020 bill wasn't going to pass, the amendment's sponsors quietly attached it as a rider to HB 4071, an environmental bill that had general support.

Postmortem on *The Death of a Sparrow*

Several weeks ago, readers of *Eco-Talk* were warned that the Florida grasshopper sparrow faces imminent extinction. The endangered sparrow nests only on dry prairie. Unfortunately, its major breeding ground, the National Audubon Society's Ordway-Whittell Kissimmee Prairie Sanctuary, has been flooded during nesting season each of the past three years.

Several years ago, the owner of a cattle ranch south of the sanctuary plugged the culverts that allowed surface water from the prairie to flow across his land into nearby Fish Slough. Since then, the prairie has become a swamp, and several feet of water have covered the nesting sites. Concerned that a species under its protection might vanish, Audubon Society, together with the Department of Justice, sued the rancher in federal court under

the Endangered Species Act.

Action was swift in coming. On May 28, U.S. District Judge Michael Moore issued a preliminary injunction against the property owner and ordered the culverts opened. And seven new culverts will be added.

"The court has upheld Audubon's private property rights," claimed Paul Gray, manager of the sanctuary.

The parties have until the end of September to resolve their dispute. If they have not reached an agreement by then, Judge Moore will impose a final settlement.

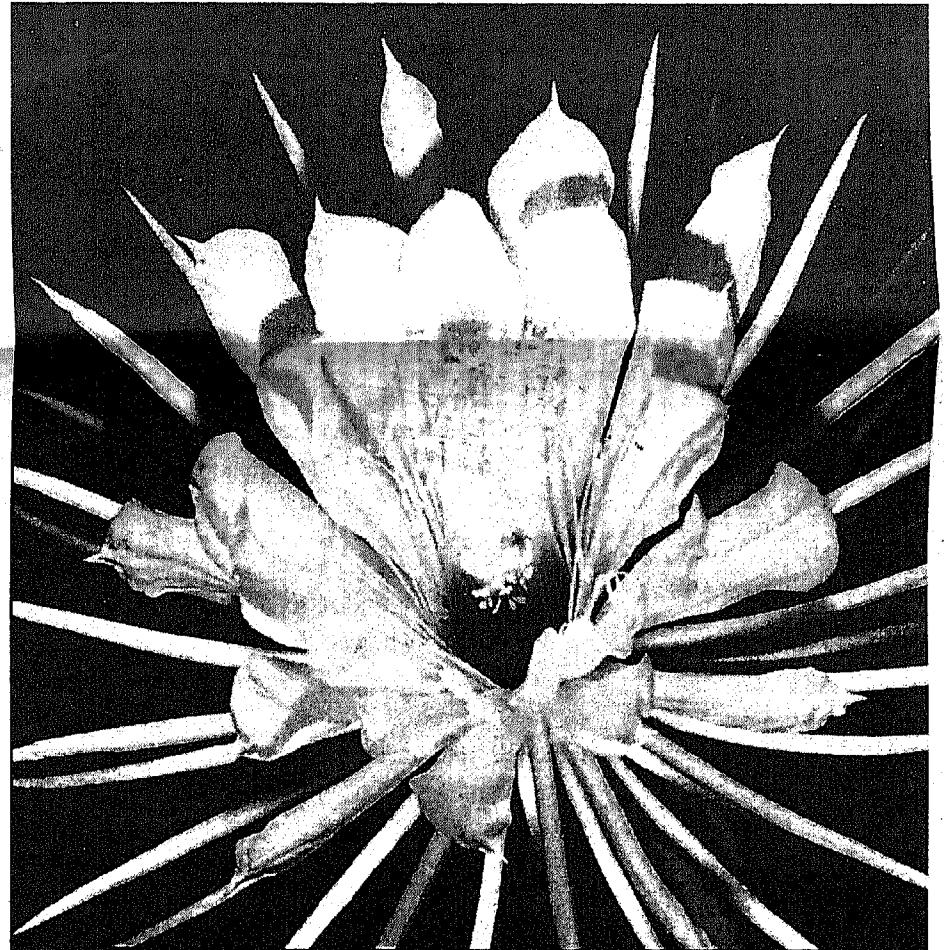

It's Show-time!!!

When driving or walking on a summer night on Sanibel, away from the busyness, you not only hear different and interesting sounds, but for the next month or so, your eyes will also be treated to a feast. On palm trees, trailing off fences and, once in awhile, on houses are plants with enormous (sometimes a foot across) fragrant blooms. Blossom time for the so-called night blooming cereus, some of which are not true cereus but most of which belong to the family *cactaceae*, is just now starting. The huge flowers and exotic aroma serve as attractants to the moths which pollinate them.

These plants are widespread in tropical America and are frequently planted (or find their way) to the base of palm trees where they put down roots and vine their way up the trunk. Some will also cling to stucco, and homeowners occasionally plant the cactus near the house where, when it climbs, it adds a more tropical look to their overall landscaping efforts.

Showy examples on Sanibel can be found at the Island Inn and beside the road in front of Casa Ybel. Both of these are the epiphytic *Cereus pteranthus* or snake cactus. (Epiphytes comprise those species, like the common "air plant" or Spanish moss, which grow on another plant but do not sustain themselves off that plant.)

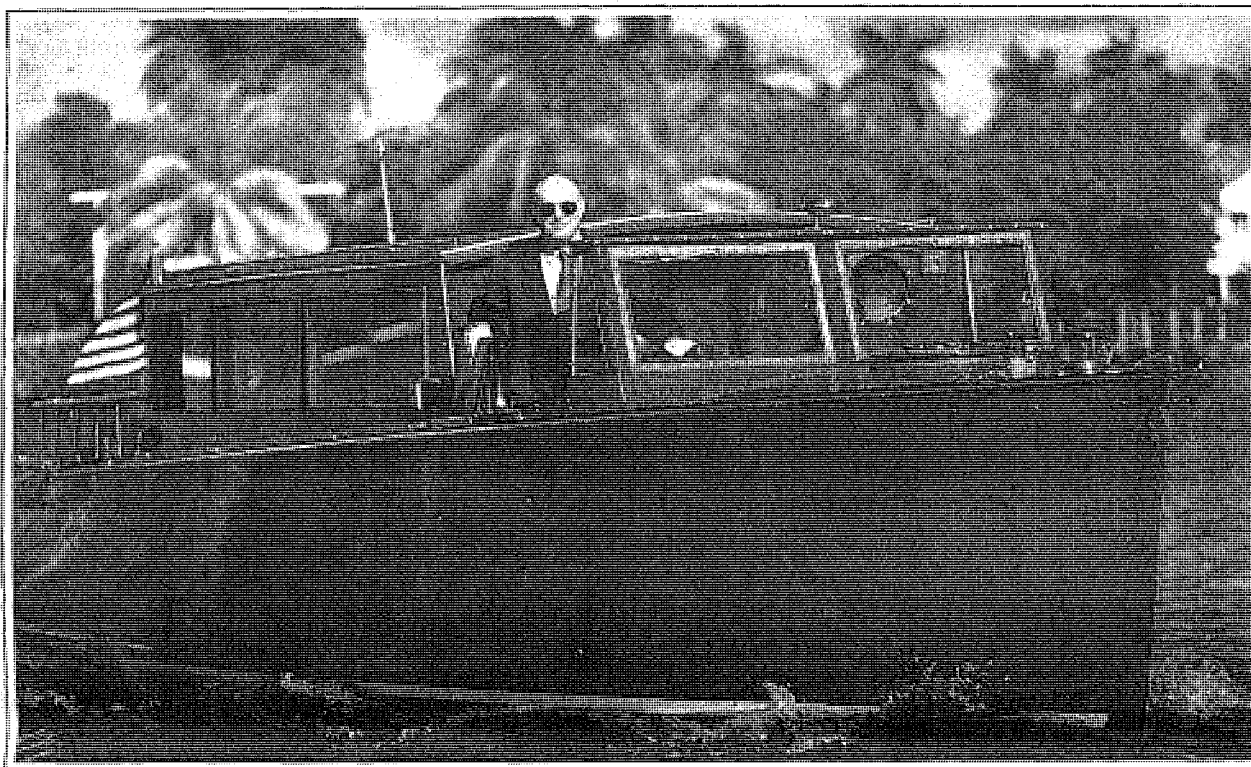
Hylocereus undatus, another of the night-blooming cereus, also goes

by the more romantic name Queen of the Night. It blooms in full regalia next to Island Pizza on Periwinkle and in the front yard of a house on the east side of Lindgren. It has 3-angled or -winged stems with short spines and climbs by attaching aerial roots; its buds resemble pointy-looking eggs.

When the snake cactus first starts budding it puts forth little fur balls along the stems that, night

by night, get bigger and bigger, turn into obvious buds and—if you're not really, really patient—will bloom after you've decided that they're not going to "make it" tonight and gone inside. (They all require infinite patience, not just the snake cactus.) When you look the next morning, all that remains is a droopy, tired-looking, spent bloom. Keep your eyes open when you're out at night!

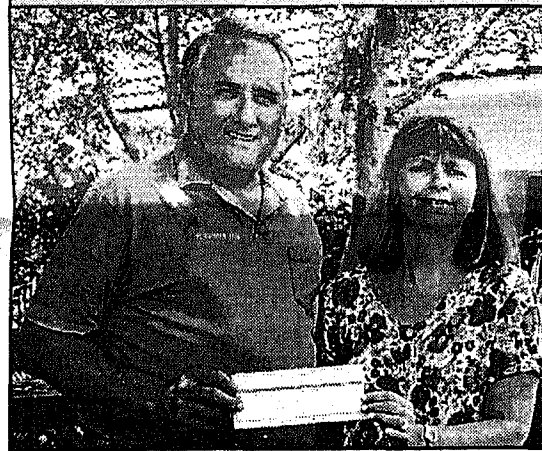

Hemingway Festival, from 3A

Patrick, Ernest's second son and father of fishing personality Mina Hemingway, credits his difficult birth with the inspiration for the difficulties that overcame Nurse Barkley in *A Farewell to Arms*. His wife, former chairman of the Theatre Arts Department at New York's City College, Dr. Carol Thompson Hemingway, is a speaker at the literary conference; Mina is not only director of the the Writing Competitions and the Flats Fishing Tournament (to be held in July), but also serving as the final judge for the short story contest; and daughter-in-law Valerie Hemingway is partially responsible for the archiving of Hemingway's papers after his death, having served as the author's secretary for a period of time. Anne Hemingway Feuer, Hemingway's niece and a published poet, will be judging the poetry contest. Another niece, author Hilary Hemingway, is executive director of the Festival and Hilary's husband, playwright and author Jeffrey Lindsay, is director of the Literary Conference.

Hemingway papers on display

This year, the Hemingway Papers will have a new look. Reformatted for travel during the 1999 Hemingway Centennial, the almost-350 documents, pictures and letters will be mounted on display boards for exhibition.

In addition to numerous pieces of family and editorial correspondence, there are telegrams and letters from Gertrude Stein and F. Scott Fitzgerald, among others. News articles and pictures from France, Key West, Cuba, Bimini, Africa Michigan and Oak Park are joined this year by additional photographs given by the Kennedy Library. "In addition," Hilary Hemingway pointed out, "for the first time, we are going to have the opening chapter of *The Sun Also Rises* on display. This is a rough first draft with his notes plainly visible."

The Hemingway Exhibit will be on display at BIG Arts Cultural Center in

Schein Performance Hall from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. throughout the Festival. The exhibit will continue through August 14 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. It is free and open to the public.

Literary Festival

The major event of the festival is, as one might suspect, the Literary Conference on Saturday and Sunday. Featuring presentations by internationally known novelists, poets and screenwriters, the conference includes book-signings and celebrates the publication of two novels — one, the winner of last year's First Novel Contest, *Flesh* by Rick Skwiot, and the other, the latest Hemingway/Lindsay collaboration, *Dreamchild*. In addition to two full days of presentations, the \$149 registration fee includes two continental breakfasts, two lunches and on Sunday, following the writer's contests awards ceremony, free hors d'oeuvres at a cash bar.

The Sanibel Bookshop is book provider to the Festival and will have numerous titles on display during the event.

Family events

Two tournaments will engage Festival attendees in more athletic pursuits... On Saturday and Sunday a mother/daughter vs. father/son tennis tournament and mixed doubles competition are designed to encourage sportsmanship, teamwork and family unity. And a golf tournament on Saturday offers the opportunity to challenge the Hemingway family and literary guests on The Dunes championship 18-hole course.

Entry fee for the two-day tennis tournament is \$35 per event, \$55 for the additional doubles competition. The \$75 entry fee for the golf tournament covers cart, greens fee, continental breakfast and awards lunch.

A Children's Art & Adventure Camp runs all day for the full three days of the Festival. For children from 5 to 12 years old, Sundial's Beach Safari will offer the kids opportunities to participate in arts activities, biking, swimming, kayaking, beach walks and eco-tours. Guest speakers from local environmental groups will

also make presentations.

The price includes lunch and all supplies — \$39 per day or \$110 for the full weekend.

Workshops and a staged reading

Several workshops are also going on during the Festival on Saturday and Sunday — Fine Art with PBS artist, Bob Fagan, from 1-4 p.m.; a photography workshop led by award-winning NBC cameraman Charles Ray at the same time; and a ceramics workshop with popular local artist/instructor Marjorie Bronsted from 9:30 a.m.-2:30 p.m. The workshops all take place at BIG Arts.

On Saturday night a staged reading of *The Lost Generation* by the Hemingway-Lindsay duo will be presented in Schein Hall. The \$8 ticket includes a wine and cheese reception and conversation with the playwrights.

Details on these events as well as on related arts competitions can be found on page 2B of the *Islander*.

Celebrations

In addition to all the other events, two dinners celebrate Papa Hemingway's life and times. The *Old Man & the Sea* Authors Dinner on Friday, June 19, will transport diners to a Cuban fishing village, reminiscent of those tropical villages that became a home away from home for young Ernest. The village ambiance offers the perfect atmosphere for guests to meet the authors, editors, agents and Hemingway family members who will be featured during the Festival, and the sounds of island music will be everywhere. A Story Telling Contest will take place during this event to commemorate the life of Leicester Hemingway, Ernest's brother, a great storyteller in his own right.

The poolside buffet will feature many of Ernest's favorites from land and sea — fresh fruit spears, fried oysters, boiled clams, shrimp and chorizo, snapper with citrus butter, roast pork loin, seafood paella, black beans and rice, brown sugar banana cake, and honey/cinnamon sopapilla, among other delicacies.

Hosted by Sundial Resort, the *Old Man & the Sea* dinner starts at 7 p.m. and is \$49 per person, \$15 for children from 5-12, and free for children 4 and under.

The second dinner, Papa's Father's Day Dinner, is on Sunday evening from 7:30 to 10 p.m. at The Dunes Golf & Tennis Club. A very special Father's Day Dinner, the meal will be followed by readings from members of the Hemingway family and authors featured at the Writers' Conference.

The international buffet, symbolizing Ernest Hemingway's travels around the world, will feature entrees and appetizers from the United States, Europe, Africa and Asia. European dishes include Italian pastas, French cheeses and breads, paella from Spain and Swiss chocolate cake. Entrées from the United States include Midwestern steamship round of beef, Montana beef medley, Idaho baked potatoes, Michigan blueberry pie and, of course, Key lime pie. From Africa and Asia come Moroccan/Mediterranean vegetables and couscous; there will also be an Oriental stir-fry dish and a wild game entrée. Jazz by the John Chapman band will serenade guests during dinner.

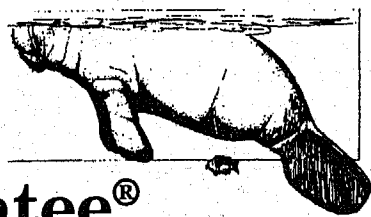

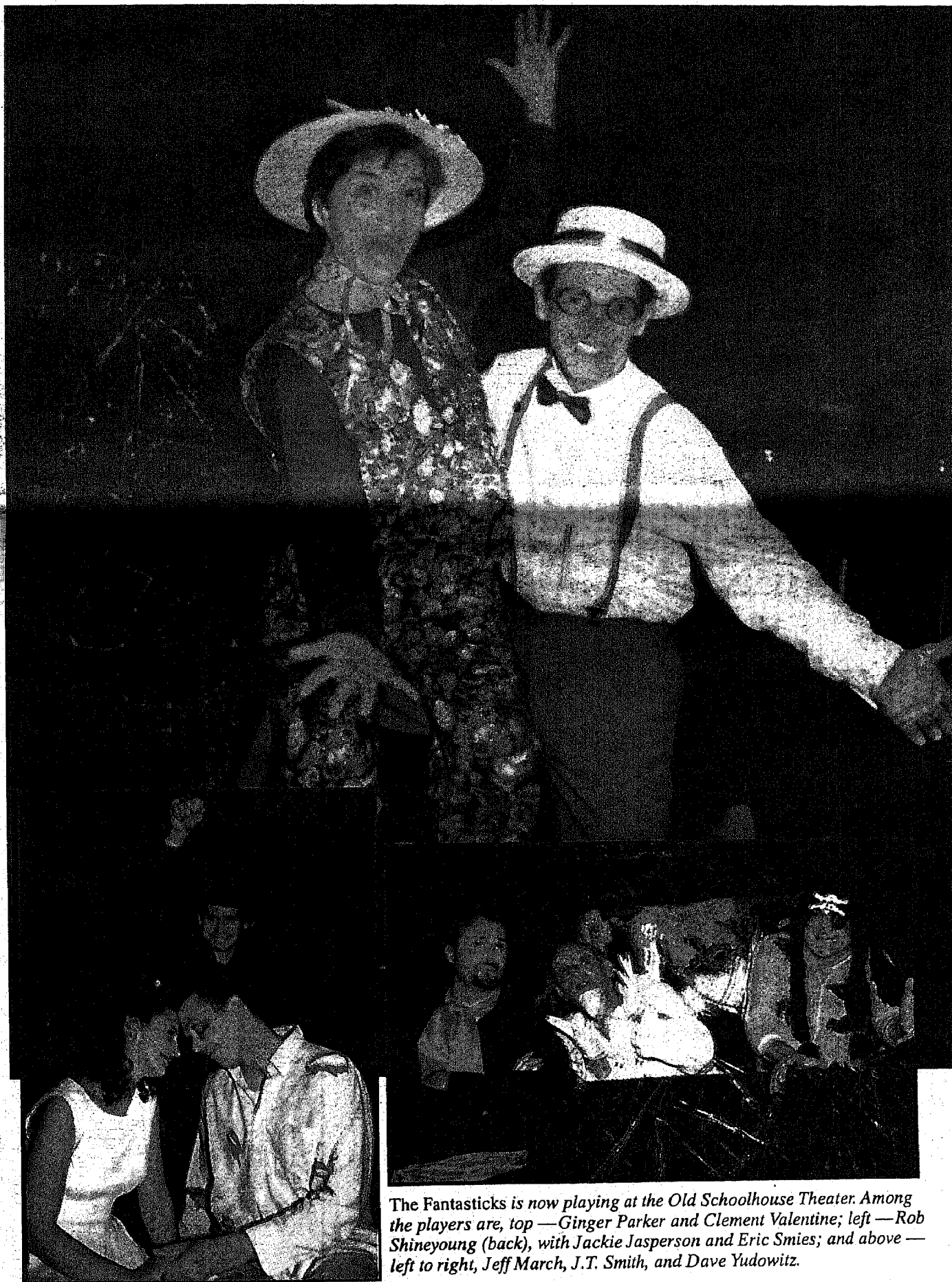

Food For Thought

By Paul Gaeta

Transport the family to the Mediterranean with chicken breasts marinated in 1/4 cup olive oil, 4 tsp. honey, 1 tsp. cumin and 1/2 tsp. each cardamon, hot paprika and ancho chile powder. Brown chicken in a skillet, then roast in a 425 oven about 20 minutes.


Fresh blueberries and raspberries are luscious over rich cheesecake. Melt a half cup raspberry jam; brush over the top of the cake first, then over the fruit. Garnish with mint.

Tender baby lettuce salad gets a nice crunch from diced, peeled jicama and roasted cashew nuts—and smooth sweetness from a mango pureed into the lime-juice/olive oil dressing.

Garlic keeps best in a cool, dark place. Don't refrigerate; it changes the taste. If garlic does sprout, cut away the green.

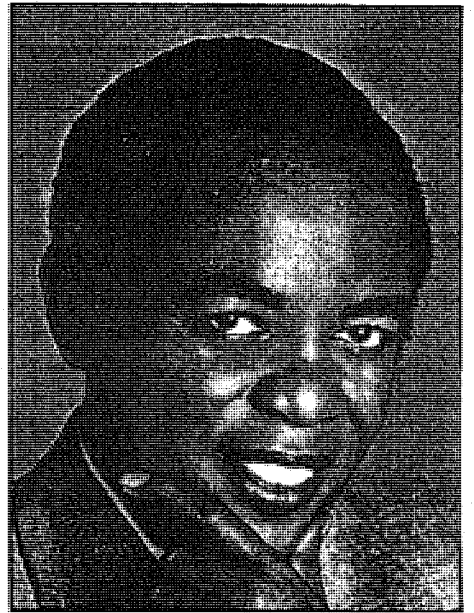

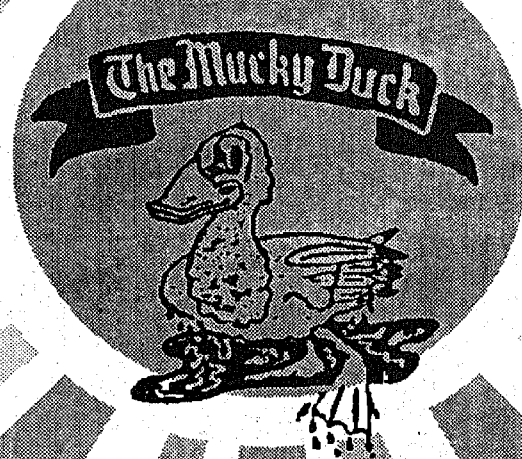

A farewell to Younger than Springtime

As I watched this season's Broadway Palm Dinner Theater production of Rodgers and Hammerstein's *South Pacific* and heard Lt. Cable sing "Younger Than Springtime" to Liat, memories of a very sad and terrifying night were all around me.

In the early 70s I was directing and choreographing an original revue called *The Great American Musical Comedy*. The two stars of the original company had been Russell Nype — the young man who had made such a sensation in *Call Me Madam* when he sang the Irving Berlin song, "You're Not Sick, You're Just in Love," with the queen of musical comedy Ethel Merman — and Lynne Stuart, who was at the time my mentor. Lynne had been the understudy and gone on for almost every musical comedy star on Broadway.

The Great American Musical Comedy was a swift history of America's great contribution to world theater, the musical comedy. It began with the *Black Crook* and wended its way through two acts of popular songs from many productions, ending with ones from the Golden Years of musical theater, the '50s and '60s. Our accompanist was the pianist-arranger Ethan Morden who has since written several books on the history of musical comedy (as well as a number of novels that are classified as "literate male porn.")

The rehearsal period was a bit stormy as Mr. Nype had a rather high opinion of his talents (he did have a special way with a song) and was most insistent that his entrance number be "It's A Lovely Day Today" that he had also sung in *Call Me Madam*. The ensuing bits and barbs between the two performers are typical of a rehearsal period with two domineering personalities. But my patience and pampering won out and had a successful opening at the John Drew Theater in East Hampton.

The show had played several more dates when Nype got some rather impressive television bookings on the West Coast and we were left looking for a suitable replacement.

William Tabbert, the original Lt. Cable in *South Pacific*, sang for everyone, including the producers and seemed ideal. We went into rehearsal again for another pending engagement. Tabbert was a hard worker, had his problems with certain staging movements but, on the whole, was a dream of a person to work with. The time eventually came for the first run-through, hopefully without stops. Tabbert had just finished singing "Younger Than Springtime" and was going into the next section when he suddenly glazed over, his speech became slurred and he had to sit down.

Thinking it might be a heart attack, we immediately called 911. The ambulance arrived and took him to Roosevelt Hospital on West 50th. We followed by cab, went immediately to the emergency room and waited for any news. We were finally told that he had had a severe stroke and was in serious condition. Naturally, his family had been called. They arrived and Tabbert died shortly after that.

I'm afraid I never hear "Younger Than Springtime" without being reminded of the time I heard Bill Tabbert sing it for the last time.

A most unusual and very happy bonding took place in the Old Schoolhouse Theater on June 4 when artist-in-residence J.T. Smith brought his production of *The Fantasticks* to the Schoolhouse stage for a limited engagement — it closes on July 11.

The Fantasticks offers a light-hearted, unpretentious evening and gives us a captivating look back at the way we were in those days of great innocence — the '50s and '60s. You're free to examine and enjoy your belief in firm values, and you are filled with a feeling of "Gee, but it's good to be here." You are immersed in belief in some almost-forgotten values, mesmerizing performances, lovely music — well-played by double keyboard artists, Lucille Gaita and Scott Wynne and nicely sung by the company. There is no question in your mind as to where you are or why you are there. You are in a place filled with magic — tinsel, wonderfully effective costumes, lights, tricks, special effects and, for the time you are ensconced in the lovely ambiance of the Old Schoolhouse Theater, you feel completely safe and suffused with a feeling of trust that assures, "Everything will turn out all right" — and, lo and behold, it does.

There has got to be a very good reason why this tiny Jones and Schmidt musical, *The Fantasticks*, has its own special listing in the *Guinness Book of World Records* for being the world's longest running show of any category still running in its original theatre. It is in its 39th year. Why? It's a heck of a good show and tugs on all of your emotions so skillfully you don't mind at all.

The play is about two neighboring families bringing up their kids. The parents are usually two fathers but J.T.'s decision to make the parents for this production a mother and a father seemed a very valid one. The trials and tribulations of raising a family, instilling values, etc. seems to be heightened because of this casting concept. It is especially true when the two are played by island favorites

Ginger Parker, as the Boy's Mother (Hucklebee), and Clement Valentine, as the Girl's Father (Bellomy). You can rest assured that, if there's a laugh to be gotten or a tear to be tugged, one or the other of such a knowing two-some will wrest it from the audience.

The Girl (Luisa) is played by Jackie Jaspersen with squeaky-clean charm and a winning personality. She is certainly from the Rodgers and Hammerstein ingenue casting mold but with one outstanding difference — she's got spunk.

Eric Smiles plays The Boy (Matt) with the conviction of Superman and, as he is whirled through the outside world in search of who knows what, he encounters situations that would have given Hercules pause. But, fortunately, with a smile and a song and the belief in himself and his true love, the ending is plu-plus happiness.

Jeff March gives the Narrator (El Gallo) the bit of worldliness that balances out the group and Rob Shineyoung as The Mute is, pure and simple, a fascinating presence on stage.

J.T. as the Old Actor (Henry) and his side-kick Dave Yudowitz as The Indian or the Man Who Dies (Mortimer) throw themselves onto the stage with a conscious effort to dominate everything in sight. Let there be no question in anyone's mind, that is exactly what they did with a great mix of humor, and wonderfully so.

You're certain to immediately associate many nostalgic moments with songs from the fabulous score. Some of the numbers are *Try to Remember*, *Much More*, *I Can See It*, and *They Were You*.

Performances are at 8 p.m. Wednesdays through Saturdays with special 3 p.m. Sunday matinees for the convenience of the many Old Schoolhouse patrons who can't or don't like to drive at night. All seats are \$15 — General admission.

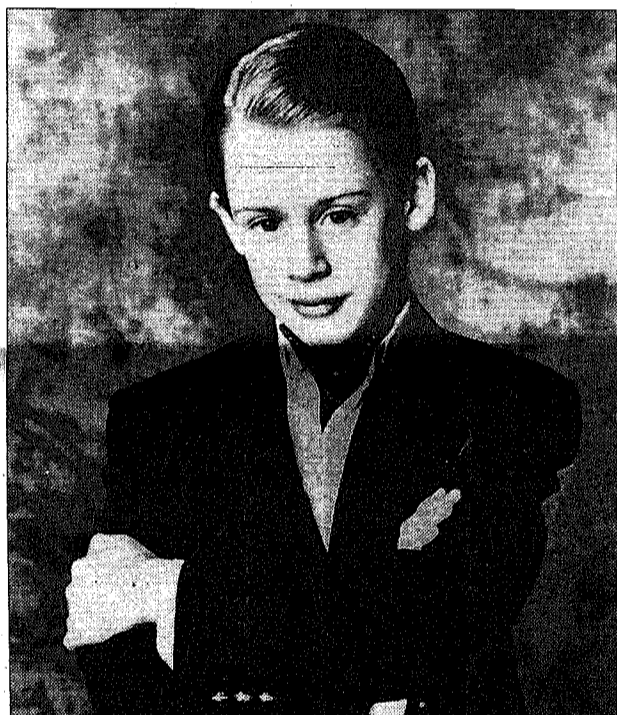

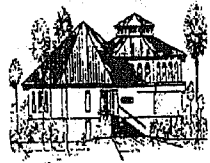
of the Board members and we came up with this idea." He added that participants will get a glimpse of the direction the Symphony Chorus will be taking when the new season kicks off this fall.

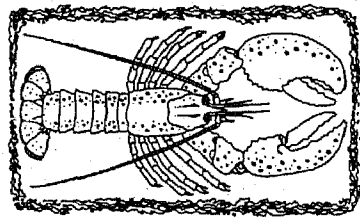

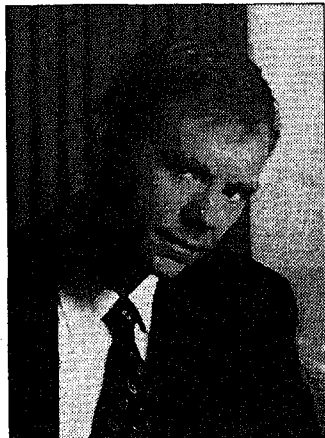
Mel Solberg, a lifeguard for 14 years, is among those heroes profiled in *L.A. Lifeguards* Sunday, June 14, on TBS.

Book: The Only Good Lawyer

Author: Jeremiah Healy

Rating: Two and one-half paws

**The frame is on in
*The Only Good Lawyer***

It only takes a few pages from Jeremiah Healy's new John Francis Cuddy mystery, *The Only Good Lawyer*, to realize the attraction of writing in the first person. I think it takes more skill to craft a tale that unfolds at the pace of a single protagonist. There can be no hints or explanations that take place outside the line of sight of the hero.

No across-town meetings behind the scenes to further the plot, nor lurking madmen poised to pounce. The only clues given to the reader are those exposed before the hero's own eyes.

The eyes in this case belong to John Francis Cuddy, a private investigator called in by the lawyer of an accused murderer to prove his innocence. The ac-

cused in this case is an obviously guilty down-and-out participant in a hostile divorce and the victim is the apparently squeaky clean attorney for the estranged wife. So, Cuddy wends his way from cover to cover knocking on doors and being knocked on, physically, by almost everyone he questions. The victim, one Woodrow Wilson Gant, a black up-and-comer on the legal scene, seems, by all accounts to have nothing to hide. So, why does no one have any recollection of the names of any of the women he was known to have seen? And why was he having dinner, shortly before his demise, with an unidentified fake blonde in a restaurant owned by a man he sent to prison years before while working for the D.A.'s office? Being innocent of one crime doesn't make one innocent of others.

Cuddy's belief in his client's innocence is justified, in his own mind at least, when the alibi witness he had sought is found dead, with the time of death estimated to be within 24 hours of the original murder. So the frame is on, and Cuddy must plod on from door to door seeking anyone else who could possibly have a motive for wanting Woodrow Gant planted in the ground.

Yes, this is a good book, although not earth shaking. An easy read that holds ones attention in anticipation of the true culprit's eventual exposure. Not unique, yet different enough in its format to remain fresh up until the final page.

This well-written mystery novel rates two and one-half paws from Steve and Travis, the bookstore dog.
