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
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Sophomores Get a Head Start








With its best showing since 1968, the Bomber Varsity Football Squad posted a 4-5 mark highlighted by a 13-0 win over archrival South River — the first victory over the Rams in ten years.

In the process, the team set several records. A passing mark was set by Darryl Spiecker, as he threw for 322 yards against Carteret. Against the same Carteret defense Hank Zaleski had nine receptions for 175 yards and two touchdowns.
