



Final open house scheduled for SUP Master Plan update

The public has one last shot to share input in-person on the island's Shared Use Path system.

In updating the Master Plan, the city and Lee County Metropolitan Planning Organization will hold the second and final open house on April 22 from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. at the Sanibel Recreation Center.

"We encourage everyone, motorists, pedestrians and cyclists, to join us at the April 22 Open House to contribute as we move into the recommendation stage of this important project," City Manager Judie Zimomra said. "Public safety, protection of our natural environment and public comment are the three most important comment of updating our Master Plan."

The open house also provides people with a chance to ask questions as staff will be present.

The existing Master Plan was adopted in 2009 and

has guided the implementation of updates to the SUP system over the past decade. An update of the plan is currently being conducted to guide the long-term vision for the system, and input and feedback from the community is one step in completing it.

community is one step in completing it.

As part of the process for updating the plan, an eight-member Project Advisory Committee was established. It has since held meetings in January and March. The firm Tindale-Oliver, out of Tampa, is

overseeing the project. It is aiming to complete it and present the plan to the city council in June.

In addition to hosting open houses, the firm has

In addition to hosting open houses, the firm has organized pop-up community events at the farmer's markets and festivals, as well as has created an online survey and conducted face-to-face polls.

People can submit comments online until April 30 at sanibelbikeped.com.

"As we have experienced historically, public participation in the process to update the Shared Use Master Plan has been robust," Zimomra said on April 15. "As of this morning 2,151 persons have provided their input via the online survey."

islands, or if you are not an observant, seasoned beachcomber, you might not notice that something on our islands is amiss. This spring is not like the others. The beaches are not the same as in the past. The difference is not a subtle one.

Many of us mark the seasons along our shores, and this year, the bastion of beach spring is missing lightning whelk egg cases. Those two-feet long, "snake-like" helical structures laid by female lightning whelks to house and protect her





Stevens Construction begins on BIG ARTS

Stevens Construction has begun construction on the new, two-story complex for BIG ARTS.

It is providing construction management services for the 27,000-square-foot facility, which will house a 3,800-square-foot performing arts center with a 414-seat theater. The first floor will also feature a spacious lobby, green room, box office, gift shop, catering kitchen, dressing rooms with showers and an expanded art gallery.

An education center will be situated on the second floor to host lectures; as well as painting, drawing, photography, music, dance and pottery workshops and classes. The second floor will also include an administrative department with conference rooms and offices.

BIG ARTS will feature an expansive, impactresistant, reflective glass façade at the front of the building, which will overlook an outdoor veranda while reducing the building's heat load. A broadened driveway for guest drop-off, landscaped walkways and ample parking will provide convenience

BIG ARTS is being constructed with energy efficient elements, such as a metal roof to reflect heat, chilled water heating and cooling system to provide energy efficient climate control, spray foam insulation to provide a thermal barrier from the exterior to interior, and LED lighting.

It took only four days for Stevens Construction to demolish the old 18,000-square-foot building,

Slated for completion in January, the company has been providing pre-construction services for the past year by providing recommendations and constructability reviews to ensure that the project could be achieved within the budget and tight schedule.

The BIG ARTS project was designed by Amy Nowacki Architect.

Free guided tours are at 10:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m., based Dunlop Road.



Everyone should see Israel with their own eyes

At 8:10 one morning in Israel, I boarded the 8:10 a.m. bus to Jerusalem at the Tiberias Terminal. There were only a few people on the bus so I had two seats to myself — one for me and one for my carry on which was a bit heavy.

After about an hour we arrived in Afula where many passengers boarded the bus so my luxury two-seats-to-myself ride ended when a

young man about twice as tall and twice as wide as I am claimed the seat next to me. Now I was scrunched next to the window with my carry-on on my lap. He looked like a typical young Israeli and we chatted a bit in Hebrew about the kind of innocuous things that strangers on a bus talk about.

When he received a call and

Faces on Faith began talking rapidly on his cell phone, I could not understand a word that he was saying. Frustrated, I said to myself, "I thought my Hebrew was better than that." Then I realized with a shudder that the man was speaking Arabic and that it was clearly his native tengue.

His name is Sameer, and he is a Muslim from Nazareth. He told me he was not subjected to any discriminato-

ry examinations or questions.

I took a cab from the Jerusalem bus terminal to my hotel. My driver was a Muslim named Nael. He was pursuing his livelihood just like anyone else. The man who checked me into my hotel is named Muhammad. Same goes for him.

Yet, if you believe the anti-Israel

propaganda in the media, you would think that the Arabs in Israel walk about in chains. Of course Israel must be very conscious of security, and for some Arabs and Palestinians in some parts of the country life is very difficult because of horrible acts of terror that have been perpetrated against the Jewish State.

My experiences in Israel convince me that in order to have credibility everyone should visit Israel to see with his or her own eyes what it is like before commenting about its political situation. It is complicated to be sure, and Israel is far from perfect, but putting the bulk of the blame on Israel for the current situation hardly reflects reality.

As you read these words, Pastor John Danner and I are preparing to lead a group of Jews and Christians on a joint trip to Israel. We eagerly look forward to helping our travelers see Israel with their own eyes.

"They're also going to be collecting trash along the way," Scroggin said.

From 9:30 to 11 a.m., there will be a Birds and Wildlife Tour. Following along on a car caravan, the tour will highlight the mangrove ecosystem and wildlife that reside in the area. The normal \$5 entrance fee to Wildlife Drive will apply per vehicle. Participants will meet at the flagpole outside the center.

There will be a Beach Walk from 10 to 11 a.m. Learn about the vital beach ecosystem with a guided exploration of the Perry Tract. Meet at the Gulfside City Park on Algiers Lane; parking fees will apply.

Scroggin explained that microtrash is mostly pieces of plastic, such as from a soda or water bottle, that have broken down or decomposed into smaller particles after being exposed to the sun and elements.

"Which can sometimes be consumed by animals or used for nesting," she said, adding that it is normally the type of plastic found inside of whales, fish and other marine animals.

From 11 a.m. to noon, visitors can take part in a free photo walk along the Indigo Trail.

Meet at the flagpole in front of the center.

"It's just another way for us to show people how they can enjoy nature," Scroggin said.

"It's another huge initiative right now, conservation through photographs," she added. "When you actually start taking pictures of wildlife, you really start sitting and watching and learning.



Florida peperomia

Florida peperomia is ideal for carefree gardeners

Florida peperomia (Peperomia obstusifolia) is a native groundcover primarily used for natural landscapes and shade gardens in Southwest Florida.

The unique species is an epiphytic herb with thick succulent leaves 2-6 inches long. The plant grows 6-9 inches in height and spreads and forms clumps broader than it is tall. Preferring shade environments, the plant does best in moist, less fertile and well drained environments that mimic the moist hammocks and swamps where they are found naturally.

The plant is ideal for carefree gardeners as it is very easy to take care of once established. Characterized as a slow growing groundcover, the plant can be spaced close together to encourage them to fill in faster.

The plant is classified as endangered in its natural environment as its numbers have declined due to poaching, exotic species invasion and habitat loss. The Peperomia plant can be propagated by cuttings, which makes the plant all the better to share with friends.

The plant will cascade over the side of a hanging basket or planter, making for a beautiful shade ornamental piece. The Peperomia also comes in non-native variegated varieties that tolerate a few hours of sunlight.

The Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation will host its Annual Earth Day Presentation on April 22 at 2 p.m. at the Nature Center, at 3333 Sanibel-Captiva

The presentation will tackle the topic of sea level rise from multiple perspectives with Marine Lab scientist Dr. Rick Bartleson and research associate Leah Reidenbach. An overview of the causes, challenges and next steps in confronting sea level rise will be discussed. Subjects will include fossil fuel CO2, greenhouse gas emissions, warming and acidifying oceans, effects on sea life and more.

Specific impacts on sea turtles and shorebirds will be addressed by Sea Turtle Program Coordinator Kelly Sloan and shorebird biologist Audrey Albrecht.

Climate facts and figures

Current CO2 levels in the atmosphere are 400 parts per million. The last time CO2 was that high, Arctic temperatures were 14 degrees F (7.7C) higher.

■ The rate of sea level rise is increasing — and the rate is now three times what it was during the

■ The oceans have been absorbing 60 percent more than was previously thought; meaning that as the data shows more ice melting and more heat absorption by the oceans, estimates of the range of sea level rise have been increasing over the years. The high end of two recent estimates, one by NOAA, is over 8 feet by 2100.

■ Temperatures were where they are today 3 million years ago, and sea level was 20 meters higher than today.

Florida already has high temperatures. Many plants and animals are near their high temperature

■ IEA estimates \$3.5 trillion per year cost from inaction, so risk handing future generations a bill of up to \$535 trillion.

■ With a 2 foot sea level rise, a lot of Lee County and Sanibel will be under water.







Recipe of the Week: Shrimp Wontons with Hoisin Dipping Sauce

By CHEF LORETTA PAGANINI

By the time one of my good friends on the island telephoned to invite my husband and I to a going away party to celebrate the end of the season, most of my refrigerator and freezer where already cleaned out and my pantry was already bare. As I asked her what I could bring to the get together, I kept thinking of what I could make with the few items I had left at hand. "An appetizer would be great," she replied. "No problem, what is your menu?" I asked her. "We are keeping it light and simple, we are grilling fresh fish and vegetable and ice cream for dessert, see you soon" she said. As I opened my freezer to take inventory of what was left, I kept thinking of her words "Light and simple." Well this is it I thought, a simple recipe with the

few shrimp left in the freezer, the condiments I had in the cupboard and the wonton wrappers that I purchased at the local grocery store. Best of all, I was able to make the wontons ahead of time and fry them the day of the party. I felt like this was a winning recipe and was feeling very proud of myself and very clever for coming up with it. After plating them on a nice platter and sprinkling them with a few extra green onions and putting the sauce in a cute little bowl we left for the party. As we arrived at our friend house, we were warmly greeted by her saying "l hope you made your barbecue meatballs, you know how everyone loves them." Well, you just can't win all the time! Makes about 24 wontons. (Chef's tip: To prevent the wonton wrappers from drying out, cover them with plastic wrap.)

1 package wonton wrappers Egg white, beaten with one teaspoon of water Cornstarch, as needed Vegetable oil for frying

Filling:

- pound large shrimp, cleaned, peeled and finely chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 teaspoons ginger, grated
- 1/4 cup green onion, minced
- 2 teaspoons sesame oil
- 1 tablespoon soy sauce

Combine all the filling ingredients in a bowl. Use your hands to blend the mixture. Lay a wonton wrapper on a flat surface and brush with the beaten egg white. Drop one tablespoon of the filling onto the center of the wrapper. Fold the wonton in half, corner to corner, to form a triangle.

Press around the filling to knock out any air bubbles, press the seam together to seal. You can leave them this shape or continue on by brushing the two side points with beaten egg white. Lay your index finger in the center so you have something to press up against, then fold the twi sides into the center, slightly overlapping, and press the dough against your finger with your thumb to form a tight seal. Lightly dust the filled wontons

with cornstarch to keep them from sticking together and place them on a cookie sheet. Heat 2 to 3 inches of oil in a deep heavy saucepan to 375°F on a deep-fry thermometer. Add a few of the wontons to the oil and cook, turning them a few times to get them nicely browned all over. Carefully lift them out of the pan with a slotted spoon and onto a paper towel-lined platter to drain. Repeat with remaining wontons. Serve with hoisin dipping sauce.

Hoisin Dipping Sauce: 1/2 cup hoisin sauce

- 2 teaspoons sesame oil
- 1 teaspoon sriracha hot sauce
- teaspoon honey
- 1 teaspoon rice vinegar

Mix all ingredients together in a small bowl, serve with shrimp wontons.





CCP reviews report on island

Having concluded discussions on issues raised by islanders as part of its process for updating the Captiva Code, the Captiva Community Panel turned to Plan and Code topics highlighted by its

At its April 9 meeting, the panel reviewed information from local planner David Depew.

Over the summer, he was charged with reviewing the new Captiva Plan, current Code and county ordinances on land use and development, then proposing any additional steps that the panel could take to protect the island's Plan and zoning from future amendments that increase density and intensity.

Depew submitted his findings to the panel in September, and a review was set

At the meeting, the topics discussed included: notification to the panel for any permits requiring removal of mangroves; providing the panel with copies of dredge and fill requests for island properties impacting uplands, wetlands and sub-merged lands on or within 500 feet of the high tide demarcation; impervious surface ratios to be determined and placed in the Code; and other highlighted issues.

After separate discussions, the panel decided to look further into the subjects of the dredge and fill requests and the impervious surface ratios and directed its staff to conduct additional research.

On the notification for mangrove removal permits, the members on the panel discussed the current process of going through the Florida Department of Environmental Protection and questioned if there is a problem that needs to be addressed. They decided to keep it on their radar, but not look further into it.

The panel also agreed to see what comes from its new Sea Level Rise Committee on the topic.

One of the other issues highlighted by Depew and discussed by the panel was evacuation routes on Captiva and Lee County's future plans for the maintenance and upkeep of Sanibel-Captiva Road.

"I think it's very important," Secretary Mike Mullins said. "I think we should try to preserve the evacuation routes.

Mintz proposed asking county staffers to attend a meeting to discuss the subject. The panel voiced agreement for the plan, noting that staff could also touch on other issues like storm drains and speed.

Over the past few months, the panel has focused on discussing and deciding whether to look further into several topics raised by islanders through an online sur-

"His recommendation and my recommendation is if the community is concerned, we maybe go forward with this test proposal," Jensen told the panel, referring to the pilot program.

He added that the trial's success and ensuring the data collected reflects the current state, however, will depend on gaining access to as many properties as possible. South Seas Island Resort has opted out.

Resident Lisa Riordan, who was in attendance, pointed out that South Seas does not own all the land, mostly the common areas. She volunteered to speak to the homeowners associations for approval.

Jensen noted that individuals in South Seas have reached out about wanting the service.

Rauschenberg Residency Director Ann Brady, who was also present for the meeting, reported that she would permit Fermin's company to access the properties to work, as long as no artists are on site.

Panel President David Mintz said he alerted Lee County officials to the possible trial.

He motioned for the panel approve the contract, then seek reimbursement for the funds from the county. If ongoing service is needed, the panel will try working with the county on a contract.

Also at the meeting, Mintz provided an update on the Captiva Drive walkway.

At last month's meeting, the panel voted unanimously to designate up to \$43,000 for Johnson Engineering to design and engineer the blueprint for the project. At the time, Panel Member Rene Miville questioned the firm's quote, and Mintz agreed to work with Miville and re-examine it.

"We did get it reduced," Mintz told the panel.

With Miville's help, he was able to get the price to \$37,250. In addition, Mintz and staff have been reaching out to stakeholders and those who may benefit from the project in search of donations.

"We've raised about \$6,300," he said.

Another project update provided during the meeting came from Panel Member and Wastewater Committee Chair Jay Brown. He reported that he had spent the last month contacting land owners in order to compile a list of at least 30 properties for the soil sample tests related to septic systems.

"I've recruited approximately 40 people," Brown said.

As part of the panel's efforts to gather supplemental information to go with the TKW study on wastewater alternatives for Captiva, the panel recently hired a consultant. Part of the contacted work includes determining the high water elevation of the water table under 30 island septic systems.

Those on the list have volunteered to let the soil engineer on their land to sample it.

"I figured he's probably going to encounter some problems," Brown said of why he compiled more than the 30 needed, citing that someone may not be home and the engineer may not gain access.

He added that the soil sampling could start the second week of May.

Brown brought up a concern about what the engineer should do if he discovers a malfunctioning system, questioning if he should tell the owner or property manager or say nothing at all. After some debate, the panel voted that he should collect the data confidentially, as planned, and do nothing.

If owners want any details, they can reach out to the

■ Mintz reported that Panel Member Bob Walter's seat is up in December and he is termed out. He suggested a list of names to make up the nominating committee in overseeing his replacement.

Mintz noted that he hopes to maintain South Seas' representation on the panel.

'They represent half of the island," he said.

The panel voted in support of Mintz's suggestions for the committee.

Panel Member Michael Lanigan, chair of the Hurricane Communications Committee, reported that members met and discussed what they thought the island needed or lacked in terms of information. The committee felt that preseason information was less important than details before and after a storm.

"Once that storm is announced and really after the storm, I think that's where there's a real demand," Lanigan said. "So, we focused a lot on that and identified sources of information."

He noted that Lee County Sheriff's Office Lt. Mike Sawicki suggested reaching out to the city of Sanibel and asking if a Captiva representative could join in on its hurricane partners' meetings.

"It's going to take some time to put together a scope and plan," Lanigan said.

planned for Turner Beach. Engineer Jeremy Herget explained that there are two main issues: erosion in the parking lot and rip-rap along the shoreline.

"We're mainly looking at the parking lot area," he said.

According to Herget, areas targeted for improvement include the asphalt curtain at the entrance and the catch basins at the entrance and south end, as much of the erosion is focused on the lot's south end.

"So all of the stormwater will slope-toward one or the other catch basin," he said.

The firm is also recommending shutting down pedestrian access to the beach through the dunes by building them up about 4 feet, extending the fence to the rip-rap and planting new vegetation.

Herget added that the only access would be adjacent to the parking meters.

"All of our work is landward, except for the rip-rap," he said.

Herget explained that the rip-rap along the shoreline will be approximately 300 feet and raised to an elevation of 6 feet, and it will tie into where the CEPD has already done some rehabilitation work.

"We're not going outside of the existing footprint," he said of the project

"The number of parking spaces will stay the same," Herget added.

The firm is contracted with Lee County and the city of Sanibel on the project, but the Florida Department of Environmental wanted approval from all stakeholders before it provides permits.

Weaver reported that she asked APTIM, the CEPD's engineering consultant, to review the project. It had no concerns with the plans, nor that it may interfere with the upcoming beach renourishment.

The commission voted 4-0 to support the project; Treasurer Bob Walter had stepped out.

During the meeting, the commissioners also discussed adjusting the schedule for approving the tentative apportionment for the beach renourishment and for scheduling the public hearing. In a 5-0 vote, they agreed to accept a methodology and then hold the meeting, but no later than January.

In other news

■ Weaver reported that staff located a 2012 survey of the Alison Hagerup Beach parking lot, which is

being submitted to Lee County to determine if it will suffice to proceed with the permitting work.

Deputy Administrator Joe Wagenti reported that he met with the company that will work on redesigning the CEPD website with him. The project will likely get under way in the next week.

Weaver noted that the commission will have a vote on the design once it is completed.

vey and at public workshops conducted last year. At last week's meeting, it reviewed concerns written in the comments section of those surveys.

On the topic of cleaning up and landscaping the entrance to the beach on Andy Rosse Lane, panel members and those in the audience debated whether to simply fix the issue or get the county involved.

"We can fix it, landscape it," Panel Member Rene Miville said. "The county is not going to care."

Resident Wendy Childers, who brought the issue forward with her hus-

band, explained that doing so would only be a temporary solution as the area would require ongoing maintenance to keep it up.

"We need a plan that's enduring and can last," she said. "That's easy to maintain"

All agreed that a committee would be formed to come up with a plan.

As for the issue of an island-wide bicycle path and sidewalk or boardwalk needed for pedestrians, the panel and attendees discussed and agreed that there is some concern for safety on some of the roads.

Lee County Sheriff's Office Lt. Mike Sawicki recommended that the panel consider creating and enforcing a required setback for vegetation along the roads throughout the island. He explained that it would provide shoulder and safety space, without the time and money needed for road expansion.

"It would be the most readily available solution," Sawicki said.

The panel directed staff to research possible existing setbacks and ones that could be adopted.

The panel decided not to do anything

on the subjects of: burying power and cable lines, trolleys and other alternative transportation, affordable housing for island employees, alert system to limit vehicles on Captiva, toll on Blind Pass Bridge, cohesive plan and image for dissemination, and rabbit control.

Two issues — better hurricane communication, and better facilities and parking lot improvements at Alison Hagerup Beach — are being handled by the panel's new Hurricane Communications Committee and the Captiva Erosion Prevention District, respectively.

Regarding Fr. Christopher Senk and Saint Isabel Catholic Church

Island residents, and visitors alike, have been following what we consider to be the unjust actions against the long-time Pastor of St. Isabel Catholic Church, Fr. Christopher Senk. Since October 2016, Fr. Senk and his literally hundreds of devoted supporters have suffered terribly as a result of actions taken by the Bishop of the Diocese of Venice, Bishop Frank Dewane. After nearly 30 months, a letter inserted in the St. Isabel bulletin (weekend of March 30-31) and posted on its website described the decision made and the consequences regarding the false allegations against Fr. Senk. The letter stated that the Congregation for Clergy (in Rome) and Bishop Dewane decreed that Fr. Senk should be sent to a health facility in Michigan for a year of "prayer and penance" and also be subject to various penalties for several years to come, implying that Pope Francis had signed off on this decree as well. Below is our reply to the Bishop's letter.



Dear Parishioners and Friends:

The letter from Bishop Frank Dewane inserted into the St. Isabel Parish bulletin on March 31, 2019, has brought, yet again, profound anguish and disillusionment to our beloved pastor, Father Christopher Senk, and serves as an instrument of division and distrust within the parish and wider community.

Parishioners For Justice continues to support our pastor, Fr. Christopher, because the decisions communicated by the Bishop are unwarranted and unjust, and the Bishop's letter itself is, unfortunately, misleading. Here are the facts as we understand them:

- Despite what the Bishop says, there is no reason to believe that Pope Francis had any role in this matter or ever saw or approved anything that the Bishop or the Congregation for Clergy proposed. There would have been no reason for the Pope to become involved, since Bishop Dewane was admittedly forced to withdraw his original, unfounded request that Fr. Christopher be dismissed from the clerical state, which is the only action that would have required the Pope's attention.
- The Bishop's artful reference to the "Apostolic See," as if he were describing actions by the Pope, is misleading, since the Apostolic See actually comprises the entire bureaucracy in the Vatican, such as the Congregation for Clergy.
- The contention that Fr. Christopher's acceptance of gifts from members of the parish constituted an "appearance of impropriety" and maybe even "exploitation" cannot be reconciled with the affidavits and other written assurances provided to the Bishop and to the Congregation. Those affidavits were authored by the persons who chose to make those gifts, or who were personally familiar with the circumstances under which they were given. These witnesses from the parish explained that not only did Fr. Christopher not solicit these gifts or trick them into giving them, but in all cases the parishioners chose to show their generosity for his faithful service to the parish without his prior knowledge.
- Evidence that showed that Fr. Christopher was innocent was disregarded as allegedly "implausible." This cavalier and condescending dismissal of the evidence from mature and sophisticated members of the parish who know the facts is gratuitously insulting to the witnesses and should be insulting to all members of the parish. Neither the Bishop nor his brother bishops on the Congregation for Clergy in Rome know Fr. Christopher nearly as well or at all in the case of the Congregation as do the many parishioners who provided the exculpatory evidence that they chose to ignore.
- For the Bishop and the Congregation to order Fr. Christopher to move to a remote facility for a year of "prayer and penance," when he has done nothing warranting any punishment, is unwarranted and cruel. It disregards the fact that he already has been excluded from his home at the rectory, banished from the parish, and forbidden to celebrate the Sacraments publicly for two and a half years.
- Ironically, Fr. Christopher's banishment also punishes the parish, the very people the Bishop and the Congregation supposedly are protecting. It is time for the hierarchy to recognize that "enough is enough" indeed, too much and to abandon this vendetta against Fr. Christopher.

Let us provide more background explaining why we continue to support Fr. Christopher, despite the actions of the Bishop and the Congregation.

Not one parishioner has ever stepped forward during Fr. Christopher's 42+ years of ministry to accuse him of exploitation. The only unhappiness was expressed by a single absentee relative of a parishioner. This relative also made certain that the supposedly exploited person was unavailable for comment by the time that the Bishop initiated his investigation. By that time, of course, the civil authorities in Lee County, to whom this same relative had complained, had concluded that there was no basis to charge Fr. Christopher with any misconduct. Indeed, the Sheriff later provided a letter formally acknowledging that Fr. Christopher had been exonerated by the civil authorities.

Even so, after the Bishop decided to open his own investigation, several parishioners, including trained medical and psychological professionals who knew that supposedly exploited parishioner well, provided affidavits that when she chose to make her gifts, she was competent, deliberate, and insistent about her desire to express her appreciation for Fr. Christopher's assistance to her and the parish in tangible ways. It is difficult to imagine a legitimate reason why the Bishop or the Congregation for Clergy, in full possession of the facts, would decide to impose sanctions based on supposed appearances that that are belied by the evidence.

In seeking to understand this action, we note that, at the beginning of Bishop Dewane's intervention into Fr. Christopher's ministry, his efforts were geared to having Fr. Christopher dismissed from the clerical state. It is reasonable to infer that this extraordinary action reflected the Bishop's desire to rid himself of another priest of the diocese who had had the temerity to question the his administration of the diocese. Apparently, it became clear that this tactic would be unsuccessful, so the Bishop had to withdraw this demand that Fr. Christopher be subjected to the death penalty for his priesthood. Fr. Christopher was never advised that this direct threat to his priesthood had been withdrawn almost a year ago, another cruel abuse of a good priest. To allow the Bishop to "save face" in this widely publicized matter, the Congregation allowed him to impose a long sentence of confinement and exile at a site of the Bishop's choosing.

Even if Fr. Christopher completed this year of proposed exile, the Bishop makes no commitment that he will ever allow Fr. Christopher to return to active ministry.

The Bishop also foresees a probation period of five years in which he will exercise detailed oversight and scrutiny of Fr. Christopher's finances. He also assumes the right to exercise this oversight over the future financial dealings of anyone for whom Fr. Christopher "has exercised priestly ministry" over his forty years of ministry. The stated oversight demonstrates a condescending, even contemptuous attitude, toward the laity and particularly the members of St. Isabel's Parish. The members of this parish are mostly successful professionals, entrepreneurs, people who are highly respected in their respective fields and communities. They have achieved the opportunity to live on Sanibel because of a lifetime of good judgement, personal efforts, and abilities. It is ironic that, in light of the extensive criticism the Bishop has received for his total lack of accountability in managing diocesan resources, he claims the right to oversee individuals in managing their own resources. Further, these people are mostly the ones whom he aggressively targets for funding for his own massive pot of cash.

From its inception, Parishioners For Justice has maintained that all abuses of power are inconsistent with the message of the Gospel. The hierarchy has fumbled its responsibility to address predatory sexual abuse, which festered and flourished because of lack of accountability of the bishops. Bishops must be called to account for their failures to respond to all forms of abuse. The actions and activities of the Bishop of Venice are abusive and require assertive reactions that call for an end to this behavior. PFJ takes no pleasure or delight in calling the Bishop to task. We nevertheless have a moral and spiritual obligation to our faith and our community to continue our efforts to right the wrongs of this Bishop that have brought scandal to our Church. We cannot stand by while a good priest is vilified and attacked.

Compiled by district staff as requested by the commission, the data revealed that the majority of the calls to the east are taking eight minutes to 10 minutes - substantially longer than to other areas.

As part of the report, staff set up a mock third station near the Dairy Queen on Periwinkle Way and reran the numbers using the model. Response times in the area dropped to four minutes or under.

"We tried to explain to them what our needs are," Muench said of his recent meeting with the city, which Fire Chief Matt Scott also attended. "That we need better coverage on that east end."

He explained that they looked at and discussed potential parcels in the area, including a property located near Periwinkle and Bailey Road. Muench added that the talk was strictly fact find-

"This was all preliminary," he said. "Nothing is cast in stone."

Muench noted that available undeveloped property on the east end is limited and most of the parcels, like the one at Periwinkle and Bailey, are zoned as conservation land, so it would require rezon-

Scott reported that as it was explained to them, the city council would have to approve a measure for placement on a ballot to release a parcel zoned as such, then

the voters would decide in an election.
"It's up to the council right now, from my understanding," Muench said.

He added that a new station would be a tax increase, but it would also drop the district's ISO rating.

"But, how do you put a price on life?" Muench asked.

He praised the perfection in which the crew carried out its protocols and its professionalism.

"They were here just unbelievably fast," Gordon said. "I'm so grateful for what you guys do.'

District administrators noted for the commissioners that the same crew responded to another call regarding chest pains on March 26 and it devolved into cardiac arrest. The crew worked tirelessly on the patient for nearly 30 minutes and brought him back. He was in intensive care for over a week

Assistant Fire Chief William Briscoe reported that crews responded to a kitchen fire on March 22 at 6:30 p.m. at 671 East Gulf Drive, Unit 4C2, located in the Sandalfoot Beachfront Condominium.

It appears to have started from a backpack or laundry being placed on a hot or still-hot stove

He reported that most of the fire damage was contained to the kitchen area, but the unit sustained smoke damage throughout for a total of approximately \$80,000 in damages. In addition, the unit below it sustained water damage as a result of the incident in the amount of about \$20,000.

Scott told the commission that the new hire, Bryan Clement, started on April 2.

"He is on shift, working out well, get-ting along with everybody," he said.

Training Officer Capt. Tim Barrett agreed.

"He seems to be a really good guy," he said. "Really appreciates what he has."



sales tax and how it is being spent easily accessible.

In early April, the state distributed \$6.3 million in sales tax revenue to the district, the first of monthly scheduled distributions.

When the next fiscal year starts July 1, a new set of revenue and planned spending will be available with the previous year being archived for easy retrieval.





thousands of offspring, until the young snails are a millimeter or two in diameter and crawl from their natal egg case into the sand to begin their new life. Originally, they are anchored in the sandy bottom, but many become detached during storms and wash ashore to either puzzle, horrify, or delight beach goers.

I say snake-like because that's how they are commonly described by beach goers who are curious of their origin. They really don't look much like snakes, but we humans are enthralled by snakes — whether in a good, or a not-so-good way. And somehow that large helical structure, at least in our minds, looks like a snake.

By now, our beaches should be littered with them. Over the years, I have created a private game with one player — me — to see how early I encounter my first lightning whelk egg case. My record is early February. But as of this third week of

March, I had yet to find a single, glorious egg case. Maybe, just maybe, lightning whelk reproduction is late this year, and soon we will return to normal spring beaches festooned with egg cases. But sadly, a more likely explanation is that there will be no accumulation of egg cases this year, or perhaps maybe the next.

This likely loss is a lingering result of the red tide algal blooms of last summer and early fall. One of the phases of an intense and prolonged algal bloom is a separate but related biological process of mass decomposition; the decomposition of animals killed by the red tide toxins, and the decomposition of the billions of algal cells that bloomed and caused the red tide.

Decomposition is a process in which free-living bacteria consume organic matter. These bacteria undergo respiration (i.e., they breathe), consuming oxygen and giving off carbon dioxide. When an algal bloom is so intense, and produces so much organic matter, the bacteria reproduce very rapidly (they also bloom) and ultimately consume all of the oxygen in the water and upper layers of the sandy bottom. This portion of the ocean stripped of oxygen is called an hypoxic zone.

Hypoxic areas are also known as dead zones. They are areas not life-supporting for the animals that normally occupy the sandy ocean bottom habitats. The good news is that we no longer have hypoxic zones just off our shores. Most of the organic matter is gone, as storms have mixed the water and returned oxygen levels to normal.

The bad news is that seemingly most of the lightning whelks of reproductive age were killed during the hypoxic event. Now we wait, to see how many years it will take until our spring beaches are again decorated with lightning whelk egg cases. 





In an effort to reconnect the community to the waterways, Calusa Waterkeeper, a non-profit clean water advocacy group, is kicking off the inaugural, The Big Calusa, a recreational, educational and cultural family friendly week-long festival this month.

The event is an ambitious creation to get the community out for a fun week of recreation, culture and cleanup.

'We wanted to create a positive event and make people feel good about the water and reconnect people," KC Schulberg, Calusa Waterkeeper's executive director and creator of The Big Calusa, said. "We wanted to create a fun water festival and at different opportunities talk about water advocacy.'

The group has been in the front of the community holding events on such topics as public health, economic damage and legislation policy and regulation since last year's red tide and blue-green algae outbreak.



Refuge harnesses solar power for island

Work has been completed on installing and connecting solar panels on the roof of the Visitor & Education Center at the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge, the final phase of the refuge's solar

installation. The new solar kiosk shows information from the solar panels on the maintenance building. Visitors can interact with the kiosk to see how much energy is being generated and what the total energy can be equated to, in terms of tons of CO2 emissions avoided. smartphones charged, electric cars charged, gallons of gasoline offset and such. They can see how much energy is produced hourly, daily, weekly, monthly, yearly and in total - since the panels have been operating. The "Ding" Darling Wildlife Society-Friends of the Refuge has plans to



create interactive solar components and exhibits inside and outside the center as part of the project, which was made possible by the 2015 San-Cap Solar Connect program and donations from Fred and Alice Stanback. San-Cap Solar Connect has brought affordable solar conversion to island residents and businesses through cooperative buying.

Now it is time to devote some time on the resource itself.

"We have had amazing support We are pretty pleased. It will become an annual event," Schulberg said.

IWA offers tips to secure water before leaving town

As the end of season approaches and part-time residents begin to prepare to head off the islands, the Island Water Association offered the following tips to help keep their water secure while away:

■ Contact IWA and take advantage of the annual free turn off and turn on of the water at the meter. For those who do not have a pool or irrigation system and will be gone until next season, it makes sense to have the water turned off at the meter. IWA does not recommend that homeowners operate the curb stop on their meter. Contact IWA so one of the technicians can turn the water off at the meter. Alternatively, they can turn the water off at the backflow prevention device if the property has one. Turning the water off at the meter or the backflow device just behind the meter turns off all the water to the prop-

For those who do not want their water turned off at the meter and do not have a backflow prevention device, they can still turn off their house valve. Turning off the house valve will turn off all spigots that are attached to the house and water to the inside of the house. It is usually recommended if the water is turned off to shut off the hot water heater valves and the corresponding circuit breaker. Some IWA members have had a locking device put on their house valve or have had the house valve moved inside their garage. Turning off the house valve does not usually turn off the irrigation

■ As a precaution, remove any outside hoses that will not be used while away.

■ Have the home watch read the water meter to check for high usage and to see if water is going through the meter. IWA is only at each property once a month to get a meter reading. A lot of water usage can occur in the span of a month. Scheduling a home watch visit for the day after the pool person can prevent a hose left running, whether due to a failed timer or just for-

■ Check the usage and the amount of the water bill every month. If the usage seems excessive, check with the home watch, irrigation person or give IWA a call. Membership Coordinator Kathy is diligent about contacting members with high usage that appear on the leak log members who show continual usage 24 hours a day

but it is impossible to monitor every members' water

Put a fresh battery in the irrigation controller. During the summer months, power outages and power surges are common. The irrigation system controller has a battery back-up for these instances, but if the battery is dead, some irrigation controllers will default to a setting to water every day. Check the rain sensor to make sure it is operating property and set appropriately for your land-

Water

April kicked off with a front dropping down early in the week bringing a few windy days and scattered showers. As we moved closer to the weekend, we were back to sunny days with light wind. Offshore fishing was good for grouper and snap-per, and a good mix of fish were caught inshore.

Many boats found their limits of red grouper in the Gulf of Mexico while targeting depths from 90 to 120 feet. Grouper, with a good number over 30 inches, were hooked while dropping live

squirrel and pinfish or dead squid and sardines. Hard bottom and ledges over the same depths also yielded mangrove snapper to 5 pounds, plus lane and yellowtail snapper, plus a few porgy.

Trolling silver spoons around bait pods in depths from

40 to 60 feet, several boats found good action on Spanish mackerel, plus a few king fish or king mackerel. Barracuda and sharks were also reported around the bait

Officials: Boating and alcohol is a recipe for disaster Many boaters are not aware of the very real, life-

threatening dangers associated with consuming alcohol while boating. Add environmental stressors to the usual factors resulting from drinking alcohol, and a truly perilous condition is present, according to the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary.

Consuming any type of alcohol produces certain physiological responses that directly affect safety and well-being of the captain, passengers and other boaters. Judgment and skills deteriorate impacting peripheral vision, balance and ability to process information. Physical performance and reaction time are

Alcohol reduces depth perception, night vision, focus and the ability to distinguish colors, especially red and green navigation lights. Alcohol consumption can result in inner ear disturbance, which can make it impossible for a person suddenly immersed in water to distinguish up from down. Life jackets are designed to move unconscious victims face up, providing they are wearing one in the first place.

People from around the globe come to enjoy the local waterways. One of the biggest challenges is they bring their own boating perspectives from back home and are unfamiliar with navigating the Florida waterways and fail to realize the physical impacts of the Florida heat, sun and wind.

The leading cause of fatalities in Florida are falls overboard, with 81 percent not wearing a life jacket. Public safety experts encourage boaters to wear their life jackets and save the drinking for the marina.

"The Coast Guard has a zero tolerance policy for boating while intoxicated," U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary Flotilla Commander Nick Kaveski said. "Always have a sober captain and save the party for

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Commission - the lead agency in investigating boating accidents reported that in 2017 that 67 percent of boating accident fatalities did not take a boating safety class.

All boaters should learn more about safe boating by taking a safe boating class. Anyone born on or after Jan. 1, 1988, must have a Boating Safety Education ID Card to legally operate a boat in Florida. find the local classes Boaters can www.aux91fmb.org/safeboating or call 239-690-6780 option 1.

"These precious natural resources, including our palm-lined beaches, exotic mangrove islands, unique ecosystems of marshes, tributaries, rivers and estuaries, not only provide boundless recreational opportunities, they serve as the underpinning of our economy, our livelihood and our enjoyment of Southwest Florida. We need to cherish and preserve these

Once the wind settled down, tarpon sightings were on the rise both inshore and offshore. Tarpon in good numbers were sighted a few miles off the beach from Sanibel's Knapp's Point south to Bonita Beach. In and around the Gulf passes, tarpon were reported around the C-span of the Sanibel Causeway, plus Redfish and Boca Grande passes. With very clear waters inshore, it was often possibly for anglers to sight several dozen or more tarpon together in Pine Island Sound and Charlotte Harbor. More often than not, it was extremely

difficult if not impossible to get one to take a bait, however their appetite should improve in the coming days as our waters continue to warm.

Spanish mackerel and ladyfish were commonly found together inside or just outside the Gulf passes and over grass flats just off the intracoastal waterway in Pine Island Sound. At times they provided non-stop action for anglers tossing small silver spoons, flashy lures and live baitfish. Sharks averaging in size from 3 to 5 feet were also in good numbers. A chunk of fresh ladyfish is a sure bet to get a shark's attention.

Catch-and-release snook fishing continued strong throughout the inshore waters and around the Gulf passes. For live bait, pilchards, herring, pinfish and large shrimp were top baits, with Z-Man Jerk Shads and MirrOdines working well for the artificial guys. Snook were reported across both sides of Pine Island Sound, Blind and Redfish passes, north Matlacha Pass, and the eastern wall of Charlotte Harbor. From shore, snook were hooked from the Matlacha Drawbridge, plus the Bokeelia and Sanibel fishing piers. All snook remain closed season and are catch and release only.

Spotted sea trout were caught in Matlacha Pass, the eastern side of Pine Island Sound and in Charlotte Harbor. Fish ranged in size from 13 to 24 inches, with a decent number reported in the 15 to 17-inch class. Many of the larger fish were hooked off shorelines and oyster bars, while better numbers of smaller fish up to 18 inches were caught over bottom with a grass/sand mix in 3 to 7-foot depths. Best baits included live pinfish, shrimp, pilchards and DOA shad tails or Vudu shrimp.

Most redfish caught were hooked while fishing the same area for snook. Fish up to 32 inches were caught from northeast Pine Island Sound and up the eastern side of Charlotte Harbor. Fish reported took either live or dead bait,

including shrimp, pilchards, pinfish or cut herring and ladyfish. Redfish are also out of season and strictly catch and release only.

Give us one solid week of a consistent weather and watch what happens. For the past month, just as the fish and bait begin to get into a pattern, our weekly front drops down and we hit the reset button. Tarpon are here in good numbers with reinforcements arriving daily, plus schools of bait are here with more on the way. We just need a string of good weather for some great April


